#### 1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. in the Pahrump District Office with a videoconference link to the Tonopah office. Board members, administrators and guests recited the Pledge of Allegiance. President Wescoatt conducted roll call of board members. Edna Forsgren and Tracie Ward were absent. Mrs. Ward arrived at 11:10 a.m.

#### 2. Adoption of Agenda

Dennis Keating moved adoption of the agenda with the removal of item 15, and Dawn Murphy seconded. Those voting aye: Nicole Genet, Dennis Keating, Cindy Marcotte, Dawn Murphy and Deborah Wescoatt. Those voting nay: none. Mrs. Ward was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

Dawn Murphy made the motion to approve the consent calendar items (no submissions for 3d), and Cindy Marcotte seconded. Those voting aye: Nicole Genet, Dennis Keating, Cindy Marcotte, Dawn Murphy and Deborah Wescoatt. Those voting nay: none. Mrs. Ward was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

4a. Superintendent's Report

Dr. Roberts said 6019 students were enrolled by the previous Friday, and students continue to enroll. Two students had enrolled as a result of Hurricane Katrina. The District has been recognized several times of late in national or state press and has been invited to present at the 66<sup>th</sup> NSBA conference on its volunteer program. Several open houses have been held, and the board was provided with dates of upcoming open houses.

4b. Administrator Reports

Mr. Norton reported he was at Gabbs for opening day of school with 47 students enrolled. He then visited every classroom in Tonopah. The next day he visited Round Mountain and reported it was a nice environment. He visited a couple classrooms in both Beatty schools before ending in Amargosa. He has handled formal harassment complaints and public complaints and is updating the emergency buckets.

Mr. Pekarek reported there are now only 9.5 vacancies, six of which are classroom teachers. Only 1.5 are special education. Over half of new employees are from Nevada

4c. Board Reports

Mr. Keating attended an advisory committee meeting on the Boys and Girls Club as well as the Pahrump High music boosters program. He said there is a need for instruments. Mrs. Genet attended Clarke Middle School open house and was impressed with the new teachers. Mrs. Marcotte also attended that open house and found administrators and teachers excited. She plans to attend Beatty's open house. Mrs. Murphy attended Pahrump High's open house and was disappointed in the low attendance. She also

attended Clarke Middle School's open house and brought up the fact that students don't have a second set of the new language arts textbooks to leave at home. Mrs. Wescoatt reported on the Yucca Mountain meeting, a meeting on web sites, Boys and Girls Club meetings and a meeting with developers. She attended a State meeting in Reno on the intervention process. She will be promoting the Boys and Girls Club on Channel 30 and will be attending a meeting in Reno on high school reform.

4d. Board Committee Reports

Mrs. Wescoatt said the bond committee met and has plans for the Harvest Festival. The construction committee will be meeting. Mrs. Murphy said there is a United Way meeting next week. The development committee will meet again on September 16.

5. Public Input

Marlene Richter of West Care informed the board about the services of her organization including drug treatment and vocational assistance. A grant will expand the program to Beatty and Amargosa for prevention curriculum. In the Pahrump area, 126 youth have been served, and a second office opened this month. They work with middle and high school students and also work with youth through the juvenile justice system. They may be involved with the Boys and Girls Club when they have a permanent site.

6. Board Appointments

Item withdrawn.

7. Attendance Committee Appointments

Mr. Norton said the three principals are in place, and he is waiting to hear from the others who were invited. Mrs. Wescoatt appointed Laurie Lundinsky as the parent appointee.

8. Appointment of a Committee to Discuss how to Accomplish Wellness/Nutrition Needs

Mrs. Wescoatt said the board has discussed school lunch and vending machines several times in the past and said they should look at how the district feeds and exercises kids. She appointed Mrs. Genet, Mr. Keating and herself and asked Mrs. Hamlin if she would participate. Dr. Roberts suggested including Pat Garlin.

Mrs. Hamlin said she had met with Ms. Walker and the Superintendent, but they came to no conclusions. She felt parents need to be provided with carbohydrate content before students can take their insulin. The school district provides information with a weighted average, and that doesn't help parents. She said the state will pay her to do nutritional analysis for certain students. She felt she could then dispense that information in the form of a pamphlet. Mrs. Wescoatt said she would like to get hold of the Garrett Supreme Court decision. She directed this item be placed on the September 23 agenda.

9. Change of Date/Location of Future Board Meetings

Mrs. Wescoatt said they will meet with developers on the morning of September 16 and would like a telephone meeting after in the event they can make a decision.

