- 1) Our food-service program (breakfast, snack, lunch) and elder lunch delivery (30+ a day) have been top notch this year. I'd venture a guess that we've served more locally harvested food (salmon, dry fish, dry meat, moose, caribou, berries) than just about any school in the nation. Proud & skilled providers here in Kokhanok!. This wouldn't be possible without BBNA's support of our elder lunch program (and reimbursement). Our local KVC also acquired a grant that bought us an industrial vacuum sealer, meat grinder, and supplies to build our very own smokehouse! We were able to test the vacuum sealer out when 3 caribou were donated to the school at the end of March.
- 2) We continue to include native language instruction & games into our morning meeting routine DAILY. A huge thank you to Beth Hill, Krista Hobson, Connor Romer, and Peducia Andrew for providing such integral learning opportunities. The students' confidence, expressiveness, and connection to their identity/culture is growing every day.
- 3) PEP Squad: They bought ice cream, rave sticks, and party glasses to sell at carnival in the student store. Their goal was to raise \$500.
- 4) Thanks to the district's support, we were able to hire 3 young men (current students) to do our custodial work. They are taking the responsibility head on, communicating with each other and the rest of the staff, completing a daily checklist, and taking pride in the facility.
- 5) We had 1 middle school student (Ava Newyaka) get accepted for ANSEP! We also had 3 high schoolers attend the final BBRCTE session of the year; Dawson Hobson, Elia Newyaka, and Iliana Wassillie. Finn Hill took her Instrument rating written test in Anchorage as well.
- 6) Our Art Club, Book Club, Game Club, and peewee basketball all wrapped up at the end of April. Our elementary students were so fortunate to have a full calendar of extra-curricular events each week. A huge THANK YOU to Krista Hobson, Gabrielle Calhoon, and Maggie DeMare for leading those!

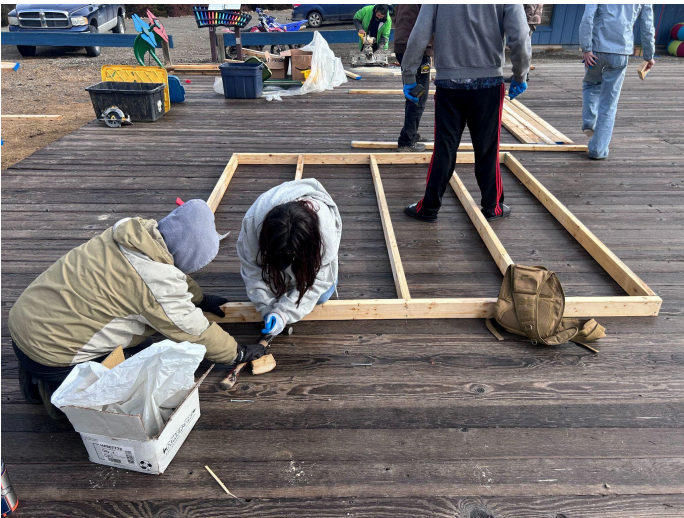
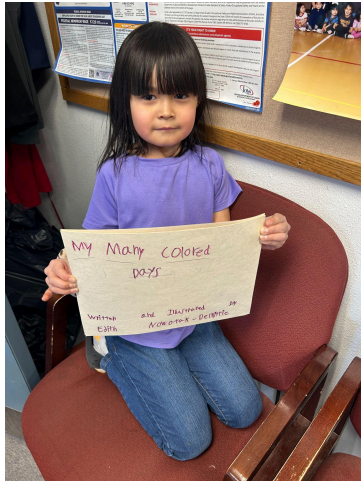
Professional Development

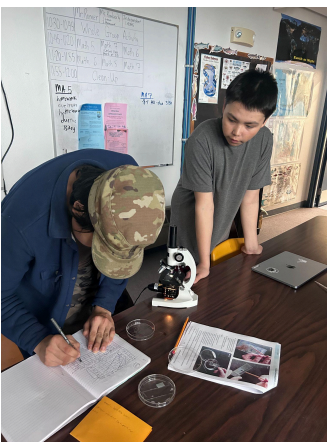

YUPIK PHRASES WE'VE LEARNED

This month we learned how to introduce ourselves. We were able to listen to the middle and high school students do their own introductions. Assipiak middle and high school students!



CLASSROOM CURRICULUM UPDATE

In math we studied: Kindergarten worked on describing and comparing measurable attributes, counting to tell the number of objects, comparing numbers and classifying objects and counting the number of objects in each category, and analyzing, comparing, creating and composing shapes.

First graders worked on understanding place value, extending the counting sequence, working with addition and subtraction equations, measuring lengths indirectly and by iterating length units, and understanding and applying the properties of operations and the relationship between addition and subtraction.

In reading we studied: Kindergarten for comprehension we worked on comparing and contrasting ideas and facts authors have written and retelling a story. For phonological awareness we worked on identifying and isolating middle sounds and segmenting sounds. For phonics we learned to blend, read and spell words with the short o sound. The high frequency word we learned: you

First graders for comprehension we worked on identifying the plot of a story, and determining the importance of details and pictures shared in a story.

For phonological awareness we worked on deleting the initial sound and deleting the final sound in words. For phonics we worked on the digraphs: ch, tch, th. The high frequency words we learned: come, found, full, next, their, walk.

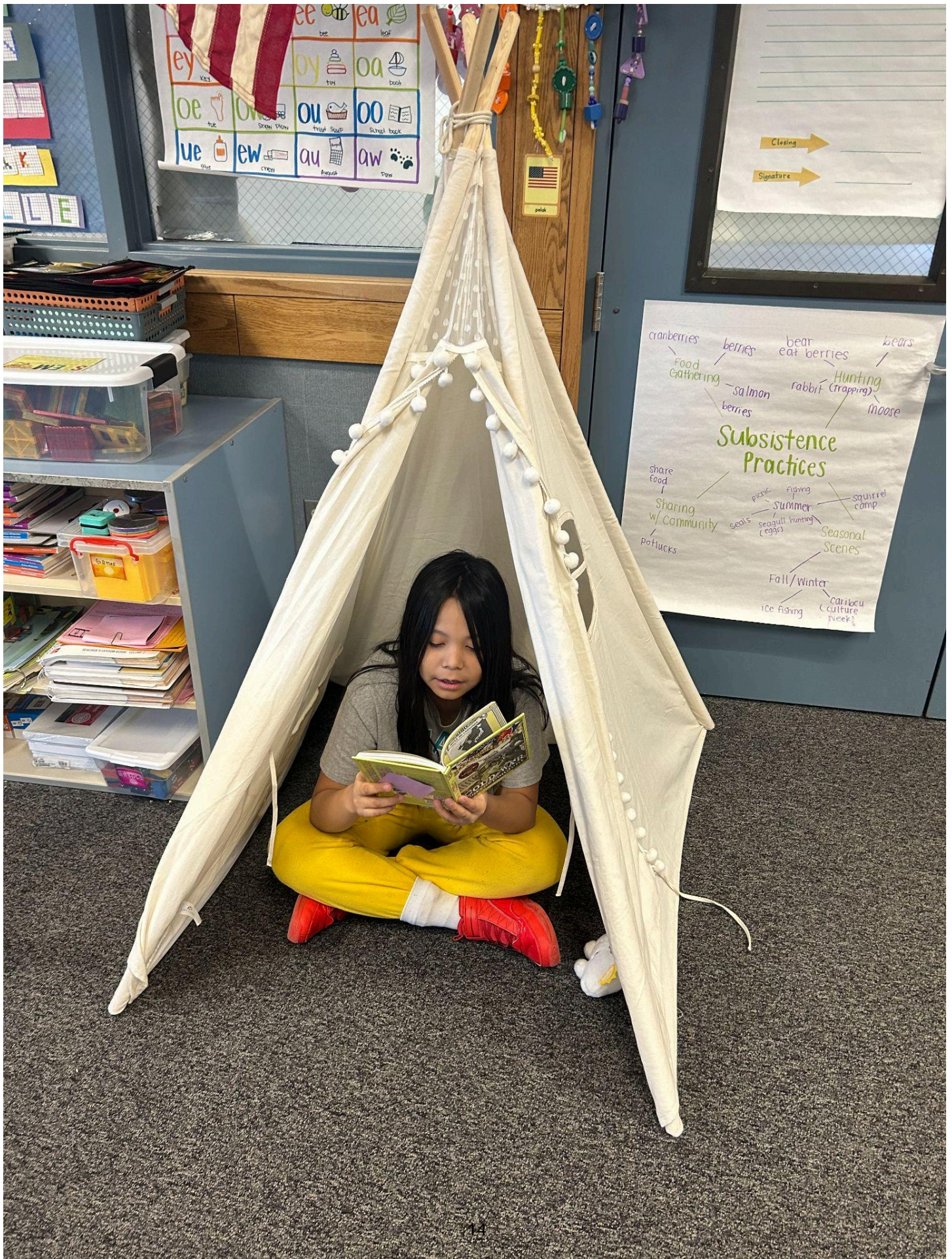

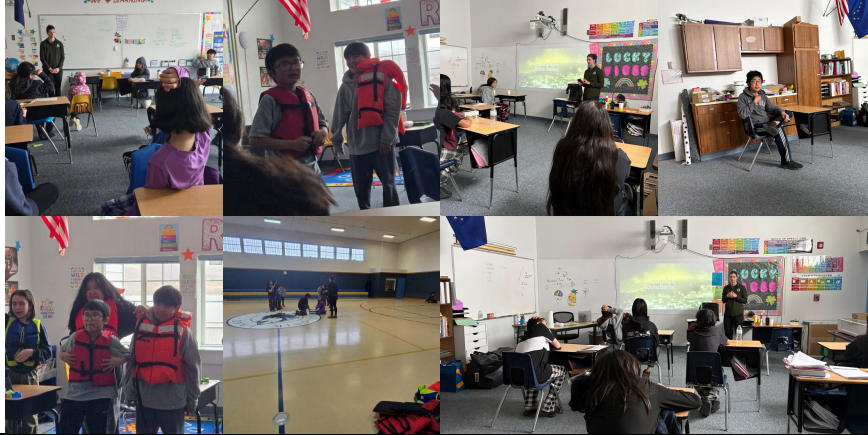


LSAC Activity

By finishing up levels nearly complete from prior years, to remembering and recording cultural and employability experiences and projects and jobs already complete, to finishing online classes

with Ms. Nikolaus and Mr. Meneskie, to finishing classes with Mr. McArthur after motivation and inspiration and many 1:1 meetings, these students made tremendous progress this past year to finish strong. Most of these have already finished their graduation requirements and some are so very close and still working on the last few standards in the final days.

