Advanced Creative Writing Proposal

What is it?

- Advanced Creative Writing is a student-led course where participants explore various genres (novel, short story, poetry, etc.).
- They compose and analyze works based on their interests and writing goals, with teacher feedback.
- Students engage in daily writer's notebooks, peer feedback sessions, and refine their craft.
- The goal is to create a multi-genre capstone portfolio, developed through three writing installments.

Why does River Falls High School need it?

- With more students taking Creative Writing, the English Department saw the need for advanced options.
- Many students seek a more rigorous course that challenges them while allowing creative freedom.
- This course provides individualized instruction and helps students refine their writing. With more aspiring authors, the course adapts to current needs, offering valuable opportunities.
- It also gives students a competitive edge for jobs and college applications.

Rigor

- This course challenges students to pursue their interests, develop metacognitive skills, and refine their writing voice. By offering choice, it taps into intrinsic motivation, encouraging exploration of diverse genres.
- Advanced Creative Writing enhances critical thinking, requiring imaginative, analytical, and abstract thought.
- Students will gain perspective by reading peers' work, fostering empathy, and social awareness.
- Writing improves communication skills, helping students naturally enhance grammar, language, and mechanics.

The Teacher's Role in a Student Centered Class

- Advanced Creative Writing will emphasize a dialogical engagement where students participate in peer evaluation and collaborate to refine their written work.
- To maintain structure and ensure student progress, the multigenre writing portfolio will consist of multiple installments wherein students will engage in risk-taking and thoughtful revision, with teacher guidance and support.

Course Description	Advanced Creative Writing is a student-led course, where participants explore multiple written genres (novel, short story, poetry, etc). They engage in the composition and analysis of works aligned with their individual interests and writing goals, receiving feedback and direction from the teacher. Within this framework, students are required to participate in daily writer's notebooks, peer feedback sessions, and refinement of their written craft. The course's goal is for each student to create a comprehensive capstone writing portfolio based on their genres of interest. Students will create a multi-genre portfolio wherein they will participate in the writing process by writing three separate installments of writing and putting them together to create their portfolio.

With an increased number of students taking Creative Writing, we as an English Department determined a need for advanced learning options. Students often tell us that they want a more rigorous writing course where they are being challenged and allowed to exercise their creative freedom. With this course, teachers would be able to accommodate students who are ready to be challenged, providing individualized instruction through conferences and helping students fine-tune their writing. We are also seeing an increased number of students who are or are wanting to become published authors. This course will be a way for teachers to adapt to current needs and create learning opportunities for all students. Students taking Advanced Creative Writing and using the skills from it will give them a competitive edge when applying for jobs and colleges.

By providing choice, we are leaning into student intrinsic motivations while encouraging them to explore diverse literary genres that are aligned with their interests.</p> <p>Advanced Creative Writing will emphasize a dialogical engagement where students participate in peer evaluation and collaborate to refine their written work. To maintain structure and ensure student progress, the multigenre writing portfolio will consist of multiple installments wherein students will engage in risk-taking and thoughtful revision, with teacher guidance and support.</p> <p>Advanced Creative Writing will be an excellent way for students to enhance their critical thinking skills. Not only will students need to think imaginatively but they will also need to analyze and create complex themes, consider multiple perspectives, and think abstractly. By reading texts written by peers and others students will gain perspective on others' lived experiences, diversifying their lens of the world around them and enriching their culture and social awareness, fostering empathy and social awareness.</p> <p>Writing is a fundamental tool of communication and by developing their skills they will become more articulate, naturally helping them improve their grammar, language usage, spelling, and mechanics.</p>

Career and Technical Writing

Career and Technical Writing is...

- a .5 credit elective for juniors and seniors.
- focused on reading and writing in the context for work-related activities.
- an opportunity for students to work collaboratively and independently to achieve work-related communication goals.
- a vehicle for building an awareness of the need to be proficient in reading, writing, speaking, and listening to be successful in the world of work.

Types of Learning Experiences

- Reading and understanding professional publications both to build reading skills and to affirm the importance of lifelong learning.
- Effectively interpreting industry-related written and visual texts (e.g. directions, flow charts, schematics, diagrams, graphs, charts, etc.)
- Producing technical documents that incorporate visual and written components using clear, concise, effective communication.
- Engaging in speaking and listening activities reflecting informal and formal job-related purposes.

Justification for its inclusion at RFHS

- Students have diverse interests and needs; a course tied more explicitly to technical and work-related communication enhances students' understanding of the relevance strong communication skills in life outside of school.
- Technical reading and writing are important elements of diverse post-secondary paths, and good communication skills enhance any potential employee's or employer's skill set.
- This class is a natural outgrowth of our increasing emphasis on Academic and Career Planning, and our goal to increase their readiness for life outside of the classroom.

Target Students and Rigor

- The course targets students who plan to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering, and industry, which can encompass a wide cross-section of the school.
- Professional texts and visual texts are complex and often require specific knowledge and the ability to make strong inferences to support understanding, skills that require multiple depths of knowledge.
- Anchoring academic skills explicitly to the real world facilitates critical thinking, problem-solving, perseverance, and adaptability—skills that are essential to navigate life in and outside of school.

Course Description	This one-term course works to meet the communication needs and interests of students who plan to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering, and industry. Students will work to develop practical skills related to effectively interpreting industry-related written and visual texts (e.g. flow charts, schematics, diagrams, graphs, charts, professional publications, etc.), producing technical documents that incorporate visual and written components, and written and spoken communication and collaboration skills.

