

HABITUAL DISCIPLINE PROBLEMS

A student may be declared a habitual disciplinary problem if written documentation exists that:

- In one school year, the student has threatened or extorted or attempted to threaten or extort another pupil or a teacher or other personnel employed by the school **two or more times**, or **the student has been suspended five times for any reason, or**
- ~~In one school year, the pupil has been suspended for initiating at least two fights on school property, at an activity sponsored by a public school, on a school bus, or, if the fight occurs within one hour of the beginning or end of a school day, on his way to or from school, or~~
- ~~The student has been suspended five times for any reason~~
- **The student has not entered into and participated in a plan of behavior.**

The student declared a habitual disciplinary problem **may be suspended for a period not to exceed one semester, or be expelled under extraordinary circumstances. Pursuant to NRS 392.466, a student declared a habitual disciplinary problem that is expelled or suspended for one semester is required to enroll in a private school, a program of independent study or be homeschooled during that time. must be expelled or suspended for a period equal to one semester. The pupil must receive equivalent instruction authorized by the state board pursuant to subsection 1 of NRS 392.070.** The Superintendent/**Designee** may, for a good cause shown in a particular case, allow a modification to the suspension or expulsion requirement, if such modification is set forth in writing.