12. Recognitions

Dr. Roberts announced that Karen Liberty was named “Central Office Administrator of the Year” by Nevada Association of School Administrators. He announced that Ginger Olson has received two masters’ degrees, and she is now in charge of educational technology in the District.

13. Discussion/Possible Decision Regarding Reconsideration of a Bus Stop

Sherry Cipollini said her children’s bus stop at Highway 372 and Murphy is in a 55 mph zone and didn’t feel it was safe. Vehicles speed past the bus even with the red lights flashing, and people drive much faster than 55 mph. Her request for a change was denied by the Transportation Supervisor, the Assistant Superintendent and the Superintendent; and she was appealing to the board. Mr. McRae said there are several bus stops on state highways and the only crosswalks on highways are at intersections. This is the only elementary stop on this highway. He has requested that DOT install “school bus stop ahead” signs. He said nearby roads are narrow, and Murphy isn’t approved as even a Class 2 road. He has the same issues on several other roads. The bus would have to back up or make a U-turn. The other two stops on that highway are at Murphy and Woodchips. There is no place for a pull off because the roadway is elevated, and the state doesn’t like pull offs.

Dennis Keating made the motion to table this item until the next meeting so board members can view the area, and Cindy Marcotte seconded the motion. Mrs. Murphy said the family has done everything required for over a year and felt a decision must be made at this meeting, and Mrs. Genet agreed. Those voting aye: Dennis Keating. Those voting nay: Mrs. Genet, Mrs. Marcotte, Mrs. Murphy and Mrs. Wescoatt. Mrs. Ward was absent for this vote. The motion failed.

Mrs. Wescoatt said she drove a bus in that area for years, and roads are bad. People drive very fast, and the Highway Patrol is rarely out there. She asked what it would take to fix the road. Mr. McRae said safety and economics are both issues. Mrs. Marcotte said in the past, the county addressed roads that school buses traveled first and asked if the county might speed this up if they knew about the issue. Mr. McRae said it wouldn’t necessarily be addressed at the Commissioner level. He said all three roads are dedicated to the county, but their status is questionable.

Mr. Cipollini said the bus stop used to be on Joseph. As the bus leaves the stop, it goes to Bannavitch, Venus and on up. When it rains, they shut that route off. They can't go up China. He felt only five minutes would be added to the route by going up Murphy and Zee and back to the highway. Another parent said the road forms a horseshoe. Another parent said there have been some very close calls, and she supports a change in the stop. Mr. McRae said the bus is an 84-passenger with 40 to 60 students.

Dawn Murphy made the motion to move the bus stop to Zee Street and Moapa. Dennis Keating seconded, and a unanimous vote was cast. Mr. McRae asked if that was for the elementary route only. Mrs. Murphy made an additional motion to change all routes to this stop. Mr. Keating seconded, and a unanimous vote was recorded...

14. Discussion Regarding School Construction

Mrs. Wescoatt asked if a motion was needed to build an elementary school. Mrs. Ward said it was done when the board voted to accept the land on Jane Avenue. Mrs. Wescoatt said this will be a continual action item on every agenda until the school is built and supplied. The board needs to discuss construction and design options. Mr. Whimpey said if the district is to have a school built by the fall of 2007, he would recommend going ahead with the updated Hafen design. Mrs. Wescoatt asked if the district could afford it, and Mr. Whimpey said they wouldn't know for sure until the bids come in. He estimated it would cost between \$10 and \$11 million. He hoped to go out to bid in October. Mrs. Murphy said she thought the construction committee was supposed to discuss this. Mrs. Wescoatt said the architect was projecting \$9.2 million, and she disagreed with his estimate. She didn't want to strip a school in order to meet that price. Dr. Roberts said as a point of order, there has been no decision made on what kind of school and how it will be constructed. He said this plan would be the most expeditious. The construction committee decided to meet on September 13 at 10:00 a.m. Dr. Roberts said the committee can discuss how much money the district can bond for.

15. Approval of Commercial Water Service Agreement

Item withdrawn.

16. Request Regarding Digital Cameras for Dual Credit Classes at CCSN

Kelcy Thompson said when the photography class started, the high school was able to purchase 20 digital cameras, and they are down to 16. The parents of three students reimbursed the school for lost cameras, but one camera has disappeared. She asked if the board would purchase ten Olympus D425 cameras with memory cards for \$162.99 each. Mrs. Wescoatt asked what guarantee the board would have that inventory control would improve. Mrs. Thompson said she believed the camera was taken when the instructor turned her back to assist another student. Mrs. Ward asked if the three reimbursed cameras were included in the total. Mrs. Thompson said it was in addition to the three.