Nathan McArthur has been tasked this year to spend about 4 hours of his day to support all LVHS students and parents in the teaching/learning process as our only certified Teacher for homeschool.

Mr. McArthur is to be commended for his knowledge of individual students, their respective ILPs, and their progress, as well as for his inspiration to each senior to get things done to close this chapter of his/her life and to launch into the world with the high school diploma in hand.





**District-directed homeschool: This is usually where a school has shut down in a village or any case where the parent or guardian desires the district to direct the Individualized Learning Plan (ILP) and to help design the curriculum. The district provides the financial support through its teachers, curriculum, electronic device loan, and other vendors as the student allotment, up to certain limits.*

***Parent-directed homeschool: This is where a parent or guardian chooses homeschool for their own reasons and desires to choose their own curriculum and provide their own instruction. Their ILP is approved by the district, the parent purchases curriculum, and the district reimburses qualifying expenses up to the limits of the annual (or cumulative) allotment: \$1200 for K-4, \$1450 for 5th-8th, \$1900 for 9th-12th.*

Services Provided

Teacher Liaison/Student Coordinator: Every student is assigned Mr. McArthur as their certified teacher to provide guidance, support, and official records. The Teacher Liaison and student/parent/guardian must engage in 2-way communication for at least 60 minutes per student per month, but we strive for more like an hour a week for most students.

Distance Teachers: 6th-12th level homeschool students are offered the same LPSD distance teachers for Reading, Writing, and Math that their onsite classmates around the district use.

Thank you to our distance teachers: Marli Nikolaus and Christian Meneskie.

Counselors: The LPSD district wide program for guidance counseling and social work also serves our LakeView students and students currently have a weekly zoom appointment for access.

Thank you to our counselors: Kacy Lou Leyba, Elisabeth Ludwig, and Patty McCasland.

Special Education Teachers: Special education services are provided to LakeView students.

Thank you to our special education teacher, Rick Rohlman.

Laptops or iPads: Each LakeView student is offered a laptop (6th-12th grade) or an Ipad (K-5th grade) and is given tech support by LPSD.

Curriculum: For district-directed students, LakeView purchases curriculum to support LakeView students in their learning, whether online or workbooks. Parent-directed families can use their allotment or use LPSD curriculum and distance teachers. K-5th level students are provided SAVAS or Reading Egg learning materials for Reading, Writing, Math, Science, and Social Studies. 4th- 12th grade students work through standards in Technology, Employability, and Cultural Awareness standards in the same manner as do their other LPSD classmates.

Assessments: LakeView students have the privilege and responsibility to participate in LPSD and statewide assessments. Students in grades K-3 are to use the Amplify Reading assessment, interventions, and progress monitoring tools. Students in 3rd-9th grade are to take the MAPs Growth Assessment and AK STAR statewide assessment. Students in grades 5, 8, and 10 are to take the Alaska Science Assessment.

School Supplies: School supplies for district-directed families are provided by the district. Parent-directed families purchase supplies and may be reimbursed for qualifying expenses through their allotment.

Official School Records: The Teacher Liaison ensures that all proficient standards and levels are marked in LPSD software with an A or a P to be archived in the official record.

Thank you to our registrar, Cassie Broschious.

Transcripts: The LPSD Registrar's Office supports LakeView students and alumni with official transcripts for life when requested by the student for postsecondary institutions, scholarship entities, and employers.

Sports & Activities: All sports and activities available to other LPSD students are available to LakeView students, provided the students meet all LPSD, ASAA, and BBRCTE eligibility requirements. This includes cross-country running, volleyball, basketball, NYO, the SNAP Meet, and BBRCTE courses.

Four students attended their first basketball jamboree and gained valuable experience both on and off the court. For many of them, this was especially meaningful, as their home villages have not had access to a basketball court for several years. LVHS was paired with NON and LAG. The camp was a wonderful success, made possible by the dedication and support of many individuals. The students and chaperones had a fantastic time, and it was an experience they will carry with them. Many are looking forward to the district tournament in PTH this month.

LakeView Homeschool School-Parent Agreement
*From the State of Alaska Requirements for Correspondence Programs and
Lake & Peninsula School District Guidelines for Homeschool*

LakeView Homeschool Commitment

1. Each student will be assigned a **certificated teacher** by the homeschool principal, called a **Teacher Liaison**, for monitoring student progress of the **Individualized Learning Plan (ILP)**.
2. Each student must be on an **ILP** that is on file with the district and signed by the Teacher Liaison and at least one parent/guardian who all agree to support the student in annual yearly progress in each subject in the ILP.
3. **Monthly Two-Way Contact:** The Teacher Liaison will strive to **meet at least an hour per month** with the student and/or parent/guardian to monitor progress and to assist with resources and strategies to become proficient.
4. **Quarterly Work Sample Review:** The Teacher Liaison will **review work samples and grades** provided by parents from each subject as presented by the parent/students each quarter. The TL will **mark off relevant standards** in the school records software that are Advanced or Proficient and provide coaching on deficient or incomplete work. Academic evidence provided by the parent is sufficient for the Teacher Liaison to assign a grade.
5. The district will include a **record of grades** or other determinations that the student has met the standards for a course. This grade record is **determined and assigned by** the Teacher Liaison or parent-teacher or LPSD distance teacher or online course institution, after reviewing work samples, reports, and student/parent recommendations.
6. The district will provide **Semester Progress Reports** to parents and high school **transcripts** upon request.
7. The district will require and provide for students to take any **statewide assessments** and may offer other district assessments to monitor student progress.
8. The district must comply and parents/guardians are to participate with the **AK READS Act**, including screening for all K-3 homeschool students (and interventions for students below benchmark).
9. Lakeview will have an **open enrollment** period for the whole school year for residents of the region.

Parent-Student Commitment

10. Each student must be on an **Individualized Learning Plan (ILP)** that is on file with the district and signed by the Teacher Liaison and at least one parent/guardian who all agree to support the student in annual yearly progress in each subject in the ILP.
11. **Monthly Two-Way Contact:** The parent/guardian agrees to support teacher-student or teacher-parent contact for at least one hour per month. For students who did not meet standards on the most recent statewide assessment, the monitoring must include strategies to become proficient.
12. The parent/guardian agrees to make a good faith effort to **return calls and emails and to initiate contact with the Teacher Liaison** in a timely manner, working together for the benefit of the student.
13. The parent/guardian **agrees to provide** a quiet space, a daily family schedule, and family-student motivation that promotes student learning. The student agrees to study, produce, and learn to strive to make annual yearly progress.
14. **Quarterly Work Sample Review:** The parent/guardian/student must provide work samples to the Teacher Liaison at least quarterly in each subject, so that the Teacher Liaison can monitor progress for each subject in the ILP.
15. The parent/guardian agrees to **review student work that they are responsible for and to assign** a grade at least quarterly on each standard or subject to share with the Teacher Liaison- an Advanced (90-100%), Proficient (80-89%), Developing (below 80%, but good effort on each assignment), or Emerging (little effort or incomplete work).
16. The parent/guardian will make their best faith effort to prepare their students to attend and to do their best on the **statewide assessment** that the district will offer in their village.
17. The district must comply and parents/guardians are to participate with the **AK READS Act**, including screening for all K-3 homeschool students (and interventions for students below benchmark).
18. If I receive a **computer, charger, or materials** from LPSD, I agree to return them when I graduate or exit from LPSD.
19. I acknowledge that I have received a copy of the school district's Student-Parent Handbook.

