**BYLAWS
OF
EDUCATIONAL SERVICES UNIT COORDINATING COUNCIL**

Article I. Authority and Purpose.

Section 1. Introduction. Pursuant to NEB. REV. STAT. § 79-1245, the Educational Services Unit Coordinating Council (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") is a political subdivision of the State of Nebraska.

Section 2. Purpose of Bylaws. The purpose of these Bylaws is to provide operational guidance to the Council and to clarify the Council's relationship with other education entities.

Section 3. Authority. The powers and duties of the Council are set forth in NEB. REV. STAT. §§ 79-1245 to 79-1249 as it may be amended from time to time. These Bylaws shall in no way limit or alter the authority and duties of the Council as provided by law.

Section 4. Mission. The mission of the Council is to provide the most cost-effective educational support for students, teachers, and school districts in each Nebraska educational service unit by facilitating statewide coordination of educational services and strategic planning.

Article II. Membership and Meetings.

Section 1. Number of Members. The Council shall initially have seventeen (17) members, one (1) administrator from each of the seventeen (17) Nebraska educational service units. The Council may involve liaisons from other educational entities and State agencies in its meetings and activities. If, at any time, the number of educational service units changes, the number of members on the Council shall also change so the number of members on the Council remains the same number as the number of existing Nebraska educational service units.

Section 2. Member Responsibilities. Each member is responsible for attending meetings and faithfully and diligently executing any responsibilities or tasks delegated by the Council to carry out its statutory powers and duties.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. In May of each year, the Council shall approve meeting dates, times and locations for the next 12 months. The Council shall meet at least once annually and schedule the number of regular meetings

that it deems appropriate for each 12-month period. The Council shall endeavor to set meetings on dates and at locations that accommodate the schedule of its members and of the State's education community. Regular meetings shall be noticed and held pursuant to the Nebraska Open Meetings Act.

Section 4. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Council may be called by the President of the Council or by a majority of Council members for any lawful reason. Special meetings shall be noticed and held pursuant to the Nebraska Open Meetings Act.

Section 5. Quorum. No action may be taken on a matter at a Council meeting unless a majority of Council members are present at the meeting either in person or via teleconference pursuant to NEB. REV. STAT. § 84-1411 as may be amended from time to time.

Section 6. Voting. If a quorum is present, the affirmative vote of the majority of Council members present at the meeting and entitled to vote on the subject matter shall be considered an act of the Council unless of a greater vote is required by law. All votes shall be by roll call vote and recorded in the minutes of the Council meeting.

Section 7. Recessed Meeting. A majority of Council members present at any meeting may vote to recess the meeting to a different date, time and/or location. Any business which might have been transacted at the original meeting may be transacted at the rescheduled meeting if a quorum is present at such recessed meeting.

Section 8. Commissioner of Education. The Commissioner of Education shall be invited to attend or to send representatives from the Nebraska Department of Education in his or her stead, to each regular meeting of the Council.

Article III. Officers.

Section 1. Number and Qualification. The initial officers of the Council shall consist of a President, a President-Elect, a Past-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and such other officers as may be deemed necessary by the Council. Together these officers shall comprise the Executive Committee of the Council.

Section 2. Election and Tenure. The officers of the Council shall be elected at the first regular meeting of the Council. Election may be by either voice vote or written ballot and shall require a majority vote of all members present at the meeting at which the election occurs. Thereafter the officers shall be elected bi-annually at the September meeting or as soon thereafter as convenient. Each officer shall hold office for two years or until his or her successor is duly elected and qualified, unless his or her service is terminated sooner because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise.

Section 3. Removal. Any officer of the Council, either elected or appointed, may be removed by a vote of the majority of the Council. Election or appointment of an officer or agent shall not of itself create a contractual relationship between the officer and the Council or give the officer any contract rights.

Section 4. Vacancies. A vacancy in an office due to death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise shall be filled by a vote of the Council in the same manner as provided in Section 2 above, at the Council's next regular meeting after the vacancy becomes known to the Council.

Section 5. Duties and Authority of Officers.

- (a) President. The President shall be the principal executive officer of Council. The President shall cause all meetings of the Council to be lawfully noticed and prepare an agenda for each meeting of the Council in accordance with state law. When present, the President shall preside at all meetings of the Council. The President may sign, with the Secretary or any other officer of the agency authorized by the Council, checks, contracts or other instruments which the Council has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof is expressly delegated by the Council or these Bylaws to some other officer or agent of the Council or required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The President shall perform all duties incident to the office of President and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Council from time to time.
- (b) President-Elect. In the absence of the President or in the event of his or her death, inability, or refusal to act, the President-Elect shall perform the duties of the President. When so acting the President-Elect, shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the

restrictions upon, the President. The President-Elect shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the President or by the Council.

- (c) Past-President. In the absence of the President or the President-Elect or in the event of his or her death, inability, or refusal to act, the Past-President shall perform the duties of the President. When so acting the Past-President, shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the restrictions upon, the President. The Past-President shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the President or by the Council.
- (d) Secretary. The Secretary shall prepare minutes of the meetings of the Council, serve as the custodian of the Council's records, keep a current roster of the physical and e-mail addresses of all Council members, and perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary, and perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the President or by the Council.
- (e) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have charge and custody of and be responsible for, all funds and securities of the Council, receive receipts for all securities and monies due and payable to the Council from any source whatsoever and give such receipts to the Council, deposit all such monies in the name of the Council in such banks, trust companies, or in other depositories designated by the Council, and perform all the duties incident to the office of Treasurer and perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the President or by the Council. If required by the Council, the Treasurer shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of his or her duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as the Council shall determine.
- (f) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall meet as needed to prepare for Council meetings, to formulate recommendations for the Council, and for such other reasons as deemed appropriate by the President or as directed by the Council.

Article IV. Administration.

Section 1. Reimbursement for Expenses. Council members and Council employees shall be entitled to reimbursement for actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as allowed by NEB. REV. STAT. § 79-1217 and other laws and applicable regulations as they may be amended from time to time. No request for reimbursement shall be submitted by an individual for an expense which has been paid by an educational service unit, other educational agency, or political subdivision. No charge for mileage shall be allowed when such mileage accrues while using an automobile owned by the State of Nebraska or one of its political subdivisions.

Section 2. Budget. The Council shall annually adopt a budget as required by the Nebraska Budget Act. Fiscal agents shall, pursuant to the agency agreement between the fiscal agent and the ESUCC, segregate funds contributed to a project from other funds maintained by the fiscal agent, either by maintaining a separate account of the Council designated for such a purpose or by maintaining a segregated fund within the budget of the educational service unit serving as fiscal agent. The Council shall require each fiscal agent appointed by the Council to provide to the Council quarterly statements of all activity for each project.

Section 3. Agency Agreements and Fiscal Agents. The Council may enter into agency agreements with individual educational service units or other public or private entities. The purpose of such agreements will be for the Council to delegate to the agent entity the authority and responsibility to oversee particular statewide cooperative projects. The agency agreement shall specify whether the agent entity will also serve as the fiscal agent for the project.

Section 4. Powers. The Council shall have the power to:

- (a) Purchase and/or lease supplies, materials and equipment and enter into a contract with any person, firm, corporation or other entity.
- (b) Accept for any of its purposes and functions any and all donations, grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials and services, conditional or otherwise from any person or entity, and receive, utilize, and dispose of the same. The nature, amount, and conditions, if any, attendant upon any donation or grant accepted

pursuant to this section shall be detailed in the annual report of Council.

- (c) Employ, compensate, evaluate and discharge staff limited only to those persons necessary to carry out its duties and functions;
- (d) Establish committees as it deems necessary for the purpose of advising the Council on any and all matters pertaining the Council's duties or activities;
- (e) Indemnify or reimburse any person in the same manner as an educational service unit board is authorized to do pursuant to NEB. REV. STAT. § 79-1217 as may be amended from time to time;
- (f) Take any other action authorized, either explicitly or implicitly, by Nebraska law, including any action that may be necessary to perform its duties and functions as provided in these Bylaws.

Section 5. Annual Plan. The Council shall develop a written document outlining the programs, services and other projects which the Council will operate each year ("Annual Plan"). The Council will annually review the Annual Plan and may amend it as the Council deems necessary.

Section 6. Advisory Committees. The Council may solicit input from advisory committees comprised of teachers, administrators, board members, staff development staff, and other individuals. The role of these committees shall be advisory only, and no recommendation or proposal by any advisory committee shall be final until acted upon and adopted by the Council.

Article V. Other Matters.

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Council shall begin on ~~July 4~~ ^{September 1} and end on ~~June 30~~ ^{August 31}. (Amended March 3, 2010)

Section 2. Liability Insurance. The Council shall obtain adequate insurance to cover itself, its members and its agents, employees, volunteers, or other persons in performing duties to the Council. Adequate shall mean an amount, if available, which will satisfy the maximum claims that could be made under Nebraska's Political Subdivision Tort Claims Act.

Section 3. Amendment. These Bylaws may be amended from time to time as deemed necessary by a majority of the Council. All such amendments must be in writing, appended to this document and signed by the Council Secretary.

Section 4. Intellectual Property. All rights to any intellectual property (copyright, trademark, patent, etc.) created in connection with any project reflected in the addenda to these Bylaws shall be owned by the Council.

These Bylaws were adopted by the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council at a meeting lawfully held pursuant to the Nebraska Open Meetings Act this _____ day of July, 2008.

Nebraska Open Meetings Act

§84-1407 Act, how cited Sections 84-1407 to 84-1414 shall be known and may be cited as the Open Meetings Act.

§84-1408 Declaration of intent; meetings open to public It is hereby declared to be the policy of this state that the formation of public policy is public business and may not be conducted in secret. Every meeting of a public body shall be open to the public in order that citizens may exercise their democratic privilege of attending and speaking at meetings of public bodies, except as otherwise provided by the Constitution of Nebraska, federal statutes, and the Open Meetings Act.

§84-1409. Terms, defined For purposes of the Open Meetings Act, unless the context otherwise requires: (1)(a) Public body means (i) governing bodies of all political subdivisions of the State of Nebraska, (ii) governing bodies of all agencies, created by the Constitution of Nebraska, statute, or otherwise pursuant to law, of the executive department of the State of Nebraska, (iii) all independent boards, commissions, bureaus, committees, councils, subunits, or any other bodies created by the Constitution of Nebraska, statute, or otherwise pursuant to law, (iv) all study or advisory committees of the executive department of the State of Nebraska whether having continuing existence or appointed as special committees with limited existence, (v) advisory committees of the bodies referred to in subdivisions (i), (ii), and (iii) of this subdivision, and (vi) instrumentalities exercising essentially public functions. (b) Public body does not include (i) subcommittees of such bodies unless a quorum of the public body attends a subcommittee meeting or unless such subcommittees are holding hearings, making policy, or taking formal action on behalf of their parent body, except that all meetings of any subcommittee established under section 81-15,175 are subject to the Open Meetings Act, and (ii) entities conducting judicial proceedings unless a court or other judicial body is exercising rulemaking authority, deliberating, or deciding upon the issuance of administrative orders;

(2) Meeting means all regular, special, or called meetings, formal or informal, of any public body for the purposes of briefing, discussion of public business, formation of tentative policy, or the taking of any action of the public body; and

(3) Videoconferencing means conducting a meeting involving participants at two or more locations through the use of audio-video equipment which allows participants at each location to hear and see each meeting participant at each other location, including public input. Interaction between meeting participants shall be possible at all meeting locations.

§84-1410. Closed session; when; purpose; reasons listed; procedure; right to challenge; prohibited acts; chance meetings, conventions, or workshops (1) Any public body may hold a closed session by the affirmative vote of a majority of its voting members if a closed session is clearly necessary for the protection of the public interest or for the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual and if such individual has not requested a public meeting. The subject matter and the reason necessitating the closed session shall be identified in the motion to close. Closed sessions may be held for, but shall not be limited to, such reasons as: (a) Strategy sessions with respect to collective bargaining, real estate purchases, pending litigation, or litigation which is imminent as evidenced by communication of a claim or threat of litigation to or by the public body; (b) Discussion regarding deployment of security personnel or devices; (c) Investigative proceedings regarding allegations of criminal misconduct; (d) Evaluation of the job performance of a person when necessary to prevent needless injury to the reputation of a person and if such person has not requested a public meeting; (e) For the Community Trust created under section 81-1801.02, discussion regarding the amounts to be paid to individuals who have suffered from a tragedy of violence or natural disaster, or (f) For public hospitals, governing board peer review activities, professional review activities, review and discussion of medical staff investigations or disciplinary actions, and any strategy session concerning transactional negotiations with any referral source that is required by federal law to be conducted at arms length. Nothing in this section shall permit a closed meeting for discussion of the appointment or election of a new member to any public body.

(2) The vote to hold a closed session shall be taken in open session. The entire motion, the vote of each member on the question of holding a closed session, and the time when the closed session commenced and concluded shall be recorded in the minutes. If the motion to close passes, then the presiding officer immediately prior to the closed session shall restate on the record the limitation of the subject matter of the closed session. The public body holding such a closed session shall restrict its consideration of matters during the closed portions to only those purposes set forth in the motion to close as the reason for the closed session. The meeting shall be reconvened in open session before any formal action may be taken. For purposes of this section, formal action shall mean a collective decision or a collective commitment or promise to make a decision on any question, motion, proposal, resolution, order, or ordinance or formation of a position or policy but shall not include negotiating guidance given by members of the public body to legal counsel or other negotiators in closed sessions authorized under subdivision (1) (a) of this section.

(3) Any member of any public body shall have the right to challenge the continuation of a closed session if the member determines that the session has exceeded the reason stated in the original motion to hold a closed session or if the member contends that the closed session is neither clearly necessary for (a) the protection of the public interest or (b) the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual. Such challenge shall be overruled only by a majority vote of the members of the public body. Such challenge and its disposition shall be recorded in the minutes.

(4) Nothing in this section shall be construed to require that any meeting be closed to the public. No person or public body shall fail to invite a portion of its members to a meeting, and no public body shall designate itself a subcommittee of the whole body for the purpose of circumventing the Open Meetings Act. No closed session, informal meeting, chance meeting, social gathering, email, fax, or other electronic communication shall be used for the purpose of circumventing the requirements of the act.

(5) The act does not apply to chance meetings or to attendance at or travel to conventions or workshops of members of a public body at which there is no meeting of the body then intentionally convened, if there is no vote or other action taken regarding any matter over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power.

§84-1411. Meetings of public body; notice; contents; when available; right to modify; duties concerning notice; videoconferencing or telephone conferencing authorized; emergency meeting without notice; appearance before public body (1) Each public body shall give reasonable advance public notice of the time and place of each meeting by a method designated by each public body and recorded in its minutes. Such notice shall be transmitted to all members of the public

body and to the public. Such notice shall contain an agenda of subjects known at the time of the publicized notice or a statement that the agenda, which shall be kept continually current, shall be readily available for public inspection at the principal office of the public body during normal business hours. Agenda items shall be sufficiently descriptive to give the public reasonable notice of the matters to be considered at the meeting. Except for items of an emergency nature, the agenda shall not be altered later than (a) 24 hours before the scheduled commencement of the meeting or (b) 48 hours before the scheduled commencement of a meeting of a city council or village board scheduled outside the corporate limits of the municipality. The public body shall have the right to modify the agenda to include items of an emergency nature only at such public meeting.

(2) A meeting of a state agency, state board, state commission, state council, or state committee, of an advisory committee of any such state entity, of an organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, the Joint Public Agency Act, or the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, of the governing body of a public power district having a chartered territory of more than one county in this state, of the governing body of a public power and irrigation district having a chartered territory of more than one county in this state, of a board of an educational service unit, of the educational service unit coordinating council, of the governing body of a risk management pool or its advisory committees organized in accordance with the Intergovernmental Risk Management Act, or of a community college board of governors may be held by means of videoconferencing or, in the case of the Judicial Resources Commission in those cases specified in section 24-1204, by telephone conference, if: (a) Reasonable advance publicized notice is given; (b) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including seating, recordation by audio or visual recording devices, and a reasonable opportunity for input such as public comment or questions to at least the same extent as would be provided if videoconferencing or telephone conferencing was not used; (c) At least one copy of all documents being considered is available to the public at each site of the videoconference or telephone conference; (d) At least one member of the state entity, advisory committee, board, council, or governing body is present at each site of the videoconference or telephone conference; and (e) No more than one-half of the state entity's, advisory committee's, board's, council's, or governing body's meetings in a calendar year are held by videoconference or telephone conference. Videoconferencing, telephone conferencing, or conferencing by other electronic communication shall not be used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act.

(3) A meeting of a board of an educational service unit, of the educational service unit coordinating council, of the governing body of an entity formed under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, the Joint Public Agency Act, or the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, of the governing body of a risk management pool or its advisory committees organized in accordance with the Intergovernmental Risk Management Act, of a community college board of governors, of the governing body of a public power district, or of the governing body of a public power and irrigation district may be held by telephone conference call if: (a) The territory represented by the educational service unit, member educational service units, community college board of governors, public power district, public power and irrigation district, or member public agencies of the entity or pool covers more than one county; (b) Reasonable advance publicized notice is given which identifies each telephone conference location at which an educational service unit board member, a council member, a member of a community college board of governors, a member of the governing body of a public power district, a member of the governing body of a public power and irrigation district, or a member of the entity's or pool's governing body will be present; (c) All telephone conference meeting sites identified in the notice are located within public buildings used by members of the educational service unit board, council, community college board of governors, governing body of the public power district, governing body of the public power and irrigation district, or entity or pool or at a place which will accommodate the anticipated audience; (d) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including seating, recordation by audio recording devices, and a reasonable opportunity for input such as public comment or questions to at least the same extent as would be provided if a telephone conference call was not used; (e) At least one copy of all documents being considered is available to the public at each site of the telephone conference call; (f) At least one member of the educational service unit board, council, community college board of governors, governing body of the public power district, governing body of the public power and irrigation district, or governing body of the entity or pool is present at each site of the telephone conference call identified in the public notice; (g) The telephone conference call lasts no more than two hours; and (h) No more than one-half of the board's, council's, governing body's, entity's, or pool's meetings in a calendar year are held by telephone conference call, except that a governing body of a risk management pool that meets at least quarterly and the advisory committees of the governing body may each hold more than one-half of its meetings by telephone conference call if the governing body's quarterly meetings are not held by telephone conference call or videoconferencing. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent the participation of consultants, members of the press, and other nonmembers of the governing body at sites not identified in the public notice. Telephone conference calls, emails, faxes, or other electronic communication shall not be used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act.

(4) The secretary or other designee of each public body shall maintain a list of the news media requesting notification of meetings and shall make reasonable efforts to provide advance notification to them of the time and place of each meeting and the subjects to be discussed at that meeting.

(5) When it is necessary to hold an emergency meeting without reasonable advance public notice, the nature of the emergency shall be stated in the minutes and any formal action taken in such meeting shall pertain only to the emergency. Such emergency meetings may be held by means of electronic or telecommunication equipment. The provisions of subsection (4) of this section shall be complied with in conducting emergency meetings. Complete minutes of such emergency meetings specifying the nature of the emergency and any formal action taken at the meeting shall be made available to the public by no later than the end of the next regular business day.

(6) A public body may allow a member of the public or any other witness other than a member of the public body to appear before the public body by means of video or telecommunications equipment.

§84-1412. Meetings of public body; rights of public; public body; powers and duties (1) Subject to the Open Meetings Act, the public has

the right to attend and the right to speak at meetings of public bodies, and all or any part of a meeting of a public body, except for closed sessions called pursuant to section 84-1410, may be videotaped, televised, photographed, broadcast, or recorded by any person in attendance by means of a tape recorder, camera, video equipment, or any other means of pictorial or sonic reproduction or in writing.

(2) It shall not be a violation of subsection (1) of this section for any public body to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations regarding the conduct of persons attending, speaking at, videotaping, televising, photographing, broadcasting, or recording its meetings. A body may not be required to allow citizens to speak at each meeting, but it may not forbid public participation at all meetings.

(3) No public body shall require members of the public to identify themselves as a condition for admission to the meeting nor shall such body require that the name of any member of the public be placed on the agenda prior to such meeting in order to speak about items on the agenda. The body may require any member of the public desiring to address the body to identify himself or herself.

(4) No public body shall, for the purpose of circumventing the Open Meetings Act, hold a meeting in a place known by the body to be too small to accommodate the anticipated audience.

(5) No public body shall be deemed in violation of this section if it holds its meeting in its traditional meeting place which is located in this state.

(6) No public body shall be deemed in violation of this section if it holds a meeting outside of this state if, but only if: (a) A member entity of the public body is located outside of this state and the meeting is in that member's jurisdiction; (b) All out-of-state locations identified in the notice are located within public buildings used by members of the entity or at a place which will accommodate the anticipated audience; (c) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including making a telephone conference call available at an in-state location to members, the public, or the press, if requested 24 hours in advance; (d) No more than 25% of the public body's meetings in a calendar year are held out-of-state; (e) Out-of-state meetings are not used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act; (f) Reasonable arrangements are made to provide viewing at other in-state locations for a videoconference meeting if requested fourteen days in advance and if economically and reasonably available in the area; and (g) The public body publishes notice of the out-of-state meeting at least 21 days before the date of the meeting in a legal newspaper of statewide circulation.

(7) The public body shall, upon request, make a reasonable effort to accommodate the public's right to hear the discussion and testimony presented at the meeting.

(8) Public bodies shall make available at the meeting or the in-state location for a telephone conference call or videoconference, for examination and copying by members of the public, at least one copy of all reproducible written material to be discussed at an open meeting. Public bodies shall make available at least one current copy of the Open Meetings Act posted in the meeting room at a location accessible to members of the public. At the beginning of the meeting, the public shall be informed about the location of the posted information.

§84-1413. Meetings; minutes; roll call vote; secret ballot; when (1) Each public body shall keep minutes of all meetings showing the time, place, members present and absent, and the substance of all matters discussed.

(2) Any action taken on any question or motion duly moved and seconded shall be by roll call vote of the public body in open session, and the record shall state how each member voted or if the member was absent or not voting. The requirements of a roll call or viva voce vote shall be satisfied by a municipality, a county, a learning community, a joint entity created pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, a joint public agency created pursuant to the Joint Public Agency Act, or an agency formed under the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act which utilizes an electronic voting device which allows the yeas and nays of each member of such city council, village board, county board, or governing body to be readily seen by the public.

(3) The vote to elect leadership within a public body may be taken by secret ballot, but the total number of votes for each candidate shall be recorded in the minutes.

(4) The minutes of all meetings and evidence and documentation received or disclosed in open session shall be public records and open to public inspection during normal business hours.

(5) Minutes shall be written and available for inspection within ten working days or prior to the next convened meeting, whichever occurs earlier, except that cities of the second class and villages may have an additional ten working days if the employee responsible for writing the minutes is absent due to a serious illness or emergency.

§84-1414. Unlawful action by public body; declared void or voidable by district court; when; duty to enforce open meeting laws; citizen's suit; procedure; violations; penalties (1) Any motion, resolution, rule, regulation, ordinance, or formal action of a public body made or taken in violation of the Open Meetings Act shall be declared void by the district court if the suit is commenced within 120 days of the meeting of the public body at which the alleged violation occurred. Any motion, resolution, rule, regulation, ordinance, or formal action of a public body made or taken in substantial violation of the Open Meetings Act shall be voidable by the district court if the suit is commenced more than 120 days after but within one year of the meeting of the public body in which the alleged violation occurred. A suit to void any final action shall be commenced within one year of the action.

(2) The Attorney General and the county attorney of the county in which the public body ordinarily meets shall enforce the Open Meetings Act.

(3) Any citizen of this state may commence a suit in the district court of the county in which the public body ordinarily meets or in which the plaintiff resides for the purpose of requiring compliance with or preventing violations of the Open Meetings Act, for the purpose of declaring an action of a public body void, or for the purpose of determining the applicability of the act to discussions or decisions of the public body. It shall not be a defense that the citizen attended the meeting and failed to object at such time. The court may order payment of reasonable attorney's fees and court costs to a successful plaintiff in a suit brought under this section.

(4) Any member of a public body who knowingly violates or conspires to violate or who attends or remains at a meeting knowing that the public body is in violation of any provision of the Open Meetings Act shall be guilty of a Class IV misdemeanor for a first offense and a Class III misdemeanor for a second or subsequent offense.

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Nebraska Open Meetings Act

84-1407. Act, how cited. Sections 84-1407 to 84-1414 shall be known and may be cited as the Open Meetings Act.

84-1408. Declaration of intent; meetings open to public. It is hereby declared to be the policy of this state that the formation of public policy is public business and may not be conducted in secret. Every meeting of a public body shall be open to the public in order that citizens may exercise their democratic privilege of attending and speaking at meetings of public bodies, except as otherwise provided by the Constitution of Nebraska, federal statutes, and the Open Meetings Act.

84-1409. Terms, defined. For purposes of the Open Meetings Act, unless the context otherwise requires:

(1)(a) Public body means (i) governing bodies of all political subdivisions of the State of Nebraska, (ii) governing bodies of all agencies, created by the Constitution of Nebraska, statute, or otherwise pursuant to law, of the executive department of the State of Nebraska, (iii) all independent boards, commissions, bureaus, committees, councils, subunits, or any other bodies created by the Constitution of Nebraska, statute, or otherwise pursuant to law, (iv) all study or advisory committees of the executive department of the State of Nebraska whether having continuing existence or appointed as special committees with limited existence, (v) advisory committees of the bodies referred to in subdivisions (i), (ii), and (iii) of this subdivision, and (vi) instrumentalities exercising essentially public functions; and

(b) Public body does not include (i) subcommittees of such bodies unless a quorum of the public body attends a subcommittee meeting or unless such subcommittees are holding hearings, making policy, or taking formal action on behalf of their parent body, except that all meetings of any subcommittee established under section 81-15,175 are subject to the Open Meetings Act, and (ii) entities conducting judicial proceedings unless a court or other judicial body is exercising rulemaking authority, deliberating, or deciding upon the issuance of administrative orders;

(2) Meeting means all regular, special, or called meetings, formal or informal, of any public body for the purposes of briefing, discussion of public business, formation of tentative policy, or the taking of any action of the public body; and

(3) Videoconferencing means conducting a meeting involving participants at two or more locations through the use of audio-video equipment which allows participants at each location to hear and see each meeting participant at each other location, including public input. Interaction between meeting participants shall be possible at all meeting locations.

84-1410. Closed session; when; purpose; reasons listed; procedure; right to challenge; prohibited acts; chance meetings, conventions, or workshops.

(1) Any public body may hold a closed session by the affirmative vote of a majority of its voting members if a closed session is clearly necessary for the protection of the public interest or for the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual and if such individual has not requested a public meeting. The subject matter and the reason necessitating the closed session shall be identified in the motion to close. Closed sessions may be held for, but shall not be limited to, such reasons as: (a) Strategy sessions with respect to collective bargaining, real estate purchases, pending litigation, or litigation which is imminent as evidenced by communication of a claim or threat of litigation to or by the public body; (b) Discussion regarding deployment of security personnel or devices; (c) Investigative proceedings regarding allegations of criminal misconduct; (d) Evaluation of the job performance of a person when necessary to prevent needless injury to the reputation of a person and if such person has not requested a public meeting; (e) For the Community Trust created under section 81-1801.02, discussion regarding the amounts to be paid to individuals who have suffered from a tragedy of violence or natural disaster; or (f) For public hospitals, governing board peer review activities, professional review activities, review and discussion of medical staff investigations or disciplinary actions, and any strategy session concerning transactional negotiations with any referral source that is required by federal law to be conducted at arms length. Nothing in this section shall permit a closed meeting for discussion of the appointment or election of a new member to any public body.

(2) The vote to hold a closed session shall be taken in open session. The entire motion, the vote of each member on the question of holding a closed session, and the time when the closed session commenced and concluded shall be recorded in the minutes. If the motion to close passes, then the presiding officer immediately prior to the closed session shall restate on the record the limitation of the subject matter of the closed session. The public body holding such a closed session shall restrict its consideration of matters during the closed portions to only those purposes set forth in the motion to close as the reason for the closed session. The meeting shall be reconvened in open session before any formal action may be taken. For purposes of this section, formal action shall mean a collective decision or a collective commitment or promise to make a decision on any question, motion, proposal, resolution, order, or ordinance or formation of a position or policy but shall not include negotiating guidance given by members of the public body to legal counsel or other negotiators in closed sessions authorized under subdivision (1)(a) of this section.

(3) Any member of any public body shall have the right to challenge the continuation of a closed session if the member determines that the session has exceeded the reason stated in the original motion to hold a closed session or if the member contends that the closed session is neither clearly necessary for (a) the protection of the public interest or (b) the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual. Such challenge shall be overruled only by a majority vote of the members of the public body. Such challenge and its disposition shall be recorded in the minutes. (4) Nothing in this section shall be construed to require that any meeting be closed to the public. No person or public body shall fail to invite a portion of its members to a meeting, and no public body shall designate itself a subcommittee of the whole body for the purpose of circumventing the Open Meetings Act. No closed session, informal meeting, chance meeting, social gathering, email, fax, or other electronic communication shall be used for the purpose of circumventing the requirements of the act.

(5) The act does not apply to chance meetings or to attendance at or travel to conventions or workshops of members of a public body at which there is no meeting of the body then intentionally convened, if there is no vote or other action taken regarding any matter over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power.

84-1411. Meetings of public body; notice; contents; when available; right to modify; duties concerning notice; videoconferencing or telephone conferencing authorized; emergency meeting without notice; appearance before public body.

(1) Each public body shall give reasonable advance publicized notice of the time and place of each meeting by a method designated by each public body and recorded in its minutes. Such notice shall be transmitted to all members of the public body and to the public. Such notice shall contain an agenda of subjects known at the time of the publicized notice or a statement that the agenda, which shall be kept continually current, shall be readily available for public inspection at the principal office of the public body during normal business hours. Agenda items shall be sufficiently descriptive to give the public reasonable notice of the matters to be considered at the meeting. Except for items of an emergency nature, the agenda shall not be altered later than (a) twenty-four hours before the scheduled commencement of the meeting or (b) forty-eight hours before the scheduled commencement of a meeting of a city council or village board scheduled outside the corporate limits of the municipality. The public body shall have the right to modify the

agenda to include items of an emergency nature only at such public meeting.

(2) A meeting of a state agency, state board, state commission, state council, or state committee, of an advisory committee of any such state entity, of an organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, the Joint Public Agency Act, or the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, of the governing body of a public power district having a chartered territory of more than one county in this state, of the governing body of a public power and irrigation district having a chartered territory of more than one county in this state, of a board of an educational service unit, of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, of the governing body of a risk management pool or its advisory committees organized in accordance with the Intergovernmental Risk Management Act, or of a community college board of governors may be held by means of videoconferencing or, in the case of the Judicial Resources Commission in those cases specified in section 24-1204, by telephone conference, if: (a) Reasonable advance publicized notice is given; (b) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including seating, recordation by audio or visual recording devices, and a reasonable opportunity for input such as public comment or questions to at least the same extent as would be provided if videoconferencing or telephone conferencing was not used; (c) At least one copy of all documents being considered is available to the public at each site of the videoconference or telephone conference; (d) At least one member of the state entity, advisory committee, board, council, or governing body is present at each site of the videoconference or telephone conference, except that a member of an organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act that sells electricity or natural gas at wholesale on a multistate basis, an organization created under the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, or a governing body of a risk management pool or an advisory committee of such organization or pool may designate a nonvoting designee, who shall not be included as part of the quorum, to be present at any site; and (e)(i) Except as provided in subdivision (2)(e)(ii) of this section, no more than one-half of the state entity's, advisory committee's, board's, council's, or governing body's meetings in a calendar year are held by videoconference or telephone conference; or (ii) In the case of an organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act that sells electricity or natural gas at wholesale on a multistate basis or an organization created under the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, such organization holds at least one meeting each calendar year that is not by videoconferencing or telephone conferencing. Videoconferencing, telephone conferencing, or conferencing by other electronic communication shall not be used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act.

(3) A meeting of a board of an educational service unit, of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, of the governing body of an entity formed under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, the Joint Public Agency Act, or the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, of the governing body of a risk management pool or its advisory committees organized in accordance with the Intergovernmental Risk Management Act, of a community college board of governors, of the governing body of a public power district, of the governing body of a public power and irrigation district, or of the Nebraska Brand Committee may be held by telephone conference call if: (a) The territory represented by the educational service unit, member educational service units, community college board of governors, public power district, public power and irrigation district, Nebraska Brand Committee, or member public agencies of the entity or pool covers more than one county; (b) Reasonable advance publicized notice is given which identifies each telephone conference location at which there will be present: (i) A member of the educational service unit board, council, community college board of governors, governing body of a public power district, governing body of a public power and irrigation district, Nebraska Brand Committee, or entity's or pool's governing body; or (ii) A nonvoting designee designated under subdivision (3)(f) of this section; (c) All telephone conference meeting sites identified in the notice are located within public buildings used by members of the educational service unit board, council, community college board of governors, governing body of the public power district, governing body of the public power and irrigation district, or entity or pool or at a place which will accommodate the anticipated audience; (d) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including seating, recordation by audio recording devices, and a reasonable opportunity for input such as public comment or questions to at least the same extent as would be provided if a telephone conference call was not used; (e) At least one copy of all documents being considered is available to the public at each site of the telephone conference call; (f) At least one member of the educational service unit board, council, community college board of governors, governing body of the public power district, governing body of the public power and irrigation district, Nebraska Brand Committee, or governing body of the entity or pool is present at each site of the telephone conference call identified in the public notice, except that a member of an organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act that sells electricity or natural gas at wholesale on a multistate basis, an organization created under the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act, or a governing body of a risk management pool or an advisory committee of such organization or pool may designate a nonvoting designee, who shall not be included as part of the quorum, to be present at any site; (g) The telephone conference call lasts no more than five hours; and (h) No more than one-half of the board's, council's, governing body's, entity's, or pool's meetings in a calendar year are held by telephone conference call, except that: (i) The governing body of a risk management pool that meets at least quarterly and the advisory committees of the governing body may each hold more than one-half of its meetings by telephone conference call if the governing body's quarterly meetings are not held by telephone conference call or videoconferencing; and (ii) An organization created under the Interlocal Cooperation Act that sells electricity or natural gas at wholesale on a multistate basis or an organization created under the Municipal Cooperative Financing Act may hold more than one-half of its meetings by telephone conference call if the organization holds at least one meeting each calendar year that is not by videoconferencing or telephone conference call. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent the participation of consultants, members of the press, and other nonmembers of the governing body at sites not identified Daily Documentation 1st Quarter in the public notice. Telephone conference calls, emails, faxes, or other electronic communication shall not be used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act.

(4) The secretary or other designee of each public body shall maintain a list of the news media requesting notification of meetings and shall make reasonable efforts to provide advance notification to them of the time and place of each meeting and the subjects to be discussed at that meeting.

(5) When it is necessary to hold an emergency meeting without reasonable advance public notice, the nature of the emergency shall be stated in the minutes and any formal action taken in such meeting shall pertain only to the emergency. Such emergency meetings may be held by means of electronic or telecommunication equipment. The provisions of subsection (4) of this section shall be complied with in conducting emergency meetings. Complete minutes of such emergency meetings specifying the nature of the emergency and any formal action taken at the meeting shall be made available to the public by no later than the end of the next regular business day.

(6) A public body may allow a member of the public or any other witness other than a member of the public body to appear before the public body by means of video or telecommunications equipment.

84-1412. Meetings of public body; rights of public; public body; powers

and duties.

(1) Subject to the Open Meetings Act, the public has the right to attend and the right to speak at meetings of public bodies, and all or any part of a meeting of a public body, except for closed sessions called pursuant to section 84-1410, may be videotaped, televised, photographed, broadcast, or recorded by any person in attendance by means of a tape recorder, camera, video equipment, or any other means of pictorial or sonic reproduction or in writing.

(2) It shall not be a violation of subsection (1) of this section for any public body to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations regarding the conduct of persons attending, speaking at, videotaping, televising, photographing, broadcasting, or recording its meetings. A body may not be required to allow citizens to speak at each meeting, but it may not forbid public participation at all meetings.

(3) No public body shall require members of the public to identify themselves as a condition for admission to the meeting nor shall such body require that the name of any member of the public be placed on the agenda prior to such meeting in order to speak about items on the agenda. The body may require any member of the public desiring to address the body to identify himself or herself.

(4) No public body shall, for the purpose of circumventing the Open Meetings Act, hold a meeting in a place known by the body to be too small to accommodate the anticipated audience.

(5) No public body shall be deemed in violation of this section if it holds its meeting in its traditional meeting place which is located in this state.

(6) No public body shall be deemed in violation of this section if it holds a meeting outside of this state if, but only if: (a) A member entity of the public body is located outside of this state and the meeting is in that member's jurisdiction; (b) All out-of-state locations identified in the notice are located within public buildings used by members of the entity or at a place which will accommodate the anticipated audience; (c) Reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear, and speak at the meeting, including making a telephone conference call available at an in-state location to members, the public, or the press, if requested twenty-four hours in advance; (d) No more than twenty-five percent of the public body's meetings in a calendar year are held out-of-state; (e) Out-of-state meetings are not used to circumvent any of the public government purposes established in the Open Meetings Act; (f) Reasonable arrangements are made to provide viewing at other in-state locations for a videoconference meeting if requested fourteen days in advance and if economically and reasonably available in the area; and (g) The public body publishes notice of the out-of-state meeting at least twenty-one days before the date of the meeting in a legal newspaper of statewide circulation.

(7) The public body shall, upon request, make a reasonable effort to accommodate the public's right to hear the discussion and testimony presented at the meeting.

(8) Public bodies shall make available at the meeting or the in-state location for a telephone conference call or videoconference, for examination and copying by members of the public, at least one copy of all reproducible written material to be discussed at an open meeting. Public bodies shall make available at least one current copy of the Open Meetings Act posted in the meeting room at a location accessible to members of the public. At the beginning of the meeting, the public shall be informed about the location of the posted information.

(3) Any citizen of this state may commence a suit in the district court of the county in which the public body ordinarily meets or in which the plaintiff resides for the purpose of requiring compliance with or preventing violations of the Open Meetings Act, for the purpose of declaring an action of a public body void, or for the purpose of determining the applicability of the act to discussions or decisions of the public body. It shall not be a defense that the citizen attended the meeting and failed to object at such time. 4. School Closing thoughts - ESU 4 - May 1 date for now — trying to figure out what to do with graduation . ESU 6 - Districts want to slow play this a little anyway because if they have to communicate the school year is "over" except for remote learning they are concerned kids may shut down on them. Just one thing I've heard repeatedly from Supts .
- ESU 13 Supt. met that they will be closing for the remainder of the year.
- ESU 15 Supt. met yesterday and discussed the Gov./Commissioner had the same message but was not ready to commit. Already thinking that will happen.
- ESU 5 - will make the final decision by April 22. Once they decide to close for the remainder of the year bring up a whole other group of questions like how are they going to handle graduation, etc.
- ESU 3 - Supts are just waiting for something more emphatic / clearer to communicate because they know parents have been utterly inundated with information from their schools.
- Also from ESU 6 - John was talking with one of our Supts just before this and feeling that now fortunately since NU and some others have said no commencement exercises, it gives cover to High Schools to be able to make that announcement in the coming ...week, two weeks, whatever. That no one can say they didn't see it coming. I'm guessing some of our Supts will want the ESU just to

help them coordinate pushing that message out as far as timing of it b/c if neighboring districts have different timing it will create some tension/drama.

ESU 11 - does not yet have a case in their area

ESU 9 - had its first case in Hastings yesterday so takes the date out to mid-May, past school being out of session.

ESU 2 - districts are closed indefinitely. Announced March 25, 2020

From Zainab Rida, NDE - NE Children foundation is working on providing flexible funds via Community Response systems in NE to help families purchase laptops, hotspots, cell phones, and the internet. Do you know the school districts that do not have laptops for families? We have heard Omaha and Lincoln have School systems that are providing laptops at home but the other school districts do not have this option? Is this correct? Please let me know what you know. Thank you so much!

4. School Closing thoughts - ESU 4 - May 1 date for now — trying to figure out what to do with graduation . ESU 6 - Districts want to slow play this a little anyway because if they have to communicate the school year is "over" except for remote learning they are concerned kids may shut down on them. Just one thing I've heard repeatedly from Supts .

ESU 13 Supt. met that they will be closing for the remainder of the year.

ESU 15 Supt. met yesterday and discussed the Gov./Commissioner had the same message but was not ready to commit. Already thinking that will happen.

ESU 5 - will make the final decision by April 22. Once they decide to close for the remainder of the year bring up a whole other group of questions like how are they going to handle graduation, etc.

ESU 3 - Supts are just waiting for something more emphatic / clearer to communicate because they know parents have been utterly inundated with information from their schools.

Also from ESU 6 - John was talking with one of our Supts just before this and feeling that now fortunately since NU and some others have said no commencement exercises, it gives cover to High Schools to be able to make that announcement in the coming ...week, two weeks, whatever. That no one can say they didn't see it coming. I'm guessing some of our Supts will want the ESU just to help them coordinate pushing that message out as far as timing of it b/c if neighboring districts have different timing it will create some tension/drama.

ESU 11 - does not yet have a case in their area

ESU 9 - had its first case in Hastings yesterday so takes the date out to mid-May, past school being out of session.