Tracie Ward made the motion to purchase the cameras as long as there is money in the budget, and Cindy Marcotte seconded. Dr. Roberts said it was not a budgeted item and would, therefore, have to come from Ending Fund Balance. Mr. Ritchie suggested taking it from the Educational Endowment Fund. Mrs. Marcotte asked if the high school is working with CCSN on this. Jerry Hill said he wasn't sure if the original purchase came from discretionary funds or from the soda machine fund. Mrs. Marcotte said she would first like to know if the high school would purchase the cameras. Dr. Roberts explained that principals are given a certain amount per student for books and supplies throughout the year, but he was sure it wasn't a budgeted item. The school would have to restructure their budget to buy them. The only other source would be soda machine fund or fundraisers. Mrs. Wescoatt commented that the school didn't replace the three they got reimbursed for. Those voting aye: Dennis Keating, Dawn Murphy, Tracie Ward and Deborah Wescoatt. Those voting nay: Cindy Marcotte and Nicole Genet. The motion passed with a majority vote.

17. Report on How Students are Assigned to Grades & Classes

Mr. Hill said he had talked with counselors, and the issue brought up in the previous board meeting is endemic to Pahrump High School. He said regulation 7142 is fairly clear. The problem is that there are different types of homeschoolers, those who follow prescribed programs and those who don't. Some students enroll with handwritten grades from the parents, and counselors have to take their word for it in placing kids where it is appropriate. They do have to use their professional judgment. Standards Master may help in placement once it is up and running. The regulation states students' transcripts will show only courses taken in Nye County School District, and they have to pass the proficiency exams. He said all school districts struggle with this. Those who enroll from other districts without transcripts are placed according to what parents tell the school until the transcripts arrive, and often they have to be moved around. This district follows the same path as Churchill and Clark.

Mrs. Wescoatt said this came up because of private school students enrolling in ninth grade. They are being denied honors courses for the reasons there were no transcripts and they didn't take proficiency tests. Mr. Hill said the regulation doesn't say they can be denied honors courses if they didn't take the proficiency tests. Mrs. Wescoatt said the teacher told her he wanted a low class count. Mr. Hill said perhaps the regulation needs to be rewritten, but Mrs. Wescoatt said the regulation is fine. The problem is that an individual teacher fails to follow district policy. Dr. Roberts said they need to draft an addition that covers entrance requirements into honors courses and address means by which students coming from outside the district can compete.

Mrs. Wescoatt said she doesn't understand why this high school can tell gifted students they can't take honors courses. She wanted to know whose decision it was and what they consider adequate. Some can take honors biology but are denied honors English. Mrs. Ward said it may depend on what area a student is gifted in. Mrs. Wescoatt said gifted and talented falls under special education, but there's no money. Dr. Roberts said he will make sure a regulation is drafted that precludes this from happening.

18. Award of Bids: Propane

Tracie Ward made the motion to award propane bids to Suburban Propane. Dennis Keating seconded, and a unanimous vote was registered.

19. Approval of Request for Installation of Radio Relay Network Equipment at Transportation Office by Cal-Tech

Mr. McRae said Cal Tech identified the bus yard as an appropriate location to set up an antenna, and there would be no interference. There will be a small cost for electricity. Tracie Ward made the motion to approve the request. Dawn Murphy seconded, and a unanimous vote was cast.

20. Approval of Resolution Creating a Fund

Mr. Ritchie said donations have been received for the Boys and Girls Club of Pahrump, and the district needs to prevent the perception that the funds are going to the Henderson facility. The district will serve as fiscal agent until such time as the Club gets its own charter. Dennis Keating made the motion to approve the resolution. Tracie Ward seconded, and a unanimous vote was recorded. The district will have to sign a Memorandum of Understanding and would monitor and approve purchases. The Club would have to send letters to donors for tax purposes.

21. Discussion of Technology Issues

Dr. Roberts explained that Mrs. Olson is now Coordinator of Accountability, Testing and Educational Technology. Mrs. Olson said one of her responsibilities will be to advise principals on what software is available and recommended and what will work with district equipment. There must be a bridge between the technology side and the education side. She is working with Jeff Padilla to compile a complete list of software. The impact between schools varies between a positive effect and a negative effect mostly because of ESL. Mrs. Wescoatt said she was concerned about principals buying technology and not being able to afford the software to run it. She asked if they must go through Mrs. Olson before purchasing. Dr. Roberts said educational software will not be purchased until Mrs. Olson and the technology department are assured it can run effectively.