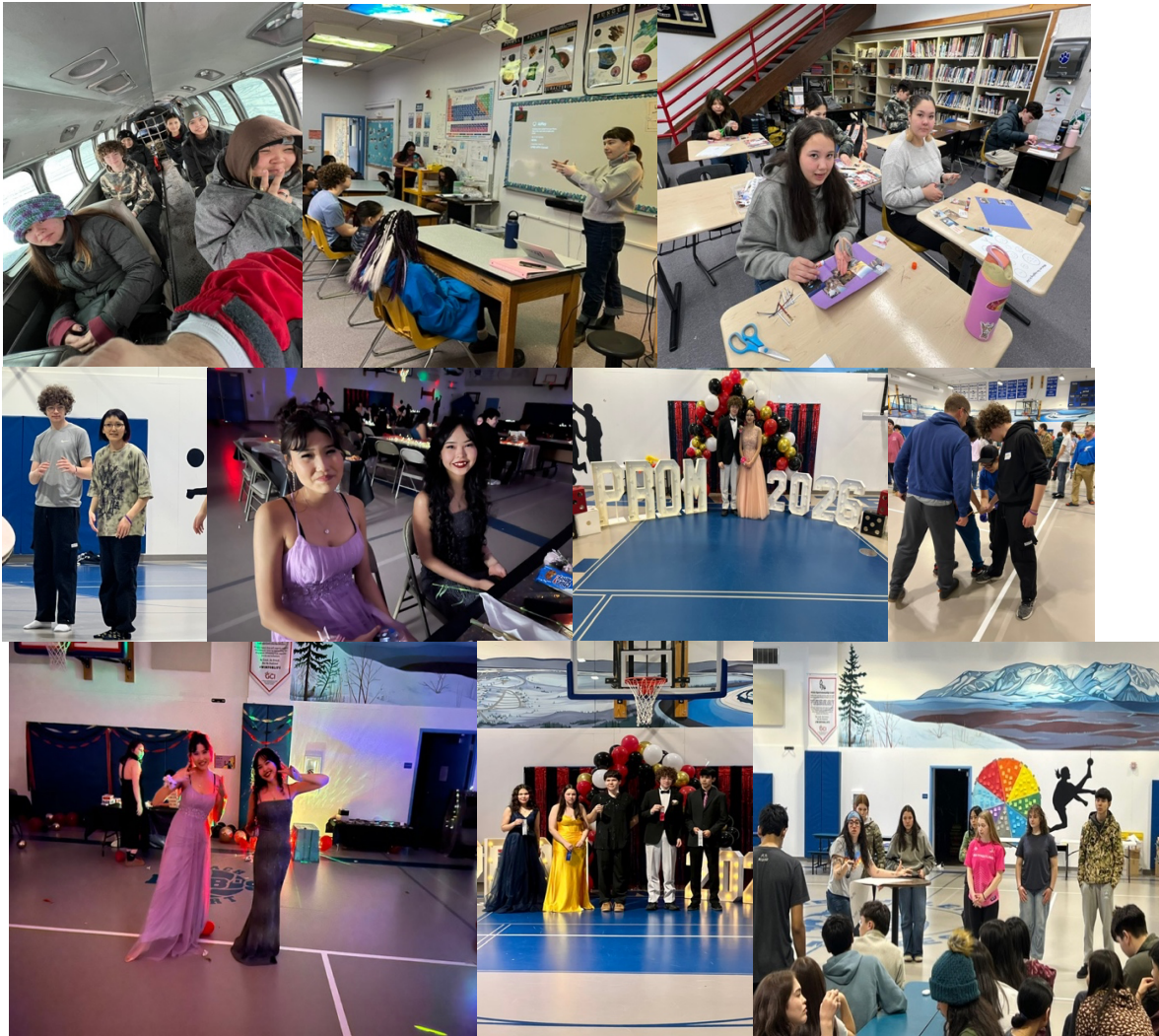

PRINCIPAL REPORT

- Will Perryville like to continue with USDA lunches for FY27 school Year? This doesn't need to be answered right away. We have till the end of March and this can be tabled until that time if needed. Currently the plan is to continue with the food lunch program and would like examples or menus or ideas if taken on by the village.
- Absences: At Risk. This is the percentage of students who miss more than 10 days for the school year up to this point. This data that I am looking at is showing that 27% of our students are considered at risk by the state due to absences, with about 20% of students missing close to 20 or more absences for the school year. We are in Feb. so with a few more months to go this may increase. This is just for awareness at what the state sees on their end and I do understand the realities of medical and other travel related interruptions that come with living in rural Alaska. We can also see by this data that this may explain why some students do not complete all their levels within the school year.
- Reading Success Data and Improvements:
54% of our students are reading two or more grade levels below
23% close to reading on level
23% on level or above.
Hopefully we can make a big push for the next couple of months and get those close to reading levels to come up.

1. Preschool: No report given
2. Kacy Lou: Our school counselor with LPSD is rolling out a new program. It is called a Sources of Strength. At it's core it is a suicide prevention program and promotes mental wellness and provides places, people, and foundations that can support and provide assistance for promoting mental wellness. Hello. My name is Evelyn Trefon. I live in Newhalen. My husband is Michael Trefon and I have 5 children enrolled at Newhalen school- Kiya, Kristen, Gabby, Aubree, and Hayden. Thank you for the opportunity to speak today. I am speaking for myself and my family.

(Unpack food bank box.)

I come before you as someone who cares deeply about our schools, our children, and the future of our communities across this district. The decisions you are making right now — especially around how and what to fund in the budget — will have lasting impacts on every village, every family, and every student you serve.

First, I urge you to prioritize funding local jobs through the general fund and not the endowment fund. In Lake and Peninsula, our schools are more than places of learning — they are the backbone of our communities. Our schools are some of the largest employers in our communities. When we invest in local hires, we are investing in families, stability, and long-term commitment to our students. People who live here understand our culture, our very day challenges, and our strengths. Keeping those dollars local strengthens everything. When the board chooses to fund local positions through guaranteed funding, you are choosing to support families who live here year-round and who are invested in our kids beyond the classroom. Keeping those jobs local strengthens not just our schools, but the stability of our entire region. Funding them through the savings account destabilizes communities' members confidence in local jobs through the school.

Second, we must do a better job working with our communities to provide food for school meal programs. The state of Alaska provides a breakfast program that our district has the opportunity to apply for on behalf of school sites. food security is a real and daily concern. Our community doesn't have much left to give. We are being donated food bank of Alaska boxes. When we work together, we can create a system that feeds our kids reliably, respectfully, and in a way that reflects who we are and how we live.

Third, I strongly urge you to preserve funding for student activities and to reinstate dedicated leadership for them. The recent decision to pull away the Activities Director role from the current employee is not a fair way to treat such a dedicated individual and it doesn't benefit a district as large and complex as ours. That role requires focused attention. Activities are not optional for our communities — they are essential. They keep students engaged, connected, and motivated. Without strong leadership, those programs will suffer, and so will our kids.

Next, I also want to address concerns about the budget itself. We are seeing inflated line items and a lack of clear, consistent information. That needs to stop. Our communities deserve

transparency and accuracy. Clear, straightforward communication must come from the finance department so that board members and the public can make informed decisions with confidence. Without that clarity, trust erodes.

I also ask that you make it a priority to visit school sites across the district. Lake and Peninsula is vast, and each community is unique. Decisions made from afar cannot fully capture what is happening on the ground. Being present in our schools — seeing classrooms, talking with staff, and listening to students — leads to better decisions rooted in reality.

If we just shut things down such as meal programs, and schools, it doesn't serve anyone. We can't give up and need to have clear paths forward and not abandon dreams. Leaving villages, community members, and students out of conversations and decisions that directly effect us, should not be the standard mode of operation.

Please include all villages that Lake and Peninsula Borough represents on your official letterhead. The current letterhead doesn't not, and to the best of my knowledge has not included Iliamna on there.

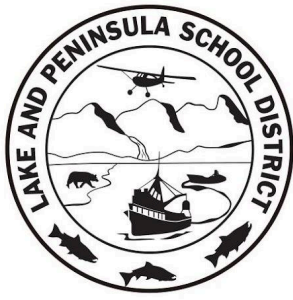
And finally, I ask you to hire a superintendent who lives in the district. Leadership should not be remote. Our district deserves someone who is part of our communities, who understands the current realities of rural life, and who builds trust through presence and accessibility. Living here matters. It shows commitment, accountability, and respect for the people you serve.

These priorities are not about adding more — they are about focusing on what matters most and doing it well.

Invest in local people. Work with our communities to feed our children. Restore strong leadership for activities. Demand transparency in budgeting. Show up in our schools. And choose leadership that lives among us.

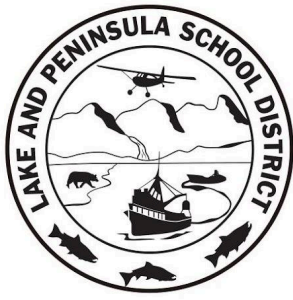

Alaska Legislative Session Update: Education Funding

HB 78: Retirement Systems; Defined Benefit Opt-In

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- **Status:** Passed Senate (12-8) on April 28; House Concurred and passed it 21-19, April 29.
- **Current Action:** Heading to the Governor's desk for signature. He has until May 18th to make a decision.
- **Summary:** A monumental "workforce stability" bill aimed at teacher retention. It establishes a new shared-risk defined benefit (pension) tier.
 - **Impact:** New and current employees can choose between the existing defined contribution (401k-style) plan or a new pension plan.
 - **Safeguards:** Includes adjustable contribution rates to prevent future unfunded liabilities for the state.

HB 261: Education Funding & Student Counts

- **Status:** Heard in House Finance Committee (April 22, May 1, and May 5).
- **Summary:** Seeks to stabilize school budgeting by changing how student counts are calculated.
 - **Mechanism:** Districts could use a three-year average of student counts or the previous year's count, whichever is greater, to determine funding.
 - **Importance:** This provides a buffer against sudden enrollment drops, allowing for more predictable long-term planning and staffing.

SB 277: Correspondence Students & BSA

- **Status:** Heard and Held in Senate Education Committee (April 13).
- **Summary:** Addresses the legal and funding framework for correspondence (homeschool) programs following recent court challenges. It also touches on Base Student Allocation (BSA) adjustments and charter school budget transparency.

HB 387: AK Native Languages Academic Task Force

- **Status:** Heard and Held in the House Education Committee on Monday, May 4th.
- **Summary:** This bill proposes the creation of a legislative task force dedicated to the study and support of Alaska Native language preservation and education. The group would review current systemic risks, such as funding gaps and the loss of linguistic expertise, and is tasked with delivering recommendations on teacher training and long-term revitalization strategies within one year.

FY 27 Operating Budget: One-Time Funding & Energy Relief

HB 263: State FY 27 Operating Budget

- **Status:** The State Senate passed the budget on May 7, 2026, with a vote of 17-3. It now returns to the House for a concurrence vote.
- **Summary:** This bill provides immediate financial relief through one-time allocations rather than permanent formula changes. It includes up to \$111 million in one-time funding for public education, which is contingent upon the price of oil. Additionally, it allocates \$29.1 million in energy relief grants specifically for public schools to address high utility and heating costs. If the House does not agree to these Senate changes, a conference committee will be formed to resolve the differences.

