ACCOUNT SERVICES CONTRACT

This ACCOUNT SERVICES CONTRACT (the "Agreement") is made and entered into and effective on 05/23/2025 by and between EDU Healthcare, LLC, a North Carolina limited liability company ("EDU HEALTHCARE") and SCHOOL ASSOCIATION FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION (DUPAGE) SASED, "Account" located at 2900 Ogden Lisle, IL 60532

(Collectively referred to as "Parties")

1. INTRODUCTION

EDU HEALTHCARE is a workforce solutions provider engaged in the business of recruiting, staffing, placing, and managing providers of occupational, speech, physical, and psychological therapy, audiology, nursing care, and related health care services (the "Services"). Account desires EDU HEALTHCARE to supply one or more of its staff members ("Provider") to render such services to the students ("Students") of Account. To that end, the Parties enter into this Agreement:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and conditions herein contained, EDU HEALTHCARE and Account hereto intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

2. TERM AND TERMINATION

This Agreement shall continue for a term outlined in Schedule A, subject to the provisions contained in this section. This Agreement may be terminated due to the following: 1) Death or disability of the Provider assigned to Account. For these purposes, "disability" means a physical or mental impairment that prevents the performance of essential job functions, with or without accommodation; 2) Termination of the at-will employment relationship between EDU HEALTHCARE and the Provider, which prevents the rendering of Services to the Account's Students; 3) By EDU HEALTHCARE for a material breach of this Agreement. For these purposes, a material breach can include, but is not limited to, the Account's failure to pay invoices in a timely fashion and the reasonable belief by EDU HEALTHCARE that the Account is violating any federal or state anti-discrimination or workplace law or regulation after EDU HEALTHCARE has put Account on notice of its concern and the Account has failed to correct the perceived violation promptly. 4) By Account upon thirty (30) days prior written notice for Cause. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Cause" shall mean acts or a willful failure to act by Provider or Providers that results in providing poor Services to Account's Students. Account shall immediately inform EDU HEALTHCARE and submit written documentation when such an act occurs. When this Agreement is terminated in accordance with Section 2, any unsatisfied obligation that arose prior to the termination date shall survive the termination until satisfied.

3. RENEWAL

This Agreement shall automatically renew at the end of the term, outlined in Schedule A of this Agreement, for successive one (1) year terms unless either Party provides a written notice at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of the term or renewal term, as applicable, of such Party's decision not to automatically renew this Agreement.

4. DUTIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF EDU HEALTHCARE

EDU HEALTHCARE shall provide the Services under the terms of this Agreement and in accordance with the requirements of federal, state, and local laws and applicable rules and regulations. EDU HEALTHCARE is in compliance and will maintain compliance with all applicable laws, including but not limited to billing, claims, submission laws, and regulations in the performance of its services. EDU HEALTHCARE will keep such records relating to the Services rendered pursuant to this Agreement. Providers will assist the Account in maintaining Student records in accordance with accepted professional standards and practices and in a manner designed to facilitate the retrieval of necessary data. Upon request by the Account, EDU HEALTHCARE shall make available all records concerning students of the account in its possession or control to ensure easy access for any potential future audits. EDU HEALTHCARE shall retain Student records for the period(s) required by state and federal law but in no event for less than ten (10) years from the date the Services were rendered. EDU HEALTHCARE will recruit, screen, interview, and assign Providers to meet Account's needs. EDU HEALTHCARE will require all Providers to sign confidentiality agreements by which they promise to protect the Account's confidential information and the student's medical information. EDU HEALTHCARE will pay wages to employees in accordance with applicable state and federal laws governing wages and hours and wage payment. EDU HEALTHCARE will make all required withholdings for payroll and income taxes from employees' wages and will pay workers' compensation insurance premiums and unemployment taxes.

5. DUTIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF ACCOUNT

Account shall provide written policies and procedures for Services and shall comply in all material respects with applicable state and federal laws and regulations. Account shall maintain individual Student records in accordance with state and federal law. Account shall be made available to EDU HEALTHCARE and its Providers for review and inspection, upon reasonable request, individual records necessary for the proper evaluation and treatment of the student. EDU HEALTHCARE agrees to maintain the confidentiality of such records in accordance with applicable law. Account shall promptly notify EDU HEALTHCARE of any issues or concerns it has with the Provider, whether related to attendance, performance, failure to adhere to Account's workplace policies, procedures, or any other matter. Account shall immediately inform EDU HEALTHCARE if it suspects that EDU HEALTHCARE is making any billing errors, or that a Provider is engaging in fraudulent activity or is violating or has violated any law.

6. MATERIALS

Account shall make available adequate materials and supplies, working and storage space to Provider, so as to enable Provider to render the Services contemplated by this Agreement. This shall include reasonable use of the Account's copy machine, fax machine, email, computer, service materials, and telephone. Account shall maintain the space in compliance with all applicable laws, rules, and regulations.

7. NO MATERIAL CHANGE

Account shall make no material change in the duties of a Provider without EDU HEALTHCARE'S written consent to the material change.

8. COMPENSATION

Payment will be made in accordance with bill rates listed in the attached Schedule A. Effective on the Agreement renewal date and every year thereafter, bill rates for services as indicated on the attached Schedule A of this agreement will be increased by three percent (3%) to keep in line with inflationary and competitive wage rate increases. Travel from facility to facility will be reimbursed to EDU HEALTHCARE based on the Standard Federal Mileage Reimbursement Rate.

9. PAYMENT TERMS & OVERTIME

Account will be billed for all services as outlined in the attached Schedule A. EDU HEALTHCARE pays its Providers overtime in compliance with federal, state, and/or local laws. EDU HEALTHCARE will bill the Account at one and one-half times the regular bill rate for all hours EDU HEALTHCARE is required to pay the Provider's overtime.

10. TIMEKEEPING

Account will ensure that Providers accurately record the start and stop times for all hours worked. The Account will approve all hours worked, including any applicable overtime hours, on a Provider's time sheet. EDU HEALTHCARE will generate an invoice for the Account based on the timesheets submitted. Account must review the invoice, notify EDU HEALTHCARE of any error, and provide a corrected invoice that is mutually acceptable to both parties within a reasonable time. In the event the Account fails to dispute or report any errors within thirty (30) days of the invoice date, errors shall not be accepted as a disputed charge, and invoices will be due and payable in full.

11. GUARANTEED MINIMUM HOURS

Account agrees to provide Provider the guaranteed number of work hours per week specified in the attached Schedule A and Work Schedule B. Cancellation of prescheduled workdays or reduction in work hours by Account will be billed, reflecting the guaranteed minimum work hours. Minimum work hours shall be reduced to reflect scheduled school closings for holidays and planning days, except for those holidays or planning days that are approved by the Account and listed on Schedule B.

12. EMPLOYMENT OF PROVIDERS

Account agrees that it will not directly or indirectly, personally or through an agent or agency, contract with or employ any Provider introduced or referred by EDU HEALTHCARE for a period of one year after the latest date of introduction, referral, placement, or end of the contract assignment. If Account or its affiliate enters into such a relationship or refers Providers to a third party for employment, Account agrees to pay an amount equal to \$21,500 or thirty-five (35) percent (whichever is greater) of the Provider's first year's annualized salary, including any signing bonuses, as agreed upon at the time of hiring. Payment is due and payable to EDU Healthcare upon the start date.

13. ASSIGNMENT

Account will not transfer or assign this Agreement without EDU HEALTHCARE's written consent.

14. PAID SICK LEAVE

N/A

15. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

It is mutually understood and agreed that EDU HEALTHCARE is an independent contractor rendering Services pursuant to this Agreement through its Provider. The Account shall neither have nor exercise any control or direction over the methods by which the Provider will render Services. The Provider will render Services under this Agreement in accordance with the accepted methods and standards of the relevant professional specialty. The Account shall have the right to request Services but not to control how the Services are rendered. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to make Provider the employee of the Account.

16. CONFIDENTIALITY

EDU HEALTHCARE and Account agree to maintain the confidentiality of information contained in this Agreement and the medical records of Account's Students. Account and EDU HEALTHCARE agree they are Covered Entities and subject to all applicable HIPAA regulations. The medical record information may be disseminated as permitted or required by law.

17. INDEMNIFICATION

To the extent permitted by law, EDU HEALTHCARE will defend, indemnify, and hold Account and its parent, subsidiaries, directors, officers, agents, representatives, and employees harmless from all claims, losses, and liabilities (including reasonable attorneys' fees) to the extent caused by EDU HEALTHCARE's breach of this Agreement; its failure to discharge its duties and responsibilities set forth in this Agreement; or the negligence, gross negligence, or willful misconduct of EDU HEALTHCARE's officers, employees, or authorized agents in the discharge of those duties and responsibilities. To the extent permitted by law, Account will defend, indemnify, and hold EDU HEALTHCARE and its parent, subsidiaries, directors, officers, agents, representatives, and employees harmless from all claims, losses, and liabilities (including reasonable attorneys' fees) to the extent caused by Account's breach of this Agreement; its failure to discharge its duties and responsibilities set forth in this Agreement; or the negligence, gross negligence, or willful misconduct of Account or Account's officers, employees, or authorized agents in the discharge of those duties and responsibilities. Neither Party shall be liable for nor be required to indemnify the other Party for any incidental, consequential, exemplary, special, punitive, or lost profit damages that arise in connection with this Agreement, regardless of the form of action (whether in contract, tort, negligence, strict liability, or otherwise) and regardless of how characterized, even if such party has been advised of the possibility of such damages. As a condition precedent to indemnification, the Party seeking indemnification will inform the other Party within ten business days after it receives notice of any claim, loss, liability, or demand for which it seeks indemnification from the other Party; and the Party seeking indemnification will cooperate in the investigation and defense of any such matter. The provisions in this section constitute the complete agreement between the parties concerning indemnification, and each Party waives its right to assert any common-law indemnification or contribution claim against the other Party.

18. INSURANCE

During the term of this Agreement, EDU HEALTHCARE at its sole cost and expense, and for the benefit of SASSED, shall carry and maintain the following insurance:

1. Comprehensive general liability and property damage insurance, insuring against all liability of EDU HEALTHCARE related to the Agreement, with a minimum combined single limit of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) per occurrence and Four Million Dollars (\$4,000,000.00) general aggregate; The Commercial General Liability policy shall be endorsed in favor of all Additional Insureds on an ISO CG 2010 (11 85) endorsement form or both ISO CG 2010 (10 01) and CG 2037 (10 01) endorsement forms, or endorsement(s) that provide equivalent coverage. 14.1 If any action is brought by either party to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for its own costs in bringing 4. Umbrella liability insurance with a minimum combined single limit of Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) per occurrence and Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) general aggregate. EDU HEALTHCARE's respective employees; and Workers' Compensation Insurance covering all costs, statutory benefits, and liabilities under State Workers' Compensation and similar laws for Professional Liability Insurance with limits in the per claim amount of not less than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) and the annual aggregate of not less than Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000);

5. Sexual abuse and molestation Insurance with limits of \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate. All insurers shall be licensed by the State of Illinois and rated A+ VII or better by A.M. Best or comparable rating service. The comprehensive general liability and property damage insurance policy, and sexual abuse and molestation policy shall name SASSED, its Board, Board members, employees, and agents as an additional insured on a primary noncontributory basis with a waiver of subrogation in favor of SASSED. Umbrella liability insurance should provide follow form coverage and be at least as broad as the underlying. EDU HEALTHCARE shall provide SASSED with certificates of insurance during the duration of this Agreement. The failure to provide acceptable insurance shall be deemed a breach of this Agreement entitling SASSED to terminate this Agreement immediately. All policies of insurance shall provide by endorsement that no coverage may be canceled or terminated by the insuring company without the insuring company having first given at least 30 days prior written notice to SASSED by mail.

19. ATTORNEY'S FEES

If any action is brought by either party to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for its own costs in bringing or defending such action, including court costs and attorney's fees, except to the extent this Agreement provides otherwise. The Parties agree to cooperate fully and assist the other Party in investigating and resolving any complaints, claims, actions, or proceedings that may be brought by or may involve a Provider.

20. CIVIL RIGHTS

Each party agrees to comply with the provisions of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, and all other applicable state and federal anti-discrimination laws and all regulations promulgated pursuant thereto to the end that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or other protected characteristic be excluded from participation in, be denied benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination in the provision of any care or services.

21. FEDERAL BUDGET RECONCILIATION ACT

Until the expiration of four (4) years from the date of this Agreement, according to Title 42, Section 1395 (x) (v) (1) (A) of the United States Code, EDU HEALTHCARE shall make available upon written request of the Secretary of the United States Department of the Health and Human Services, or the request of the Controller General of the United States General Accounting Office, or any of their duly authorized representatives, copies of such documents as are necessary to substantiate the nature and costs associated with the Services performed by EDU HEALTHCARE under the terms of the Agreement.

22. CAUSES BEYOND CONTROL

Neither Party will be responsible for failure or delay in performance of this Agreement if the failure or delay is due to labor disputes, strikes, fire, riot, war, terrorism, acts of God, or any other causes beyond the control of the nonperforming Party.

23. DEFAULT

If an Event of Default by Account occurs, in addition to the right to terminate this Agreement, EDU HEALTHCARE may seek any other remedy available to it in law or in equity on account of such default. Additionally, any amounts due for Services provided by EDU HEALTHCARE shall be immediately paid to EDU HEALTHCARE. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, either party may terminate this Agreement immediately in the event of a default ("Event of Default") by the other party. With respect to the Account, it shall be an "Event of Default" hereunder: (a) if Account shall fail to keep, observe, or perform any material term or provision of this Agreement, and such default shall continue for a period of ten (10) days after written notice thereof shall have been given to Account by EDU HEALTHCARE, which notice shall specify the event or events constituting the default; (b) if the Account shall petition for reorganization or liquidation under the Bankruptcy Court or apply for, or consent to, the appointment of a receiver, trustee, or liquidator of Account, or of the facility at which Services are being rendered, or admit in writing its respective inability to pay its respective debts as they become due, make a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or otherwise evidence its insolvency or (c) if the Account ceases to be the licensed operator of the facility at which Services are being rendered.

BLAZERWORKS SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS SERVICES AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into by and between **BlazerWorks, LLC** (hereinafter "BW") located at 5550 Peachtree Parkway, Suite 200, Peachtree Corners, GA 30092 and **School Association for Special Education of DuPage County** whose principal address is 2900 Ogden Ave., Lisle, IL 60532 (hereafter referred to as "Client"). This Agreement shall govern the overall terms of the relationship and the parties agree as follows:

1. Scope of Services.

This Agreement sets forth the general terms and conditions governing the contractual relationship between Client and BW regarding the administration and management of providers of personnel to perform services for Client. BW, a licensed entity in the business of providing workforce solutions to the public and private education sector and not a healthcare provider, will use its commercially reasonable efforts to source Consultants for assignment with Client. In such capacity, BW will act as a non-exclusive workforce solutions manager between Client and its supplemental staff ("Consultants") and may carry out its responsibilities hereunder using one or more Secondary Staffing Partners ("SSP"), including its affiliated divisions/companies. During the term of this agreement, all communications regarding the day-to-day activity and professional operations of the services outlined in this agreement will be conducted between BW and Client. BW shall comply, and shall ensure all SSP's agree to comply, with all applicable laws, regulations, rules and ordinances governing the services to be provided by BW and/or SSP pursuant to this Agreement.

2. Independent Contractor.

The parties hereto specify and intend that the relationship of each to the other is that of an independent contractor, and that no Consultant shall at any time be an employee of Client, unless the parties shall otherwise agree in writing.

3. Term and Termination of Contract.

This Agreement shall be effective as of August 1, 2025, and shall continue through July 30, 2026 (the "Term"), unless earlier terminated as provided herein. Either Party may terminate this Agreement without cause by providing the other Party with at least thirty (30) days' prior written notice. Such termination shall be effective at the end of the 30-day notice period or on a later date specified in the notice. Upon termination, all obligations under this Agreement shall cease, except for those provisions that, by their nature, survive termination (e.g., confidentiality, indemnification, or fee obligations accrued prior to termination).

4. Competency and Licensing.

BW will present Consultants who possess the licensure and/or certification required for the position identified by Client. In addition, BW will present Consultants who, as closely as possible, represent that they meet the experience and other qualifications as requested by the Client. BW and BW in conjunction with SSP will make every effort to pre-screen job candidates based on Client's requirements and perform due diligence to ascertain the professional and applicable Department of Education licensing and certification requirements for the Consultant referred to Client. In the event Client becomes aware of any notices, findings, or information, including but not limited to fingerprint search results that may negatively impact the commencement or continuation of said assignment, the Client shall notify BW in writing within three (3) business days of Client becoming aware. Client shall furnish all relevant details regarding the situation. Failure to notify BW of such matters may result in the termination of the contractual relationship. Client acknowledges that the decision to accept and keep any Consultant on assignment is ultimately the responsibility of the Client. BW shall not make any intentional misrepresentations about any Consultant and disclaims responsibility or liability for fraud or misrepresentation by consultants not readily ascertainable by reasonable diligence in performing BW's services.

BW will, and shall ensure SSP's will, comply with Section 10-21.9 of the Illinois School Code relating to fingerprint-based criminal history records checks and checks of the Statewide Sex Offender Database and the Statewide Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Database. Before any Consultant furnishes services for Client, BW will provide Client with proof of compliance and/or ensure Consultant complies with Client's checks, as determined by Client.

For each Consultant to provide services for Client, BW will ensure compliance with the requirements of Section 24-5 of the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/24-5) relating to evidence of physical fitness to perform assigned duties and freedom from communicable disease (and screening for tuberculosis when required), and BW will provide proof of compliance to Client.

In addition, for each Consultant who will have direct contact with Client's students, BW will, and shall ensure SSP's will, comply with Section 22-94 of the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/22-94), to include an employment history review, using forms consistent with the template forms issued by the Illinois State Board of Education, and other compliance with the requirements applicable to contractors. By assigning any such Consultant to Client, BW shall, and BW will ensure SSP's shall, represent that the Consultant is not disqualified from such work based on sexual misconduct allegations and that the Consultant: (A) has never been the subject of a sexual misconduct allegation unless a subsequent investigation resulted in a finding that the allegation was false, unfounded, or unsubstantiated; (B) has never been discharged from, been asked to resign from, resigned from, or otherwise



been separated from any employment, been removed from a substitute list, been disciplined by an employer, or had an employment contract not renewed due to an adjudication or finding of sexual misconduct or while an allegation of sexual misconduct was pending or under investigation, unless the investigation resulted in a finding that the allegation was false, unfounded, or unsubstantiated; and (C) has never had a license or certificate suspended, surrendered, or revoked or had an application for licensure, approval, or endorsement denied due to an adjudication or finding of sexual misconduct or while an allegation of sexual misconduct was pending or under investigation, unless the investigation resulted in a finding that the allegation was false, unfounded, or unsubstantiated.

5. Insurance.

BW will ensure SSP's maintain the following minimum amounts of insurance:

General Liability - \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$4,000,000 aggregate.

Workers Compensation - in accordance with State regulations.

Employer's Liability - \$1,000,000.

Excess Liability over General Liability and Employer's Liability - \$5,000,000 per occurrence and \$5,000,000 aggregate.

Professional Liability - \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate.

Sexual Abuse and Molestation - \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate

6. Employment of Consultants.

Client agrees that it will not directly or indirectly, personally or through an agent or agency, contract with or employ any Consultant introduced or referred by BW or through its SSP for a period of one year after the latest date of introduction, referral, placement or last day of scheduled assignment. If Client or its affiliate enters into such a relationship, Client may be subject to pay a fee per Consultant. Applicable fees are determined by each SSP and could be different for each SSP and/or Consultant. Fees will be outlined in each Consultant's "Client Assignment Confirmation," one of which will be issued for each Consultant placed with Client. Blazerworks will facilitate contact between Client and SSP to verify or negotiate fees. Payment is due and payable to BW on the first day such Consultant provides services to Client outside of this agreement. Client agrees that it will not solicit any Consultant who during the course of business is introduced or referred by BW to Client. Moreover, the Client agrees it will not solicit any Consultant prior to a Consultant Assignment Confirmation being executed. Client shall be subject to a fee of 35% of the Consultant's first year annualized compensation if a Client or its Affiliates intentionally interferes with the relationship of BW and its SSPs, or attempts to solicit any Consultant from BW or its SSPs.

7. Limitation of Liability.

Except for damages or losses arising from a party's indemnification obligations pursuant to paragraph 19, neither party shall be liable to the other for any special, consequential, indirect, exemplary or punitive damages, including any damages on account of lost profits, lost data, loss of use of data, or lost opportunity, whether or not placed on notice of any such alleged damages and regardless of the form of action in which such damages may be sought. The fees and billings due under this agreement are not considered special damages or lost profits and shall not be limited by these provisions. Further, excluding claims arising out of BW's failure to pay SSP's for services rendered after having received payment from Client for such services, in no event shall BW's aggregate liability with respect to any claim or liability arising out of or relating to the Agreement exceed \$25,000.00.

8. On-Site Responsibility.

Client is responsible for providing all orientation, support, facilities, training, direction, and means for the Consultant to complete the assignment. Client acknowledges that BW is not providing special education or related services, but rather is providing candidate identification and management services. As such, Client acknowledges that BW nor SSP's are responsible for monitoring the Consultant's on-site performance given that they do not have the capacity to provide direct, on-site supervision of daily activity. Client warrants that its facilities and operations will comply at all times with all applicable federal, state and local safety and health laws, regulations and standards, including any applicable OSHA standards, and that Client will be responsible for providing all safety training and equipment.

9. Timekeeping and Invoicing.

Client will ensure that Consultants accurately record the start and stop times for all hours worked, in accordance with the Client's policies utilizing the Client designated method which may include the submission of BW's timesheet. Timesheets are due weekly by 12:00 PM on the Monday following the end of Client's designated workweek.

BW will generate an invoice for Client based on timesheets submitted. Each invoice will contain a unique invoice number, date(s) services were provided, Consultant name, Consultant job title, hourly bill rate, total hours billed, and total amount due. Client must review the invoice and notify BW of any errors, including billed hours or improper rates, immediately and in writing. Invoicing errors not received within forty-five (45) days of the date of invoice shall not be disputed and invoices will be due in full.



10. Professional Fees.

Client will be responsible for verifying hours worked by Consultants as documented on the Consultant's timesheet and any discrepancy must be reported to BW by 10:00 on Tuesday following the work week end. Client will pay BW based on hours worked and in accordance with the service charges specified on one or more Assignment Confirmations, which will be included as addenda to this Agreement. BW will generate an invoice for Client based on timesheets submitted. Client must review the invoice and notify BW of any errors, including billed hours or improper rates, within forty-five (45) days of the date of invoice. BW shall resolve any error and provide corrected invoice mutually acceptable to both parties within a reasonable period. In the event client fails to dispute or report any errors within forty-five (45) days, errors shall not be accepted as a disputed charge and invoices will be due and payable in full. All pre-approved hours worked over forty (40) hours in a one-week work period will be billed at one and one-half times the regular bill rate unless applicable law requires double-pay, in which case such time will be billed at two times the regular bill rate. Client hereby notifies BW that pre-approval is required for any and all overtime hours prior to any such hours being worked. SSP invoices will be collected by BW, consolidated and submitted to Client. BW will pay SSPs within 15 days of BW's receipt of payment from Client for services provided by such SSP.

11. Payment Terms.

BW reserves the right to consolidate Consultant and SSP invoices, and invoice Client on a weekly basis for all services provided during the previous week. Client's written pre-approval is required for any and all overtime hours prior to any such hours being worked. If (and only if) such written pre-approval is given by Client, BW will bill Client at one and one-half times the regular bill rate for Consultant's overtime. Payment is due in accordance with the Illinois Local Government Prompt Payment Act, 50 ILCS 505. Invoices paid after the due date will incur an interest charge in accordance with the Illinois Local Government Prompt Payment Act, 50 ILCS 505. BW reserves the right, at its option, to discontinue any extension of credit. Should billing disputes arise, Client shall notify BW in writing within ten (10) days of the receipt of the disputed invoice.

12. Administrative Responsibilities.

Client shall be responsible for orienting Consultants to Client's policies and procedures regarding the submission of any requisite paperwork which must be tendered for reimbursement by funding entities such as Medicare, Medicaid, or health insurance. Such paperwork may include, but is not limited to, patient care plans, comprehensive patient histories, individual education plans, or Client specific program plans. During the contracted assignment, should Consultants fail to submit paperwork as required per Client's policies and procedures, Client must notify BW in writing within three (3) business days of alleged failure. Failure to notify BW before assignment ends shall negate any Client claim to withhold payment due to untimely work and/or paperwork non-compliance by Consultant. Client agrees that all approved time sheets by client's assigned representative are not subjected to billing dispute if client fails to notify BW of time sheet and work performed discrepancies. Additionally, Client acknowledges and agrees that if formal notice is required to be given to any Consultant that participation in a retirement system/pension is either: 1) permitted by Consultant's election; or 2) is required by law, Client is solely responsible for providing such notice to BW and Consultant and fulfilling all associated administrative duties. Client shall immediately notify BW if any Consultant is required to, or voluntarily elects to participate in any such system, and agrees that no work will be performed by such Consultant until a signed agreement between SSP and Client sets forth the manner in which all employer and employee contributions will be made.

13. Incident and Error Tracking

Client will report to BW any performance issues, incidents, errors and other events related to the care and services provided by BW or SSP employees. BW or SSP, as applicable, will document reported incidents in employee's personnel file and track all such events for quality assurance purposes. All supporting documentation is required within five (5) business days of the occurrence.

14. Reporting of Work-Related Injuries.

Client will maintain a safe working environment and provide all appropriate personal protective equipment as deemed appropriate by the Client and suitable to the setting to which Consultants are assigned. Client ensures compliance with all applicable OSHA obligations to include general training on the reporting of work-place injuries, incidents, and occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens occurring at Client facility. Records of such occurrences must be maintained by the Client and accessible to BW within guidelines set forth by governing entities. In the event of work-place injury, incident or exposure, each affected Consultant will contact their immediate Client-appointed supervisor and report to the applicable treating department as per Client protocol. Consultants shall also report work-place injuries, incidents or exposures to BW and applicable SSPs concurrently with Client.

15. Termination with Cause.

Within five (5) business days after occurrence, Client has the obligation to notify BW of any misconduct or poor performance by the Consultant, and any Consultant-involved incident that would be considered adverse to the overall operation of Client. Client may request that BW facilitate the immediate removal of any Consultant due to any of the issues preceding with written and/or verbal notice. The Client, however, may not immediately terminate a Consultant's assignment unless BW or SSP has been notified as set forth in the first sentence of this section, or unless a single incident warrants immediate dismissal prior to BW's notification. All supporting documentation specifying the reasons and facts of the termination is required Within five (5) business days after



termination. Client will be responsible for all professional fees (and expenses if applicable) up to the point of termination. Should BW identify a suitable replacement Consultant within two (2) business days after termination, Client agrees to original terms or extended terms of the terminated Consultant's assignment.

16. Termination without Cause.

Either party may cancel an assignment with thirty (30) days prior written notice. In that event, Client is responsible for all charges and fees prior to cancellation date and through the 30-day period of notice. In the event Client is unable to provide thirty (30) days' notice of termination, Client will be billed for thirty (30) days at the agreed upon regular bill rate and minimum hours. In addition, Client may cancel an assignment with thirty (30) days prior written notice to BW in the event that the assignment becomes unnecessary for reasons beyond Client's control, including (but not limited to) extended absence of the student to whom the Consultant is assigned or a reduction in the number of students receiving services from the Consultant.

17. Guaranteed Minimum Hours.

Client agrees to provide Consultant the guaranteed number of work hours per week specified in the "Client Assignment Confirmation," one of which will be issued for each Consultant placed with Client. Cancellation of prescheduled workdays or reduction in work hours by Client will be billed reflecting the guaranteed minimum work hours. Minimum work hours shall be reduced to reflect scheduled closings for holidays and planning days.

18. Paid Sick Leave.

For those jurisdictions that have passed or will pass paid sick time legislation, Paid Sick Time will be the responsibility of BW or the SSP, as applicable, and will not be billed to Client.