ESU 2 - districts are closed indefinitely. Announced March 25, 2020

From Zainab Rida, NDE - NE Children foundation is working on providing flexible funds via Community Response systems in NE to help families purchase laptops, hotspots, cell phones, and the internet. Do you know the school districts that do not have laptops for families? We have heard Omaha and Lincoln have School systems that are providing laptops at home but the other school districts do not have this option? Is this correct? Please let me know what you know. Thank you so much!

2. Commissioner was present to say thanks for everyone's help and support. Proud of the ESU structure and work taking place. What do schools need from an education standpoint? What questions do schools have in this next phase? Moving into phases that are looking for patterns and themes he needs to address. What are the common themes? Asking ESU Administrators to be the leaders at the local levels. The reality is that this could continue to impact us through the summer and the fall. Think through ways to organize key themes.  - d. When there will be a definite "schools closed for remainder of year" Commissioner looks for this to not happen before the end of school to start opening things back up. Commissioner requested of Governor a statewide DHM approach. Just beginning to see the growth of the virus. He is also working with local health officials. He will work to get a more precise answer for the dates.
 - e. Travel authorization forms - information requiring essential personnel to have the form. The Commissioner thought that the Gov. said this is not for NE. This comes into place when there is a shelter in place order.
 - f. Reading Improvement Act - what will this look like if we are still under restrictions this summer? Commissioner might be asking the Gov. to release some requirements.

4. School Closing thoughts - ESU 4 - May 1 date for now — trying to figure out what to do with graduation . ESU 6 - Districts want to slow play this a little anyway because if they have to communicate the school year is "over" except for remote learning they are concerned kids may shut down on them. Just one thing I've heard repeatedly from Supts .

ESU 13 Supt. met that they will be closing for the remainder of the year.

ESU 15 Supt. met yesterday and discussed the Gov./Commissioner had the same message but was not ready to commit. Already thinking that will happen.

ESU 5 - will make the final decision by April 22. Once they decide to close for the remainder of the year bring up a whole other group of questions like how are they going to handle graduation, etc.

ESU 3 - Supts are just waiting for something more emphatic / clearer to communicate because they know parents have been utterly inundated with information from their schools.

Also from ESU 6 - John was talking with one of our Supts just before this and feeling that now fortunately since NU and some others have said no commencement exercises, it gives cover to High Schools to be able to make that announcement in the coming ...week, two weeks, whatever. That no one can say they didn't see it coming. I'm guessing some of our Supts will want the ESU just to help them coordinate pushing that message out as far as timing of it b/c if neighboring districts have different timing it will create some tension/drama.

ESU 11 - does not yet have a case in their area

ESU 9 - had its first case in Hastings yesterday so takes the date out to mid-May, past school being out of session.

ESU 2 - districts are closed indefinitely. Announced March 25, 2020

From Zainab Rida, NDE - NE Children foundation is working on providing flexible funds via Community Response systems in NE to help families purchase laptops, hotspots, cell phones, and the internet. Do you know the school districts that do not have laptops for families? We have heard Omaha and Lincoln have School systems that are providing laptops at home but the other school districts do not have this option? Is this correct? Please let me know what you know. Thank you so much!

Commissioner requested of Governor a statewide DHM approach. Just beginning to see the growth of the virus. He is also working with local health officials. He will work to get a more precise answer for the dates.
 - e. Travel authorization forms - information requiring essential personnel to have the form. The Commissioner thought that the Gov. said this is not for NE. This comes into place when there is a shelter in place order.

4. School Closing thoughts - ESU 4 - May 1 date for now — trying to figure out what to do with graduation . ESU 6 - Districts want to slow play this a little anyway because if they have to communicate the school year is "over" except for remote learning they are concerned kids may shut down on them. Just one thing I've heard repeatedly from Supts .

ESU 13 Supt. met that they will be closing for the remainder of the year.

ESU 15 Supt. met yesterday and discussed the Gov./Commissioner had the same message but was not ready to commit. Already thinking that will happen.

ESU 5 - will make the final decision by April 22. Once they decide to close for the remainder of the year bring up a whole other group of questions like how are they going to handle graduation, etc.

ESU 3 - Supts are just waiting for something more emphatic / clearer to communicate because they know parents have been utterly inundated with information from their schools.

Also from ESU 6 - John was talking with one of our Supts just before this and feeling that now fortunately since NU and some others have said no commencement exercises, it gives cover to High Schools to be able to make that announcement in the coming ...week, two weeks, whatever. That no one can say they didn't see it coming. I'm guessing some of our Supts will want the ESU just to help them coordinate pushing that message out as far as timing of it b/c if neighboring districts have different timing it will create some tension/drama.

ESU 11 - does not yet have a case in their area

ESU 9 - had its first case in Hastings yesterday so takes the date out to mid-May, past school being out of session.

ESU 2 - districts are closed indefinitely. Announced March 25, 2020

From Zainab Rida, NDE - NE Children foundation is working on providing flexible funds via Community Response systems in NE to help families purchase laptops, hotspots, cell phones, and the internet. Do you know the school districts that do not have laptops for families? We have heard Omaha and Lincoln have School systems that are providing laptops at home but the other school districts do not have this option? Is this correct? Please let me know what you know. Thank you so much!

BACKGROUND

The Nebraska Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate statewide activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units (ESUs). The governing body for the ESUCC consists of an administrator representative from each ESU. The ESUCC was created by LB 603 (2007) and officially came into existence, per statute, on July 1, 2008. Fiscal year 2008-2009 was the first year of operation for the ESUCC. The duties of the ESUCC are set out at Neb. Rev. Stat §§ 79-1245 to 79-1249 (Reissue 2014, Cum. Supp. 2018). Section 79-1246(1) provides the following:

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council shall work toward statewide coordination to provide the most cost-effective services for the students, teachers, and school districts in each educational service unit. The council's duties include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Preparation of strategic plans to assure the cost-efficient and equitable delivery of services across the state;*
- (b) Administration of statewide initiatives and provision of statewide services; and*
- (c) Coordination of distance education.*

Prior to the creation of the ESUCC, the legislature passed LB 1208 (2006), which created the Distance Education Council (DEC). The duties and responsibilities of the DEC were transferred to the ESUCC with the passage of LB 603.

While discussing the formation of the ESUCC, the administrators for the ESUs considered the intent of LB 603. In consultation with legal counsel, policy makers, and various State officials, it was decided that all statewide activities offered in partnership by the ESUs would be placed under the umbrella of the ESUCC. In order to transition to the new structure, the ESUCC established a master services agreement with each ESU. Additionally, fiscal agents for each of the projects were continued in the transition to the ESUCC.

In April 2010, the ESUCC held a planning session and adopted a new organizational chart and administrative structure to manage the statewide projects by September 1, 2010. The new organizational structure organized each of the statewide projects under the administration of a single entity and under management of the ESUCC Executive Director. Much of this transition, including centralizing the accounting, policies, and procedures, was completed during the summer of 2010.

Although complete, this transition continues presently with the review of policies and procedures, as well as the development of strategic plans for each project and the ESUCC as a whole. Additionally, Title 92 NAC 84-003.02A1 provides the following:

The ESU administrator or his or her designee shall participate in two jointly established meetings with representatives of the Department and the ESU Coordinating Council annually to establish the focus and coordination of necessary core services based on priorities and on needs that are identified through the analysis of data.

The Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) and the ESUCC meet during October and April of each year to identify collaborative efforts to meet the core service needs of ESUs and school districts.

Overview of Statewide Projects and Activities:

- **ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO):** The ESUPDO serves as a collaborative effort to provide statewide training for ESU employees and key NDE Staff statewide. Professional development is among the core services identified by State statute for ESUs. The ESUPDO consists of four affiliate groups comprised of ESU employees across the 17 ESUs with representation from essential NDE Staff. As the NDE and the ESUCC continue with statewide efforts, alignment with the NDE Strategic Plan, as well as the six tenets of AQuESTT (Accountability for a Quality Education System, Today and Tomorrow), will better define the direction for the ESUPDO. These groups are the following:

- **Staff Development Affiliate (SDA):** Members are responsible for providing staff development for their school districts and have assisted the NDE's efforts on statewide and local assessment as well as school improvement for Nebraska's school districts.
- **Network Operations Committee (NOC):** NOC supports the extensive communications network within and among the ESUs and school districts. NOC provides network security and protocols for its districts and ESUs and ensures that the communications network for distance education, internet, email, and internet protocol phones are functioning and secure. Statewide, this group establishes common frameworks and capacities for assisting one another to help ensure the education network functions well.
- **Teaching and Learning with Technology (TLT):** Between 2015 and 2017, membership for Technology Assistant Group (TAG), I-Mat, and Distance Education began a dialogue regarding combined efforts within the three affiliates/projects based upon the fact that 46% of the membership serve in multiple roles. Formalized discussion began during January of 2016 and, as a result of the membership's efforts, the concept of a newly formed affiliate, TLT, evolved. The initial meeting regarding the development of the TLT began with the following stated purpose:

Enhance communication through efficient and effective planning, development and implementation while maintaining autonomy of each affiliate.

TLT was fully implemented beginning 2017-2018.

- **ESU Special Populations Directors (ESPD):** This affiliate group consists of the special education directors and staff from across the State. It was included in ESUPDO as the need for special education professional development for special education and classroom teachers emerged in the age of standards and assessment, along with the need to develop and share professional development efforts for special education teachers and classroom teachers alike. ESPD is also involved with the NDE in providing leadership for special education training and support.
- **Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing (Coop):** The Coop provides cooperative purchasing services to ESU member schools throughout the State of Nebraska. The service is offered by the ESUCC and Nebraska's 17 ESUs in a joint effort. The ESUCC serves as the governing body for cooperative purchasing.

Per the ESUCC's website (<http://www.esucc.org/COOP-PURCHASING>), the Coop's vision is to "provide compliant, competitive, aggregated bidding and purchasing to control and reduce costs to its members by maximizing efficiency of resources and processes in Nebraska and Nationally."

Additionally, the ESUCC's website provides the following information regarding the Coop:

ESUCC Cooperative Purchasing represents 17 Educational Service Units statewide who in turn service Nebraska school districts with over 300,000 students and is currently in its 5th decade of operation. ESUCC Cooperative Purchasing is authorized to coordinate purchases for public school districts, nonpublic school systems, other ESUs, and other public agencies, including any county, city, village, school district, or agency of the state government, any drainage district, sanitary and improvement district, or other municipal corporation or political subdivision of the State of Nebraska.

- **Distance Education:** Created by LB 1208 (2006), the Distance Education Council began as a State project with ESU 10 serving as the fiscal agent. Coordination of the Distance Education project has since been taken over by the ESUCC, however. In striving to build, improve, and maintain the State's Distance Education network, the ESUCC exercises the powers and duties specified at Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1248 (Reissue 2014), as follows:

- (1) Providing public access to lists of qualified distance education courses;*
- (2) Collecting and providing school schedules for participating educational entities;*
- (3) Facilitation of scheduling for qualified distance education courses;*
- (4) Brokering of qualified distance education courses to be purchased by educational entities;*
- (5) Assessment of distance education needs and evaluation of distance education services;*
- (6) Compliance with technical standards as set forth by the Nebraska Information Technology Commission and academic standards as set forth by the State Department of Education related to distance education;*
- (7) Establishment of a system for scheduling courses brokered by the council and for choosing receiving educational entities when the demand for a course exceeds the capacity as determined by either the technology available or the course provider;*
- (8) Administration of learning management systems, either through the staff of the council or by delegation to an appropriate educational entity, with the funding for such systems provided by participating educational entities; and*
- (9) Coordination with educational service units and postsecondary educational institutions to provide assistance for instructional design for both two-way interactive video distance education courses and the offering of graduate credit courses in distance education.*

The governance structure within the Distance Education project was recommended as part of the TLT Affiliate, with full implementation that began in 2017-2018.

- **Instructional Materials (I-Mat):** I-Mat has a long history of providing services statewide for school districts through Nebraska's network of ESUs. For approximately 40 years, the ESUs have worked together to purchase rights to media resources and make those available through local ESUs. Beginning in 2010-11, the fiscal management was moved under the ESUCC's central accounting system. ESUs contribute to the project for the "spring buy" and "special projects" each year, as needed and defined by the affiliate(s). The purpose of the I-Mat project is designed for research and development of digital resources. The governance structure within the I-MAT project is recommended as part of the TLT Affiliate, with full implementation that began in 2017-2018.
- **BlendED:** Beginning 2015-2016, a statewide committee comprised of NDE, ESUCC, and ESU staff recommended that three learning management systems (LMS) be included within the ESUCC market place. The recommended LMS included Schoology, Canvas, and BlackBoard. In addition to the LMS, the BlendED Advisory Committee was charged with providing a recommendation for a statewide Learning Object Repository (LOR). After a lengthy review, the recommendation included the integration of the current Learn360 project, Amazon Inspire, and the IlliniCloud ISLE program.

The BlendEd Project leadership is comprised of a tiered governance structure that includes a BlendEd/Distance Education Director, co-chairs for the overall BlendEd Initiative, and leadership for the BlendEd Pilot Project. Specific duties for each level of leadership include: 1) the Director serving as a project manager for the BlendEd Project; 2) the BlendEd co-chairs providing leadership for the BlendEd Initiative; and 3) the BlendEd Pilot leadership providing the vision and guidance for the daily operations of the pilot program. In addition, a BlendEd Advisory Committee comprised of NDE, ESUCC, ESU staff, and school district staff provides the direction and input for the BlendEd Project.

- **Special Education (SPED) Projects:** Three special education projects are managed by the ESUCC. The projects also transitioned in 2010-11 to the ESUCC from a fiscal agent management model under ESU 1. The purpose of the SPED Project is for participating parties to pool their resources in connection with the special education services and for the training of special education teachers and other staff members employed by educational institutions within the State of Nebraska. Each participating ESU contributes a \$5,500 annual fee in general support of the projects; additionally, each participating school is assessed a fee for services provided under the Student Records System (SRS) fee structure.
 - **Improving Learning for Children with Disabilities (ILCD):** ILCD is a State self-assessment project that gathers information for Federal reporting requirements. The ILCD Project utilizes parent, teacher, and administration survey assessments. The survey results can be accessed via the ILCD website. The ESUCC's technology role includes purchasing, distributing, and scanning surveys. ESUCC staff provides technical assistance for the ILCD website and survey design.
 - **Project PARA:** Project PARA is a web-based method for school districts to provide introductory training for their para-educators. The project assists schools in meeting the para-educator training requirements of No Child Left Behind, Title 92 NAC 11, and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Project PARA is a collaborative effort between the University of Nebraska, the NDE, and Nebraska ESUs.
 - **Student Records System (SRS):** SRS is an online special education record-keeping system designed to create all special education documents required by Title 92 NAC 51, including IEP, MDT, IFSP, and all required notices. The SRS is a highly secured system that organizes and stores documents and provides easy access to files from anywhere via the internet. SRS training is provided across the State for district staff and college and university staff.

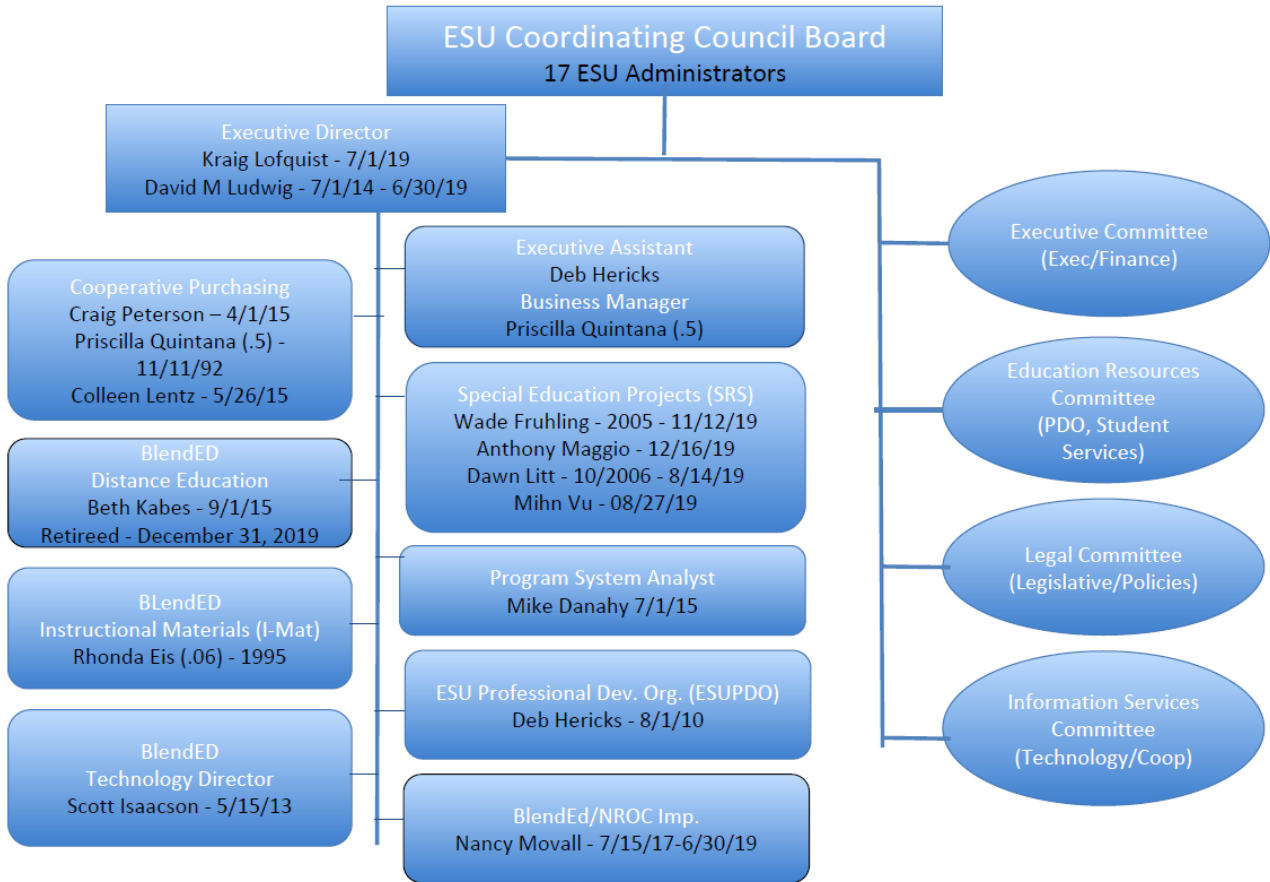

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying cash-basis financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, as of and for the year ended August 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's basic financial statements, as listed in the Table of Contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting described in Note 1. This includes determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash-basis financial position of the governmental activities and the major fund of Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council as of August 31, 2019, and the respective changes in cash basis financial position for the year then ended in conformity with the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s basic financial statements. Management’s Discussion and Analysis, the Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund, Notes to the Budgetary Comparison Schedule, and the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

The Management’s Discussion and Analysis, Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund, and Notes to the Budgetary Comparison Schedule on pages 9 through 13, 25, and 36 herein have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 10, 2020, on our consideration of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Management of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) provides the following discussion and analysis of the ESUCC's financial performance, as reflected in the financial report for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019. Please read it in conjunction with the ESUCC's basic financial statements, which follow.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the ESUCC's financial statements. The provisions of Statement No. 34 (Statement 34) of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), "Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments," established standards for external financial reporting for all State and local government entities. These standards require three components for the ESUCC's basic financial statements: 1) government-wide financial statements; 2) fund financial statements; and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other information (Budgetary Comparison Schedule, and Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund) in addition to the basic financial statements. These components are described below:

Government-Wide Financial Statements

These statements are intended to provide a broad view of the ESUCC's operations in a manner similar to the private sector, providing both a short-term and a long-term view of the ESUCC's financial position. The ESUCC prepared its government-wide statements on the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis, receipts are recognized when collected rather than when earned, and disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Accordingly, the ESUCC's government-wide financial statements are not intended to present the financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) accepted in the United States of America. The government-wide financial statements include two statements, the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities.

The *Statement of Net Position* on page 14 presents all of the ESUCC's assets on the cash basis, as described above.

The *Statement of Activities* on page 15 presents information showing how the ESUCC's net position changed during the reported year. Changes reported are on the cash basis, as described above. The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct disbursements of a given function or segment are offset by program receipts. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program receipts include: (1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment; and (2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Appropriations and other items not properly included among program receipts are reported, instead, as general receipts.

Fund Financial Statements

This is the second set of financial statements presented in the report. Under GAAP, these statements would be different from the government-wide statements in that these statements would use a different accounting approach and focus on the near-term inflows and outflows of ESUCC operations.

The ESUCC has only one fund, the General Fund. GAAP classifies funds into three categories – Governmental Funds, Proprietary Funds, and Fiduciary Funds. The General Fund of an entity is classified as a Governmental Fund, as it accounts for all basic services. The Fund Financial Statements, which can be found on pages 16 and 17, provide detailed information about the ESUCC's General Fund. A fund is a method of accounting that uses a set of accounts to maintain accountability and control over specific sources of funding and spending for a particular activity or objective. GAAP requires governmental funds to use the modified accrual basis of accounting.

The five projects that make up the General Fund in addition to ESUCC Administration are: ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO); Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing Unit (Coop); Distance Education; Instructional Materials (I-Mat); and Special Education.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in all of the basic financial statements. The notes can be found beginning on page 18.

Other Information

Following the basic financial statements and the accompanying notes thereto is additional information that further explains and supports the information in such financial statements. The other information consists of the Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund and notes, and the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund. This information can be found beginning on page 25.

FINANCIAL AND OPERATING HIGHLIGHTS

The ESUCC's Net Position for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, compared to the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, decreased by \$249,585. This decrease is primarily due to the fact that the ESUCC's fiscal year ends in the middle of the Coop Annual Buy timeframe; therefore, its end-of-the-year balance is directly affected by the timing of receipts of vendor administrative fees. The table on the following page provides a more detailed picture of the changes in net position.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF ESUCC AS A WHOLE

Net Position

The ESUCC's assets totaled \$1,009,700 at August 31, 2019, as compared to \$1,259,285 at August 31, 2018. Due to the preparation of the financial statements on a cash basis for fiscal years ended August 31, 2019, and August 31, 2018, there were no liabilities as of August 31, 2019, and as of August 31, 2018.

Unrestricted net position is all other net position that does not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt." The ESUCC's unrestricted net position totaled \$1,009,700 as of August 31, 2019.

The ESUCC's net position was \$1,009,700 and \$1,259,285 as of August 31, 2019, and 2018, respectively. The ESUCC's net position may vary based on receipts and disbursements in Cooperative Purchasing as well as other ESUCC projects.

Changes in Net Position

The condensed financial information below was derived from the Government-Wide Statement of Activities and reflects how the ESUCC's net position changed during the year. Following the table is management's analysis of the changes in net position for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019.

Receipts

The largest single source of receipts for the ESUCC is charges for services. Charges for services are primarily receipts generated by the Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing Unit for services provided to ESUs and school districts and program receipts for the various projects. Charges for services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$1,758,570 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$1,645,105. ESUCC's charges for services increased largely due to increased instructional materials local receipts due to the re-alignment of Learn360 renewals to the ESUCC fiscal year.

The second largest source of receipts, during fiscal year 2019, is a grant from the Nebraska Department of Education. Total grants received during the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$532,720 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$625,947. The decrease was caused by a decrease in Innovation Grant receipts during the year. Although the amount awarded for the grant stayed the same, receipts decreased due a timing difference of when award amounts were received

Disbursements

The largest purpose of disbursements for the ESUCC was for the Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing, which were then provided to ESUs and school districts. Disbursements for these services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$993,588 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$806,420. The increase in COOP disbursements was caused by schools and ESUs purchasing more items through the COOP in the current year than in the previous year.

The second largest purpose of disbursements for the ESUCC was for goods and services disbursed by the ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO), which provides training for ESU employees statewide. Disbursements for these services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$906,964 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$961,044. The largest cause of this decrease was a decrease in amounts charged to ESUs and schools for trainings, including threat assessment trainings.

The remaining disbursements for the ESUCC relate primarily to the various other programs managed by the ESUCC. Disbursements for various programs for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$1,188,656 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$976,920. The increase in these programs was caused primarily by an increase in Instructional Materials (I-Mat) program purchases.

ANALYSIS OF ESUCC’S GENERAL FUND VARIATIONS

The table below provides a comparison of budgeted receipts and disbursements to actual receipts and disbursements.

The largest variance between budgeted and actual receipts was Local Receipts, which were budgeted to be \$2,802,024 but were actually \$1,758,570. The majority of this variance can be explained primarily by the budgeted flow-through revenues included in the budget.

The largest variances between budgeted and actual disbursements were due to Purchased Services, which had budgeted \$2,026,047 but incurred actual costs of \$1,154,734. This difference is caused by the ESUCC budgeting for potential grants, which are unknown at the time the budget is prepared.

FACTORS THAT WILL AFFECT THE FUTURE

Several factors influence the future of the ESUCC and its projects. Projects that are based on conditions of ESUs and school districts, as far as purchasing of products and services, tend to vary depending on the levels of participation in Cooperative Purchasing, and professional development. General economics have created an environment in which schools and ESUs have fewer resources available to buy goods and services. Additionally, State appropriations have been reduced for support of the ESUCC and the Distance Education program. These reductions will impact overall resources available for the foreseeable future. Long-term trends will include further strategic reorganization of projects and services to address the likelihood of a decrease in future resources. Strategic reorganization efforts impacting the future will include organizing professional development services under a new structure that will allow for the development of new statewide projects. Additionally, existing projects in technology are being organized to manage most efficiently and effectively the changing environment in educational technology. Future fiscal years will continue to combine efforts in instructional materials and distance education under a "BlendEd" initiative. Similarly, professional development efforts will include new statewide projects and services. Future projects and services of the ESUCC will be maintained through expanded partnerships and possibly through statewide grants or contracts facilitated by the ESUCC.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2019

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. *Organization*

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate statewide activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units (ESUs). The governing body for the ESUCC consists of an Administrator Representative from each of the 17 ESUs and an Executive Director. The ESUCC was created by LB 603 (2007) and officially came into existence, according to statute, on July 1, 2008. Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1246(1) (Reissue 2014) outlines the ESUCC's general responsibilities and duties as follows:

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council shall work toward statewide coordination to provide the most cost-effective services for the students, teachers, and school districts in each educational service unit. The council's duties include, but are not limited to:

(a) Preparation of strategic plans to assure the cost-efficient and equitable delivery of services across the state;

(b) Administration of statewide initiatives and provision of statewide services; and

(c) Coordination of distance education.

Prior to the creation of the ESUCC by the Nebraska Legislature, the 17 ESUs worked in partnership to provide statewide activities. Based on the above statutory authority, the ESUCC decided that all statewide activities offered in partnership by the ESUs would be placed under the umbrella of the ESUCC. Although identified separately in the "ESUCC Admin and Professional Development Organization" column of the Combining Schedule, the ESUCC reports the general administrative costs of the ESUCC overall, along with the ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO) project costs. The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17 to provide all staff for the ESUCC. This is accomplished annually by ESU 17 developing employment contracts with all ESUCC project employees, including the Executive Director of the ESUCC. Thus, all ESUCC project employees and the ESUCC Executive Director are ESU 17 employees. Through an interlocal agreement, the ESUCC reimburses ESU 17 for all salaries and benefits for these employees.

The following is a brief description of each statewide project budgeted for and administered by the ESUCC:

- **ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO):** The ESUPDO serves as a collaborative effort to provide training for ESU employees statewide. Professional development is among the core services identified by State statute for ESUs.
- **Distance Education:** Distance Education originated with the Distance Education Council, which was formed by legislation in 2006 and has since evolved into a program under the ESUCC. Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1248 (Reissue 2014) includes, among the powers and duties of the ESUCC, various responsibilities pertaining to the operation of the State's distance education network.
- **Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing (Coop):** Coop provides cooperating purchasing services to Educational Service Unit Member schools throughout the State of Nebraska.
- **Instructional Materials (I-Mat):** I-Mat is a statewide project that purchases rights to media materials and makes them available through local ESUs in a variety of formats.

- **Special Education (SPED) Projects:** The purpose of the SPED Projects is for participating parties to pool their resources in connection with the special education services and for the training of special education teachers and other staff members employed by educational institutions within the State of Nebraska.
- **BlendEd Initiative (Technology Direction):** In May 2013, the position of Technology Director was formed to coordinate this work across the ESUCC project areas. Projects involved in this effort are the Distance Education and I-Mat, including Learning Object Repository. Blended education calls for making strategic choices about when face-to-face (synchronous) instruction is needed and when and how online (asynchronous) instruction can be best used to provide elements of student control over time, place, path, and pace and provide more equity, efficiency, and flexibility.

B. Reporting Entity

The ESUCC is a governmental entity established under and governed by the laws of the State of Nebraska. In evaluating how to define the ESUCC for financial reporting purposes, all potential component units have been considered. The basic – but not the only – criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is the governing body’s ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant manifestation of this ability is financial interdependency. Other manifestations of the ability to exercise oversight responsibility include, but are not limited to, the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, and the ability to influence significantly operations and accountability for fiscal matters. Based upon the above criteria, the accompanying financial statements include all funds for which the ESUCC has oversight responsibility. The ESUCC does not have any component units and has only one fund – the General Fund. The ESUCC is not considered a component unit of any other governmental entity.

C. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The basic financial statements include both government-wide and fund financial statements. The reporting model, based on GASB Statement 34, focuses on the ESUCC as a whole in the government-wide financial statements and major individual funds in the fund financial statements. The government-wide financial statements report information on all of the activities of the primary government and any component units. The ESUCC has only one fund – the General Fund – and has no component units. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental receipts, are reported separately.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment is offset by program revenues. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program receipts include: 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment; and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Appropriations and other items not properly included among program receipts are reported instead as general receipts.

D. Fund Types

The accounts of the ESUCC are organized on the basis of funds. The ESUCC has only one governmental fund type – the General Fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

E. Basis of Accounting

The ESUCC prepares its financial statements, both its governmental-wide and fund statements, on the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis of accounting, receipts are recognized when collected rather than when earned, and disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Consequently, these financial statements are not intended to present financial information in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

F. Cash and Cash Equivalents

In addition to the ESUCC's bank account, this classification includes all short-term investments, such as certificates of deposit, and investments in the Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT), having original maturities of less than two years. NPAIT deposits and investments include certificate of deposits, demand deposit accounts, repurchase agreements, and government agency securities. These investments are valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value due to the short-term nature of the investments.

G. Basis of Presentation

The ESUCC adopted the provisions of Statement No. 34 (Statement 34) of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), "Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments." Statement 34 established standards for external financial reporting for all State and local government entities, which includes government-wide financial statements, fund financial statements, and the classification of net position into three components: (a) invested in capital assets, net of related debt; (b) restricted; and (c) unrestricted. The ESUCC reported only unrestricted net position.

H. Net Position Classification

Government-Wide Statements. Net Position is displayed as unrestricted net position. Unrestricted net position is all other net assets that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

Fund Financial Statements. Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. ESUCC has designated its fund balance as Unassigned. Unassigned fund balance is the portion of the General Fund that is not restricted, committed, or assigned for a specific purpose.

I. Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded as disbursements at the time of purchase. This differs from generally accepted accounting principles, which require capital assets to be capitalized and depreciated over the life of the asset.

J. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. Compensated Absences

The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17, through an interlocal agreement, to provide staffing for the ESUCC. The ESUCC has entered into negotiated agreements with contracted personnel. In those agreements, the ESUCC has agreed to provide benefits for personal and sick leave. In accordance with the cash basis of accounting, these benefits are recorded as a disbursement when paid.

2. **Deposits and Investments**

Listed below is a summary of the deposit and investment portfolio that comprises the Cash and Cash Equivalents on the ESUCC’s August 31, 2019, basic financial statements.

Deposits – Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, a government’s deposits may not be returned to it. At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC held bank deposits and also held funds in certificates of deposits, demand deposits, and money market accounts with the Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT).

The NPAIT was established in June 1996 through the Interlocal Cooperation Act and commenced operations on July 25, 1996. The NPAIT was established to assist public bodies throughout the State of Nebraska with the investment of their available cash reserves. Participation in the investment trust is voluntary for its members. The objective of the NPAIT is to provide its owner members with a conservative and effective investment alternative tailored to the needs of its members. The NPAIT currently consists of and operates one portfolio and a fixed-term account. The NPAIT portfolio management generally follows established investment criteria developed by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) for money market funds designed to offer acceptable yield while maintaining liquidity. The NPAIT is not registered with the SEC as an investment company. Bank Deposits – The ESUCC does not have a policy for custodial credit risk associated with deposits.

The ESUCC is required by State statute to collateralize bank deposits in excess of federally insured amounts. The bank deposits at August 31, 2019, were covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC).

The carrying amount for the Bank Deposit is negative because at August 31, 2019, the outstanding checks exceeded the bank balance. However, the NPAIT account sends funds to the bank account when checks clear the bank.

2. **Deposits and Investments** (Concluded)

Investments – The NPAIT may legally invest in direct obligations of, as well as other obligations guaranteed as to principal by, the U.S. Treasury and U.S. Agency and Instrumentalities and in bank repurchase agreements. It may also invest in guaranteed student loans, loans guaranteed by the Small Business Administration, Federal Home Administration, or any other agency of the United States, as well as any other type of investment permitted for public agencies by State law. At June 30, 2019, all of the NPAIT’s investments in U.S. agencies and repurchase agreements mature in a period of less than two years.

At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC had \$1,084,972 in NPAIT investments. These investments consisted of government agency securities and repurchase agreements, which were collateralized by U.S. government securities.

The ESUCC is exposed to the risks noted below in relation to its investments in the NPAIT. The ESUCC does not have a policy for these risks.

Interest Rate Risk – As a means of limiting its members’ exposure to fair value losses resulting from rising interest rates, all of the NPAIT’s investments have maturities of less than two years.

Credit Risk – Credit risk is the risk that the issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. According to the latest audit report on the NPAIT, as of June 30, 2019, the NPAIT’s investments in government agency securities were rated as AA+.

Custodial Credit Risk – Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the NPAIT will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of the outside party.

The ESUCC has no specific policy as to credit risk. All of the underlying securities for the NPAIT investments in repurchase agreements at June 30, 2019, the latest audit report date for the NPAIT, are held by the counterparties in the NPAIT’s name.

Concentration of Credit Risk – The NPAIT places no limit on the amount that may be invested in any one issuer.

No insurance claims resulting from these risks were filed during the fiscal year by the ESUCC. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded the above coverage in the past three years.

4. **School Retirement**

Plan Description

The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17 to provide all staff for the ESUCC. Thus, all of the ESUCC project employees and the ESUCC Executive Director are ESU 17 employees. Through an interlocal agreement, the ESUCC agreed to reimburse ESU 17 for all salaries and benefits for these employees. Benefits provided by the ESUCC included retirement benefits, as ESU 17 employees are eligible to be members of the Nebraska School Employees Retirement System. Thus, ESU 17 contributes to the Nebraska School Employees Retirement System on behalf of the ESUCC from retirement contributions collected from the ESUCC. The Nebraska School Employees Retirement System is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Nebraska Public Employees Retirement System (NPERS). NPERS provides retirement and disability benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The School Employees Retirement Act establishes benefit provisions. NPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for NPERS. That report may be obtained by writing NPERS, 1526 K Street, Suite 400, P.O. Box 94816, Lincoln, NE, 68509-4816, or by calling 1-800-245-5712.

Plan members were required to contribute 9.78% of their annual covered salary from September 1, 2018, to August 31, 2019. The ESUCC is required to contribute 101% of the employee contribution. The contribution requirements of the plan members and the ESUCC are established by the Nebraska statutes. For the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, the ESUCC employees contributed \$112,210, and the ESUCC contributed \$113,332, which equaled the required contribution. For the fiscal years ended August 31, 2018, and August 31, 2017, the ESUCC employees contributed \$112,034 and \$101,404, respectively, and the ESUCC contributed \$113,155 and \$102,418 respectively, which equaled the required contribution.

6. Reclassification

The ESUCC records in its general ledger employee salaries and benefits; however, the ESUCC staff are ESU 17 employees, as the ESUCC contracts through an interlocal agreement with ESU 17 to provide staffing for the ESUCC, making all employees of the ESUCC contract employees. To better reflect the nature of these disbursements, \$1,074,193 of salaries and wages was classified as Purchased Services and \$273,575 was classified as Innovation Grant disbursements on the Statement of Cash Receipts, Disbursements, and Changes in Cash Basis Fund Balance.

7. Accounts Receivable

At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC had \$269,179 in accounts receivable. In accordance with the cash basis of accounting, these receivables are not recorded on the financial statements. They are recorded as receipts on the financial statements when the ESUCC receives the funds.

8. Unemployment Compensation Insurance

The ESUCC has adopted the reimbursable option of the State's Unemployment Compensation Insurance Program. Under this option, a claimant would receive unemployment compensation from the State. The ESUCC is liable to reimburse the State the actual amount of the claim(s).

9. Related Parties

The governing body for the ESUCC consists of the Administrator from each of the 17 ESUs across the State. The ESUCC coordinates statewide activities and provides services for the 17 ESUs. In turn, the ESUCC bills each of the ESUs for those services.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and major fund of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, as of and for the year ended August 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 10, 2020. The report notes that the financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. *A material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. *A significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Additional items

We noted certain matters that we reported to the management of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council in a separate letter dated March 10, 2020.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Dear Council:

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, and have issued our report thereon dated March 10, 2020. In planning and performing our audit of the basic financial statements of the ESUCC, we considered internal control in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the basic financial statements. An audit does not include examining the effectiveness of internal control and does not provide assurance on internal control. We also performed tests of the ESUCC's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants.

During our audit, we noted certain matters involving internal control over financial reporting and other operational matters that are presented here. This comment and recommendation is intended to improve the internal control over financial reporting or result in operational efficiencies in the following area:

Segregation of Duties

During our review of the ESUCC receipt and capital asset processes, as well as our testing of selected transactions, we noted a lack of segregation of duties. We also noted compensating controls adopted by the ESUCC. However, these compensating controls do not completely eliminate the risk of errors or fraud occurring and going undetected. We noted the following:

- Receipts: There is a lack of segregation of duties over the receipts process due to two employees having the ability to perform all of the following processes: receive checks and record initial control, perform the deposit entry, and reconcile the deposit document to the general ledger. We noted that compensating controls were in place during the fiscal year, including when all steps of the deposit process were performed by a single person, the deposit slip and ledger were reviewed and initialed by a second person, and deposits, bank statements, and reconciliation reports were reviewed and approved by the ESUCC.
- Capital Assets: There is a lack of segregation of duties over the capital assets process. Five employees had the ability to add capital assets to, as well as remove them from, the accounting records. The ESUCC stated that it had compensating controls in place during the fiscal year, including a review of capital asset activity at the monthly staff meetings.

A similar finding was noted in the previous reports.

A good internal control plan involves an adequate segregation of duties to ensure that no one person is in a position both to perpetuate and to conceal errors or irregularities. When one individual is able to perform all phases of a transaction, there is an increased risk for errors or fraud to occur and go undetected, resulting in loss or misuse of ESUCC funds.

We recommend the ESUCC review its staffing and assignments to determine if an adequate segregation of duties can be obtained, so no one individual is able to process a transaction from being to end. If an adequate segregation of duties cannot be obtained, we recommend the ESUCC continue monitoring to ensure compensating controls are in place and effective.

ESUCC Response: Receipts - We will continue to monitor and ensure compensating controls are in place and effective. We will also continue to ensure that all transactions are reviewed and approved by multiple personnel. We will continue to review at monthly budget meetings, FAB Committee meetings, and ESUCC Board meetings.

Capital Assets - We will continue to monitor during monthly budget meetings and scheduled staff meetings for review and documentation.

It should be noted this report is critical in nature, as it contains only our comments and recommendations on the areas noted for improvement and does not include our observations on any strong features of the ESUCC.

Draft copies of this report were furnished to the ESUCC to provide management with an opportunity to review the report and to respond to the comment and recommendation included in this report. The formal response received has been incorporated into this report. A response that indicates corrective action has been taken was not verified at this time, but it will be verified in the next audit.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the ESUCC, the appropriate Federal and regulatory agencies, and citizens of the State of Nebraska, and it is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

BACKGROUND

The Nebraska Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate statewide activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units (ESUs). The governing body for the ESUCC consists of an administrator representative from each ESU. The ESUCC was created by LB 603 (2007) and officially came into existence, per statute, on July 1, 2008. Fiscal year 2008-2009 was the first year of operation for the ESUCC. The duties of the ESUCC are set out at Neb. Rev. Stat §§ 79-1245 to 79-1249 (Reissue 2014, Cum. Supp. 2018). Section 79-1246(1) provides the following:

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council shall work toward statewide coordination to provide the most cost-effective services for the students, teachers, and school districts in each educational service unit. The council's duties include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Preparation of strategic plans to assure the cost-efficient and equitable delivery of services across the state;*
- (b) Administration of statewide initiatives and provision of statewide services; and*
- (c) Coordination of distance education.*

Prior to the creation of the ESUCC, the legislature passed LB 1208 (2006), which created the Distance Education Council (DEC). The duties and responsibilities of the DEC were transferred to the ESUCC with the passage of LB 603.

While discussing the formation of the ESUCC, the administrators for the ESUs considered the intent of LB 603. In consultation with legal counsel, policy makers, and various State officials, it was decided that all statewide activities offered in partnership by the ESUs would be placed under the umbrella of the ESUCC. In order to transition to the new structure, the ESUCC established a master services agreement with each ESU. Additionally, fiscal agents for each of the projects were continued in the transition to the ESUCC.