2026-2027 Small School Intent to Enroll

Through the LPSD pre-registration process, we have the insight as of today of the following pre-enrollment numbers:

Chignik Lagoon: 12 students.

Nondalton: 13 students.

Igiugig: 10 students.

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We heard from the Chignik Bay community that they do not anticipate having 10 students to reopen the school, and we have not heard back from the community of Pilot Point with any indication on the potential of having 10 students in their community for the start of the 2026-2027 school year.

LPSD Food Service

USDA/National School Lunch Program: Perryville and Chignik Lake are participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) utilizing USDA foods for the 2025-2026 school year based on their feedback and current available funds submitted to their individual accounts in January 2025. LPSD will maintain communication with these communities regarding their food service balance at the start of the year, on a quarterly basis or as needed. **Our team is working with Newhalen/Iliamna School Staff and community partners for them to weigh transitioning to NSLP.

Community Supported Food Service: Kokhanok, Port Heiden, Igiugig, Newhalen/Iliamna, Port Alsworth, continue to provide food for students through combined efforts within their community(ies). In the 2026-2027 school year, Chignik Lagoon and Nondalton will also be moving to a community supported food service program.

Re: Maintenance Report

Spring has sprung and the snow is receding, revealing the wear and tear of a brutal winter. Generally, as the academic year concludes, our typical transition toward school and housing maintenance—including deep cleaning, grounds maintenance, and minor repair is underway. For the third consecutive year, however, this activity has been scaled back as result of budget constraints. During the final week of operations, our focus remains on an efficient closure using existing classified staff. Under the supervision of the principals, the custodians will work an extra week with the goal of having as orderly, accountable exit as possible. Final plans for summer facilities use are being discussed and communicated but are not yet collectively defined. Housing exit checklists are already being executed by the principals and head teachers in an attempt to get as complete of information as possible on our apartments so the effort of preparing them for new occupancy can be efficient. This information will be used to communicate and assess the realities of deep cleaning, fixture/appliance/furniture/interior finishes. There are 48 active housing units in the district. We need to clearly define and communicate the specifics of apartment exits, and anticipated summer occupancy. This information, together with current maintenance requests, will help define the work for the summer.

Chronic absenteeism

Please help LPSD improve attendance rates. We want students and families to love school so much that they are sad to miss even one day. How do we encourage this? Chronic absence is missing so much school for any reason that a student is academically at risk.

From Sept 3, 2025 - May 5, 2026, **46.5%--which is 139 students** missed 10% or more of school for any reason.

81 out of 160 K-5 students (which is **50.6%**) have missed 10% or more of school for any reason.

This includes:

67.9% of our Kindergarten students

72.2% of our 1st-grade students

53.6% of our 2nd-grade students

In LPSD's 2025-2026 calendar there are 68 student days in the fall semester and 82 students days in the spring semester for a total of 150 student days.

During the 2026-2027 school year:

- 70% of K-5 students have missed 20 or more days of school. This is 112 students.
- 57.6% of 6-12 grade students have missed 20 or more days of school. This is 80 students.
- 43 students have missed 30 or more days of school.

Supporting End-of-Year Student Records and PowerSchool

After some productive collaboration, I believe we have a decent system in place to make sure student end-of-year records are accurate and transferable. In an SBS system of learning and teaching, it is very important that LPSD’s teachers in May leave a clear picture of where each student is ending the school year. We want a student’s new teacher in August to have accurate and easy to use information about their students so they are confident in making instructional decisions.

New K-5 ELA Curriculum

The Curriculum Pilot group met on May 6 and recommended Core Knowledge Language Arts for LPSD. [Here is a link to their formal recommendation.](#)

What the group did

- They rated each HMH and CKLA using LPSD's criteria. The top priority was how easy it would be for teachers to use it in multi-level classrooms.
- Members recorded short videos showing lessons, so others could see the materials in action.
- They reviewed scope and sequence documents, collected teacher feedback, read reports on phonics outcomes, and used AI to create comparison reports.
- The group worked together professionally and asked thoughtful questions to help LPSD choose the best ELA program.

Next steps

- With endowment funds, CKLA will be purchased and shipped out to sites this summer.
- Sites will work with local leadership to decide how best to dispose of old Reach for Reading Curriculum.
- Teachers will receive PD in August on how to use CKLA.

Key teaching practices for multi-level classrooms

1. Teach phonics in small groups by students' skill level. For knowledge units, teachers can often teach a single lesson to the whole mixed-grade class, using simple scaffolds and stretches so all students can follow.
2. Use Heggerty for extra phonemic awareness practice when students need more support.

It has been a pleasure to serve the district. Thank you for allowing, supporting and encouraging me to be creative and collaborative. This has brought much joy to my LPSD work, play, and life. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to help with Meshik School this year. It was an honor and privilege to spend time in the community.

LPSD Fund Balance Use and Endowment Fund Balances & Earnings

A summary of Fund Balance use and Endowment fund balances is attached. The Borough Finance Manager expects \$90,000 in earning this year after market value fluctuations.

BBRCTE Fund Sources and Expenditures

The general fund budgets for FY26 BBRCTE revised amounts and the FY27 Estimated amounts are attached for informational purposes.

To clarify, the General Fund BBRCTE budget is not supported by LPSD revenues; BBRCTE private donations and partner contributions that pass through LPSD as the fiscal agent are reported in the LPSD general fund, Revenues equal Expenditures. BBRCTE general fund revenue and expenses are wholly funded by donations and partner contributions. LPSD fiscal agent expenses are offset by grant indirect cost allocations and are reflected in District Administration Support Services or the Business Office.

LPSD Perkins funding is the only direct allocation to LPSD that is directed 100% to BBRCTE classes.

BBRCTE governing board approved budget documents attached. The donations/contributions in excess of expenses for FY26 are donor restricted for BBRCTE programs and will be available for expenditure in FY27 for BBRCTE operations. Expected uses are USDA equipment grant match and student travel.

Reporting Update

Grant quarterly reports were all filed for reimbursements in April for quarter ending March 31, 2026. Annual grant close out is being completed. Many funds are already complete for the year and final documentation is ready for audit. Annual Final Expenditure Reports for all DEED grants are due by August 31, 2026.

Audit prep is underway, the week of August 10th all transaction test work and compliance work will be completed. Audit reports are due to DEED November 15th.

Grants and Federal Funding

Part II of the Indian Education grant was submitted on April 4th. The Parent Committee meeting was held April. The membership only needs to be documented one time for each student and directly provides funding for aides to support reading and the SNAP meet for high school students.

ESEA grants are in progress, all the required meetings were held in April. ESEA applications must be substantially approved by June 30th. ESEA program monitoring will be conducted by DEED on all LPSD ESEA programs in FY27. Monitoring is conducted every 3-5 years depending on the district risk assessment by DEED. LPSD's last monitoring was in 2020. Monitoring is an involved process and will cover Title I-A, Title I-C migrant and Title II.

The President's Budget for LPSD grant funding in the 2027-2028 school year represents a 69% reduction in grant programs. Eliminates most programs, Title I-A, Make Education Great Again (MEGA) for reading and math instruction primarily. MEGA is block grants to states to be administered with more local focus. Charter School Funding, IDEA funding consolidates 6 current programs, Indian Education and Impact Aid all received funding. All other programs are zeroed out, Title I-C Migrant, Rural Education, Title II, School Improvement and Title IV-A are programs LPSD currently receives funding for. CTE grants and Alaska Native Education competitive grants have zero allocations. Now Congress must review and adopt a budget, a lot may change in that process.

Financial Report attached.

Year to date actual information is attached. The FY26 revised budget is under new business for approval.

Legislative Session

It is unlikely a BSA increase will be passed, several bills for one-time funding to support fuel cost increases and operation are being considered.

HB78 providing for a responsible pension for teacher, public safety officers and public employees is on its way to the Governor. If enacted this would restore a pension based retirement program verses the DC plans 401(k) style approach. This will likely significantly improve Alaska's ability to recruit and retain a qualified workforce.

Bills affecting education and mandating curriculum only reflect the cost to the State of Alaska. The estimated costs for districts to purchase and staff to meet the new requirements are typically not provided to the legislature.