19. Unscheduled Facility Closure Policy.

The parties agree that in the event of an unforeseen or unexpected interruption in an Consultant's assignment resulting from an unscheduled closure, complete or partial, of Client's facilities due to natural or manmade disasters, such as, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, fire, storms, flooding, earthquake, labor unrest, riots, and/or acts of terrorism or war (each an "Unscheduled Closure"), Client will be invoiced and shall pay for each such affected Consultant's services at the reduced rate of \$200 per day for each day that the Consultant (s) is unable to work by virtue of such Unscheduled Closure. For the purposes of this section snow days are not included.

20. Multiple Locations.

If client requires Consultant to travel to and perform services at more than one location, Client will compensate BW for travel time between facilities in the same work day at the regular hourly bill rate and for mileage up to the current acceptable IRS reimbursement rate.

21. Indemnification.

BW will contractually require, in all subcontractor/sub-vendor agreements, that each SSP agree to defend, indemnify and hold harmless Client (as a third-party beneficiary) and BW together with their governing boards, executive boards, directors, officers, employees and agents from and against all liability, loss, expense, damage or claim for injury or damages arising out of or relating to its performance of services to Client including, without limitation any and all claims for injury or damage caused by or resulting from the acts and/or omissions of Consultants and/or SSPs, including acts and/or omissions of their directors, officers, employees or agents except to the extent said claims are caused by, or in any manner related to, the negligent acts or omissions of Client, its Board of Directors, Governing Board, Board members, employees, and agents..

BW agrees that it shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Client and SSP together with their directors, officers, employees and agents from and against all liability, loss, expense, damage or claim for injury or damages to the extent solely caused by or resulting solely from the negligent or willful acts or omissions of BW in the performance of services hereunder, including acts and/or omissions of its directors, officers, employees or agents except to the extent said claims are caused by, or in any manner related to, the negligent acts or omissions of Client, its Board of Directors, Governing Board, Board members, employees, and agents.. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary above, BW shall not be responsible, under any theory of liability, for claims resulting from the acts or omissions of any of the SSPs, their respective officers, employees, agents, or contractors, nor shall BW be responsible for the SSP's performance under the applicable supplier agreement, and BW's insurance shall not be deemed to cover or be excess to the insurance of any SSP.

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, neither BW's nor SSP's obligations with respect to indemnification for acts or omissions described in this Section will apply to the extent that such application would nullify any existing insurance coverage of Soliant or as to that portion of any claim of loss which the insurer is obligated to defend or satisfy.



22. Confidentiality.

Each party acknowledges that as a result of this Agreement, they will learn confidential information of the other party. Confidential information is defined as that information which is private to each party but is shared by one to the other party as required to accomplish this Agreement. It is agreed that neither party will disclose any confidential information of the other party to any person or entity. Neither will it permit any person nor entity to use said confidential information. The only exceptions will be: (a) Information shared to the appropriate individuals within the respective organizations as necessary to execute this Agreement, (b) disclosures as required by law. Confidential Information of BW shall include, but is not limited to, any and all unpublished information owned or controlled by BW and/or its employees, that relates to the clinical, technical, marketing, business or financial operations of BW and which is not generally disclosed to the public.

23. Family Education Rights and Privacy Act.

BW shall, and shall contractually require all SSPs and Consultants, to comply with all laws, rules and regulations pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 USC 1232g ("FERPA"). BW acknowledges that certain information about the Client's students may be contained in records maintained by BW, SSPs, and/or Consultants. BW further acknowledges that this information may constitute "school student records", and/or "education records" as defined in FERPA, and/or "personally identifiable information" as defined in FERPA's implementing regulations, which information is hereinafter collectively referred to as "Student Data." With regard to Student Data, BW agrees as follows:

- a. BW certifies that it will comply with all applicable laws and/or regulations, including FERPA, relating to confidentiality, privacy, and data security.
- b. BW will have access to Student Data on an "as needed" basis, only as necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- c. When BW is provided access to Student Data, BW (and its employees) will use the information only for the purposes for which access was provided.
- d. BW agrees that it will comply with 34 CFR §99.33(a) relating to the use and redisclosure of Student Data.
- e. BW shall maintain in force measures reasonably available within the information technology industry to prevent any unauthorized person from gaining access to or altering, viewing, manipulating or affecting the Student Data in any way. BW shall maintain, encrypt, and secure the Student Data in accordance with industry standards. BW agrees to maintain the confidentiality of the Student Data using at least the degree of care and security as BW uses to maintain the confidentiality of its own confidential information.
- f. BW agrees to direct its owners, directors, members, employees, and agents to adhere to the confidentiality requirements set forth herein.
- g. Upon termination, cancellation, expiration, or other conclusion of this Agreement, BW shall return all Student Data to the Client and shall delete all Student Data from its operational systems.

In addition, BW will contractually require all SSPs and Consultants to agree to items a-g, above.

24. Equal Opportunity.

BW will contractually require that all SSPs: 1) screen based on merit only; 2) warrant that no candidates will be discriminated against due to race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, or any other characteristic protected by law; and 3) provide equal opportunity to all Consultants for employment. Client warrants that it will screen based on merit only, that no candidates will be unlawfully rejected by Client, that no candidates will be discriminated against by Client due to race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, or disability, and that it is an equal opportunity employer. BW warrants that it will screen based on merit only, that no candidates will be unlawfully rejected by BW, that no candidates will be discriminated against by BW due to race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, or any other characteristic protected by law, and that it is an equal opportunity employer. In performing services pursuant to this Agreement, BW will not, and shall ensure SSP's acknowledge they will not, discriminate against any individual on the basis of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, ancestry, marital status, order of protection status, military status, sexual orientation, pregnancy, or any other characteristic protected under applicable State or Federal law.

25. Compliance with Laws.

BW shall comply with all state and federal laws, regulations, rules and ordinances applicable to BW and/or the services to be provided by BW pursuant to this Agreement.

26. Notices.

AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

THIS AFFILIATION AGREEMENT (the “**Agreement**”) by and between **SASED** (the “**Facility**”) and the **Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois University on behalf of Northern Illinois University** (the “**School**”) shall become effective on the date when the last party to sign has executed this Agreement (the “**Effective Date**”).

WHEREAS, the School desires to utilize various Facility sites (Exhibit A) that may be available for the purpose of providing practical learning and clinical experiences as listed in Exhibit B in connection with students of the School.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is understood and agreed upon by the parties hereto as follows:

A. SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Provision of foundational curriculum to students. The School shall have the total responsibility for planning and determining the adequacy of the practical learning and clinical educational experience of students in theoretical background, basic skill, professional ethics, attitude and behavior, and will refer to the Facility only those students who have satisfactorily completed the prerequisite didactic portion of the School’s curriculum.

2. Insurance.

A. Student professional and general liability insurance.

(i) Other Colleges and Universities

School shall (a) maintain professional liability insurance, which may be self-insured, covering students, or (b) require students participating in the practicum to maintain a personal student professional liability insurance policy. Such policy shall have limits for professional liability insurance of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence or claim and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) in the aggregate; and general liability coverage of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence or claim and Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate covering the acts of such student while participating in the program. Such insurance coverage must be placed with an insurance carrier acceptable to the Facility. School shall provide proof of coverage to the Facility by providing certificates of insurance evidencing coverage prior to student participation in the practical learning and clinical educational experience. In the event required insurance coverage is not provided or is canceled, the Facility may terminate the placement of the student(s).

(ii) State Colleges and Universities located in Illinois

If the School is a state college or university located within Illinois, the School shall (a) maintain professional liability insurance, which may be self-insured, covering students, or (b) require students participating in the practical learning and clinical educational experience to maintain a personal student professional liability insurance policy. Such professional liability insurance policy shall have limits of not less than One Million

Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence or claim and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) in the aggregate covering the acts of such student while participating in the program at the Facility. School shall provide proof of coverage to the Facility by providing certificates of insurance evidencing coverage prior to student participation in the practical learning and clinical educational experience.

(a) Where Worker's Compensation or other obligation for payment of benefits may arise, this Agreement shall neither enlarge nor diminish such obligation.

(b) In the event required insurance coverage is not provided or is canceled, the Facility may terminate the placement of the student(s).

B. Student Health Insurance. School shall require students participating in the practical learning and clinical educational experience to maintain comprehensive health insurance and shall verify same prior to student participation in the program at the Facility. In the event required insurance coverage is not provided or is canceled, the Facility may terminate the placement of the student(s).

C. Facility Insurance. Facility shall maintain during this Agreement professional liability insurance in amounts not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence or claim and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) in the aggregate, and general liability insurance in amounts not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence or claim and Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate. Further, Facility shall maintain workers compensation insurance in amounts not less than that required by statute. Facility may be self-insured.

3. Designation of liaison to Facility; communications relating to clinical placements. The School will designate a faculty or other professional staff member to coordinate and act as its liaison to the Facility. The assignments to be undertaken by the students participating in the practical learning and clinical experience will be mutually arranged and a regular exchange of information will be maintained by on-site visits when practical, and by letter or telephone in other instances.

The School shall notify the Facility in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating clinical placements with the Facility.

4. Evidence of student certifications, vaccinations, etc. As required by the facility, the School shall provide evidence that each student has met all requirements, which may include, but are not limited to, CPR certification, proof of absence of TB, hepatitis B vaccination, Tdap vaccination, annual flu vaccination, and OSHA compliance for prevention of transmission of blood borne pathogens and TB and general HIPAA training. Facility may update these requirements upon written notice to School. Any student not meeting applicable requirements shall not be eligible to participate in a clinical rotation. Any requirements under this section (e.g. immune status and TB screening) shall be based on current CDC and OSHA standards and/or guidelines for health-care personnel, and shall be evaluated by the School upon program entry of each student and again each time such standards and/or guidelines are changed or updated.

5. Criminal background check and drug/background screening compliance. Where applicable, a fingerprint-based criminal background check and a drug screen, as required by and acceptable to the Facility, are required of each placed student prior to participation in the practical learning and clinical educational experience. The School will advise students that they are required to complete all required background screenings and that students with unacceptable results will not participate at sites where students with such results are forbidden by Facility's policy or applicable law. The School will advise students that they are required to comply with Section 10-21.9 of the Illinois School Code relating to fingerprint-based criminal history records checks and checks of the Statewide Sex Offender Database and the Statewide Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Database. The Facility will conduct the fingerprinting. The School will advise its students who will have direct contact with children or students at the Facility during their placement that they shall comply with all required components of the Faith's Law Employment History Review process pursuant to Section 22-94 of the Illinois *School Code* if required by the Facility, and School agrees to reasonably assist the Facility in gathering information to support such Employment History Reviews if requested by the Facility.

6. School notices to students. The School shall notify each student prior to his/her arrival at the Facility that he/she is required to:

- (a) Follow the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility.
- (b) Obtain medical care at his/her own expense for any injuries or illnesses sustained as a direct or indirect result of his/her affiliation with the Facility.
- (c) Provide his/her own transportation and living arrangements.
- (d) Report to the Facility on time and follow all of the Facility's established Board policies and regulations during the regularly scheduled operating hours of the Facility.
- (e) Conform to the standards and practices established by the School while functioning at the Facility.
- (f) Obtain prior written approval of the Facility and the School before publishing any material relating to the practical learning and clinical educational experience.
- (g) Meet the personal, ethical and professional standards required of employees of the Facility and consistent with the applicable professional Code of Ethics and the applicable standards of relevant accrediting or regulatory bodies.
- (h) Comply with all applicable background check and screening requirements required by State law and/or the Facility's Board policies.

Maintain confidentiality of the Facility's school student records and other student data as required by federal and State law.

7. Accreditation. As required by Facility, School represents that it is and, for the term of this Agreement, will be (a) approved by the Illinois Board of Higher Education, or

similar body for the state in which the School is located, and (b) accredited by an accrediting body that is recognized by Council for Higher Education Accreditation or the U.S. Department of Education. School will provide Facility with copies of all accreditations upon request. In the event accreditation is lost, suspended, or otherwise restricted, School shall notify Facility, in writing, within three (3) business days. Facility may, at its sole discretion, suspend or terminate this Agreement if School fails to maintain its accreditation.

B. FACILITY RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Provision of facilities for supervised clinical experiences.** Subject to the ability of Facility to accommodate School's request, which Facility shall determine in its sole discretion, the Facility agrees to make the appropriate facilities available to the School in order to provide supervised practical learning and clinical educational experiences to students. Such facilities shall include an environment conducive to the learning process of the students as intended by the terms of this Agreement and conforming to customary Facility procedures. Facility shall provide faculty and students with an orientation to Facility, including HIPAA training.

2. **Facility rules applicable to students during clinical assignments.** Students are to remain subject to the authority, policies, and regulations imposed by the School and, during periods of practical learning and clinical educational experience, students will be subject to all rules and regulations of the Facility and imposed by the Facility on its employees and agents with regard to following the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility.

3. **Patient care.** While at the Facility, students are not to replace the Facility staff, and are not to render service except as identified for educational value and delineated in the jointly planned practical learning and clinical educational experiences. Any such direct contact between a student and a patient shall be under the proximate supervision of a member of the staff of the Facility. The Facility shall at all times remain responsible for patient care.

4. **Emergency treatment of students.** Emergency outpatient treatment will be available to students while in the hospital for practical learning and clinical educational experience in case of accident or illness. In case of emergency at the Facility, the Facility's standard procedure will be followed. It is the student's responsibility to bear the cost of the emergency treatment.

5. **Designation of liaison to School; communications relating to practical learning and clinical educational experiences.** The Facility shall designate a liaison responsible for coordinating the practical learning and clinical educational experience. That person shall maintain contact with the School's designated liaison person to assure mutual participation in and surveillance of the practical learning and clinical educational experience. The Facility shall notify the School in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating the practical learning and clinical educational experience.

6. Identity and credentials of Facility supervising personnel. The Facility shall designate and submit in writing to the School, the name and professional and academic credentials of the individual(s) overseeing student(s) experiences.

7. School tour of Facility. The Facility shall, on reasonable request and subject to legal restrictions regarding student record and patient health information, permit a tour of its clinical facilities and services available and other items pertaining to practical learning and clinical educational experiences, by representatives of the School and agencies charged with responsibility for approval of the facilities or accreditation of the curriculum.

8. Provision of relevant Facility policies. The Facility shall provide the student(s) and the School the Facility's administrative policies, standards and practices relevant to the practical learning and clinical educational experience.

9. FERPA compliance. The Facility shall comply with the applicable provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 USC 1232 (g), otherwise known as FERPA or the Buckley Amendment, and shall take all measures necessary to ensure the confidentiality of any and all information in its possession regarding the School's students who train at the Facility pursuant to this agreement.

C. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Compliance with patient and student record privacy laws. The School agrees to abide by and require that its faculty and students abide by all applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations regarding patient privacy, including but not limited to, the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information as required under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). Students shall be required to comply with the Facility's policies and procedures regarding the confidentiality of patient information and the use of all such information. The parties will notify one another if there are known breaches of this confidentiality. Further, School shall require that students and faculty de-identify all documents created and/or utilized for educational purposes outside of Facility. This shall include, at a minimum, removal of patient name, date of birth, address, medical record number, insurance information, social security number and other personal information that could be used to identify a patient.

The School acknowledges that the School and its students will, have access to Facility information that constitutes "school student records" as defined in the Illinois School Student Records Act (105 ILCS 10/1, et seq.) and/or "education records" as defined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA," 20 U.S.C. §1232g) and/or "personally identifiable information" as defined in FERPA's implementing regulations (34 CFR §99.3) and/or "records" as defined in the Illinois Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Confidentiality Act (740 ILCS 110/1, et seq.), which information is hereinafter collectively referred to as "School Student Data."

With regard to School Student Data: (1) The School and its students will comply with all applicable laws and/or regulations relating to confidentiality, privacy, and data security;

(2) The School and its students will have access to the Facility's School Student Data on an "as needed" basis, only as necessary to implement the program under this Agreement; (3) When the School and/or its Students are provided access to School Student Data, such information will be used only for the purposes for which access was provided; (4) The School and its students will comply with 34 CFR §99.33(a) relating to the use and redisclosure of School Student Data; (5) The School and its students shall take reasonable measures to prevent any unauthorized person from gaining access to School Student Data. The School agrees that it and its students will maintain the confidentiality of School Student Data using at least the degree of care and security as the School uses to maintain its own confidential information. The School agrees to direct its students, employees, and agents to adhere to the confidentiality requirements set forth herein. Upon termination, cancellation, expiration, or other conclusion of this Agreement, the School and its students shall return and/or delete all of Facility's School Student Data.

2. Determination of instructional period. The course of the practical learning and clinical educational experience will cover a period of time as arranged between the School and the Facility. The beginning dates and length of experience shall be mutually agreed upon by the School and the Facility.

3. Determination of number of participating students. The number of students eligible to participate in the practical learning and clinical educational experience will be determined and may be changed by mutual agreement of the parties. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Facility and the School agree and understand that the availability of practical learning and clinical educational experiences at Facility during the term of this Agreement may periodically be affected by a variety of factors. In such event, Facility may reduce the number of students eligible to participate in the practical learning and clinical educational experience with prior notice to the School and adequate time for the School to reassign the student(s) to another clinical site. The Facility agrees further to accommodate students of the School who are similarly displaced from other clinical affiliates of the School to the extent that clinical space is available at the Facility.

4. Evaluation of students' clinical experiences. Evaluation of the practical learning and clinical educational experiences of the students will be accomplished jointly by the School and the Facility. Appropriate School and the Facility staff will communicate on a regular basis for the purpose of reviewing and evaluating current practical learning and clinical educational experiences offered to students.

5. Removal of students.

(a) The School has the right to remove a student from a practical learning and clinical educational experience. The School shall notify the Facility of such removal in writing.

(b) The Facility may immediately remove any student participating in a practical learning and clinical educational experience from the Facility's premises for behavior that the Facility deems to be an immediate threat to the health or welfare of its patients, staff members, visitors, or operations. In such event, the Facility shall notify the School in writing of its actions and the reasons for its actions as soon as practicable. If the Facility desires to remove a student for any other reason, it shall notify the School in

writing of the reasons for the removal and shall consult with the School before removing the student.

D. TERM OF AGREEMENT:

The term of this Agreement shall be for one (1) year, to commence on the Effective Date. Thereafter, this Agreement shall automatically renew for additional one (1) year terms, not to exceed a total of nine (9) one year terms, unless terminated as set forth herein. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other party. In the event that this Agreement is not renewed for a subsequent term, students who are participating in the practical learning and clinical educational experiences at the time of termination shall be allowed to complete such assignment under the terms and conditions herein set forth.

E. ADDITIONAL TERMS:

1. **Stipulations as to liability.** Subject to applicable state law, neither party to this Agreement shall be legally liable for the consequences, whether bodily injury or property damage, occasioned by an act, omission, or neglect chargeable to the other party. Where Worker's Compensation or other obligation for payment of benefits may arise, this Agreement shall neither enlarge nor diminish such obligation.
2. **Qualifications of School faculty.** The School represents that relevant faculty members are appropriately qualified, certified and/or licensed. The School will provide the Faculty with copies of evidence of qualifications, certifications or licensures, upon request.
3. **Assignment of Agreement.** This Agreement may not be assigned by either party without the prior written consent of the other party, which will not be unreasonably withheld.
4. **Excluded Providers.** Each party represents that neither it nor any of its employees and agents is excluded as a provider under Medicare or Medicaid or under any other federal or state health care program.
5. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or situation shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, and the application of such provision to persons or situations other than those to which it shall have been held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, but shall continue to be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
6. **Non-Discrimination.** There shall be no unlawful discrimination or treatment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, order of protection status, marital status, ancestry, military status, unfavorable discharge from military service, sexual orientation, physical or mental disability, or any other legally protected class in the employment, training, or promotion of students or personnel engaged in the performance of this Agreement.

7. **Employment status.** No student, School employee or agent of School under this Agreement shall in any way be considered an employee or agent of the Facility nor shall any such student, School employee or agent be entitled to any fringe benefits, Worker's Compensation, disability benefits or other rights normally afforded to employees of the Facility.

8. **Notice to Parties.** Any notice, demand or request required or permitted to be given under the provisions of this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given under the earlier of (a) the date actually received by the party in question, by whatever means and however addressed, or (b) the date sent by facsimile (receipt confirmed), or on the date of personal delivery, if delivered by hand, or on the date signed for if sent by an overnight delivery service, to the following addresses, or to such other address as either party may request, in the case of the School, by notifying the Facility, and in the case of the Facility, by notifying the School:

Nothing in this Agreement, expressed or implied, is intended to confer on any person other than the parties hereto or their respective successors and assigns any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Agreement.

12. **Agreement binding on parties successors and assigns.** This Agreement shall be binding upon the School and the Facility, their successors, employees, agents and assigns, during the initial term of this Agreement and any extensions thereof.

13. **Captions for reference only.** The captions contained in this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and do not define, describe, or limit the scope or intent of this Agreement or any of its provisions.

14. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. No changes or modifications of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same are in writing and signed by the parties. No waiver of any provisions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties.

FIELD PLACEMENT AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE ARIZONA BOARD OF REGENTS, THE UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA
AND
THE SCHOOL ASSOCIATION FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

This Agreement entered into this 2 day of June, 2025, by and between the Arizona Board of Regents, for and on behalf of The University of Arizona (hereinafter referred to as the “University”) and SASSED (hereinafter referred to as the “AGENCY”) and herein referred to as “Party” or “Parties.”

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a relationship between the AGENCY and University to enable an educational experience for the University’s students at AGENCY sites, which may qualify the students for University academic credit as determined by the University.

Now, therefore, it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto as follows:

Term

The initial term of this Agreement shall be for five years, from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025 with the option to renew for up to an additional five years, except that either Party may, at any time, with or without cause, terminate this Agreement by providing the other Party with ninety (90) days advance written notice.

Definitions

1. “Student Practitioner” as used herein means the University student active in participation in the duties and functions of professional practice under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of AGENCY (“Supervising Practitioners”).
2. “Session of student practice” as used herein is considered to be all or part of the following:
 - a. Observations in classrooms and field practice settings ranging from several hours to several weeks within a given semester;
 - b. Assisting an experienced practitioner with routine classroom or field work, or other work that is routine professional practice;
 - c. Instructing one or more students or interacting with one or more clients in the field setting;
 - d. Assuming responsibility for planning and implementing instruction for a large group (including an entire classroom) of students;
 - e. Assuming responsibility for counseling clients;
 - f. Conducting client assessments and developing appropriate intervention strategies;
 - g. Assisting with enrichment activities including, but not limited to, community engagements, field trips, exhibits, and fairs;

The nature and length of student practice activities will be determined by the University program. University program staff will provide a description of program and programmatic expectations to

all Supervising Practitioners.

3. "Supervising Practitioner" as used herein means employees of AGENCY who hold valid credentials issued by the State of Illinois authorizing them to serve in the schools in which the Student Practitioner is placed. Supervising Practitioners shall have completed a minimum of three (3) years satisfactory or effective work experience in the field in which they are supervising.

Program Terms

1. University and AGENCY will agree on schedules for Student Practitioners performing services with AGENCY.
2. Neither University nor AGENCY is obligated to provide transportation to any Student Practitioner to or from AGENCY.
3. Representatives of University and AGENCY will participate in a meeting or telephone conference at least one time each semester to evaluate, among other things, program objectives, changes or enhancements thereto, and the performance of Student Practitioners.
4. AGENCY will not impair its existing contracts for service with any work performed by Student Practitioners.

University Obligations

1. The University will be responsible for developing and carrying out procedures for Student Practitioner selection and admission to University programs.
2. The University will provide to AGENCY, supervising practitioner, or building administrator a handbook or other documentation of program requirements and expectations.
3. The University will be responsible for verifying that each Student Practitioner has appropriate health insurance coverage. In addition, the University will inform Student Practitioners that they may be required to provide AGENCY with: evidence of physical fitness to perform assigned duties and proof of freedom from communicable disease pursuant to Section 24-5 of the Illinois School Code and other applicable requirements and will be required to comply with the required fingerprint based criminal history background check under Section 10-21.9 of the Illinois School Code and checks of the Statewide Sex Offender Database and the Statewide Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Database.
4. The University will designate an individual to serve as the primary liaison to AGENCY for purposes of this Agreement.

AGENCY Obligations

1. AGENCY shall retain ultimate control and authority over all on-site aspects of educational services relating to its students, including training of Student Practitioners. AGENCY will provide orientation to Student Practitioners with regard to hours of participation, place of duties, conditions

of its premises, standards of conduct, confidentiality, and facility safety procedures and operations. AGENCY will provide Student Practitioners with at least the same safety instruction it provides to its regular employees working under similar conditions. AGENCY will alert each Student Practitioner and the University of any non-obvious dangers associated with facilities, activities and the surrounding locales of which it is aware and as to which Student Practitioners may be assigned.

2. AGENCY shall provide an appropriate student practice experience by assigning a qualified supervising practitioner who is appropriately certified in the field of practice and who will provide opportunities for Student Practitioners to satisfy program requirements.
3. AGENCY shall grant Student Practitioners access to AGENCY student records, under the supervision of AGENCY Supervising Practitioner, for the sole purpose of Student Practitioners' education and training, in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. §1232g; 34 CFR Part 99. This includes student Individual Educational Plans (IEPs).
4. AGENCY shall provide adequate supervision and shall hire a certified/qualified substitute supervisor teacher in the event that the employee serving as the Supervising Practitioner is absent during a session of student practice, for Student Practitioners who do not hold a substitute certificate, unless there are extenuating circumstances.
5. AGENCY may hire Student Practitioner as a substitute teacher for AGENCY Supervising Practitioner during a session of student practice only if the Student Practitioner holds a valid Substitute K-12 Certificate.
6. AGENCY agrees that AGENCY Supervising Practitioners will submit to the University evaluations of each Student Practitioner's progress, in a format and at such times as directed by the University.
7. AGENCY acknowledges that Student Practitioners' educational records are protected by FERPA. Accordingly, AGENCY must obtain express written permission from any Student Practitioner before University may release any data pertaining to such student. The University will provide guidance to AGENCY, as needed, with respect to complying with the release of Student Practitioners' educational records in accordance with FERPA.
8. Each Student Practitioner shall perform and comply with all written policies, regulations and directives of AGENCY. AGENCY shall provide all applicable written policies, regulations and directives to Student Practitioner and to University. AGENCY may relieve a Student Practitioner from further participation in the Program if, in its sole discretion, it believes that such Student Practitioner has violated AGENCY's policies, regulations and/or directives.

Refusal or Dismissal of Student Practitioner

1. AGENCY may, for good cause and in compliance with state and federal regulations, refuse to accept the placement of a Student Practitioner. During a placement, either party may, at their sole discretion, immediately dismiss any Student Practitioner whose performance or conduct is not in

accordance with AGENCY or University policies, procedures, rules, codes of conduct, violates the applicable laws of the State of Arizona or the state where the placement is conducted, or is otherwise detrimental to the health & welfare of the AGENCY's students or faculty. If such action is required, the party initiating the dismissal will notify the other within one (1) business day of the dismissal, to follow with written notification (email acceptable) within ten (10) business days of the dismissal. The written notification shall identify the specific violation(s) of policy, procedure, rule, code of conduct, or law that resulted in the dismissal. University will be responsible for any disciplinary action of the Student Practitioner.

2. The refusal or dismissal of a Student Practitioner in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement shall not affect continuation of this Agreement or the continued training of other Student Practitioners by AGENCY pursuant to this Agreement.

General Provisions

1. The University shall inform each participating Student Practitioner of federal and state laws governing the confidentiality of AGENCY client or student information, including FERPA. Any breach of confidentiality by a participating Student Practitioner shall be grounds for immediate termination.
2. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as establishing a partnership, joint venture, or similar relationship between the University and AGENCY. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to authorize either Party to act as agent for the other, and neither Party shall be liable for the wrongful acts or negligence of the other while acting in the course or scope of their employment while performing the duties undertaken pursuant to this Agreement. Nothing expressed herein shall create any rights or duties in favor of any potential third Party beneficiary or other person, agency or organization.
3. The University maintains insurance coverage through the State of Arizona's Risk Management Division self-insurance program to cover liabilities arising from the acts and omissions of the University's employees, students, and agents participating under this Agreement. The AGENCY shall maintain adequate insurance (which may include a bona fide self-insurance program) to cover any liability arising from the acts and omissions of the AGENCY's employees and agents. University students are not deemed to be employees of AGENCY by virtue of this Agreement.
4. The Parties agree to comply with all applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations and executive orders governing equal employment opportunity, immigration, and nondiscrimination, including the Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended.
5. This Agreement is subject to the provisions of A.R.S. § 38-511 regarding Conflict of Interest.
6. The parties may agree to make use of arbitration to address disputes arising under this Agreement pursuant to rules adopted under A.R.S. 12-133.
7. The performance of both Parties may be dependent upon the appropriation of funds by each Party's governing, legislative authority. Should the Legislature in the case of the University or the

cooperative in the case of AGENCY fail to appropriate the necessary funds or if either Party's applicable appropriation is reduced during the fiscal year, the Party that is subject to the reduced or eliminated funding may reduce the scope of this Agreement if appropriate or cancel this Agreement without further duty or obligation. Each Party agrees to notify the other Party as soon as reasonably possible after the unavailability of said funds comes to its attention.

9. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will continue valid and enforceable to the full extent permitted by law.
10. No waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall affect the right of any party thereafter to enforce such provision or to exercise any right or remedy available to it in the event of any other default.
11. The Parties agree to remain silent on law and venue.
12. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same Agreement. The Parties agree that any xerographically or electronically reproduced copy of this agreement will have the same legal force and effect as any copy bearing original signatures of the Parties.
13. This document constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and any prior or contemporaneous representations, either oral or written are hereby superseded. This Agreement may not be modified, amended, altered or extended except through a written amendment signed by each party.

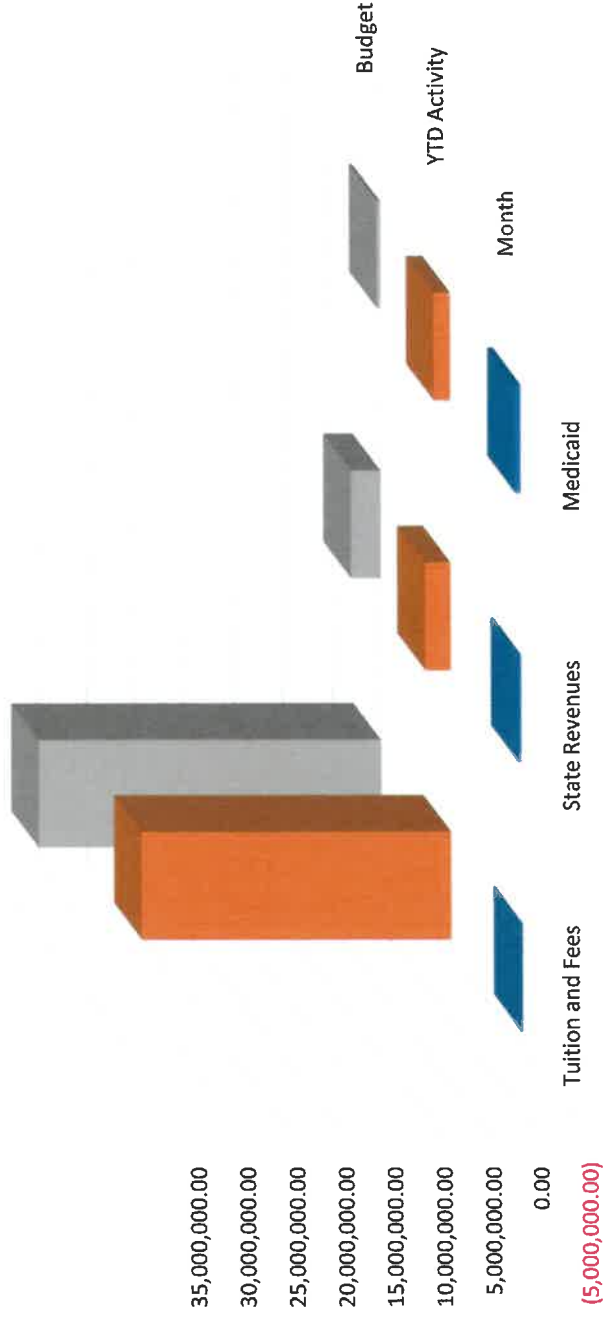

SASED PROGRAM REVENUE



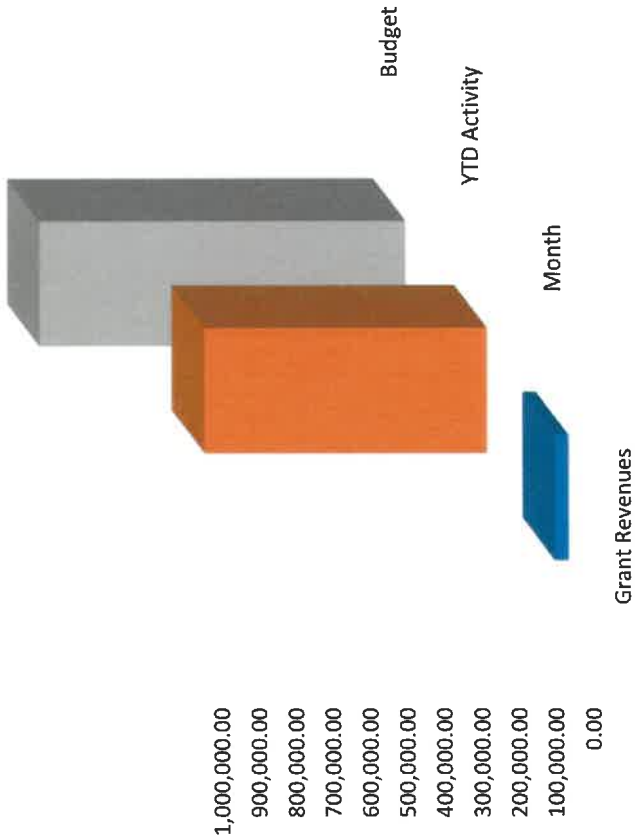

EXTERNAL GRANT REVENUE



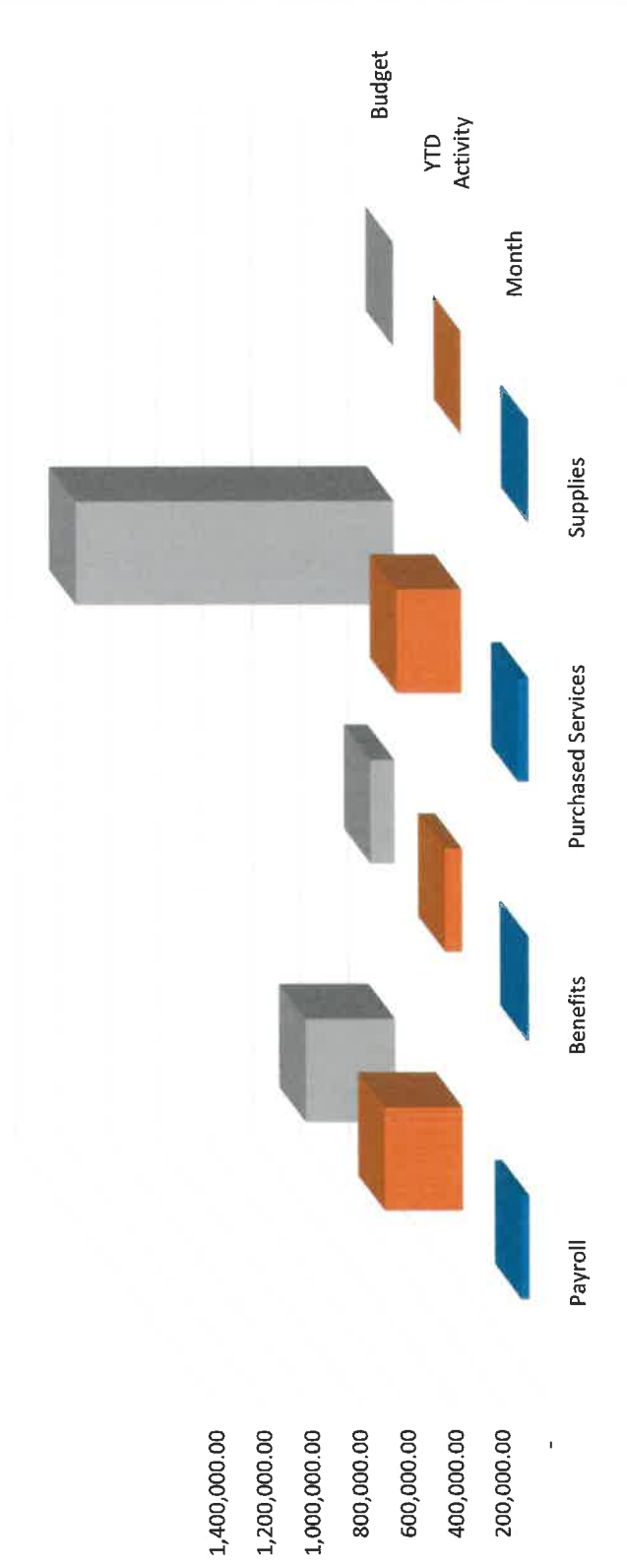

EXTERNAL GRANT EXPENDITURES



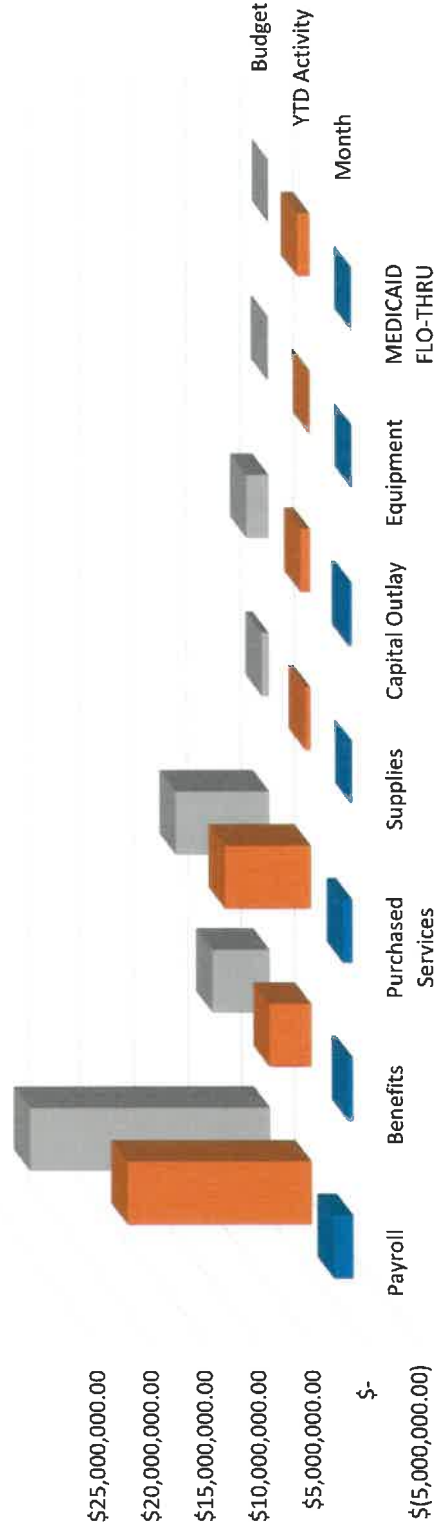

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made by and between The School Association for Special Education in DuPage County ("SASED"), which is operating as Early CHOICES ("Early CHOICES"), and Accountability Solutions ("Contractor") (collectively referred to as "the Parties").

The Parties agree as follows:

1. **SERVICES.** Early CHOICES shall engage Contractor to provide the following service:

Custom Development on Android App to meet required compliance standards:

A. Added feature to allow users to delete account and all data by individual assessment within app.

B. Added feature to allow users to delete account and all data from within Google App store App bio link.

C. Added features to online EC and SPP 6 apps to allow for data to be called and deleted from within the app and within the Google app store.

2. **TERM.** Contractor shall provide services to Early CHOICES pursuant to this Agreement during the period from March 1, 2023 to March 31, 2023 ("Agreement Term").

3. **COMPENSATION.** In exchange for the services provided pursuant to Paragraph 1, Early CHOICES shall pay Contractor \$5,000.00, plus related travel expenses not to exceed n/a. Contractor must submit a signed "Contractor Request for Payment" form to SASED to initiate payment. Contractor will be issued a Form 1099 and shall be solely responsible for paying all applicable payroll or employment taxes, including but not limited to FICA, federal personal income tax, state personal income tax, and state disability tax.

7. OTHER RULES AND POLICIES. Contractor agrees to abide by any other rules, policies, and procedures as communicated by Early CHOICES.

8. TERMINATION. This Agreement may be terminated early for the following reasons:

- a. Mutual agreement, with fourteen (14) days' notice;
- b. Permanent disability (inability to perform essential job functions with or without accommodation);
- c. Death; or
- d. Cause.

Termination for cause during the term of this Agreement shall be for any conduct, act, or failure to act by the Contractor, which, at the sole discretion of Early CHOICES, is deemed detrimental to the best interests of Early CHOICES.

9. RETURN OF PROPERTY. Upon termination or completion of the Agreement Term, Contractor will promptly return to Early CHOICES all property belonging to Early CHOICES, including without limitation: all computers, technology, office supplies, keys and any other property in any form.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made by and between The School Association for Special Education in DuPage County ("SASED"), and Creative Exchange ("Contractor") (collectively referred to as "the Parties").

The Parties agree as follows:

1. SERVICES. SASED shall engage Contractor to provide the following service:
 - a. To provide supplies (paper, pens, stickers, etc. and equipment (guitar, rhythm instruments, tape recorders, etc).
 - b. To develop programs and procedures for students.
 - c. To provide direct service to students on a regular basis.
 - d. To regularly report progress to staff.
 - e. To consult with treatment team members as requested.
 - f. To perform all services in accordance with the Music Therapy code of ethics and maintain necessary certification and registration in the state of Illinois.

Contractor shall provide services pursuant to an agreed schedule. Contractor is responsible for obtaining approval for scheduled services prior to providing services.

2. TERM. Contractor shall provide services to SASED pursuant to this Agreement during the period from August 14, 2025 to June 1, 2026, unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing. ("Agreement Term").

3. COMPENSATION. In exchange for approved services provided pursuant to Paragraph 1, SASED shall pay Contractor \$75.00 per direct service hour for 27.5 hours a week for approximately 34 weeks. Contractor must submit a signed "Contractor Request for Payment" form to SASED to initiate payment. Contractor will be issued a Form 1099 and shall be solely responsible for paying all applicable payroll or employment taxes, including but not limited to FICA, federal personal income tax, state personal income tax, and state disability tax.

4. EXPENSES. Contractor shall bear all other expenses incurred in the performance of this Agreement unless pre-approved in writing by SASED's Executive Director or designee.

5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. Contractor is an independent contractor and not an employee of SASED. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create the relationship of employer and employee, principal and agent, or any relationship other than that of independent parties contracting with each other solely for the purpose of carrying out the terms of this Agreement. 6. RECORDS AND CONFIDENTIALITY. Contractor acknowledges that for purposes of implementing this Agreement and providing services under this Agreement, she/he may have access to information that constitutes "school student records" as defined in the *Illinois School*

Student Records Act (105 ILCS10/1, et seq.) and/ or "education records"as defined in the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act* ("FERPA," 20 U.S.C. §1232g) and/ or "personally identifiable information" as defined in FERPA' s implementing regulations (34 CFR §99.3), which information is collectively referred to as "Student Data." With regard to Student Data, Contractor certifies that she/he will comply with all applicable laws, regulations and SASED policies relating to confidentiality, privacy, use, redisclosure and data security.

All school student records maintained by SASED that are used by the Contractor in connection with the provision of services under this Agreement shall be and remain the property of SASED. The parties acknowledge and agree that all records and documents prepared pursuant or related to this Agreement are the property of SASED, although Contractor may retain temporary physical possession of them for the convenience of SASED. SASED has the unrestricted authority to request, access, use, disclose, distribute, and otherwise use, in whole or in part, any reports, data, or other materials prepared by Contractor under this Agreement. Any record (personally identifiable to a student) that Contractors delivers to or prepares for SASED under this Agreement is a student record, subject to all confidentiality protections under the Federal Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the Illinois School Student Records Act. At the conclusion of the Agreement Term, Contractor agrees to return all Student Data to SASED.

7. CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECK. Any Contractor employees who provide services to SASED students under this Agreement shall be subject to a criminal background check as required by the Illinois School Code.

8. OTHER RULES AND POLICIES. Contractor agrees to abide by any other rules, policies, and procedures as communicated by SASED.

9. TERMINATION. Either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason, at any time, by written notice delivered to the other party not less than ten (10) days prior to the termination date. The Contractor will be entitled to recover any outstanding compensation earned as of the date of receipt of written notification from SASED of its termination of this Agreement.

10. RETURN OF PROPERTY. Upon termination or completion of the Agreement Term, Contractor will promptly return to SASED all property belonging to SASED, including without limitation: all computers, technology, office supplies, keys and any other property in any form.

11. CONTINUING OBLIGATIONS. Notwithstanding the termination of this Agreement for any reason, the provisions of Paragraph 6 of this Agreement will continue in full force and effect following such termination.

12. NON-DISCRIMINATION. 13. INSURANCE. During the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall maintain:

General Liability and Professional Liability insurance coverage in at least the following amounts: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per each occurrence; and three million dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate. The insurance shall include a provision for Sexual Abuse and Molestation coverage in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence/aggregate.

Auto Liability insurance coverage in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) Combined Single Limit if autos are used during SASSED business.

Workers Compensation/Employers' Liability insurance with statutory coverage with \$100,000 Accident, \$500,000 Disease Policy and \$100,000 Disease Per Employee.

A certificate of insurance should be provided annually naming SASSED as an Additional Named Insured and its successors on a primary and noncontributory basis.

14. LIABILITY. Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless SASSED, its officers, employees and agents, against any and all claims, damages, costs, losses, and/ or expenses arising from or related to the performance of this Agreement. This includes but is not limited to reasonable attorney's fees.

A student, parent/guardian, employee, or community member should notify any SASED Complaint Manager if he or she believes that the Board of Directors, its employees, or its agents have violated his or her rights guaranteed by the [State](#) or federal [Constitution](#), State or federal statute, or Board policy, or has a complaint regarding any one of the following:

1. Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, [42 U.S.C. §12101](#) *et seq.*
2. [Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, 20 U.S.C. §1681 et seq., excluding Title IX complaints governed by Board policy 2:265, Title IX Grievance Procedure](#)^{PRESSPlus1}
3. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, [29 U.S.C. §791](#) *et seq.*
4. The Complaint Manager will first attempt to resolve complaints without resorting to this grievance procedure. If a formal complaint is filed under this policy, the Complaint Manager will address the complaint promptly and equitably. A student and/or parent/guardian filing a complaint under this policy may forego any informal suggestions and/or attempts to resolve it and may proceed directly to this grievance procedure. The Complaint Manager will not require a student or parent/guardian complaining of any form of harassment to attempt to resolve allegations directly with the accused (or the accused's parent(s)/guardian(s)); this includes mediation.

Right to Pursue Other Remedies Not Impaired

The right of a person to prompt and equitable resolution of a complaint filed under this policy shall not be impaired by the person's pursuit of other remedies, e.g., criminal complaints, civil actions, etc. Use of this grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies and use of this grievance procedure does not extend any filing deadline related to the pursuit of other remedies. If a person is pursuing another remedy subject to a complaint under this policy, the SASSED will continue with a simultaneous investigation under this policy.

Deadlines

All deadlines under this policy may be extended by the Complaint Manager as he or she deems appropriate. As used in this policy, *school business days* means days on which SASSED's Administrative Center is open.

Filing a Complaint

A person (hereinafter Complainant) who wishes to avail him or herself of this grievance procedure may do so by filing a complaint with any SASSED Complaint

Manager. The Complainant shall not be required to file a complaint with a particular Complaint Manager and may request a Complaint Manager of the same gender. The Complaint Manager may request the Complainant to provide a written statement regarding the nature of the complaint or require a meeting with a student's parent(s)/guardian(s). The Complaint Manager shall assist the Complainant as needed.

For any complaint alleging bullying and/or cyberbullying of students, the Complaint Manager or designee shall process and review the complaint under Board policy 7:180, *Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment*, in addition to any response required by this policy.

For any complaint alleging sex discrimination that, if true, would implicate Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 ([20 U.S.C. §1681 et seq.](#)), the Title IX Coordinator or designee shall process and review the complaint under Board policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*.

For any complaint alleging harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall process and review the complaint under Board policy 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*, in addition to any response required by this policy.

For any complaint alleging sexual harassment or other violation of Board policy 5:20, *Workplace Harassment Prohibited*, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall process and review the complaint according to that policy, in addition to any response required by this policy, and shall consider whether an investigation under Board policy 5:120, *Employee Ethics; Code of Professional Conduct; and Conflict of Interest*, should be initiated.

Investigation Process

The Complaint Manager will investigate the complaint or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation on his or her behalf. The Complaint Manager shall ensure both parties have an equal opportunity to present evidence during an investigation. The complaint and identity of the Complainant will not be disclosed except: (1) as required by law, this policy, or any collective bargaining agreement, (2) as necessary to fully investigate the complaint, or (3) as authorized by the Complainant.

The identity of any student witnesses will not be disclosed except: (1) as

required by law, this policy, or any collective bargaining agreement, (2) as necessary to fully investigate the complaint, or (3) as authorized by the parent/guardian of the student witness, or by the student if the student is 18 years of age or older.

The Complaint Manager will inform, at regular intervals, the person(s) filing a complaint under this policy about the status of the investigation. Within 30 school business days after the date the complaint was filed, the Complaint Manager shall file a written report of his or her findings with the Executive Director. The Complaint Manager may request an extension of time from the Executive Director.

The Executive Director will keep the Board informed of all complaints.

If a complaint contains allegations involving the Executive Director or Board member(s), the written report shall be filed directly with the Board, which will make a decision in accordance with paragraph four of the following section of this policy.

Decision and Appeal

Within five school business days after receiving the Complaint Manager's report, the Executive Director shall provide his or her written decision to the Complainant and the accused as well as to the Complaint Manager. All decisions shall be based upon the *preponderance of evidence* standard.

Within 10 school business days after receiving the Executive Director's decision, the Complainant or the accused may appeal the decision to the Board by making a written request to the Complaint Manager. The Complaint Manager shall promptly forward all materials relative to the complaint and appeal to the Board.

Within 30 school business days after an appeal of the Executive Director's decision, the Board shall affirm, reverse, or amend the Executive Director's decision or direct the Executive Director to gather additional information. Within five school business days after the Board's decision, the Executive Director shall inform the Complainant and the accused of the Board's action.

For complaints containing allegations involving the Executive Director or Board member(s), within 30 school business days after receiving the Complaint Manager's or outside investigator's report, the Board shall provide its written decision to the Complainant and the accused, as well as to the Complaint Manager.

This policy shall not be construed to create an independent right to a hearing before the Executive Director or Board. The failure to strictly follow the timelines in this grievance procedure shall not prejudice any party.

Appointing a Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, and Complaint Managers [PRESSPlus3](#)

The Executive Director shall appoint a Nondiscrimination Coordinator to manage SASSED's efforts to provide equal opportunity employment and educational opportunities and prohibit the harassment of employees, students, and others.

~~The Nondiscrimination Coordinator also serves as SASSED's Executive Director~~ shall appoint a Title IX Coordinator to coordinate SASSED's efforts to comply with Title IX. [PRESSPlus4](#)

The Executive Director shall appoint at least one Complaint Manager to administer this policy. If possible, the Executive Director will appoint two Complaint Managers, each of a different gender. SASSED's Nondiscrimination Coordinator may be appointed as one of the Complaint Managers.

The Executive Director shall insert into this policy and keep current the names, office addresses, email addresses, and telephone numbers of the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, and the Complaint Managers.

4:15 Identity Protection

The collection, storage, use, and disclosure of social security numbers by SASED shall be consistent with State and federal laws. The goals for managing SASED's collection, storage, use, and disclosure of social security numbers are to:

1. Limit all activities involving social security numbers to those circumstances that are authorized by State or federal law.
2. Protect each social security number collected or maintained by SASED from unauthorized disclosure.

The Executive Director is responsible for ensuring that SASED complies with the Identity Protection Act, [5 ILCS 179/](#). Compliance measures shall include each of the following:

1. All employees having access to social security numbers in the course of performing their duties shall be trained to protect the confidentiality of social security numbers. Training should include instructions on the proper handling of information containing social security numbers from the time of collection through the destruction of the information.
2. Only employees who are required to use or handle information or documents that contain social security numbers shall have access to such information or documents.
3. Social security numbers requested from an individual shall be provided in a manner that makes the social security number easily redacted if the record is required to be released as part of a public records request.
4. When collecting a social security number or upon request by an individual, a statement of the purpose(s) for which SASED is collecting and using the social security number shall be provided. The stated reason for collection of the social security number must be relevant to the documented purpose.
5. All employees must be advised of this policy's existence, and a copy of the policy must be made available to each employee. The policy must also be made available to any member of the public, upon request.
6. If this policy is amended, employees will be advised of the existence of the amended policy and a copy of the amended policy will be made available to each employee.

No SASED employee shall collect, store, use, or disclose an individual's social security number unless specifically authorized by the Executive Director. An employee who has substantially breached the confidentiality of social security numbers may be subject to disciplinary action or sanctions up to and including dismissal in accordance with SASED policy and procedures. This policy shall not be interpreted as a guarantee of the confidentiality of social security numbers and/or other personal information. SASED will use best efforts to comply with this policy, but this policy should not be construed to convey any rights to protection of information not otherwise afforded by law.

Treatment of Personally Identifiable Information Under Grant Awards

The Executive Director ensures that SASED takes reasonable cybersecurity and other measures to

safeguard information including: [PRESSPlus1](#) (1) *protected personally identifiable information*, (2) other types of information that a federal awarding agency, pass-through agency entity, or State awarding agency designates as sensitive, such as *personally identifiable information* (PII) and (3) information that SASSED considers to be sensitive consistent with applicable laws regarding privacy and confidentiality (collectively, *sensitive information*), when administering federal grant awards and State grant awards governed by the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act ([30 ILCS 708/](#)).

The Executive Director shall establish procedures for the identification, handling, storage, access, disposal and overall confidentiality of sensitive information. The Executive Director shall ensure that employees and contractors responsible for the administration of a federal or State award for SASSED receive regular training in the safeguarding of sensitive information. Employees mishandling sensitive information are subject to discipline, up to and including dismissal.

Personally Identifiable Information (PII) means information that can be used to distinguish or trace an individual's identity, either alone or when combined with other personal or identifying information that is linked or linkable to a specific individual. Some PII is available in public sources such as telephone books and websites. This was previously defined as *public personally identifiable information* (Public PII), but 2024 revisions to 2 C.F.R. Part 200 have deleted Public PII as a definition. The definition of PII is not attached to any single category of information or technology. Instead, it requires a case-by-case assessment of the specific risk that an individual can be identified. Non-PII can become PII whenever additional information is made publicly available, in any medium and from any source, that could be used to identify an individual when combined with other available information. 2 C.F.R. §200.1.

Protected personally identifiable information (Protected PII) means PII, except for certain types of PII that must be disclosed by law. 2024 revisions to 2 C.F.R. Part 200 eliminated examples of Protected PII and instead only list examples of PII within the definition of Protected PII at 2 C.F.R. §200.1, which may indicate broadening of the definition of Protected PII. See 89 Fed. Reg. 79732. Before the 2024 revisions, examples of Protected PII contained in the regulation included, but were not limited to, social security number, passport number, credit card numbers, clearances, bank numbers, biometrics,

date and place of birth, mother's maiden name, criminal records, medical records, financial records, and educational transcripts. 2 C.F.R. §200.1. Consult the board attorney for guidance in this area. 4:80 Accounting and Audits

SASED's accounting and audit services shall comply with the *Requirements for Accounting, Budgeting, Financial Reporting, and Auditing*, as adopted by the Ill. State Board of Education (ISBE), State and federal laws and regulations, and generally accepted accounting principles. Determination of liabilities and assets, prioritization of expenditures of governmental funds, and provisions for accounting disclosures shall be made in accordance with government accounting standards as directed by the auditor designated by the Board of Directors. The Executive Director, in addition to other assigned financial responsibilities, shall report monthly on SASED's financial performance, both income and expense, in relation to the financial plan represented in the budget.