In April 2010, the ESUCC held a planning session and adopted a new organizational chart and administrative structure to manage the statewide projects by September 1, 2010. The new organizational structure organized each of the statewide projects under the administration of a single entity and under management of the ESUCC Executive Director. Much of this transition, including centralizing the accounting, policies, and procedures, was completed during the summer of 2010.

Although complete, this transition continues presently with the review of policies and procedures, as well as the development of strategic plans for each project and the ESUCC as a whole. Additionally, Title 92 NAC 84-003.02A1 provides the following:

The ESU administrator or his or her designee shall participate in two jointly established meetings with representatives of the Department and the ESU Coordinating Council annually to establish the focus and coordination of necessary core services based on priorities and on needs that are identified through the analysis of data.

The Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) and the ESUCC meet during October and April of each year to identify collaborative efforts to meet the core service needs of ESUs and school districts.

Overview of Statewide Projects and Activities:

- **ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO):** The ESUPDO serves as a collaborative effort to provide statewide training for ESU employees and key NDE Staff statewide. Professional development is among the core services identified by State statute for ESUs. The ESUPDO consists of four affiliate groups comprised of ESU employees across the 17 ESUs with representation from essential NDE Staff. As the NDE and the ESUCC continue with statewide efforts, alignment with the NDE Strategic Plan, as well as the six tenets of AQuESTT (Accountability for a Quality Education System, Today and Tomorrow), will better define the direction for the ESUPDO. These groups are the following:

- **Staff Development Affiliate (SDA):** Members are responsible for providing staff development for their school districts and have assisted the NDE's efforts on statewide and local assessment as well as school improvement for Nebraska's school districts.
- **Network Operations Committee (NOC):** NOC supports the extensive communications network within and among the ESUs and school districts. NOC provides network security and protocols for its districts and ESUs and ensures that the communications network for distance education, internet, email, and internet protocol phones are functioning and secure. Statewide, this group establishes common frameworks and capacities for assisting one another to help ensure the education network functions well.
- **Teaching and Learning with Technology (TLT):** Between 2015 and 2017, membership for Technology Assistant Group (TAG), I-Mat, and Distance Education began a dialogue regarding combined efforts within the three affiliates/projects based upon the fact that 46% of the membership serve in multiple roles. Formalized discussion began during January of 2016 and, as a result of the membership's efforts, the concept of a newly formed affiliate, TLT, evolved. The initial meeting regarding the development of the TLT began with the following stated purpose:

Enhance communication through efficient and effective planning, development and implementation while maintaining autonomy of each affiliate.

TLT was fully implemented beginning 2017-2018.

- **ESU Special Populations Directors (ESPD):** This affiliate group consists of the special education directors and staff from across the State. It was included in ESUPDO as the need for special education professional development for special education and classroom teachers emerged in the age of standards and assessment, along with the need to develop and share professional development efforts for special education teachers and classroom teachers alike. ESPD is also involved with the NDE in providing leadership for special education training and support.
- **Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing (Coop):** The Coop provides cooperative purchasing services to ESU member schools throughout the State of Nebraska. The service is offered by the ESUCC and Nebraska's 17 ESUs in a joint effort. The ESUCC serves as the governing body for cooperative purchasing.

Per the ESUCC's website (<http://www.esucc.org/COOP-PURCHASING>), the Coop's vision is to "provide compliant, competitive, aggregated bidding and purchasing to control and reduce costs to its members by maximizing efficiency of resources and processes in Nebraska and Nationally."

Additionally, the ESUCC's website provides the following information regarding the Coop:

ESUCC Cooperative Purchasing represents 17 Educational Service Units statewide who in turn service Nebraska school districts with over 300,000 students and is currently in its 5th decade of operation. ESUCC Cooperative Purchasing is authorized to coordinate purchases for public school districts, nonpublic school systems, other ESUs, and other public agencies, including any county, city, village, school district, or agency of the state government, any drainage district, sanitary and improvement district, or other municipal corporation or political subdivision of the State of Nebraska.

- **Distance Education:** Created by LB 1208 (2006), the Distance Education Council began as a State project with ESU 10 serving as the fiscal agent. Coordination of the Distance Education project has since been taken over by the ESUCC, however. In striving to build, improve, and maintain the State's Distance Education network, the ESUCC exercises the powers and duties specified at Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1248 (Reissue 2014), as follows:

- (1) Providing public access to lists of qualified distance education courses;*
- (2) Collecting and providing school schedules for participating educational entities;*
- (3) Facilitation of scheduling for qualified distance education courses;*
- (4) Brokering of qualified distance education courses to be purchased by educational entities;*
- (5) Assessment of distance education needs and evaluation of distance education services;*
- (6) Compliance with technical standards as set forth by the Nebraska Information Technology Commission and academic standards as set forth by the State Department of Education related to distance education;*
- (7) Establishment of a system for scheduling courses brokered by the council and for choosing receiving educational entities when the demand for a course exceeds the capacity as determined by either the technology available or the course provider;*
- (8) Administration of learning management systems, either through the staff of the council or by delegation to an appropriate educational entity, with the funding for such systems provided by participating educational entities; and*
- (9) Coordination with educational service units and postsecondary educational institutions to provide assistance for instructional design for both two-way interactive video distance education courses and the offering of graduate credit courses in distance education.*

The governance structure within the Distance Education project was recommended as part of the TLT Affiliate, with full implementation that began in 2017-2018.

- **Instructional Materials (I-Mat):** I-Mat has a long history of providing services statewide for school districts through Nebraska's network of ESUs. For approximately 40 years, the ESUs have worked together to purchase rights to media resources and make those available through local ESUs. Beginning in 2010-11, the fiscal management was moved under the ESUCC's central accounting system. ESUs contribute to the project for the "spring buy" and "special projects" each year, as needed and defined by the affiliate(s). The purpose of the I-Mat project is designed for research and development of digital resources. The governance structure within the I-MAT project is recommended as part of the TLT Affiliate, with full implementation that began in 2017-2018.
- **BlendED:** Beginning 2015-2016, a statewide committee comprised of NDE, ESUCC, and ESU staff recommended that three learning management systems (LMS) be included within the ESUCC market place. The recommended LMS included Schoology, Canvas, and BlackBoard. In addition to the LMS, the BlendED Advisory Committee was charged with providing a recommendation for a statewide Learning Object Repository (LOR). After a lengthy review, the recommendation included the integration of the current Learn360 project, Amazon Inspire, and the IlliniCloud ISLE program.

The BlendEd Project leadership is comprised of a tiered governance structure that includes a BlendEd/Distance Education Director, co-chairs for the overall BlendEd Initiative, and leadership for the BlendEd Pilot Project. Specific duties for each level of leadership include: 1) the Director serving as a project manager for the BlendEd Project; 2) the BlendEd co-chairs providing leadership for the BlendEd Initiative; and 3) the BlendEd Pilot leadership providing the vision and guidance for the daily operations of the pilot program. In addition, a BlendEd Advisory Committee comprised of NDE, ESUCC, ESU staff, and school district staff provides the direction and input for the BlendEd Project.

- **Special Education (SPED) Projects:** Three special education projects are managed by the ESUCC. The projects also transitioned in 2010-11 to the ESUCC from a fiscal agent management model under ESU 1. The purpose of the SPED Project is for participating parties to pool their resources in connection with the special education services and for the training of special education teachers and other staff members employed by educational institutions within the State of Nebraska. Each participating ESU contributes a \$5,500 annual fee in general support of the projects; additionally, each participating school is assessed a fee for services provided under the Student Records System (SRS) fee structure.
 - **Improving Learning for Children with Disabilities (ILCD):** ILCD is a State self-assessment project that gathers information for Federal reporting requirements. The ILCD Project utilizes parent, teacher, and administration survey assessments. The survey results can be accessed via the ILCD website. The ESUCC's technology role includes purchasing, distributing, and scanning surveys. ESUCC staff provides technical assistance for the ILCD website and survey design.
 - **Project PARA:** Project PARA is a web-based method for school districts to provide introductory training for their para-educators. The project assists schools in meeting the para-educator training requirements of No Child Left Behind, Title 92 NAC 11, and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Project PARA is a collaborative effort between the University of Nebraska, the NDE, and Nebraska ESUs.
 - **Student Records System (SRS):** SRS is an online special education record-keeping system designed to create all special education documents required by Title 92 NAC 51, including IEP, MDT, IFSP, and all required notices. The SRS is a highly secured system that organizes and stores documents and provides easy access to files from anywhere via the internet. SRS training is provided across the State for district staff and college and university staff.

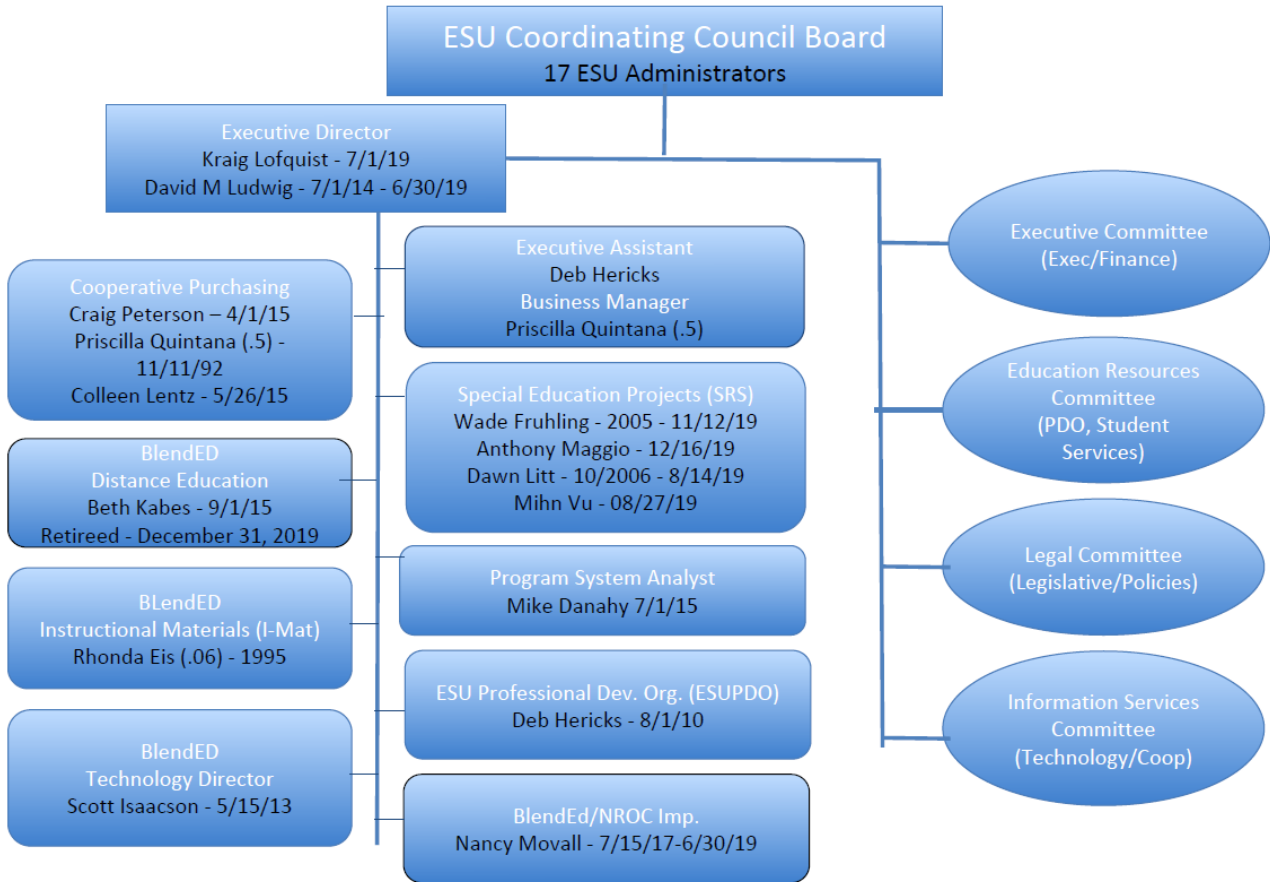

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying cash-basis financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, as of and for the year ended August 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's basic financial statements, as listed in the Table of Contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting described in Note 1. This includes determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash-basis financial position of the governmental activities and the major fund of Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council as of August 31, 2019, and the respective changes in cash basis financial position for the year then ended in conformity with the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s basic financial statements. Management’s Discussion and Analysis, the Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund, Notes to the Budgetary Comparison Schedule, and the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

The Management’s Discussion and Analysis, Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund, and Notes to the Budgetary Comparison Schedule on pages 9 through 13, 25, and 36 herein have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 10, 2020, on our consideration of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council’s internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Management of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) provides the following discussion and analysis of the ESUCC's financial performance, as reflected in the financial report for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019. Please read it in conjunction with the ESUCC's basic financial statements, which follow.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the ESUCC's financial statements. The provisions of Statement No. 34 (Statement 34) of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), "Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments," established standards for external financial reporting for all State and local government entities. These standards require three components for the ESUCC's basic financial statements: 1) government-wide financial statements; 2) fund financial statements; and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other information (Budgetary Comparison Schedule, and Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund) in addition to the basic financial statements. These components are described below:

Government-Wide Financial Statements

These statements are intended to provide a broad view of the ESUCC's operations in a manner similar to the private sector, providing both a short-term and a long-term view of the ESUCC's financial position. The ESUCC prepared its government-wide statements on the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis, receipts are recognized when collected rather than when earned, and disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Accordingly, the ESUCC's government-wide financial statements are not intended to present the financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) accepted in the United States of America. The government-wide financial statements include two statements, the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities.

The *Statement of Net Position* on page 14 presents all of the ESUCC's assets on the cash basis, as described above.

The *Statement of Activities* on page 15 presents information showing how the ESUCC's net position changed during the reported year. Changes reported are on the cash basis, as described above. The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct disbursements of a given function or segment are offset by program receipts. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program receipts include: (1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment; and (2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Appropriations and other items not properly included among program receipts are reported, instead, as general receipts.

Fund Financial Statements

This is the second set of financial statements presented in the report. Under GAAP, these statements would be different from the government-wide statements in that these statements would use a different accounting approach and focus on the near-term inflows and outflows of ESUCC operations.

The ESUCC has only one fund, the General Fund. GAAP classifies funds into three categories – Governmental Funds, Proprietary Funds, and Fiduciary Funds. The General Fund of an entity is classified as a Governmental Fund, as it accounts for all basic services. The Fund Financial Statements, which can be found on pages 16 and 17, provide detailed information about the ESUCC's General Fund. A fund is a method of accounting that uses a set of accounts to maintain accountability and control over specific sources of funding and spending for a particular activity or objective. GAAP requires governmental funds to use the modified accrual basis of accounting.

The five projects that make up the General Fund in addition to ESUCC Administration are: ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO); Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing Unit (Coop); Distance Education; Instructional Materials (I-Mat); and Special Education.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in all of the basic financial statements. The notes can be found beginning on page 18.

Other Information

Following the basic financial statements and the accompanying notes thereto is additional information that further explains and supports the information in such financial statements. The other information consists of the Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budget and Actual – General Fund and notes, and the Combining Schedule of Cash Basis Receipts and Disbursements – General Fund. This information can be found beginning on page 25.

FINANCIAL AND OPERATING HIGHLIGHTS

The ESUCC's Net Position for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, compared to the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, decreased by \$249,585. This decrease is primarily due to the fact that the ESUCC's fiscal year ends in the middle of the Coop Annual Buy timeframe; therefore, its end-of-the-year balance is directly affected by the timing of receipts of vendor administrative fees. The table on the following page provides a more detailed picture of the changes in net position.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF ESUCC AS A WHOLE

Net Position

The ESUCC's assets totaled \$1,009,700 at August 31, 2019, as compared to \$1,259,285 at August 31, 2018. Due to the preparation of the financial statements on a cash basis for fiscal years ended August 31, 2019, and August 31, 2018, there were no liabilities as of August 31, 2019, and as of August 31, 2018.

Unrestricted net position is all other net position that does not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt." The ESUCC's unrestricted net position totaled \$1,009,700 as of August 31, 2019.

The ESUCC's net position was \$1,009,700 and \$1,259,285 as of August 31, 2019, and 2018, respectively. The ESUCC's net position may vary based on receipts and disbursements in Cooperative Purchasing as well as other ESUCC projects.

Changes in Net Position

The condensed financial information below was derived from the Government-Wide Statement of Activities and reflects how the ESUCC's net position changed during the year. Following the table is management's analysis of the changes in net position for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019.

Receipts

The largest single source of receipts for the ESUCC is charges for services. Charges for services are primarily receipts generated by the Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing Unit for services provided to ESUs and school districts and program receipts for the various projects. Charges for services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$1,758,570 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$1,645,105. ESUCC's charges for services increased largely due to increased instructional materials local receipts due to the re-alignment of Learn360 renewals to the ESUCC fiscal year.

The second largest source of receipts, during fiscal year 2019, is a grant from the Nebraska Department of Education. Total grants received during the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$532,720 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$625,947. The decrease was caused by a decrease in Innovation Grant receipts during the year. Although the amount awarded for the grant stayed the same, receipts decreased due a timing difference of when award amounts were received

Disbursements

The largest purpose of disbursements for the ESUCC was for the Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing, which were then provided to ESUs and school districts. Disbursements for these services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$993,588 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$806,420. The increase in COOP disbursements was caused by schools and ESUs purchasing more items through the COOP in the current year than in the previous year.

The second largest purpose of disbursements for the ESUCC was for goods and services disbursed by the ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO), which provides training for ESU employees statewide. Disbursements for these services for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$906,964 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$961,044. The largest cause of this decrease was a decrease in amounts charged to ESUs and schools for trainings, including threat assessment trainings.

The remaining disbursements for the ESUCC relate primarily to the various other programs managed by the ESUCC. Disbursements for various programs for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, were \$1,188,656 and for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018, were \$976,920. The increase in these programs was caused primarily by an increase in Instructional Materials (I-Mat) program purchases.

ANALYSIS OF ESUCC’S GENERAL FUND VARIATIONS

The table below provides a comparison of budgeted receipts and disbursements to actual receipts and disbursements.

The largest variance between budgeted and actual receipts was Local Receipts, which were budgeted to be \$2,802,024 but were actually \$1,758,570. The majority of this variance can be explained primarily by the budgeted flow-through revenues included in the budget.

The largest variances between budgeted and actual disbursements were due to Purchased Services, which had budgeted \$2,026,047 but incurred actual costs of \$1,154,734. This difference is caused by the ESUCC budgeting for potential grants, which are unknown at the time the budget is prepared.

FACTORS THAT WILL AFFECT THE FUTURE

Several factors influence the future of the ESUCC and its projects. Projects that are based on conditions of ESUs and school districts, as far as purchasing of products and services, tend to vary depending on the levels of participation in Cooperative Purchasing, and professional development. General economics have created an environment in which schools and ESUs have fewer resources available to buy goods and services. Additionally, State appropriations have been reduced for support of the ESUCC and the Distance Education program. These reductions will impact overall resources available for the foreseeable future. Long-term trends will include further strategic reorganization of projects and services to address the likelihood of a decrease in future resources. Strategic reorganization efforts impacting the future will include organizing professional development services under a new structure that will allow for the development of new statewide projects. Additionally, existing projects in technology are being organized to manage most efficiently and effectively the changing environment in educational technology. Future fiscal years will continue to combine efforts in instructional materials and distance education under a "BlendEd" initiative. Similarly, professional development efforts will include new statewide projects and services. Future projects and services of the ESUCC will be maintained through expanded partnerships and possibly through statewide grants or contracts facilitated by the ESUCC.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2019

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. *Organization*

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate statewide activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units (ESUs). The governing body for the ESUCC consists of an Administrator Representative from each of the 17 ESUs and an Executive Director. The ESUCC was created by LB 603 (2007) and officially came into existence, according to statute, on July 1, 2008. Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1246(1) (Reissue 2014) outlines the ESUCC's general responsibilities and duties as follows:

The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council shall work toward statewide coordination to provide the most cost-effective services for the students, teachers, and school districts in each educational service unit. The council's duties include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Preparation of strategic plans to assure the cost-efficient and equitable delivery of services across the state;*
- (b) Administration of statewide initiatives and provision of statewide services; and*
- (c) Coordination of distance education.*

Prior to the creation of the ESUCC by the Nebraska Legislature, the 17 ESUs worked in partnership to provide statewide activities. Based on the above statutory authority, the ESUCC decided that all statewide activities offered in partnership by the ESUs would be placed under the umbrella of the ESUCC. Although identified separately in the "ESUCC Admin and Professional Development Organization" column of the Combining Schedule, the ESUCC reports the general administrative costs of the ESUCC overall, along with the ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO) project costs. The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17 to provide all staff for the ESUCC. This is accomplished annually by ESU 17 developing employment contracts with all ESUCC project employees, including the Executive Director of the ESUCC. Thus, all ESUCC project employees and the ESUCC Executive Director are ESU 17 employees. Through an interlocal agreement, the ESUCC reimburses ESU 17 for all salaries and benefits for these employees.

The following is a brief description of each statewide project budgeted for and administered by the ESUCC:

- **ESU Professional Development Organization (ESUPDO):** The ESUPDO serves as a collaborative effort to provide training for ESU employees statewide. Professional development is among the core services identified by State statute for ESUs.
- **Distance Education:** Distance Education originated with the Distance Education Council, which was formed by legislation in 2006 and has since evolved into a program under the ESUCC. Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-1248 (Reissue 2014) includes, among the powers and duties of the ESUCC, various responsibilities pertaining to the operation of the State's distance education network.
- **Nebraska ESU Cooperative Purchasing (Coop):** Coop provides cooperating purchasing services to Educational Service Unit Member schools throughout the State of Nebraska.
- **Instructional Materials (I-Mat):** I-Mat is a statewide project that purchases rights to media materials and makes them available through local ESUs in a variety of formats.

1. **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies** (Continued)

- **Special Education (SPED) Projects:** The purpose of the SPED Projects is for participating parties to pool their resources in connection with the special education services and for the training of special education teachers and other staff members employed by educational institutions within the State of Nebraska.
- **BlendEd Initiative (Technology Direction):** In May 2013, the position of Technology Director was formed to coordinate this work across the ESUCC project areas. Projects involved in this effort are the Distance Education and I-Mat, including Learning Object Repository. Blended education calls for making strategic choices about when face-to-face (synchronous) instruction is needed and when and how online (asynchronous) instruction can be best used to provide elements of student control over time, place, path, and pace and provide more equity, efficiency, and flexibility.

B. Reporting Entity

The ESUCC is a governmental entity established under and governed by the laws of the State of Nebraska. In evaluating how to define the ESUCC for financial reporting purposes, all potential component units have been considered. The basic – but not the only – criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is the governing body’s ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant manifestation of this ability is financial interdependency. Other manifestations of the ability to exercise oversight responsibility include, but are not limited to, the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, and the ability to influence significantly operations and accountability for fiscal matters. Based upon the above criteria, the accompanying financial statements include all funds for which the ESUCC has oversight responsibility. The ESUCC does not have any component units and has only one fund – the General Fund. The ESUCC is not considered a component unit of any other governmental entity.

C. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The basic financial statements include both government-wide and fund financial statements. The reporting model, based on GASB Statement 34, focuses on the ESUCC as a whole in the government-wide financial statements and major individual funds in the fund financial statements. The government-wide financial statements report information on all of the activities of the primary government and any component units. The ESUCC has only one fund – the General Fund – and has no component units. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental receipts, are reported separately.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment is offset by program revenues. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program receipts include: 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment; and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Appropriations and other items not properly included among program receipts are reported instead as general receipts.

D. Fund Types

The accounts of the ESUCC are organized on the basis of funds. The ESUCC has only one governmental fund type – the General Fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Continued)

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

E. Basis of Accounting

The ESUCC prepares its financial statements, both its governmental-wide and fund statements, on the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis of accounting, receipts are recognized when collected rather than when earned, and disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Consequently, these financial statements are not intended to present financial information in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

F. Cash and Cash Equivalents

In addition to the ESUCC's bank account, this classification includes all short-term investments, such as certificates of deposit, and investments in the Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT), having original maturities of less than two years. NPAIT deposits and investments include certificate of deposits, demand deposit accounts, repurchase agreements, and government agency securities. These investments are valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value due to the short-term nature of the investments.

G. Basis of Presentation

The ESUCC adopted the provisions of Statement No. 34 (Statement 34) of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), "Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments." Statement 34 established standards for external financial reporting for all State and local government entities, which includes government-wide financial statements, fund financial statements, and the classification of net position into three components: (a) invested in capital assets, net of related debt; (b) restricted; and (c) unrestricted. The ESUCC reported only unrestricted net position.

H. Net Position Classification

Government-Wide Statements. Net Position is displayed as unrestricted net position. Unrestricted net position is all other net assets that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

Fund Financial Statements. Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. ESUCC has designated its fund balance as Unassigned. Unassigned fund balance is the portion of the General Fund that is not restricted, committed, or assigned for a specific purpose.

I. Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded as disbursements at the time of purchase. This differs from generally accepted accounting principles, which require capital assets to be capitalized and depreciated over the life of the asset.

J. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. Compensated Absences

The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17, through an interlocal agreement, to provide staffing for the ESUCC. The ESUCC has entered into negotiated agreements with contracted personnel. In those agreements, the ESUCC has agreed to provide benefits for personal and sick leave. In accordance with the cash basis of accounting, these benefits are recorded as a disbursement when paid.

2. **Deposits and Investments**

Listed below is a summary of the deposit and investment portfolio that comprises the Cash and Cash Equivalents on the ESUCC's August 31, 2019, basic financial statements.

Deposits – Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, a government's deposits may not be returned to it. At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC held bank deposits and also held funds in certificates of deposits, demand deposits, and money market accounts with the Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT).

The NPAIT was established in June 1996 through the Interlocal Cooperation Act and commenced operations on July 25, 1996. The NPAIT was established to assist public bodies throughout the State of Nebraska with the investment of their available cash reserves. Participation in the investment trust is voluntary for its members. The objective of the NPAIT is to provide its owner members with a conservative and effective investment alternative tailored to the needs of its members. The NPAIT currently consists of and operates one portfolio and a fixed-term account. The NPAIT portfolio management generally follows established investment criteria developed by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) for money market funds designed to offer acceptable yield while maintaining liquidity. The NPAIT is not registered with the SEC as an investment company. Bank Deposits – The ESUCC does not have a policy for custodial credit risk associated with deposits.

The ESUCC is required by State statute to collateralize bank deposits in excess of federally insured amounts. The bank deposits at August 31, 2019, were covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC).

The carrying amount for the Bank Deposit is negative because at August 31, 2019, the outstanding checks exceeded the bank balance. However, the NPAIT account sends funds to the bank account when checks clear the bank.

2. **Deposits and Investments** (Concluded)

Investments – The NPAIT may legally invest in direct obligations of, as well as other obligations guaranteed as to principal by, the U.S. Treasury and U.S. Agency and Instrumentalities and in bank repurchase agreements. It may also invest in guaranteed student loans, loans guaranteed by the Small Business Administration, Federal Home Administration, or any other agency of the United States, as well as any other type of investment permitted for public agencies by State law. At June 30, 2019, all of the NPAIT’s investments in U.S. agencies and repurchase agreements mature in a period of less than two years.

At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC had \$1,084,972 in NPAIT investments. These investments consisted of government agency securities and repurchase agreements, which were collateralized by U.S. government securities.

The ESUCC is exposed to the risks noted below in relation to its investments in the NPAIT. The ESUCC does not have a policy for these risks.

Interest Rate Risk – As a means of limiting its members’ exposure to fair value losses resulting from rising interest rates, all of the NPAIT’s investments have maturities of less than two years.

Credit Risk – Credit risk is the risk that the issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. According to the latest audit report on the NPAIT, as of June 30, 2019, the NPAIT’s investments in government agency securities were rated as AA+.

Custodial Credit Risk – Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the NPAIT will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of the outside party.

The ESUCC has no specific policy as to credit risk. All of the underlying securities for the NPAIT investments in repurchase agreements at June 30, 2019, the latest audit report date for the NPAIT, are held by the counterparties in the NPAIT’s name.

Concentration of Credit Risk – The NPAIT places no limit on the amount that may be invested in any one issuer.

No insurance claims resulting from these risks were filed during the fiscal year by the ESUCC. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded the above coverage in the past three years.

4. **School Retirement**

Plan Description

The ESUCC contracts with ESU 17 to provide all staff for the ESUCC. Thus, all of the ESUCC project employees and the ESUCC Executive Director are ESU 17 employees. Through an interlocal agreement, the ESUCC agreed to reimburse ESU 17 for all salaries and benefits for these employees. Benefits provided by the ESUCC included retirement benefits, as ESU 17 employees are eligible to be members of the Nebraska School Employees Retirement System. Thus, ESU 17 contributes to the Nebraska School Employees Retirement System on behalf of the ESUCC from retirement contributions collected from the ESUCC. The Nebraska School Employees Retirement System is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Nebraska Public Employees Retirement System (NPERS). NPERS provides retirement and disability benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The School Employees Retirement Act establishes benefit provisions. NPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for NPERS. That report may be obtained by writing NPERS, 1526 K Street, Suite 400, P.O. Box 94816, Lincoln, NE, 68509-4816, or by calling 1-800-245-5712.

Plan members were required to contribute 9.78% of their annual covered salary from September 1, 2018, to August 31, 2019. The ESUCC is required to contribute 101% of the employee contribution. The contribution requirements of the plan members and the ESUCC are established by the Nebraska statutes. For the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, the ESUCC employees contributed \$112,210, and the ESUCC contributed \$113,332, which equaled the required contribution. For the fiscal years ended August 31, 2018, and August 31, 2017, the ESUCC employees contributed \$112,034 and \$101,404, respectively, and the ESUCC contributed \$113,155 and \$102,418 respectively, which equaled the required contribution.

Operating lease payments for the year ended August 31, 2019, totaled \$38,874.

6. Reclassification

The ESUCC records in its general ledger employee salaries and benefits; however, the ESUCC staff are ESU 17 employees, as the ESUCC contracts through an interlocal agreement with ESU 17 to provide staffing for the ESUCC, making all employees of the ESUCC contract employees. To better reflect the nature of these disbursements, \$1,074,193 of salaries and wages was classified as Purchased Services and \$273,575 was classified as Innovation Grant disbursements on the Statement of Cash Receipts, Disbursements, and Changes in Cash Basis Fund Balance.

7. Accounts Receivable

At August 31, 2019, the ESUCC had \$269,179 in accounts receivable. In accordance with the cash basis of accounting, these receivables are not recorded on the financial statements. They are recorded as receipts on the financial statements when the ESUCC receives the funds.

8. Unemployment Compensation Insurance

The ESUCC has adopted the reimbursable option of the State's Unemployment Compensation Insurance Program. Under this option, a claimant would receive unemployment compensation from the State. The ESUCC is liable to reimburse the State the actual amount of the claim(s).

9. Related Parties

The governing body for the ESUCC consists of the Administrator from each of the 17 ESUs across the State. The ESUCC coordinates statewide activities and provides services for the 17 ESUs. In turn, the ESUCC bills each of the ESUs for those services.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and major fund of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council, as of and for the year ended August 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 10, 2020. The report notes that the financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. *A material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. *A significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Additional items

We noted certain matters that we reported to the management of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council in a separate letter dated March 10, 2020.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Dear Council:

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2019, and have issued our report thereon dated March 10, 2020. In planning and performing our audit of the basic financial statements of the ESUCC, we considered internal control in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the basic financial statements. An audit does not include examining the effectiveness of internal control and does not provide assurance on internal control. We also performed tests of the ESUCC's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants.

During our audit, we noted certain matters involving internal control over financial reporting and other operational matters that are presented here. This comment and recommendation is intended to improve the internal control over financial reporting or result in operational efficiencies in the following area:

Segregation of Duties

During our review of the ESUCC receipt and capital asset processes, as well as our testing of selected transactions, we noted a lack of segregation of duties. We also noted compensating controls adopted by the ESUCC. However, these compensating controls do not completely eliminate the risk of errors or fraud occurring and going undetected. We noted the following:

- Receipts: There is a lack of segregation of duties over the receipts process due to two employees having the ability to perform all of the following processes: receive checks and record initial control, perform the deposit entry, and reconcile the deposit document to the general ledger. We noted that compensating controls were in place during the fiscal year, including when all steps of the deposit process were performed by a single person, the deposit slip and ledger were reviewed and initialed by a second person, and deposits, bank statements, and reconciliation reports were reviewed and approved by the ESUCC.
- Capital Assets: There is a lack of segregation of duties over the capital assets process. Five employees had the ability to add capital assets to, as well as remove them from, the accounting records. The ESUCC stated that it had compensating controls in place during the fiscal year, including a review of capital asset activity at the monthly staff meetings.

A similar finding was noted in the previous reports.

A good internal control plan involves an adequate segregation of duties to ensure that no one person is in a position both to perpetuate and to conceal errors or irregularities. When one individual is able to perform all phases of a transaction, there is an increased risk for errors or fraud to occur and go undetected, resulting in loss or misuse of ESUCC funds.

We recommend the ESUCC review its staffing and assignments to determine if an adequate segregation of duties can be obtained, so no one individual is able to process a transaction from being to end. If an adequate segregation of duties cannot be obtained, we recommend the ESUCC continue monitoring to ensure compensating controls are in place and effective.

ESUCC Response: Receipts - We will continue to monitor and ensure compensating controls are in place and effective. We will also continue to ensure that all transactions are reviewed and approved by multiple personnel. We will continue to review at monthly budget meetings, FAB Committee meetings, and ESUCC Board meetings.

Capital Assets - We will continue to monitor during monthly budget meetings and scheduled staff meetings for review and documentation.

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PROJECT BACKGROUND

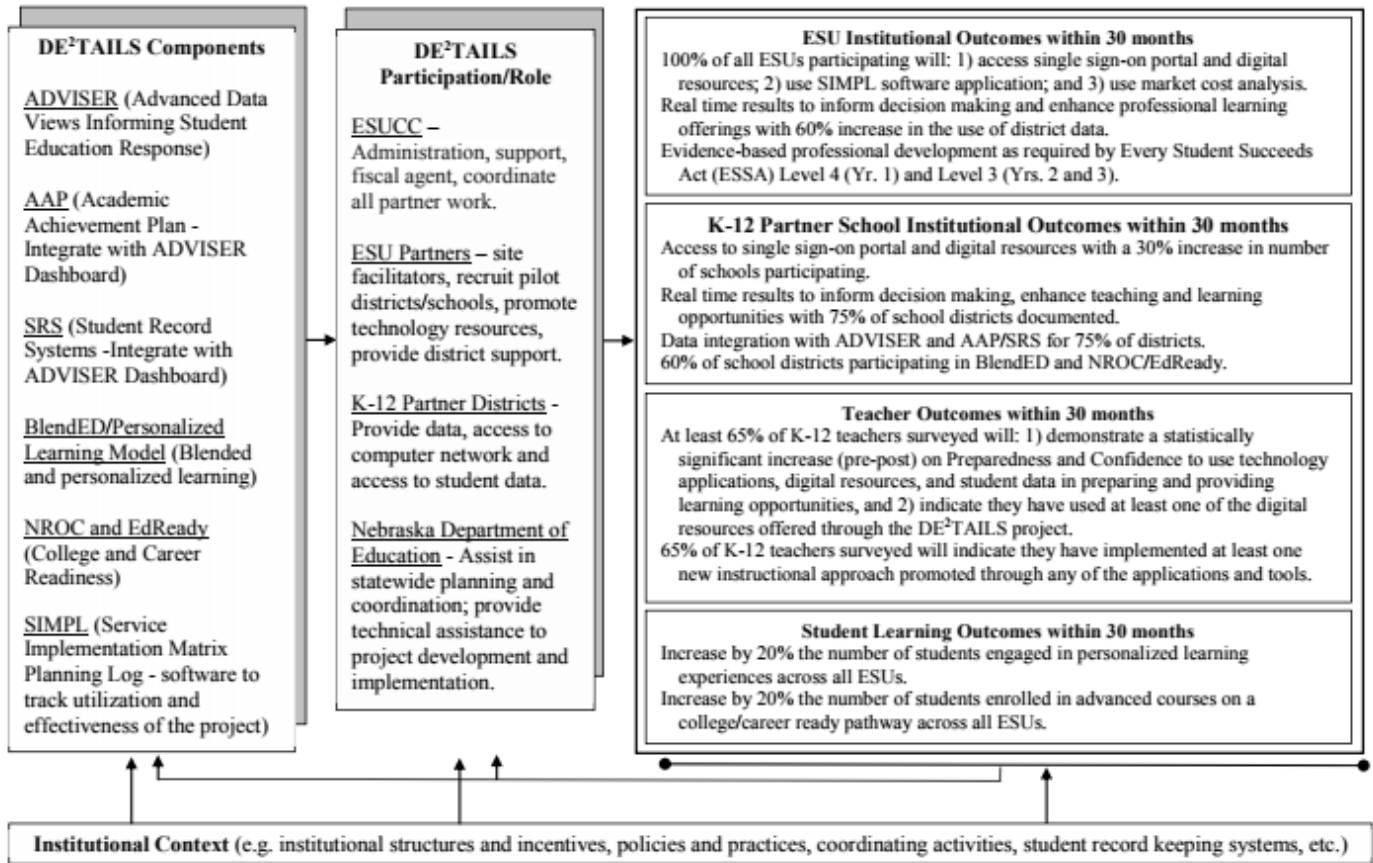
In the state of Nebraska, as per State Statute 79-1246, the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) is charged with coordinating statewide efforts with all Educational Service Units (ESUs) leading 17 ESUs serving 245 school districts employing 22,000 teachers educating 307,000 students. Funded by the state innovation grant in the 2016/17 school year, ESUCC developed the “Data-Driven Ecosystem Enhancing Teaching and Learning (DE²TAILS)” project, integrating multiple state data systems and resources into an ecosystem of support, tools, resources, and data designed to enhance an environment centered around blended and personalized learning.

The DE²TAILS framework incorporates the five applications/components within a shared data store. This project proposed to: (1) develop an integrated technology ecosystem through a secure, trusted data infrastructure Advanced Data Views Informing Student Education Response (ADVISED) by integrating multiple technology systems through a single sign-on portal; (2) design an integrated system application for the Academic Achievement Plan (AAP) and Student Record Systems (SRS) with ADVISED to address the needs of at-risk and high needs students; (3) use technology to innovate student learning in the classroom and improve academic/employment outcomes through a BlendEd/Personalized Learning Environment; (4) provide a baseline collection of online digital resources for student access improving college and career readiness through NROC/EdReady; and (5) develop a statewide software Service Implementation Matrix Process & Log (SIMPL) for visualization and rapid analysis of evidenced-based professional development and instructional practice to drive informed decision making. ESUs, public schools, educators, and students will have access to a “one-stop shop” of online tools, applications, student-level data, and resources for professional and student learning.

Within the funding period, the DE²TAILS project proposed to develop this technology ecosystem that is replicable across schools in every ESU and scalable across all ESUs as a statewide system of teacher and student support to bring positive impact on ESU institutional changes, K-12 partner school institutional outcomes, teacher practices, and ultimately student academic achievement.

































Exhibit 1 presents a logic model that reflects hypotheses about the relationship between DE²TAILS primary impacts on ESUs, partner districts, and participating teachers, which in turn will lead to impacts on students in these systems. The logic model also serves as a basis for the evaluation design and is used to guide data collection and analysis.

EXHIBIT 1. ESUCC DE²TAILS LOGIC MODEL



RMC Research Corporation serves as the external evaluator of this innovative project conducting a mixed method quasi-experimental study to assess the implementation and impact of the grant. The evaluation will: (1) assess whether the project is making satisfactory progress towards its stated goals; (2) recommend reasonable, evidence-based adjustments to project plans and activities; (3) support the development and validation of survey and assessment tools; and (4) describe the impact of the DE²TAILS project. As conveyed in Exhibit 2, RMC Research has developed a set of key questions that guide the evaluation process, along with identification of specific data collection methods to answer these questions. These key questions assist RMC Research Corporation in providing both a formative and summative review and corresponding set of recommendations to inform program changes and applications during the implementation of the DE²TAILS project.

METHODOLOGY

DATA COLLECTION

The DE²TAILS evaluation employs a mixed-methods approach to generate both quantitative and qualitative data to examine and respond to the evaluation questions, undertaken initially across two stages, and ultimately across a third stage of the project. Quantitative data were collected from instruments developed for this project and surveys and observation protocols that were previously developed and administered; while qualitative data were collected from open-ended questions from the survey instruments, program documents, group meeting notes, and staff interviews over the course of 2017/19 project years. The current report summarizes finding the development and implementation of the five applications/components within the data ecosystem and examines the program impact on stakeholders. This evaluation utilizes a combination of program documents, group meeting observations, staff interviews, participant interviews, survey instruments, and classroom observation data.

QUALITATIVE METHODS



Project documents were reviewed to gain insights into program development and implementation, participant recruitment, professional development efforts, and DE²TAILS project progress. The document analysis included an examination of progress documents in seven areas, including AAP/SRS, BlendEd, NROC/EdReady, SIMPL, SIMPL Pilots, meetings and communication, and technology. Documents were requested from project staff between February 2017 to December 2019. For BlendEd, responses to the open-ended questions were collected from the professional development evaluation survey to provide formative feedback to further participant trainings.

Telephone interviews were also conducted in May/June 2018 with administrators and teachers who participated in the BlendEd project. A computer-generated random sample was initially used to contact participants seeking an interview. Later, to recruit more respondents, RMC Research staff sent an e-mail to all other identified participants seeking an interview about the program. RMC Research staff conducted interviews with a total of nine teachers and five administrators. Interview questions were focused on implementation, impacts, facilitators and challenges, and lessons learned. Respondents also contributed multiple suggestions for program improvement.