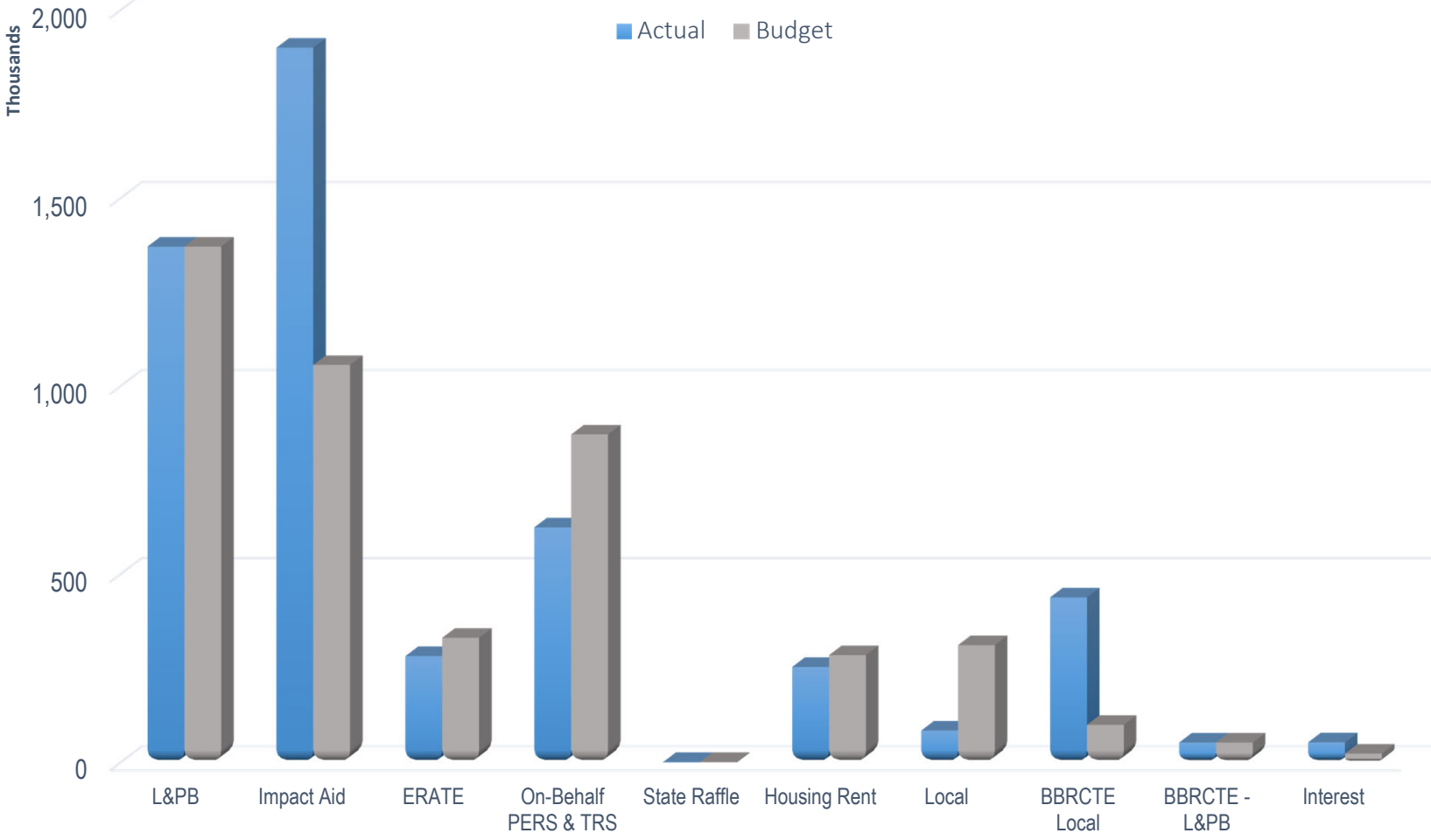

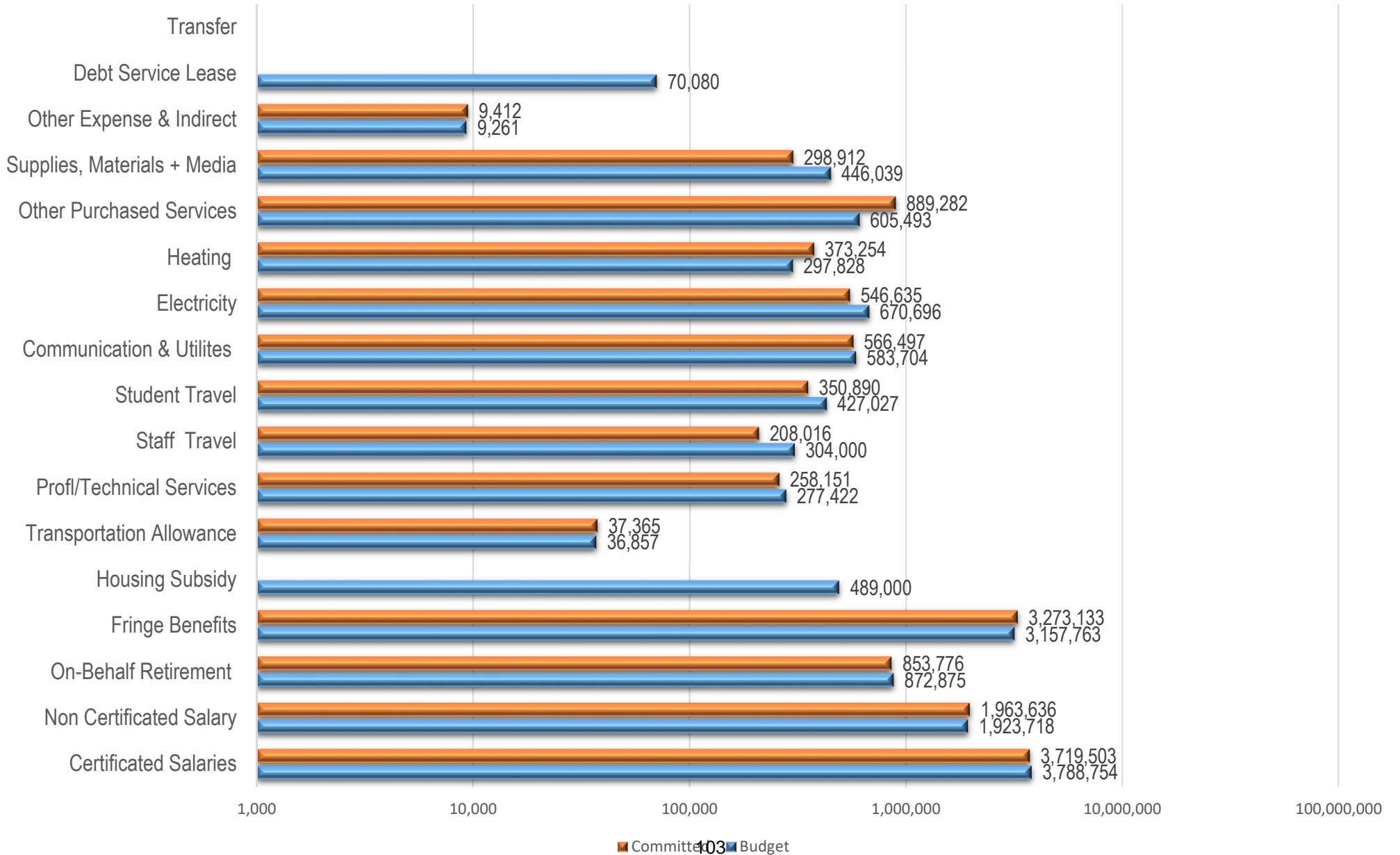

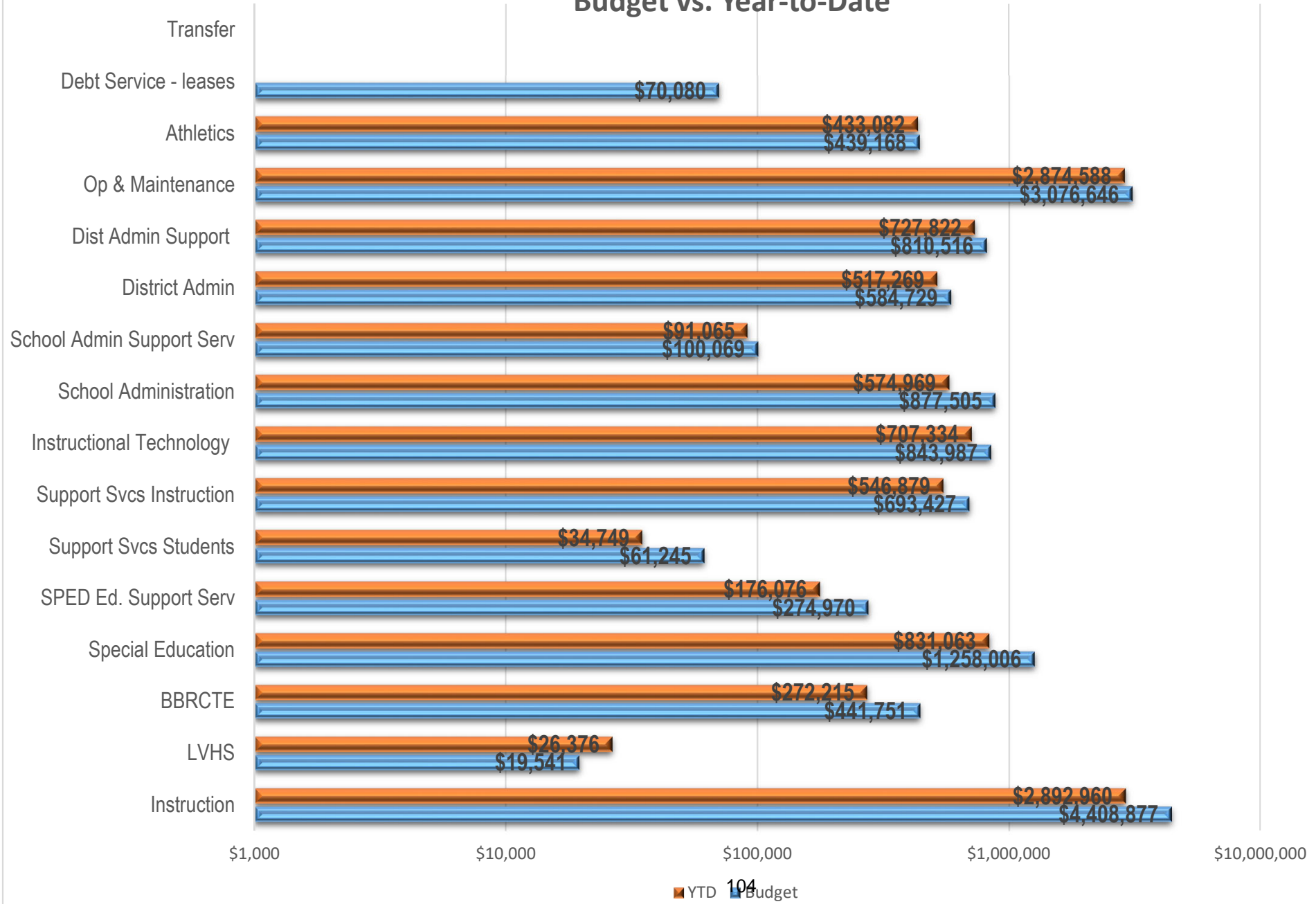
Budget vs. Actual (Year-to Date) Revenue Comparison (Excluding SOA Foundation)

Re: Special Education Report

Special Education Assurances

School districts are required every year to verify that certain assurances are being fulfilled in special education. There are 50 assurances that all school districts agree to complete during the grant application process. The department verifies these assurances on a rotational basis to reduce burden on the school district. This year districts were required to document that they are in compliance with the three assurances below. We are grateful to Becca Stenson for her work during the school year overseeing our Child Find activities and making sure each child ages 3-5 who is eligible for special education early intervention is found and served.

