CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:34 p.m. in the Pahrump boardroom with a videoconference link to the Tonopah boardroom and telephone connections to Mrs. Forsgren and Mr. McNeely. Board members, administrators and guests recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll was called; all members were present except for Mr. McNeely. He connected by telephone at 6:58 p.m.

ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Mrs. Ward moved adoption of the agenda, and Mr. Tokerud seconded. Those voting aye: Mr. Floyd, Mrs. Forsgren, Mr. Keating, Mr. Pape, Mr. Tokerud and Mrs. Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mr. McNeely was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Mrs. Ward made the motion to approve the consent calendar consisting of the February 5 minutes, two immunization exemptions, ten adult ed/GED requests, the White Pine tuition agreement and Mr. Tokerud's travel to Reno for the NASB New Board Member training. Mr. Keating seconded the motion. Those voting aye: Mr. Floyd, Mrs. Forsgren, Mr. Keating, Mr. Pape, Mr. Tokerud and Mrs. Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mr. McNeely was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

APPROVAL OF WARRANTS

Mrs. Ward moved approval of the warrants, and Mr. Tokerud seconded. Those voting aye: Mrs. Forsgren, Mr. Keating, Mr. Pape, Mr. Tokerud and Mrs. Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mr. Floyd abstained because there was a payment to Floyd's Hardware, and Mr. McNeely was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

REPORTS

Dr. Roberts said he was notified by Senator Reid's office that the district was awarded a \$143,000 grant for a tech lab at Pahrump High. He receives almost daily updates on the federal stimulus package.

Mr. Whimpey provided a two year summary of electrical usage at Tonopah High for the discussion on the solar energy grant.

Mr. Tokerud attended the policy and budget meetings and the cornerstone ceremony at Floyd Elementary. He attended the NASB New Board Member training in Reno and provided other members with information on governance and stewardship. Mrs. Ward attended the cornerstone ceremony, budget and policy meetings, and truancy hearings. Mr. Floyd attended the cornerstone ceremony and budget meeting. Mr. Keating attended the cornerstone ceremony, a Valentine's Day celebration at Floyd and the budget workshop. Mrs. Forsgren listened in on the budget meeting. Mr. Pape attended the cornerstone ceremony and budget workshop.

Mr. Tokerud volunteered to replace Mr. Keating on the United Way Board of Directors.

RECOGNITIONS

Mr. Buffi presented Thelma Sherman with her adult ed diploma after three and one half years of perseverance. At the age of 70, she passed the math proficiency after nine attempts.

APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF INVEST '09

Mrs. Ward made the motion to approve the resolution, and Mr. Keating seconded. Those voting aye: Mr. Floyd, Mrs. Forsgren, Mr. Keating, Mr. Pape, Mr. Tokerud and Mrs. Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mr. McNeely was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE APPROVAL TO OPEN BANK ACCOUNT FOR HEALTH INSURANCE THIRD PARTY ADMINISTRATOR

Mr. Ritchie explained the new third party administrator will take over April 1, and the present account is needed for the current administrator to finish paying claims through March 31. Mrs. Ward made the motion to approve a new bank account, and Mrs. Forsgren seconded. Those voting aye: Mr. Floyd, Mrs. Forsgren, Mr. Keating, Mr. Pape, Mr. Tokerud and Mrs. Ward. Those voting nay: none. Mr. McNeely was absent for this vote. The motion carried with a majority vote.

UPDATE ON REVENUE SHORTFALL

Mr. Ritchie said that, based on the budget the Governor submitted, the Distributive School Account money will be reduced by \$407 per pupil, which would be about a \$2 million shortfall, or a four percent reduction.

DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE APPROVAL TO PURCHASE ONE MODULAR FOR ROUND MOUNTAIN ELEMENTARY

Mr. Whimpey said the two classroom replacement unit will come from the \$15 million bond. He estimated preparing the pad and running the utilities would cost \$10,000. Mrs. Ward made the motion to approve the purchase. Mrs. Forsgren seconded, and a unanimous vote was registered.

