To bring after-school sports/activity coupled with academic support to at least 15% of the total student population at Aloha-Huber Park, funded through community partnerships.

### **Summary of Progress:**

For the Fall of 2016, AHP currently has 10% (100 kids in grade 4-8) involved in its "Student Athlete" program. This program was created in partnership between Aloha-Huber Park teachers and the Camps for Kids Foundation. It focuses on explicitly teaching students the importance of balancing organized sports with academic achievement. Students received focused, afterschool academic support from certified AHP teachers, as well as participation in a seasonal sport (Football – Fall, Basketball – Winter, Soccer – Spring).

This program is funded 50-50 by Camps for Kids Foundation and Aloha-Huber Park K-8 School.

- Most Jacob Wismer students participated in the Oct. 5<sup>th</sup> International Walk & Bike to School Day. We receive support from the BSD coordinator, Lynn Mutrie.
- We are continuing to work with Young Audiences to secure an art residency and/or performances for our students this year.

### **Team Goals for the 2016-2017 school year:**

- Improve our responsiveness to early childhood education at Rock Creek. This will include ways to support children academically in the area of reading and math, as well as supporting families on success strategies. We will do this through expanding our Book Buddy/Mentorship program and enhancing our Read To Me opportunities with the assistance of our community, our own 5th grade students, and our Westview students.
- Improve overall health and fitness of our students and staff. Last year's community partnerships afforded us an opportunity to build a running track at Rock Creek that was completed June 2016. We are working with community partners to begin a Recess Runners club at recess to promote health and fitness. We have also applied and were awarded a Marathon Kids grant that will allow us to provide a free before-school running club for kids. Our two-year goal is to have the track surfaced (the bid is \$23,500).
- Last summer, our friends at Foresters Financial helped fund and support a Summer Reading/Postcard program. The goal of the program was to eliminate the "summer slide" with a targeted group of students by providing them with 6 books of their choice to read over the summer. The children who participated went home on the last day of school with a book of their choice that they were excited to read, as well as a postcard addressed to one of the Foresters Financial volunteers. When the

student finished their book, they wrote a postcard to the volunteer about what they learned or enjoyed about the book, mailed it, and then waited for a response and another book from the volunteer. The achievement results were incredible for our students and the volunteers loved the opportunity to be involved. We were able to reach 41 Rock Creek students and Foresters Financial provided 25 staff members. Our goal this summer is to enhance the increase the program... with a goal to support 80 Rock Creek students with 40 postcard volunteers provided by Foresters Financial.

- Two years ago, Remedy Church helped us build a community garden. This garden has been a wonderful addition to our school community and has provided us a venue to learn more about science and experience the joy of learning outside the classroom. Our goal this year is to build a greenhouse to complement the garden. Foresters Financial is helping to support a grant through the Portland Community Tool Bank.
- Westview High School students have played a significant partnership role at Rock Creek. We have 36 WHS students who have been involved in a variety of projects at Rock Creek. We would like to see that number increase this year to 100 WHS students.

### **Summary of Progress:**

The Book Buddy program is up and going. We need to add the mentorship component. The Rock Creek track is completed and is being used every day. The Recess Runners program has begun and is going very well. We applied and were awarded a grant through Marathon Kids. We are reaching out to potential builders to donate their services to construct our greenhouse. We have a nice partnership with Westview, but that needs to be enhanced.

We received a large grant from Nike, a matching donor for all fundraising, and held a successful auction along with a range of community and family donations to help fund the track.

- **SHINE** – As we enter year 4 of our 5 year Twenty-first century grant through Impact Northwest, the need to build partnerships to be greater self-sustaining is imperative. Weekly meetings with our SHINE coordinators provide opportunities to discuss and plan outreach opportunities and support this work.
- **Read to Me** – Our desire is to replicate and grow last year’s success of this program during the school year. Data collected from previous and current kindergarten students show literacy growth which can partially be attributed to this resource. With the knowledge that every child should have 500 books read aloud to them before their kindergarten experience, we are trying to replicate this experience for all of our students within their first year of school at William Walker.
- **Beyond Our School Walls** - Providing opportunities for William Walker students beyond our building helps grow a larger community view and ideas for our students. Currently these include the Big Sister –Big Brother program for third grade with our Comcast partners, an interactive program with ACMA, and coordinated visits with the BSD Terra Nova program.

**Summary of Progress: *What strides have been made toward the goal(s) above? Evolution? New Projects? New partnerships made along the way?***

- **SHINE** - Progress is being made connecting with individuals and corporations to support our after school program. Most recently, we received a grant to be used for STEM instruction that will continue through this school year. High school students from Jesuit have connected with us and will be teaching an interactive science class during the winter tem. Westview students will be joining SHINE staff to augment our enrichment activities with support teaching soccer and active classes.
- **Read to Me:** In collaboration with the kindergarten teacher and intervention team , the program was redesigned this fall to incorporate more volunteers each day. We are seeking eighty volunteers each day in order for every kindergarten student to have a buddy to read with them from 8:30 to

9:10. With volunteer coordinator Linda Hall leading this charge, we are on our way but have many more volunteers to find. In November, we will be meeting with Sunset Presbyterian Church's leadership team to determine how we might involve more of their volunteers, especially the retired community, to grow this volunteer base. We are also looking at other avenues, including connecting with retirement communities where transportation to and from our school might be provided by the retirement home.

### **Beyond our School Walls:**

#### **Terra Nova Sustainable Sciences Farm**

Last year's second and fourth graders had an opportunity to experience an afternoon at Terra Nova farm, where they participated in agricultural activities with high school mentors. This year, we are continuing our partnership with Terra Nova. There is a fall trip planned for the same students, who are now in third and fifth grade, that will build on their previous experiences at the farm. Assistant Principal Wendy Bernard partnered with Andrew Cronk on a pending grant, which would expand this partnership significantly. If the grant is awarded, all of William Walker's first through fifth grade students would have an opportunity to visit Terra Nova and participate in science inquiry programs both on-site and remotely, using interactive technology.

Operation School Bell is off to a great start! Assistance League has clothed 494 students living in unstable housing or are in great need during the the month of October. Our goal this year is to have 1,000 K-5 students at all BSD schools receive new clothing by the 3rd week of December. When students go to Assistance League for there appointment to shop at Operation School Bell, they receive a winter coat, 2 pairs of pants, 2 shirts, 5-pack of underwear, 6 pairs of socks, a shoe voucher to Payless Shoes for \$22, a dental kit and a free book. This fall Assistance League pre-packed new clothing and coats for 72 Head Start students and delivered them to the schools where we have those programs in place. BSD middle school and high school students will start Operation School Bell in January. They will shop at Fred Meyer for new clothing with a gift card provided by Assistance League. The goal is to clothe 800 MS/HS students through this program. It is estimated that each student receives new clothing valued at \$125 each. BSD will have over 2,000 students receive new clothing by the end of the 2016-17 season. Our district is so lucky to have such a wonderful organization as Assistance League helping to take care of our students!