Among the nine teachers interviewed for the report were two who taught at the elementary level, two who taught at the middle school level, and four who taught in high schools. One respondent served as a technology specialist and coach for blended learning. Subjects taught by the six middle and high school teachers included language arts, history, geography, music, science, and Spanish. Two administrators mentioned participation in state trainings for BlendEd; all five administrators stated they were actively engaged in supporting the integration of blended education into classrooms.

Observation data were collected between fall 2018 to winter 2019 from participating BlendEd teachers to assess teacher-student interaction, student-student interaction, instruction, student learning experience, and classroom culture. Feedback from BlendEd professional development sessions were also gathered through teacher surveys to measure teachers' perceptions of professional development quality and the preparedness of their implementation of BlendEd.

In addition, project leaders from ADVISER, BlendEd, EdReady, and SIMPL were asked to complete an e-mail interview at the end of each year between 2018 and 2019 to describe progress made on objectives, factors that facilitated and posed challenges to project progress, issues that participants raised about their experiences with the project, and what was done to address issues, and suggestions for project improvement.

Program documents, open-ended responses to the BlendEd professional development evaluation form, BlendEd observation responses, and leadership interview data were further analyzed using an approach that closely follows methods explicated by Miles, Huberman, and Saldaña (2019).¹ This approach emphasizes well defined study variables to ensure the comparability of data and reduction of data using data displays and matrices so that the common themes can be identified. The program documents were analyzed for trends to examine program progress, the open-ended questions were examined to determine professional development impact and recommendations for future training, and the interview responses were gauged for program implementation and impact on participants.

QUANTITATIVE METHODS



Surveys were administered to participating BlendEd teachers and students to collect perceptual data on a range of outcome variables. The student survey and teacher survey were administered to the pilot participants for BlendEd using Google forms. BlendEd coaches used an observation protocol to conduct classroom observations throughout the pilot year and provided observation ratings. RMC Research reviewed the survey instruments and observation data and estimated the psychometric features of the instruments. Based on the analysis results, RMC Research modified the existing teacher and student surveys and included the following measures: BlendEd learning experience, academic engagement, perceived program impact, and demographic information for the student survey; and BlendEd implementation fidelity, level of support received, preparedness and confidence to teach, job satisfaction, perceived impact, and demographic information for the teacher survey (complete surveys may be found in the Appendix).

Another instrument developed by the evaluator was the evaluation form for the BlendEd professional development. Descriptive statistics were estimated based on participant responses to summarize professional development impact and recommendations for further professional development sessions.

FINDINGS

SUMMARIES OF DATA SOURCES

DOCUMENT REVIEW

Program documents were collected from the DE²TAILS project in seven areas: AAP/SRS, BlendEd, NROC/EdReady, SIMPL, SIMPL Pilots, meetings and communications, and technology. A sample of documents such as PowerPoint presentations, meeting notes, and recruitment materials were reviewed. Surveys, observation protocols, and spreadsheets that contained project data were not included in the review.

The review showed that each of the projects' components is making progress towards its objectives, communication among participants is shared, and action steps are documented. There were numerous PowerPoint presentations and webinars that described the project's goals, objectives, and evaluation design. Meeting notes included agendas, tasks that needed to be accomplished, links to project documents, decisions made, and next steps.

EdReady prepared a project report in 2019 to inform stakeholders about the progress of its efforts. As of December 15, 2019, EdReady had more than 9,650 student accounts and 749 teacher accounts in Nebraska. Over 1,700 learning goals were established for students. The EdReady participants utilized the program for different purposes. Thirty-one percent (31%) of them used EdReady to reinforce foundational skills for future learning in mathematics or English language arts (ELA), 30% of them used EdReady to supplement skills while taking a mathematics or ELA class, and 29% of the users adopted EdReady to identify and revisit possible gaps in identified mathematics or ELA skills. Among the users, 65% of the students working inside a specific EdReady ACT Math Prep module made progress and improved their test score.

Materials regarding SIMPL included presentations about the three stages of the project: data dig, services planning, and implementation, as well as the rubric development. A timeline for the SIMPL pilot gave monthly tasks for each phase of implementation. Memos from the law firm advising the ESUCC discussed legal issues that may arise under the DE²TAILS data system and applicable federal and state laws pertaining to data privacy. In 2018, SIMPL developed an Online Tool Manual which was distributed statewide and contained information on software access and user roles as well as detailed instructions for schools and administration to utilize the system and update data on services, reports, test scores, activity logs, and other areas. Bimonthly meetings were held with project leadership/research team members from ESUCC, SIMPL, BlendEd/NROC, and RMC Research and covered topics ranging from training for SIMPL software to data security policies and procedures.

Feedback was collected from the SIMPL users on its strengths, weaknesses, and areas of improvement. The strengths of SIMPL centered around its accessibility from different devices and how it is tied to single sign-on (SSO) and AQUESTT, easy data input for cost analysis, accountability, and user-friendly data visualization. Some users also liked that each ESU has autonomy to develop their plans and delivery of services through SIMPL. When asked about SIMPL's major weakness, respondents noted the data input was inconsistent across different ESUs, therefore, it might be difficult to compare services across ESUs. Respondents also made suggestions for future opportunities with SIMPL. Key remarks were including all ESUs; transferring the SIMPL process, especially the data dig, to other areas of ESU work;

including school districts as a consistent part of scoring process; developing a report library; and calculating value add by service category.

BLENDed CLASSROOM OBSERVATION

The Lighthouse Classroom Observation Rubric was used by BlendEd coaches to examine teachers’ classroom practice when implementing BlendEd learning. As the rubric examined composite domains based on clusters of similar items to create measures that were more robust and reliable, internal consistency of these composite variables were estimated based on the 2017/18 observation data. Exhibit 3 presents information about the internal consistency of the observation rubric estimated by Cronbach’s alpha.² As there is one item each for teacher-to-student interaction and student-screen interaction, internal consistency measure was not applicable to these two items. The four items measuring student learning experience had the highest internal reliability among all items, while classroom culture questions had lower internal consistency.

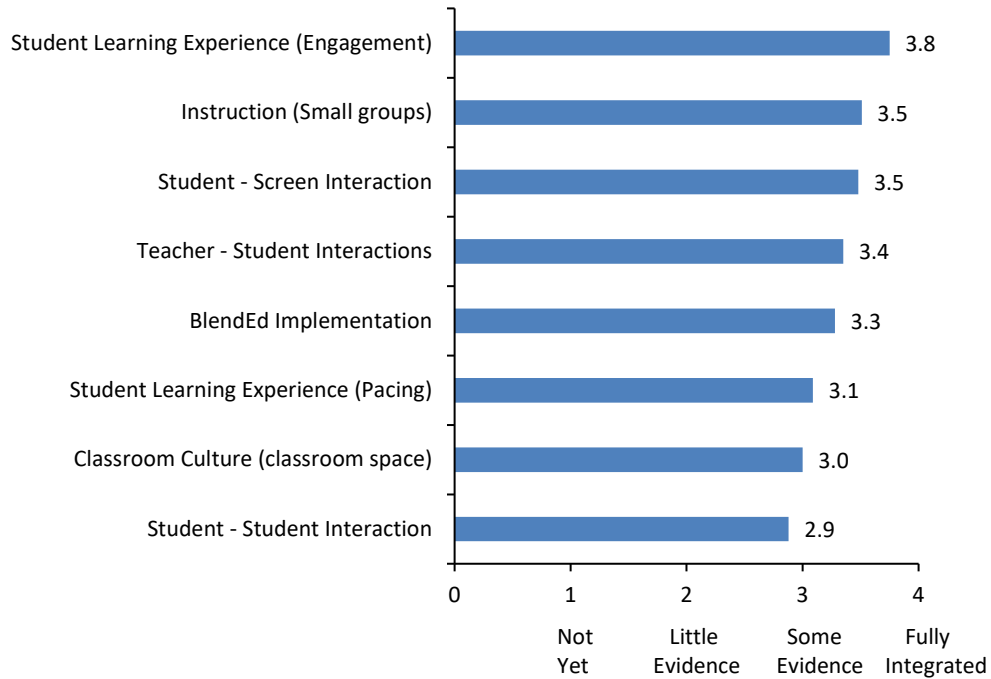
In the 2018/19 school year, the BlendEd team continued to conduct classroom observations in Nebraska. A total of 139 observations were conducted with 80 teachers teaching Grades 1-12 across 14 school districts and nine ESUs. Most of the classrooms observed had around 12-20 students (64.8%) in Grades 5-10 (76.9%). The major subject areas observed included ELA (33.1%), mathematics (27.3%), science (18.7%), and social studies (7.9%). The observer also attended a few classes of technology, business, world language, and other topic areas.

Exhibit 4 displays the overall observational ratings across all domains of the Lighthouse observation rubric. On a 4-point rating scale where 1 = not yet, 2 = little evidence, 3 = some evidence, and 4 = fully integrated, student engagement was rated the highest in the classrooms observed in 2018/19, indicating that strong evidence was observed for student engagement. Small group instruction and student-screen interaction also received higher ratings, suggesting that teachers demonstrated stronger evidence of conducting small group instruction and using technology in their BlendEd classrooms. Student-student interaction received the lowest rating, suggesting that only limited evidence was observed for student collaboration in a BlendEd class. Overall, observers found some evidence that teachers were implementing the BlendEd key domains in the observed classrooms.

TEACHER SURVEY

The BlendEd learning program developed and administered a teacher survey during the 2017 school year. The survey included both Likert-scale items and open-ended questions to gather teacher data on a set of questions measuring the following domains: work environment, peer relationship, administrator support for teaching, personal development, beliefs about student achievement, perceived impact of BlendEd learning, work attitude, school learning environment, vertical communication across grades, expectations, school vision, parent communication, working effectively with diverse students, school morale, clarity of student outcomes, teaching to standards, and attitudes about learning and teaching. A total of 35 teachers responded to the survey instrument. Reliability analysis was conducted based on the responses.

Exhibit 5 presents information about the internal consistency of the teacher survey items by composite domains. As there is only one item for vertical communication across grades, internal consistency measure was not performed for this item. A few domains with two or three items per domain have an Alpha coefficient smaller than .70, indicating a low to medium internal consistency.

Based on the results, RMC Research further reviewed the survey items and developed a new teacher survey to reduce the amount of measurement domains but include more questions about BlendEd program implementation and perceived program impact (see Appendix). The revised instrument included the following domains:

- *Background information* including participant demographics, education background, teaching experience, and teaching certification received.
- *BlendEd implementation fidelity*. Items used a 4-point scale where 1 = never, 2 = rarely, 3 = sometimes, and 4 = always.
- *Preparedness to Teach* (adapted from RMC Research, 2007).⁴ Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = not at all prepared, 2 = somewhat prepared, 3 = moderately prepared, 4 = well prepared, and 5 = very well prepared.
- *Confidence to teach* (adapted from Yopp, Sutton, & Burroughs, 2010).⁵ Items used a 5-point rating scale where 1 = not confident at all, 2 = somewhat confident, 3 = moderately confident, 4 = very confident, and 5 = extremely confident.
- *Support for teaching* (adapted from Yopp, Sutton, & Burroughs, 2010). Items used a 5-point rating scale where 1 = not at all supported, 2 = somewhat supported, 3 = moderately supported, 4 = well supported, and 5 = very well supported.

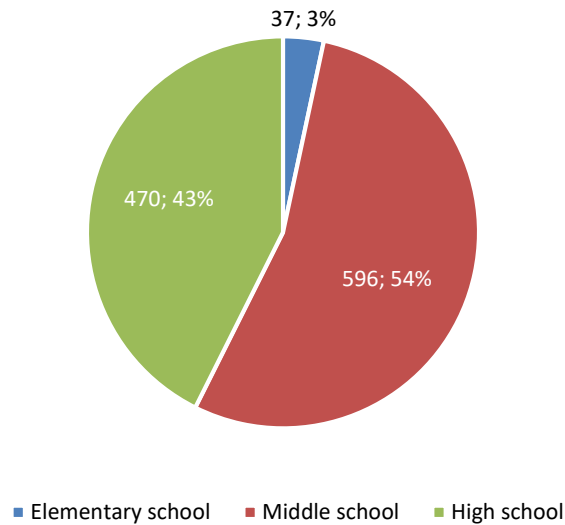

- *Job satisfaction* (adapted from the teacher job satisfaction questionnaire, Lester 1984).⁶ Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree or disagree, 4 = agree, and 5 = strongly agree.
- *Perceived impact* (adapted from the BlendEd teacher survey). Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree or disagree, 4 = agree, and 5 = strongly agree.

STUDENT SURVEY

In the BlendEd pilot study, a student survey was also administered to students taught by participating teachers. The survey included both Likert-scale items (1 = disagree, 2 = some of the time, 3 = most of the time, and 4 = agree) and one open-ended question asking what students need for success in their BlendEd learning class. A total of 1,238 students answered the survey. As Exhibit 6 shows, the vast majority were middle school students (43%) and high school students (54%).

EXHIBIT 6. STUDENT SURVEY GROUPS BY SCHOOL LEVEL (N = 1,238)

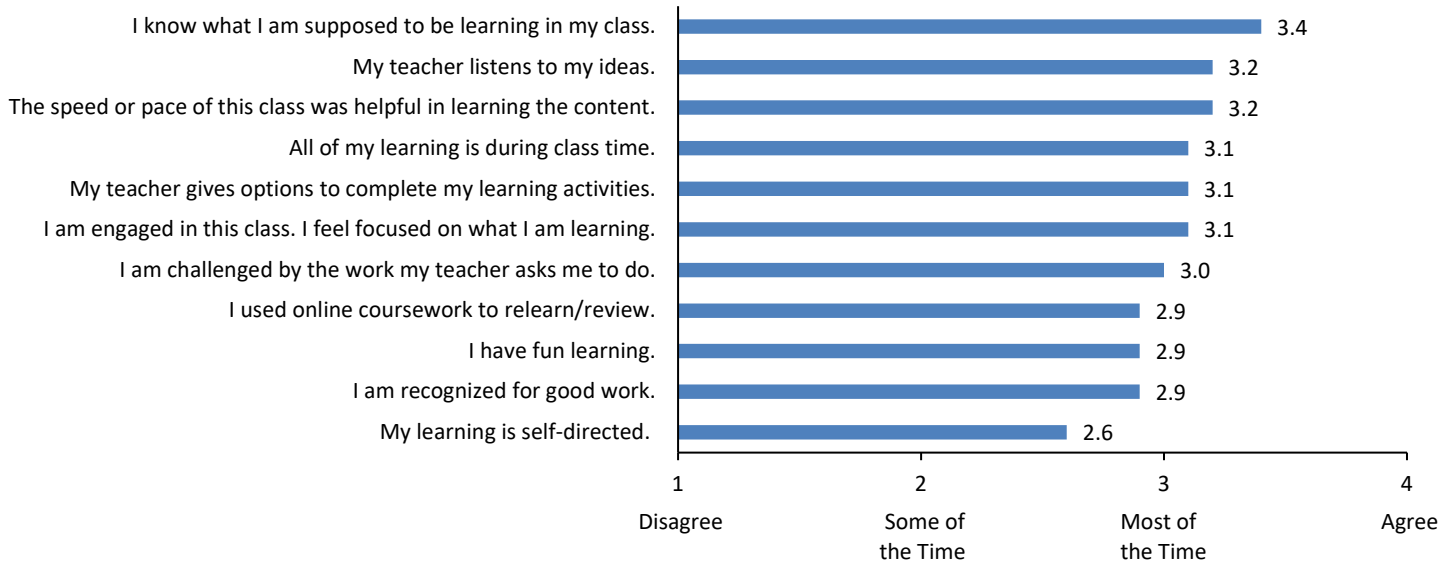


As there are no clearly defined composite variables for these items, the internal consistency test for the student survey was not conducted. RMC Research computed descriptive statistics for the Likert-scale items.

Exhibit 7 shows a summary of student responses for each survey question. Overall, average student ratings indicated that, most of the time, students agreed with statements about classroom expectations, teacher attention and class pace, use of classroom instruction time, student choice, engagement, and course challenge. Students were slightly less likely to agree they used online coursework to relearn/review; that they had fun learning; or they were recognized for good work. They reported that sometimes their learning is self-directed in a BlendEd class.

Further analyses by grade level are displayed in Exhibits 8 through 10. A cross-grade comparison indicates that students have the highest agreement on the statement “I know what I am supposed to be learning in my class” and the lowest agreement on “my learning is self-directed.” As their grade level increases, students seem to have more self-direction in their class. Elementary students and middle school students both agreed that most of the time they are engaged in a BlendEd class and feel focused on what they are learning. The student engagement, however, slightly dropped among high school students.

EXHIBIT 8. SUMMARY OF ELEMENTARY STUDENT SURVEY RESPONSES (N = 37)

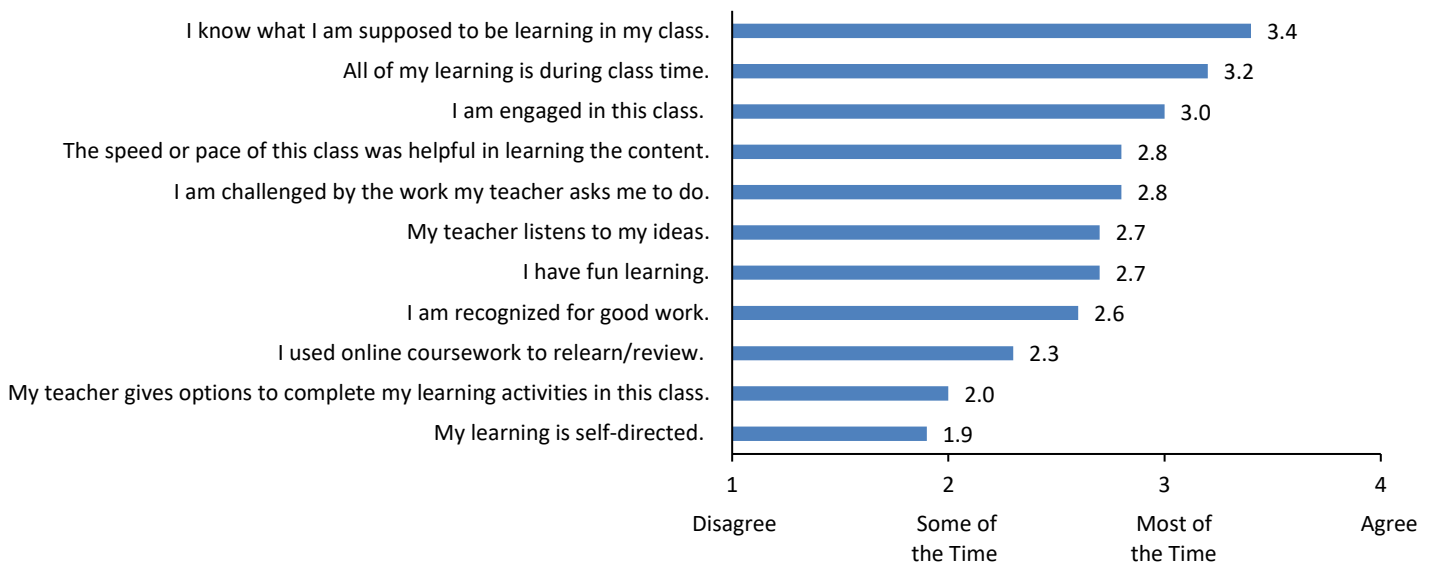


EXHIBIT 9. SUMMARY OF MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT SURVEY RESPONSES (N = 470)

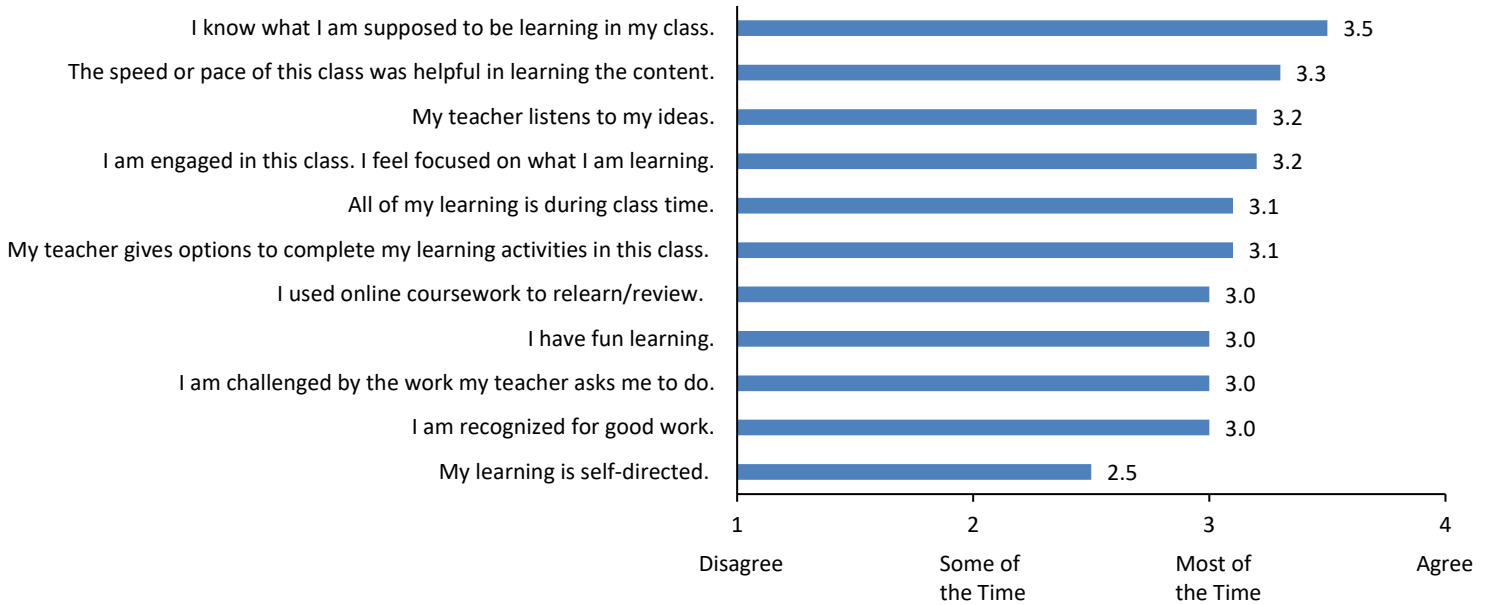
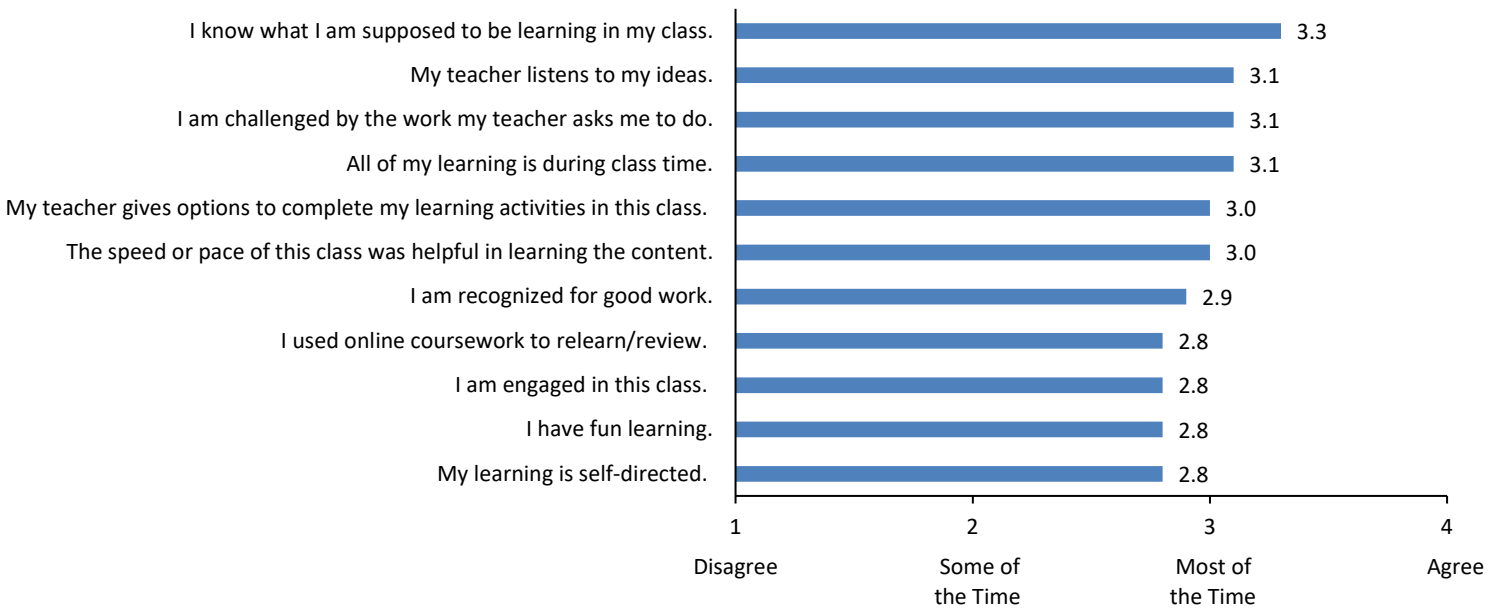


EXHIBIT 10. SUMMARY OF HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT SURVEY RESPONSES (N = 596)



RMC Research reviewed and revised the existing student survey to include more items that measure student academic engagement and perceived impact of BlendEd learning (see Appendix). The revised instrument included the following domains:

- *Demographic information* including participant gender, ethnicity, grade level, and subject areas for BlendEd learning.
- *BlendEd learning experience* (adapted from BlendEd student survey). Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree or disagree, 4 = agree, and 5 = strongly agree.
- *Academic engagement* (adapted from Wang, Good, Fredericks, & Bachler, 2013).⁷ Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree or disagree, 4 = agree, and 5 = strongly agree.
- *Perceived impact* (adapted from the BlendEd student survey and classroom observation rubric). Items used a 5-point scale where 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree or disagree, 4 = agree, and 5 = strongly agree.

BLEND^{ED} PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EVALUATION FORM

July 2017, BlendEd learning provided a day-long professional development training to all Cohort 1 teachers, including those who participated in 2016/17 and new teachers who will be implementing BlendEd classes in 2017/18. The purpose of the training was to review the 2016/17 implementation of BlendEd learning in the pilot classrooms, discuss lessons learned, and plan with participants how to teach BlendEd classes in the upcoming school year.

The training started with whole group and small group discussions about what worked in the pilot year and what teachers wanted to implement/adjust/improve/change. Participants worked in small groups organized by ESU regions to use Canvas, the BlendEd website designated for training and resource sharing to upload their thoughts and share with all participants. Next, attendees were divided into groups of administrators, second year pilot teachers, and new pilot teachers to have more targeted discussions with the BlendEd coaches. During the administrator professional development, participants reviewed their district data compared to statewide data, shared teacher student feedback gathered through classroom observations, and discussed how to support teacher personal learning goals and conduct teacher evaluation. For the veteran BlendEd pilot teachers, the BlendEd coach recapped the BlendEd Instructional Framework, but focused on sharing BlendEd learning resources and research based best practices that teachers can use in their classroom. She also led a discussion with teachers about how to promote student ownership in their own learning. The first-year teachers' session focused on how to get started with BlendEd teaching and learning. The training also included practice sessions where teachers could collaborate to develop their own BlendEd lesson plans.

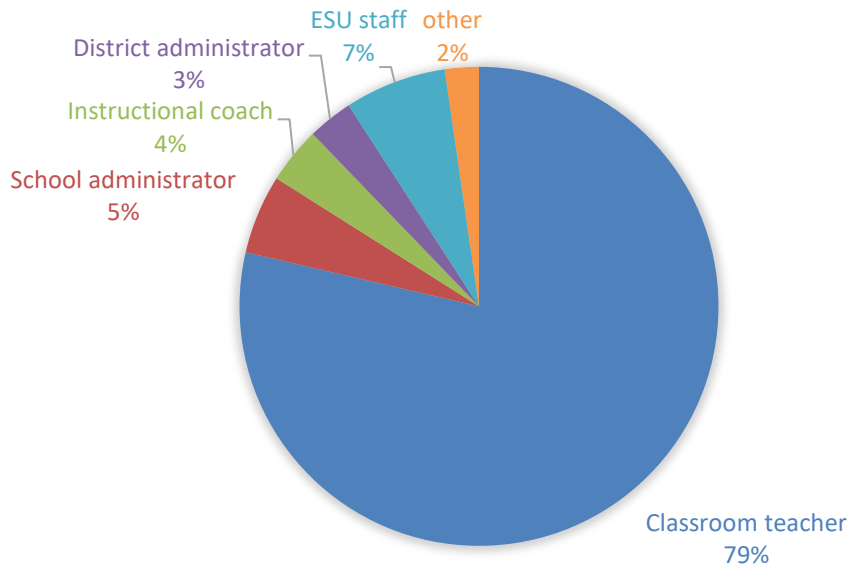
In summer 2019, BlendEd continued to offer the same professional development sessions to the current and future BlendEd teachers. At the end of the professional development, participants were asked to complete an online evaluation form to evaluate their professional development experience. The form

included two Likert-scale questions and six open-ended questions. A total of 131 participants responded to the professional development evaluation form. Descriptive analysis was conducted for each Likert-scale question.

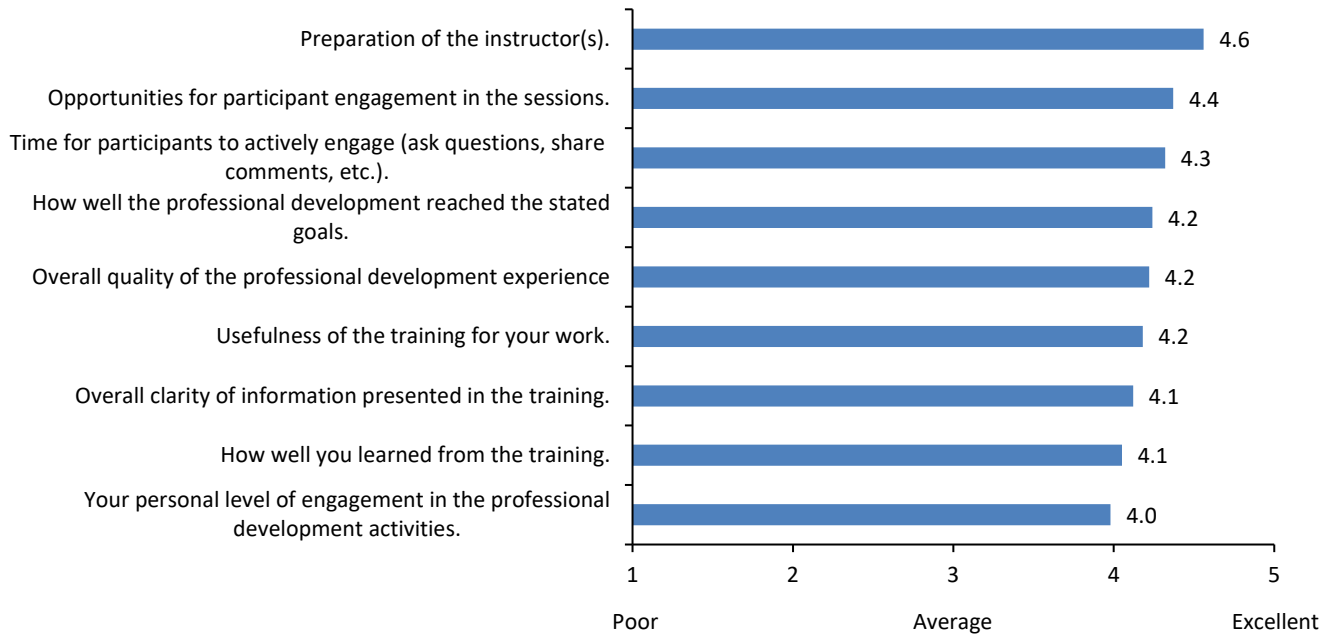
Exhibit 11 indicates that the vast majority of respondents were classroom teachers (79%), followed by ESU staff (7%) and school/district level administrators (8% total). Several instructional coaches, and technology staff also responded to the evaluation form.

EXHIBIT 11. BLENDED PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EVALUATION RESPONDENT GROUPS



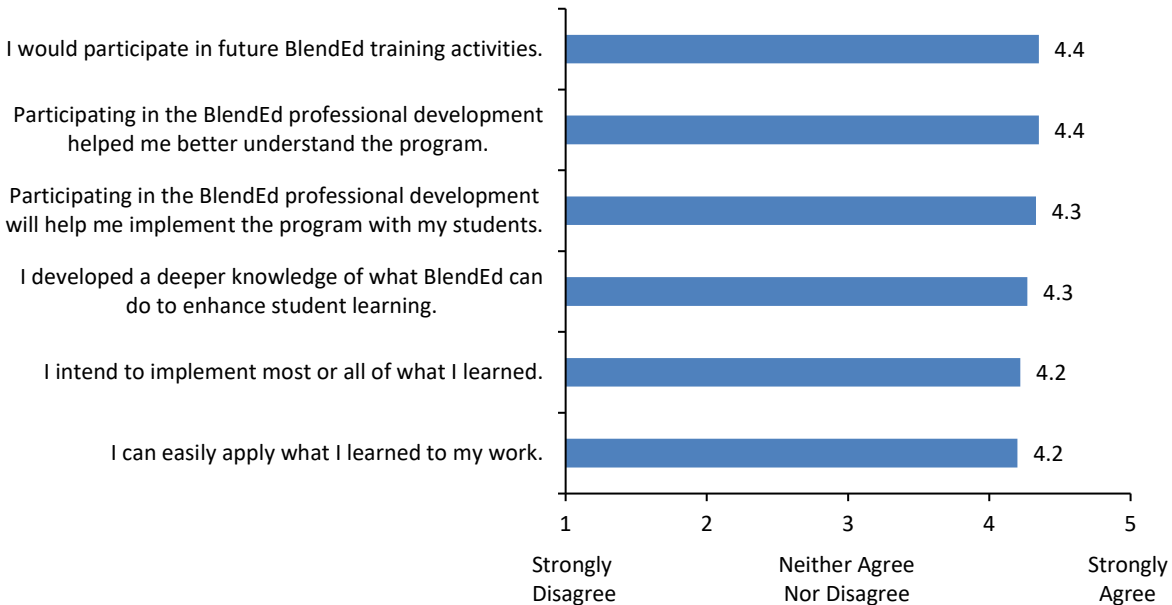
When asked to rate their experience for the day-long BlendEd professional development/training on a 5-point scale where 1 = poor, 2 = below average, 3 = average, 4 = above average, and 5 = excellent, the vast majority of respondents agreed that overall the BlendEd training was above average to excellent, suggesting an overall high quality of the professional development. Exhibit 12 shows that respondents gave the highest rating to instructor preparedness. They also agreed they had a good opportunity and sufficient time to engage and participate in the professional development activities. While still above average, lower ratings were given to personal level of engagement in the professional development.

The evaluation form also asked respondents to rate their take-aways from or the influence of the BlendEd professional development on a 5-point scale from 1 = strongly disagree to 5 = strongly agree. Overall, respondents agreed or strongly agreed that participating in the professional development had a positive influence on the BlendEd implementation. Most respondents would like to participate in future BlendEd training activities. They also agreed that the professional development helped them better understand BlendEd and would help them implement the program with their students. They strongly agreed that they developed a deeper knowledge of what BlendEd can do to enhance student learning. (see Exhibit 13).

Classroom teachers were asked on the evaluation form what they liked best about the professional development experience. Many valued the opportunity to collaborate with other teachers and enjoyed the time to work and create BlendEd materials. They particularly enjoyed learning from teachers who are currently using BlendEd about the successes and challenges they have faced. Teachers appreciated the ideas, resources, and information they could take back to their classrooms as they work to implement BlendEd. A sample of teacher responses included the following:

Work time and the time to collaborate with other teachers when I needed to.

I loved having time to work on the specific needs I had!

I always appreciate time to apply what we've learned in a professional development day, so I really liked the time we spent building a blended learning plan for a few lessons.

Great organization by the staff! Love the breakouts to meet both beginning and advanced blended experienced teachers

Teachers noted some key take-aways from their participation in the BlendEd training. Many realized that learning should be student centered, so they learned to share expectations with students, collaborate with students, and let students take ownership of their learning. Another major takeaway is the information about student choice and voice and the differences between these two in the learning process. Teachers mentioned they gained a better understanding of different BlendEd models and learned how to pick the models that best fit their classroom. They also learned about new resources and tools to make BlendEd work effectively in their classrooms and options for grouping students for instruction. Several comments illuminated what teachers found to be helpful:

I learned that there is a BlendEd style for all teachers

A key take-away was learning the different models that can be used in the classroom.

BlendEd approaches do not need to be one method the entire time but can switch between the three within the same lesson/unit. I also learned the difference between choice and voice! I had used them as synonyms before.

When asked what, if anything, they would change to improve the professional development activities, more than half of teachers either did not respond or indicated, “nothing.” Some commented that they would use more guidance in creating an actual lesson that teachers can deliver in classroom. Some also remarked that they would like to have more collaboration and planning time with people from the same district to generate lesson ideas. Additional feedback from participants included the following:

Please give us more time to work on generating lesson ideas and collaborating.

I would like to see specific examples of what teachers are doing.

I like the activities that were directly related to learning about BlendEd. I can appreciate working with others, but I feel feedback within our own district is priority. In other words, less ‘get-to-know you’ activities.

Participants used words such as “informative,” “engaging,” “practical,” “educational,” and “fulfilling” when asked what words they would use to describe this professional development experience to colleagues. Almost all comments were positive and included sentiments about the professional development providing great resources, opportunities for collaboration, and ideas for integrating instruction. Several participants provided further elaboration:

New, exciting, and learning opportunity to better teach students.

It was a great training with a lot of really useful takeaways.

A connection between the technology, pedagogy, and content knowledge (I think trying to make the full pack cycle is important).

This workshop will help you understand blended learning process. It’s great for beginners as well as more advanced learners.

Teachers hoped that participation in the training will allow them to provide a more engaging learning experience for their students. They also hoped that students would be more likely to take ownership of their learning in a BlendEd classroom. Some teachers mentioned they would like to be better able to use BlendEd strategies in their classrooms and to share what they learned with other teachers in their schools or districts. Teachers hoped their involvement in the training and implementation of BlendEd in their classrooms will lead to students being more motivated to learn, better able to retain knowledge, and more willing to use technology. Comments from teachers highlighted some of these aspirations:

I hope that it will help me create an effective BlendEd plan to create an effective learning experience for my students.

I hope that through my participation today, I can help my students become self-sufficient and curious learners who are great problem solvers!

I'm excited to use the strategies and concepts I learned today to implement effective blended learning in my math classes. I hope that it will boost my students' engagement and give them more time to deepen their understanding and interest.

I hope to get other teachers on board to be supportive of this change and process. I would hope that my students are open to trying something new and different from their classroom last year.

Most participants did not indicate they needed any additional information or support to help them implement the BlendEd program. Some mentioned they would like to receive additional support from the BlendEd team, more planning time, and continued education to learn how to implement different BlendEd models. They noted they would like to have follow-up discussion on BlendEd plans they develop for their classroom and get more feedback from observers. Teachers also expressed interest in more video examples from other teachers and more professional development webinars. Follow-up from mentors and hands-on coaching were also suggested as types of ongoing support that could be provided. Additional feedback from participants included the following:

As with all PD, I just need reminders to implement the things I learned today, and contacts to reach out to when I'm stuck or struggling with implementation.

I really like video examples and webinars for continuing ed for blended learning.

[I hope] we'd continue to get together to get tossing around ideas and to talk about what works and what doesn't.

BLENDED PARTICIPANT INTERVIEWS

IMPLEMENTATION

Administrators indicated that BlendEd learning was adopted at their school for various reasons. Several said their school had one-to-one computing technology and they wanted to familiarize teachers with best practices or improve the effectiveness of instruction. Some heard about the program through their ESU and wanted to see what the initiative could offer, while others had teachers who were interested in the program and/or thought that BlendEd was a means for creating more impactful lessons. Several comments that administrators made about reasons for integrating BlendEd into classrooms at their respective schools included:

It was the result of the purchase of technology, going to one-to-one [technology] and not seeing the results that were anticipated. I wanted something that was more engaging for students rather than just digitizing curriculum.

We are trying to see what it offers. It is being used for 2 hours, 5 days a week in core courses.

There was the opportunity to participate and they had a brand new one-to-one initiative in the middle school. They wanted to get teachers on board with best practices. We had a couple of teachers receive training, implement practices, and then conduct professional development to show what works in their setting.

Most teachers said they were asked by their school administrator, technology specialist, or curriculum director to participate in BlendEd learning, while others shared that they were intrigued by the innovative classroom work being done by other teachers in their school and/or district who were already implementing the program. When asked what motivated them to participate, several teachers mentioned that BlendEd learning aligned with the goals of their classroom or the curriculum. Other teachers reported they were looking to make changes in their classroom, either through providing students with more opportunities for self-pacing and personalized learning or developing more interaction with technology.

Implementation varied by school but tended to begin with teachers who expressed interest in the program or were at specific grade levels. Teachers shared that they had considerable flexibility with implementation of BlendEd as they incorporated it into their curriculum and classroom. They said the use of blended learning promoted student engagement and increased differentiation. While most teachers felt blended learning had been successfully integrated into their classes, several teachers expressed confusion about program expectations or said they needed additional support from the ESU. The following is a sampling of comments from teachers about program implementation:

Students enjoy the BlendEd atmosphere; they don't want the traditional style of teaching.