Administrative Assurance # 5 The district will maintain documentation that verifies contact is made to private schools, charter schools, and correspondence schools to identify children with disabilities who need services.

LPSD does not have any private schools or charter schools within its boundaries. The district has a home school program, Lake View Home School, as one of the district school choices. The district employs a home school coordinator to meet with parents and students on a regular basis. A special education teacher is assigned to provide services to students in the home school program. Students suspected of having a disability are referred for evaluation.

In the instance that a private school, charter school, or correspondence school were to be established within the jurisdiction of the district, the district would implement a systematic process to ensure timely and documented outreach for the purpose of identifying children with disabilities who may require special education services. In this instance, the Special Education Director/designee would review outreach documentation annually to ensure all required entities have been contacted and documentation is complete.

Administrative Assurance #6 The district will maintain documentation that verifies child find activities are coordinated with Part C child find activities. 34 CFR 300.124.

The Lake and Peninsula School District collaborates with Part C Early Intervention providers, Bristol Bay Area Health Corporation Infant Learning Program based in Dillingham, and Parents, Infants, and Children Early Learn Program based in Anchorage depending on which village is home to the student. This ensures a smooth transition and continuity of Child Find efforts for children transitioning from early intervention to preschool special education services.

The district ensures participation in transition conferences and maintains documentation verifying coordination efforts for all eligible children referred from Part C.

***Administrative Assurance #8** The district will maintain documentation that the child find annual public notice is available in English and each language in which the district has a bilingual program and is posted in several areas throughout the community (TV spots, newspaper announcements and/r other forms of media.) 34 CFR 300.111*

Lake and Peninsula School District conducts annual Child Find public awareness activities to inform the community of available special education services and procedures for referral.

The district maintains a yearly checklist verifying that public notice requirements are met, and are distributed across the community. LPSD does not have a bilingual program; however, the district works to ensure that all parents understand the Child Find process.

Disproportionality Report

We have not received the Disproportionality Report required by IDEA in which DEED conducts its annual analysis to identify disproportionality in identification of special education students and LRE. I have contacted DEED and learned that the reports have not been completed yet this year. LPSD has been identified in past years as having disproportionality in the area of Speech/Language eligibility for Alaska Native and American Indian students. We have worked each year to reduce our risk ratio through training, pre-referral interventions, and study of District practices. Although this has been a recurring problem for LPSD, last spring our ratio had improved significantly. We are hoping we maintained that progress through this school year.

Special Education Staffing for Next School Year

We will have some special education staffing changes next year. Tracey Thomas, who has served LPSD as the special education teacher at Nondalton for several years is moving on to new adventures. Rick Rohman who was an itinerant special education teacher for Chignik Lagoon, Chignik Lake, Chignik Bay and Perryville is retiring to spend more time with his family. We thank these dedicated teachers for their service to our students who experience disabilities and wish them the best in their futures. Any additional staffing changes are yet to be determined.

In the related service areas, Presence, a teletherapy company that we have worked with for many years, will continue to provide part of the speech/language and occupational therapy services to students who are eligible. They will share the speech/language load with Clover Therapy, a company that did a

wonderful job for us a few years ago. We are working with the two related service companies in order to provide services to our students at times and frequencies that will maximize their progress. Mary Olson, who joined our team in 2018, will continue to provide on-site therapy and supervision of physical therapy services to our students who require PT. We are happy that Vincent Henry will return as the school psychologist for LPSD. We look forward to another year of growth for our students in these related service areas.

Transition to Embrace

As I'm sure you are aware, LPSD has been using the PowerSchool Platform to create and store special education documents. The State Department of Special Education has been paying for this platform since 2016. The State will no longer pay for PowerSchool special programs and is requiring that districts across the state replace PowerSchool special programs with the Embrace platform. Our sped teachers have received training on the new platform and will continue to receive training and hands on learning throughout the 26/27 school year. Embrace will "talk" with PowerSchool SIS so we are hoping the glitches will be few and that we will find Embrace to be intuitive. Many thanks to Sam Rigby and Nathan McArthur for their hours of work moving our files from PowerSchool to Embrace. We couldn't have done it without their expertise.

School Year Closure

Once again, the special education teachers have been busy completing re-evaluations and new referral evaluations, ESER and IEP meetings, and of course, along with the paraeducators, providing special education services to their students up to the last minute! They were also tasked with doublechecking all the special education student information in PowerSchool and providing information to me for the end of year reports. I am hopeful that the Embrace platform will generate accurate state reports when required.

This school year has been busy and productive in special education. LPSD continues to include sped students in sports, academic contests, robotics, cultural enrichment curriculum, and other appropriate extra-curricular activities. LPSD truly is an example of inclusion at its best. Teachers and support staff help our students stay focused on the goal of graduation and provide the instruction and services needed for our students to be prepared for their adult lives.

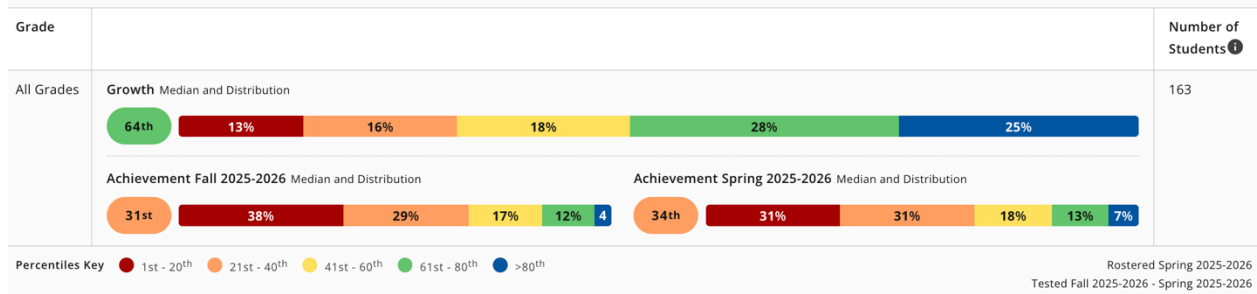

Lake And Peninsula School Dist | Math K-12

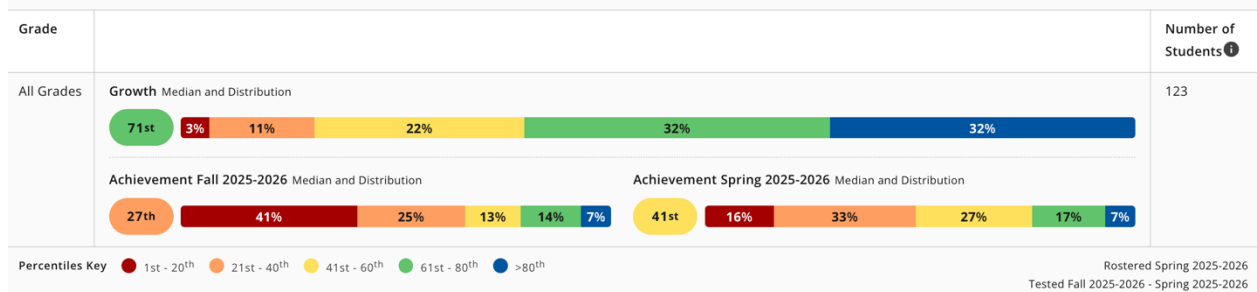


On the MAP Growth Math Assessment achievement scores grew 3 points from fall 2025 to spring 2026. District Growth was in the 64th percentile.