Annual Audit

At the close of each fiscal year, the Executive Director shall arrange an audit of SASED's funds, accounts, statements, and other financial matters. The audit shall be performed by an independent certified public accountant designated by the Board of Directors and be conducted in conformance with prescribed standards and legal requirements. A complete and detailed written audit report shall be provided to each Board of Directors member and to the Executive Director. The Executive Director shall annually, on or before October 15, submit an original and one copy of the audit to the Regional Superintendent of Schools.

Annual Financial Report

The Executive Director or designee shall annually prepare and submit the Annual Financial Report on a timely basis using the form adopted by the ISBE. The Executive Director shall review and discuss the Annual Financial Report with the Board before it is submitted.

Inventories

The Executive Director or designee is responsible for establishing and maintaining accurate inventory records. The inventory record of supplies and equipment shall include a description of each item, quantity, location, purchase date, and cost or estimated replacement cost, unless the supplies and equipment are acquired by SASED pursuant to a federal or State grant award, in which case the inventory record shall also include the information required by [2 C.F.R. §200.313](#), if applicable. The Executive Director shall establish procedures for the management of property acquired by SASED under grant awards that comply with federal and State law.

Capitalization Threshold [PRESSPlus1](#)

To be considered a capital asset for financial reporting purposes, a capital item must be at or above a capitalization threshold of \$1,000-\$5,000, [PRESSPlus2](#) depending on the item, and have an estimated useful life greater than one year. To be considered a capital asset for insurance coverage purposes, a capital item must at or above a capitalization threshold of \$1,000 and have an estimated useful life greater than one year. The following Capitalization Table should be used when developing the estimated useful life and calculating the depreciation expense for an item using the straight-line

depreciation method.

Disposition of SASSED Property

The Executive Director or designee shall notify the Board of Directors, as necessary, of the following so that the Board may consider its disposition: (1) SASSED personal property (property other than buildings and land) that is no longer needed for school purposes, and (2) school site, building, or other real estate that is unnecessary, unsuitable, or inconvenient. Notwithstanding the above, the Executive Director or designee may unilaterally dispose of personal property of a diminutive value. The Executive Director shall establish procedures for the disposition and, when permitted by the terms and conditions of the award, the retention [PRESSPlus3](#) of property acquired by SASSED under grant awards that comply with federal and State law.

Taxable Fringe Benefits

The Executive Director or designee shall: (1) require that all use of SASSED property or equipment by employees is for SASSED's convenience and best interests unless it is a Board of Directors-approved fringe benefit, and (2) ensure compliance with the Internal Revenue Service regulations regarding when to report an employee's personal use of SASSED property or equipment as taxable compensation.

Controls for Revolving Funds and Petty Cash

Revolving funds and the petty cash system are established in Board policy 4:50, *Payment Procedures*. The Executive Director shall: (1) designate a custodian for each revolving fund and petty cash fund, (2) obtain a bond for each fund custodian, and (3) maintain the funds in compliance with this policy, State law, and ISBE rules. A check for the petty cash fund may be drawn payable to the designated petty cash custodian. Bank accounts for revolving funds are limited to a maximum balance of \$1,000. All expenditures from these bank accounts must be directly related to the purpose for which the account was established and supported with documentation, including signed invoices or receipts. All deposits into these bank accounts must be accompanied with a clear description of their intended purpose. The Executive Director or designee shall include checks written to reimburse revolving funds on the Board of Directors monthly listing of bills indicating the recipient and including an explanation.

Control Requirements for Checks

The Board of Directors must approve all bank accounts opened or established in SASSED's or a District SASSED's name or with SASSED's Federal Employer Identification Number. All checks issued by SASSED must be signed by either the Treasurer or Board of Directors Chairperson, except that checks from accounts containing student activity funds or fiduciary funds and revolving accounts may be signed by their respective account custodians.

Internal Controls

The Executive Director is primarily responsible for establishing and implementing a system of internal controls for safeguarding SASSED's financial condition; the Board of Directors, however, will oversee these safeguards. The control objectives are to ensure efficient business and financial practices, reliable financial reporting, and compliance with State law and Board policies, and to prevent losses from fraud, waste, and abuse, as well as employee error, misrepresentation by third parties, or other imprudent employee action.

The Executive Director or designee shall annually audit SASSED's financial and business operations for compliance with established internal controls and provide the results to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may from time-to-time engage a third-party to audit internal controls in addition to the annual audit.

5:20 Workplace Harassment Prohibited

SASED expects the workplace environment to be productive, respectful, and free of unlawful discrimination, including harassment. SASED employees shall not engage in harassment or abusive conduct on the basis of an individual's actual or perceived race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, age, citizenship status, work authorization status, pregnancy, marital status, family responsibilities, reproductive health decisions, order of protection status, military status, or unfavorable discharge from military service, nor shall they engage in harassment or abusive conduct on the basis of an individual's other protected status identified in Board policy 5:10, *Equal Employment Opportunity and Minority Recruitment*. Harassment of students, including, but not limited to, sexual harassment, is prohibited by Board policies 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*; 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*; 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*; [PRESSPlus1](#) 7:20, *Harassment of Students Prohibited*; 7:180, *Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment*; and 7:185, *Teen Dating Violence Prohibited*.

SASED will take remedial and corrective action to address unlawful workplace harassment, including sexual harassment.

Sexual Harassment Prohibited

SASED shall provide a workplace environment free of verbal, physical, or other conduct or communications constituting harassment on the basis of sex as defined and otherwise prohibited by State and federal law. SASED provides annual sexual harassment prevention training in accordance with State law.

SASED employees shall not make unwelcome sexual advances or request sexual favors or engage in any unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature when: (1) submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment; (2) submission to or rejection of such

conduct by an individual is used as the basis for employment decisions affecting such individual; or (3) such conduct has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working environment. Sexual harassment prohibited by this policy includes, but is not limited to, verbal, physical, or other conduct. The terms intimidating, hostile, or offensive include, but are not limited to, conduct that has the effect of humiliation, embarrassment, or discomfort. Sexual harassment will be evaluated in light of all the circumstances.

Making a Report or Complaint

Employees and *nonemployees* (persons who are not otherwise employees and are directly performing services for SASSED pursuant to a contract with SASSED, including contractors, and consultants) are encouraged to promptly report information regarding violations of this policy. Individuals may choose to report to a person of the individual's same gender. Every effort should be made to file such reports or complaints as soon as possible, while facts are known, and potential witnesses are available.

Aggrieved individuals, if they feel comfortable doing so, should directly inform the person engaging in the harassing conduct or communication that such conduct or communication is offensive and must stop.

Whom to Contact with a Report or Complaint

An employee should report claims of harassment, including making a confidential report, to any of the following: his/her immediate supervisor, the Program Administrator/Coordinator, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, and/or a Complaint Manager.

An employee may also report claims using Board policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*. If a claim is reported using Board policy 2:260, then the Complaint Manager shall process and review the claim according to that policy, in addition to any response required by this policy.

The Executive Director shall insert into this policy the names, office addresses, email addresses, and telephone numbers of SASSED's current Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, PRESSPlus2 and Complaint Managers. ~~The Nondiscrimination Coordinator also serves as the SASSED's Title IX Coordinator.~~

Investigation Process

Any SASSED employee who receives a report or complaint of harassment must promptly forward the report or complaint to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, or a Complaint Manager. Any employee who fails to promptly forward a report or complaint may be disciplined, up to and including discharge.

Reports and complaints of harassment will be confidential to the greatest extent practicable, subject to SASSED's duty to investigate and maintain a workplace environment that is productive, respectful, and free of unlawful discrimination,

including harassment.

For any report or complaint alleging sexual-based [PRESSPlus3](#) harassment that, if true, would implicate Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 ([20 U.S.C. §1681 et seq.](#)), the Nondiscrimination Title IX Coordinator or designee shall consider whether action under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, should be initiated.

For any report or complaint alleging harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall investigate under Board policy 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*.

For any other alleged workplace harassment that does not require action under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, or 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall consider whether an investigation under policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*, and/or 5:120, *Employee Ethics; Code of Professional Conduct; and Conflict of Interest*, should be initiated, regardless of whether a written report or complaint is filed.

Reports That Involve Alleged Incidents of Sexual Abuse of a Child by School Personnel

An *alleged incident of sexual abuse* is an incident of sexual abuse of a child, as defined in [720 ILCS 5/11-9.1A\(b\)](#), that is alleged to have been perpetrated by school personnel, including a school vendor or volunteer, that occurred: on school grounds during a school activity; or outside of school grounds or not during a school activity.

Any complaint alleging an incident of sexual abuse shall be processed and reviewed according to policy 5:90, *Abused and Neglected Child Reporting*. In addition to reporting the suspected abuse, the complaint shall also be processed under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, or policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Enforcement

A violation of this policy by an employee may result in discipline, up to and including discharge. A violation of this policy by a third party will be addressed in accordance with the authority of the Board in the context of the relationship of

the third party to SASSED, e.g., vendor, parent/guardian, invitee, etc. Any person making a knowingly false accusation regarding harassment will likewise be subject to disciplinary action, which for an employee that may be up to and including discharge.

Retaliation Prohibited

An employee's employment, compensation, or work assignment shall not be adversely affected by complaining or providing information about harassment. Retaliation against employees for bringing complaints or providing information about harassment is prohibited (see Board policies 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*, and 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, and 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*), and depending upon the law governing the complaint, whistleblower protection may be available under the State Officials and Employees Ethics Act ([5 ILCS 430/](#)), the Whistleblower Act ([740 ILCS 174/](#)), and/or the Ill. Human Rights Act ([775 ILCS 5/](#)).

An employee should report allegations of retaliation to his/her immediate supervisor, the Program Administrator, an administrator, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, and/or a Complaint Manager.

Employees who retaliate against others for reporting or complaining of violations of this policy or for participating in the reporting or complaint process will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge.

Recourse to State and Federal Fair Employment Practice Agencies

SASSED encourages all employees who have information regarding violations of this policy to report the information pursuant to this policy. The following government agencies are available to assist employees: the Ill. Dept. of Human Rights and the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

The Executive Director shall also use reasonable measures to inform staff members, applicants, and nonemployees of this policy, which shall include posting on SASSED website and/or making this policy available in SASSED's administrative office and including this policy in the appropriate handbooks.

General Personnel

5:60 Expenses

The Board regulates the reimbursement of all travel, meal, and lodging expenses by resolution. Money shall not be advanced or reimbursed, or purchase orders issued for: (1) the expenses of any person except the employee, (2) anyone's personal expenses, or (3) entertainment expenses. Entertainment includes, but is not limited to, shows, amusements, theaters, circuses, sporting events, or any other place of public or private entertainment or amusement, unless the entertainment is ancillary to the purpose of the program or event. SASED is not responsible for losses due to an employee's own negligence, losses due to normal wear, or losses due to theft, unless the theft was a result of SASED's negligence. Employees must submit the appropriate itemized, signed, standardized form(s) to support any requests for expense advancements, reimbursements, or purchase orders that show the following:

1. The amount of the estimated or actual expense, with attached receipts for actual incurred expenses.
2. The name and title of the employee who is requesting the expense advancement or reimbursement. Receipts from group functions must include the names, offices, and job titles of all participants.
3. The date(s) of the official business on which the expense advancement, reimbursement, or purchase order will be or was expended.
4. The nature of the official business conducted when the expense advancement, reimbursement, or purchase order will be or was expended.

Advancements

The Executive Director may advance expenses to teachers and other licensed employees for the anticipated actual and necessary expenses to be incurred while attending meetings that are related to their duties and will contribute to their professional development, provided they fall below the maximum allowed in the Board's expense regulations.

Expense advancement requests must be submitted to the Executive Director or designee on SASED's standardized estimated expense approval form for employees. After spending expense advancements, employees must use SASED's standardized expense reimbursement form and submit to the Executive Director: (a) the itemized, signed advancement voucher that was issued, and (b) the amount of actual expenses by attaching receipts. Any portion of an expense advancement not used must be returned to SASED. Expense advancements and vouchers shall be presented to the Board in its regular bill process.

Reimbursements and Purchase Orders

Expense reimbursements and purchase orders may be issued by the Executive Director or designee to employees, along with other expenses necessary for the performance of their duties, provided the expenses fall below the maximum allowed in the Board's expense regulations.

Expense reimbursements and purchase order approvals are not guaranteed and, when possible, employees should seek pre-approval of expenses by providing an estimation of expenses on

SASED's standardized estimated expense approval form for employees, except in situations when the expense is diminutive. When pre-approval is not sought, employees must seek reimbursement on SASED's standardized expense reimbursement form for employees. Expense reimbursements and purchase orders shall be presented to the Board in its regular bill process.

Use of Credit and Procurement Cards

Credit and procurement card usage is governed by policy 4:55, *Use of Credit and Procurement Cards*.

Exceeding the Maximum Allowable Expense Amount(s)

All requests for expense advancements, reimbursements, and purchase orders exceeding the maximum allowed in the Board's expense regulations may only be approved when:

1. The Board's resolution to regulate expenses allows for such approval;
2. An emergency or other extraordinary circumstance exists; and
3. The request is approved by a roll call vote at an open Board meeting.

Registration

When possible, registration fees will be paid by SASED in advance.

Travel

The least expensive method of travel will be used, provided that no hardship will be caused to the employee. The Executive Director will have the authority to approve out-of-state travel. SASED staff are allowed out-of-state travel only with the approval of the SASED Executive Director who will ensure the travel is consistent with Board approved reimbursement rates and administrative guidelines. Staff will only attend out-of-state programs and activities which are not available in Illinois and attendance at which will directly benefit SASED. Employees will be reimbursed for:

1. Air travel at the coach or economy class commercial airline rate. First class or business class air travel will be reimbursed only if emergency circumstances warrant. The emergency circumstances must be explained on the expense form and Board approval of the additional expense is required. Fees for the first checked bag will be reimbursed. Copies of airline tickets and baggage receipts must be attached to the expense form.
2. Rail or bus travel at actual cost. Rail or bus travel costs may not exceed the cost of coach airfare. Copies of tickets must be attached to the expense form to substantiate amounts.
3. Use of personal automobiles at the standard mileage rate approved by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes. The reimbursement may not exceed the cost of coach airfare. Mileage for use of personal automobiles in trips to and from transportation terminals will also be reimbursed. Toll charges and parking costs will be reimbursed.
4. Automobile rental costs when the vehicle's use is warranted. The circumstances for such use must be explained on the expense form.
5. Taxis, airport limousines, ride sharing services, or other local transportation costs.

Meals

Meals charged to SASED should represent mid-fare selections for the hotel/meeting facility or general area. Tips are included with meal charges. Expense forms must explain the meal charges incurred. Alcoholic beverages will not be reimbursed.

Lodging

Employees should request conference rate or mid-fare room accommodations. A single room rate will be reimbursed. Employees should pay personal expenses at checkout. If that is impossible, deductions for the charges should be made on the expense form.

Miscellaneous Expenses

Employees may seek reimbursement for other expenses incurred while attending a meeting sponsored by organizations described herein by fully describing the expenses on the expense form, attaching receipts.

Additional Requirements for Travel Expenses Charged to Federal and State Grants

All grant-related travel expenses must be pre-approved by the Executive Director or designee.

Expenses for travel, including expenses for transportation, lodging, meals, and related items incurred by employees and charged to a federal grant or State grant governed by the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act ([30 ILCS 708/](#)) must also meet the following requirements:

1. The participation of the employee is necessary to the award, and the costs are specifically related to the award.
2. Expenses must be permissible under the terms and conditions of the award.
3. Expenses must be reasonable and consistent with this policy.
4. The Board does not reimburse actual expenses or pay a per diem allowance unless the employee is on official travel status for more than 12 hours. However, employees remain eligible for mileage reimbursement (minus regular commuting mileage/costs) and other transportation expenses if on travel status less than 12 hours.
5. Expenses may be charged based on an actual cost basis or on a per diem basis in lieu of actual costs incurred; however, only one method may be applied per trip.
6. Commercial airfare costs in excess of the least expensive coach or economy class are prohibited except when such accommodations would: (1) require circuitous routing; (2) require travel during unreasonable hours; (3) excessively prolong travel; (4) result in additional costs that would offset transportation savings; or (5) offer accommodations not reasonably adequate for the traveler's medical needs. Qualifying circumstances must be explained on the expense form, and Board approval of the additional expense is required.
7. Per diem rates and actual reimbursement amounts for mileage, meals, and lodging may not exceed the rates established by the Governor's Travel Control Board or federal travel regulations, whichever is less. These limits do not apply when: (1) an employee stays in the lowest-priced room available at or near a hotel where a conference or seminar is located or in accommodations arranged by the conference/seminar organization, or (2) lodging at or below the established rate is unavailable. In those cases, the employee will be reimbursed for actual lodging expenses with prior approval, but in no case will the reimbursement exceed 300% of the applicable maximum per diem rate. If a conference fee includes a meal, the meal or per diem allowance will be reduced by the actual value of the meal or the applicable meal allowance, whichever is less.
8. Employees must use the least expensive compact car available when using a rental car for travel, unless an exception is approved. The Board does not reimburse employees for collision damage waiver or theft insurance.
9. The Board will reimburse travel expenses not chargeable to an award from other SASSED funds consistent with this policy.

5:100 Staff Development Program

The Executive Director or designee shall implement a staff development program. The goal of the program shall be to update and improve the skills and knowledge of staff members in order to achieve and maintain a high level of job performance and satisfaction.

Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act (ANCRA) and Erin's Law Training

The staff development program shall include the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act (ANCRA) mandated reporter training and training on the awareness and prevention of child sexual abuse and grooming behaviors (*Erin's Law*) as follows (see Board policies 4:165, *Awareness and Prevention of Child Sexual Abuse and Grooming Behaviors*, and 5:90, *Abused and Neglected Child Reporting*):

1. Within three months of employment, each staff member must complete mandated reporter training from a provider or agency with expertise in recognizing and reporting child abuse. Mandated reporter training must be completed again at least every three years.
2. By January 31 of every year, all school personnel must complete evidence-informed training on preventing, reporting, and responding to child sexual abuse, grooming behaviors (including *sexual misconduct* as defined in *Faith's Law*), and boundary violations.

In-Service Training Requirements

The staff development program shall provide, at a minimum, within six months of employment and renewed at least once every five years thereafter (unless required more frequently by other State or federal law), the in-service training of all District staff who work with pupils on:

1. Health conditions of students, including but not limited to training on:
 - a. Anaphylactic reactions and management, conducted by a person with expertise on anaphylactic reactions and management;
 - b. Management of asthma, prevention of asthma symptoms, and emergency response in the school setting;
 - c. The basics of seizure recognition and first aid and emergency protocols, consistent with best practice guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention;
 - d. The basics of diabetes care, how to identify when a diabetic student needs immediate or emergency medical attention, and whom to contact in case of emergency;
 - e. Current best practices regarding identification and treatment of attention deficit hyperactivity disorder; and
 - f. How to respond to an incident involving life-threatening bleeding, including use of a school's trauma bleeding control kit, if applicable.
2. Social-emotional learning. Training may include providing education to all school personnel about the content of the Illinois Social and Emotional Learning Standards, how they apply to everyday school interactions, and examples of how social emotional learning can be integrated into instructional practices across all grades and subjects.

3. Developing cultural competency, including but not limited to understanding and reducing implicit bias, including *implicit racial bias* as defined in [105 ILCS 5/10-20.61](#) (implicit bias training).
4. Identifying warning signs of mental illness, trauma, and suicidal behavior in youth, along with appropriate intervention and referral techniques, including resources and guidelines as outlined in [105 ILCS 5/2-3.166](#) (*Ann Marie's Law*) and the definitions of *trauma*, *trauma-responsive learning environments*, and *whole child* as set forth in [105 ILCS 5/3-11](#).
5. Domestic and sexual violence and the needs of expectant and parenting youth, conducted by persons with expertise in domestic and sexual violence and the needs of expectant and parenting youth. Training shall include, but is not limited to:
 - a. Communicating with and listening to youth victims of domestic or sexual violence and expectant and parenting youth;
 - b. Connecting youth victims of domestic or sexual violence and expectant and parenting youth to appropriate in-school services and other agencies, programs, and services as needed;
 - c. Implementing SASSED's policies and procedures regarding such youth, including confidentiality; and
 - d. Procedures for responding to incidents of teen dating violence that take place at school, on school grounds, at school-sponsored activities, or in vehicles used for school-provided transportation as outlined in [105 ILCS 110/3.10](#) (see Board policy 7:185, *Teen Dating Violence Prohibited*).
6. Protections and accommodations for students, including but not limited to training on:
 - a. The federal Americans with Disabilities Act as it pertains to the school environment; and
 - b. Homelessness.
7. Educator ethics and responding to child sexual abuse and grooming behavior (see Board policy 5:120, *Employee Ethics; Code of Professional Conduct; and Conflict of Interest*); including but not limited to training on:
 - a. Teacher-student conduct;
 - b. School employee-student conduct; and
 - c. Evidence-informed training on preventing, recognizing, reporting, and responding to child sexual abuse and grooming as outlined in [105 ILCS 5/10-23.13](#) (*Erin's Law*).
8. Effective instruction in violence prevention and conflict resolution, conducted in accordance with the requirements of [105 ILCS 5/27-23.4](#) (violence prevention and conflict resolution education).

Additional Training Requirements

In addition, the staff development program shall include each of the following:

1. Ongoing professional development for ~~teachers, administrators, all school personnel and school resource officers, and staff~~ regarding on the requirements of 105 ILCS 5/10-22.6 and 5/10-20.14, the adverse consequences of school exclusion and justice-system involvement, effective classroom management strategies, culturally responsive discipline, trauma-responsive learning environments as defined in 105 ILCS 5/3-11(b), PRESSPlus1 the appropriate and available supportive services for the promotion of student attendance and engagement, and developmentally appropriate disciplinary methods that promote positive and healthy school climates.
2. Annual continuing education and/or training opportunities (professional standards) for school nutrition program directors, managers, and staff. Each school food authority's director shall document compliance with this requirement by the end of each school year and maintain documentation for a three-year period.

3. All high school coaching personnel, including the head and assistant coaches, and athletic directors must obtain online concussion certification by completing online concussion awareness training in accordance with [105 ILCS 25/1.15](#). Coaching personnel and athletic directors hired on or after 8-19-14 must be certified before their position's start date.
4. The following individuals must complete concussion training as specified in the Youth Sports Concussion Safety Act: coaches and assistant coaches (whether volunteer or employee) of an interscholastic athletic activity; nurses, licensed and/or non-licensed healthcare professionals serving on the Concussion Oversight Team; athletic trainers; game officials of an interscholastic athletic activity; and physicians serving on the Concussion Oversight Team.
5. For school personnel who work with hazardous or toxic materials on a regular basis, training on the safe handling and use of such materials.
6. For delegated care aides performing services in connection with a student's seizure action plan, training in accordance with [105 ILCS 150/](#), the Seizure Smart School Act.
7. For delegated care aides performing services in connection with a student's diabetes care plan, training in accordance with [105 ILCS 145/](#), the Care of Students with Diabetes Act.
8. For all SASSED staff, annual sexual harassment prevention training.
9. Title IX requirements for training in accordance with 34 C.F.R. §Part 106.8(d) (see Board policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*).
10. Training for all SASSED employees on the prevention of discrimination and harassment based on race, color, and national origin in school as part of new employee training and at least once every two years.
11. Training for at least one designated employee at each school about the Prioritization of Urgency of Need for Services (PUNS) database and steps required to register students for it.
12. Training in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/26A for at least one staff member in each school designated as a resource for students who are parents, expectant parents, or victims of domestic or sexual violence, and for any employees whose duties include the resolution of complaints of violations of 105 ILCS 5/26A (see Board policy 7:255, *Students who are Parents, Expectant Parents, or Victims of Domestic or Sexual Violence*). [PRESSPlus2](#)

The Executive Director shall develop protocols for administering youth suicide awareness and prevention education to staff consistent with Board policy 7:290, *Suicide and Depression Awareness and Prevention*.

An opportunity shall be provided for all staff members to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer life-saving techniques and first aid, including the Heimlich maneuver, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the use of an automated external defibrillator, in accordance with a nationally recognized certifying organization. Physical fitness facilities' staff must be trained in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and use of an automated external defibrillator.

INSTRUCTION

6:150 Home and Hospital Instruction

A student who is absent from a SASED program, or whose physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse anticipates that the student will be absent from school, because of a medical condition may be eligible for instruction in the student's home or hospital. Eligibility shall be determined by State law and the Ill. State Board of Education rules governing (1) the continuum of placement options for students who have been identified for special education services or (2) the home and hospital services. Appropriate educational services from qualified staff will begin no later than five school days after receiving a written statement from: (1) a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches, (2) a licensed physician assistant, or (3) a licensed advanced practice registered nurse. Instructional or related services for a student receiving special education services will be determined by the student's individualized education program. The student's home district shall assume responsibility for the student's educational services after notification has been given by SASED.

The home district of a student who is unable to attend a SASED program because of pregnancy or pregnancy-related conditions, the fulfillment of parenting obligations related to the health of the child, or health and safety concerns arising from domestic or sexual violence as defined in 105 ILCS 5/26A, is responsible to provide home instruction, correspondence courses, or other courses of instruction under the following circumstances: [PRESSPlus1](#)

1. ~~(4) b~~ Before the birth of the child when the student's physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse indicates, in writing, that she is medically unable to attend regular classroom instruction, and ~~(2) f~~
2. For up to three months after the child's birth or a miscarriage. [PRESSPlus2](#)
3. When a student must care for his or her ill child if:
 - a. The child's physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse informs the District, in writing, that the child has a serious health condition [PRESSPlus3](#) that would require the student to be absent from school for two or more consecutive weeks; and
 - b. The student or the student's parent/guardian informs SASED, in writing, that the student needs to care for the child during this period.
4. The student must treat physical or mental health complications or address safety concerns arising from domestic or sexual violence when a health care provider or an employee of the student's domestic or sexual violence organization, as defined in 105 ILCS 5/26A, informs SASED, in writing, that the care is needed by the student and will cause the student's absence from school for two or more consecutive weeks.

SASED may reassess home instruction provided to a student under No. 3 or No. 4 every two months to determine the student's continuing need for home instruction.

Periodic conferences will be held between appropriate SASED personnel, district personnel, parent(s)/guardian(s), and hospital staff to coordinate course work and facilitate a student's return to school.

INSTRUCTION

6:235 Access to Electronic Networks

Electronic networks are a part of SASED/member districts' instructional program and serve to promote educational excellence by facilitating resource sharing, innovation, and communication.

The term *electronic networks* includes all of SASED and its member districts' technology resources, including, but not limited to:

1. SASED and its member districts' local-area and wide-area networks, including wireless networks (Wi-Fi), Cooperative/member district-issued Wi-Fi hotspots, and any Cooperative/member district servers or other networking infrastructure;
2. Access to the Internet or other online resources via the SASED member districts' networks or to any District-issued online account from any computer or device, regardless of location;
3. SASED member district-owned or SASED member district-issued computers, laptops, tablets, phones, or similar devices.

The Executive Director shall develop an implementation plan for this policy and appoint system administrator(s).

SASED/member district is not responsible for any information that may be lost or damaged, or become unavailable when using the network, or for any information that is retrieved or transmitted via the Internet. Furthermore, SASED/member districts will not be responsible for any unauthorized charges or fees resulting from access to the Internet.

Curriculum

The use of SASED/member districts' electronic networks shall: (1) be consistent with the curriculum adopted by SASED/member districts as well as the varied instructional needs, learning styles, abilities, and developmental levels of the students, and (2) comply with the selection criteria for instructional materials and library-media center materials. As required by federal law and Board policy 6:60, *Curriculum Content*, students will be educated about appropriate online behavior, including but not limited to: (1) interacting with other individuals on social networking websites and in chat rooms, and (2) cyberbullying awareness and response. Staff members may, consistent with the Executive Director's implementation plan, use the Internet throughout the curriculum.

SASED/member districts' electronic network is part of the curriculum and is not a public forum for general use.

Acceptable Use

All use of the SASED/member districts' electronic networks must be: (1) in support of education and/or research, and be in furtherance of the goals stated herein, or (2) for a legitimate school business purpose. Use is a privilege, not a right. Students and staff members have no expectation of privacy in any material that is stored, transmitted, or received via SASED/member districts' electronic network or SASED/member districts' computers. General rules for behavior and communications

apply when using electronic networks. SASED/member districts' administrative procedure, *Acceptable Use of the Cooperative's Electronic Networks*, contains the appropriate uses, ethics, and protocol. Electronic communications and downloaded material, including files deleted from a user's account but not erased, may be monitored or read by school officials.