PRESENTATION ON NEW BUS VIDEO SYSTEM

Mr. McRae made a presentation on the three-camera system installed in 35 buses in Pahrump. The GPS shows the location and speed of the bus as well as five or six different activities of the driver. It monitors turn signals, brakes and use of amber and red stop lights. He can take a still picture of a student and email it to the principal for disciplinary purposes. The driver can activate an event button that will take the viewer directly to the point in the video he wishes to be viewed. The videos are encrypted and film 80 hours before being overwritten. He said it would cost approximately \$130,000 to equip the rest of the bus fleet. His goal is to finish the activity buses, then the remaining route buses and finally special ed buses.

DISCUSSION/DECISION REGARDING SOLAR POWER GRANT FROM NEVADA POWER

Dr. Roberts said his recommendation was to table this item until the district knows more about funding that will become available for green schools. Mr. Tokerud made the motion to table the item. Mr. Floyd seconded, and a unanimous vote was recorded.

DISCUSSION/DECISION REGARDING PLACEMENT OF SIXTH GRADERS IN PAHRUMP

Dr. Roberts said since the last board meeting when this issue was discussed, the district learned that sixth grade level library books could not be transferred to the elementary schools because of seventh and eighth grade students who read at the sixth grade level. The additional cost would be at least \$40,000 and would further impact space requirements. Declining revenues were discussed at the budget workshop earlier in the day. The district won't know final revenue numbers until June, and the decision would have to be made by next month.

Mark Kessler did an analysis of sixth graders' academic achievement, discipline and social adjustment. This year's sixth grade class scored second out of five schools in math and first in reading, which indicates they aren't being harmed academically being in the middle school. It also indicated there is a smoother transition. Mr. Hill explained the school is in year 4 of Needs Improvement but in each year, the school has failed because of one small sub-group. His department has found the students are working hard, teachers are working at maximum capabilities, and students are moving throughout the school without chaos. Another problem is the constantly escalating barrier each school must reach. If the school becomes Needs Improvement Year 5, the school must restructure. However, many of the things the State has recommended have already been put in place.

Mr. Kessler noted the sixth grade increases in proficiency an average of six percent annually while seventh and eighth grades tend to decrease in proficiency. This year, an assistant principal, secretary and counselor are assigned to each pod, making them small learning communities. Doug Steward said he is the assistant principal over sixth grade and has noted a tremendous change in the learning environment. He reviews a list of failing or troubled students each week and summons the resources they need. Discipline issues have decreased a great deal under this structure. Mr. Skelton addressed how one of the sub groups caused the school to fail to meet Adequate Yearly Progress by having one student out of 11 absent when testing occurred.

Mrs. Lepisto said the district needs to do a better job on public relations so that parents have a true picture of the middle school environment. There are a lot of misconceptions, and she doubts many parents know how separated the grade levels now are. Mr. Floyd made the motion to not move the sixth graders from the middle school this year, and Mr. Keating seconded. Mr. Tokerud said he would vote in favor of the motion but wished to have this brought up again next year. He thought the board's priorities should be on the side of what's best for education. He also acknowledged there should be drastic changes in order to stop the decreasing test scores in upper middle school grades. Mr. Keating agreed and said the public should be educated on how and why a school fails to meet AYP. They should also be informed of the way grades are now grouped. Mr. McNeely said he found the national studies in favor of keeping sixth grade at the elementary level compelling and is voting for the motion strictly for economic reasons. The vote in favor of the motion was unanimous.

JERRY C. HILL:

- Reviewed analysis of PVHS senior writing High School Proficiency Examinations (HSPE), then met with PVHS administration and offered services for remediation of those that did not pass.
- Approved program of remediation at PVHS for regular ed. seniors that did not pass math HSPE.
 - ♦ Remediation will be carried out by PVHS math teachers during prep periods until the test is offered again.
- Attended and participated in two (2) budget workshops during this period. Analyzed effect of departmental and school staff cuts.
- Met with State Consultant Steven Ross (Title III - LEP) concerning our programs for LEP students.
- Prepared and taught "Legend of Troy," a multimedia presentation to PATHWAYS students on February 27th and March 5th.