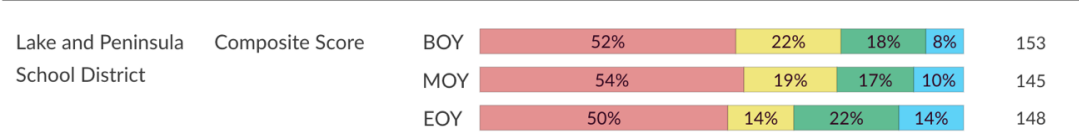

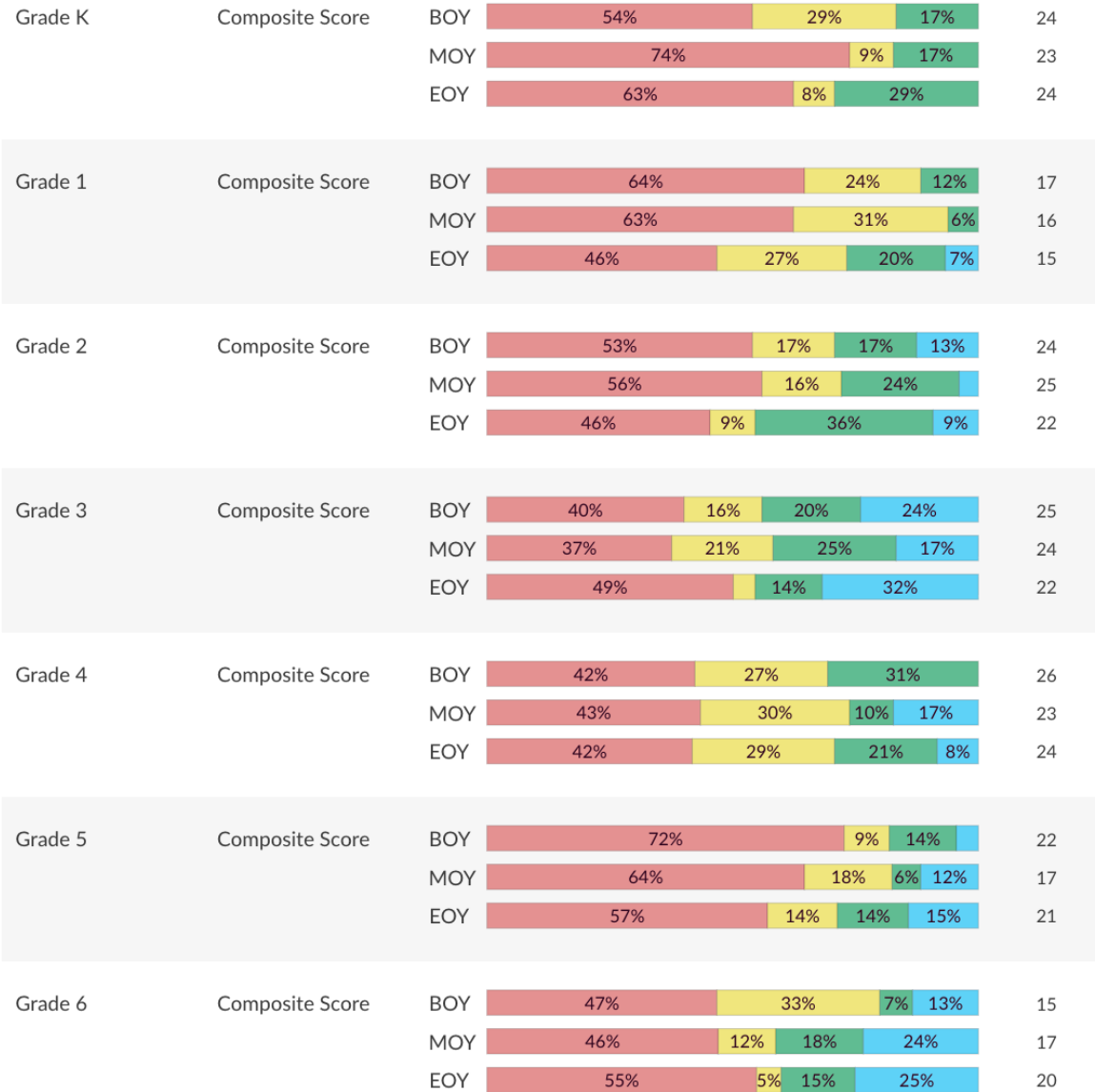
This shows the level each color represents:



This shows the combined scores of all LPSD students taking the Amplify mClass assessments for each benchmark period. LPSD went from 26% of student at or above benchmark in the Beginning Of Year (BOY) to 36% at or above at the End Of Year (EOY.) That’s an increase of 10 points over the year.



These show the combined scores of students in each grade level for each assessment period – Beginning Of Year (BOY,) Middle Of Year (MOY,) and End Of year (EOY.)



ADP - Alaska Developmental Profile – Kindergarten students - Used to provide a baseline skill level for students entering kindergarten.

Fall 2025 ADP results:

Glossary of assessment terms:

Formative Assessment – ongoing monitoring of student learning used to make changes to instructions and provide timely feedback for students. Examples are; teachers asking questions, having students write a few sentences about what they learned, checking a student’s homework, observing students doing a task. It happens throughout each day. Teachers may use it to make immediate changes to what they are teaching and/or to inform future instructional planning. It’s most impactful for students when they get feedback about their progress.

Interim Assessments – assessments used to measure where students are in their learning and predict success on summative assessments and other educational measures. These are usually given at specific intervals. Examples are; benchmark assessments (MAP Growth) and progress monitoring of intervention programs. These give teachers objective measures of student academic progress. Both teachers and students can see if they are “on the right track.” These are most impactful when they are used by educators to change or continue with specific instructional plans.

Summative Assessments – assessments used at the end of an instructional unit to measure learning, mastery, skills acquired, etc. They are generally only given once. Examples are; End of Levels, chapter tests, mid-terms/finals, the PEAKS assessment. These are not intended to be given frequently or repeatedly. Summative assessments are often standardized in what they measure and how. This means they are very objective but not always individualized for different learning needs. They are a valuable *part* of an overall data system.

Criterion Reference Assessment – A criterion referenced assessment measures whether or not a student has mastered a fixed criteria or standard. Example: A 3rd grade reading standard is “Read grade-appropriate irregularly spelled words.” A criterion reference assessment would provide a predetermined list of 3rd grade appropriate irregularly spelled words. If the student can read the words they pass. If they can’t, they don’t.

Norm Reference Assessment – A norm referenced assessment measures how well a student compares to other, similar students, in their understanding of specific standards. Example: With the same standards as above – A student is presented with the same list of words. They read as many of the words as they can. This number is compared to how many words other 3rd graders can accurately read. The results are a percentile.

- The admin team will be discussing literacy interventions for older students at their end of year planning meeting. This will include how to fit them into the schedule without losing other things, the possibility of offering credits for interventions classes, and a process for students to enter and exit the intervention process.
- The literacy intervention process for students k-5 made a lot of progress this year. The process is clear to teachers and well supported with resources and training. The next steps are to determine supports needed at individual sites to ensure students are getting all the help they need.
- The CLSD grant is providing multiple opportunities for literacy enrichment over the summer. Amplify Online Tutoring is being offered to 16 students grades 2-5. Spots are available to students based on teacher recommendation and parent permission. Teachers in Nondalton and Igiugig will be offering 5 hours a week of learning enrichment in May and June. One week intensive literacy support sessions will take place in Kokhanok, Newhalen, and Chignik Lake. These sessions were based on teacher availability. Grade levels served and specific instructional focus varies from site to site.

CLSD: Building Staff Capacity (*Literacy-Focused Professional Development*)

Alaska Reads Act: Educator Professional development

- LPSD had a team of 12 educators attend The Science of Reading Symposium. Matthew Grossmann, Eric Oba, Alexis Pursell, Roy Womack, Gabrielle Calhoon, Kim Phillips, Diana Hejtmanek, and Julie Boggan attended in person. Sara Erickson and Faith Woodcock attended virtually. It was great to have a whole team participate. The grant will support another team attending the SOR symposium and the MTSS conference next year.

- The elementary reading curriculum pilot team decided on a curriculum to recommend. That is detailed in the Curriculum Report. The team put a lot of time and effort into carefully considering the needs of LPSD students and teachers. This is a big responsibility and not an easy process. When adopting a curriculum we have to keep in mind that none of them are designed to meet all of the unique needs of LPSD. In my role I will be working to find ways to address things that are specific to LPSD. I will work with the company onboarding team to determine the best way to teach the program in our shortened school year. I will also be exploring ways to enhance and increase cultural relevance.
- Amber Kresl and I will be meeting with the Glean Education consulting team to reflect on their support this year and what it will look like next year. One example is the para professional training they provided this year. Should we carry on with the same model, change the focus, increase frequency, decrease frequency, etc.”?

Fostering & Sustaining Partnerships (Family/Community Engagement & Partnerships)

- The April family engagement activity was planting Alaskan wildflowers. Sites received seeds, pots, and snacks. Sites also have the option of hosting a game night in May. However, many sites have a robust schedule of family activities including culture weeks, graduations, game days, and community clean ups so they may not use those items until later.
- As part of a partnership to foster family engagement, Elisabeth Ludwig and I produce a monthly newsletter.

We will be finalizing our grant data in the next few days, but as of May 5th, we can definitively say that our team has served 151+ students in just the first four months of the calendar year. 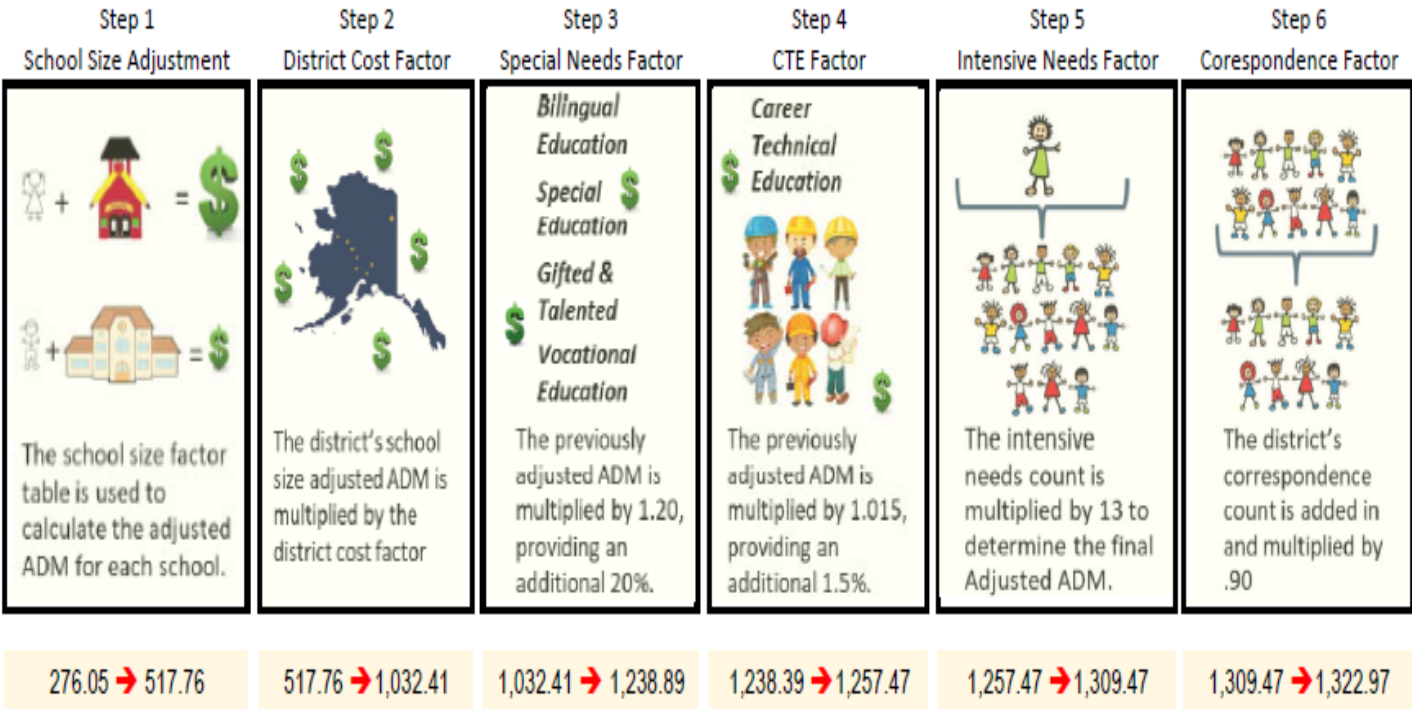
BBRCTE:

Revenue and Expenses for BBRCTE are direct pass through and restricted for BBRCTE programs. LPSD does not directly subsidize programs. BBRCTE grants do subsidize the fiscal agent costs through indirect costs allocations in District Administration Support Services – business office operation.

