Hello Meteor Families,

January and February are typically the months with the greatest chance of severe weather and the potential for the District to shift to an E Learning Day or take an emergency school closing day. I want to remind parents that student and staff safety is our top priority and we will only shift to an E Learning day or close school if conditions become too dangerous for students and staff to venture outside.

Fortunately we are from northern Illinois and we are accustomed to extreme weather. However if conditions become, or potentially could become, dangerous we have two options to keep students safe:

- **E Learning Days** - The state allows us to shift to an E Learning day. On these days, students attend classes in the virtual world. We use Google Meets. Students attend classes and receive instruction in the safety of their home using their school issued Chromebooks. Click here to review the [E LEARNING PLAN](#). When we shift to E Learning, we do not have to make up the day at the end of the year because an E Learning Day counts as a regular attendance day. We can use five E Learning days a year.
- **School Closure** - If for some reason we are not able to shift to an E Learning day or conditions make it so E Learning is not possible, we can cancel school. Students would not attend classes in person or virtually. When we close school and there is no instruction, we will have to add a day to the end of the school year.