Internet Safety

Technology protection measures shall be used on each SASED/member district computer with Internet access. They shall include a filtering device that protects against Internet access by both adults and minors to visual depictions that are: (1) obscene, (2) pornographic, or (3) harmful or inappropriate for students, as defined by federal law and as determined by the Executive Director or designee. The Executive Director or designee shall enforce the use of such filtering devices for a bona fide research or other lawful purpose, provided the person received prior permission from the Executive Director or system administrator. The Executive Director or designee shall include measures in this policy's implementation plan to address the following:

1. Ensure staff supervision of student access to online electronic networks,
2. Restrict student access to inappropriate matter as well as restricting access to harmful materials,
3. Ensure student and staff privacy, safety, and security when using electronic communications,
4. Restrict unauthorized access, including "hacking" and other unlawful activities, and
5. Restrict unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal identification information, such as, names and addresses.

Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI)-Enabled Tools [PRESSPlus1](#)

The Board recognizes that AI-enabled tools are important to enhance student learning, educator effectiveness, and school operations. The use of AI-enabled tools in SASED shall be implemented in a safe, ethical, and equitable manner and in accordance with Board policies 1:30, SASED Philosophy, and 7:345, Use of Educational Technologies.

To implement the use of AI-enabled tools in SASED, the Executive Director or designee shall:

1. Develop a Association-wide AI Plan that addresses SASED's approach to the integration of AI;
2. Based on the Association-wide AI Plan, establish AI Responsible Use Guidelines to address the responsible use of AI in the Association by students and staff;
3. Ensure that AI-enabled tools comply with State and federal law;
4. Ensure that staff receive training and students receive instruction on the use of AI, as appropriate; and
5. Review the Association's AI Plan and AI Responsible Use Guidelines on an annual basis and update them as needed.

Authorization for Electronic Network Access

Each staff member must sign SASED and the host member districts' *Authorization for Access to the District's Electronic Networks* as a condition for using SASED/member districts' electronic network. Each student and his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) must sign the *Authorization* before being granted unsupervised use.

Confidentiality

All users of SASSED/member districts' computers to access the Internet shall maintain the confidentiality of student records. Reasonable measures to protect against unreasonable access shall be taken before confidential student information is loaded onto the network.

Violations

The failure of any student or staff member to follow the terms of the SASSED or host district administrative procedure, *Acceptable Use of the District's Electronic Networks*, or this policy, will result in the loss of privileges, disciplinary action, and/or appropriate legal action.

This content contains an item on which collective bargaining may be required. Any policy that impacts upon wages, hours, and terms and conditions of employment is subject to collective bargaining upon request by the employee representative, even if the policy involves an inherent managerial right.

A Statewide Generative AI and Natural Language Processing Taskforce issued a report to the General Assembly in December 2024 (<https://doit.illinois.gov/content/dam/soi/en/web/doit/meetings/ai-taskforce/reports/2024-gen-ai-task-force-report.pdf>) that recommended the Ill. State Board of Education provide guidance on the use of AI in schools, best practices, and educator training. The U.S. Dept. of Education released a toolkit to assist education leaders with the safe, ethical, and equitable integration of AI within education systems, available at: http://downloads.microscribepub.com/il/press/federal_resources/FINAL-ED-OET-Education-Leaders-AI-Toolkit-10.29.24_20250221.pdf. Note: This resource may no longer be available on a federal government website but is being maintained at PRESS Online to provide consistent subscriber access.

Adopting policy language that addresses AI provides (a) a way for boards to monitor how this technology is being used in the district, and (b) an opportunity for the board and the superintendent to examine all current policies, collective bargaining agreements, and administrative procedures on this

subject. Before adoption of this subhead, the board may want to have a conversation with the superintendent to determine how local conditions, resources, and current practices will support the full implementation of a policy that addresses AI and its goals. The use of AI will be most effective when the policy reflects local conditions and circumstances. Consult the Board Attorney about these issues. 7:10 Equal Educational Opportunities

Equal educational and extracurricular opportunities shall be available for all students without regard to color, race, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, ancestry, age, physical or mental disability, gender identity, status of being homeless, immigration status, order of protection status, military status, unfavorable military discharge, reproductive health decisions, or actual or potential marital or parental status, including pregnancy. Further, SASED will not knowingly enter into agreements with any entity or any individual that discriminates against students on the basis of sex or any other protected status. Any student may file a discrimination complaint by using Board policy 2:260, Uniform Grievance Procedure, or in the case of discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin, Board policy 2:270, Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited.^{PRESSPlus1}

Sex Equity

No student shall, based on sex, sexual orientation, or gender identity be denied equal access to programs, activities, services, or benefits or be limited in the exercise of any right, privilege, advantage, or denied equal access to educational and extracurricular programs and activities.

Any student may file a sex equity complaint by using Board policy 2:260, Uniform Grievance Procedure. A student may appeal the Board's resolution of the complaint to the Regional Superintendent (pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/3-10) and, thereafter, to the State Superintendent of Education (pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/2-3.8).

Any student may file a ~~sexual harassment~~ ^{discrimination}^{PRESSPlus2} complaint by using Board policy 2:265, Title IX Grievance Procedure.

Administrative Implementation

The Executive Director shall appoint a Nondiscrimination Coordinator, ~~who also serves as SASED's~~ and a Title IX Coordinator. The Executive Director and Program Administrator/Coordinator shall use reasonable measures to inform staff members and students of this policy and related grievance procedures.

STUDENTS

7:20 Harassment of Students Prohibited

No person, including a SASED employee, agent, or student, shall harass, intimidate, or bully a student on the basis of actual or perceived: race; color; national origin; military status; unfavorable discharge status from military service; sex; sexual orientation; gender identity; gender-related identity or expression; ancestry; age; religion; physical or mental disability; order of protection status; status of being homeless; actual or potential marital or parental status, including pregnancy; physical appearance; socioeconomic status; academic status; association with a person or group with one or more of the aforementioned actual or perceived characteristics; or any other distinguishing characteristic. SASED will not tolerate harassing, intimidating conduct, or bullying whether verbal, physical, sexual, or visual, that affects the tangible benefits of education, that unreasonably interferes with a student's educational performance, or that creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive educational environment. Examples of prohibited conduct include name-calling, using derogatory slurs, stalking, sexual violence, causing psychological harm, threatening or causing physical harm, threatened or actual destruction of property, or wearing or possessing items depicting or implying hatred or prejudice of one of the characteristics stated above.

Sexual Harassment Prohibited

SASED shall provide an educational environment free of verbal, physical, or other conduct or communications constituting harassment on the basis of sex as defined and otherwise prohibited by State and federal law. See policies 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, and 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Making a Report or Complaint

The Executive Director shall use reasonable measures to inform staff members and students of this policy by including:

1. For students, age-appropriate information about the contents of this policy in SASED's student handbook(s), on SASED's website, and, if applicable, in any other areas where policies, rules, and standards of conduct are otherwise posted in each school.
2. For staff members, this policy in the appropriate employee handbook(s), if applicable, and/or in any other areas where policies, rules, and standards of conduct are otherwise made available to staff.

Investigation Process

Any SASED employee who receives a report or complaint of harassment must promptly forward the report or complaint to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, or a Complaint Manager. Any employee who fails to promptly comply may be disciplined, up to and including discharge.

Reports and complaints of harassment will be confidential to the greatest extent practicable, subject to SASED's duty to investigate and maintain an educational environment that is productive, respectful, and free of unlawful discrimination, including harassment.

For any report or complaint alleging sexual-based [PRESSPlus3](#) harassment that, if true, would implicate Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 ([20 U.S.C. §1681 et seq.](#)), the Nondiscrimination Title IX Coordinator or designee shall consider whether action under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, should be initiated.

For any report or complaint alleging harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall investigate under Board policy 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*. [PRESSPlus4](#)

For any other alleged student harassment that does not require action under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, or 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*, the

Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager or designee shall consider whether an investigation under policies 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*, and/or 7:190, *Student Behavior*, should be initiated, regardless of whether a written report or complaint is filed.

Reports That Involve Alleged Incidents of Sexual Abuse of a Child by School Personnel

An *alleged incident of sexual abuse* is an incident of sexual abuse of a child, as defined in [720 ILCS 5/11-9.1A\(b\)](#), that is alleged to have been perpetrated by school personnel, including a school vendor or volunteer, that occurred: on school grounds during a school activity; or outside of school grounds or not during a school activity.

Any complaint alleging an incident of sexual abuse shall be processed and reviewed according to policy 5:90, *Abused and Neglected Child Reporting*. In addition to reporting the suspected abuse, the complaint shall also be processed under policy 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, or policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Enforcement

Any SASED employee who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including discharge. Any third party who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be addressed in accordance with the authority of the Board in the context of the relationship of the third party to SASED, e.g., vendor, parent/guardian, invitee, etc. Any SASED student who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be subject to disciplinary action, including but not limited to, suspension and expulsion consistent with the behavior policy. Any person making a knowingly false accusation regarding prohibited conduct will likewise be subject to disciplinary action.

Retaliation Prohibited

Retaliation against any person for bringing complaints or providing information about harassment is prohibited (see policies 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*, and 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*, and 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*).

Students should report allegations of retaliation to the Program

Administrator/Coordinator, an administrator, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, and/or a Complaint Manager.

7:70 Attendance and Truancy

Compulsory School Attendance

This policy applies to individuals who have custody or control of a child: (a) between the ages of six (on or before September 1) and 17 years (unless the child has graduated from high school), or (b) who is enrolled in any of grades kindergarten through 12 in the public school regardless of age.

Subject to specific requirements in State law, the following children are not required to attend public school: (1) any child attending a private school (including a home school) or parochial school, (2) any child who is physically or mentally unable to attend school (including a pregnant student suffering medical complications as certified by her physician), (3) any child lawfully and necessarily employed, (4) any child over 12 and under 14 years of age while in confirmation classes, (5) any child absent because of religious reasons, including to observe a religious holiday, for religious instruction, or because his or her religion forbids secular activity on a particular day(s) or time of day, and (6) any child 16 years of age or older who is employed and is enrolled in a graduation incentives program.

The parent/guardian of a student who is enrolled must authorize all absences from school and notify the school in advance or at the time of the student's absence. A valid cause for absence includes illness (including mental or behavioral health of the student), attendance at a verified medical or therapeutic appointment (including a victim services provider), [PRESSPlus1](#) observance of a religious holiday, death in the immediate family, attendance at a civic event, family emergency, other situations beyond the control of the student as determined by the Board, voting pursuant to policy 7:90, *Release During School Hours* ([10 ILCS 5/7-42](#) and [5/17-15](#)), other circumstances that cause reasonable concern to the parent/guardian for the student's mental, emotional, or physical health or safety, or other reason as approved by the Executive Director or designee. For students who are parents, expectant parents, or victims of domestic or sexual violence, valid cause for absence also includes the fulfillment of a parenting responsibility and addressing circumstances resulting from domestic or sexual violence. [PRESSPlus2](#) Students absent for a valid cause may make up missed homework and classwork assignments in a reasonable timeframe.

Absenteeism and Truancy Program

The Executive Director or designee shall manage an absenteeism and truancy program in accordance with the School Code and Board policy. The program shall include but not be limited to:

1. A protocol for excusing a student from attendance who is necessarily and lawfully employed. The Executive Director or designee is authorized to determine when the student's absence is justified.
2. A protocol for excusing a student in grades 6 through 12 from attendance to sound *Taps* at a military honors funeral held in Illinois for a deceased veteran.
3. A protocol for excusing a student from attendance on a particular day(s) or at a particular time of day when his/her parent/guardian is an active duty member of the uniformed services and has been called to duty for, is on leave from, or has immediately returned from deployment to a

- combat zone or combat-support postings.
4. A process to telephone, within two hours after the first class, the parents/guardians of students in grade 8 or below who are absent without prior parent/guardian notification.
 5. A process to identify and track students who are truants, chronic or habitual truants, or truant minors as defined in [105 ILCS 5/26-2a](#).
 6. A description of diagnostic procedures for identifying the cause(s) of a student's unexcused absenteeism, including interviews with the student, his or her parent(s)/guardian(s), and staff members or other people who may have information about the reasons for the student's attendance problem.
 7. The identification of supportive services that may be offered to truant, chronically truant, or chronically absent students, including parent-teacher conferences, student and/or family counseling, ~~er~~and information about available community agency services relevant to such students' needs. See Board policy 6:110, *Programs for Students At Risk of Academic Failure and/or Dropping Out of School and Graduation Incentives Program*.
 8. A process for the collection and review of chronic absence data and to:
 - a. Determine what systems of support and resources are needed to engage chronically absent students and their families, and
 - b. Encourage the habit of daily attendance and promote success.
 9. Reasonable efforts to provide ongoing professional development to ~~teachers, administrators~~all school personnel, Board members, and school resource officers, ~~and staff~~PRESSPlus3 on the appropriate and available supportive services for the promotion of student attendance and engagement.
 10. A process to request the assistance and resources of outside agencies, such as, the juvenile officer of the local police department or the truant office of the appropriate Regional Office of Education, if truancy continues after supportive services have been offered.
 11. A protocol for cooperating with non-SASED agencies including County or municipal authorities, the Regional Superintendent, truant officers, the Community Truancy Review Board, and a comprehensive community based youth service agency. Any disclosure of school student records must be consistent with Board policy 7:340, Student Records, as well as State and federal law concerning school student records.
 12. An acknowledgement that no punitive action, including out-of-school suspensions, expulsions, or court action, shall be taken against a truant minor for his or her truancy unless available supportive services and other school resources have been provided to the student.
 13. The criteria to determine whether a student's non-attendance is due to extraordinary circumstances shall include economic or medical necessity or family hardship and such other criteria that the Executive Director believes qualifies.
 14. A process for a 17-year-old resident to participate in SASED's various programs and resources for truants. The student must provide documentation of his/her dropout status for the previous six months. A request from an individual 19 years of age or older to re-enroll after having dropped out of school is handled according to provisions in 7:50, *School Admissions and Student Transfers To and From Non-SASED Schools*.
 15. A process for the temporary exclusion of a student 17 years of age or older for failing to meet minimum attendance standards according to provisions in State law. A parent/guardian has the right to appeal a decision to exclude a student.

Monitoring/Updating

Pursuant to State law and Board policy 2:240, Board Policy Development, the Board updates this policy at least once every two years. The Executive Director or designee shall assist the Board with its update.

7:180 Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment

Bullying, intimidation, and harassment diminish a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate. Preventing students from engaging in these disruptive behaviors and providing all students equal access to a safe, non-hostile learning environment are important SASED goals.

Bullying on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical appearance, socioeconomic status, academic status, pregnancy, parenting status, homelessness, age, marital status, physical or mental disability, military status, sexual orientation, gender-related identity or expression, unfavorable discharge from military service, order of protection status, association with a person or group with one or more of the aforementioned actual or perceived characteristics, or any other distinguishing characteristic is prohibited in each of the following situations:

1. During any school-sponsored education program or activity.
2. While in school, on school property, on school buses or other school vehicles, at designated school bus stops waiting for the school bus, or at school-sponsored or school-sanctioned events or activities.
3. Through the transmission of information from a school computer, a school computer network, or other similar electronic school equipment.
4. Through the transmission of information from a computer that is accessed at a non-school-related location, activity, function, or program or from the use of technology or an electronic device that is not owned, leased, or used by SASED or the school if the bullying causes a substantial disruption to the educational process or orderly operation of a school. This paragraph (item #4) applies only when a school administrator or teacher receives a report that bullying through this means has occurred; it does not require staff members to monitor any non-school-related activity, function, or program.

Definitions from [105 ILCS 5/27-23.7](#)

Bullying includes *cyberbullying* and means any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct, including communications made in writing or electronically, directed toward a student or students that has or can be reasonably predicted to have the effect of one or more of the following:

1. Placing the student or students in reasonable fear of harm to the student's or students' person or property;
2. Causing a substantially detrimental effect on the student's or students' physical or mental health;
3. Substantially interfering with the student's or students' academic performance; or
4. Substantially interfering with the student's or students' ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school.

Bullying may take various forms, including without limitation one or more of the following: harassment, threats, intimidation, stalking, physical violence, sexual harassment, sexual violence, theft, public humiliation, destruction of property, or retaliation for asserting or alleging an act of bullying. This list is meant to be illustrative and non-exhaustive.

Cyberbullying means bullying through the use of technology or any electronic communication, including without limitation any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data, or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or in part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic system, photo-electronic system, or photo-optical system, including without limitation electronic mail, Internet communications, instant messages, or facsimile communications. *Cyberbullying* includes the creation of a webpage or weblog in which the creator assumes the identity of another person or the knowing impersonation of another person as the author of posted content or messages if the creation or impersonation creates any of the effects enumerated in the definition of *bullying*.

Cyberbullying also includes the distribution by electronic means of a communication to more than one person or the posting of material on an electronic medium that may be accessed by one or more persons if the distribution or posting creates any of the effects enumerated in the definition of *bullying*.

Restorative measures means a continuum of school-based alternatives to exclusionary discipline, such as suspensions and expulsions, that: (i) are adapted to the particular needs of the school and community, (ii) contribute to maintaining school safety, (iii) protect the integrity of a positive and productive learning climate, (iv) teach students the personal and interpersonal skills they

will need to be successful in school and society, (v) serve to build and restore relationships among students, families, schools, and communities, (vi) reduce the likelihood of future disruption by balancing accountability with an understanding of students' behavioral health needs in order to keep students in school, and (vii) increase student accountability if the incident of bullying is based on religion, race, ethnicity, or any other category that is identified in the Ill. Human Rights Act.

School personnel means persons employed by, on contract with, or who volunteer in a school district, including without limitation school and school district administrators, teachers, school social workers, school counselors, school psychologists, school nurses, cafeteria workers, custodians, bus drivers, school resource officers, and security guards.

Bullying Prevention and Response Plan

The Executive Director or designee shall develop and maintain a bullying prevention and response plan that advances SASSED's goal of providing all students with a safe learning environment free of bullying and harassment. This plan must be consistent with the requirements listed below.

1. SASSED uses the definition of *bullying* as provided in this policy.
2. Bullying is contrary to State law and the policy of SASSED. However, nothing in SASSED's bullying prevention and response plan is intended to infringe upon any right to exercise free expression or the free exercise of religion or religiously based views protected under the [First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution](#) or under [Section 3 of Article I of the Illinois Constitution](#).
3. Students are encouraged to immediately report bullying. A report may be made orally or in writing to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, [Title IX Coordinator](#), [PRESSPlus1](#) Program Administrator/Coordinator, a Complaint Manager, or any staff member with whom the student is comfortable speaking. Anyone, including staff members and parents/guardians, who has information about actual or threatened bullying is encouraged to report it to SASSED'S named officials or any staff member. SASSED named officials and all staff members are available for help with a bully or to make a report about bullying. Anonymous reports are also accepted; however, this shall not be construed to permit formal disciplinary action solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

Consistent with federal and State laws and rules governing student privacy rights, the parents/guardians of all students involved in an alleged incident of bullying will be notified of such, along with threats, suggestions, or instances of self-harm determined to be the result of bullying, within 24 hours after the school's administration is made aware of the student's involvement in the incident. As appropriate, the school's administration shall also discuss the availability of social work services, counseling, school psychological services, other interventions, and restorative measures. The school shall make diligent efforts to notify a parent or legal guardian, utilizing all contact information the school has available or that can be

5. The Executive Director or designee shall promptly investigate and address reports of bullying, by, among other things:
 - a. Making all reasonable efforts to complete the investigation within 10 school days after the date the report of a bullying incident was received and taking into consideration additional relevant information received during the course of the investigation about the reported bullying incident.
 - b. Involving appropriate school support personnel and other staff persons with knowledge, experience, and training on bullying prevention, as deemed appropriate, in the investigation process.
 - c. Notifying the Building Principal or school administrator or designee of the reported incident of bullying as soon as possible after the report is received.
 - d. Consistent with federal and State laws and rules governing student privacy rights, providing parents/guardians of the students who are parties to the investigation information about the investigation and an opportunity to meet with the Building Principal or school administrator or his or her designee to discuss the investigation, the findings of the investigation, and the actions taken to address the reported incident of bullying.

The Executive Director or designee shall investigate whether a reported incident of bullying is within the permissible scope of SASSED's jurisdiction and shall require that SASSED provide the victim with information regarding services that are available within SASSED and community, such as counseling, support services, and other programs.

6. The Executive Director or designee shall use interventions to address bullying, that may include, but are not limited to, school social work services, restorative measures, social-emotional skill building, counseling, school psychological services, and community-based services.
7. A reprisal or retaliation against any person who reports an act of bullying is **prohibited**. Any person's act of reprisal or retaliation will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge with regard to employees, or suspension and/or expulsion with regard to students.
8. A student will not be punished for reporting bullying or supplying information, even if SASSED's investigation concludes that no bullying occurred. However, a person who is found to have falsely accused another of bullying, as a means of retaliation, as a means of bullying, or provided false information will be treated as either: (a) *bullying*, (b) student discipline

up to and including suspension and/or expulsion, and/or (c) both (a) and (b) for purposes of determining any consequences or other appropriate remedial actions.

9. SASSED's bullying prevention and response plan is based on the engagement of a range of school stakeholders, including students and parents/guardians.
10. The Executive Director or designee shall post this policy on SASSED's publicly accessible website, if any, and include it in the student handbook, and, where applicable, post it where other policies, rules, and standards of conduct are currently posted. The policy must be distributed annually to parents/guardians, students, and school personnel (including new employees when hired), and must also be provided periodically throughout the school year to students and faculty.
11. Pursuant to State law and policy 2:240, *Board Policy Development*, the Board monitors this policy every two years by conducting a review and re-evaluation of this policy to make any necessary and appropriate revisions. The Executive Director or designee shall assist the Board with its re-evaluation and assessment of this policy's outcomes and effectiveness. Updates to this policy will reflect any necessary and appropriate revisions. This process shall include, without limitation:
 - a. The frequency of victimization;
 - b. Student, staff, and family observations of safety at a school;
 - c. Identification of areas of a school where bullying occurs;
 - d. The types of bullying utilized; and
 - e. Bystander intervention or participation.

The evaluation process may use relevant data and information that SASSED already collects for other purposes. Acceptable documentation to satisfy the re-evaluated policy submission include one of the following:

- 1) An updated version of the policy with the amendment/modification date included in the reference portion of the policy;
- 2) If no revisions are deemed necessary, a copy of board minutes indicating that the policy was re-evaluated and no changes were deemed to be necessary; or
- 3) A signed statement from the Board Chairperson indicating that the Board re-evaluated the policy and no changes to it were necessary.

The Executive Director or designee must post the information developed as a result of the policy re-evaluation on SASSED's website, or if a website is not available, the information must be provided to school administrators, Board members, school personnel, parents/guardians, and students. Reviews and re-evaluations in years they are due must be submitted to ISBE by September 30.

12. The Executive Director or designee shall fully implement the Board policies, including without limitation, the following:
 - a. 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*. A student may use this policy to complain about bullying.
 - b. 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*. Any person may use this policy to complain about ~~sexual harassment-discrimination~~ [PRESSPlus2](#) in violation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.
 - c. 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*. Any person may use this policy to complain about discrimination or harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin in violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and/or the Illinois Human Rights Act. [PRESSPlus3](#)
 - d. 6:60, *Curriculum Content*. Bullying prevention and character instruction is provided in all grades in accordance with State law.
 - e. 6:65, *Student Social and Emotional Development*. Student social and emotional development is incorporated into SASSED's educational program as required by State law.
 - f. 6:235, *Access to Electronic Networks*. This policy states that the use of SASSED's electronic networks is limited to: (1) support of education and/or research, or (2) a legitimate business use.
 - g. 7:20, *Harassment of Students Prohibited*. This policy prohibits *any* person from harassing, intimidating, or bullying a student based on an identified actual or perceived characteristic (the list of characteristics in 7:20 is the same as the list in this policy).
 - h. 7:185, *Teen Dating Violence Prohibited*. This policy prohibits teen dating violence on school property, at school sponsored activities, and in vehicles used for school-provided transportation.
 - i. 7:190, *Student Behavior*. This policy prohibits, and provides consequences for, hazing, bullying, or other aggressive behaviors, or urging other students to engage in such conduct.
 - j. 7:310, *Restrictions on Publications; Elementary Schools*, and 7:315, *Restrictions on Publications; High Schools*. These policies prohibit

students from and provide consequences for: (1) accessing and/or distributing at school any written, printed, or electronic material, including material from the Internet, that will cause substantial disruption of the proper and orderly operation and discipline of the school or school activities, and (2) creating and/or distributing written, printed, or electronic material, including photographic material and blogs, that causes substantial disruption to school operations or interferes with the rights of other students or staff members.

STUDENTS

7:185 Teen Dating Violence Prohibited

Engaging in teen dating violence that takes place at school, on school property, at school-sponsored activities, or in vehicles used for school-provided transportation is prohibited. For purposes of this policy, the term *teen dating violence* occurs whenever a student who is 13 to 19 years of age uses or threatens to use physical, mental, or emotional abuse to control an individual in the dating relationship; or uses or threatens to use sexual violence in the dating relationship.

The Executive Director or designee shall develop and maintain a program to respond to incidents of teen dating violence that:

1. Fully implements and enforces each of the following Board policies:

- a. 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*. This policy provides a method for any student, parent/guardian, employee, or community member to file a complaint if he or she believes that the Board, its employees, or its agents have violated his or her rights under the State or federal Constitution, State or federal statute, Board policy, or various enumerated bases.
- b. 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*. This policy prohibits a SASED employee, agent, or student from engaging in ~~sexual~~ discrimination, ~~including sex-based harassment,~~ [PRESSPlus1](#) in violation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Prohibited conduct includes but is not limited to sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking.
- c. 7:20, *Harassment of Students Prohibited*. This policy prohibits any person, including a SASED employee, agent, or student, from harassing intimidating, or bullying a student based on the student's actual or perceived characteristics of sex; sexual orientation; gender identity; and gender-related identity or expression (this policy includes more protected statuses).
- d. 7:180, *Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment*. This policy prohibits students from engaging in bullying, intimidation, and harassment at school, school-related events and electronically. Prohibited conduct includes threats, stalking, physical violence, sexual harassment, sexual violence, theft, public humiliation, destruction of property, or retaliation for asserting or alleging an act of bullying.

2. Encourages anyone with information about incidents of teen dating violence to report them to any of the following individuals:

- a. Any school staff member. School staff shall respond to incidents of teen dating violence by following SASED's established procedures for the prevention, identification, investigation, and response to bullying and school violence.
- b. The Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Program Administrator/Coordinator, or a Complaint Manager identified in policy 7:20, *Harassment of Students Prohibited*.

3. Incorporates age-appropriate instruction in grades 7 through 12, in accordance with SASED's

comprehensive health education program in Board policy 6:60, *Curriculum Content*. This includes incorporating student social and emotional development into SASSED's educational program as required by State law and in alignment with Board policy 6:65, *Student Social and Emotional Development*.

4. Incorporates education for school staff, as recommended by the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Program Administrator/Coordinator, or a Complaint Manager.
5. Notifies students and parents/guardians of this policy.

STUDENTS

7:190 Student Behavior

The goals and objectives of this policy are to provide effective discipline practices that: (1) ensure the safety and dignity of students and staff; (2) maintain a positive, weapons-free, and drug-free learning environment; (3) keep school property and the property of others secure; (4) address the causes of a student's misbehavior and provide opportunities for all individuals involved in an incident to participate in its resolution; and (5) teach students positive behavioral skills to become independent, self-disciplined citizens in the school community and society.

When and Where Conduct Rules Apply

A student is subject to disciplinary action for engaging in prohibited student conduct, as described in the section with that name below, whenever the student's conduct is reasonably related to school or school activities, including, but not limited to:

1. On, or within sight of, school grounds before, during, or after school hours or at any time;
2. Off school grounds at a school-sponsored activity or event, or any activity or event that bears a reasonable relationship to school;
3. Traveling to or from school or a school activity, function, or event; or
4. Anywhere, if the conduct interferes with, disrupts, or adversely affects the school environment, school operations, or an educational function, including, but not limited to, conduct that may reasonably be considered to: (a) be a threat or an attempted intimidation of a staff member; or (b) endanger the health or safety of students, staff, or school property.