This course would be a part of continuing efforts to adapt to and meet students' academic and career-related interests and needs. Technical reading and writing are important elements of diverse post-secondary paths, and good communication skills enhance any potential employee's or employer's skill set. Though the current course offerings in the English department help students develop good communication skills, a course tied more explicitly to technical and work-related communication enhances students' understanding of the relevance of those skills. This may be particularly true for a cohort of students who may find more traditional English classes less relevant or compelling.

Justification	<p>Explain how this course meets certain criteria of Goal 4.1 of the SDRF Strategic Plan: Embed into curriculum and instruction: critical thinking, problem-solving, perseverance, adaptability, social-emotional awareness, financial literacy, & desire for lifelong learning.</p> <p>The goal of the course is to provide learning opportunities for students to engage effectively with their personal and professional worlds through strong, context-based communication skills. The class would provide students with opportunities to work collaboratively and independently to build those skills. Interpreting and creating texts that employ both visual and written components that target specific purposes facilitates critical thinking, problem-solving, perseverance, and adaptability. For example, exposure to professional publications heightens students' awareness of the need to be life-long learners regardless of what ultimate career or field they pursue, and interpreting or creating clear instructions requires critical thinking, problem-solving, and perseverance. In addition, the plan for the English department, Technology Education department, and Agriculture department to build the curriculum collaboratively models interconnectedness and educational transference that benefits students' success.</p>																		
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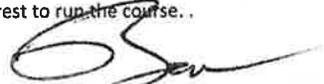
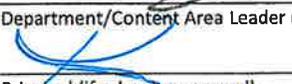
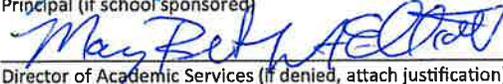
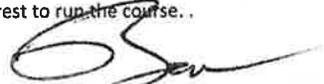
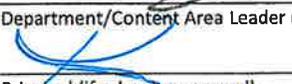
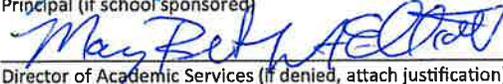
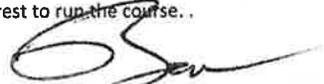
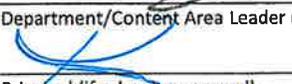
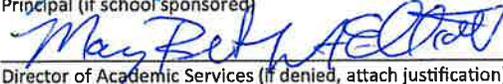

Course Description	This course encompasses the study of our natural resources and basic fish and wildlife management. Topics include groundwater quality, big game wildlife management, outdoor recreation, forestry, air pollution, soil, sustainability, fish and renewable energy. Students will be working in an aquaculture/hydroponics lab completing a variety of hands-on activities. Guest speakers and field trips will be embedded in the course to increase our understanding.

Currently, the Natural Resources class offers deep level thinking, and problem solving skills on Sustainable Ag, Soils, Wildlife Management, Fish and Water Quality, and Renewable Energy. Students will engage in fieldwork, hands-on lab, and field trips to gather a deeper appreciation for the environment. Additionally, by adding nine weeks to this course, students will have the opportunity to earn transcribed credits through CVTC, safety certifications in ATV, Snowmobile, and Boaters safety, and adding a forestry unit that will utilize the school forest.

Overall, the revised course is poised to be a valuable addition to our curriculum, enriching the educational experiences of our students while aligning to the school district strategic plan.</p>

What are the new reading readiness screener requirements and when do those requirements take effect?

A single reading readiness screener will be administered to Wisconsin students in 4K through grade 3 beginning in the school year 2024-2025. The assessment must be administered to 4K students twice per year. Once no more than 45 days into the school year and once no more than 45 days prior to the end of the school year.



What is the new reading readiness screener?

DPI has selected AIMSweb+ as the statewide universal screening tool for PK-3.

Beginning in the 2024-2025 school year, provide parents and families with results of the reading readiness screener no later than 10 days after the assessment is scored in an understandable format.

Personal Reading Plans

Which students will receive a personal reading plan?

Any child in grades K-3 who scores below the 25th percentile on the reading readiness screener must receive a personal reading plan. Act 20 requires that schools monitor student reading development progress weekly. The term “progress monitoring” here does not have the same meaning as progress monitoring required for special education evaluation when considering specific learning disability. Some form of weekly progress monitoring is required and must be outlined in a child’s personalized reading³⁹ plan.

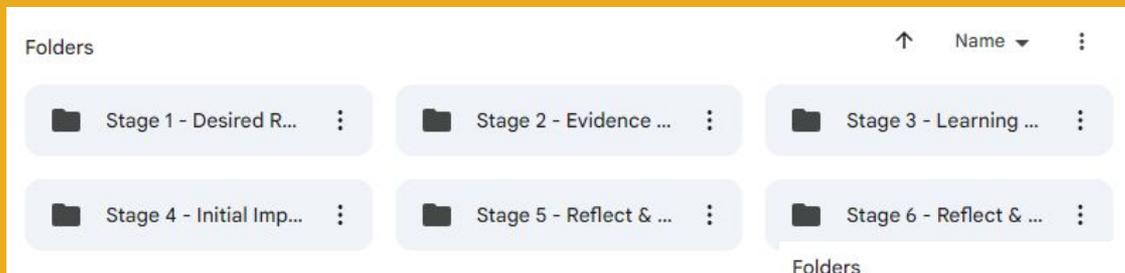