Mr. Ritchie said there are 314 Tangents district-wide. The district is in phase two of the grant asking for more student computers. It is an issue with Power Grade. Two years ago when the district requested money from the Commissioners for a wish list, most of the schools requested computers and some did not.

22. Approval of Second Reading: Policy 1140 – Contact with School District Staff

Dawn Murphy made the motion to approve the second reading, and Nicole Genet seconded. Those voting aye: Nicole Genet, Dennis Keating, Cindy Marcotte, Dawn

Murphy and Tracie Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mrs. Wescoatt was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote. A copy of the policy is attached.

23. Approval of Second Reading: Policy 5339 – Limited English Proficiency

Dawn Murphy made the motion to approve the second reading, and Cindy Marcotte seconded. Those voting aye: Nicole Genet, Dennis Keating, Cindy Marcotte, Dawn Murphy and Tracie Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mrs. Wescoatt was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote. A copy of the policy is attached.

Another beautiful day for Nye County School District. On Monday, September 12, 2005, I visited Tonopah Schools.

I traveled on to Round Mountain schools where I attended elementary and high school classes and met several students, teachers, and custodians. I also did some investigating regarding the elementary school computer situation. I believe I have found a viable temporary fix for their problem. I will discuss this in depth at another time.

At 6:00 p.m. I presented the staff, students, and Principal of Tonopah Middle School the plaque, from the Nevada Department of Education, for Exemplary Status. This was followed by a Bar-B-Q with the parents.

On Tuesday morning, September 13, I attended a Construction Committee meeting in Pahrump. In the afternoon, I met with Dr. Hager who has been assigned by the Nevada Department of Education as the School Support Team Leader for Manse Elementary. As Manse is in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year as Needs Improvement, he will be heading the team that provides assistance for improvement. I am optimistic about Manse school improvement for the 05-06 school year.

On Wednesday morning, September 14, I met with a Sheriff's Deputy and Sam Simatos regarding a special education matter that involved a student. In the afternoon, I left for Reno to attend the State Interim Finance Committee meeting and the Nevada High School Improvement Summit that were both scheduled for Thursday, September 15.

I met with the Concordia and Beazer developer's attorney, Jennifer Lazovich, and, by phone, Procter Hug, our attorney, regarding both the development and water agreements.

On Saturday, September 17, I attended a Rotary function.

Tuesday, September 20, found me in Beatty attending a Nevada Department of Education Testing Security meeting with all principals.

Construction Committee Meeting on Wednesday, September 21.

Wherever there have been open dates and times in my calendar, I have been visiting school sites and classrooms in the Pahrump and Amargosa areas. I have logged approximately 1,000 miles over the last two weeks.

Lastly, our student count for September 9, 2005 was 6,162. (see attached)

**C. DOORS** shall be made from 1/2" thick HDPE with a homogeneous color and a matte textured finish.

**D. DOOR FRAMES** shall be made from 1/2" thick HDPE with a homogeneous color and a matte textured finish.

**E. MATERIAL TESTING** All solid plastic components shall resist deterioration and discoloration when submitted to the following chemicals, tested in accordance with corrosion-testing procedure established by The United States Plastic Corporation: Acetic Acid 80%, Caustic Soda, Nicotine, Ammonium Phosphate, Copper Chloride, Lime Sulfur, Acetone, Chlorine Water, Soaps, Beach 12%, Core Oils, Potassium Bromide, Ammonia liquid, Hydrochloric Acid 40%, Trisodium Phosphate, Brine, Hydrogen Peroxide 30%, Sodium Bicarbonate, Borax, Isopropyl Alcohol, Urea and Urine, Citric Acid, Lactic Acid 25%, Vinegar.

**F. CONTINUOUS LATCH** shall be made from 1/2" thick HDPE and shall provide a full-length latching mechanism capable of accepting several lock types. Latch mechanism shall be securely attached to the entire length of the door, providing a continuous security latch.

**G. DOOR HINGE** shall be a continuous piano hinge integrated into the full length of the door and main locker body made of 1/4-gauge type 304 stainless steel; hinge shall be powder coated to match locker color.

**H. SLOPETOPS** shall be made from a single sheet of 1/2" thick HDPE with a 1" thick HDPE backing strip.

**I. COAT HOOKS** shall be plastic and attach to underside of shelf or locker top. One per opening shall be provided in one- and two-tier lockers.