It's successful. We have added more each year through book talks and computers, etc.

It fits the classroom. Seating is flexible and allows for differentiation.

I wish we had more meetings with the ESU person; we need more regular contact. I feel that I am missing some things.

The principal gave carte blanche to make classrooms into blended classrooms. The school is heavy into technology.

The whole feel for the year was survival. I felt off-track with blended education; it was so many procedures, a new approach to classroom learning. I do try to incorporate blended education into what I do, although not always formally.

Administrators noted that teachers were at different stages of implementation with BlendEd, with some who were quite experienced and adept with the strategies while others were just beginning to use them. They said teachers adapted the strategies as needed based on the topic, unit, or schedule. Administrators observed that BlendEd moved instruction away from a lecture format and provided more hands-on learning with different ways to learn the content and express mastery.

Teachers mentioned participating in professional development for BlendEd through trainings held by their ESU, conferences, workshops, and webinars. They acquired a myriad of strategies and resources at these events. Some teachers said they received coaching or had visited and observed classrooms in

which blended learning was being used, either in their school or in other schools. Several also noted they were trained and prepared in using the Canvas platform. While the majority of teachers expressed confidence with using and integrating technology, several wanted more training on Canvas, specifically wanting to know how to navigate it more effectively and reduce the time required for input. Many stated there was a substantial amount of additional time required to input everything into the system and prepare it for use by students since so much of the instruction was individualized. They also felt other platforms, such as Schoology, should be available for use.

Support for BlendEd implementation was provided by administrators, other teachers, and the ESU. Administrators shared that they supported the teachers by providing opportunities to work together and assisting teachers if they ran into implementation or integration issues. Teachers also noted the various ways they supported and were supported by peers involved in the project. These included informal discussions with other participating teachers, both within and outside of their school and district, in regard to what was and was not effective in the program; collaboration with other teachers at ESU trainings; and guidance from ESU staff which included sharing of ideas and answering questions. Some teachers were observed by a consultant from the ESU, although they voiced frustration with the observations since no feedback was provided and they were unsure if they were implementing the program correctly.

Teachers were asked what strategies were effective in getting them to use the BlendEd resources. Strategies mentioned by included:

- Accessing texts and other resources online;
- Visiting other classrooms to see how resources were being used;
- Playing games on Kahoot;
- Utilizing resources as part of classroom management by constantly reviewing objectives and procedures;
- Being able to share ideas with other participating teachers on utilization;
- Participating in the training;
- Having ESU staff available for consultation; and
- Being provided with additional time to develop lesson plans since materials (i.e., textbooks) were online.

In addition to effective strategies detailed by teachers, administrators said that having the technology coordinator answer questions during professional learning communities (PLC) meetings and asking experienced teachers to observe and share materials with beginning teachers also served to expand the usage of resources in classrooms.

Although resources were generally characterized as high quality, effective, and beneficial, some drawbacks with resources were noted by several teachers. These negative aspects included resources being limited or largely unavailable for content areas outside of core classes, especially for foreign languages, and the shortage of resources available for classrooms beyond the elementary level. Administrators mentioned that resources needed to meet students' abilities and needs in order to be effective and have a connection between the content and the approach.

When asked if other teachers benefited from the BlendEd resources, both respondent groups affirmed they did. It was noted that when other teachers witnessed students becoming more engaged in the

lessons, they were more motivated to utilize creative and innovative ways to deliver content. They also had opportunities to learn about, ask questions, and see what BlendEd teachers were doing. Many shared that observing other teachers using the strategies contributed to their buy-in. Additionally, respondents mentioned that some of the components and strategies were being utilized by teachers before formal participation in the program and prior to the program being labeled as BlendEd. Both groups also enjoyed having the different resources available to them.

IMPACT

A majority of teachers and administrators believed the use of BlendEd positively impacted their students. They perceived that students, including those in special education (SPED), were more engaged in the lessons, gained deeper mastery of the topics, had better retention of information, set educational goals, and became more self-motivated. They discussed how students had more control and ownership of their learning and were therefore making better choices for their education because it was more meaningful for them. Through the implementation of BlendEd components, students were utilizing technology more effectively, working together more purposefully, and displaying more interest in what they were learning. Both respondent groups saw increases in academic achievement and reported improvements in assessment scores and grades as well as with writing. Typical comments about impacts follow:

Having a choice helps [students] take learning into their own hands. – Teacher

I have seen improvements in SPED students. Scores have gone through the roof. Students can learn through videos on their own. – Teacher

[Students] become more motivated to get things done. It piques their interest; it helps them find resources to expand on a topic. MAP scores improved; their writing has improved from different blended techniques. Students are mastering topics better.
– Teacher

It does change the attitude of the students. They have more ownership of what's going on, they are in charge of their own time, and they end up moving through the curriculum with mastery faster. – Administrator

Students are truly engaged in the lessons. They have a greater control over their own learning and are making choices for themselves. BlendEd creates more active classrooms. – Administrator

Additionally, teachers and administrators stated that through blended learning and personalized learning experiences, students were learning skills that inevitably transferred to other classes and subjects. They were exposed to different strategies and engaged in projects or other extension activities related to the topics. Students were familiar with the technology and the use of Canvas. Teachers mentioned the use of technology enabled students to become more independent, find their own solutions and answers, collaborate with other students on assignments, express their creativity, and keep current with their assignments when absent.

However, several teachers who were still struggling with integrating the technology into their classrooms perceived that impacts on students were limited. They felt they needed to understand the

BlendEd strategies more fully and practice them more skillfully before benefits to students could be realized. One administrator described a direct connection between teachers' familiarity and competence with BlendEd strategies and the achievement of measurable outcomes with students.

Teachers generally thought that BlendEd impacted students' college and career readiness by familiarizing them with learning through technology, preparing them for nontraditional college classrooms, and encouraging them to formulate their own life goals. Teachers believed students who simultaneously cultivated knowledge about technology and developed greater skills in creativity and independence would ultimately become more capable members of the workforce.

Most teachers explained that BlendEd positively shaped interactions among students by helping them to work together in a respectful fashion and build trust. They perceived that students were more willing to ask questions, share information, and help each other out. This is how teachers described impacts on student interactions:

It's impacted them positively. There is rotation to different stations and small group work. Previously, students shared less.

Students built relationships in a positive way. Students are more willing to work with others and build trust. They come to me when they need help and go to each other for help.

Students interact, help each other out. They are more social. It helped me to build relationships with students.

A few teachers held a different perspective, saying that student collaboration was sometimes discouraged by the technology when students worked individually on their computers without interaction or students in groups delegated most of the responsibility to one person while others did very little. One teacher characterized collaboration as a skill that needed to be continually emphasized and monitored.

Teachers said that participation enhanced their teaching by providing more tools, resources, and strategies. Administrators noted that BlendEd teachers devised different and innovative ways to approach a lesson and deliver content and had increased confidence in their teaching. They also observed teachers being more team-oriented because of their collaborative work on BlendEd lessons and strategies. Administrators felt their own leadership capacity had been enhanced by becoming more aware of a different model of instruction and seeing how blended learning strategies enabled students to take greater initiative in directing their own learning.

FACILITATORS AND CHALLENGES

Administrators cited several facilitators that were critical to BlendEd implementation in their schools. These facilitators encompassed regular support from the ESU; free training available through the grant; support from the superintendent; and adopting a common learning management system. Other facilitators included having school board support, a strong technology coordinator, and the one-to-one infrastructure. Challenges described by administrators included the time required by teachers to create and refine lessons on top of their other numerous responsibilities; the degree of student engagement

being less than desired; the need for a library of resources; and the lack of reliable Internet connections at homes located in more remote rural areas.

Nearly all teachers stated the greatest factor that served to facilitate implementation of BlendEd in their classrooms was the training and support they received. They appreciated their administrators allowing them time to incorporate it into their classrooms and being flexible as they began implementation. In addition to administrators, they described being supported by the ESU consultants and other teachers. Several also credited the technology component itself as aiding in the facilitation of BlendEd into their classes.

The most frequent challenge teachers experienced with implementation of BlendEd was the requirement of time. This included time to develop and refine lesson plans and see if the components were effective in the classroom. Other challenges mentioned by teachers included the limited resources for subject areas other than core content, the scarcity of resources for classes beyond elementary grade levels, the lack of alignment between the program and the standards, and student resistance to change. Additionally, several teachers noted that BlendEd was a collection of activities rather than a methodology of instruction and were subsequently unsure if they were implementing the concept correctly. They discussed the enormity of the information involved and requested that it be broken down into smaller and better-defined parts to ensure fidelity of implementation. Some teachers who were new to blended learning said they needed more concrete examples and practical information on how to turn theory into practice. Comments about challenges from teachers included:

I know what I am doing, but I don't know if it's in the right direction.

I would like to see a stellar example of what I am shooting for and how to apply that to my own class.

I need better help and support with how to put in small pieces at a time.

The ideas and concepts are great, but I need more on how to do things.

There is not enough accessibility to information . . . how do you increase interaction and involvement from students as they dive into projects?

To address these challenges, teachers collaborated with peers and administrators to resolve issues, adjusted their classrooms and lessons as needed, and sought feedback from ESU consultants. Teachers wanted more opportunities to work with ESU staff on lessons plans and ensure the plans were correct. They also wanted access to an online discussion board to post and look for additional resources and ideas, saying that such a venue would allow them to see how other teachers were utilizing BlendEd within their own content area.

LESSONS LEARNED

The most consistent lesson learned, as expressed by teachers and administrators, was the significant amount of planning time involved with implementation. Teachers were constantly trying new things, making adjustments, and breaking lessons down into smaller modules so students could assimilate the information and not become frustrated. Administrators emphasized the importance of creating a

common planning time for teachers so they could develop lessons together and share successful strategies as well as obstacles they faced.

Other lessons learned included understanding that technology can help to teach students work and life skills; breaking the information down into smaller modules so students can more easily grasp the content; accepting that part of the implementation process is making mistakes and learning from them; and seeing that lecture is not always the best way to instruct. Teachers advised others who were considering the use of BlendEd to try it and persevere even when their plans did not work out as hoped. They felt the benefits of student academic growth, increased individualized learning, student control over their own learning, and more academic engagement were worth the time, effort, and inevitable frustration associated with taking on a new approach to learning.

SUGGESTIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT

Although BlendEd was well received overall by those who were utilizing the components, teachers had several suggestions for strengthening the program. Many stated the program needed to find a way to teach the different components over a longer period of time so instructors did not feel overwhelmed and could become fully familiar with one part before trying to integrate a new one. Other suggestions included:

- Providing more time to plan lessons and incorporate BlendEd into classrooms;
- Alerting teachers to available resources pertinent to their grades and content areas;
- Receiving additional support from the ESU consultants including more ideas on how BlendEd can work in different classrooms and feedback from classroom observations;
- Switching resources during the year so students remain interested;
- Finding a better balance between technology and teaching; and
- Receiving ideas for ways to increase student engagement and interactions.

Administrators suggested allowing teachers to conduct more site visits to other schools; having more than one platform to choose from, such as Schoology; focusing on smaller public school districts so teachers could see how comparable teachers manage the program; demonstrating effective strategies; and continuing to do goal-setting with teachers.

PROJECT LEADERSHIP INTERVIEWS

Project leaders from ADVISER, BlendEd, EdReady, and SIMPL were asked to complete an e-mail questionnaire in winter 2019. They described progress made on objectives, factors that facilitated and posed challenges to project progress, issues that participants raised about their experiences with the project and what had been done to address issues, and perceived program impacts on participants.

PROGRESS MADE ON OBJECTIVES

All four projects displayed substantial progress on their objectives as detailed below.

The team has built policies, procedures and infrastructure for security and privacy with the ADVISER data system and related applications which are part of the data ecosystem. In collaboration with the Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) legal counsel and ESUCC legal team, the innovation team

drafted a statement of data ownership and access. This statement has been shared for review by the U.S. Department of Education and its Privacy Technical Assistance Center. Favorable review feedback was received on the team's interpretation of regulations regarding handling of data and school districts' ability to provide data.

The ADVISER and SSO applications have been fully integrated into the state data reporting and assessment systems. Nebraska Cloud SSO service is available to all ESUs and school districts in Nebraska. Usage data showed 206 organizations have utilized the framework.

The new version of the Nebraska Cloud app launch portal was available April 2020. There will be 88 applications in the app launch portal. The Software Innovation Network is being formed to continue the work of evaluating, implementing, maintaining and retiring software in the state-wide education community.

SRS and AAP applications are being tested and revised to be integrated with the ADVISER system for data exchange. In July 2019, new development libraries and new hosting environment were used for SRS to increase the speed of the application. The development team continue working on debugging and system improvement based on pre-release testing results and helpdesk requests.

The SRS has been used to report student SPED data to ADVISER for the 2018/19 and 2019/20 school years. It was used by 241 out of 244 public school districts in Nebraska in the 2019/20 school year. New features, including support for 504 SPED plans and an administrative dashboard will be added by the SRS advisory team. An interface is also under development to synchronize ADVISER data by student information systems into SRS to avoid data entry duplication in both systems. The upgrade of SRS system, although it required more resources than originally expected, will help develop and upgrade the AAP system in 2020 as it will be using the SRS code base.

Overall, leadership felt the innovation grant has provided more access to quality applications through the single sign-on application and automated rostering of some applications from ADVISER. It promoted data quality through automated submission of reporting data and encouraging data to be accurate at the system of record rather than being corrected at intermediate reporting steps.

In the BlendEd project, the team continued to increase the utilization of the strategies around blended and personalized learning. They scaled the professional development and coaching of classroom teachers through (1) monthly meetings of ESU blended coaches and identifying how to address activities and concerns that arise from the meetings; (2) onsite visits to the participating districts/schools to observe teachers implementing BlendEd strategies; (3) professional development sessions for both new and veteran BlendEd teachers to have a deeper understanding of BlendEd strategies and how to develop BlendEd lesson plans; and (4) meetings with teachers and the ESU staff to discuss successes and struggles in the implementation.

In the last project year, the foci of BlendEd have been revised based on improved knowledge of the participants and the coaches in the project. The project is now focused on providing coaching strategies and supports for teachers to reflect and improve instruction using BlendEd strategies, instead of just providing professional development opportunities. The lighthouse teachers, who are the initial group of participating teachers, are viewed as change agents in the schools and districts and have received the most support from the team regarding BlendEd strategies and techniques.

The SIMPL project has undertaken three phases during the past project years to develop and implement the online SIMPL tool to help ESU enter service inventories, receive training in best practice service development, and have an online repository of reports. Phase 1 is the service planning phase when the team compiled and examined the existing service offerings; created common system to code services; collected preliminary data such as participation and implementation data; created services management web application; and started building an online dashboard. SIMPL implementation started in Phase 2 when the SIMPL application started to collect activity logs; service implementation scores were given; workshop data were integrated; data products were generated; annual reports were provided to districts/ESUs/state. The last phase the team just went through was cost-repository-prediction. The team was able to provide reports comparing the costs to school districts using ESU services with the costs to School Districts reaching out to external vendors.

The SIMPL project greatly increased use of the software system throughout the state. At the outset of the Innovation Grant, ESU 7 was the only ESU using SIMPL. There was no method to collect the aggregate number of service hours, service recipients, event attendance, or statewide correlation to AQuESTT. In 2017/18, five ESUs (2, 7, 8, 10, and 17) were involved and eight ESUs (2, 3, 7, 8, 10, 13, 16, and 17) were inputting data into SIMPL. In 2019/20, two more ESUs (9 and 15) started using SIMPL to log services. By spring 2020, more than 66,514 school district personnel have participated in services. A total of 34,876 hours/4,650 school days of support have been logged in SIMPL. Over 11,915 entries were documented and more than 6,000 individuals have attended ESU sponsored events.

FACTORS THAT FACILITATED PROJECT PROGRESS

Respondents noted that a number of factors helped facilitate each project. For ADVISER and SRS development and implementation, the innovation team reported that their progress was enhanced by:

- consistent attention, steady work on the projects;
- communication with all possible stakeholders to understand needs and experience with the systems being developed;
- additional resources at the right times to speed development;
- positive user experience;
- users understanding the purpose/need for the systems and the updates; and
- loyal following of users.

For the BlendEd project, building relationships with participating teachers through site visits and observations was viewed as the most beneficial. The constant communication with teachers also helped the team to receive validation from the work they are implementing. Facilitators also included regular meetings with ESU coaches and blended lighthouse teachers to guide the teacher through their goals and plans for implementation, and the support from school/ESU administrators.

EdReady established working relationships with a variety of “shareholders” they viewed as key to project progress aligning with broader statewide goals (including those of ESUCC, NDE, ESUs, local schools, conference organizers and business entities). Impactful use of EdReady in the classroom and in support of local efforts are being identified and shared as models for others across the state in case studies, conference presentations, and more.

For the SIMPL project, one large facilitator was the monthly SIMPL advisory team meetings to problem solve, trouble shoot, and provide procedural suggestions to the ESUCC. Other facilitators included ESUCC and NDE participating in a joint collaboration meeting to establish priorities for their memorandum of understanding and using the SIMPL process for this work; and the development of a SIMPL user manual. This manual is intended to be a living document that will be revised as the tool is revised.

Across different projects, common facilitators are hardworking team members and the collaboration across projects. Respondents noted that most team members put in extra time and efforts and worked beyond the expectations of their positions to reach goals. There were weekly meetings involving the ADVISER team, SRS application, and hosting infrastructure to coordinate needs and activities. These meetings, along with the NDE Data and Technology Committee, promoted awareness and alignment of technology project work between agencies. The BlendEd and NROC/EdReady project has established a close partnership. The EdReady product allows for teachers and students to consider a blended strategy for students to work at their own pace. The SIMPL project also can be used to support the implementation of the blended learning strategies through services of professional development and coaching. In addition, with a fully functioning ADVISER dashboard, the progress a student is making can be identified and resources could be selected based on the student needs.

DISSEMINATION

During the project years, the innovation grant research team has put forth strong efforts to disseminate project products. The SRS and SSO applications have been promoted through the state-wide ESU network of affiliate groups and meetings, state-level conferences, NDE news bulletins, and direct communication with active users. For the BlendEd project, results of the site visits and observations and the notes from the monthly BlendEd Coaches meetings have been shared with the ESU administrators in a monthly report. In addition, the ESU coaches have been sharing the results with their schools and districts in order to gain local interest in using the BlendEd strategies. The BlendEd learning used social media posts to raise project awareness. Examples of student artifacts created when using blended learning strategies were also posted in the OERCommons Hub for Nebraska (https://www.oercommons.org/curated-collections/889?_hub_id=55) and the website for the Digital Age Pedagogy bit.ly/DigitalAgePedagogy. The SIMPL project shared project reports to communicate with state senators, school districts, school boards and the NDE.

SUGGESTIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT

Several suggestions for project stability and improvement came from project leaders. For ADVISER, it was seen as important to make conservative estimates of time and resources needed as software development projects are intensive and require careful specifications, planning, and monitoring to keep them on track. Project leadership also suggested that structured testing plans be developed to ensure software quality. Both automated testing techniques and real-world user scenarios are essential to providing the best user experience when new software or updates are rolled out. It was also noted that a communications and marketing plan should be created as an essential part of the project to promote awareness and engagement in the stakeholder community.

BlendEd leadership remarked that it is essential to create participant buy in, not only from the teachers but also from building administrators to maintain sustainability. An ideal approach is a school-wide

innovation approach with administrative full interest and support as well as a strong team of classroom teachers willing to put the innovative strategies in place and continue even when there is difficulty.

In addition, the professional development has to be deep to provide a strong understanding of the strategies. The BlendEd team also noted that follow-up professional development and coaching allows for the growth to progress. Without these pieces, the growth will plateau and not be able to see the potential results of these innovative strategies. The SIMPL project leadership indicated that it is important to move the management to ESUCC at the outset of the project to promote engagement of all ESUs to participate in the project. The EdReady project leadership had no suggestions at this time.

CONCLUSIONS

Evaluation findings demonstrate that the DE²TAILS project has operated on the proposed timelines and has accomplished most of the proposed goals and objectives.

FINDINGS

- **The review of project documents and leadership interviews provide evidence the DE²TAILS project has been fully implemented in support of proposed goals and objectives.** The documents made available for review show an increasingly sophisticated project being implemented in ways that meet program goals and objectives and support participants. Qualitative data collected from project documents and leadership interviews also confirm that ADVISER, BlendEd, EdReady, and SIMPL projects displayed substantial progress on their objectives.
- **The DE²TAILS project has made a substantial impact on participants and different stakeholders statewide.** The ADVISER project has provided a state-wide access to quality applications through the SSO application and automated rostering of some applications from ADVISER. It promoted data quality through automated submission of reporting data. BlendEd and EdReady projects increased the utilization of the strategies around blended and personalized learning. They also scaled the professional development and coaching of classroom teachers. The SIMPL project developed and implemented the online SIMPL tool to help ESU enter service inventories, receive training in best practice service development, and have an online repository of reports.
- **BlendEd summer training provided a high-quality professional development experience.** Participants agreed the BlendEd training was approaching excellent. They gave the highest rating to instructor preparedness. They also agreed they had good opportunities and sufficient time to engage and participate in the professional development activities.
- **Participants also agreed or strongly agreed that what they learned in the BlendEd professional development has a positive influence on the BlendEd implementation.** Most respondents would like to participate in future BlendEd training activities. They also agreed that the professional development helped them better understand BlendEd and would help them implement the program with their students. They also indicated strong agreement that they developed a deeper knowledge of what BlendEd can do to enhance student learning.
- **Although implementation varied by schools, most teachers and administrators believed the use of BlendEd positively impacted their students.** They perceived that students were more engaged in

the lessons, gained deeper mastery of the topics, had better retention of information, set educational goals, became more self-motivated, had more ownership of their learning, and utilized technology more effectively. Both respondent groups saw increases in academic achievement and reported improvements in assessment scores and grades as well as with writing.

- **BlendEd has also demonstrated a positive impact on participating teachers and administrators.** Teachers and administrators said that participation enhanced their teaching by providing more tools, resources, and strategies. Administrators noted that BlendEd teachers devised different and innovative ways to approach a lesson, increased confidence in their teaching, and became more team-oriented because of their collaborative work on BlendEd lessons and strategies. Administrators felt their own leadership capacity was enhanced by becoming more aware of a different model of instruction.

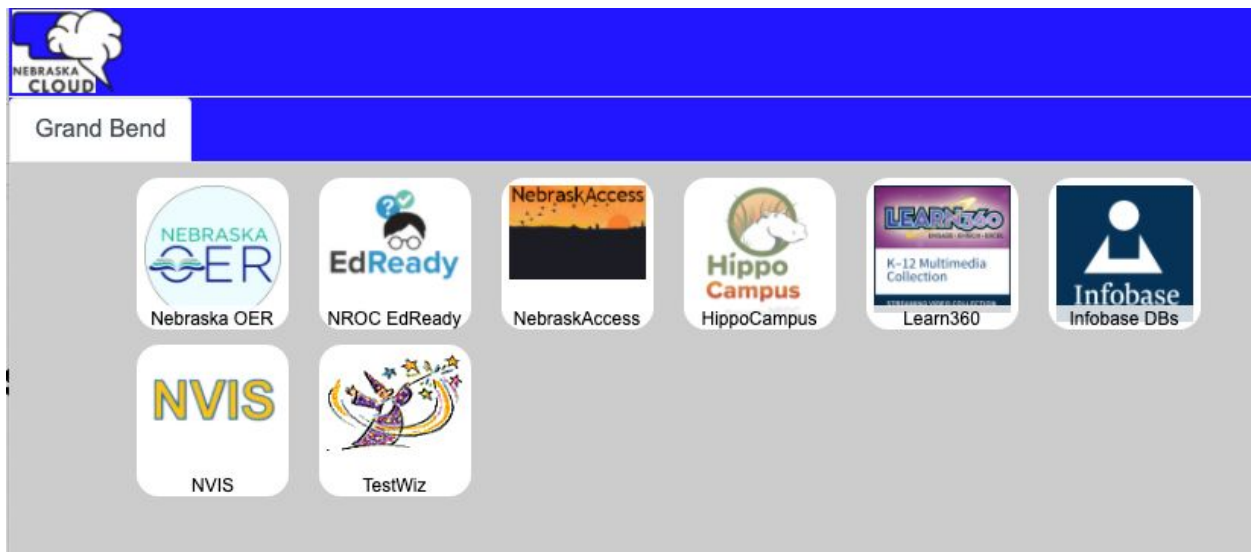
ESUCC Information Services Update

Software Innovation Network

In the current remote environment efforts have shifted to information gathering and needs analysis, toward prioritizing the CARES act resources and providing technological supports in this new time. The [NDE Commissioner's public survey](#), direct interviews with stakeholders, discussions with NOC and other ESU affiliate leaders, and other channels of input are all coming together to help prioritize and direct work in this area. It seems the NDE plans to announce additional resources during May to address the gathered reported needs.

The Academic Advancement Plan (AAP) application has received some new attention based on the remote operations now in place at schools. Dean Folkers and I have discussed using some contract development work to update this software to improve communications between Interim Program Schools and resident districts.



The new app launch portal (screen shot above) is available to all districts statewide and is populated by default with freely available apps and resources.

DE²TAILS

Xin Wang from RMC has provided the final evaluation report for the project and it is included as a separate attachment on the meeting today.

Nebraska Cloud Hosting

With changes in priorities, I have developed a new project plan to finally remove our servers from the Nebraska Hall data center and adjust the hosting contract to only include the off-site backup server. The new plan has us completing those moves by the end of May. This could be impacted due to the data center currently being closed for outside access.

SRS

During April, the focus of the SRS development team was ADVISER reporting. The team has released 10 fixes into the live system since our last board meeting. Helpdesk calls are down, and Minh is taking these via his cell phone at home at this time. The SRS was held via Zoom on the afternoon of April 20th. Reports from the field show that the improvements in the system are noticed and many areas reported no or very minor problems in their daily operations. We are at the threshold to move from fixing to improving even more. Future enhancements include support for 504 plans and an administrative dashboard or checklist to help administrative users see a concise list of problems such as errors reporting students to ADVISER, expired forms, or incomplete data. A beginning design of the support for 504 plans is among the plans for May.

Grand Island will be transitioning away from SRS during the 2020-2021 school year as they adopt the Edupoint Synergy product and our team has met with them about a data interchange to make that a smooth process.

During April, the focus of the SRS development team was ADVISER reporting. The team has released 10 fixes into the live system since our last board meeting. Helpdesk calls are down, and Minh is taking these via his cell phone at home at this time. The SRS was held via Zoom on the afternoon of April 20th. Reports from the field show that the improvements in the system are noticed and many areas reported no or very minor problems in their daily operations. We are at the threshold to move from fixing to improving even more. Future enhancements include support for 504 plans and an administrative dashboard or checklist to help administrative users see a concise list of problems such as errors reporting students to ADVISER, expired forms, or incomplete data. A beginning design of the support for 504 plans is among the plans for May.

Grand Island will be transitioning away from SRS during the 2020-2021 school year as they adopt the Edupoint Synergy product and our team has met with them about a data interchange to make that a smooth process.

2020-2023 SPECIAL BUY AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the ESUCC and Sergeant Laboratories, Inc ("Contractor"). Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate the activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units. The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council was created by LB 603 in 2007 and officially came into existence on July 1, 2008. Cooperative Purchasing is a Project of ESUCC that has been in existence since 1968 with the purpose of providing the Educational Service Unit (ESU) member school districts ("Members") of Nebraska an opportunity to secure the maximum procurement value through cooperative synergies. The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) Advisory group serves as the steering committee for new and future cooperative buys statewide under its direction. A chief executive officer coordinates the statewide purchasing agreement between educational service units and their school districts and other serviceable entities. The Director of Cooperative Purchasing manages the program with the guidance of the ESUCC, Advisory Board, and the Fiscal Agent. ESUCC serves 17 ESUs that provide a statewide network of educational opportunities to approximately 245 school districts and more than 300,000 students.

In consideration of mutual covenants, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Scope of the Contract.** The Contractor shall provide Members the opportunity to purchase the goods and/or services as defined in **Exhibit A**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, at the prices set forth in this Agreement and its Exhibits.
- 2. Payment Terms/Payment Schedule.** Members shall pay for services rendered and/or for accepted goods on the terms and payment schedule as set forth in **Exhibit B** which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. Prices listed in Exhibit B shall remain in effect during the term of this Agreement unless agreed otherwise by the parties in writing.
- 3. Administrative Fee.** Contractor shall submit to ESUCC as an administrative fee a sum equal to two percent (2%) of the total gross dollar volume, less freight of all goods and services and excluding annual support and maintenance purchased by the ESUCC, ESUs, and Members. This fee will be submitted to ESUCC on a quarterly basis beginning three months from the Effective Date of this Agreement for all transactions completed and paid during said quarter.

4. **Term.** This Agreement is effective on July 1, 2020 ("Effective Date") and shall continue until 12:00 midnight (CST) on June 30, 2023, unless terminated earlier as provided by this Agreement or by law.
5. **Governing Law; Designation of Forum.** This Agreement is governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Nebraska. Any action to enforce this Agreement must be brought in the state or federal courts of the State of Nebraska. Mandatory and exclusive venue for any disputes shall be in Sarpy County, Nebraska.
6. **Student Privacy Protections.**
 - A. **Definition of Data.** Data include all Personally Identifiable Information (PII), Member Data, and other non-public information. Data include, but are not limited to, student data, metadata, and user content.
 - B. **Definition of Member Data.** Member Data includes all PII and other information that is not intentionally made generally available by ESUCC or its Members on public websites or publications, including but not limited to business, administrative and financial data, intellectual property, and student and personnel data and metadata.
 - C. **Definition of Personally Identifiable Information.** Personally Identifiable Information includes but is not limited to: personal identifiers such as name, address, phone number, date of birth, Social Security number, and student or personnel identification number; "personal information" as used in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 84-712.05 and personally identifiable information contained in student education records as that term is defined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 USC 1232g.
 - D. **Definition of User.** User means a participant, instructor, or administrator of ESUCC or its Members who are authorized with login credentials by ESUCC or its Members to use the goods and/or services provided by this Agreement.
 - E. **Data De-Identification.** Contractor may use deidentified Data for product development, research, or other purposes. De-identified Data will have all direct and indirect personal identifiers removed. This includes, but is not limited to, name, ID numbers, date of birth, demographic information, location information, and school ID. Furthermore, Contractor agrees not to attempt to re-identify deidentified Data and not to transfer de-identified Data to any party unless that party agrees not to attempt reidentification.
 - F. **Marketing and Advertising.** Contractor will not use any Data to advertise or market to students or their parents. Advertising or marketing may be directed to the ESUCC, Members, or their school districts only if student information is properly de-identified."
 - G. **Modification of Terms of Service.** Contractor will not change how Data are collected, used, or shared under the terms of this Agreement in any way without

advance notice to and consent from the ESUCC, the Members, and the affected school district(s).

- H. **Data Collection.** Contractor will only collect Data necessary to fulfill its duties as outlined in this Agreement.
- I. **Data Use.** Contractor will use Data only for the purpose of fulfilling its duties and providing services under this Agreement, and for improving services under this Agreement.
- J. **Data Mining.** Contractor is prohibited from mining Data for any purposes other than those agreed to by the parties. Data mining or scanning of user content for the purpose of advertising or marketing to students or their parents is prohibited.
- K. **Data Sharing.** Data cannot be shared with any additional parties without prior written consent of the User except as required by law.
- L. **Data Transfer or Destruction.** Contractor will ensure that all Data in its possession and in the possession of any subcontractors, or agents to which the Contractor may have transferred Data, are destroyed or transferred to the ESUCC under the direction of the ESUCC when the Data are no longer needed for their specified purpose, at the request of the Member.
- M. **Rights and License in and to Data.** Parties agree that all rights, including all intellectual property rights, shall remain the exclusive property of the Member, and Contractor has a limited, nonexclusive license solely for the purpose of performing its obligations as outlined in the Agreement. This Agreement does not give Contractor any rights, implied or otherwise, to Data, content, or intellectual property, except as expressly stated in the Agreement. This includes the right to sell or trade Data.
- N. **Access.** Any Data held by Contractor will be made available to a Member upon request by the Member.
- O. **Security Controls.** Contractor will store and process Data in accordance with industry best practices. This includes appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to secure Data from unauthorized access, disclosure, and use. Contractor will conduct periodic risk assessments and remediate any identified security vulnerabilities in a timely manner. Contractor will also have a written incident response plan, to include prompt notification of the Member in the event of a security or privacy incident, as well as best practices for responding to a breach of PII. Contractor agrees to share its incident response plan upon request.
- P. **Response to Legal Orders, Demands or Requests for Data.** Except as otherwise expressly prohibited by law, Contractor will:
 - (1) Promptly notify ESUCC and Members of any subpoenas, warrants, or other legal orders, demands or requests received by Contractor seeking Data;
 - (2) Consult with ESUCC and Members regarding its response;

- (3) Cooperate with ESUCC's and Member's reasonable requests in connection with efforts by them to intervene and quash or modify the legal order, demand or request; and
- (4) Upon ESUCC's or a Member's request, provide them with a copy of its response.

7. Termination.

A. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement in whole or part if funding from federal, state, or other sources for ESUCC or its Members is not obtained and continued at levels sufficient to allow for purchase of the good and/or services in the indicated quantities or term. ESUCC shall notify the Contractor as soon as practicable if funds to meet ESUCC's or Members' obligations become unavailable. The determination of ESUCC as to the insufficiency of funds is conclusive.

B. Each party may terminate this Agreement if the other party breaches or is in default of any material obligation hereunder which default is incapable of cure, or which, being capable of cure, has not been cured within thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice of such default or such additional cure period as the nondefaulting party may authorize in writing.

C. Each party may terminate this Agreement by written notice if federal or state laws or rules are modified or interpreted in a way that the services are no longer allowable or appropriate for purchase under this contract or are no longer eligible for the funding proposed for payments authorized by this contract.

D. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, by written notice to the Contractor and may regard the Contractor in default of this Agreement if the Contractor becomes:

- (1) Insolvent;
- (2) Makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors;
- (3) Files a voluntary petition of bankruptcy;
- (4) Suffers or permits the appointment of a receiver for its business or assets;
- (5) Becomes subject to any proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency law, whether domestic or foreign; or
- (6) Has wound up or liquidated, voluntarily or otherwise.

E. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, immediately, without notice, if the Contractor is debarred or suspended from performing services on any public contracts.

F. The parties may terminate this Agreement without cause by mutual written consent or by either party with a minimum of ninety (90) days written notice.

G. Upon the termination for any reason or expiration of this Agreement, the Contractor promptly must return to ESUCC all papers, materials and other property

of ESUCC then in its possession, including but not limited to all work in progress as is appropriate in its then existing form to ESUCC.

8. Indemnification.

A. The Contractor hereby waives and agrees to indemnify and save harmless ESUCC and the ESUs and their officials, agents, employees, and volunteers (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Indemnities"), against any and all claims of injuries, death, damage to property, liabilities, judgments, costs and expenses which may otherwise accrue against Indemnities in consequence of the granting of this Agreement or which may otherwise result therefrom.

B. The Contractor shall, at his or her own expense, appear, defend and pay all charges of attorneys and all costs and other expenses arising therefrom or incurred in connection therewith.

C. If any judgment shall be rendered against ESUCC or the ESUs in any such action, the Contractor shall, at his or her own expense, satisfy and discharge the same.

D. Any performance bond or insurance protection required by this contract, or otherwise provided by the Contractor, shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify and save harmless and defend the Indemnities as herein provided.

E. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify and save harmless any Indemnities will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement by either party for any reason.

9. Insurance. Contractor shall secure and keep in force during the term of this Agreement the following insurance coverages from insurance companies or government self-insurance pools authorized to do business in Nebraska:

A. Commercial general liability, including premises or operations, contractual, and products or completed operations coverages (if applicable), with minimum liability limits of \$1,000,000 per person and \$5,000,000 per occurrence; and

B. If applicable, workers compensation coverage meeting all statutory requirements.

The Contractor shall furnish a certificate of insurance to the undersigned ESUCC representative prior to commencement of this Agreement. Failure to provide insurance as required in this agreement is a material breach of contract entitling ESUCC to terminate this Agreement immediately.

10. Public Records. The Contractor acknowledges that ESUCC must comply with Neb. Rev. Stat. § 84-712 through § 84-713 and release public records as defined law upon request, which may include this Agreement and all records created and maintained in relation to this Agreement.

- 11. Publicity.** ESUCC does not endorse the goods or services of the Contractor. Except for listing ESUCC as a client during the term of this Agreement, news releases or other publicity concerning this Agreement must not be made by the Contractor without the prior written approval of ESUCC.
- 12. Drug/Alcohol/Tobacco/Weapons Free Workplace.** The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not manufacture, sell, distribute, dispense, possess or use controlled substances or marijuana, as defined by Nebraska law, during the performance of this Agreement while on ESUCC, ESU, or Member premises or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not possess any weapon, as defined by Nebraska law and the federal "Drug-Free Schools Act," on ESUCC, ESU, or Member property or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, also shall adhere to all ESUCC, ESU, and Member policies and regulations that prohibit the possession, distribution, sale, dispensation, or use of any alcohol or tobacco products while on ESUCC, ESU, or Member premises or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. Failure to comply with this provision may be considered a material breach. ESUCC may suspend or terminate the Contractor, subcontractor, or both if it violates these laws, regulations, or policies or this provision.
- 13. Nondiscrimination.** The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant who is to be employed for performance of this Agreement with respect to his or her hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, because of his race, color, religion, sex, disability, or national origin.
- 14. Independent Contractor.** Contractor is an independent contractor under this contract and is not an ESUCC, ESU, or Member employee for any purpose. The Contractor retains sole and absolute discretion in the manner and means of carrying out Contractor's activities and responsibilities under this Agreement, except to the extent specified in this Agreement.
- 15. Employment Eligibility Verification.** The Contractor shall use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of employees hired on or after October 1, 2009 and who are physically performing services within the State of Nebraska. If the Contractor employs or contracts with any subcontractor in connection with this Agreement, the Contractor shall include a provision in the contract requiring the subcontractor to use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of new employees physically performing services within the State of Nebraska.
- 16. Taxpayer Identification.** Contractor's federal employer identification number is: 39-1952680
- 17. Sales Tax.** ESUCC, ESUs, and Members are exempt from sales tax and shall not pay any sales tax under this Agreement. ESUCC, ESUs and/or Members will provide the Contractor with applicable sales tax exemption certificates upon written request.

18. Notice. Each party giving any Notice ("Notice") under this Agreement must give written Notice by personal delivery, registered or certified Mail (in each case, return receipt requested and postage prepaid), or nationally recognized overnight courier (with all fees prepaid.) Notice shall be sent to the following addressees at the following addresses:

Notice is effective only if the party giving the Notice has complied with this section.

19. Warranties and Specifications. Contractor shall be responsible for providing to Members all manufacturer warranties on all goods and services. Contractor shall provide Members with all attachments normally supplied by the manufacturer and/or supplier. Complete product specification sheets or brochures must be provided to Members, ESUs, or ESUCC upon request.

20. Entire Agreement. The Agreement is the complete and exclusive expression of the parties' agreement on the matters contained in this Agreement. All prior and contemporaneous negotiations and agreements between the parties on the matters contained in this Agreement are expressly merged into and superseded by this Agreement.

21. Amendments and Modifications. The parties may amend or modify this Agreement only by a signed, written agreement by both parties that identifies itself as an amendment or modification to this Agreement. No other alternations in the terms of this agreement shall be valid or binding.

22. Waivers. The parties may waive any provision in this Agreement only by a writing executed by the party or parties against whom the waiver is sought to be enforced. No failure or delay: (1) In exercising any right or remedy, **or** (2) In requiring the satisfaction of any condition under this Agreement, **and** (3) No act, omission, or course of dealing between the parties operates as a waiver or estoppel of any right, remedy or condition. A waiver made in writing on one occasion is effective only in

that instance and only for the purpose stated. A waiver once given is not to be construed as a waiver on any future occasion or against any other Person.

- 23. Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement remain in full force, if the essential terms and conditions of this Agreement for each party remain enforceable.
- 24. Counterparts.** The parties may execute this Agreement in multiple counterparts, each of which constitutes an original, and all of which, collectively, constitute only one agreement. The signatures of all of the parties need not appear on the same counterpart, and delivery of an executed counterpart signature page by facsimile or other electronic means is as effective as executing and delivering this Agreement in the presence of the other parties to this Agreement. This Agreement is effective upon delivery of one executed counterpart from each party to the other parties. In proving this Agreement, a party must produce or account only for the executed counterpart of the party to be charged.
- 25. Force Majeure.** Neither party shall be liable for any loss or damage suffered by the other party, directly or indirectly, as a result of the non performing party's failure to perform, or delay in performing, any of its obligations contained in this contract (except any obligations to make payments for services rendered or accepted goods received before the failure to perform or the delay in performance), where, in the opinion of ESUCC, such failure or delay is cause by circumstances beyond the non performing party's control or which make performance commercially impracticable, including but not limited to fire, flood, storm or other natural disaster, explosion, accident, war, riot, civil disorder, government regulations or restrictions of any kind or any acts of any government, alien enemy, judicial action, power failure, acts of God, or other natural circumstances. This Force Majeure provision excludes economic hardship, changes in market conditions, and insufficiency of funds on the part of Contractor.
- 26. Assignment.** This Agreement binds the parties and their respective successors and assignees. The Contractor shall not assign or otherwise dispose of this Agreement or any duty, right, or responsibility contemplated in this Agreement to any other person without the previous written consent of ESUCC.
- 27. Subcontractors.** The Contractor shall not subcontract services or any part of this Agreement without the prior written consent of ESUCC.
- 28. Captions.** The descriptive headings of the Articles, Sections and subsections of this Agreement are for convenience only, do not constitute a part of this Agreement, and do not affect this Agreement's construction or interpretation.
- 29. Rights and Remedies Cumulative.** Any enumeration of ESUCC's rights and remedies set forth in this Agreement is not exhaustive. ESUCC's exercise of any right or remedy under this Agreement does not preclude the exercise of any other right or remedy. All of the ESUCC's rights and remedies are cumulative and are in addition to any other right or remedy set forth in this Agreement, any other agreement

between the parties, or which may now or subsequently exist at law or in equity, by statute or otherwise.

