Board of Education Report



The first nine weeks are behind us and we will soon be sitting in the bleachers watching the winter activities. It is hard to believe the year 2022 is quickly approaching, but one thing is certain-It has been a really good year. We have a wonderful blend of students and it has been really rewarding to watch the upperclassmen grow and mature into young adults as much as I have enjoyed getting to know the freshman with each passing day. I could not begin to list all the great things our students and staff have accomplished this year and I am certain those positive things will continue. Each month I have the pleasure to share just a few of the many, many great things that we have going on at the high school.

1. 11th grade English- Ms. Angie Oberg:

The start of the school year has gone well in junior English. Students have focused on learning and then applying the three steps to critical thinking. As they understand the basics, analyze the material, and draw conclusions about a variety of writing passages (from poetry to nonfiction articles to novels), the students are establishing the foundation through verbal and written forms of how to express each of the three steps. We have been implementing a new activity each week, and the variety of approaches has empowered the students to strengthen those critical thinking skills with enthusiasm.

Students have also been working on formal writing techniques through paragraphs and essays. Our goal this year is to help the students gain confidence and competence in a variety of writing forms while developing a personal style. See the following list for the topics: song analysis (start of year) informal writing, Gatsby and Of Mice and Men--formal writing--start with enumeration, then clarification, then body paragraphs, finally an essay at the end, Analogy--compare themselves to an item, personality quiz (strengths and weaknesses) formal writing--body paragraphs, what we keep (about an object that they have kept and to which they assign meaning)--formal writing--personal essay, person who has influenced them--formal writing--personal essay, quote with which they agree and one with which they disagree--formal writing--body paragraph, Othello/Flowers for Algernon--formal writing--start with clarification, then body paragraphs, finally an essay at the end, various persuasive topics for ACT--formal writing--essay, childhood place (what places makes them feel most like themselves)--formal writing--personal essay, junior year lessons (what three lessons have been learned or what world event has affected the junior year)--formal personal essay, and practice college scholarship/job essays (topics vary but usually what obstacle have you overcome and what activity has shaped you)--formal personal essay

One of the best adjustments in junior English has been the change in independent reading. The students have had the opportunity to choose to read many new fiction books through a strong collaboration with the media center and a curated classroom library. Students have been selecting their independent reading from the books in the library for the last several years, which has worked well. One of my personal goals for the classroom is to foster a passion for reading. I believe that many students have rediscovered an interest in reading as a result of independent reading and from the accessibility of the collection of books in my classroom. I have found that about 85-90 percent of the students are reading the books (compared to 30-40 percent in the past) and are enjoying reading and talking about what they are reading with their peers.

2. 9th grade Science Field Trip :



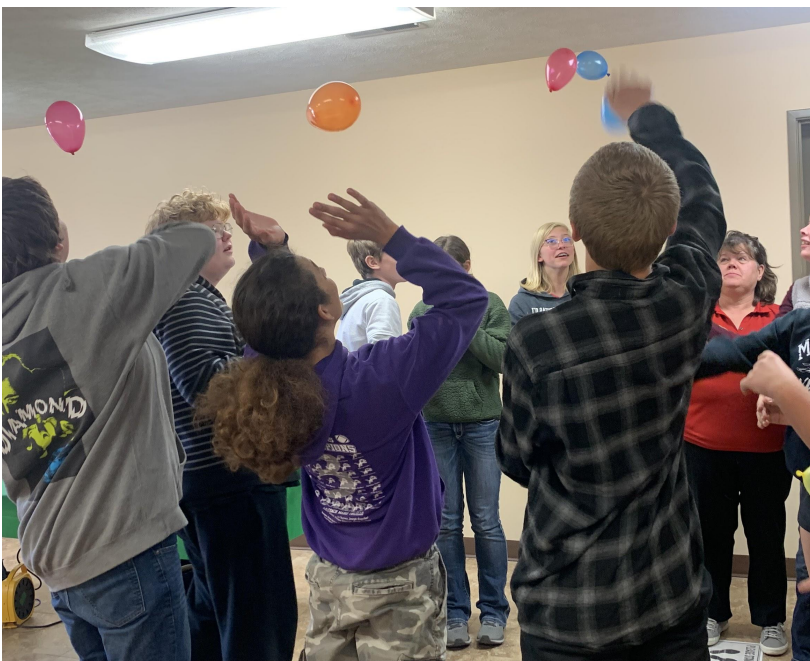
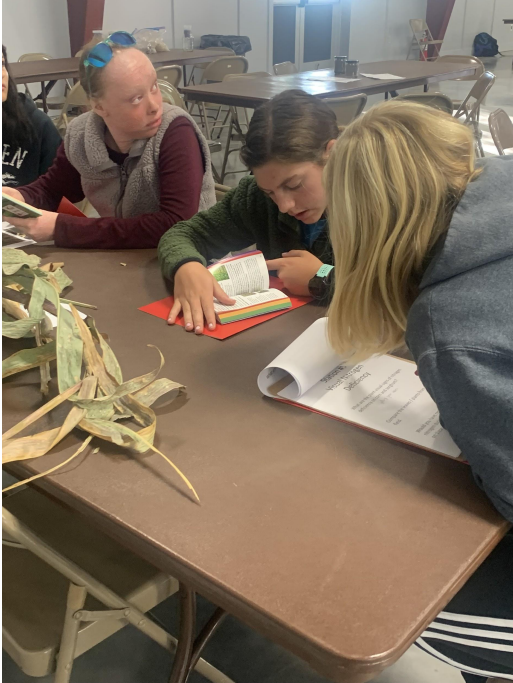
Science Field Day Report