Prohibited Student Conduct

SASED/member district administrations are authorized to discipline students enrolled in SASED programs for gross disobedience or misconduct, including but not limited to:

1. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, or selling tobacco or nicotine materials, including without limitation, electronic cigarettes.
2. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, or selling alcoholic beverages. Students who are under the influence of an alcoholic beverage are not permitted to attend school or school functions and are treated as though they had alcohol in their possession.
3. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, or selling:
 - a. Any illegal drug, controlled substance, or cannabis (including marijuana, hashish and medical cannabis unless the student is authorized to be administered a medical cannabis infused product under Ashley's Law).
 - b. Any anabolic steroid unless being administered in accordance with a physician's or licensed practitioner's prescription.
 - c. Any performance-enhancing substance on the Illinois High School Association's most current banned substance list unless administered in accordance with a physician's or licensed practitioner's prescription.

- d. Any prescription drug when not prescribed for the student by a physician or licensed practitioner, or when used in a manner inconsistent with the prescription or prescribing physician's or licensed practitioner's instructions. The authorized medical use of cannabis is prohibited unless the student is authorized to be administered a medical cannabis infused product under Ashley's Law).
- e. Any inhalant, regardless of whether it contains an illegal drug or controlled substance:
 - (a) that a student believes is, or represents to be capable of, causing intoxication, hallucination, excitement, or dulling of the brain or nervous system; or (b) about which the student engaged in behavior that would lead a reasonable person to believe that the student intended the inhalant to cause intoxication, hallucination, excitement, or dulling of the brain or nervous system. The prohibition in this section does not apply to a student's use of asthma or other legally prescribed inhalant medications.
- f. Any substance inhaled, injected, smoked, consumed, or otherwise ingested or absorbed with the intention of causing a physiological or psychological change in the body, including without limitation, pure caffeine in tablet or powdered form.
- g. "Look-alike" or counterfeit drugs, including a substance not containing an illegal drug or controlled substance, but one: (a) that a student believes to be, or represents to be, an illegal drug or controlled substance; or (b) about which a student engaged in behavior that would lead a reasonable person to believe that the student expressly or impliedly represented to be an illegal drug or controlled substance.
- h. Drug paraphernalia, including devices that are or can be used to: (a) ingest, inhale, or inject cannabis or controlled substances into the body; and (b) grow, process, store, or conceal cannabis or controlled substances.

Students who are under the influence of any prohibited substance are not permitted to attend school or school functions and are treated as though they had the prohibited substance, as applicable, in their possession.

- 4. Using, possessing, controlling, or transferring a weapon as that term is defined in the **Weapons** section of this policy.
- 5. Using or possessing an electronic paging device.
- 6. Using a cellular telephone, video recording device, personal digital assistant (PDA), or other electronic device in any manner that disrupts the educational environment or violates the rights of others, including using the device to take photographs in locker rooms or bathrooms, cheat, or otherwise violate student conduct rules. ~~Prohibited conduct specifically includes, without limitation, creating, sending, sharing, viewing, receiving, or possessing an indecent visual depiction of oneself or another person through the use of a computer, electronic communication device, or cellular phone.~~ [PRESSPlus1](#) Unless otherwise banned under this policy or by the Program Administrator, all electronic devices must be kept powered -off or silenced and out-of-sight during the regular school day unless: (a) the supervising teacher grants permission; (b) use of the device is provided in a student's individualized education program (IEP) or Section 504 plan; (c) it is used during the student's lunch period, or (d) it is needed in an emergency that threatens the safety of students, staff, or other individuals.
- 7. Sexting, which, for purposes of this policy, is the act of creating, sending, sharing, viewing, receiving, or possessing sexually explicit messages, images, or videos electronically, regardless of whether they are authentic or computer-generated, through the use of a computer, electronic communication device, or cellular phone. Sexting also includes creating, sending, sharing, viewing, receiving, or possessing indecent visual depictions, non-consensual dissemination of private sexual images, and non-consensual dissemination of sexually

explicit digitized depictions, as defined in State law. [PRESSPlus2](#)

8. Using or possessing a laser pointer unless under a staff member's direct supervision and in the context of instruction.
9. Disobeying rules of student conduct or directives from staff members or school officials. Examples of disobeying staff directives include refusing a SASSED/member district staff member's request to stop, present school identification, or submit to a search.
10. Engaging in academic dishonesty, including cheating, intentionally plagiarizing, using a writing service and/or generative artificial intelligence technology in place of original work unless specifically authorized by staff, wrongfully giving or receiving help during an academic examination, and wrongfully obtaining test copies or scores.
11. Engaging in hazing or any kind of bullying or aggressive behavior that does physical or psychological harm to a staff person or another student or urging other students to engage in such conduct. Prohibited conduct specifically includes without limitation, any use of violence, intimidation, force, noise, coercion, threats, stalking, harassment, sexual harassment, public humiliation, theft or destruction of property, retaliation, hazing, bullying, bullying using a school computer or school computer network, or other comparable conduct.
12. Engaging in any sexual activity, including without limitation, offensive touching, sexual harassment, indecent exposure (including mooning), and sexual assault. This does not include the non-disruptive: (a) expression of gender or sexual orientation or preference, or (b) display of affection during non-instructional time.
13. Teen dating violence, as described in Board policy 7:185, Teen Dating Violence Prohibited, is prohibited.
14. Causing or attempting to cause damage to, or stealing or attempting to steal, school property or another person's personal property.
15. Entering school property or a school facility without proper authorization.
16. In the absence of a reasonable belief that an emergency exists, calling emergency responders (such as calling 911); signaling or setting off alarms or signals indicating the presence of an emergency; or indicating the presence of a bomb or explosive device on school grounds, school bus, or at any school activity.
17. Being absent without a recognized excuse; State law and Board policy regarding truancy control will be used with chronic and habitual truants.
18. Being involved with any public school fraternity, sorority, or secret society, by: (a) being a member; (b) promising to join; (c) pledging to become a member; or (d) soliciting any other person to join, promise to join, or be pledged to become a member.
19. Being involved in gangs or gang-related activities, including displaying gang symbols or paraphernalia.
20. Violating any criminal law, including but not limited to, assault, battery, arson, theft, gambling, eavesdropping, and hazing.
21. Making an explicit threat on an Internet website against a school employee, a student, or any school-related personnel if the Internet website through which the threat was made is a site that was accessible within the school at the time the threat was made or was available to third parties who worked or studied within the school grounds at the time the threat was made, and the threat could be reasonably interpreted as threatening to the safety and security of the threatened individual because of his or her duties or employment status or status as a student inside the school.
22. Operating an unmanned aircraft system (UAS) or drone for any purpose on school grounds or at any school event unless granted permission by the Executive Director or designee.
23. Engaging in any activity, on or off campus, that violates the disciplinary rules or policies of a

SASED member district, or interferes with, disrupts, or adversely affects the school environment, school operations, or an educational function, including but not limited to, conduct that may reasonably be considered to: (a) be a threat or an attempted intimidation of a staff member; (b) endanger the health or safety of students, staff, or school property; or bears a nexus with school or school-related activities.

For purposes of this policy, the term "possession" includes having control, custody, or care, currently or in the past, of an object or substance, including situations in which the item is: (a) on the student's person; (b) contained in another item belonging to, or under the control of, the student, such as in the student's clothing, backpack, or automobile; (c) in a school's student locker, desk, or other school property; or (d) at any location on school property or at a school-sponsored events.

Efforts, including the use of positive interventions and supports, and progressive discipline, shall be made to deter students, while at school or a school-related event, from engaging in aggressive behavior that may reasonably produce physical or psychological harm to someone else. The Executive Director, Program Administrator or designee shall ensure that the parent/guardian of a student who engages in aggressive behavior is notified of the incident. The failure to provide such notification does not limit the authority of SASED or a member district to impose discipline, including suspension or expulsion, for such behavior.

No disciplinary action shall be taken against any student that is based totally or in part on the refusal of the student's parent/guardian to administer or consent to the administration of psychotropic or psychostimulant medication to the student.

Disciplinary Measures

SASED administration shall limit the number and duration of expulsions and out-of-school suspensions to the greatest extent practicable, and, where practicable and reasonable, shall consider forms of non-exclusionary discipline before using out-of-school suspensions or expulsions. Administration shall not advise or encourage students to drop out voluntarily due to behavioral or academic difficulties. Potential disciplinary measures include, without limitation, any of the following:

1. Notifying parents/guardians.
2. Disciplinary conference.
3. Withholding of privileges.
4. Temporary removal from the classroom.
5. Return of property or restitution for lost or damaged property
6. In-school suspension for a period not to exceed 5 school days. Program Administrator or designee shall ensure that the student is properly supervised.
7. After-school study or Saturday study, provided the student's parent/guardian has been notified. If transportation arrangements cannot be agreed upon, an alternative disciplinary measure must be used. The student must be supervised by the detaining teacher or the Program Administrator or designee.
8. Community service with local public and nonprofit agencies that enhances community efforts to meet human, educational, environmental, or public safety needs. SASED/member district will not provide transportation. Administration shall use this option only as an alternative to another disciplinary measure giving the student and/or parent/guardian the choice.
9. Seizure of contraband: confiscation and temporary retention of personal property that was used to violate this policy or school disciplinary rules.
10. Suspension from the bus, in accordance with Board policy 7:220, Bus Conduct and 7:230 Misconduct by Students with Disabilities.

11. Out of school suspension from school and all school activities in accordance with Board policy 7:200, Suspension Procedures. A student who has been suspended may also be restricted from being on school grounds and at school activities.
12. Expulsion from school and all school activities for a definite time period not to exceed two calendar years, provided that the appropriate procedures regarding the discipline of students with disabilities are followed. A student who has been expelled may also be restricted from being on school grounds and at school activities.
13. Transfer to an alternative program if the student is expelled or otherwise qualifies for the transfer under State law. The transfer shall be in the manner provided in [Article 13A](#) or [13B of the School Code](#).
14. Notifying juvenile authorities or other law enforcement whenever the conduct involves criminal activity, including but not limited to, illegal drugs (controlled substances), "look-alikes," alcohol, or weapons or in other circumstances as authorized by the reciprocal reporting agreement between SASSED and local law enforcement agencies.

The above list of disciplinary measures is a range of options that will not always be applicable in every case. In some circumstances, it may not be possible to avoid suspending or expelling a student because behavioral interventions, other than a suspension and expulsion, will not be appropriate and available, and the only reasonable and practical way to resolve the threat and/or address the disruption is a suspension or expulsion.

Corporal punishment is prohibited in all circumstances. *Corporal punishment* is defined as a discipline method in which a person deliberately inflicts pain upon a student in response to the student's unacceptable behavior or inappropriate language, with an aim to halt an offense, prevent its recurrence, or set an example for others. [PRESSPlus3](#) It includes slapping, paddling, or prolonged maintenance of students in physically painful positions, or intentional infliction of bodily harm. Corporal punishment does not include reasonable force as permitted by 105 ILCS 5/10-20.33 needed to maintain safety for students, staff, or other persons, or for the purpose of self-defense or defense of property.

Isolated Time Out, Time Out, and Physical Restraint

Isolated time out, time out, and physical restraint may only be used when a student's behavior presents an imminent danger of serious physical harm to the student or others, less restrictive and intrusive measures have been tried and proven ineffective in stopping the imminent danger of serious physical harm, there is no known medical contraindication to its use on the student, and the school staff member or members applying the intervention have been trained in its safe application, in accordance with [105 ILCS 5/10-20.33](#), State Board of Education rules ([23 Ill. Admin. Code Section 1.285](#)), and SASSED procedures.

Weapons

A student who is determined to have brought one of the following objects to school, any school-sponsored activity or event, or any activity or event that bears a reasonable relationship to school may be expelled, subject to the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*, as amended, the *Illinois School Code*, and *Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973*, and their respective rules and regulations, for a period of at least one calendar year but not more than two calendar years:

1. A *firearm*, meaning any gun, rifle, shotgun, or weapon as defined by Section 921 of Title 18 of the United States Code ([18 U.S.C. § 921](#)), firearm as defined in Section 1.1 of the Firearm Owners Identification Card Act ([430 ILCS 65/](#)), or firearm as defined in Section 24-1 of the Criminal Code of 2012 ([720 ILCS 5/24-1](#)).

2. A knife, brass knuckles, or other knuckle weapon regardless of its composition, a billy club, or any other object if used or attempted to be used to cause bodily harm, including "look alikes" of any firearm as defined above.

The expulsion requirement under either paragraph 1 or 2 above may be modified by the Superintendent of the student's district of residence, and the Superintendent's determination may be modified by the Board of the student's district of residence on a case-by-case basis. The Superintendent of the student's district of residence or designee may grant an exception to this policy, upon the prior request of an adult supervisor, for students in theatre, cooking, ROTC, martial arts, and similar programs, whether or not school-sponsored, provided the item is not equipped, nor intended, to do bodily harm.

This policy's prohibitions concerning weapons apply regardless of whether: (1) a student is licensed to carry a concealed firearm, or (2) the SASSED Board of Directors or the Board of the district hosting a SASSED program, permits visitors, who are licensed to carry a concealed firearm, to store a firearm in a locked vehicle in a school parking area.

Re-Engagement of Returning Students

The Executive Director or designee shall maintain a process to facilitate the re-engagement of students who are returning from an out-of-school suspension, expulsion, or an alternative setting. The goal of re-engagement shall be to support the student's ability to be successful in school following a period of exclusionary discipline and shall include the opportunity for students who have been suspended to complete or make up work for equivalent academic credit.

Required Notices

A SASSED staff member shall immediately notify the office of the Program Administrator in the event that he or she: (1) observes any person in possession of a firearm on or around school grounds; however, such action may be delayed if immediate notice would endanger students under his or her supervision, (2) observes or has reason to suspect that any person on school grounds is or was involved in a drug-related incident, or (3) observes a battery committed against any staff member or is subject to a battery. *School grounds* includes modes of transportation to school activities and any public way within 1000 feet of the school, as well as school property itself.

Upon receiving a report of (1), above, the Building Principal or designee shall immediately notify local law enforcement. In addition, upon receiving a report on any of the above (1)-(3), the Building Principal or designee shall notify the Executive Director or designee and any involved student's parent/guardian.

Upon receiving a report on any of the above (1)-(3), the Executive Director or designee shall immediately notify local law enforcement. The Executive Director or designee shall also report these incidents involving battery against staff members to the Ill. State Board of Education (SBE) through its web-based School Incident Reporting System as they occur during the year and no later than August 4, July 31 PRESSPlus4 for the preceding school year.

Delegation of Authority

Each teacher, and any other school personnel when students are under his or her charge, is authorized to impose any disciplinary measure, other than suspension, expulsion, corporal punishment or in-school suspension, that is appropriate and in accordance with the policies and rules on student discipline of SASSED and the member district in which the student resides. All disciplinary actions so imposed shall be consistent with and subject to applicable federal and State laws and regulations related to the discipline of students with disabilities, and consistent with such students' IEPs.

Teachers, other ~~certificated~~ licensed educational employees, and any other persons (whether or not a licensed employee) providing a related service for or with respect to a student, may only use reasonable force as permitted by 105 ILCS 5/10-20.33 ^{PRESSPlus5} ~~needed to maintain safety for other students, school personnel, or other persons, or for the purpose of self-defense or defense of property.~~ Teachers may temporarily remove students from a classroom for disruptive behavior.

The Executive Director or Program Administrator or the appropriate administrator from the student's district of residence are authorized to impose the same disciplinary measures as teachers and may suspend students guilty of gross disobedience or misconduct from school (including all school functions) and from riding the school bus, up to 10 consecutive school days, provided the appropriate procedures are followed. SASSED in collaboration with the district of residence may suspend a student from riding the bus in excess of 10 school days for safety reasons.

Program Guides and Student Handbook

The Executive Director or designee, may request input from the Parent Advisory Council, shall prepare disciplinary rules implementing SASSED's disciplinary policies. These disciplinary rules shall be presented annually to the Board for its review and approval.

A program guide and/or student handbook, including SASSED's disciplinary policies and rules, shall be distributed to the students' parents/guardians within 15 days of the beginning of the school year or upon a student's enrollment.

7:200 Suspension Procedures

With respect to disciplinary action concerning children with disabilities, the Executive Director shall develop procedures that conform to the requirements of [34 CFR 300.530 through 300.536](#), as well as Section 10-22.6 of the *Illinois School Code* [[105 ILCS 5/10-22.6](#)], as amended. In addition, upon the occurrence of any act that may subject the student either to expulsion from school or suspension resulting in more than ten (10) cumulative days of suspension during any one school year, a meeting of the IEP Team shall be convened to review the student's behavioral intervention plan or, if a behavioral intervention plan has not yet been developed, to develop one. 7:210 Expulsion Procedures

The final authority for expulsion of a student programmed educationally within SASED lies with the Board of Education of the student's district of residence. The policy provided within the district of residence for expulsion of students will be followed, including the due process procedures and compliance with the provisions of IDEA. No student with a disability shall be expelled if the student's particular act of gross disobedience or misconduct is a manifestation of his or her disability. A student with a disability whose gross disobedience or misconduct is not a manifestation of his/her disability may be expelled pursuant to the expulsion procedures, in accordance with the district of residence, provided that the student shall continue to receive educational services as provided in his or her Individual Education Plan (IEP) during the period of expulsion. 7:250 Student Support Services

The following student support services may be provided by SASED as authorized by the resident school district:

1. Health services supervised by a qualified school nurse. The Executive Director or designee may implement procedures to further a healthy school environment and prevent or reduce the spread of disease.
2. Educational and psychological testing services and the services of a school psychologist as needed. In all cases, written permission to administer a psychological examination must be obtained from a student's parent(s)/guardian(s). The results will be given to the parent(s)/guardian(s), with interpretation, as well as to the appropriate professional staff.
3. The services of a school social worker. A student's parent/guardian must consent to regular or continuing services from a social worker.
4. ~~Guidance and s~~School counseling services. The Executive Director or designee shall annually inform all school personnel and students 12 years of age and older, in writing, of the availability of counseling without parent/guardian consent under 405 ILCS 5/3-550. [PRESSPlus1](#)

The Executive Director or designee shall develop protocols for responding to students with social, emotional, or mental health needs that impact learning ability. SASED, however, assumes no liability for preventing, identifying, or treating such needs.

Erin's Law Counseling Options, Assistance, and Intervention

The Executive Director or designee will ensure that each school building's Student Support Committee identifies counseling options for students who are affected by sexual abuse and grooming behaviors, along with SASED and community-based options for victims of sexual abuse and grooming behaviors to obtain assistance and intervention. Community-based options must include a Children's Advocacy Center and sexual assault crisis center(s) that serve SASED, if any.

Article 26A Domestic or Sexual Violence and Parenting Resource Personnel [PRESSPlus2](#)

The Executive Director or designee will ensure that at least one staff member in each school building is designated as a resource person (Article 26A Resource Person) for students who are parents, expectant parents, or victims of domestic or sexual violence and offers those services required by 105 ILCS 5/26A. See Board policy 7:255, *Students Who are Parents, Expectant Parents, or Victims of Domestic or Sexual Violence*. The Article 26A Resource Person may be a member of the building's Student Support Committee.

The Executive Director shall ensure that ~~T~~this policy shall be implemented in a manner consistent with State and federal laws, including the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 42 U.S.C. §12101 et seq., and that it is respectful of student privacy, including that student records are maintained and their confidentiality protected in accordance with Board policy and SASED procedures. 7:270 Administering Medicines to Students

Students should not take medication during school hours or during school-related activities unless it is necessary for a student's health and well-being. When a student's licensed health care provider and parent/guardian believe that it is necessary for the student to take a medication during school hours or school-related activities, the parent/guardian must request that the school/program dispense the medication to the child and otherwise follow SASED's procedures on dispensing medication.

Students may receive prescription and non-prescription medication at school only when the student's parent/guardian has submitted the completed "Authorization for Administration of Medication Form". No student shall possess or consume any prescription or non-prescription medication on school grounds or at a school-related function other than as provided for in this policy and its implementing procedures.

Nothing in this policy shall prohibit any school employee from providing emergency assistance to students, including administering prescribed medication, except for Diastat, which is to be administered by an RN or LPN.

The Program Administrator shall include this policy in the student handbook and shall provide a copy to the parents/guardians of students.

Self-Administration of Medication

A student may possess an epinephrine auto-injector (EpiPen®) and/or medication prescribed for asthma for immediate use at the student's discretion, provided the student's parent/guardian has completed and signed a "School Medication Authorization Form (SMA)."

The Executive Director will ensure an emergency action plan is developed for each self-administering student.

A student may self-administer medication required under a qualifying plan provided the student's parent/guardian has completed a signed SMA form. A qualifying plan means: Asthma Action Plan, Individual Health Care Action Plan, allergy emergency action plan, or plan pursuant to Section 504 of Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or a plan pursuant to the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. A student may also possess the supplies and equipment necessary to monitor and treat diabetes in accordance with the student's diabetes care plan and/or the supplies, equipment, and medication necessary to treat epilepsy in accordance with the student's seizure action plan. [PRESSPlus1](#)

SASED shall incur no liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any injury arising from a student's self-administration of medication including epinephrine injectors, asthma medication or medicines under a qualifying plan, or the storage of any medication by school personnel. A student's parent/guardian must indemnify and hold harmless SASED and its employees and agents, against any claims, except a claim based on willful and wanton conduct, arising out of a student's self-administration of an epinephrine injector, asthma medication or medicines under a qualifying plan, or

the storage of any medication by school personnel.

SASED Supply of Undesignated Epinephrine Auto-Injectors

The Executive Director or designee shall implement [Section 22-30\(f\)](#) of the School Code and maintain a supply of undesignated epinephrine auto-injectors for use in the Alternative School program at Southeast School in the name of SASED and provide or administer them as necessary according to State law. Undesignated epinephrine auto-injector means an epinephrine auto-injector prescribed in the name of SASED or one of its schools. The school/program nurse or trained personnel, as defined in State law, may administer an undesignated epinephrine auto-injector to a person when they, in good faith, believe a person is having an anaphylactic reaction. Each Program Administrator and/or his corresponding school nurse shall maintain a list of the names of trained personnel who have received a Statement of Certificate pursuant to State Law.

SASED Supply of Undesignated Opioid Antagonists

The Executive Director or designee shall implement [105 ILCS 5/22-30\(f\)](#) and maintain a supply of undesignated opioid antagonists and provide or administer them as necessary according to State law. Opioid antagonist means a drug that binds to opioid receptors and blocks or inhibits the effect of opioids acting on those receptors, including, but not limited to, naloxone hydrochloride or any other similarly acting drug approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Undesignated opioid antagonist is not defined by the School Code; for purposes of this policy, it means an opioid antagonist prescribed in the name of SASED or one of its schools or obtained by the District without a prescription. School/program nurse or trained personnel, as defined in State law, may administer an undesignated opioid antagonist to a person when they, in good faith, believe a person is having an opioid overdose. Each building administrator and/or his or her corresponding school nurse shall maintain the names of trained personnel who have received a statement of certification pursuant to State law. See the website for the Ill. Dept. of Human Services for information about opioid prevention, abuse, public awareness, and a toll-free number to provide information and referral services for persons with questions concerning substance abuse treatment.

SASED Supply of Undesignated Glucagon

The Executive Director or designee shall implement [105 ILCS 145/27](#) and maintain a supply of undesignated glucagon in the name of SASED in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

When a student's prescribed glucagon is not available or has expired, a school/program nurse or delegated care aide may administer undesignated glucagon only if he or she is authorized to do so by a student's diabetes care plan.

Administration of Medical Cannabis

The Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act allows a medical cannabis infused product to be administered to a student by one or more of the following individuals:

1. A parent/guardian of a student who is a minor who registers with the Ill. Dept. of Public Health (IDPH) as a designated caregiver to administer medical cannabis to their child. A designated caregiver may also be another individual other than the student's parent/guardian. Any designated caregiver must be at least 21 years old and is allowed to administer a medical cannabis infused product to a child who is a student on the premises of his or her school or on his or her school bus if:
 - a. Both the student and the designated caregiver possess valid registry identification cards issued by IDPH;
 - b. Copies of the registry identification cards are provided to the SASED;

- c. That student's parent/guardian completed, signed, and submitted a School Medication Authorization Form - Medical Cannabis; and
 - d. After administering the product to the student, the designated caregiver immediately removes it from school premises or the school bus.
2. A properly trained school nurse or administrator, who shall be allowed to administer the medical cannabis infused product to the student on the premises of the child's school, at a SASSED-sponsored activity, or before/after normal school activities, including while the student is in before-school or after-school care on school-operated property or while being transported on a school bus.
 3. The student him or herself when the self-administration takes place under the direct supervision of a school nurse or administrator.

Medical cannabis infused product (product) includes oils, ointments, foods, and other products that contain usable cannabis but are not smoked or vaped. Smoking and/or vaping medical cannabis is prohibited.

The product may not be administered in a manner that, in the opinion of SASSED, would create a disruption to the educational environment or cause exposure of the product to other students. A school employee shall not be required to administer the product.

Discipline of a student for being administered a product by a designated caregiver, or by a school nurse or administrator, or who self-administers a product under the direct supervision of a school nurse or administrator pursuant to this policy is prohibited. SASSED may not deny a student attendance at a school solely because he or she requires administration of the product during school hours.

Void Policy

SASSED's Supply of Undesignated Asthma Medication section of the policy is void whenever the Executive Director or designee is, for whatever reason, unable to: (1) obtain for SASSED a prescription for undesignated asthma medication from a physician or advanced practice nurse licensed to practice medicine in all its branches, or (2) fill SASSED's prescription for undesignated school asthma medication.

SASSED's Supply of Undesignated Epinephrine Injectors section of the policy is void whenever the Executive Director or designee is, for whatever reason, unable to: (1) obtain for SASSED a prescription for undesignated epinephrine injectors from a physician or advanced practice nurse licensed to practice medicine in all its branches, or (2) fill SASSED's prescription for undesignated school epinephrine injectors.

SASSED's Supply of Undesignated Opioid Antagonists section of the policy is void whenever the Executive Director or designee is unable to obtain a supply of opioid antagonists due to a shortage, in which case the Cooperative shall make reasonable efforts to maintain a supply.

SASEED's Supply of Undesignated Glucagon section of the policy is void whenever the Executive Director or designee is, for whatever reason, unable to: (1) obtain for SASSED a prescription for glucagon from a qualifying prescriber, or (2) fill SASSED's prescription for undesignated school glucagon.

The **Administration of Medical Cannabis** section of the policy is void and SASSED reserves the right not to implement it if SASSED is in danger of losing federal funding.

Administration of Undesignated Medication

Upon any administration of an undesignated medication permitted by State law, the Executive Director or designee(s) must ensure all notifications required by State law and administrative procedures occur.

Undesignated Medication Disclaimers

Upon implementation of this policy, the protections from liability and hold harmless provisions applicable under State law apply.

No one, including without limitation, parents/guardians of students, should rely on SASSED for the availability of undesignated medication. This policy does not guarantee the availability of undesignated medications. Students and their parents/guardians should consult their own physician regarding these medication(s).

7:310 Restrictions on Publications; Elementary Schools

School-Sponsored Publications and Web Sites

School-sponsored publications, productions, and web sites are part of the curriculum and are not a public forum for general student use. School authorities may edit or delete material that is inconsistent with SASED's educational mission.

All school-sponsored communications shall comply with the ethics and rules of responsible journalism. Text that is libelous, obscene, vulgar, lewd, invades the privacy of others, conflicts with the basic educational mission of the school, is socially inappropriate, is inappropriate due to the maturity of the students, or is materially disruptive to the educational process will not be tolerated.

The author's name will accompany personal opinions and editorial statements. An opportunity for the expression of differing opinions from those published/produced will be provided within the same media.

Non-School Sponsored Publications Accessed or Distributed On-Campus

For purposes of this section and the following section, a *publication* includes, without limitation: (1) written or electronic print material, (2) audio-visual material on any medium including electromagnetic media (e.g., images, digital files flash memory, etc.), or combinations of these whether off-line (e.g., a printed book, digital files, etc.) or online (e.g., any website, social networking site, database for information retrieval, etc.), or (3) information or material on electronic devices (e.g., text or voice messages delivered by cell phones, tablets, and other hand-held devices).