30. Relationship Among Parties. This Agreement creates no relationship of joint venture, partnership, limited partnership, agency, or employer- employee between the parties, and the parties acknowledge that no other facts or relations exist that would create any such relationship between them. Neither party has any right or authority to assume or to create any obligation or responsibility on behalf of the other party except as my from time to time be provided by written instrument signed by both parties.

31. Rules of Construction. The parties hereto have each been represented by counsel, or had the opportunity to be represented, during the negotiation and execution of this Agreement, and therefore waive application of any law or rule of construction providing that ambiguities in the contract will be construed against the party drafting such contract.

32. Piggyback Clause. For the term of the Agreement and any mutually agreed extensions, other public agencies may purchase, lease-purchase, or rent the identical item(s) at the same price and upon the same terms and conditions as provided in this Agreement. The term "public agencies" means any county, city, village, school district, or agency of any state government or of the United States; any drainage district, sanitary and improvement district, or other municipal corporation or political subdivision of Nebraska; and any political subdivision of another state.

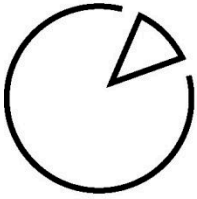

Section 1.01 – Cover Page: The information included in the Cover Page is true and correct and is part of this Agreement.

Section 1.02 -- Definitions: The following definitions shall apply:

- (14) Software: The term "Software" shall that product identified as "the Software" on the Cover Page, including all of the contents of the electronic files, whether on disk(s), CD-ROM(s) or other media, provided by Licensor under this Agreement.
- (15) Updates: The term "Update" shall mean: (a) any upgrades, modified versions, updates, additions, replacements and copies of the Software (current release only), if any, provided to Licensee by Licensor for the sole purpose of maintenance, error correction, or debugging of the Software, or (b) any upgrades, modified versions, replacements or additions to the Secure Data Vault Server (current model only), if any, provided to you by the Licensor for the sole purpose of maintenance, error correction, or debugging of the Product.
- (16) Unauthorized Access: The term "Unauthorized Access" shall mean any access to the Product or Documentation except for the exclusive purposes of: (a) use pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement; (b) internally demonstrating the performance, utility and functions of the Product for the sole purpose of use pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement; or (c) training employees of Licensee in the use of the Product pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

The foregoing grant of license excludes the right to modify all or any portion of the Software or the Product, or any Documentation, or to create any derivative works thereof, except as expressly authorized by Licensor in writing in advance. The use by Licensee of such modification or derivative work shall be subject to the terms of this Agreement, including all license restrictions set forth in this Article II, unless otherwise expressly agreed by Licensor in writing.

The Software and the Product may not be sublicensed or relicensed by Licensee nor be deployed or distributed to, or for the benefit of, any third party, including consultants, and may only be used for the internal business purposes of Licensee as specified in this Agreement. Licensee agrees not to sublicense, relicense, rent, assign, loan, lease or use the Software or the Product to provide service bureau, ASP, commercial time-sharing, or similar services to third parties, including consultants, or for any other activities or purposes not expressly authorized in this Agreement without the express, prior written consent of Licensor in each instance. Other than pursuant to a regularly scheduled and followed backup policy applicable to substantially all software licensed by Licensee, Licensee may make no more than one copy of the Software for back-up purposes in support of the use of the Product. Use of the Product is restricted to the number of users, CPUs, seats and/or servers and computer system and machine class, if applicable, for which License Fees have been paid, as specified in the Cover Page and/or in Schedule A (or as specified during user registration if this Agreement is being displayed and accepted electronically.).

Section 2.05 – Compliance Verification: At least once every calendar year and, absent reasonable suspicion of breach of this Agreement, no more than twice in one calendar year, Licensor shall be entitled, after giving Licensee at least five (5) days' notice and subject to Licensee's reasonable requirements relative to safety and security, to audit and inspect Licensee's records and facilities as is reasonably necessary for Licensor to ensure compliance with the provisions of this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if Licensor reasonably suspects that Licensee has breached this Agreement, Licensor may audit Licensee's Product-related activities with one (1) day's notice. Licensee shall maintain complete and accurate records, available on request to Licensor, indicating the location(s) where each Product has been installed and, as applicable, the Computer/computer system and the number of users, CPUs, seats, and servers for each Product. If Licensee's non-compliance with this Agreement has resulted in a loss that is equal to or greater than five percent (5%) of the License Fee paid to date for that year or is otherwise reasonably determined to be a material breach of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Licensee shall reimburse Licensor in full for the cost of such audit in addition to paying any other fees, costs, or damages associated with the non-compliance or breach.

Section 2.06 – Documentation Use: Documentation may be used only in support of authorized use of the Software and the Product as specified in this Agreement.

Section 2.07 – Services: Unless otherwise defined in a separate Extended Service Agreement or Product Maintenance Agreement, Support Services provided by Licensor to Licensee shall consist of technical phone support or e-mail support, at Licensor's discretion, offered for the duration of the Initial License Term only, related to: (a) installation, site preparation and planning; (b) user operation; and (c) Updates. The Initial License Term shall be 12 months beginning on the Effective Date as indicated on the Cover Page. Licensor agrees to provide Support Services specified in this Agreement on the Effective Date for the Initial License Term, using commercially

reasonable efforts in doing so. The non-refundable Service Charge must be paid in accordance with the terms of this Agreement in order for Licensee to be entitled to the Support Services for the Initial License Term. Licensor has no obligation to provide Support Services or any other services for: (i) altered or modified Software or Products; (ii) third party software or applications being used in conjunction with the Software or Products; (iii) Product Problems or other such problems which arise as a result of Licensee's negligence or fault, or from malfunctions of Licensee's hardware or its operating systems; (iv) Product Problems or other such problems which result from changes to the operating environment which make it incompatible with the operating environment for which the Software or Product was originally provided, including without limitation, additions or changes to hardware, operating systems, compilers, or co-resident software; nor has Licensor any obligation to assist Licensee to develop or debug applications which use the Software or Product. At any given time, Licensor shall provide Support Services for the then-current, general-release version of the Software and Product, and the immediately preceding general release version of such Software and Product, but only for a period of six (6) months following the general release of the then-current version of the Software and Product. In all cases, Licensor shall provide Support Services only during the Initial License Term and any Renewal Term.

Section 2.08 – Renewal: If, at least thirty (30) days before the end of the Initial License Term or any subsequent Renewal Term, Licensee does not notify, in writing, Licensor that Licensee will not renew this Agreement, then this Agreement shall be deemed automatically renewed by Licensee for an additional one year Renewal Term, which will include the right to Support Services. License Fees for such Renewal Term will be billed and must be paid in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. With regards to renewal of this Agreement, the License Fee is subject to reasonable increase at the sole discretion of Licensor. Licensee is entitled to receive Updates during the Initial License Term or any subsequent Renewal Term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE III: PAYMENT

Section 3.01 -- Fees: Licensee shall promptly pay the License Fee and Initial Service Charge within thirty (30) days of delivery of the Product. Additional Service Charges, costs, and fees for any services beyond those described in Section 2.07 will be charged for and invoiced separately at Licensor's discretion.

Section 3.02 -- Costs: Licensee shall pay all direct costs incurred by Licensor in providing Support Services or any other services pursuant to this Agreement. Such direct costs shall include (without limitation) postage, shipping, media charges, telephone, travel, material and reproduction costs.

Section 3.03 -- Invoicing and Payment: Licensor shall invoice Licensee monthly for any costs incurred by Licensor in providing Support Services or any other services under this Agreement or for any balance due on the License Fee. Upon request of Licensee, such invoices shall be accompanied by receipts evidencing such costs. Licensee shall pay any such invoice in full within thirty (30) days of receipt, or in the case of overdue License Fees or other overdue balances, within ten (10) days of receipt of the invoice. Any amounts payable by

Licensee hereunder that remain unpaid after the due date shall be subject to a late charge equal to the lesser of the maximum amount permissible by law or 1.5% per month from the due date until such amount is paid.

EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY SET FORTH IN SECTION 5.01 AND EXCEPT FOR ANY WARRANTY, CONDITION, REPRESENTATION OR TERM TO THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE SAME CANNOT OR MAY NOT BE EXCLUDED OR LIMITED BY LAW APPLICABLE TO LICENSEE IN LICENSEE'S JURISDICTION, LICENSOR AND ITS SUPPLIERS HEREBY EXPRESSLY DISCLAIM ANY AND ALL WARRANTIES, CONDITIONS, REPRESENTATIONS,

GUARANTEES OR TERMS (EXPRESS OR IMPLIED WHETHER BY STATUTE, COMMON LAW, CUSTOM, USAGE OR OTHERWISE) AS TO ANY MATTER INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION THE WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, INTEGRATION, SATISFACTORY QUALITY, FITNESS FOR ANY PARTICULAR PURPOSE, OR NON-INFRINGEMENT OF ANY INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS OF ANY THIRD PARTY.

Section 5.03 -- Defect Notice: Any Defect Notice must be received by Licensor within thirty (30) days after delivery of the Product. Upon receiving a Defect Notice from Licensee, Licensor shall review the asserted discrepancy to determine if the discrepancy is valid. If, in the reasonable professional judgment of Licensor the discrepancy is valid, Licensor's only obligation shall be, in the Licensor's sole discretion, to correct the discrepancy, using commercially reasonable efforts to do so, or to refund the portion of the License Fee appropriate to the particular defect in question. If, in the reasonable professional judgment of Licensor, such discrepancy is not valid, Licensor shall submit to Licensee a written explanation of the reasons why such asserted discrepancy is not valid. SAVINGS, EVEN IF A LICENSOR REPRESENTATIVE HAS BEEN ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH LOSS, DAMAGES, CLAIMS OR COSTS OR FOR ANY CLAIM BY ANY THIRD PARTY. THE FOREGOING LIMITATIONS AND EXCLUSIONS APPLY TO THE EXTENT PERMITTED BY APPLICABLE LAW IN LICENSEE'S JURISDICTION. In the event that any Licensee Enhancement does not qualify as a "work made for hire" as a matter of law, Licensee hereby

irrevocably and unconditionally agrees to assign and assigns all right, title and interest throughout the world in and to such Licensee Enhancements to Licensor and agrees to execute any and all documents and take any and all further actions required to confirm and perfect such assignment, at Licensor's request. Section 6.02 -- Reverse Engineering: Reverse engineering, disassembly, decompilation and other source code derivation of the Software or the Product are strictly prohibited.

- a. **Definition of the Annual Buy:** This is a line item bid were vendors are awarded by line item. If there is a tie for the bid price then a Nebraska vendor wins over an out of state vendor, otherwise it goes to a coin flip. Bids are sent to registered vendors nation-wide in October. Bid Awards announced in December and January, catalogs with over 4,200 items are published and distributed schools/members in February. The orders are then aggregated by address (all teacher/staff orders for items are aggregated into one line item per address) and sent to vendors in March and April and merchandise is delivered to the Cooperative members during May through July. The product categories offered are as follows: Electronics and Related Supplies, General Supplies, Furniture, Copier Paper, Maintenance-Shop Supplies, Health & Safety Supplies, Athletic Equipment & Supplies, Hot Lunch Equipment & Supplies, Science Equipment & Supplies, and Art Equipment & Supplies.
- b. **Paper Buy Recap** - Orders sent to Paper101 in the amount of \$856,459.15. This is down \$101,253.28 from 2019 totals.

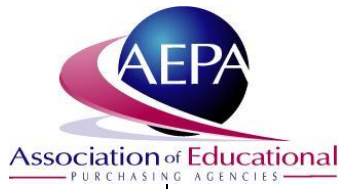

ARTICLE 1. Membership of the Organization

SECTION 1.1 Membership

The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies, Inc. (AEPA), a Nevada corporation, is a membership organization and its affairs shall be managed exclusively under the authority of its Board of Directors of the AEPA (Board).

SECTION 1.2 Limitation of Membership

AEPA will designate one member agency (hereinafter "Member") per state that is operating legally under the rules and regulations of that Member's state. Any additional educational entities that wish to participate in AEPA will negotiate with the authorized Member within that entity's state and participate through that Member in a manner in which the entity and Member agree, providing such agreement is not in conflict with any Board Policies or Procedures of AEPA. The Member will be the only communication link between AEPA and the non-Member entity in that Member's state.

SECTION 1.3 Membership Application

To become a Member of AEPA, a prospective member agency will submit to the President of AEPA an approved *Memorandum of Understanding* and *AEPA Application for Membership*, both signed by authorized Officers of the prospective member, making known their request for membership to AEPA.

SECTION 1.4 Membership Approvals

Membership must be approved by a majority vote of the total membership.

SECTION 1.5 Termination of Membership

Membership in AEPA may be terminated at the request of the Member or at any time by a vote of the majority of the total membership.

SECTION 1.6 Fiscal Liability

No Member shall be responsible for the debts, obligations or representations of any other Member.

ARTICLE 2. Board of Directors

SECTION 2.1 Number of Directors

The Board shall be composed of not more than two Directors per Member.

The Board shall increase or decrease the number of Directors with the addition or loss of Members. However, no action by the Board in increasing or decreasing the number of Directors shall have the effect of shortening any Director's term of office unless his/her membership terminates.

SECTION 2.2 Identification of the Board

The Member may change its Director(s) at will.

SECTION 2.3 Action by Unanimous Written Consent

If and when the Directors shall severally or collectively consent in writing to any action to be taken by AEPA, such action shall be as valid corporate action as though it had been authorized at a meeting of the Board. Consent in writing shall include email transactions.

SECTION 2.4 Power to Make Bylaws

The Board shall have power to make and amend any Bylaw or Bylaws, providing that the Board shall not make or alter any Bylaw or Bylaws fixing the qualifications, classifications or term of office of any Director of the then-existing Board.

SECTION 2.5 Power to Elect Corporate Officers

The Board shall elect from among the Directors a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer for the Corporation.

SECTION 2.6 Power to Elect Other Officers and Appoint Agents

The Board shall have power to elect such other Officers and appoint agents as the Board may deem necessary for transactions of the business of the Corporation.

2.6.1 Ex-officio Directors

At the discretion of the Board Ex-officio directors may be appointed to carry forth the duties as set forth by the Board for said Director. The Ex-officio Director is considered to be a non-voting member of the Board.

SECTION 2.7 Removal of Officers and Agents

Any Officer or agent may be removed by the Board whenever in the judgment of the Board the business interests of AEPA will be served thereby. Removal shall be by a vote of the majority of the total membership.

SECTION 2.8 Power to Fill Vacancies

The Board shall have power to fill any vacancy in any office occurring for any reason whatsoever.

SECTION 2.9 Delegation of Powers

For any reason deemed sufficient by the Board, whether occasioned by absence or otherwise, the Board may delegate all or any of the powers and duties of any office to any other Officer or Director, but no Officer or Director shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity.

SECTION 2.10 Power to Require Bonds

The Board at its expense may require any Officer or agent to file with AEPA a satisfactory bond conditioned for faithful performance of his or her duties.

SECTION 2.11 Compensation

The compensation, if any, of Directors, Officers and agents shall be fixed by the Board.

SECTION 2.12 Duties

The Board shall have the control and general management of the affairs and business of AEPA. In performing duties a Director must do so in good faith, with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances, and in a manner that the Director reasonably believes to be in the best interests of the mission, goals and purposes of the organization. An individual who has special skills or expertise has a duty to use such skills or expertise.

The duties of the Board shall include:

- 2.12.1 Establishing basic organizational and management Bylaws, Policies and Procedures.
- 2.12.2 Establishing, reviewing and approving program objectives and performance measures and significant transactions.
- 2.12.3 Hiring an independent auditor and reviewing and approving auditing and accounting principles and practices used in preparing the organization's financial statements.
- 2.12.4 Reviewing and approving the organization's budget and financial objectives, as well as investments, joint ventures and business transactions.
- 2.12.5 Establishing such policies as self-dealing, compensation of key employees and conflict of interest policies as deemed appropriate.
- 2.12.6 Establishing and overseeing a compliance program to address regulatory and liability concerns.
- 2.12.7 Ensuring that any salaries, wages, together with fringe benefits or other forms of compensation paid to or provided to an employee, Officer or Director do not exceed a value which is reasonable and commensurate with the duties and working hours associated with such employment and with the compensation ordinarily paid persons in similar positions with similar duties. In so doing, the Board shall make inquiry into and consider the compensation paid to individuals in other organizations similarly situated; and
- 2.12.8 At its discretion, the Board may designate a committee to perform any of the above duties.
- 2.12.9 Any employee or an individual having a contract for services, rendered on behalf of AEPA Inc., will adhere to all Bylaws, Policies and Procedures of AEPA Inc.

ARTICLE 3. Meetings

SECTION 3.1 Place of Meetings

Any or all meetings of the Board of AEPA may be held within or outside the State of Nevada. Date and location of all meetings will be determined by approved Board action and reflected in meeting minutes.

In the rare case when a meeting of the full Board, where Directors are physically present is impossible or ill-advised due to extenuating circumstances, AEPA Officers may decide to hold a "Virtual" meeting utilizing whatever electronic media is deemed appropriate to hold a meeting where a quorum of Directors are able to attend. Such virtual meetings may be the result of, but not limited to, the case of local, state or national emergencies or Acts of God prohibiting travel to the physical place of the scheduled meeting or where the congregation of groups the size of the AEPA Board would be banned by local, state or federal authorities.

SECTION 3.2 Annual Meeting

An Annual Meeting of the Board shall be held in the month of March or April, the purposes of which shall be the validation of a Board, annual financial review, election of Officers and transacting any other business properly brought before it.

SECTION 3.3 Notice of Annual Meeting

At least three (3) months prior to the date fixed by Section 3.2 of this Article for the holding of the Annual Meeting of the Board, written notice, including the time and place of such meeting, shall be mailed or emailed, as herein provided, to each Member of the Board entitled to vote at such meeting.

SECTION 3.4 Delayed Annual Meeting

If, for any reason, the Annual Meeting of the Board shall not be held during the months of March or April, such meeting may be called and held as a special meeting, and the same proceedings may be had there as at an Annual Meeting, provided that the Notice of such meeting shall be the same herein required for the annual meeting, namely, not less than a three (3) month notice.

SECTION 3.5 Order of Business at Annual Meeting

The order of business at the Annual Meeting of the Board shall be as follows:

- 3.5.3. Reading of Minutes of Last Meeting
- 3.5.4. Report of President
- 3.5.5. Report of Secretary – validation of the Board

- 3.5.7. Election of Officers
- 3.5.8. Transaction of Other Business

Transaction of other business mentioned in the Notice, or other business or issues which a majority of the Directors present decide should be added to the Agenda.

3.5.9. Adjournment

In the absence of any objection, the presiding officer may vary the order of business at his or her discretion.

SECTION 3.6 Regular Meeting of the Board

A Regular Meeting of the Board shall be held in the month of October, November or December. Three (3) month Notice of regular meetings of the Board shall be required.

3.6.1 Open Meetings

Any meeting (Board of Directors, or Executive Committee) of AEPA Inc. shall be considered an open meeting unless action by the Board dictates the meeting to be closed. Before closing a meeting, the Board shall make a statement on the record and provide the specific grounds for the meeting to be closed. Such grounds may include but are not limited to: alleged victims or reporters of criminal sexual conduct, domestic violence, maltreatment, active criminal investigations, non-public data, medical records, consideration of allegations or charges of an employee or Director, labor negotiations, employee evaluations, property transactions, security matters or upon the advice of legal counsel to maintain attorney-client privilege.

SECTION 3.7 Special Meeting of the Board

Special meetings of the Board may be called by a majority of the Directors with three (3) months' Notice by mail or email. Action taken at any such meeting shall not be invalidated for want of notice if such notice shall be waived as provided in Section 3.9 Hereof.

SECTION 3.8 Notices and Mailings

All Notices required to be given by any provision of these Bylaws shall state the authority pursuant to which they are issued (such as "by order of the President," or "by order of the Board" as the case may be). Notice may be given by United States mail and shall be deemed duly served when the same has been deposited in the United States mail, first class, with postage fully prepaid, plainly addressed to the addressee at his or her last address appearing upon the records of AEPA. Notice may also be provided by email sent to the addressee's last email address appearing on the records of AEPA provided such notice is verified by receipt.

SECTION 3.9 Waiver of Notice

Notice of the time, place and purpose of any meeting of the Board may be waived in writing, either before, during or after such meeting has been held.

SECTION 3.10 Roberts Rules of Order

Meetings shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.

ARTICLE 4. Quorum

SECTION 4.1 Quorum

A majority of the total number of Members shall constitute a quorum. A quorum shall

be required to take action at any meeting of the Board, unless otherwise stated. ~~These same quorum rules would apply in the event of a Virtual meeting.~~

ARTICLE 5. Voting, Elections and Proxies

SECTION 5.1 Who Is Entitled to Vote

At every meeting of the Board, each Member has one vote upon each item of business submitted to a vote.

SECTION 5.2 Elections

Election of Officers shall be held annually at the spring meeting. Nominations for Officers shall be solicited by a nominating committee of three (3) Member representatives appointed by the AEPA President in advance of the meeting and from the floor prior to the vote. A person shall be elected to an office upon receipt of a majority vote. When there are two or more nominees for a position, there shall be a private written ballot counted by a committee of Directors.

SECTION 5.3 Proxies

Proxy voting is not allowed.

SECTION 5.4 Majority Voting

A majority of those Members constituting a quorum is required to take official action unless otherwise stated.

SECTION 5.5 Electronic Voting

5.5.1 The President may ~~use~~ authorize electronic voting when, in his or her opinion, it is not practical to hold the vote during membership meetings. An electronic vote by email will require that a motion be made and seconded. The motion, along with the name of the ~~Member-Director~~ representatives who made the motion and seconded it, will be included in the email. 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ARTICLE 6. Corporate Officers

SECTION 6.3 Executive Director

The Executive Director shall provide the President and Board regular and up-to-date information regarding the business of AEPA. SECTION 6.4 Vice Presidents

At least one Vice President shall be elected by the Board. Such Vice Presidents (indicated as First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President), in the order of their position rank, shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the President during the absence or disability of the President. The Vice President(s) shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or by the President. The President and Vice President may not be from the same Member.

SECTION 6.5 Secretary

The Secretary shall be elected by the Board and shall be invited to attend all meetings of the Board, and shall preserve the books of AEPA, true minutes of the proceedings of all such meetings and record keeping including minutes of the meetings. If the Secretary is not in attendance, the President or meeting chair shall appoint a secretary pro-temp for that meeting. He or she shall disburse the funds of AEPA as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the President and Directors at the

regular meetings of the Board, and whenever requested by them, an account of all his or her transactions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of AEPA. If required by the Board, he or she shall deliver to the President, and shall keep in force, a bond at the expense of AEPA in form, amount and with a surety or securities satisfactory to the Board, conditioned for faithful performance of the duties of his or her office, and for restoration to AEPA in case of his or her death, resignation, retirement or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money and property of whatever kind in his or her possession or under his or her control belonging to AEPA. He or she shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or by the President. The Treasurer may not be from the same Member as the President, Vice President(s) or Secretary.

SECTION 6.7 Term of Office

The term of office for all Officers shall be two (2) years or until their successors have been duly elected and qualified. The term of each office shall be July 1 through June 30. Election of the President and Treasurer shall be in odd-numbered years, and the Vice President(s) and Secretary in the even-numbered years. Election of Officers shall be held at the Annual Meeting of the Board or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

SECTION 6.8 Additional Officers

Additional Officers may be elected at the determination of the Board.

SECTION 6.9 Resignation

Any Officer of AEPA may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Officers of the Board. Such resignation shall take effect at the time specified therein; and unless otherwise specified therein, acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

ARTICLE 7. Indemnification

SECTION 7.1 Indemnification

The Corporation will indemnify each Member, Director, Officer, and the Executive Director of AEPA, and their heirs, legal representatives and assigns, against expenses, costs and attorney's fees actually and reasonably incurred in connection with the defense of any action, suit or proceeding, civil or criminal, in which the Member, Director, Officer, and the Executive Director is made a party by reason of being or having been a Member, Director, Officer and the Executive Director of AEPA. The indemnification may include any amounts paid to satisfy a judgment or to compromise or settle a claim. The Member, Director or Officer will not be indemnified if he or she is adjudged to have been guilty of willful misconduct or recklessness in the performance of his or her duty to AEPA.

ARTICLE 8. Corporate Seal

SECTION 8.1 Seal

The Board shall provide an appropriate seal bearing the name of the Corporation, which shall be the corporate seal. It shall be in the custody of the Secretary and shall be affixed to documents as authorized by these Bylaws, the President or by the Board.

SECTION 8.2 Failure to Affix Seal

The failure to affix the corporate seal shall not have any effect on the validity of any document.

ARTICLE 9. Execution of Instruments

SECTION 9.1 Checks and Drafts

All checks, drafts and orders for payment of money shall be signed in the name of AEPA and shall be countersigned by such Officers or agents as the Board shall from time to time designate for that purpose.

SECTION 9.2 Contracts, Conveyances or Other Instruments

When the execution of any contract, conveyance or other instrument has been authorized without specification of the executing Officers, the President, or any Vice President, and the Secretary, may execute the same on behalf of AEPA and may affix the corporate seal thereto. The Board shall have power to designate the Officers and agents who shall have authority to execute any instrument on behalf of AEPA.

SECTION 9.3 Documents

All AEPA Inc. documents are property of the organization. They must be released back to the organization within 30 days in the event of an Officer, Director or agent of the Board's resignation or removal.

ARTICLE 10. Power of Board to Borrow Money

SECTION 10.1 Borrowing Money

The Board shall have no power or authority to borrow money.

ARTICLE 11. Adoption, Amendments and Precedence of Bylaws

SECTION 11.1 Adoption

These AEPA Bylaws are adopted by the Board of Directors on this 27th day of July 2007.

SECTION 11.2 Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended, altered, added to or repealed by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the total membership, providing the amendment, alteration, addition or repeal is proposed at an annual, regular or special meeting of the Board and adopted at a subsequent meeting.

SECTION 11.3 Precedence

Articles of Incorporation shall take precedence over the Bylaws. The Bylaws shall take precedence over the Board Policies and Procedures.

ARTICLE 1. Membership of the Organization

SECTION 1.1 Membership

The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies, Inc. (AEPA), a Nevada corporation, is a membership organization and its affairs shall be managed exclusively under the authority of its Board of Directors of the AEPA (Board).

SECTION 1.2 Limitation of Membership

AEPA will designate one member agency (hereinafter "Member") per state that is operating legally under the rules and regulations of that Member's state. Any additional educational entities that wish to participate in AEPA will negotiate with the authorized Member within that entity's state and participate through that Member in a manner in which the entity and Member agree, providing such agreement is not in conflict with any Board Policies or Procedures of AEPA. The Member will be the only communication link between AEPA and the non-Member entity in that Member's state.

SECTION 1.3 Membership Application

To become a Member of AEPA, a prospective member agency will submit to the President of AEPA an approved *Memorandum of Understanding* and *AEPA Application for Membership*, both signed by authorized Officers of the prospective member, making known their request for membership to AEPA.

SECTION 1.4 Membership Approvals

Membership must be approved by a majority vote of the total membership.

SECTION 1.5 Termination of Membership

Membership in AEPA may be terminated at the request of the Member or at any time by a vote of the majority of the total membership.

SECTION 1.6 Fiscal Liability

No Member shall be responsible for the debts, obligations or representations of any other Member.

ARTICLE 2. Board of Directors

SECTION 2.1 Number of Directors

The Board shall be composed of not more than two Directors per Member.

The Executive Director is recommended by the Executive Committee and contracted to serve the association by a vote of the Board of AEPA. He or she shall have the responsibility of day to day management of the business of AEPA and shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. The Executive Director shall provide the President and Board regular and up-to-date information regarding the business of AEPA. The Executive Director shall support and assist to facilitate all committee meetings as needed with Committee Chairs. The Executive Director, along with the President of AEPA shall be jointly responsible to foster communication. The Executive Director shall facilitate all AEPA meetings.

SECTION 6.4 Vice Presidents

At least one Vice President shall be elected by the Board. Such Vice Presidents (indicated as First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President), in the order of their position rank, shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the President during the absence or disability of the President. The Vice President(s) shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or by the President. The President and Vice President may not be from the same Member.

SECTION 6.5 Secretary

The Secretary shall be elected by the Board and shall be invited to attend all meetings of the Board, and shall preserve the books of AEPA, true minutes of the proceedings of all such meetings and record keeping including minutes of the meetings. If the Secretary is not in attendance, the President or meeting chair shall appoint a secretary pro-temp for that meeting. The minutes of the meeting will be distributed to all Members and placed on the AEPA website within 30 days of the meeting. The Secretary shall safely keep in his or her custody the seal of the Corporation and shall have the authority to affix the same to all instruments where its use is required. He or she shall give all notices required by statute, bylaw or resolution. He or she shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or by the President. The Secretary may not be from the same Member as the President or Vice Presidents.

SECTION 6.6 Treasurer

The Treasurer or President's designee shall have custody of all corporate funds and securities and shall keep in books, belonging to AEPA, full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements; he or she shall deposit all monies, securities and other valuable effects in the name of AEPA in such depositories as may be designated for that purpose by the Board. He or she shall disburse the funds of AEPA as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the President and Directors at the regular meetings of the Board, and whenever requested by them, an account of all his or her transactions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of AEPA. If required by the Board, he or she shall deliver to the President, and shall keep in

force, a bond at the expense of AEPA in form, amount and with a surety or securities satisfactory to the Board, conditioned for faithful performance of the duties of his or her office, and for restoration to AEPA in case of his or her death, resignation, retirement or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money and property of whatever kind in his or her possession or under his or her control belonging to AEPA. He or she shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or by the President. The Treasurer may not be from the same Member as the President, Vice President(s) or Secretary.

SECTION 6.7 Term of Office

The term of office for all Officers shall be two (2) years or until their successors have been duly elected and qualified. The term of each office shall be July 1 through June 30. Election of the President and Treasurer shall be in odd-numbered years, and the Vice President(s) and Secretary in the even-numbered years. Election of Officers shall be held at the Annual Meeting of the Board or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

SECTION 6.8 Additional Officers

Additional Officers may be elected at the determination of the Board.

SECTION 6.9 Resignation

Any Officer of AEPA may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Officers of the Board. Such resignation shall take effect at the time specified therein; and unless otherwise specified therein, acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

ARTICLE 7. Indemnification

SECTION 7.1 Indemnification

The Corporation will indemnify each Member, Director, Officer, and the Executive Director of AEPA, and their heirs, legal representatives and assigns, against expenses, costs and attorney's fees actually and reasonably incurred in connection with the defense of any action, suit or proceeding, civil or criminal, in which the Member, Director, Officer, and the Executive Director is made a party by reason of being or having been a Member, Director, Officer and the Executive Director of AEPA. The indemnification may include any amounts paid to satisfy a judgment or to compromise or settle a claim. The Member, Director or Officer will not be indemnified if he or she is adjudged to have been guilty of willful misconduct or recklessness in the performance of his or her duty to AEPA.

ARTICLE 8. Corporate Seal

SECTION 8.1 Seal

The Board shall provide an appropriate seal bearing the name of the Corporation, which shall be the corporate seal. It shall be in the custody of the Secretary and shall be affixed to documents as authorized by these Bylaws, the President or by the Board.

SECTION 8.2 Failure to Affix Seal

The failure to affix the corporate seal shall not have any effect on the validity of any document.

ARTICLE 9. Execution of Instruments

SECTION 9.1 Checks and Drafts

All checks, drafts and orders for payment of money shall be signed in the name of AEPA and shall be countersigned by such Officers or agents as the Board shall from time to time designate for that purpose.

SECTION 9.2 Contracts, Conveyances or Other Instruments

When the execution of any contract, conveyance or other instrument has been authorized without specification of the executing Officers, the President, or any Vice President, and the Secretary, may execute the same on behalf of AEPA and may affix the corporate seal thereto. The Board shall have power to designate the Officers and agents who shall have authority to execute any instrument on behalf of AEPA.

SECTION 9.3 Documents

All AEPA Inc. documents are property of the organization. They must be released back to the organization within 30 days in the event of an Officer, Director or agent of the Board's resignation or removal.

ARTICLE 10. Power of Board to Borrow Money

SECTION 10.1 Borrowing Money

The Board shall have no power or authority to borrow money.

ARTICLE 11. Adoption, Amendments and Precedence of Bylaws

SECTION 11.1 Adoption

These AEPA Bylaws are adopted by the Board of Directors on this 27th day of July 2007.

SECTION 11.2 Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended, altered, added to or repealed by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the total membership, providing the amendment, alteration, addition or repeal is proposed at an annual, regular or special meeting of the Board and adopted at a subsequent meeting.

SECTION 11.3 Precedence

Articles of Incorporation shall take precedence over the Bylaws. The Bylaws shall take precedence over the Board Policies and Procedures.

ARTICLE 1. Mission Statement

The mission of the Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies, Inc. (AEPA) is to cooperatively serve our Members through a continuous effort to explore and solve present and future purchasing needs. Our goals include working to secure multi-state volume purchasing contracts with benefits that are measurable, cost-effective and continuously exceed our Members' expectations. AEPA is committed to accomplishing this mission lawfully and ethically, using leading-edge technology and futuristic business practices.

ARTICLE 2. History and Governance of AEPA

SECTION 2.1 -The Initial Cooperative, Unincorporated Effort

2.1.1. First Meeting

The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies (AEPA-U) was formed in May of 2000 as a cooperative, unincorporated effort. There were seven states at the May 2000 meeting that became the founding states. They included Arizona, Indiana, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon and Washington. Three additional states (Kansas, Kentucky and Pennsylvania) became Members prior to award of the first AEPA-U bid in December of 2000.

2.1.2. First Solicitation

For its first solicitation, AEPA-U agreed on several principles, including the following: one simultaneous bid would be issued for all participating agencies, each agency would independently advertise the bid, the bid would be available on a web site with each state linking to that site, all questions regarding the bid would be answered in writing by one person, all bids would be received at one central site, bids would initially be approved or rejected by AEPA-U, there would be a one-year contract with three possible one-year extensions, no more than 12 agencies could participate in the first bid, and after AEPA-U approval, each Member would determine if contracts could be awarded in accordance with that state's laws and regulations.

2.1.3. Subsequent Efforts

Since the first bid, additional agencies have become AEPA-U Members by completing a Memorandum of Understanding, and additional bids have been prepared, advertised, distributed and approved in a method similar to the initial model. Bids have been developed and published each year, with bid AEPA-U 007 published in September 2006 with vendor approval granted in December 2006. The term of the bid for the first year is through February 28 (approximately 15 months after Board approval), and the remaining three extensions for one year are through the following February.

SECTION 2.2 Formation of the Corporation

AEPA was incorporated in March of 2007. Two items required for membership are an *Application for Membership* and the *Memorandum of Understanding*.

ARTICLE 3. The Enabling Documents

SECTION 3.1 AEPA Articles of Incorporation

The Articles of Incorporation determine the basic foundations of the Corporation.

SECTION 3.2 AEPA Bylaws

The Bylaws describe the basic organization of the Corporation and include Organization Membership, Board of Directors, Meetings, Quorum, Voting, Elections and Proxies, Corporate Officers, Indemnification, Corporate Seal, Execution of Instruments, Power to Borrow Money, and Amendment of Bylaws.

SECTION 3.3 AEPA Board Policies

The Policy mandates the processes to ensure AEPA retains the tax-exempt status of the Corporation. Key aspects include conflict of interest and disclosure, self-dealing and compensation of key employees.

SECTION 3.4 AEPA Procedures

The Procedures are intended to include items that are necessary for the operation of the corporation. Members are required to comply with the

established Procedures.

3.4.1 Strategic Alliance Agreement

A Strategic Alliance Agreement between AEPA and another organization, that has been approved by AEPA, shall have its contents implemented as if they are adopted AEPA Procedures.

ARTICLE 4. Definitions

SECTION 4.1 Majority

The *majority* shall be a simple majority of those present and voting at a meeting unless otherwise stated. A majority of total membership shall be required for amendment of Procedures (13.2).

SECTION 4.2 Approved Contract

AEPA approves a contract whose terms and conditions are then extended to AEPA Members.

SECTION 4.3 Awarded Contract

Members award contracts in compliance with the terms and conditions of the applicable AEPA-approved contract.

ARTICLE 5. Organization

SECTION 5.1 Committees

Unless otherwise noted, the President of AEPA with Board approval appoints all committees. At the discretion of the President of AEPA, committees may be added or dissolved as needed for the efficient operation of AEPA. All committees shall be composed of staff from at least two Members. Each committee shall elect a Chair.

5.1.1. Executive Committee

The Committee shall consist of the Corporate Officers, the chairs of the ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Committee, Enabling Documents Committee, Finance Committee, Marketing Committee, and four other at large Directors so named by the President as per Section 5.1. The at large Directors shall serve two-year terms, not to exceed six years. The function of the committee shall be, but is not limited to, review, plan and recommend AEPA items to the Board for approval. The corporate Officers, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall act on behalf of the Board on matters related to the business of AEPA within the adopted Bylaws, Policies, Procedures and the annual budget. Meeting dates shall be determined by the Officers and members are expected to attend all meetings.

5.1.2. ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Committee

Appointed by the ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Coordinator, the Committee will assist in the development of new ~~bidsolicitations~~ (including review of AEPA General Terms and Conditions, Agency Terms and Conditions,

bidsolicitation forms, item specifications and general format of the bidsolicitation) and work with the BidSolicitation Coordinator to refine bidsolicitation documents and procedures to ensure an efficient and professional solicitation process from start to finish. The BidSolicitation Committee will work with the BidSolicitation Coordinator to ensure the bidsolicitation is developed, published, distributed, monitored, opened and recommendations are made in a timely manner. The BidSolicitation Committee will also assist with responses to bidders-potential respondents and vendor partners regarding bid-solicitation documents and specifications.

This committee will be responsible for receiving, opening and tabulating bidsolicitation documents and initially determining if vendor responses are considered responsive according to the requirements published in the bidsolicitation specifications. All responses will be tabulated and reported to the Board. Responsive bids-respondents will be sent to the Category Committee for analysis.

5.1.3. Bid-Solicitation Utilization Committee

The Committee acts as a clearinghouse for vendor and Member contract awards, contract extensions and volume of sales. Membership utilization expectations, including both percent of contracts signed and volume per student, will be annually determined and disseminated at the spring meeting. Data will be tracked and reported to the membership at least twice a year. The BidSolicitation Utilization Committee membership shall include representation from both low-volume and high-volume Members.

5.1.4. Category Committee

A Category Committee will be established for each bidsolicitation technical category. The Committee will develop the commodity specifications for the bid-solicitation in an open nonrestrictive way to allow numerous bidders-respondents to have a chance to respond. They will also assist the Bid-Solicitation Solicitation Committee in developing the bid-solicitation evaluation criteria for the category to allow for an open and honest competition to select the recommended bidder responder or bidders-respondents responders—if the bidsolicitation allows for multiple awards. The Category Committee analyzes bidsolicitation responses and provides written reasons for recommending or not recommending bidsolicitation responses based on the evaluation criteria as outlined in the bidsolicitation documents.

The Category Committee assists the BidSolicitation Committee to answer questions received during the bidsolicitation process; reviews responsive bids-respondents making a recommendation to the membership for approval or rejection; monitors implementation of the contract in each state; receives and analyzes utilization information from the Bid Solicitation Utilization Committee; and makes recommendations to the membership for contract extensions. The Committee also receives marketing plans from vendors during extension process as required by the membership.

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5.1.5. Marketing Committee

The Committee promotes awareness of AEPA to potential Members, ~~bidders~~responders, vendors and the general public.

5.1.6. New Member Committee

The Committee solicits new membership from a qualified agency in non-member states. The Committee will also assist Members during their first year of affiliation with AEPA.

5.1.7. Partnerships Committee

The Committee continually evaluates the need for affiliation and partnership with other groups where a strategic alliance would be beneficial to AEPA.

5.1.8. Website Committee

The Committee maintains the AEPA website to be used both by the Members and general public. The website will be used to post information such as bid solicitations, meeting information, minutes and other items related to AEPA.

5.1.9. Enabling Documents Committee

The Committee reviews, updates and maintains the AEPA Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, Board Policies and Procedures, reporting annually to the membership.

5.1.10. Nominating Committee

The Committee solicits nominations for elected officers in advance of the meeting for presentation to membership.

5.1.11 Finance Committee

The Committee shall annually review the monies, securities and other valuable effects in the name of AEPA. The committee shall develop a system of tracking transactions, prepare required reports and determine when an independent audit is needed.