**J. FINISH** shall be white commercial grade smooth for tops, bottoms, side walls, and shelves. Doors and frames shall have a slightly textured matte finish to reduce marking

and be from the manufacturer's standard colors. Graffiti and dirt shall be easily removable with standard institutional cleaning agents.

### 2.02 FABRICATION

**A. Fabricate locker components** square and rigid with a finish free from scratches and chips.

**B. Solid plastic locker box** shall be fabricated from a single sheet of HDPE plastic with corners fused together. Frame shall be welded to box assembly. Unit shall have no exposed metal fasteners or dovetail joints.

**C. Hinge** shall be attached to door and frame with vandal-resistant double threaded stainless steel screws designed specifically for plastic applications. Hinge system shall allow for easy field replacement of doors.

**D. Slope top** shall consist of a 1" thick HDPE backplate and a 1/2" thick colored HDPE top panel.

**E. Lockers** shall be shipped fully assembled.

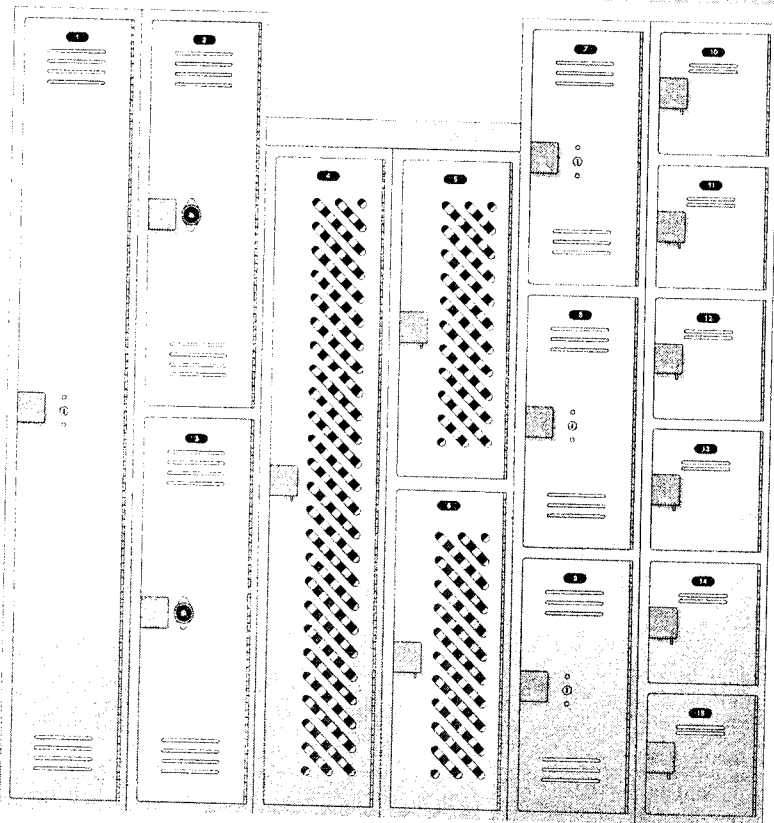

September 13, 2005  
Construction Committee Meeting

Debbie asked for an update on how the Hafen Elementary plans were revised for the new Floyd school.

She then stated an easel or rack should to be procured to make it easier to look at building plans. Bob stated he would have one built out of PVC.

Bob Whimpey said the library was expanded, three regular size classrooms were lost but three smaller classrooms were gained. There was a testing room and counselor's office.

They made the stage smaller to create storage space.

A copy of the discussion with Dr. Owens was passed out.

Dawn had an issue regarding collapsible soil.

Bob Whimpey stated they planned to dig down approximately five feet and fill with a bed of rock. He is still waiting on the soil report.

Dawn mentioned a possible pier system for use as a base for building.

Bob stated that they used this system for the repairs at Rosemary Clarke and the cost was approximately \$2,000 per pier.

Debbie stated she wanted to explore the possibility of desert landscaping.

Dawn stated she would like to see soft padding used as a base around playground equipment.

Bob said this would double the cost of the equipment, but it was decided this could be a savings compared to water costs for grass irrigation.

Debbie had issues with the \$9,000,000 estimate that the architects gave for the new school site. She thinks this will be much higher, approximately 12 – 15 million.

Debbie had questions on the bid process.

Bob stated there is an agency in Las Vegas that can be used when companies go out for a bid of this nature.

Rod stated that in order to accept a low bid from an out-of-state company the bid has to be at least 5% less than any bid from a Nevada company. This is a NRS statute.

