Community Use of Facilities

- Athletics and organized groups drive the majority of facility use
- For-profit usage is a significant and growing segment
- Smaller community groups are underrepresented—opportunity for growth
- Usage is concentrated, not diversified—creates both stability and risk
- Data supports future planning, capacity conversations, and resource allocation