SECTION 5.2 BidSolicitation Coordinator

The BidSolicitation Coordinator is selected for a one-year term and will serve at the direction of the President of AEPA. BidSolicitation Committee members shall be from at least two other Members. The BidSolicitation Coordinator shall serve as the Chairman of the BidSolicitation Committee and will appoint one member of the committee to serve as Vice Chairman of the BidSolicitation Committee, who will assume the duties of the Chairman if the Chairman is unable to fulfill his or her duties. The BidSolicitation Committee Chairman and Vice Chairman may not be from the same agency. It shall be the responsibility of the BidSolicitation Coordinator to oversee the bid solicitation process, ensure that the bid solicitation(s) is/are developed, published, received and reviewed annually in accordance with AEPA Procedures and make recommendations to the President on changes and improvements to the bid solicitation process for efficiency and effectiveness.

ARTICLE 6. Financial

SECTION 6.1 Fees and Dues

An annual fee will be assessed to member agencies subject to the review and approval of the Board at the winter meeting. Payment will be due to AEPA Inc. on or before June 30 of the following year.

6.1.1 Registration Fees

Members will be required to pay a registration fee for AEPA meetings as determined by the Officers. Non-Members will be required to pay a registration fee for AEPA meetings as determined by the Officers. Any member or non-member that registers after the registration deadline will be assessed a late registration fee as determined by the Officers.

SECTION 6.2 Financial Report

The Treasurer for AEPA will provide the membership with a listing of all financial transactions at the annual and regular meeting, and at other times when requested by a majority of membership.

The Treasurer shall have custody of all corporate funds and securities and shall keep in books, belonging to AEPA full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements; he or she shall deposit or review the deposit of all monies, securities and other valuable effects in the name of AEPA in such depositories as may be designated for that purpose by the Board. He or she shall disburse or review the disbursement of the funds of AEPA as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for the disbursements, and shall render to the President and Directors at the regular meetings of the Board, and whenever requested by them, an account of all his or her transactions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of AEPA. If required by the Board he or she shall deliver to the President and shall keep in force a bond at the expense of AEPA in form, amount and with a surety or securities satisfactory to the Board, conditioned for faithful performance of duties or his or her office and for restoration to AEPA in case of his or her death, resignation, retirement or removal from office of all books, papers, vouchers, money and property of whatever kind in his or her possession or under his or her control belonging to AEPA. The Treasurer may not be from the same Member agency as the President, Vice President or Secretary.

SECTION 6.3 Receive and Disperse Funds

The President and/or Treasurer, as officers of the AEPA, Inc., or their designees as approved by the Board and/or the Executive Committee are authorized to receive and disperse AEPA funds in compliance with AEPA, Inc. Policy and Procedures.

SECTION 6.4 Expenditures

Any expenditure made by the approved officers of the AEPA, Inc. shall not be made from an account with a balance less than the expenditure.

SECTION 6.5 Trade Show Expense Reimbursement

Reimbursements for a maximum of two (2) Members to exhibit at national trade shows shall be determined and approved by the Board. Reimbursements shall not exceed \$20,000.00 annually including the following limitations per Member attending; Member shall use reasonable commercial efforts to obtain cost effective travel arrangements such as a competitive economy class airfare or mileage at the current IRS reimbursement rate, lodging at trade show rate a maximum of 3 nights, food up to \$50.00/day and other costs- cab, parking, shuttle (excludes rental car) not to exceed \$50.00.

SECTION 6.6 Credit Cards

This section is to identify the appropriate use of AEPA Inc. credit card program available to authorized members to make business related purchases for goods or services.

- 6.6.1. The Executive Committee of AEPA Inc. will designate members allowed to hold an AEPA Inc. credit card. Those issued a credit card must be a member and have an on-going need to make business purchases such as travel, meeting expenses or other related expenses.
- 6.6.2. Cardholders may not use the cards for personal purchases or loan their card to another individual, with the exception of individuals within the organization authorized by the cardholders to make purchases using the organization credit card.
- 6.6.3. Cardholders and approvers must ensure that purchases with the organization card comply with all AEPA Inc. policies and purchasing procedures. Funds must not be expended that cannot be supported with the AEPA Inc. budgets.
- 6.6.4. All purchases must be supported by itemized receipts. A scanned copy of the receipt or invoice must be e-mailed to the Treasurer within 30 days of the end of the month of the expenditure unless other arrangements have been made with the Treasurer. Cardholders must keep original copy of receipt or invoice for calendar year.
- 6.6.5. Cardholders who make non-business related, unauthorized purchases or purchases that cannot supported as a business expense by appropriate documentation will be personally responsible for those purchases. A misuse of an AEPA Inc. credit card may result in termination of credit card use for that individual member.
- 6.6.6. Cardholders are responsible for reporting card loss, theft, or unauthorized use to the Treasurer and/or Executive Committee as soon as they are aware of the occurrence.
- 6.6.7. The Treasurer shall submit to the Executive Committee on a regular basis a summary of financial transaction to include credit purchase and use at each Executive Committee meeting or when requested by the Board.

ARTICLE 7. Membership

SECTION 7.1 Minimum Level of Contract Participation

It is the responsibility of the Member to actively promote the use of AEPA contracts. Each Member shall complete the *Annual AEPA Member Report*. Any Member whose use falls below one-half of the ~~bids~~solicitations which the Member is legally allowed to use, shall present a report to the membership on the status of the AEPA contracts by their member agencies and the potential for future use. The Board shall suggest corrective action to the Member and monitor further usage of contracts by the Member. Action by the Board could include termination of membership.

SECTION 7.2 Compliance

It is the responsibility of each Member to ensure that the AEPA solicitation process and contracts are in compliance with its state laws. Members will make every effort to make their agency Terms and Conditions consistent with the Terms and Conditions of the majority of the Member states. AEPA assumes no liability for non-compliance with state, federal or local laws or regulations by any Member.

SECTION 7.3 Contract Usage Reports

Contracts must be monitored for use by the Member and the Member must provide contract usage information as authorized by AEPA.

SECTION 7.4 Meeting Participation

Each Member is expected to send at least one authorized representative to each of two required meetings. Not more than two representatives from each Member will be seated at the meeting table. The Presiding Officer may waive this procedure if space permits.

SECTION 7.5 Active Participation

Each Member will actively participate in and support the mission of the AEPA. Each member will serve on at least one or more AEPA committees, complete the annual Disclosure, Code of Conduct and any other forms so required by the Board. Members with special skills or expertise have a duty to serve in a leadership capacity of the organization.

SECTION 7.6 Member Conflict of Interest

7.6.1. Member Individual ~~Bid~~Solicitation

An AEPA Member may market and provide AEPA contracts in another Member state provided that both Members mutually agree in writing and the agreement is forwarded to the AEPA President.

AEPA Members that market or make available AEPA contracts in "non-AEPA" states will submit in writing to the AEPA President the following information: name of the state, name of the vendors, and the volume generated by the AEPA contracts.

~~Re-bidding-soliciting~~ AEPA contracts for use in other AEPA states is prohibited. Any alleged infraction must be documented- and- brought- to the- Board- for -review- and- action.

7.6.2. Financial Benefit

A Member that will or may receive any financial benefit from a vendor

or potential vendor beyond the stated administrative fee shall not participate in prohibited activities, including:

- 7.6.2.1. Drafting Solicitations to which the vendor might respond,
- 7.6.2.2. Contract Oversight Committee membership for any bidsolicitation that includes or could include the vendor,
- 7.6.2.3. Discussions regarding the vendor or potential vendor, or
- 7.6.2.4. Voting on approval or any other action related to the vendor or potential vendor.

7.6.3. New Member Use

AEPA encourages new Members to avail themselves of all AEPA contracts which they have the legal authority to perform.

7.6.4 Harmony

To promote harmony, Members shall cooperate as follows in marketing and selling items and services from AEPA contracts in non-member states.

7.6.4.1 Existing AEPA member relationships in non-member states.

7.6.4.1.1 All Members shall be grandfathered into non-member states or areas of non-Member states where, prior to March 1, 2008 they have had:

7.6.4.1.1.1 Sales within the last year, or

7.6.4.1.1.2 Written evidence of a plan with a vendor to market within that state.

7.6.4.1.2 Such effort shall be limited to 10 states per Member

7.6.4.2 Other than listed in (7.6.4.1) above, all Members shall submit to the AEPA President their request to market and sell in non-member states for each AEPA vendor contract they intend to market or sell.

7.6.4.2.1 Should more than one Member indicate intent to market or sell a specific vendor contract in a specific state, those Members shall discuss and resolve the conflict.

7.6.4.2.2 Should they not be able to reach an agreement, the vendor in question shall determine which Member shall have marketing and sales right for that non-Member state or part of that state.

7.6.4.3 A vendor may identify a specific state or states where they do not want their AEPA contract marketed or sold.

7.6.4.4 AEPA Members may discuss joint sales and marketing endeavors in a non- AEPA State and have the option to share the commission.

ARTICLE 8. Awarded Vendor Responsibilities

SECTION 8.1 Marketing

Each AEPA-approved vendor is expected to have a proactive marketing plan in place. If there is more than one contract for a vendor in the state of a Member, and the AEPA contract is more advantageous to the Member, then the vendor shall market the AEPA contract as the solution of choice.

SECTION 8.2 Reporting

Each vendor will report sales by state to the AEPA ~~Bid~~Solicitation Utilization Committee.

SECTION 8.3 Minimum Levels of Participation

It is the responsibility of the AEPA-approved vendor to actively promote the use of its AEPA-approved contracts. Each vendor shall complete the Annual AEPA Vendor Report. Any vendor whose use falls below sales to one-half to the Members shall present a report to the membership on the status of the use of their AEPA contracts and the potential for future use.

SECTION 8.4 Contract Term Length

AEPA contracts are awarded for an initial term of up to 15 months. Up to three annual extensions are available. Ending dates for all contracts awarded by individual Members shall coincide with the AEPA ending dates.

SECTION 8.5 Contract Extensions

Approved vendors can only extend the AEPA contract to current AEPA Members. If membership by a Member is terminated, extensions of the contract will not be available to that Member.

ARTICLE 9. ~~Bid Process~~ Bid/Proposal Process

SECTION 9.1 ~~Bid~~Solicitation Development

AEPA will use Common Law contracts, as the guiding guidance document for issuing RFP's. An approval process will be developed by the AEPA Administrative Solicitation Committee to allow an AEPA Category Committee to request to use an RFP process instead of an RFB IFB process.~~

~~Bid~~Solicitation development will be the overall responsibility of the ~~Bid~~Solicitation Coordinator. The ~~bid~~solicitation will contain five major parts

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that will be drafted by various people and/or committees as listed below.

- 9.1.2. General Terms and Conditions--Membership
- 9.1.3. State Terms and Conditions-- Each Member

SECTION 9.2 Advertising, Publication and Distribution

Each AEPA ~~Invitation for Bid (IFB) solicitation~~ will be a single issue simultaneously ~~bid solicitation~~ by all Members. ~~Bids-Solicitations~~ will be advertised and published by each Member. The ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Distribution Committee will track prospective ~~bidders-responders~~ that are notified of the ~~bid solicitation~~ availability.

SECTION 9.3 Questions

Only the ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Questions and Answers Committee will answer questions concerning the ~~bid-solicitation~~

SECTION 9.4 Receiving Bids

The ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Acceptance Committee will receive ~~bids-responses~~ and initially determine the responsive ~~bidders-responders-respondents~~

SECTION 9.5 Commodity Selection for Potential ~~Bids-Solicitations~~

Board will approve the commodity categories to be ~~advertised~~

SECTION 9.6 Term of Contracts

Unless otherwise agreed to by majority vote, all ~~bids-solicitations~~ will result in initial contracts for up to fifteen (15) months with three possible one-year extensions.

SECTION 9.7 State Terms and Conditions

Each Member will provide the ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Coordinator with State Terms and Conditions that it requires in addition to the General Terms and Conditions.

SECTION 9.8 ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Publication

Each Member will actively promote AEPA ~~bids-solicitations~~ to prospective ~~bidders-responders~~ and assist in the ~~bid-solicitation~~ publication as outlined by AEPA.

SECTION 9.9 Prospective ~~Bidders-Respondents~~, Responders

9.9.1. ~~Bid-Solicitation~~ Distribution

The ~~bids-solicitations~~ will be made available on the AEPA website.

9.9.2. Member Prospective ~~Bidders-Respondent~~, Responder Distribution

Each Member will make timely notification to their prospective ~~bidders-responders~~ of ~~invitation for Bid (IFB) RFB, IFB or RFP~~ availability.

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9.9.3. Web Link

Members will provide a link from their website (if one exists) to the AEPA website to enable prospective ~~bidders~~ ~~respondents~~ responders to obtain the ~~bid solicitation~~ solicitation documents.

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SECTION 9.10 Questions Concerning the ~~Invitation for Bid (IFB)~~ ~~solicitation~~

All questions concerning the ~~Invitation for Bid (IFB)~~ ~~solicitation~~ will be addressed to the ~~Bid Solicitation~~ Questions and Answers Committee. The ~~Bid Solicitation~~ Questions and Answers Committee will issue all responses after review by Members.

SECTION 9.11 ~~Bid Solicitation~~ Solicitation Receiving and Opening

SECTION 9.12 Mid-year (0.5) Solicitation

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9.12.3 Narrowly defined category with a set of current specifications available for use through a state agency or other avenue-

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ARTICLE 10. Evaluation Process

SECTION 10.1 ~~Bid Solicitation~~ Acceptance Distribution

Once the ~~bids~~ ~~responses~~ are opened and tabulated by the ~~Bid Solicitation~~ Committee, documents required for evaluation will be distributed to the appropriate Contract Oversight Committee. During the evaluation process, the Contract Oversight Committee may recommend to the Board that certain ~~bids~~ ~~responses~~ be rejected. Committee actions will be included in the evaluation report to the general membership.

SECTION 10.2 Oversight Committee Recommendations

The recommendation by the Category Committee will present the ~~bid~~ ~~solicitation~~ responses ranked in ~~the~~ ~~appropriate~~ ~~order~~ ~~for~~ ~~the~~ ~~RFB~~ ~~IFB~~ ~~or~~ ~~RFP~~:-

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SECTION 10.3 Approval Meeting

The Category Committee evaluation will be presented on the approved AEPA form and the recommendations will be available to the Board at least 24 hours prior to the approval meeting.

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SECTION 10.4 Evaluation Criteria

Evaluation criteria will be determined by the Category Committee and shall be included in the bid-solicitation specifications.

ARTICLE 11. Approval and Award Process

SECTION 11.1 Solicitation Intent

The intent of an AEPA solicitation is to obtain vendors that will provide products and services to all Members. Upon the recommendation of the Category Committee and by vote of the membership, a respondent may be approved for an award that will provide services and products to a minimum of 90% of the members who indicate they will use the contract. Members served shall include at least two of the three least populated states.

SECTION 11.2 Presentation of BidsResponses

Recommendations by the Category Committees will be considered by the Board.

SECTION 11.3 Approval Vote

AEPA contracts are approved by a majority vote of participating Members for that category.

SECTION 11.4 Line Item or Catalog Determination

Each AEPA solicitation will be identified as either a line item bid or a catalog bid-solicitation. Catalog bid-solicitations provide for fixed discounts for the entire nationally published catalog or sub-catalog and items that may change price and characteristics frequently. Line item bid-solicitations involve specifically defined items at set prices. Line item bid-solicitations allow price and item modification as permitted in the bid-solicitation document during AEPA meetings. Catalog bid-solicitations allow price and item modification as permitted in the bid-solicitation document upon change of the catalog with discounts remaining constant.

SECTION 11.5 Approved Vendor Contacts Members

Once a vendor is approved by AEPA, the vendor is responsible for initiating communication to finalize the contract documents and complete any additional paperwork required by the Member.

SECTION 11.6 Member Review

It is the responsibility of the Members to review each AEPA approved bid response and determine if a contract is to be awarded for that Member.

SECTION 11.7 Beginning Date

The beginning date of the contract is the date of the "award" by the Member. The ending date of the contract will coincide with the AEPA ending date.

ARTICLE 12. Contract Management

SECTION 12.1 Contract Award

12.1.1. First Year

Once a contract is awarded by the Member, it is valid through February 28, approximately 15 months following AEPA initial approval.

12.1.2. Additional Volume Discount

As part of their bid-solicitation submission, ~~an AEPA~~ a respondent ~~vendor~~ may provide for volume discounts. The threshold for the discount should be included in their bid-solicitation documents.

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SECTION 12.2 Contract Extensions

12.2.1. Oversight Recommendation

The Category Committees are responsible for reviewing bidsolicitations and contracts and making extension recommendations, in writing, to the membership.

12.2.2. Extension Vote

A majority of those in attendance that have signed the contract, and have it as a current offering in their agency, must approve all contract extensions, terminations and modifications.

12.2.3. Member Extension

Once AEPA approval is made, each Member is responsible for determining if it will extend an AEPA approved contract renewal for its state.

12.2.4. Use of Only Approved Extensions

It is the responsibility of the Member to allow only the use of an AEPA vendor offering that is currently approved by AEPA.

SECTION 12.3 Contract Appeal Process

12.3.1. Initial Contact With Category Committee

~~A vendor, bidder-Respondent or prospective bidder~~ desiring appeal of a decision regarding a bidsolicitation or a contract, shall first address the appropriate Category Committee.

12.3.2. First Appeal to President

If the issue is not satisfactorily resolved, it may be submitted to the President of AEPA.

12.3.3. Final Appeal to Board

If the issue is not satisfactorily resolved, it may be submitted to the Board.

SECTION 12.4 Contract Modifications

AEPA recommends a contract with the vendor, and then each Member has the

option to award the contract. If a vendor or a Member requests a change in the contract, such change must be referred to the appropriate Category Committee. The appropriate Category Committee will make a recommendation to the President for action by the AEPA membership. The contract can only be modified by a vote of the AEPA membership. The appropriate vendor having a contract with a Member may adopt any approved changes in the contract.

ARTICLE 13. Adoption, Amendments and Precedence

SECTION 13.1 Adoption

These Procedures are adopted on the 27th of July 2007.

SECTION 13.2 Amendments

The Procedures may be amended by a majority vote of the total membership.

SECTION 13.3 Precedence

The Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws and Board Policies take precedence over the Procedures. The Procedures take precedence over any other documents of AEPA.

ARTICLE 14. Attachments

ARTICLE 1. Mission Statement

The mission of the Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies, Inc. (AEPA) is to cooperatively serve our Members through a continuous effort to explore and solve present and future purchasing needs. Our goals include working to secure multi-state volume purchasing contracts with benefits that are measurable, cost-effective and continuously exceed our Members' expectations. AEPA is committed to accomplishing this mission lawfully and ethically, using leading-edge technology and futuristic business practices.

ARTICLE 2. History and Governance of AEPA

SECTION 2.1 The Initial Cooperative, Unincorporated Effort

2.1.1. First Meeting

The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies (AEPA-U) was formed in May of 2000 as a cooperative, unincorporated effort. There were seven states at the May 2000 meeting that became the founding states. They included Arizona, Indiana, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon and Washington. Three additional states (Kansas, Kentucky and Pennsylvania) became Members prior to award of the first AEPA-U bid in December of 2000.

2.1.2. First Solicitation

For its first solicitation, AEPA-U agreed on several principles, including the following: one simultaneous bid would be issued for all participating agencies, each agency would independently advertise the bid, the bid would be available on a web site with each state linking to that site, all questions regarding the bid would be answered in writing by one person,

all bids would be received at one central site, bids would initially be approved or rejected by AEPA-U, there would be a one-year contract with three possible one-year extensions, no more than 12 agencies could participate in the first bid, and after AEPA-U approval, each Member would determine if contracts could be awarded in accordance with that state's laws and regulations.

2.1.3. Subsequent Efforts

Since the first bid, additional agencies have become AEPA-U Members by completing a Memorandum of Understanding, and additional bids have been prepared, advertised, distributed and approved in a method similar to the initial model. Bids have been developed and published each year, with bid AEPA-U 007 published in September 2006 with vendor approval granted in December 2006. The term of the bid for the first year is through February 28 (approximately 15 months after Board approval), and the remaining three extensions for one year are through the following February.

SECTION 2.2 Formation of the Corporation

AEPA was incorporated in March of 2007. Two items required for membership are an *Application for Membership* and the *Memorandum of Understanding*.

ARTICLE 3. The Enabling Documents

SECTION 3.1 AEPA Articles of Incorporation

The Articles of Incorporation determine the basic foundations of the Corporation.

SECTION 3.2 AEPA Bylaws

The Bylaws describe the basic organization of the Corporation and include Organization Membership, Board of Directors, Meetings, Quorum, Voting, Elections and Proxies, Corporate Officers, Indemnification, Corporate Seal, Execution of Instruments, Power to Borrow Money, and Amendment of Bylaws.

SECTION 3.3 AEPA Board Policies

The Policy mandates the processes to ensure AEPA retains the tax-exempt status of the Corporation. Key aspects include conflict of interest and disclosure, self-dealing and compensation of key employees.

SECTION 3.4 AEPA Procedures

The Procedures are intended to include items that are necessary for the operation of the corporation. Members are required to comply with the established Procedures.

3.4.1 Strategic Alliance Agreement

A Strategic Alliance Agreement between AEPA and another organization, that has been approved by AEPA, shall have its contents implemented

as if they are adopted AEPA Procedures.

ARTICLE 4. Definitions

SECTION 4.1 Majority

The *majority* shall be a simple majority of those present and voting at a meeting unless otherwise stated. A majority of total membership shall be required for amendment of Procedures (13.2).

SECTION 4.2 Approved Contract

AEPA approves a contract whose terms and conditions are then extended to AEPA Members.

SECTION 4.3 Awarded Contract

Members award contracts in compliance with the terms and conditions of the applicable AEPA-approved contract.

ARTICLE 5. Organization

SECTION 5.1 Committees

Unless otherwise noted, the President of AEPA with Board approval appoints all committees. At the discretion of the President of AEPA, committees may be added or dissolved as needed for the efficient operation of AEPA. All committees shall be composed of staff from at least two Members. Each committee shall elect a Chair.

5.1.1. Executive Committee

The Committee shall consist of the Corporate Officers, the chair of the Solicitation Committee, Enabling Documents Committee, Finance Committee, Marketing Committee, and four other at large Directors so named by the President as per Section 5.1. The at large Directors shall serve two-year terms, not to exceed six years. The function of the committee shall be, but is not limited to, review, plan and recommend AEPA items to the Board for approval. The corporate Officers, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall act on behalf of the Board on matters related to the business of AEPA within the adopted Bylaws, Policies, Procedures and the annual budget. Meeting dates shall be determined by the Officers and members are expected to attend all meetings.

5.1.2. Solicitation Committee

Appointed by the Solicitation Coordinator, the Committee will assist in the development of new solicitations (including review of AEPA General Terms and Conditions, Agency Terms and Conditions, solicitation forms, item specifications and general format of the solicitation) and work with the Solicitation Coordinator to refine solicitation documents and procedures to ensure an efficient and professional solicitation process from start to finish. The Solicitation Committee will work with the Solicitation Coordinator to ensure the solicitation is developed, published,

distributed, monitored, opened and recommendations are made in a timely manner. The Solicitation Committee will also assist with responses to potential respondents and vendor partners regarding solicitation documents and specifications.

This committee will be responsible for receiving, opening and tabulating solicitation documents and initially determining if vendor responses are considered responsive according to the requirements published in the solicitation specifications. All responses will be tabulated and reported to the Board. Responsive respondents will be sent to the Category Committee for analysis.

5.1.3. Solicitation Utilization Committee

The Committee acts as a clearinghouse for vendor and Member contract awards, contract extensions and volume of sales. Membership utilization expectations, including both percent of contracts signed and volume per student, will be annually determined and disseminated at the spring meeting. Data will be tracked and reported to the membership at least twice a year. The Solicitation Utilization Committee membership shall include representation from both low-volume and high-volume Members.

5.1.4. Category Committee

A Category Committee will be established for each solicitation technical category. The Committee will develop the commodity specifications for the solicitation in an open nonrestrictive way to allow numerous respondents to have a chance to respond. They will also assist the Solicitation Committee in developing the solicitation evaluation criteria for the category to allow for an open and honest competition to select the recommended responder or responders—if the solicitation allows for multiple awards. The Category Committee analyzes solicitation responses and provides written reasons for recommending or not recommending solicitation responses based on the evaluation criteria as outlined in the solicitation documents.

The Category Committee assists the Solicitation Committee to answer questions received during the solicitation process; reviews responsive respondents making a recommendation to the membership for approval or rejection; monitors implementation of the contract in each state; receives and analyzes utilization information from the Solicitation Utilization Committee; and makes recommendations to the membership for contract extensions. The Committee also receives marketing plans from vendors during extension process as required by the membership.

5.1.5. Marketing Committee

The Committee promotes awareness of AEPA to potential Members, responders, vendors and the general public.

5.1.6. New Member Committee

The Committee solicits new membership from a qualified agency in non-member states. The Committee will also assist Members during their first

year of affiliation with AEPA.

5.1.7. Partnerships Committee

The Committee continually evaluates the need for affiliation and partnership with other groups where a strategic alliance would be beneficial to AEPA.

5.1.8. Website Committee

The Committee maintains the AEPA website to be used both by the Members and general public. The website will be used to post information such as solicitations, meeting information, minutes and other items related to AEPA.

5.1.9. Enabling Documents Committee

The Committee reviews, updates and maintains the AEPA Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, Board Policies and Procedures, reporting annually to the membership.

5.1.10. Nominating Committee

The Committee solicits nominations for elected officers in advance of the meeting for presentation to membership.

5.1.11 Finance Committee

The Committee shall annually review the monies, securities and other valuable effects in the name of AEPA. The committee shall develop a system of tracking transactions, prepare required reports and determine when an independent audit is needed.

SECTION 5.2 Solicitation Coordinator

The Solicitation Coordinator is selected for a one-year term and will serve at the direction of the President of AEPA. Solicitation Committee members shall be from at least two other Members. The Solicitation Coordinator shall serve as the Chairman of the Solicitation Committee and will appoint one member of the committee to serve as Vice Chairman of the Solicitation Committee, who will assume the duties of the Chairman if the Chairman is unable to fulfill his or her duties. The Solicitation Committee Chairman and Vice Chairman may not be from the same agency. It shall be the responsibility of the Solicitation Coordinator to oversee the solicitation process, ensure that the solicitation(s) is/are developed, published, received and reviewed annually in accordance with AEPA Procedures and make recommendations to the President on changes and improvements to the solicitation process for efficiency and effectiveness.

ARTICLE 6. Financial

SECTION 6.1 Fees and Dues

An annual fee will be assessed to member agencies subject to the review and approval of the Board at the winter meeting. Payment will be due to AEPA Inc. on or before June 30 of the following year.

6.1.1 Registration Fees

Members will be required to pay a registration fee for AEPA meetings as determined by the Officers. Non-Members will be required to pay a registration fee for AEPA meetings as determined by the Officers. Any member or non-member that registers after the registration deadline will be assessed a late registration fee as determined by the Officers.

SECTION 6.2 Financial Report

The Treasurer for AEPA will provide the membership with a listing of all financial transactions at the annual and regular meeting, and at other times when requested by a majority of membership.

The Treasurer shall have custody of all corporate funds and securities and shall keep in books, belonging to AEPA full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements; he or she shall deposit or review the deposit of all monies, securities and other valuable effects in the name of AEPA in such depositories as may be designated for that purpose by the Board. He or she shall disburse or review the disbursement of the funds of AEPA as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for the disbursements, and shall render to the President and Directors at the regular meetings of the Board, and whenever requested by them, an account of all his or her transactions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of AEPA. If required by the Board he or she shall deliver to the President and shall keep in force a bond at the expense of AEPA in form, amount and with a surety or securities satisfactory to the Board, conditioned for faithful performance of duties or his or her office and for restoration to AEPA in case of his or her death, resignation, retirement or removal from office of all books, papers, vouchers, money and property of whatever kind in his or her possession or under his or her control belonging to AEPA. The Treasurer may not be from the same Member agency as the President, Vice President or Secretary.

SECTION 6.3 Receive and Disperse Funds

The President and/or Treasurer, as officers of the AEPA, Inc., or their designees as approved by the Board and/or the Executive Committee are authorized to receive and disperse AEPA funds in compliance with AEPA, Inc. Policy and Procedures.

SECTION 6.4 Expenditures

Any expenditure made by the approved officers of the AEPA, Inc. shall not be made from an account with a balance less than the expenditure.

SECTION 6.5 Trade Show Expense Reimbursement

Reimbursements for a maximum of two (2) Members to exhibit at national trade shows shall be determined and approved by the Board. Reimbursements shall not exceed \$20,000.00 annually including the following limitations per Member attending; Member shall use reasonable commercial efforts to obtain cost effective travel arrangements such as a competitive economy class airfare or mileage at the current IRS reimbursement rate, lodging at trade show rate a

maximum of 3 nights, food up to \$50.00/day and other costs- cab, parking, shuttle (excludes rental car) not to exceed \$50.00.

SECTION 6.6 Credit Cards

This section is to identify the appropriate use of AEPA Inc. credit card program available to authorized members to make business related purchases for goods or services.

- 6.6.1. The Executive Committee of AEPA Inc. will designate members allowed to hold an AEPA Inc. credit card. Those issued a credit card must be a member and have an on-going need to make business purchases such as travel, meeting expenses or other related expenses.
- 6.6.2. Cardholders may not use the cards for personal purchases or loan their card to another individual, with the exception of individuals within the organization authorized by the cardholders to make purchases using the organization credit card.
- 6.6.3. Cardholders and approvers must ensure that purchases with the organization card comply with all AEPA Inc. policies and purchasing procedures. Funds must not be expended that cannot be supported with the AEPA Inc. budgets.
- 6.6.4. All purchases must be supported by itemized receipts. A scanned copy of the receipt or invoice must be e-mailed to the Treasurer within 30 days of the end of the month of the expenditure unless other arrangements have been made with the Treasurer. Cardholders must keep original copy of receipt or invoice for calendar year.
- 6.6.5. Cardholders who make non-business related, unauthorized purchases or purchases that cannot be supported as a business expense by appropriate documentation will be personally responsible for those purchases. A misuse of an AEPA Inc. credit card may result in termination of credit card use for that individual member.
- 6.6.6. Cardholders are responsible for reporting card loss, theft, or unauthorized use to the Treasurer and/or Executive Committee as soon as they are aware of the occurrence.
- 6.6.7. The Treasurer shall submit to the Executive Committee on a regular basis a summary of financial transaction to include credit purchase and use at each Executive Committee meeting or when requested by the Board.

ARTICLE 7. Membership

SECTION 7.1 Minimum Level of Contract Participation

It is the responsibility of the Member to actively promote the use of AEPA contracts. Each Member shall complete the *Annual AEPA Member Report*. Any Member whose use falls below one-half of the solicitations which the Member is legally allowed to use, shall present a report to the membership on the status of the AEPA contracts by their member agencies and the potential for future use. The Board shall suggest corrective action to the Member and monitor further usage of contracts by the Member. Action by the Board could

include termination of membership.

SECTION 7.2 Compliance

It is the responsibility of each Member to ensure that the AEPA solicitation process and contracts are in compliance with its state laws. Members will make every effort to make their agency Terms and Conditions consistent with the Terms and Conditions of the majority of the Member states. AEPA assumes no liability for non-compliance with state, federal or local laws or regulations by any Member.

SECTION 7.3 Contract Usage Reports

Contracts must be monitored for use by the Member and the Member must provide contract usage information as authorized by AEPA.

SECTION 7.4 Meeting Participation

Each Member is expected to send at least one authorized representative to each of two required meetings. Not more than two representatives from each Member will be seated at the meeting table. The Presiding Officer may waive this procedure if space permits.

SECTION 7.5 Active Participation

Each Member will actively participate in and support the mission of the AEPA. Each member will serve on at least one or more AEPA committees, complete the annual Disclosure, Code of Conduct and any other forms so required by the Board. Members with special skills or expertise have a duty to serve in a leadership capacity of the organization.

SECTION 7.6 Member Conflict of Interest

7.6.1. Member Individual Solicitation

An AEPA Member may market and provide AEPA contracts in another Member state provided that both Members mutually agree in writing and the agreement is forwarded to the AEPA President.

AEPA Members that market or make available AEPA contracts in “non-AEPA” states will submit in writing to the AEPA President the following information: name of the state, name of the vendors, and the volume generated by the AEPA contracts.

Re-soliciting AEPA contracts for use in other AEPA states is prohibited. Any alleged infraction must be documented and brought to the Board for review and action.

7.6.2. Financial Benefit

A Member that will or may receive any financial benefit from a vendor or potential vendor beyond the stated administrative fee shall not participate in prohibited activities, including:

7.6.2.1. Drafting Solicitations to which the vendor might respond,

7.6.2.2. Contract Oversight Committee membership for any solicitation that includes or could include the vendor,

- 7.6.2.3. Discussions regarding the vendor or potential vendor, or
- 7.6.2.4. Voting on approval or any other action related to the vendor or potential vendor.

7.6.3. New Member Use

AEPA encourages new Members to avail themselves of all AEPA contracts which they have the legal authority to perform.

7.6.4 Harmony

To promote harmony, Members shall cooperate as follows in marketing and selling items and services from AEPA contracts in non-member states.

7.6.4.1 Existing AEPA member relationships in non-member states.

7.6.4.1.1 All Members shall be grandfathered into non-member states or areas of non-Member states where, prior to March 1, 2008 they have had:

7.6.4.1.1.1 Sales within the last year, or

7.6.4.1.1.2 Written evidence of a plan with a vendor to market within that state.

7.6.4.1.2 Such effort shall be limited to 10 states per Member

7.6.4.2 Other than listed in (7.6.4.1) above, all Members shall submit to the AEPA President their request to market and sell in non-member states for each AEPA vendor contract they intend to market or sell.

7.6.4.2.1 Should more than one Member indicate intent to market or sell a specific vendor contract in a specific state, those Members shall discuss and resolve the conflict.

7.6.4.2.2 Should they not be able to reach an agreement, the vendor in question shall determine which Member shall have marketing and sales right for that non-Member state or part of that state.

7.6.4.3 A vendor may identify a specific state or states where they do not want their AEPA contract marketed or sold.

7.6.4.4 AEPA Members may discuss joint sales and marketing endeavors in a non- AEPA State and have the option to share the commission.

ARTICLE 8. Awarded Vendor Responsibilities

SECTION 8.1 Marketing

Each AEPA-approved vendor is expected to have a proactive marketing plan in place. If there is more than one contract for a vendor in the state of a Member, and the AEPA contract is more advantageous to the Member, then the vendor shall market the AEPA contract as the solution of choice.

SECTION 8.2 Reporting

Each vendor will report sales by state to the AEPA Solicitation Utilization Committee.

SECTION 8.3 Minimum Levels of Participation

It is the responsibility of the AEPA-approved vendor to actively promote the use of its AEPA-approved contracts. Each vendor shall complete the Annual AEPA Vendor Report. Any vendor whose use falls below sales to one-half to the Members shall present a report to the membership on the status of the use of their AEPA contracts and the potential for future use.

SECTION 8.4 Contract Term Length

AEPA contracts are awarded for an initial term of up to 15 months. Up to three annual extensions are available. Ending dates for all contracts awarded by individual Members shall coincide with the AEPA ending dates.

SECTION 8.5 Contract Extensions

Approved vendors can only extend the AEPA contract to current AEPA Members. If membership by a Member is terminated, extensions of the contract will not be available to that Member.

ARTICLE 9. Bid/Proposal Process

SECTION 9.1 Solicitation Development

When it is in the best interest of AEPA member agencies, AEPA may allow Requests for Proposals, (RFP) in lieu of issuing an Invitation for Bid, (IFB). AEPA will use Common Law contracts as the guidance document for issuing RFP's. An approval process will be developed by the AEPA Solicitation Committee to allow an AEPA Category Committee to request to use an RFP process instead of an IFB process.

Solicitation development will be the overall responsibility of the Solicitation Coordinator. The solicitation will contain five major parts that will be drafted by various people and/or committees as listed below.

- 9.1.1. Solicitation Overview--Solicitation Coordinator
- 9.1.2. General Terms and Conditions--Membership
- 9.1.3. State Terms and Conditions-- Each Member
- 9.1.4. Commodity Specifications-- Category Committee
- 9.1.5. Forms--Solicitation Coordinator

SECTION 9.2 Advertising, Publication and Distribution

Each AEPA solicitation will be a single issue simultaneous solicitation by all Members. Solicitations will be advertised and published by each Member. The Solicitation Distribution Committee will track prospective responders that are notified of the solicitation availability.

SECTION 9.3 Questions

Only the Solicitation Questions and Answers Committee will answer questions concerning the solicitation

SECTION 9.4 Receiving Bids

The Solicitation Acceptance Committee will receive responses and initially determine the responsive respondents

SECTION 9.5 Commodity Selection for Potential Solicitations

Board will approve the commodity categories to be advertised.

SECTION 9.6 Term of Contracts

Unless otherwise agreed to by majority vote, all solicitations will result in initial contracts for up to fifteen (15) months with three possible one-year extensions.

SECTION 9.7 State Terms and Conditions

Each Member will provide the Solicitation Coordinator with State Terms and Conditions that it requires in addition to the General Terms and Conditions.

SECTION 9.8 Solicitation Publication

Each Member will actively promote AEPA solicitations to prospective responders and assist in the solicitation publication as outlined by AEPA.

SECTION 9.9 Prospective Responders

9.9.1. Solicitation Distribution

The solicitations will be made available on the AEPA website.

9.9.2. Member Prospective Responder Distribution

Each Member will make timely notification to their prospective responders of IFB or RFP availability.

9.9.3. Web Link

Members will provide a link from their website (if one exists) to the AEPA website to enable prospective responders to obtain the solicitation documents.

SECTION 9.10 Questions Concerning the solicitation

All questions concerning the solicitation will be addressed to the Solicitation Questions and Answers Committee. The Solicitation Questions and Answers Committee will issue all responses after review by Members.

SECTION 9.11 Solicitation Receiving and Opening

Solicitation responses will be received and opened by the Solicitation Committee. Any late responses will be returned to the respondent unopened

with a letter of explanation.

SECTION 9.12 Mid-year (0.5) Solicitation

In the event the AEPA Board wishes to issue a mid-year solicitation, one or more of the following parameters will be met in determining whether a mid-year solicitation will be approved:

9.12.1 Re-issuance of a previously unsuccessful solicitation

9.12.2 Extraordinary, broadly available funding opportunities that are time sensitive

9.12.3 Narrowly defined category with a set of current specifications available for use through a state agency or other avenue

ARTICLE 10. Evaluation Process

SECTION 10.1 Solicitation Acceptance Distribution

Once the responses are opened and tabulated by the Solicitation Committee, documents required for evaluation will be distributed to the appropriate Contract Oversight Committee. During the evaluation process, the Contract Oversight Committee may recommend to the Board that certain responses be rejected. Committee actions will be included in the evaluation report to the general membership.

SECTION 10.2 Oversight Committee Recommendations

The recommendation by the Category Committee will present the solicitation responses ranked in the appropriate order for the IFB or RFP

SECTION 10.3 Approval Meeting

The Category Committee evaluation will be presented on the approved AEPA form and the recommendations will be available to the Board at least 24 hours prior to the approval meeting.

SECTION 10.4 Evaluation Criteria

Evaluation criteria will be determined by the Category Committee and shall be included in the solicitation specifications.

ARTICLE 11. Approval and Award Process

SECTION 11.1 Solicitation Intent

The intent of an AEPA solicitation is to obtain vendors that will provide products and services to all Members. Upon the recommendation of the Category Committee and by vote of the membership, a respondent may be approved for an award that will provide services and products to a minimum of 90% of the members who indicate they will use the contract. Members served shall include at least two of the three least populated states.

SECTION 11.2 Presentation of Responses

Recommendations by the Category Committees will be considered by the Board.

SECTION 11.3 Approval Vote

AEPA contracts are approved by a majority vote of participating Members for that category.

SECTION 11.4 Line Item or Catalog Determination

Each AEPA solicitation will be identified as either a line item or a catalog solicitation. Catalog solicitations provide for fixed discounts for the entire nationally published catalog or sub-catalog and items that may change price and characteristics frequently. Line item solicitations involve specifically defined items at set prices. Line item solicitations allow price and item modification as permitted in the solicitation document during AEPA meetings. Catalog solicitations allow price and item modification as permitted in the solicitation document upon change of the catalog with discounts remaining constant.

SECTION 11.5 Approved Vendor Contacts Members

Once a vendor is approved by AEPA, the vendor is responsible for initiating communication to finalize the contract documents and complete any additional paperwork required by the Member.

SECTION 11.6 Member Review

It is the responsibility of the Members to review each AEPA approved response and determine if a contract is to be awarded for that Member.

SECTION 11.7 Beginning Date

The beginning date of the contract is the date of the "award" by the Member. The ending date of the contract will coincide with the AEPA ending date.

ARTICLE 12. Contract Management

SECTION 12.1 Contract Award

12.1.1. First Year

Once a contract is awarded by the Member, it is valid through February 28, approximately 15 months following AEPA initial approval.

12.1.2. Additional Volume Discount

As part of their solicitation submission, a respondent may provide for volume discounts. The threshold for the discount should be included in their solicitation documents.

SECTION 12.2 Contract Extensions

12.2.1. Oversight Recommendation

The Category Committees are responsible for reviewing solicitations and contracts and making extension recommendations, in writing, to the membership.

12.2.2. Extension Vote

A majority of those in attendance that have signed the contract, and have it as a current offering in their agency, must approve all contract extensions, terminations and modifications.

12.2.3. Member Extension

Once AEPA approval is made, each Member is responsible for determining if it will extend an AEPA approved contract renewal for its state.