If Revenue exceeds Expenses at year end the balance of donations become Restricted Fund Balance for future expenditure. If revenue is not sufficient to cover expense estimates programs are adjusted.

- Partner revenue increased \$253,581 over spring 2025 estimates. The major increases are \$40,000 cosmetology; \$50,000 BBNC tax credits; Partner staff share MOA increased \$63,900 the balance is numerous small amounts.
- Restricted donations are expected to exceed expenses this year.

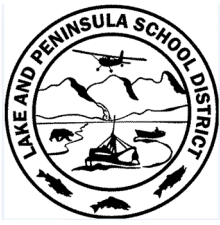

SUBJECT: Classified Pay Scale July 1, 2026 through June 30, 2030

The Classified Pay Scales are expiring on June 30, 2026 completing the 4-year handbook cycle. The pay scale is updated every four year, the last update was July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2026 the board selected 2% per year increase.

The attached pay scales are updated for a 2% annual increase to the base hourly rate. The increase is consistent with past increases and reflects the board’s commitment to LPSD’s classified staff.

Approval of the 2% each year for four years to the salary schedule is recommended. Pay scales are attached.

2% increase over 4 years is estimated to be \$127,213.

The question of increasing the starting wage B1 to \$20 is a \$2.29 increase. \$20 is often the starting wage for local entities. An increase to \$20 and the resulting index increase to the scale is estimated at \$122,169 in year 1, the 4-year increase is estimated at \$503,437.

Laura Hylton "Authorized Employee" Finance Director to adopt a nonqualified deferred compensation plan that qualifies under Section 457(b) of the Code, and shall make the Plan available to the following individuals:

All Employees

All Employees except those employees in the following class or classes:

All independent contractors who perform services for the Employer from time to time.

FURTHER RESOLVED that Authorized Employee is hereby authorized, directed and empowered to execute any documents, contracts, or agreements as may be necessary or desirable to implement the plan, and is further authorized, directed and empowered to take any and all actions necessary or desirable to effectuate the foregoing resolutions.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

Between
Lake and Peninsula School District
and
Newhalen Iliamna Youth Activities Club, Inc.

Effective Date: 5.10.24

1. PURPOSE

This Memorandum of Agreement (“Agreement”) establishes the operational, financial, and legal expectations governing the relationship between Lake and Peninsula School District (“LPSD”) and Newhalen Iliamna Youth Activities Club, Inc. (“NIYAC”). NIYAC operates as an independent nonprofit organization supporting student activities at Newhalen School.

2. LEGAL STATUS AND INDEPENDENCE

2.1 Independent Entity. NIYAC is a separate legal entity and not a program, department, or agent of LPSD. NIYAC was formed for the sole purpose of supporting co-curricular activities that are not provided by LPSD. In August 2023, NIYAC assumed responsibility for the Newhalen School Food Service Program, aka the Meal Program. It is understood that the success of NIYAC and LPSD is connected and requires collaboration and a positive symbiotic relationship between the independent entities.

2.2 No Authority to Bind LPSD. NIYAC shall have no authority to bind LPSD. NIYAC may not commit LPSD funds or enter into contracts on behalf of LPSD. LPSD shall have no authority to bind NIYAC. LPSD may not commit NIYAC funds or enter into contracts on NIYAC's behalf.

3. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

NIYAC shall maintain Directors and Officers insurance with a \$1,000,000 policy limit. NIYAC shall also maintain General Liability Insurance with a \$1,000,000 single and \$2,000,000 aggregate policy limit. NIYAC shall provide annual proof of coverage.

NIYAC shall protect, defend, indemnify, and hold LPSD harmless from any claims, demands, suits, damages, losses, expenses, liabilities or causes of action arising from or resulting directly from or in connection with this Agreement.

4. DOCUMENTATION AND COMPLIANCE

NIYAC shall provide LPSD with proof of non-profit 501(c)(3) status and an annual list of the Board.

5. CASH HANDLING REQUIREMENTS

If NIYAC funds are stored on LPSD property, NIYAC shall provide its own safe to store the funds. LPSD shall not be responsible for the security of any cash that NIYAC stored on LPSD property. All NIYAC funds shall be managed solely by NIYAC. NIYAC agrees to indemnify and hold LPSD harmless for any claims or losses related to NIYAC storing cash on LPSD property.

6. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

NIYAC shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws. This includes, but is not limited to, Alaska charitable solicitation laws, IRS reporting requirements for non-profit organizations, and Alaska charitable gaming laws and regulations.

7. RESTRICTIONS ON STAFF ROLES

If LPSD-certified staff serve on the NIYAC Board, they must recuse themselves from any NIYAC Board decision involving a dispute with LPSD.

All LPSD staff (classified and certified) may not serve in NIYAC roles as Treasurer and Financial Manager. If NIYAC uses LPSD employees to volunteer to handle funds at NIYAC events, NIYAC agrees to indemnify and hold LPSD harmless for any claims or losses related to LPSD employees handling NIYAC funds.

8. DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION RESPONSIBILITIES

The District Administration shall (1) maintain documentation required under this Agreement, (2) provide the NIYAC Board with the most current LPSD Policies and Regulations, and (3) work with NIYAC to ensure equitable support for student activities.

9. NIYAC FUNDRAISING AND USE OF FACILITIES

Notice of the next month's NIYAC events using LPSD school facilities must be provided via email to the Building Principal and the Superintendent by the third Thursday of the prior month. That notice must include:

- Event name and purpose
- Date and time
- Expected participants
- NIYAC officials who will oversee the event, including handling any cash

The District Superintendent or designee will approve or disapprove in writing NIYAC's requested use for the next month within three (3) school days.

Any NIYAC requests to use LPSD school facilities made on a shorter time frame, will be considered on a case-by-case basis by the Superintendent or designee.

There will be a clear distinction between NIYAC fundraising and LPSD fundraising. LPSD fundraisers will use *MySchoolBucks*. NIYAC fundraisers will utilize NIYAC's own Point of Sale/Payment systems. NIYAC will be responsible for maintaining the NIYAC Point of Sale/Payment systems.

10. FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

NIYAC commits to providing food for the Newhalen School food service program, or may choose to request the National Student Lunch Program (NSLP). NIYAC will financially supplement the cost of the NSLP as needed.

So long as funding is available from the Lake and Peninsula Borough Education Endowment, LPSD will provide the employees to prepare and serve the food.

NIYAC will provide food that meets all health and safety requirements and relevant laws and regulations.

NIYAC will coordinate with LPSD food service managers as needed.

11. TRAVEL AND STUDENT ACTIVITIES

All student and staff travel must be approved in advance by the Superintendent or designee, whether funded by LPSD or NIYAC.

LPSD will fund travel in accordance with the LPSD School Board adopted budget. NIYAC will directly pay for expenses for NIYAC-funded activities.

All chaperones for both NIYAC-funded and LPSD-funded student travel must be listed on the travel request forms. Any individuals interacting with District students for NIYAC-supported activities, including but not limited to coaches, must execute an LPSD volunteer agreement and complete a background check prior to any interaction with District students. It is the Site Administrator's responsibility to ensure each chaperone has a background check and has executed an LPSD chaperone agreement.

All LPSD athletics and activities no matter their funding source will be held to the same standards and oversight regardless of the funding source. This would include but not limited to travel, chaperoning, coaching, certifications, and student and coach requirements.

All NIYAC-funded trips must adhere to the LPSD athletic and activities handbook and policies and procedures for travel of students and staff.

12. OPERATING BOUNDARIES.

NIYAC shall not interfere with school operations. LPSD and NIYAC will collaborate and partner to support student activities and meals. Efforts to collaborate and partner must be communicated to the District Administration and NIYAC in accordance with the terms of this Agreement to support student activities and meals.

3. TERM AND TERMINATION.

This Agreement will commence on _____ and will remain in effect for one year unless terminated earlier by either party. This Agreement shall automatically renew for successive one (1) year terms upon the expiration of the initial term (and any subsequent renewal term), unless either party provides written notice of its intent not to renew at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the then-current term. Either party may terminate this Agreement with a 30-day written notice to the other party. In the event of termination, both parties will work together to ensure a smooth transition and minimal disruption to student activities and meals.

14. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter described here in and all prior or contemporaneous oral or written communications, understandings, or agreements between the parties with respect to such subject matters are hereby superseded in their entirety.

14. AMENDMENTS

Any amendments to this Agreement must be made in writing and signed by authorized representatives of both parties

15. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Alaska.