Creating, distributing, and/or accessing non-school sponsored publications shall occur at a time and place and in a manner that will not cause disruption, be coercive, or result in the perception that the distribution or the publication is endorsed by SASED.

Students are prohibited from creating, distributing, and/or accessing at school any publication that:

1. Will cause substantial disruption of the proper and orderly operation and discipline of the school or school activities;
2. Violates the rights of others, including but not limited to material that is libelous, invades the privacy of others, or infringes on a copyright;
3. Is socially inappropriate or inappropriate due to maturity level of the students, including but not limited to material that is obscene, pornographic, or pervasively lewd and vulgar, contains indecent and vulgar language, or *sexting* as defined by Governing Board policy 7:190. Student Behavior, PRESSPlus1 and/or Student Handbooks;
4. Is reasonably viewed as promoting illegal drug use; or
5. Is distributed in kindergarten through eighth grade and is primarily prepared by non-students, unless it is being used for school purposes. Nothing herein shall be interpreted to prevent the inclusion of material from outside sources or the citation to such sources as long as the material

to be distributed or accessed is primarily prepared by students.

Accessing or distributing *on-campus* includes accessing or distributing on school property or at school-related activities. A student engages in gross disobedience and misconduct and may be disciplined for: (1) accessing or distributing forbidden material, or (2) for writing, creating, or publishing such material intending for it to be accessed or distributed at school.

Non-School Sponsored Publications Accessed or Distributed Off-Campus

A student engages in gross disobedience and misconduct and may be disciplined for creating and/or distributing a publication that: (1) causes a substantial disruption or a foreseeable risk of a substantial disruption to school operations, or (2) interferes with the rights of other students or staff members.

Bullying and Cyberbullying

The Executive Director or designee shall treat behavior that is *bullying* and/or *cyberbullying* according to Board policy 7:180, *Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment*, in addition to any response required by this policy.

7:315 Restrictions on Publications; High Schools

Definitions

Libel means the willful or negligent publication of provably false and unprivileged statements of fact that do demonstrable harm to a living person's reputation.

Obscene means lewd; impure; indecent; calculated to shock the moral sense of humans by a disregard of chastity or modesty. Objectionable or offensive to accepted standards of decency.

School official means a Program Administrator or designee.

School-sponsored media means any material that is prepared, substantially written, published, or broadcast by a student journalist, distributed or generally made available to members of the student body, and prepared under the direction of a student media advisor. It does not include media intended for distribution or transmission solely in the classroom in which the media is produced.

Slander means the speaking of false statements of fact that seriously harm a living person's reputation.

Student journalist means a public high school student who gathers, compiles, writes, edits, photographs, records, or prepares information for dissemination in school-sponsored media.

Student media adviser means an individual employed, appointed, or designated by SASED to supervise or provide instruction relating to school-sponsored media.

School-Sponsored Media

School-sponsored publications, productions, and websites are governed by the Speech Rights of Student Journalists Act and Board policies, and student journalists are responsible for determining the news, opinion, feature, and advertising content of those publications, productions, and websites.

Student journalists must:

1. Make decisions based upon news value and guided by the Code of Ethics provided by the Society of Professional Journalists, National Scholastic Press Association, Journalism Education Association, or other relevant group;
2. Produce media based upon professional standards of accuracy, objectivity, and fairness;
3. Review material to improve sentence structure, grammar, spelling, and punctuation;
4. Check and verify all facts and verify the accuracy of all quotations;
5. In the use of personal opinions, editorial statements, and/or letters to the editor, provide opportunity and space for the expression of differing opinions within the same media to align with SASED's media literacy curriculum mandate in [105 LCS 5/27-20.08](#); and
6. Include an author's name with any personal opinions and editorial statements, if appropriate.

Student journalists may not create, produce, or distribute school-sponsored media that:

1. Is libelous, slanderous, or obscene;
2. Constitutes an unwarranted invasion of privacy;
3. Violates federal or State law, including the Constitutional rights of third parties; or
4. Incites students to:
 - a. Commit an unlawful act;
 - b. Violate any of SASSED's policies; or
 - c. Materially and substantially disrupt the orderly operation of the school.

SASSED will not engage in prior restraint of material prepared by student journalists for school-sponsored media, unless the material fits into one of the four prohibited categories listed above, in which case the Executive Director or designee and/or student media adviser may review, edit, and delete such media material before publication or distribution of the media.

No expression made by students in the exercise of freedom of speech or freedom of the press under this policy shall be deemed to be an expression of SASSED or an expression of Board policy.

Non-School Sponsored Publications Accessed or Distributed On Campus

For purposes of this section and the following section, a *publication* includes, without limitation: (1) written or electronic print material, (2) audio-visual material on any medium including electromagnetic media (e.g., images, digital files, flash memory, etc.), or combinations of these whether off-line (e.g., a printed book, digital files, etc.) or online (e.g., any website, social networking site, database for information retrieval, etc.), or (3) information or material on electronic devices (e.g., text or voice messages delivered by cell phones, tablets, and other hand-held devices).

Creating, distributing, and/or accessing non-school sponsored publications shall occur at a time and place and in a manner that will not cause disruption, be coercive, or result in the perception that the distribution or the publication is endorsed by SASSED.

Students are prohibited from creating, distributing, and/or accessing at school any publication that:

1. Will cause a material and substantial disruption of the proper and orderly operation and discipline of the school or school activities;
2. Violates the rights of others, including but not limited to material that is libelous, slanderous or obscene, invades the privacy of others, or infringes on a copyright;
3. Is socially inappropriate or inappropriate due to maturity level of the students, including but not limited to material that is obscene, pornographic, or pervasively lewd and vulgar, contains indecent and vulgar language, or *sexting* as defined by Governing Board policy 7:190, Student Behavior, PRESSPlus1 and/or Student Handbooks;
4. Is reasonably viewed as promoting illegal drug use;
5. Is distributed in kindergarten through eighth grade and is primarily prepared by non-students, unless it is being used for school purposes. However, material from outside sources or the citation to such sources may be allowed, as long as the material to be distributed or accessed is primarily prepared by students; or
6. Encourages or incites students to violate any Board policies.

Accessing or distributing *on-campus* includes accessing or distributing on school property or at school-related activities. A student engages in gross disobedience and misconduct and may be

disciplined for: (1) accessing or distributing forbidden material, or (2) for writing, creating, or publishing such material intending for it to be accessed or distributed at school.

Non-School Sponsored Publications Accessed or Distributed Off-Campus

A student engages in gross disobedience and misconduct and may be disciplined for creating and/or distributing a publication that: (1) causes a substantial disruption or a foreseeable risk of a substantial disruption to school operations, or (2) interferes with the rights of other students or staff members.

Bullying and Cyberbullying

The Executive Director or designee shall treat behavior that is *bullying* and/or *cyberbullying* according to Board policy 7:180, *Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment*, in addition to any response required by this policy.

STUDENTS

7:340 Student Records

School student records are confidential. Information from them shall not be released other than as provided by law. A school student record is any writing or other recorded information concerning a student and by which a student may be identified individually that is maintained by a school or at its direction by a school employee, regardless of how or where the information is stored, except as provided in State or federal law as summarized below:

1. Records kept in a staff member's sole possession.
2. Records maintained by law enforcement officers working in the school.
3. Video and other electronic recordings (including without limitation, electronic recordings made on school buses) that are created in part for law enforcement, security, or safety reasons or purposes. The content of these recordings may become part of a school student record to the extent school officials create, use, and maintain this content, or it becomes available to them by law enforcement officials, for disciplinary or special education purposes regarding a particular student.
4. Any information, either written or oral, received from law enforcement officials concerning a student less than the age of 18 years who has been arrested or taken into custody.

State and federal law grants students, parents/guardians, and when applicable, the Ill. Dept. of Children and Family Services' Office of Education and Transition Services, certain rights, including the right to inspect, copy, and/or challenge school student records. The information contained in school student records shall be kept current, accurate, clear, and relevant. All information maintained concerning a student receiving special education services shall be directly related to the provision of services to that child. SASED may release directory information as permitted by law, but a parent/guardian shall have the right to opt-out of the release of directory information regarding his or her child. SASED will comply with State or federal law with regard to release of a student's school records, including, where applicable, without notice to, or the consent of, the student's parent/guardian or eligible student. Upon request, SASED discloses school student records without parent consent to the official records custodian of another school in which a student has enrolled or intends to enroll, as well as to any other person as specifically required or permitted by State or federal law.

The Executive Director shall fully implement this policy and designate an *official records custodian* for each school who shall maintain and protect the confidentiality of school student records, inform staff members of this policy, and inform students and their parents/guardians of their rights regarding school student records.

Student Biometric Information Collection

The Executive Director or designee may recommend a student biometric information collection system solely for the purposes of identification and fraud prevention. Such recommendation shall be consistent with budget requirements and in compliance with State law. Biometric information means any information that is collected through an identification process for individuals based on their unique behavioral or physiological characteristics, including fingerprint, hand geometry, voice, or facial

recognition or iris or retinal scans.

Before collecting student biometric information, SASSED shall obtain written permission from the person having legal custody/parental responsibility or the student (if over the age of 18). Upon a student's 18th birthday, SASSED shall obtain written permission from the student to collect student biometric information. Failure to provide written consent to collect biometric information shall not be the basis for refusal of any services otherwise available to a student.

All collected biometric information shall be stored and transmitted in a manner that protects it from disclosure. Sale, lease, or other disclosure of biometric information to another person or entity is strictly prohibited.

SASSED will discontinue use of a student's biometric information and destroy all collected biometric information within 30 days after: (1) the student graduates or withdraws from SASSED, or (2) SASSED receives a written request to discontinue use of biometric information from the person having legal custody/parental responsibility of the student or the student (if over the age of 18). Requests to discontinue using a student's biometric information shall be forwarded to the Executive Director or designee.

The Executive Director or designee shall develop procedures to implement this policy consistent with State and federal law.

2:270 Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited

New/Unpublished Section

Discrimination and harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin [PRESSPlus1](#) negatively affect a student's ability to learn and an employee's ability to work. Providing an educational and workplace environment free from such discrimination and harassment is an important District goal. The District does not discriminate on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, or national origin in any of its education programs or activities, and it complies with federal and State non-discrimination laws.

Examples of Prohibited Conduct [PRESSPlus2](#)

Examples of conduct that may constitute discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin include: disciplining students more harshly and frequently because of their race, color, or national origin; denying students access to high-rigor academic courses, extracurricular activities, or other educational opportunities based on their race, color, or national origin; denying language services or other educational opportunities to English learners; and assigning students special education services based on a student's race, color, or national origin.

Harassment is a form of prohibited discrimination. Examples of conduct that may constitute harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin include: the use of racial, ethnic or ancestral slurs or stereotypes; taunts; name-calling; offensive or derogatory remarks about a person's actual or perceived race, color, or national origin; the display of racially-offensive symbols; racially-motivated physical threats and attacks; or other hateful conduct.

Making a Report or Complaint: Investigation Process [PRESSPlus3](#)

Individuals are encouraged to promptly report claims or incidences of discrimination or harassment based on race, color, or national origin to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, a Complaint Manager, or any employee with whom the student is comfortable speaking. Reports under this policy will be processed under Board policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Any District employee who receives a report or complaint of discrimination or harassment must promptly forward the report or complaint to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator or a Complaint Manager. Any employee who fails to promptly comply may be disciplined, up to and including discharge.

Reports and complaints of discrimination or harassment will be confidential to the greatest extent practicable, subject to the District's duty to investigate and maintain an educational environment that is productive, respectful, and free of unlawful discrimination, including harassment.

This policy does not impair or otherwise diminish the existing rights of unionized employees to request an exclusive bargaining representative to be present during any investigatory interviews, nor does this policy diminish any rights available under an applicable collective bargaining agreement, including, but not limited to, a grievance procedure.

Federal and State Agencies

If the District fails to take necessary corrective action to stop harassment based on race, color, or national origin, further relief may be available through the Ill. Dept. of Human Rights (IDHR) or the U.S. Dept. of Education's Office for Civil Rights. [PRESSPlus4](#) To contact IDHR, go to: <https://dhr.illinois.gov/about-us/contact-idhr.html> or call (312) 814-6200 (Chicago) or (217) 785-5100 (Springfield).

Prevention and Response Program

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a prevention and response program to respond to complaints of discrimination based on race, color, and national origin, including harassment, and retaliation. The program shall include procedures for responding to complaints which: [PRESSPlus5](#)

1. Reduce or remove, to the extent practicable, barriers to reporting discrimination, harassment, and retaliation;
2. Permit any person who reports or is the victim of an incident of alleged discrimination, harassment, or retaliation to be accompanied when making a report by a support individual of the person's choice who complies with the District's policies and rules;
3. Permit anonymous reporting, except that an anonymous report may not be the sole basis of any disciplinary action;
4. Offer remedial interventions or take such disciplinary action as may be appropriate on a case-by-case basis;
5. Offer, but do not require or unduly influence, a person who reports or is the victim of an incident of harassment or retaliation the option to resolve allegations directly with the accused; and
6. Protects a person who reports or is the victim of an incident of harassment or retaliation from suffering adverse consequences as a result of a report of, investigation of, or a response to the incident.

Policy Posting and Distribution

This policy shall be posted on the District's website. [PRESSPlus6](#) The Superintendent shall annually inform staff members of this policy by posting it in a prominent and accessible location such as the District website, employee handbook, staff intranet site, [PRESSPlus7](#) and/or in other areas where policies and rules of conduct are made available to staff. The Superintendent shall annually inform students and their parents/guardians of this policy by posting it on the District's website [PRESSPlus8](#) and including an age-appropriate summary of the policy in the student handbook(s). [PRESSPlus9](#)

Enforcement

Any District employee who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be subject to remedial action and/or disciplinary action, up to and including discharge.

Any District student who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be subject to remedial action and/or disciplinary action, including but not limited to, suspension and expulsion consistent with Board policy 7:190, *Student Behavior*.

Any third party who is determined, after an investigation, to have engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy will be addressed in accordance with the authority of the Board in the context of the relationship of the third party to the District, e.g., vendor, parent, invitee, etc. Any person making a knowingly false accusation regarding prohibited conduct will likewise be subject to remedial and/or disciplinary action.

Retaliation Prohibited

Retaliation against any person for bringing complaints, participating in the complaint process, or otherwise providing information about discrimination or harassment based on race, color, or national origin is prohibited (see Board policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*).

Individuals should report allegations of retaliation to the Building Principal, an administrator, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, and/or a Complaint Manager.

The law requires school districts to have a written policy (or policies) in place that prohibit discrimination and harassment based on race, color, and national origin, as well as retaliation. Consult the Board Attorney regarding this law's application to entities other than school districts.

Like other non-discrimination and harassment policies in the PRM, this new policy utilizes the existing complaint process in sample policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

The policy must contain the following: (1) descriptions of various forms of discrimination and harassment based on race, color, and national origin, including examples; (2) the district's internal process for filing a complaint regarding a violation of the policy; (3) an overview of the district's prevention and response program that includes procedures for responding to complaints of discrimination and harassment based on race, color, and national origin and retaliation; (4) potential remedies for a violation of the policy; (5) a prohibition on retaliation for making a complaint or participating in the complaint process; (6) the legal recourse available to the Ill. Dept. of Human Rights (IDHR) and federal agencies if a district fails to take corrective action; and (7) directions on how to contact IDHR.

New/Unpublished Section

Domestic and sexual violence affect a student's ability to learn. Students who are parents or expectant parents have unique needs. Providing support services that enable students who are parents, expectant parents, [PRESSPlus1](#) or victims of domestic or sexual violence (Article 26A Students) to succeed in school are important District goals and required by 105 ILCS 5/26A (Article 26A). [PRESSPlus2](#)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement a program for supporting Article 26A Students that:

1. Distributes this policy and procedures for requesting supportive services or filing a complaint to all students at the beginning of each school year. [PRESSPlus3](#)
2. Ensures at least one staff member in each school building is designated as a resource person for Article 26A Students (Article 26A Resource Person) and receives training in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/26A-35. [All SASSED Social Workers and BMS will serve as the designated resource person.](#) [PRESSPlus4](#)
3. Notifies all District employees and agents that, upon learning or suspecting that a student is a parent, expectant parent, or victim of domestic or sexual violence, they must refer the student to a designated Article 26A Resource Person. [PRESSPlus5](#)
4. Ensures any employees whose duties include the resolution of Article 26A complaints receive training in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/26A-25(b)(1).
5. Requires verification of a student's claim of Article 26A status relating to domestic or sexual violence in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/26A-45. [PRESSPlus6](#)
6. Provides Article 26A Students with in-school support services, information about non-school-based support services, and the ability to make up work missed due to circumstances related to the student's Article 26A status in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/26A-40. [PRESSPlus7](#)
7. Ensures the prompt and equitable resolution of all Article 26A complaints

through a complaint resolution procedure that fully complies with 105 ILCS 5/26A-25. [PRESSPlus8](#)

8. Ensures that all information concerning an Article 26A Student's status and related experiences, or information concerning a student who is a named perpetrator of domestic or sexual violence, provided to or otherwise obtained by the District or its employees or agents pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/26A is retained in a confidential temporary file in accordance with 105 ILCS 10/2(f). [PRESSPlus9](#) Confidentiality procedures will: [PRESSPlus10](#)
 - a. Provide that such information may not be disclosed to any other individual outside of the District, including any other employee, except if such disclosure is: (1) permitted by the Ill. School Student Records Act (105 ILCS 10/), the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. §1232g), or other applicable State or federal laws; or (2) requested or consented to, in writing, by the Article 26A Student or their parent/guardian if it is safe to obtain written consent from the parent/guardian; and
 - b. Comply with the requirements of 105 ILCS 5/26A-30.
9. Ensures that in the event an Article 26A Student or their parent/guardian reports an incident of alleged domestic or sexual violence, the District's procedures comply with 105 ILCS 5/26A-20(c). [PRESSPlus11](#)
10. Complies with State and federal law and aligns with Board policies. [PRESSPlus12](#)

Requesting Support Services

An Article 26A Student and/or their parent/guardian may request support services under this policy by contacting the building-level Article 26A Resource Person, whose name and contact information will be annually distributed to employees, students, and parents/guardians by each Building Principal.

Filing a Complaint

An Article 26A Student and/or their parent/guardian may file a complaint under this policy with the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Title IX Coordinator, Building Principal, Assistant Building Principal, Dean of Students, [PRESSPlus13](#) a Complaint Manager, or any employee with whom the person is comfortable speaking. [PRESSPlus14](#)

The Superintendent shall insert into this policy and keep current the names, office addresses, email addresses, and telephone numbers of the District's

Complaint Resolution Procedure

When a complaint is filed, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator and/or Complaint Manager or designee shall process and review it according to administrative procedure 7:255-AP2, *Complaint Resolution Procedure for Students Who are Parents, Expectant Parents, or Victims of Domestic or Sexual Violence*.

Enforcement

Any District employee who is determined, at the conclusion of the complaint resolution procedure, to have violated Article 26A will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including discharge. Any third party who is determined, at the conclusion of the complaint resolution procedure, to have violated Article 26A will be addressed in accordance with the authority of the Board in the context of the relationship of the third party to the District, e.g., vendor, parent/guardian, invitee, etc.

This policy does not increase or diminish the ability of the District or the parties to exercise any other rights under existing law.

Policy Review [PRESSPlus16](#)

At least once every two years, pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/26A-20 and Board policy 2:240, *Board Policy Development*, the Board reviews and makes any necessary updates to this policy and to any other policies that may act as a barrier to their immediate enrollment and re-enrollment, attendance, graduation, and success in school of any student who is a parent, expectant parent, or victim of domestic or sexual violence. The Superintendent or designee shall assist the Board with its review and any updates.

Retaliation Prohibited [PRESSPlus17](#)

Retaliation against an Article 26A Student or their parent/guardian for exercising or attempting to exercise their rights under Article 26A is prohibited. Individuals should report allegations of retaliation to the Building Principal, an administrator, the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, and/or a Complaint Manager.

A student, employee, or other person authorized by the District to provide aid, benefit, or service under the District's education program or activity who retaliates against others for reporting or complaining of violations of this policy or for participating in any manner under this policy will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge, with regard to employees, or suspension or expulsion, with regard to students.

2:265 Title IX Grievance Procedure

Sexual harassment affects a student's ability to learn and an employee's ability to work. Providing an educational and workplace environment free from sexual harassment is an important District goal. The District does not discriminate on the basis of sex in any of its education programs or activities, and it complies with Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX) [PRESSPlus1](#) and its implementing regulations (34 C.F.R. Part 106) concerning everyone in the District's education programs and activities, including applicants for employment, students, parents/guardians, employees, and third parties.

Title IX Sexual Harassment Prohibited

Sexual harassment as defined in Title IX (Title IX Sexual Harassment) is prohibited. Any person, including a District employee or agent, or student, engages in Title IX Sexual Harassment when that person engages in conduct on the basis of an individual's sex that satisfies one or more of the following:

1. A District employee conditions the provision of an aid, benefit, or service on an individual's participation in unwelcome sexual conduct; or
2. Unwelcome conduct determined by a reasonable person to be so severe, pervasive, and objectively offensive that it effectively denies a person equal access to the District's educational program or activity; or
3. *Sexual assault* as defined in 20 U.S.C. §1092(f)(6)(A)(v), *dating violence* as defined in 34 U.S.C. §12291(a)(11), *domestic violence* as defined in 34 U.S.C. §12291(a)(12), or *stalking* as defined in 34 U.S.C. §12291(a)(36).

Examples of sexual harassment include, but are not limited to, touching, rape, sexual battery, sexual abuse, sexual coercion, crude jokes or pictures, discussions of sexual experiences, teasing related to sexual characteristics, and spreading rumors related to a person's alleged sexual activities.

Definitions from 34 C.F.R. §106.30

Complainant means an individual who is alleged to be the victim of conduct that could constitute sexual harassment.

Education program or activity includes locations, events, or circumstances where the District has substantial control over both the *Respondent* and the context in which alleged sexual harassment occurs.

Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint means a document filed by a *Complainant* or signed by the Title IX Coordinator alleging sexual harassment against a *Respondent* and requesting that the District investigate the allegation.

Respondent means an individual who has been reported to be the perpetrator of the conduct that could constitute sexual harassment.

Supportive measures mean non-disciplinary, non-punitive individualized services offered as appropriate, as reasonably available, and without fee or charge to the *Complainant* or the *Respondent* before or after the filing of a Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint or where no Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint has been filed.

Title IX Sexual Harassment Prevention and Response

The Superintendent or designee will ensure that the District prevents and responds to allegations of Title IX Sexual Harassment as follows:

1. Ensures that the District's comprehensive health education program in Board policy 6:60, *Curriculum Content*, incorporates (a) age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and prevention programs in grades pre-K through 12, and (b) age-appropriate education about the warning signs, recognition, dangers, and prevention of teen dating violence in grades 7-12. This includes incorporating student social and emotional development into the District's educational program as required by State law and in alignment with Board policy 6:65, *Student Social and Emotional Development*.
2. Incorporates education and training for school staff as recommended by the Superintendent, Title IX Coordinator, Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Building Principal, Assistant Building Principal, Dean of Students, [PRESSPlus2](#) or a Complaint Manager.
3. Notifies applicants for employment, [PRESSPlus3](#) students, parents/guardians, employees, and collective bargaining units of this policy and contact information for the Title IX Coordinator by, at a minimum, prominently

displaying them on the District's website, if any, and in each handbook made available to such persons.

Making a Report

A person who wishes to make a report under this Title IX grievance procedure may make a report to the Title IX Coordinator, Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Building Principal, Assistant Building Principal, Dean of Students, [PRESSPlus4](#) a Complaint Manager, or any employee with whom the person is comfortable speaking.

School employees shall respond to incidents of sexual harassment by promptly making or forwarding the report to the Title IX Coordinator. An employee who fails to promptly make or forward a report may be disciplined, up to and including discharge.

Processing and Reviewing a Report

Upon receipt of a report made under this Title IX grievance procedure, the Title IX Coordinator and/or designee will promptly contact the Complainant to: (1) discuss the availability of supportive measures, (2) consider the *Complainant's* wishes with respect to *supportive measures*, (3) inform the Complainant of the availability of supportive measures with or without the filing of a Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint, and (4) explain to the Complainant the process for filing a Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint.

Further, the Title IX Coordinator will analyze the report to identify and determine whether there is another or an additional appropriate method(s) for processing and reviewing it. For any report received, the Title IX Coordinator shall review Board policies 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*; 5:20, *Workplace*

Harassment Prohibited; 5:90, Abused and Neglected Child Reporting; 5:120, Employee Ethics; Code of Professional Conduct; and Conflict of Interest; 7:20, Harassment of Students Prohibited; 7:180, Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment; 7:185, Teen Dating Violence Prohibited; and 7:190, Student Behavior, to determine if the allegations in the report require further action.

Reports of alleged sexual harassment will be confidential to the greatest extent practicable, subject to the District's duty to investigate and maintain an educational program or activity that is productive, respectful, and free of sexual harassment.

Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint Grievance Process

When a Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint is filed, the Title IX Coordinator will investigate it or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation.

The Superintendent or designee shall implement procedures to ensure that all Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaints are processed and reviewed according to a Title IX grievance process that fully complies with 34 C.F.R. §106.45. The District's grievance process shall, at a minimum:

1. Treat *Complainants* and *Respondents* equitably by providing remedies to a *Complainant* where the *Respondent* is determined to be responsible for sexual harassment, and by following a grievance process that complies with 34 C.F.R. §106.45 before the imposition of any disciplinary sanctions or other actions against a *Respondent*.
2. Require an objective evaluation of all relevant evidence – including both inculpatory and exculpatory evidence – and provide that credibility determinations may not be based on a person's status as a *Complainant*, *Respondent*, or witness.
3. Require that any individual designated by the District as a Title IX Coordinator, investigator, decision-maker, or any person designated by the District to facilitate an informal resolution process:
 - a. Not have a conflict of interest or bias for or against complainants or respondents generally or an individual *Complainant* or *Respondent*.
 - b. Receive training on the definition of sexual harassment, the scope of the District's education program or activity, how to conduct an investigation and grievance process (including hearings, appeals, and

informal resolution processes, as applicable), and how to serve impartially.

4. Require that any individual designated by the District as an investigator receiving training on issues of relevance to create an investigative report that fairly summarizes relevant evidence.
5. Require that any individual designated by the District as a decision-maker receive training [PRESSPlus6](#) on issues of relevance of questions and evidence, including when questions and evidence about the *Complainant's* sexual predisposition or prior sexual behavior are not relevant.
6. Include a presumption that the *Respondent* is not responsible for the alleged conduct until a determination regarding responsibility is made at the conclusion of the grievance process.
7. Include reasonably prompt timeframes for conclusion of the grievance process.
8. Describe the range of possible disciplinary sanctions and remedies the District may implement following any determination of responsibility.
9. Base all decisions upon the *preponderance of evidence* standard. [PRESSPlus7](#)
10. Include the procedures and permissible bases for the *Complainant* and *Respondent* to appeal.
11. Describe the range of *supportive measures* available to *Complainants* and *Respondents*.
12. Not require, allow, rely upon, or otherwise use questions or evidence that constitute, or seek disclosure of, information protected under a legally recognized privilege, unless the person holding such privilege has waived the privilege.

Enforcement

Any District employee who is determined, at the conclusion of the grievance process, to have engaged in sexual harassment will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including discharge. Any third party who is determined, at the conclusion of the grievance process, to have engaged in sexual harassment will be addressed in accordance with the authority of the Board in the context of the relationship of the third party to the District, e.g., vendor, parent, invitee, etc. Any District student who is determined, at the conclusion of the grievance process, to have engaged in sexual harassment will be subject to disciplinary action, including, but not limited to, suspension and expulsion consistent with student behavior policies. Any person making a knowingly false accusation

regarding sexual harassment will likewise be subject to disciplinary action.

This policy does not increase or diminish the ability of the District or the parties to exercise any other rights under existing law.

Retaliation Prohibited

The District prohibits any form of retaliation against anyone who, in good faith, has made a report or complaint, assisted, or participated or refused to participate in any manner in a proceeding under this policy. Any person should report claims of retaliation using Board policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Any person who retaliates against others for reporting or complaining of violations of this policy or for participating in any manner under this policy will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge, with regard to employees, or suspension and expulsion, with regard to students.