Egenberger-

On 10/13/21 the 9th grade class went to Holdrege, students had an option to take 2 different tracts, both exploring different career opportunities involved in science and other science related topics. Some of the sessions that my group participated in discussed entrepreneurship, food science, textile science, and the science of physical therapy. The students got to experiment with a muscle stimulator, dye different fabrics, and test foods for starch and sugar. Other sessions discussed the power of addiction, mental health, and the spread of germs.



Soelberg - I was with the group that was on Tract 1, which was more agriculture based for the breakout sessions. We learned about ruminant nutrition and students had the opportunity to put their hand into a fistulated rumen research steer. They also got to learn about meat science and the differences in meat based on the location it comes from on the cow. Then we learned about nitrates and how they are important for soil with crops, but can be concerning if there are high levels in the water and what detection materials are used to look at nitrate levels in soil, water and plants. The last session we visited was insect trivia where they learned about honeybees, mosquitos and other insects found in Nebraska and their importance in agriculture.

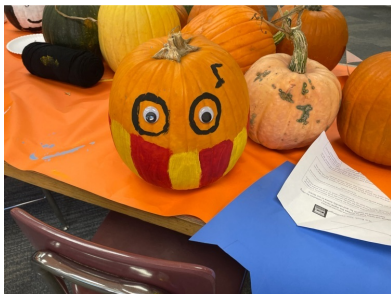
One School, One Book-

Internal Board Policies - Methods of OperationPublic Participation at Board MeetingsA. Attend

Members of the public shall be permitted to attend and to speak at board meetings. Any member of the public desiring to address the body shall be required to identify himself or herself, including an address and the name of any organization represented by such person, unless the address requirement is waived to protect the security of the individual.

The Board may allow advisors, consultants, and other persons who are not Board members to appear at the meeting via telephone or other similar means.

The chair has the authority to assure that people conduct themselves in an orderly manner at the meeting. Undue interruption or other interference with the orderly conduct of business will not be allowed. The chair may order persons who are disorderly to be removed from the meeting.

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B. Hear

The board will, upon request, make a reasonable effort to accommodate the public's right to hear the discussion and testimony presented at the meeting.

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C. Record

Members of the public may use recording devices (tape recorder, video camera, etc.) to record any part of a meeting of a public body, except for closed sessions. No recording, other than note taking, shall be done without informing the President in advance. The President shall control the placement of the recording device so the device does not obstruct the view of Board members or other members of the public attending the meeting and does not otherwise interfere with the meeting.

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D. Access to Written Materials

At least one copy of all reproducible written material to be discussed at an open meeting will be made available at the meeting for examination and copying by members of the public.

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E. Speak

Members of the public will be permitted to speak at Board meetings at which a public forum is on the Agenda. Members of the public may also speak when invited to make a presentation or when recognized by the chair. The Board is not required to allow members of the public to speak at each meeting. However, the Board will not forbid public participation at all meetings.

Members of the public will not be required to have their name be placed on the agenda prior to the meeting in order to speak about items on the agenda.

Members of the public who desire to address the Board will be required to identify themselves.

The President or chair for the meeting shall have the authority to establish reasonable time limits for individual speakers and for the duration of public forum sessions.

Speakers will be permitted to address the Board consistent with free speech rights. However, offensive language, defamatory remarks, and hostile conduct will not be tolerated. Further, charges or complaints against a school employee shall not be made for the first time at a public Board meeting without having followed the school's complaint procedure.