- Met with Coordinator of State and Federal Programs Karen Holley to design workshop for PVHS and RCMS computer teachers to meet with State Consultant to review and reorganize specific computer courses.
- Met with representatives of INSIGHT, a private on-line school, to determine if their programs might meet the needs of several of our high schools in terms of classes we could not offer, but could be accessed through INSIGHT.
- Met with Data Instructional Specialist Mark Kessler to review his "Comprehensive Design for School Improvement for Nye County" which provides guidelines for action on all schools not achieving AYP.
- Visited RCMS and PVHS several times during this period and met with administrative staffs.
- Attended presentation by Renzulli Learning, a computerized program that facilitates Response to Intervention (RTI) process as well as differentiating instruction (DI) in the classroom.
- Met with individual department members on daily basis during interim period.

MARIA DESCAMPS:

- February 17th In-Service:
 - ◆ Presented a half day session on reading and writing at JG Johnson, as outlined in their School Improvement Plan.
 - This was session 4 out of 14 to be delivered to the staff.
 - This training is part of a reading and writing professional development plan that the teachers agreed to participate in.
 - As part of the training, homework assignments are given, and teachers are asked to collaborate during PLC to continue the learning process, they are also asked to conduct lessons and bring back examples to every session to discuss and share with others.
 - ◆ Worked with PVHS and analyzed writing samples of 11th grade students with a team of teachers from PVHS.
 - The writing samples were a product of a "Mock" writing proficiency that this office asked PVHS teachers to conduct.
 - The purpose of the "Mock" was to be able to identify students who, with a little assistance, might possibly be able to pass the test on March 18th.
 - The students targeted were IEP students which were identified to be students who, if they did not pass, would keep PVHS from making AYP.

- Contacted an outside tutoring company from Reno to come to Pahrump and provide in-house tutoring for 31 IEP students at PVHS.
 - ◆ This office worked with PVHS and tutors to come up with an implementation plan and model that would provide instructional assistance to 31 students in need of additional instructional support.
 - ◆ Tutoring is currently going on throughout the day, and will continue until March 17th.

- Coordinated a school site visit for 18 teachers in Pahrump and Tonopah to attend Rundell Elementary in Clark County School District, as part of the Targeted Assistance Grant (TAG).
 - ◆ The teachers started the day at a meeting where they learned about the Response to Intervention Model (RTI) that CCSD has implemented, and then continued on to observe classroom teachers teaching at Rundell Elementary.
 - ◆ This is the second school visit that NCSD has participated in, the response from our teachers has been very positive. They love the opportunity to watch other teachers and learn from one another.

- Participated in RCMS Restructuring Plan meeting with the Department of Student Achievement.

- Currently working on contacting textbook representatives and asking them to send samples as we prepare to go into a math adoption.

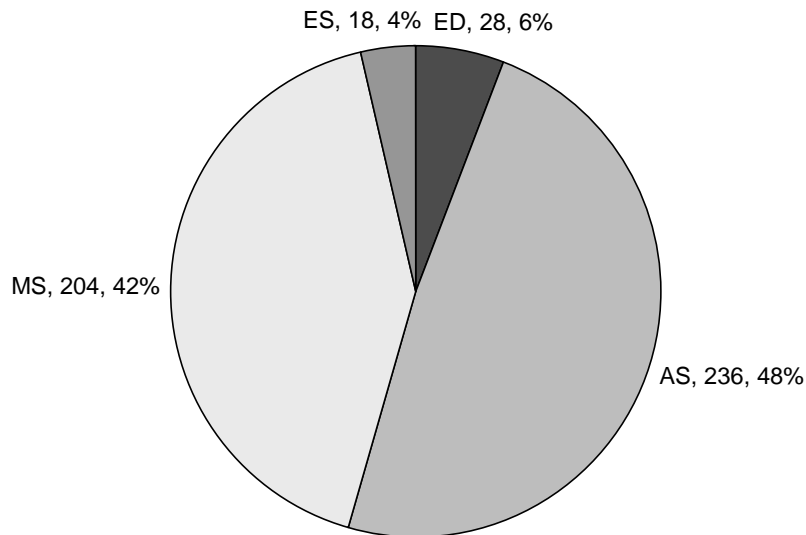
- Coordinating professional development for RCMS as outlined in their School Improvement Plan.
 - ◆ Heinemann Seminars will be conducting an all day training on "*Reading Across the Content Area*" for RCMS teachers on April 3rd, and Gourmet Learning will be coming to Pahrump and conducting a two day session with RCMS teachers on April 27th and 28th to go over all the materials that have been purchased.
 - ◆ RCMS is currently using Gourmet Learning as part of their CRT tutoring program.