12.2.4. Use of Only Approved Extensions

It is the responsibility of the Member to allow only the use of an AEPA vendor offering that is currently approved by AEPA.

SECTION 12.3 Contract Appeal Process

12.3.1. Initial Contact With Category Committee

A Respondent desiring appeal of a decision regarding a solicitation or a contract, shall first address the appropriate Category Committee.

12.3.2. First Appeal to President

If the issue is not satisfactorily resolved, it may be submitted to the President of AEPA.

12.3.3. Final Appeal to Board

If the issue is not satisfactorily resolved, it may be submitted to the Board.

SECTION 12.4 Contract Modifications

AEPA recommends a contract with the vendor, and then each Member has the option to award the contract. If a vendor or a Member requests a change in the contract, such change must be referred to the appropriate Category Committee. The appropriate Category Committee will make a recommendation to the President for action by the AEPA membership. The contract can only be modified by a vote of the AEPA membership. The appropriate vendor having a contract with a Member may adopt any approved changes in the contract.

ARTICLE 13. Adoption, Amendments and Precedence

SECTION 13.1 Adoption

These Procedures are adopted on the 27th of July 2007.

SECTION 13.2 Amendments

The Procedures may be amended by a majority vote of the total membership.

SECTION 13.3 Precedence

The Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws and Board Policies take precedence over the Procedures. The Procedures take precedence over any other documents of AEPA.

ARTICLE 14. Attachments

Certain documents need to be maintained by AEPA to ensure good management.

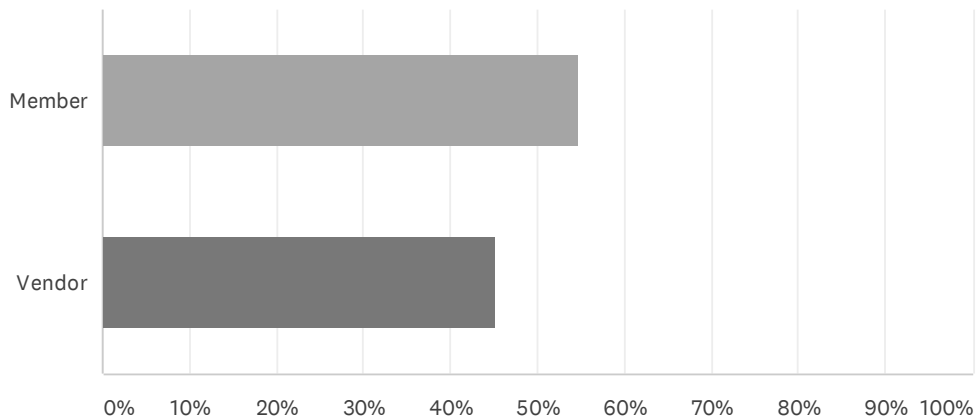

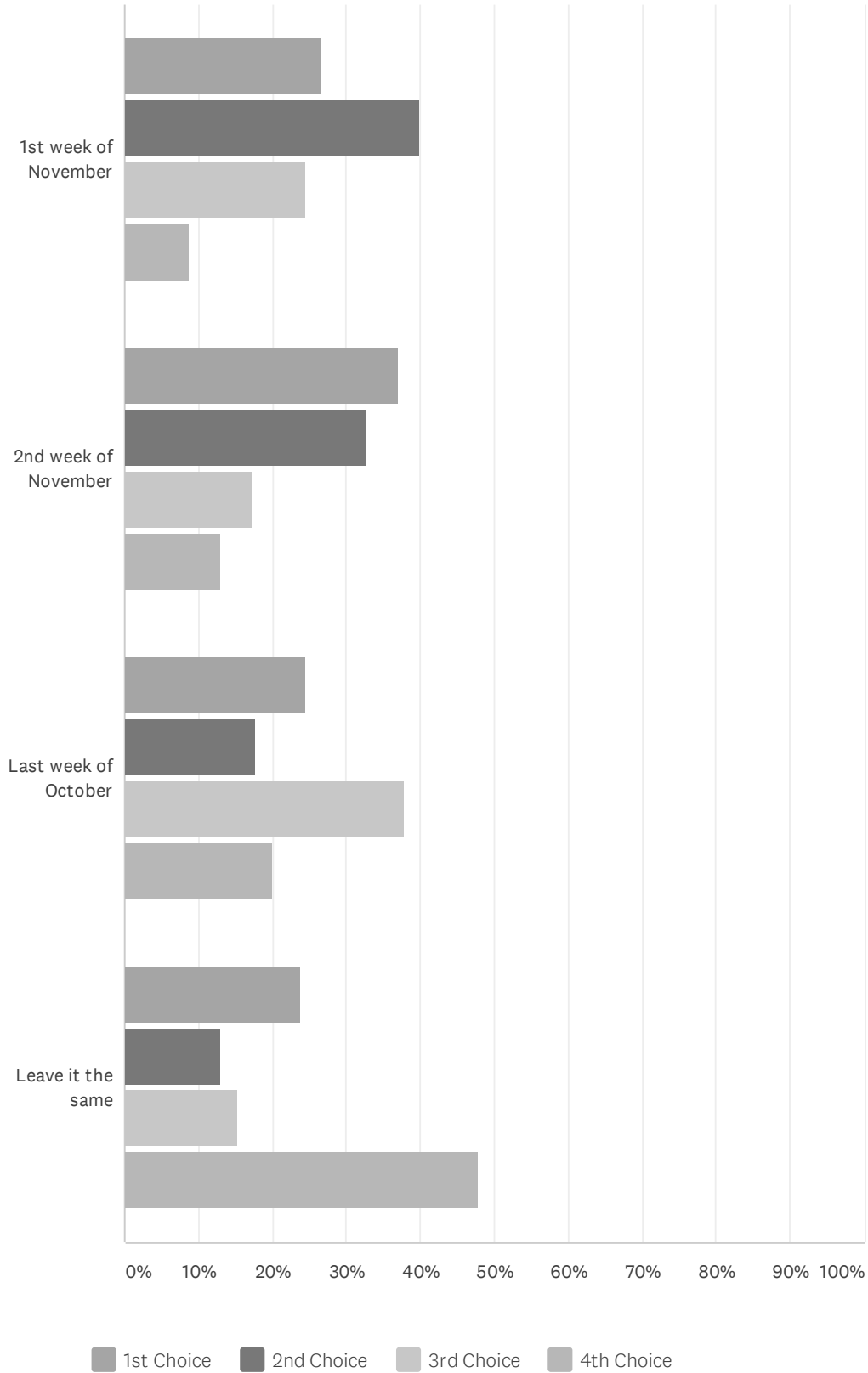

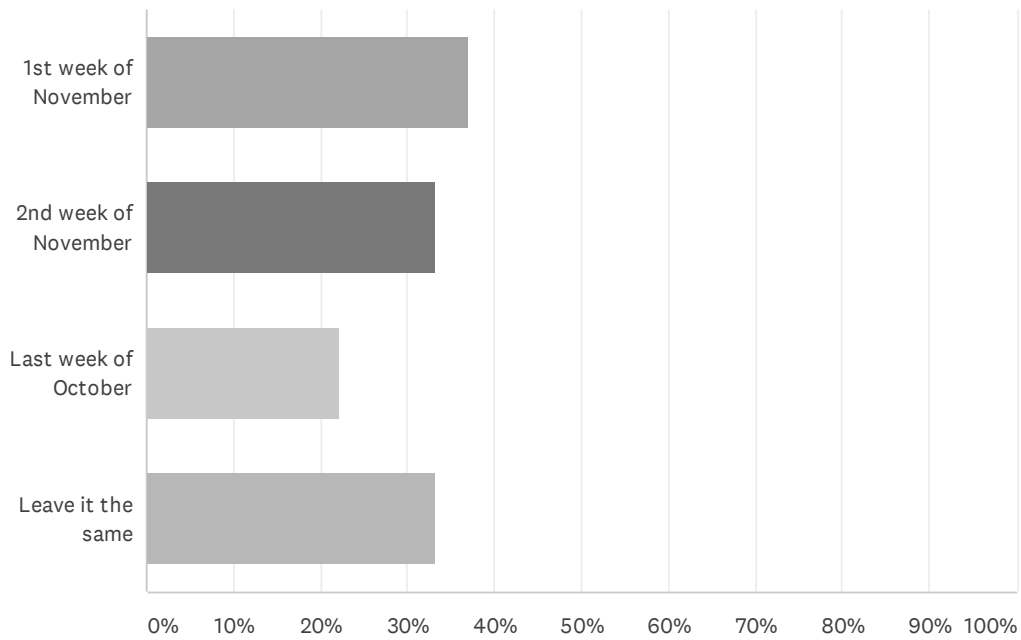

AEPA Vendor Partner Advisory Committee

The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies (AEPA) Vendor Partner Advisory Committee is established for the purpose of providing advice, counsel, and/or recommendations to the AEPA President and others as requested by the AEPA President. The advice, counsel, and/or recommendations shall not bind the AEPA President to take any specific action. This committee shall be voluntary to AEPA vendor partners who meet the qualifications delineated in this document.

A. Duties of Committee Members:

1. Be aware of issues, opportunities, and/or challenges on items of strategic importance to AEPA.
2. Provide support and guidance on establishing and achieving goals and objectives of AEPA.
3. Engage in discussions on the issues, opportunities, and/or challenges that AEPA is or could face.
4. Make recommendations to the AEPA President when requested to do so.

B. Benefits of a Vendor Partner Advisory Committee:

1. Provide credible advice, counsel, and/or recommendations making it easier to build stable and profitable partnerships between AEPA members and vendor partners.
2. Provide expertise based from a wide variety of backgrounds and authentic experiences from vendor perspective. This information can then be used to make more informed decisions.
3. Bring additional resources to AEPA including, but not limited to, contacts with other potentially successful vendors who may wish to become AEPA vendor partners.

C. Membership on the AEPA Vendor Partner Committee:

1. Must have had at least four years as a vendor partner of AEPA
2. Must have had at least three million dollars in annual sales using the AEPA state contracts over each of the past two calendar years
3. Must have attended or been represented at both AEPA yearly meetings for the past two calendar years (exceptions may be made for extenuating circumstances by AEPA President)
4. Must be in adequate standing with all AEPA state agencies

D. Terms of Service:

1. The first six committee members will be appointed as soon as possible after the AEPA Spring 2020 Meeting.
2. Initial appointees will serve one, two, or three years.
3. Terms will begin on July 1.
4. Each year following the initial appointments, beginning with the AEPA Spring 2021 Meeting, the AEPA vendor partners present during the meeting shall recommend two vendor partners for service on the committee. This recommendation shall be made to the AEPA President. The vendor partners recommended shall meet all the AEPA requirements established in this document.
5. Beginning with the 2021 appointments, terms shall be for three years.
6. Service on the committee may not exceed six years total.
7. Each vendor partner (company) shall not have more than one representative on the committee at any one time.
8. The AEPA President shall accept the recommendations from the vendor partners unless the vendor partner recommended fails to meet the AEPA requirements as set forth in this document.

E. Required Actions/Standards for the AEPA Vendor Partner Advisory Committee:

1. Be and remain in adequate standing with all AEPA state agencies.
2. Commit to attending two AEPA yearly meetings during the time of service on the committee.
3. Be willing to meet quarterly, via the worldwide web or conference call, with the AEPA President or others with whom the AEPA President chooses.
4. Make suggestions to the President on items to be considered by the committee that are of strategic importance to AEPA.
5. Reach out to other AEPA vendor partners for input and feedback on issues when needed.
6. Keep any discussions that could reflect poorly on any AEPA member or vendor partner confidential, as well as any discussion that is proprietary to AEPA.

F. Removal from the Committee:

A vendor partner shall be removed from the committee by the AEPA President when the vendor partner fails to meet the requirements for membership or actions/standards set forth in this document. The AEPA President may appoint a replacement for the vendor partner as soon as possible or at the Spring AEPA Meeting (which ever occurs first). This vendor partner shall serve the remainder of the term.

2020-2023 SPECIAL BUY AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the ESUCC and Sergeant Laboratories, Inc ("Contractor"). Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) was created in statute to coordinate the activities of Nebraska's 17 Educational Service Units. The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council was created by LB 603 in 2007 and officially came into existence on July 1, 2008. Cooperative Purchasing is a Project of ESUCC that has been in existence since 1968 with the purpose of providing the Educational Service Unit (ESU) member school districts ("Members") of Nebraska an opportunity to secure the maximum procurement value through cooperative synergies. The Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council (ESUCC) Advisory group serves as the steering committee for new and future cooperative buys statewide under its direction. A chief executive officer coordinates the statewide purchasing agreement between educational service units and their school districts and other serviceable entities. The Director of Cooperative Purchasing manages the program with the guidance of the ESUCC, Advisory Board, and the Fiscal Agent. ESUCC serves 17 ESUs that provide a statewide network of educational opportunities to approximately 245 school districts and more than 300,000 students.

In consideration of mutual covenants, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Scope of the Contract.** The Contractor shall provide Members the opportunity to purchase the goods and/or services as defined in **Exhibit A**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, at the prices set forth in this Agreement and its Exhibits.
- 2. Payment Terms/Payment Schedule.** Members shall pay for services rendered and/or for accepted goods on the terms and payment schedule as set forth in **Exhibit B** which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. Prices listed in Exhibit B shall remain in effect during the term of this Agreement unless agreed otherwise by the parties in writing.
- 3. Administrative Fee.** Contractor shall submit to ESUCC as an administrative fee a sum equal to two percent (2%) of the total gross dollar volume, less freight of all goods and services and excluding annual support and maintenance purchased by the ESUCC, ESUs, and Members. This fee will be submitted to ESUCC on a quarterly basis beginning three months from the Effective Date of this Agreement for all transactions completed and paid during said quarter.

4. **Term.** This Agreement is effective on July 1, 2020 ("Effective Date") and shall continue until 12:00 midnight (CST) on June 30, 2023, unless terminated earlier as provided by this Agreement or by law.
5. **Governing Law; Designation of Forum.** This Agreement is governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Nebraska. Any action to enforce this Agreement must be brought in the state or federal courts of the State of Nebraska. Mandatory and exclusive venue for any disputes shall be in Sarpy County, Nebraska.
6. **Student Privacy Protections.**
 - A. **Definition of Data.** Data include all Personally Identifiable Information (PII), Member Data, and other non-public information. Data include, but are not limited to, student data, metadata, and user content.
 - B. **Definition of Member Data.** Member Data includes all PII and other information that is not intentionally made generally available by ESUCC or its Members on public websites or publications, including but not limited to business, administrative and financial data, intellectual property, and student and personnel data and metadata.
 - C. **Definition of Personally Identifiable Information.** Personally Identifiable Information includes but is not limited to: personal identifiers such as name, address, phone number, date of birth, Social Security number, and student or personnel identification number; "personal information" as used in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 84-712.05 and personally identifiable information contained in student education records as that term is defined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 USC 1232g.
 - D. **Definition of User.** User means a participant, instructor, or administrator of ESUCC or its Members who are authorized with login credentials by ESUCC or its Members to use the goods and/or services provided by this Agreement.
 - E. **Data De-Identification.** Contractor may use deidentified Data for product development, research, or other purposes. De-identified Data will have all direct and indirect personal identifiers removed. This includes, but is not limited to, name, ID numbers, date of birth, demographic information, location information, and school ID. Furthermore, Contractor agrees not to attempt to re-identify deidentified Data and not to transfer de-identified Data to any party unless that party agrees not to attempt reidentification.
 - F. **Marketing and Advertising.** Contractor will not use any Data to advertise or market to students or their parents. Advertising or marketing may be directed to the ESUCC, Members, or their school districts only if student information is properly de-identified."
 - G. **Modification of Terms of Service.** Contractor will not change how Data are collected, used, or shared under the terms of this Agreement in any way without

advance notice to and consent from the ESUCC, the Members, and the affected school district(s).

- H. **Data Collection.** Contractor will only collect Data necessary to fulfill its duties as outlined in this Agreement.
- I. **Data Use.** Contractor will use Data only for the purpose of fulfilling its duties and providing services under this Agreement, and for improving services under this Agreement.
- J. **Data Mining.** Contractor is prohibited from mining Data for any purposes other than those agreed to by the parties. Data mining or scanning of user content for the purpose of advertising or marketing to students or their parents is prohibited.
- K. **Data Sharing.** Data cannot be shared with any additional parties without prior written consent of the User except as required by law.
- L. **Data Transfer or Destruction.** Contractor will ensure that all Data in its possession and in the possession of any subcontractors, or agents to which the Contractor may have transferred Data, are destroyed or transferred to the ESUCC under the direction of the ESUCC when the Data are no longer needed for their specified purpose, at the request of the Member.
- M. **Rights and License in and to Data.** Parties agree that all rights, including all intellectual property rights, shall remain the exclusive property of the Member, and Contractor has a limited, nonexclusive license solely for the purpose of performing its obligations as outlined in the Agreement. This Agreement does not give Contractor any rights, implied or otherwise, to Data, content, or intellectual property, except as expressly stated in the Agreement. This includes the right to sell or trade Data.
- N. **Access.** Any Data held by Contractor will be made available to a Member upon request by the Member.
- O. **Security Controls.** Contractor will store and process Data in accordance with industry best practices. This includes appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to secure Data from unauthorized access, disclosure, and use. Contractor will conduct periodic risk assessments and remediate any identified security vulnerabilities in a timely manner. Contractor will also have a written incident response plan, to include prompt notification of the Member in the event of a security or privacy incident, as well as best practices for responding to a breach of PII. Contractor agrees to share its incident response plan upon request.
- P. **Response to Legal Orders, Demands or Requests for Data.** Except as otherwise expressly prohibited by law, Contractor will:
 - (1) Promptly notify ESUCC and Members of any subpoenas, warrants, or other legal orders, demands or requests received by Contractor seeking Data;
 - (2) Consult with ESUCC and Members regarding its response;

- (3) Cooperate with ESUCC's and Member's reasonable requests in connection with efforts by them to intervene and quash or modify the legal order, demand or request; and
- (4) Upon ESUCC's or a Member's request, provide them with a copy of its response.

7. Termination.

A. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement in whole or part if funding from federal, state, or other sources for ESUCC or its Members is not obtained and continued at levels sufficient to allow for purchase of the good and/or services in the indicated quantities or term. ESUCC shall notify the Contractor as soon as practicable if funds to meet ESUCC's or Members' obligations become unavailable. The determination of ESUCC as to the insufficiency of funds is conclusive.

B. Each party may terminate this Agreement if the other party breaches or is in default of any material obligation hereunder which default is incapable of cure, or which, being capable of cure, has not been cured within thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice of such default or such additional cure period as the nondefaulting party may authorize in writing.

C. Each party may terminate this Agreement by written notice if federal or state laws or rules are modified or interpreted in a way that the services are no longer allowable or appropriate for purchase under this contract or are no longer eligible for the funding proposed for payments authorized by this contract.

D. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, by written notice to the Contractor and may regard the Contractor in default of this Agreement if the Contractor becomes:

- (1) Insolvent;
- (2) Makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors;
- (3) Files a voluntary petition of bankruptcy;
- (4) Suffers or permits the appointment of a receiver for its business or assets;
- (5) Becomes subject to any proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency law, whether domestic or foreign; or
- (6) Has wound up or liquidated, voluntarily or otherwise.

E. ESUCC may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, immediately, without notice, if the Contractor is debarred or suspended from performing services on any public contracts.

F. The parties may terminate this Agreement without cause by mutual written consent or by either party with a minimum of ninety (90) days written notice.

G. Upon the termination for any reason or expiration of this Agreement, the Contractor promptly must return to ESUCC all papers, materials and other property

of ESUCC then in its possession, including but not limited to all work in progress as is appropriate in its then existing form to ESUCC.

8. Indemnification.

A. The Contractor hereby waives and agrees to indemnify and save harmless ESUCC and the ESUs and their officials, agents, employees, and volunteers (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Indemnities"), against any and all claims of injuries, death, damage to property, liabilities, judgments, costs and expenses which may otherwise accrue against Indemnities in consequence of the granting of this Agreement or which may otherwise result therefrom.

B. The Contractor shall, at his or her own expense, appear, defend and pay all charges of attorneys and all costs and other expenses arising therefrom or incurred in connection therewith.

C. If any judgment shall be rendered against ESUCC or the ESUs in any such action, the Contractor shall, at his or her own expense, satisfy and discharge the same.

D. Any performance bond or insurance protection required by this contract, or otherwise provided by the Contractor, shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify and save harmless and defend the Indemnities as herein provided.

E. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify and save harmless any Indemnities will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement by either party for any reason.

9. Insurance. Contractor shall secure and keep in force during the term of this Agreement the following insurance coverages from insurance companies or government self-insurance pools authorized to do business in Nebraska:

A. Commercial general liability, including premises or operations, contractual, and products or completed operations coverages (if applicable), with minimum liability limits of \$1,000,000 per person and \$5,000,000 per occurrence; and

B. If applicable, workers compensation coverage meeting all statutory requirements.

The Contractor shall furnish a certificate of insurance to the undersigned ESUCC representative prior to commencement of this Agreement. Failure to provide insurance as required in this agreement is a material breach of contract entitling ESUCC to terminate this Agreement immediately.

10. Public Records. The Contractor acknowledges that ESUCC must comply with Neb. Rev. Stat. § 84-712 through § 84-713 and release public records as defined law upon request, which may include this Agreement and all records created and maintained in relation to this Agreement.

- 11. Publicity.** ESUCC does not endorse the goods or services of the Contractor. Except for listing ESUCC as a client during the term of this Agreement, news releases or other publicity concerning this Agreement must not be made by the Contractor without the prior written approval of ESUCC.
- 12. Drug/Alcohol/Tobacco/Weapons Free Workplace.** The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not manufacture, sell, distribute, dispense, possess or use controlled substances or marijuana, as defined by Nebraska law, during the performance of this Agreement while on ESUCC, ESU, or Member premises or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not possess any weapon, as defined by Nebraska law and the federal "Drug-Free Schools Act," on ESUCC, ESU, or Member property or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, also shall adhere to all ESUCC, ESU, and Member policies and regulations that prohibit the possession, distribution, sale, dispensation, or use of any alcohol or tobacco products while on ESUCC, ESU, or Member premises or at ESUCC, ESU, or Member related functions. Failure to comply with this provision may be considered a material breach. ESUCC may suspend or terminate the Contractor, subcontractor, or both if it violates these laws, regulations, or policies or this provision.
- 13. Nondiscrimination.** The Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant who is to be employed for performance of this Agreement with respect to his or her hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, because of his race, color, religion, sex, disability, or national origin.
- 14. Independent Contractor.** Contractor is an independent contractor under this contract and is not an ESUCC, ESU, or Member employee for any purpose. The Contractor retains sole and absolute discretion in the manner and means of carrying out Contractor's activities and responsibilities under this Agreement, except to the extent specified in this Agreement.
- 15. Employment Eligibility Verification.** The Contractor shall use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of employees hired on or after October 1, 2009 and who are physically performing services within the State of Nebraska. If the Contractor employs or contracts with any subcontractor in connection with this Agreement, the Contractor shall include a provision in the contract requiring the subcontractor to use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of new employees physically performing services within the State of Nebraska.
- 16. Taxpayer Identification.** Contractor's federal employer identification number is: 39-1952680
- 17. Sales Tax.** ESUCC, ESUs, and Members are exempt from sales tax and shall not pay any sales tax under this Agreement. ESUCC, ESUs and/or Members will provide the Contractor with applicable sales tax exemption certificates upon written request.

18. Notice. Each party giving any Notice ("Notice") under this Agreement must give written Notice by personal delivery, registered or certified Mail (in each case, return receipt requested and postage prepaid), or nationally recognized overnight courier (with all fees prepaid.) Notice shall be sent to the following addressees at the following addresses:

Notice is effective only if the party giving the Notice has complied with this section.

19. Warranties and Specifications. Contractor shall be responsible for providing to Members all manufacturer warranties on all goods and services. Contractor shall provide Members with all attachments normally supplied by the manufacturer and/or supplier. Complete product specification sheets or brochures must be provided to Members, ESUs, or ESUCC upon request.

20. Entire Agreement. The Agreement is the complete and exclusive expression of the parties' agreement on the matters contained in this Agreement. All prior and contemporaneous negotiations and agreements between the parties on the matters contained in this Agreement are expressly merged into and superseded by this Agreement.

21. Amendments and Modifications. The parties may amend or modify this Agreement only by a signed, written agreement by both parties that identifies itself as an amendment or modification to this Agreement. No other alternations in the terms of this agreement shall be valid or binding.

22. Waivers. The parties may waive any provision in this Agreement only by a writing executed by the party or parties against whom the waiver is sought to be enforced. No failure or delay: (1) In exercising any right or remedy, **or** (2) In requiring the satisfaction of any condition under this Agreement, **and** (3) No act, omission, or course of dealing between the parties operates as a waiver or estoppel of any right, remedy or condition. A waiver made in writing on one occasion is effective only in

that instance and only for the purpose stated. A waiver once given is not to be construed as a waiver on any future occasion or against any other Person.

- 23. Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement remain in full force, if the essential terms and conditions of this Agreement for each party remain enforceable.
- 24. Counterparts.** The parties may execute this Agreement in multiple counterparts, each of which constitutes an original, and all of which, collectively, constitute only one agreement. The signatures of all of the parties need not appear on the same counterpart, and delivery of an executed counterpart signature page by facsimile or other electronic means is as effective as executing and delivering this Agreement in the presence of the other parties to this Agreement. This Agreement is effective upon delivery of one executed counterpart from each party to the other parties. In proving this Agreement, a party must produce or account only for the executed counterpart of the party to be charged.
- 25. Force Majeure.** Neither party shall be liable for any loss or damage suffered by the other party, directly or indirectly, as a result of the non performing party's failure to perform, or delay in performing, any of its obligations contained in this contract (except any obligations to make payments for services rendered or accepted goods received before the failure to perform or the delay in performance), where, in the opinion of ESUCC, such failure or delay is cause by circumstances beyond the non performing party's control or which make performance commercially impracticable, including but not limited to fire, flood, storm or other natural disaster, explosion, accident, war, riot, civil disorder, government regulations or restrictions of any kind or any acts of any government, alien enemy, judicial action, power failure, acts of God, or other natural circumstances. This Force Majeure provision excludes economic hardship, changes in market conditions, and insufficiency of funds on the part of Contractor.
- 26. Assignment.** This Agreement binds the parties and their respective successors and assignees. The Contractor shall not assign or otherwise dispose of this Agreement or any duty, right, or responsibility contemplated in this Agreement to any other person without the previous written consent of ESUCC.
- 27. Subcontractors.** The Contractor shall not subcontract services or any part of this Agreement without the prior written consent of ESUCC.
- 28. Captions.** The descriptive headings of the Articles, Sections and subsections of this Agreement are for convenience only, do not constitute a part of this Agreement, and do not affect this Agreement's construction or interpretation.
- 29. Rights and Remedies Cumulative.** Any enumeration of ESUCC's rights and remedies set forth in this Agreement is not exhaustive. ESUCC's exercise of any right or remedy under this Agreement does not preclude the exercise of any other right or remedy. All of the ESUCC's rights and remedies are cumulative and are in addition to any other right or remedy set forth in this Agreement, any other agreement

between the parties, or which may now or subsequently exist at law or in equity, by statute or otherwise.

30. Relationship Among Parties. This Agreement creates no relationship of joint venture, partnership, limited partnership, agency, or employer- employee between the parties, and the parties acknowledge that no other facts or relations exist that would create any such relationship between them. Neither party has any right or authority to assume or to create any obligation or responsibility on behalf of the other party except as my from time to time be provided by written instrument signed by both parties.

31. Rules of Construction. The parties hereto have each been represented by counsel, or had the opportunity to be represented, during the negotiation and execution of this Agreement, and therefore waive application of any law or rule of construction providing that ambiguities in the contract will be construed against the party drafting such contract.

32. Piggyback Clause. For the term of the Agreement and any mutually agreed extensions, other public agencies may purchase, lease-purchase, or rent the identical item(s) at the same price and upon the same terms and conditions as provided in this Agreement. The term "public agencies" means any county, city, village, school district, or agency of any state government or of the United States; any drainage district, sanitary and improvement district, or other municipal corporation or political subdivision of Nebraska; and any political subdivision of another state.

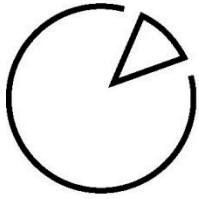

Section 1.01 – Cover Page: The information included in the Cover Page is true and correct and is part of this Agreement.

Section 1.02 -- Definitions: The following definitions shall apply:

- (15) Updates: The term "Update" shall mean: (a) any upgrades, modified versions, updates, additions, replacements and copies of the Software (current release only), if any, provided to Licensee by Licensor for the sole purpose of maintenance, error correction, or debugging of the Software, or (b) any upgrades, modified versions, replacements or additions to the Secure Data Vault Server (current model only), if any, provided to you by the Licensor for the sole purpose of maintenance, error correction, or debugging of the Product.

The Software and the Product may not be sublicensed or relicensed by Licensee nor be deployed or distributed to, or for the benefit of, any third party, including consultants, and may only be used for the internal business purposes of Licensee as specified in this Agreement. Licensee agrees not to sublicense, relicense, rent, assign, loan, lease or use the Software or the Product to provide service bureau, ASP, commercial time-sharing, or similar services to third parties, including consultants, or for any other activities or purposes not expressly authorized in this Agreement without the express, prior written consent of Licensor in each instance. Other than pursuant to a regularly scheduled and followed backup policy applicable to substantially all software licensed by Licensee, Licensee may make no more than one copy of the Software for back-up purposes in support of the use of the Product. Use of the Product is restricted to the number of users, CPUs, seats and/or servers and computer system and machine class, if applicable, for which License Fees have been paid, as specified in the Cover Page and/or in Schedule A (or as specified during user registration if this Agreement is being displayed and accepted electronically.).

Section 2.05 – Compliance Verification: At least once every calendar year and, absent reasonable suspicion of breach of this Agreement, no more than twice in one calendar year, Licensor shall be entitled, after giving Licensee at least five (5) days' notice and subject to Licensee's reasonable requirements relative to safety and security, to audit and inspect Licensee's records and facilities as is reasonably necessary for Licensor to ensure compliance with the provisions of this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if Licensor reasonably suspects that Licensee has breached this Agreement, Licensor may audit Licensee's Product-related activities with one (1) day's notice. Licensee shall maintain complete and accurate records, available on request to Licensor, indicating the location(s) where each Product has been installed and, as applicable, the Computer/computer system and the number of users, CPUs, seats, and servers for each Product. If Licensee's non-compliance with this Agreement has resulted in a loss that is equal to or greater than five percent (5%) of the License Fee paid to date for that year or is otherwise reasonably determined to be a material breach of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Licensee shall reimburse Licensor in full for the cost of such audit in addition to paying any other fees, costs, or damages associated with the non-compliance or breach.

Section 2.06 – Documentation Use: Documentation may be used only in support of authorized use of the Software and the Product as specified in this Agreement.

Section 2.07 – Services: Unless otherwise defined in a separate Extended Service Agreement or Product Maintenance Agreement, Support Services provided by Licensor to Licensee shall consist of technical phone support or e-mail support, at Licensor's discretion, offered for the duration of the Initial License Term only, related to: (a) installation, site preparation and planning; (b) user operation; and (c) Updates. The Initial License Term shall be 12 months beginning on the Effective Date as indicated on the Cover Page. Licensor agrees to provide Support Services specified in this Agreement on the Effective Date for the Initial License Term, using commercially

reasonable efforts in doing so. The non-refundable Service Charge must be paid in accordance with the terms of this Agreement in order for Licensee to be entitled to the Support Services for the Initial License Term. Licensor has no obligation to provide Support Services or any other services for: (i) altered or modified Software or Products; (ii) third party software or applications being used in conjunction with the Software or Products; (iii) Product Problems or other such problems which arise as a result of Licensee's negligence or fault, or from malfunctions of Licensee's hardware or its operating systems; (iv) Product Problems or other such problems which result from changes to the operating environment which make it incompatible with the operating environment for which the Software or Product was originally provided, including without limitation, additions or changes to hardware, operating systems, compilers, or co-resident software; nor has Licensor any obligation to assist Licensee to develop or debug applications which use the Software or Product. At any given time, Licensor shall provide Support Services for the then-current, general-release version of the Software and Product, and the immediately preceding general release version of such Software and Product, but only for a period of six (6) months following the general release of the then-current version of the Software and Product. In all cases, Licensor shall provide Support Services only during the Initial License Term and any Renewal Term.

Section 2.08 – Renewal: If, at least thirty (30) days before the end of the Initial License Term or any subsequent Renewal Term, Licensee does not notify, in writing, Licensor that Licensee will not renew this Agreement, then this Agreement shall be deemed automatically renewed by Licensee for an additional one year Renewal Term, which will include the right to Support Services. License Fees for such Renewal Term will be billed and must be paid in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. With regards to renewal of this Agreement, the License Fee is subject to reasonable increase at the sole discretion of Licensor. Licensee is entitled to receive Updates during the Initial License Term or any subsequent Renewal Term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE III: PAYMENT

Section 3.01 -- Fees: Licensee shall promptly pay the License Fee and Initial Service Charge within thirty (30) days of delivery of the Product. Additional Service Charges, costs, and fees for any services beyond those described in Section 2.07 will be charged for and invoiced separately at Licensor's discretion.

Section 3.02 -- Costs: Licensee shall pay all direct costs incurred by Licensor in providing Support Services or any other services pursuant to this Agreement. Such direct costs shall include (without limitation) postage, shipping, media charges, telephone, travel, material and reproduction costs.

Section 3.03 -- Invoicing and Payment: Licensor shall invoice Licensee monthly for any costs incurred by Licensor in providing Support Services or any other services under this Agreement or for any balance due on the License Fee. Upon request of Licensee, such invoices shall be accompanied by receipts evidencing such costs. Licensee shall pay any such invoice in full within thirty (30) days of receipt, or in the case of overdue License Fees or other overdue balances, within ten (10) days of receipt of the invoice. Any amounts payable by

EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY SET FORTH IN SECTION 5.01 AND EXCEPT FOR ANY WARRANTY, CONDITION, REPRESENTATION OR TERM TO THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE SAME CANNOT OR MAY NOT BE EXCLUDED OR LIMITED BY LAW APPLICABLE TO LICENSEE IN LICENSEE'S JURISDICTION, LICENSOR AND ITS SUPPLIERS HEREBY EXPRESSLY DISCLAIM ANY AND ALL WARRANTIES, CONDITIONS, REPRESENTATIONS,

GUARANTEES OR TERMS (EXPRESS OR IMPLIED WHETHER BY STATUTE, COMMON LAW, CUSTOM, USAGE OR OTHERWISE) AS TO ANY MATTER INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION THE WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, INTEGRATION, SATISFACTORY QUALITY, FITNESS FOR ANY PARTICULAR PURPOSE, OR NON-INFRINGEMENT OF ANY INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS OF ANY THIRD PARTY.

Section 5.03 -- Defect Notice: Any Defect Notice must be received by Licensor within thirty (30) days after delivery of the Product. Upon receiving a Defect Notice from Licensee, Licensor shall review the asserted discrepancy to determine if the discrepancy is valid. If, in the reasonable professional judgment of Licensor the discrepancy is valid, Licensor's only obligation shall be, in the Licensor's sole discretion, to correct the discrepancy, using commercially reasonable efforts to do so, or to refund the portion of the License Fee appropriate to the particular defect in question. SAVINGS, EVEN IF A LICENSOR REPRESENTATIVE HAS BEEN ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH LOSS, DAMAGES, CLAIMS OR COSTS OR FOR ANY CLAIM BY ANY THIRD PARTY. In the event that any Licensee Enhancement does not qualify as a "work made for hire" as a matter of law, Licensee hereby

irrevocably and unconditionally agrees to assign and assigns all right, title and interest throughout the world in and to such Licensee Enhancements to Licensor and agrees to execute any and all documents and take any and all further actions required to confirm and perfect such assignment, at Licensor's request. Section 6.02 -- Reverse Engineering: Reverse engineering, disassembly, decompilation and other source code derivation of the Software or the Product are strictly prohibited.

Section 6.03 -- Confidentiality: Licensee hereby acknowledges that the Software, the Product, the Documentation, and related disclosures, include information that is Confidential Information of Licensor. Licensee hereby agrees not to disclose such information except to persons and organizations expressly authorized in writing by Licensor to receive such information. The foregoing does not apply to information: (i) rightfully known by Licensee prior to receipt; or (ii) which becomes public knowledge by acts other than those of the parties after receiving such information; or (iii) is independently developed by Licensee without a breach of obligations hereunder; or (iv) is rightfully received by Licensee from a third party without restriction and without breach of this Agreement.

Section 6.04 -- Copies: Except as expressly authorized in this Agreement, Licensee shall not copy the Software, Product or Documentation and shall not allow the Software, Product or Documentation to be copied without the prior written consent of Licensor.

Section 6.05 -- Indemnification: To the extent permitted by law, Licensee shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Licensor against any damages or liability arising from use of the Software, Product or Documentation by Licensee and/or any breach by Licensee of this Agreement

ARTICLE VII: MISCELLANEOUS

Section 7.01 -- Assignments: Licensee may not assign or otherwise transfer this Agreement or any right hereunder, including by operation of law, without the prior written consent of Licensor. Any purported assignment in violation of this Section 7.01 shall be void and without effect.

Section 7.02 -- Entire Agreement: This Agreement expresses the entire understanding of the parties and supersedes previous verbal and written agreements between the parties concerning licensing of the Product. Licensee hereby acknowledges that the Documentation shall in no way lessen Licensee's obligations to Licensor under this Agreement or broaden Licensee's rights under this Agreement.

Section 7.03 -- Equitable Remedies: Licensee hereby acknowledges that damages at law may be an inadequate remedy for Licensee's breach of this Agreement. Therefore, Licensee shall have the right to seek specific performance, injunction or other equitable remedy in the event of a breach of this Agreement by Licensee, without necessity of posting a bond or other security thereof.

Section 7.04 -- Amendments and Modifications: Waivers, alterations, modifications or amendments of a provision of this Agreement shall not be binding unless such waiver, alteration, modification or amendment is in writing and signed by the party to be bound.

Section 7.05 -- Severability: If any provision of this Agreement is rendered invalid, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 7.06 -- Captions: The headings and captions of this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference and do not define, limit or describe the scope or intent of this Agreement or any particular section, paragraph, or provision.

Section 7.07 -- Governing Law: This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Minnesota. This Agreement will not be governed by the conflict of law rules of any jurisdiction or the United Nations Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods, the application of which is expressly excluded.

Section 7.08 -- Notice: Notices shall be in writing and shall be deemed delivered in person when delivered by courier or mailed postage to the person and address designated on the Cover Page.

Section 7.09 -- Bankruptcy: If Licensor must institute, defend, appear or attend a bankruptcy proceeding as a result of the filing of bankruptcy by Licensee, fees and expenses shall be borne by Licensee. If Licensee has a bankruptcy proceeding filed against it, Licensor shall recover attorney fees, expert witness fees, and other costs incurred by such other party in connection with the bankruptcy proceeding, hearing or trial. If Licensee is subject to insolvency, bankruptcy, or any other such proceedings, then Licensor may, in its sole discretion, require Licensee or its receiver or such equivalent party to return the Product(s) and Documentation to Licensor or to destroy them, and, at Licensor's sole discretion, all Support Services hereunder will cease. In all such events as described in this Section, Licensee will not be entitled to any refund of Licensee Fees or Service Charges.

Section 7.10 -- Waiver: Waiver of any breach of this Agreement shall not constitute waiver of another breach. Failing to enforce a provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver or create an estoppel from enforcing such provision.

Section 7.11 -- Arbitration: Any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Agreement, or breach thereof, shall be settled by arbitration in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association, and will be held at Madison, Wisconsin. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrators may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. Qualified Arbitrators shall be selected by the parties in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. Each party shall have the right of discovery as set forth in the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

Section 7.12 -- Arbitration or Litigation Expense: In the event of litigation or arbitration arising out of this Agreement, each party shall pay its own costs and expenses of litigation and arbitration (excluding fees and expenses of arbitrators and administrative fees and expenses of arbitration).

Section 7.13 -- Other Authorizations: Licensee hereby authorizes Licensor to list Licensee as a customer in any of Licensor's marketing materials, with a brief description of the Product and/or Support Services provided to Licensee, and to provide a copy of this Agreement in conjunction with a financing transaction, acquisition, merger, or other such transactions, or in conjunction with legal or professional consultation.

Section 7.14 -- Export Rules: Licensee will comply with all applicable export and related laws and regulations, obtain any applicable export licenses, and it will not export or re-export directly or indirectly (including via remote access) any part of the Software, Product, Documentation, and/or technical

data to any country subject to an embargo by the United States. Licensee also may not export and/or re-export the Software or the Product, including technical data, to individuals and companies listed on any list of parties proscribed by the United States Government or any agency thereof. In addition, Licensee may not export and/or re-export Software, Product, Documentation and/or technical data, if it knows or has reason to know that a recipient or end-user is engaged in the design, development and use of weapons of mass destruction or is engaged in activities which may be deemed a threat to the national security of the United States.

Section 7.15 -- Notice to U.S. Government End Users: Products acquired with United States Federal Government funds or intended for use within or for any United States federal agency are provided with "Restricted Rights" as defined in DFARS 252.227-7013(c)(1)(ii) or FAR 52.227-19 and are subject to any other such applicable regulations of the U.S. Government.