Advertisements must run for at least two weeks before release of bid packets. It was decided that the bid packets would go out the end of October giving 45 days for return and looking at starting construction around the first of the year.

Debbie wants other alternatives available should the cost for a permanent building prove to be too high.

Debbie asked Bob to find out which companies have built modular schools.

Bob stated that there were two types of modulars. Ones with wheels and ones with cement walls. Most have 2X6 framing to meet insulation values. He stated he believes the requirements are R17 for the walls and R30 for the ceiling.

Debbie asked that modular schools be located so the committee may see one first hand.

Dawn stated she feels the builders take more care with modulars, while companies that build on sites seem to just slap the buildings together.

Dr. Rob asked if the current architectural plans can be used with something other than block. He stated he would not like to see the district have to pay an additional \$100,000 for new plans.

Debbie stated the district may have to and wants modular information immediately. She is interested in those that have been built in the southwest because of the heat factor.

Bob suggested a field trip to St. George to visit the modular school there.

Debbie instructed him to set it up.

Dr. Rob said a date for next week would be good.

Debbie said she would ask Raymond where the video camera is so she can video the school in St. George. She told Bob Whimpey to have an update ready for the Board Meeting on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.

The committee decided to have the next meeting on Wednesday, September 21 at 10:00 a.m.

Debbie asked to have information on the prevailing wage necessary for set up and delivery of a modular school and an update on when the soil report will be in.

Bob had a concern that the plot plan from Mtn West did not show access from the development to the school property. The only access to school property is on Jane Street.

Dr. Rob had asked for access from the development for students to be able to walk to school without having to walk on the main road with traffic.

Bob said he will contact Procter Hug and make sure access is listed in the land agreement.

Honorable President Wescoatt,

This is a Letter of Interest to continue our representation of the Nye County School District (NCSD) during the interim and the next legislative session.

As you are aware, there are Interim Committees that run year-round and the NCSD does not have representation for its Assembly District. School funding, tax caps and teacher recruitment are some of the issues that may be of interest. Some of the most important, or detrimental, ideas for legislation come from the Interim Committees.

It would be beneficial to the NCSD to have a legislative plan in place. As noted in your final report, dated June 24, 2005, part of that plan could be requesting the bill that would have helped the NCSD with the repairs of its northern schools.

We understand that the NCSD will also need help with the "Room for Children to Learn" program. Without the bonding passed, the NCSD will find the building of more schools difficult, at best. We are able to help with fundraising for the campaign, as well as a campaign plan. The plan would include a budget, direct mail, signage and advertising, as well as scheduling speaking engagements for various members of the trustee board to appear on television and before community groups.

Understanding that the NCSD may not commingle taxpayer funds with the rebonding attempt, we are offering two different contracts.

The first is the standard contract for consulting on the state level of \$1,500 month, with the original thirty-day out clause, to continue through the 2007 legislative session. The second covers the "Room for Children to Learn" program, at \$1000 a month, also with a thirty-day out clause, to continue through the 2006 election year.

In short, Nevada-Elect is offering to continue its representation of the NCSD during the interim year and during the 2007 legislative session, as well as the "Room for Children to Learn" program. We are offering two contracts, with the same thirty-day out clause as the previous contract, of a total of \$2,500. This will alleviate the problem of commingling the funds.

We look forward to working with you again.

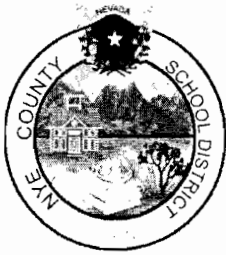

A dropout is any student who has a withdrawal code of W5a, W5b, W5c, W5d, W5e, W5f, W5g, W5h, W5i, or W6.

Students who have a withdrawal code of W11 are those students who have not returned at the beginning of the new year. For purposes of reporting, W11 students are given additional time to reenter school. The students have until December 1 to enroll in an institution of higher learning. For example: Johnny Jones was present on the last day of school his freshman year, June 9, 2004. On August 28, 2004, Johnny does not show up for school. He is coded as W11-non-return. If Johnny enrolls in Pathways on November 20, 2005, his withdrawal code is changed to W1c. If he does not enroll anywhere and the schools do not receive a request for records, Johnny will be reclassified on December 1 to W5i.

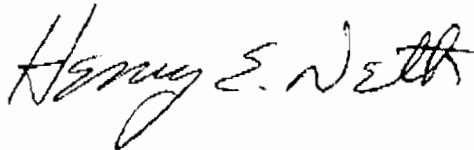