GINGER OLSON:

- I attended a technology conference in Palm Springs with five teachers from March 4 – March 7. The conference was very teacher oriented - full of good information. There was a student showcase with amazing work. For many students, computers are a natural way to interact with others. Facebook, Myspace, Wiki, Blog, Twitter, Second Life, Diig and Ning are their reality.
- Writing scores for grade 5 have arrived. Improvement was especially impressive at JG Johnson, where they had an 88% increase in the number of students proficient.

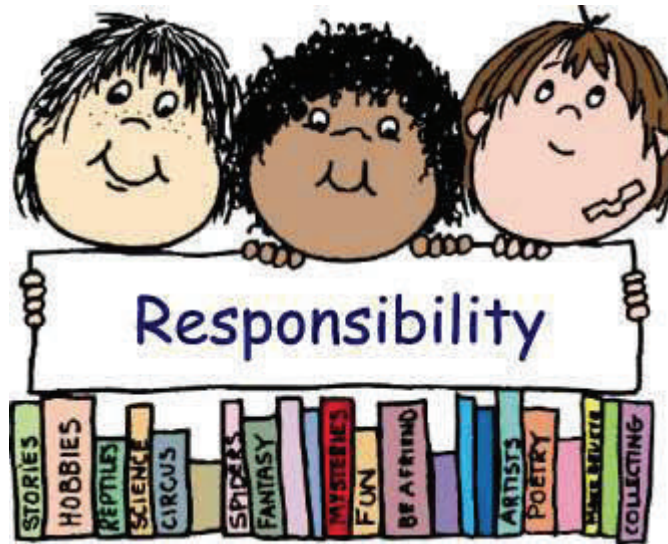

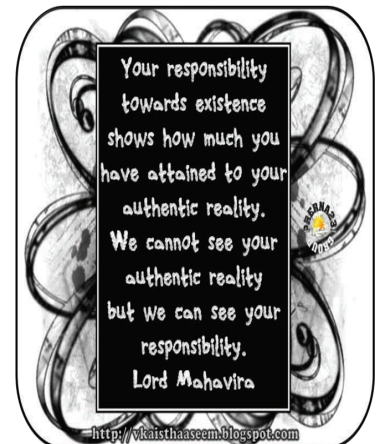

STAFF CONDUCT

It is unlawful for a person employed in a position of authority (teacher/instructor, administrator, coach or teacher's aide or auxiliary non-professional employee who assists licensed personnel) by a public or private school from engaging in sexual conduct with a pupil who is 16 or 17 years of age who is enrolled or attending the school at which the person is employed. Any employee convicted under NRS 201.540 shall be guilty of a category C **felony**. This policy does not apply if the employee is married to the student.

It is further the policy of this district that no employee shall engage in sexual conduct with any pupil of the Nye County School District. This policy does not apply if the employee is married to the student.

STUDENT ADMISSION TO SCHOOL

Application for admission to a NCSD school will be made by registering at the school site for which the student is **zoned**.

Zone restrictions will not apply to career development centers, special education schools or programs, adult education day and evening schools, or other schools and programs which provide city-wide curricular opportunities for all qualified **NCSD** students regardless of their place of residence. **If** admission to a particular school or program is not based upon residence in a particular attendance zone, initial registration may be required at the appropriate attendance zone school.

Parents requesting a variance to attend a school outside their attendance zone must apply at the desired school. The variance must be approved by both the receiving principal and the principal from the residence school.

Applications from non-residents to attend district schools will be considered when space and services are available **and only after the parent has obtained written approval from both school boards. Non-resident students will not be admitted until written approval has been obtained.** Tuition **may** be charged to non-resident **parents if there is not an inter-county agreement in place.** Non-resident **students** may be permitted to attend public schools **only after** payment of tuition **if required** by the Board of Trustees.

Any **student** who becomes a non-resident of the district will be permitted to remain in the district school until the end of the **school year**.

In the case of a change from resident to non-resident status, or from non-resident status to resident status or withdrawal, tuition may be adjusted.
