

BOARD POLICIES

The Stillwater Board of Education believes that the formulation of school policy is its primary function and responsibility. School policies are statements that set forth the goals of the community and the board of education. School policies serve as guidelines for the successful and efficient functioning of the school system. They create a framework within which the administrative staff can successfully discharge its responsibilities in organizing and carrying out a sound educational program for all students.

The board recognizes that no collections of policies can cover every potential scenario, nor is that our intent. The Constitution and appropriate laws of the United States, the Constitution and laws of Oklahoma and regulations of the State Board of Education govern the Stillwater Board of Education. These policies are an extension of those laws and regulations, and have been established by the board for Stillwater Public Schools.

Policies may be cooperatively formulated by the board of education working with students, staff, parents or legal guardians of students and stakeholders, but the final authority rests solely with the board. The implementation of school policy is the responsibility of the superintendent and the administrative staff.

The policies of the Stillwater Board of Education may be reviewed annually. Changes, additions, or deletions may be made subsequent to this annual review. However, requests for the board to consider changes in policies may be made at any time. Suggestions should be submitted in writing to the superintendent or the president of the board.

The board believes that the most important ingredient of a legitimate suggestion for policy change is a well documented need or problem and a solution that is feasible for the district.

Addition, modification, or deletion of board policies may appear on any board meeting agenda. **A board policy statement may be added or an existing policy statement may be changed or deleted at any board meeting by the approval of a majority of the membership, provided such action is properly announced by the agenda of that meeting.** ~~They will normally require first and second readings, at separate meetings on different days, prior to adoption by affirmative vote of the board. The first and second readings, as well as the planned board vote, must clearly appear in the meeting agendas. In extraordinary circumstances, when time is of the essence, the board may vote to waive second reading and proceed directly to a vote of approval, provided that possibility is clearly stated in the agenda.~~

Board policy regulations, guidelines, and exhibits are to be presented to the board for approval prior to distribution.

The board of education is aware that board action, in and of itself, may be interpreted as establishment of policy.