PRESSPlus 7. 34 C.F.R. §106.45(b)(1)(vii) requires the Title IX sexual harassment grievance process to state the standard of proof it will use to determine responsibility of the respondent. The standard of proof selected must be applied “consistently to formal complaints alleging Title IX sexual harassment regardless of whether the respondent is a student or an employee.” 85 Fed. Reg. 30373. *Preponderance of evidence* is a standard of proof used in civil cases. It means “the greater weight of the evidence, not necessarily established by the greater number of witnesses testifying to a fact but by evidence that has the most convincing force.” See *Black’s Law Dictionary, 11th ed. 2019*. *Preponderance of evidence* is the standard of proof used in sample policy 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.

Clear and convincing is a higher standard of proof, requiring more than *preponderance of evidence* but less than proof beyond a reasonable doubt. It means “evidence indicating that the thing to be proved is highly probable or reasonably certain.” See *Black’s Law Dictionary, 11th ed. 2019*. **Consult the board attorney regarding the appropriate standard of proof for the district, as well as implications if a different standard of proof is used in this policy than in 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*.** For boards that choose the *clear and convincing evidence* standard of proof, delete “~~preponderance of~~” and insert “clear and convincing.” Ensure the same standard of proof is used in 2:265-AP2, *Formal Title IX Complaint Grievance Process*, available at PRESS Online by logging in at www.iasb.com. **Issue 118, April 2025**

Introduction

I. PROCEDURES FOR BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTIONS FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

The following procedures are pursuant to Board Policies 7:230, *Misconduct by Students with Disabilities*, and 7:190, *Student Behavior*. These procedures have been developed after careful review and consideration of the Illinois State Board of Education's guidelines, *Behavioral Interventions in Schools: Guidelines for the Development of District Policies for Students with Disabilities* (October 2024). The District emphasizes the use of positive behavioral interventions with students with disabilities to develop and strengthen desirable behaviors and reduce identified inappropriate behaviors. Behavioral interventions shall be used by taking into consideration the student's physical freedom and social interaction and shall be administered in a manner that respects human dignity and personal privacy and that ensures a student's rights to placement in the least restrictive environment.

SASED remains committed to providing an individualized educational program for all students that fosters academic and social emotional growth. While all students enrolled in a SASED program have individual education plans, each program utilizes the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) framework when addressing student behavior. At Tier I, all students participate in program-wide preventative systems. At Tiers II and III, behavioral interventions are implemented that are developed to support students beyond what is provided within the program-wide system. An individualized Behavior Intervention Plan (based on the results of a Functional Assessment/Analysis) will be developed for students whose behavior impedes his/her learning or that of others and the student's IEP team determines that such a plan is necessary to address that behavior.

A fundamental principle is that positive, non-aversive strategies and interventions designed to develop and strengthen desirable student's behaviors should be used whenever possible at Tiers II and III. In accordance with this principle, positive interventions shall be given the highest priority and shall always accompany the use of more restrictive procedures.

When behavioral interventions are used, they will be used in consideration of the pupil's physical freedom and social interaction. They will be administered in a manner that respects human dignity and personal privacy that will ensure a pupil's right to placement in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE).

SASED Policies are developed in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/14-8.05 and address student discipline, suspension and expulsion procedures, bus conduct, student misconduct, and the use of time out and physical restraint.

Behavior Oversight Committee

A Behavioral Oversight Committee (BOC) was created consisting of SASSED employees and parent representation from multiple programs and positions. This committee includes, but is not limited to, teachers, paraprofessionals, school service personnel, and administrators, advocates for persons with disabilities, and individuals with knowledge or expertise in the development and implementation of behavioral interventions for persons with disabilities.

The Behavior Oversight Committee (BOC) is responsible for recommending policies to the Board for adoption and developing procedures for students with disabilities who require behavioral interventions.

The duties and responsibilities of the Behavior Oversight Committee are as follows:

1. Recommend policies to the Board for adoption and develop and review SASSED procedures on the use of behavioral interventions for students with disabilities who require such intervention.
2. Ensure that SASSED policies and procedures emphasize preventative strategies and positive interventions designed to develop and strengthen desirable behaviors.

SASSED Steering Committee

In addition to the Behavior Oversight Committee, SASSED also has a Steering Committees and professional learning communities for each program. The Steering Committee and Program Professional Learning Communities are responsible for the following in regard to behavior:

1. Review and monitor incidents involving the emergency use of restrictive interventions.
2. Ensure policy and procedures are available to parents and guardians of all students with individualized educational plans via SASSED's website. [SASSED Board policies](#)
3. Advise SASSED administration regarding issues arising from the use of behavioral interventions.
4. Suggest needed staff development in the area of behavioral strategies and interventions.
5. Ensure the dignity and privacy of students.
6. Identify staff or consultants qualified in the area of behavior interventions.
7. Review student behavior and social emotional data (e.g. discipline referrals, physical management) and suggest improvements
8. Developing and implementing the SASSED RTO Reduction Plan.

II. LEVELS OF INTERVENTION

In accordance with Section 5/14-8.05 of the School Code of Illinois and the ISBE’s *Behavioral Interventions in Schools: Guidelines for Development of District Policies for Students with Disabilities* (October 2024), behavioral interventions for students with disabilities are classified under four distinct categories of generally-accepted behavior intervention methods:

- Positive Behavioral Supports and Interventions
- Reactive Nonrestrictive Interventions
- Restrictive Interventions
- Prohibited Interventions

The following are examples of behavioral interventions across the levels of intervention:

Positive Behavioral Supports and Interventions:

Preventative strategies are designed to be implemented with all students in which prosocial behaviors are taught, recognized, and reinforced across all school environments. Reactive, nonrestrictive interventions are those interventions that are more targeted and may be implemented by a staff member that is specifically trained in those interventions. These interventions may be used without the development of a written individual Behavioral Intervention Plan (BIP) or inclusion in the student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP). In addition to the preventative strategies, the selection of these behavioral interventions should be research- and evidence-based. Reactive, non-restrictive interventions place emphasis on positive behavioral change(s) rather than behavioral control or negative consequences.

Restrictive interventions are those interventions that are considered appropriate during emergency situations or when non-restrictive interventions have been attempted but have been shown to be ineffective. In general, restrictive interventions significantly impact delivery of instruction, change the environment where delivery occurs, or change the length of the academic day.

Restrictive interventions should only be used when non-restrictive interventions have not been effective in addressing the problem or changing behavior. Restrictive interventions should be implemented for the minimum amount of time necessary to manage the student's behavior, should be used only in conjunction with positive interventions designed to strengthen expected behaviors, and should be replaced by less restrictive interventions as soon as reasonably possible. If restrictive interventions are implemented routinely for chronic behaviors, a

Functional Behavioral Assessment (FBA) should be completed and reported to the student's IEP team, and a Behavior Intervention Plan (BIP) should be developed.

Highly restrictive interventions should only be utilized after a Functional Behavioral Assessment (FBA) has been completed and a Behavior Intervention Plan (BIP) has been developed and added to a student's IEP. In the event of an emergency, highly restrictive interventions can be implemented without the completion of an FBA/BIP; however, consideration for the need for the FBA/BIP should be made subsequent to the emergency situation in which one or more of the highly restrictive interventions have been implemented.

Prohibited interventions are those that are illegal or inappropriate for the student population and should not be implemented under any circumstances.

Lastly, any of the above non restrictive interventions may be considered restrictive in nature in any of the following circumstances:

- If prolonged or recurring negative behavior occurs in response to the use of the intervention; and
- If the emphasis is on behavior control rather than behavior change.

III. CRITERIA FOR DETERMINING WHEN A STUDENT MAY REQUIRE A BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLAN

Section 14-8.05 requires that policies and procedures include criteria for determining when students with disabilities may require a behavior intervention plan. SASSED's criteria is as follows:

- A. At every IEP conference, the IEP team will consider whether the student exhibits behavior that impedes his/her learning or that of others. If so, the IEP team will also consider the use of positive behavioral interventions and supports, and other strategies, to address that behavior. Depending on the nature, frequency, and severity of the behavior, this may be done informally (and documented in the IEP) or through the initiation of an FBA and development of a BIP.
- B. When a student experiences instances of isolated time out, time out, or physical restraint on any 3 days within a 30-day period, the school personnel who initiated, monitored, and supervised the incidents shall initiate a review meeting of the effectiveness of the procedure(s) used, review the student's FBA, including a determination as to whether a new FBA is necessary, and prepare an individual behavior plan for the student that includes, if applicable, a plan for conducting a new FBA that provides either for continued use of these interventions or for the use of other specified interventions. The individual behavior plan shall be placed in the student's temporary record. The review meeting shall also consider the student's potential need for an alternative program, for special education eligibility, or, for a student already eligible for special education, for a change in program.
 - 1. The review meeting must be held no later than 20 days after the third day the instance of isolated time out, time out, or physical restraint occurred. The timeline may be extended if a request for extension is received from the student's parent or guardian.
 - 2. The District shall invite the student's parents or guardians to participate in this review meeting and shall provide ten days' notice of its date, time, and location. An IEP meeting satisfies this review meeting requirement.
 - 3. The notification shall inform the parents or guardians that the student's potential need for special education, an alternative program or, for students already eligible for special education, the student's potential need for a change in program, will be considered and that the results of the review meeting will be entered into the temporary student record.
- C. If the student is restrained in a supine physical restraint in at least 2 separate instances within a 30-school day period, the school personnel who initiated, monitored, and supervised the incidents shall initiate a Restraint Review, which is a review of the effectiveness of the procedures used. If the personnel involved in the restraints do not include a psychologist, social worker, nurse, or behavior specialist,

at least one of those staff members shall be included in the Restraint Review. The State Superintendent may request that the District provide documentation from the Restraint Review. The Restraint Review must include, but is not limited to:

1. conducting or reviewing a FBA, reviewing data, considering the development of additional or revised positive behavioral interventions and supports, considering actions to reduce the use of restrictive procedures, or, if applicable, modifying the student's IEP, Section 504 plan, BIP, or other plan of care, as appropriate; and
2. reviewing any known medical or psychological limitations that contraindicate the use of a restrictive procedure, considering whether to prohibit that restrictive procedure, and, if applicable, documenting any prohibitions in the student's IEP, Section 504 plan, BIP, or other plan of care.

D. When a student engages in misconduct that results in removals of more than 10 school days during one school year, the IEP team shall develop, or review and as appropriate revise, an FBA and BIP for the student to address the behavior violation so that it does not recur.

Upon the occurrence of an incident that may subject the student either to expulsion or to suspension resulting in more than 10 cumulative school days during one school year, the IEP team shall develop, or review and as appropriate revise, an FBA and BIP for the student.

A functional behavioral assessment of the target behavior of concern is critical to the understanding of the structure and function of the behavior and the development or strengthening of more appropriate replacement or desired behaviors.

In conducting a functional behavioral assessment, a wide range of procedures should be utilized to gain a valid understanding of the target behavior. This may include direct observation of the student across times and settings, interviews with the student as well as their teachers and parents, systematic manipulation of the student's environment, and completion of other assessment measures to gain a more complete understanding of the behavior. A functional behavioral assessment should include the following components:

- A detailed description of the target behavior of concern including data on the intensity, frequency, and duration of the behavior;
- A description of the settings in which the behavior occurs and an analysis of antecedents to and consequences of the behavior;
- A description of other environmental variables that may affect the behavior (i.e. medication, medical conditions, sleep, diet, schedule, social factors);
- An examination and review of the known communicative behavior and the functional or practical intent of the behavior;
- A description of environmental modifications made to change the target behavior; and

- An identification of appropriate behaviors that could serve as functional alternatives to the target behavior.
- Trauma informed practices and other researched based approaches regarding regulation must be incorporated into functional behavioral assessments and behavior intervention plans.

Each student receiving special education services who require the use of a restrictive behavioral intervention should have a written BIP developed by the IEP team and included in the student's IEP. Prior to writing the new BIP, the IEP team should review previous IEPs and discuss previous interventions attempted and their results. This behavioral intervention plan must include the following:

- A summary of the functional behavioral assessment findings;
- A summary of previous interventions implemented;
- A detailed description of the behavior intervention(s) to be used, including those aimed at developing or strengthening alternative, or more appropriate behaviors (i.e. personnel involved in the intervention, all procedures used, data collection and monitoring procedures);
- A list of measurable behavior changes expected and method(s) of evaluation;
- A schedule for review of intervention's effectiveness;
- A list of provisions for communicating with the parents about their student's behavior and coordinating school-based and home-based interventions

The following individuals must be informed of the student's BIP, including crisis plan discussions:

- IEP team, including SASED Program administrator
- Building leadership (i.e. member district principal and/or assistant principal, etc.)
- Other building personnel as designated by the IEP team
- Liaison officer, as applicable

A BIP is a critical element of any successful behavioral intervention (behavior change protocol). Before an intervention is selected, a continuum of possible (tiered support) interventions designed to produce the desired behavioral change(s) should be considered. The least restrictive intervention that is reasonably calculated to produce the desired effect should be selected for implementation. When evaluating an intervention for possible use, Section 14-8.05 requires that the impact of an intervention on the student's physical freedom, social interaction, personal dignity, and privacy must be carefully considered. The following additional variables should be considered when evaluating a potential intervention:

- Student autonomy: Does the student have choices and control over the intervention, their body, and their environment?
- Effectiveness: Does the intervention produce a measurable change in behavior?

- **Generality:** Is the behavior change likely to maintain and generalize across environments, people, and situations?
- **Social validity:** Is the intervention and its outcomes considered meaningful, acceptable, and relevant by stakeholders?
- **Practicality:** Is the intervention feasible given the staff, resources, and environment?
- **Analytic:** Is the intervention based on objective data? Is it able to be monitored over time?
- **Empirically valid:** Is the intervention based on current behavioral research?

SASED staff should ensure that a **behavioral intervention is carried out as prescribed in the BIP**, in accordance with generally accepted professional practices, and consistent with written SASED policies and procedures. This involves training teachers, teaching assistants, and other personnel in the use of behavioral interventions and the ongoing monitoring of the intervention procedures. The use of more restrictive interventions requires greater planning, documentation, and supervision.

All students entering or enrolled in any SASED programs with a known emotional disability will have an individualized behavioral intervention plan developed by the findings of an individualized functional behavioral assessment/analysis. Such behavior intervention plans will be reviewed at least annually at the student's annual reviews. Functional behavioral assessments may be conducted and behavior intervention plans may be reviewed and amended more frequently if the following situations occur:

- A student is not showing improvement in behavior after behavioral interventions at Tiers I-III have been implemented with the student; or
- A student requires an RTO in order to preserve student safety and RTO is not included in the existing behavior intervention plan; or
- RTO's are included in the behavior intervention plan and two or more RTO's were implemented.

For students enrolled in SASED that do not have a known emotional disability, a functional behavioral assessment and behavior intervention plan will be conducted and developed under any of the following circumstances:

- A student is not showing improvement in behaviors after behavioral interventions at Tiers I-III have been implemented with the student; or
- A student requires an RTO in order to preserve student safety; or
- An RTO was implemented.

IV. PROCEDURES FOR MONITORING THE USE OF RESTRICTIVE BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTIONS

A. Restrictive Interventions

SASED's Executive Director, or designee, will implement and monitor the Board's Policy on the implementation and use of restrictive behavioral interventions. The duties of the Executive Director or designee include:

1. Reviewing and monitoring incidents involving the emergency use of restrictive behavioral interventions;
2. Reviewing and monitoring behavioral interventions involving the use of restrictive procedures;
3. Advising the Executive Director or designee on issues arising from the use of restrictive behavioral interventions;
4. Identifying staff or consultants qualified in the area of behavioral interventions; and
5. Advising the Executive Director or designee regarding staff development in the area of behavioral interventions.

B. Highly Restrictive Interventions

See Administrative Procedures 7:190-AP4, *Use of Isolated Time Out, Time Out, and Physical Restraint*, for procedures for monitoring isolated time out, time out, and physical restraint.

At least one time annually, the SASED Steering Committee/Behavior Oversight Committee shall review and analyze student behavioral data, specifically RTO's. Behavioral data will be organized by program and RTO's and other restrictive interventions will be studied and analyzed closely. Interventions will also be reviewed and analyzed to ensure implemented interventions and programs are having desired outcomes. The Steering Committee/Behavior Oversight Committee will also review research that supports proactive interventions, behavioral interventions, and programs that support students with behavioral needs. If desired outcomes are not being realized and/or research presents better possibilities, the Steering Committee will make recommendations as appropriate.

V. TRAINING

The Executive Director or designee will periodically assess the need for training opportunities for school staff, students, and parents/guardians in the areas of SEL and behavioral intervention strategies. When applicable, the Executive Director or designee will maintain documentation of such training opportunities. Training for staff who may implement time out, isolated time out, and/or physical restraint will be provided according to ISBE rules (23 Ill. Admin. Code 1.285(h)).

VI. DISTRIBUTION

SASED will inform its students about these policies and procedures annually and copies will be provided to parents or guardians of all students receiving special education services in the following manner:

- Within 15 days after policies and procedures are adopted by the Board, and
- Within 15 days after the Board has amended its policies and procedures, and
- At the time an IEP is first implemented for a student, and
- At the student's annual review, the LEA representative of the IEP team will explain the policies and procedures, provide a copy of the policies to the parents and/or guardians, and provide a copy of the procedures upon request of any parents and/or guardians.

Also, Parents and Guardians of all SASED's students will have access to local SASED policies and procedures on the use of behavioral interventions via SASED's website. All Parents and guardians will be provided this information at the beginning of every school year via the SASED Student Handbook. Should policies or procedures regarding the use of behavioral interventions change throughout the school year, parents and guardians will be notified of such changes via email.

VII. Family Involvement

The parents or guardians must be notified within 24 hours when a restrictive procedure is used.

Family Involvement:

Parents and/or guardians have the right to be involved in the development of any behavioral intervention/management plan utilizing restrictive procedures. Such involvement includes, but is not limited to, participating in the designing, implementation, and evaluation of interventions. Parents and guardians should be provided with copies and/or explanations of the functional analysis conducted and the behavioral intervention plan developed for their child.

Notification:

The student's parents or guardian shall be provided written notification of the rationale, procedures, and possible outcomes of a behavioral intervention/management plan developed at an IEP meeting, in accord with the special education requirements.

Documentation in the IEP:

All children with disabilities have a right to a free and appropriate public education, as specified in the federal and state statutes. An IEP is required for students to receive special education services and the IEP is the foundation for ensuring that a student is provided with appropriate educational and related services. A Behavior Intervention Plan (BIP) is developed to address specific behavior(s) that are impeding the student's ability to access or participate in his education and/or impeding other students' learning. Any BIP that is implemented for a student eligible for special education services is part of the IEP. The BIP for a student eligible for special education services should be developed by the student's multidisciplinary IEP team.

Appeal and Due Process Procedures:

All procedural safeguards, including rights to conflict resolution, mediation, and an impartial due process hearing, as required through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the School Code, shall be applicable to the resolution of disputes involving Behavioral Intervention Plans.

If the parent or guardian disagrees with a proposed restrictive behavioral intervention, the SASSED Cooperative in conjunction with the serving and home districts will work with the parent to attempt resolution of the dispute. The parents may request a due process hearing as provided by Section 226.605 and 226.615 of 23 Illinois Administrative Code.

The SASSED Cooperative shall ensure that parents are fully informed of their due process rights.

Physical Restraint, Time Out, and Isolated Time Out (RTO)

The Illinois School Board of Education has developed a Bill of Rights regarding physical restraint, time out, and isolated time out. SASSED is dedicated to ensuring a safe, healthy, and supportive learning environment for all students. SASSED grounds itself in its Mission and Vision which states “SASSED is committed to being the innovative leader that inspires, creates, and implements best practices in education for all” and “to maximize student outcomes.” Students in SASSED programs have complex and multi-faceted needs, at times resulting in an imminent threat to themselves, students or others. As such, the Bill of Rights is being included in this document, as well as SASSED’s RTO Reduction Plan and SASSED’s procedures for responding to RTO’s.

The ISBE Bill of Rights states:

“This Bill of Rights provides parents and guardians with an overview of the requirements and rights related to the use of physical restraint, time out, and isolated time out (RTO). RTO should be used as a last resort and only when the threat of imminent danger of serious physical harm exists. The information presented in this guide is not meant to be exhaustive and does not include a complete explanation of all the laws. However, at a minimum, parents and guardians should be aware of their rights when RTO is utilized to ensure the safety and well-being of their child.

Terms to Know

- **Chemical Restraint:** Using medication to control a student’s behavior or to restrict a student’s movement.*
- **Imminent Danger:** A situation in which a student presents a danger to the safety and well-being of himself, herself, or another person and is likely to cause immediate physical harm.
- **Isolated Time Out:** Involuntary confinement of a student alone in a time out room or other enclosure outside of the classroom without a supervising adult in the time out room or enclosure.
- **Mechanical Restraint:** Using a device or equipment that limits or prevents a student’s movement.*
- **Physical Restraint:** Holding or restricting a student’s movement.
- **Prone Restraint:** A physical restraint in which a student is held face down and physical pressure is applied to the body to prevent movement.*
- **Time Out:** Involuntary monitored separation of a student from classmates with a trained adult in the room for part of the school day or for a brief time in a non-locked setting.

**Not permitted to be used in Illinois public and nonpublic schools.*

RTO Standards

RTO may be used when:

- Your child's behavior may cause serious physical harm to self or others.
- The school tried to calm your child down with other techniques before using RTO.
- Your child has no known health reasons that RTO should not be used.
- Your child calms down and there is no longer a risk of serious physical harm to self or others.

RTO must end when:

- Your child calms down and there is no longer a risk of serious physical harm to self or others.
- Your child says that he/she/they is unable to breathe.
- Staff recognize that your child is having a difficult time breathing.

RTO must not be used if:

- Your child has health concerns and using RTO could harm your child.
- Your child did not follow directions.
- Your child was verbally disrespectful or rude.
- Your child was cursing.
- Your child tried to damage property.
- The school staff wants to punish your child.

Student Rights While Placed in a Time Out or Isolated Time Out

- The room must meet all safety requirements of the law. The door shall not be locked, and the doorway may not be blocked with furniture or other objects.
- During a timeout, an adult must remain in the room with the student.
- A student may only be placed in isolated time out when the supervising adult would be in danger of serious physical harm from the student. An adult will remain outside of the room.
- While in time out or isolated time out, a student must be allowed to go to the bathroom or take regularly scheduled medicine.
- If a time out or isolated time out occurs during lunch or a regularly scheduled snack time, food or drink must be offered to the student.
- Clothing items shall remain in place. Items may only be removed if there is a risk of self-injury or injury to others.
- Staff must never leave a student alone. They must continually check on the student to make sure the student has calmed down and can return to class.

Parent/Guardian Bill of Rights After an RTO Event

1. **Notification:** The school should attempt to notify you on the same day of the RTO event.
2. **Written Explanation:** Within one day (unless the next day is a weekend or holiday), you should receive a written explanation of the event.
3. **Right to Meet:** Within two days (unless the next day is a weekend or holiday), you should be notified of the right to schedule a meeting. The meeting should be held two days after your request is made. You may meet in person, via telephone, or virtually.
4. **Meeting:** During the meeting, everyone should talk about what happened and what could have been done differently. You may ask questions, make suggestions, and share what works best for your child. The goal is to prevent future RTO events.
5. **Meeting Notes:** You must be provided a copy of the meeting notes.

How to File a Complaint

If you feel your child's rights have been violated during a RTO event, you may file a RTO state complaint. A complaint must be filed within one year of the RTO incident. There is no cost to file a complaint, and you do not need an attorney. To file a complaint or to request assistance, you may contact the Illinois State Board of Education at 217-785-5585 or by emailing restrainttimeout@isbe.net.”

SASED RTO Procedures

1. After a physical restraint incident has ended, the person who filled out the behavior log, hands it to the staff member who initiated (lead) the restraint.
2. The staff member who initiated (lead) the physical restraint, completes the [ISBE Physical Restraint and Time Out Form](#), which documents what happened before the restraint and why the team went hands on. This form must be completed in its entirety.
3. The staff member who initiated (lead) the physical restraint and completed the form, emails administration as soon as possible, notifying them that there was an incident that involved a physical restraint.
4. The staff member who initiated(lead) the physical restraint and completed the ISBE documentation form will scan the behavior log to the student's case manager. Then he/she will give the hard copy of the paperwork to the student's case manager for the case manager to enter into Embrace BIR (Both the top and the bottom portion of the BIR needs to be entered). **If the case manager is not in school, give the hard copy of the paperwork to the BMS/SW. If both are absent provide the paperwork to the administrator and inform them the case manager and BMS/SW are absent.**
5. Student's Case manager contacts home the same day and reports the restraint.
6. Student's case manager emails administration letting them know the BIR is ready for review. Administrator will schedule a debrief meeting. This meeting should include all members involved with the restraint (listed on the paperwork), administrator, the student's BMS/SW and Case Manager. Debriefing must happen within 48 hours of the restraint.
7. Administrator emails the paperwork (form and Parent Bill of Rights) to the student's guardians (form, restraint log, ISBE complaint form, and procedural safeguards). The following are CC'd on the email to the family: Physicalmanagement@SASED.org, District representative, Assistant Director of Programs, BMS/SW, and program assistant.
8. Program Assistant places a printed copy in the student's temporary file.
 - a. For Pathways only: Administration schedules an Intervention Review meeting if a student has had 3 RTOs in a month.

The following paragraphs of the above-referenced Lease shall be amended as follows:

Article 2., Term; The Term of the Lease shall Commence June 1, 2025 (Commencement Date) and shall End May 31, 2031 (Expiration Date);

Article 3., Base Rent; Beginning on the Commencement Date Base RENT shall be \$660,000.00 annually, or \$55,000.00 per month and beginning June 1, 2026 shall escalate two percent (2%) annually in accordance with the below schedule.

Article 24., Tenant and Landlord represent to each other that neither party has dealt with any broker in connection with this Addendum and both parties agree to indemnify and hold the other harmless from all damages, liabilities, claims, losses, costs and expenses arising from any claims or demands of any broker for any commission alleged to be due such broker in connection with the Premises and this Lease Addendum.

Lease Termination Option: Notwithstanding the Term of the Lease or any other provision in the Lease or this Addendum, Tenant, in its sole discretion, shall have the option to terminate the Lease effective at the end of the day on any of the dates listed below, by providing a written termination notice to Landlord no later than the corresponding notice date identified below.

For termination effective at the end of the day on	Notice must be provided no later than
May 31, 2027	November 30, 2026
May 31, 2028	November 30, 2027

Any such termination notice is to be provided in a manner in accordance with the Notice provisions set forth in Article 25 of the Lease.

In the event the Tenant exercises this Lease Termination Option and is otherwise in compliance with the Lease, the Tenant's Deposit (as defined in Article 27 of the Lease),



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or any balance thereof, shall be returned to Tenant upon termination or upon any later date on which Tenant vacates the Premises.

All other terms and conditions of the Lease and Amendment to Lease are in full force and effect.

Summary: Below are updates for the SASED Board committees:

Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee met on June 4, 2025. The following was discussed:

- Medicaid Cost Settlement - The FY23 Annual Cost Report has been completed and certified. Embrace assesses a 5% fee to the settlement amount. SASED anticipates receiving a net amount of \$1,039,495 from the FY23 Medicaid Annual Cost Settlement in late June or July 2025. These funds will be used to offset tuition costs in FY26 through categorical allocations to programs and services. [Attached](#) is the breakdown of the settlement amount by cost pool, the distribution of the settlement across programs, and a comparison of the budgeted tuition rates to the adjusted tuition rates reflecting the Annual Cost Settlement allocation for your review.
- Facility Cost Analysis- An updated Facility Cost analysis was presented to the Finance Committee. When looking only at the comparison of staff needed for SASED's current model to the anticipated staff needed for a centralized location, an overall decrease in cost was estimated to be \$4,000,000. SASED also conducted a cost analysis if services were to expand to include 20 additional classrooms (10 Autism, 10 ED). If SASED was to expand to serve 170 district students currently placed out of district, a savings of \$4.7 million was estimated. SASED staff were asked to make a few revisions. Once the revisions are complete, Dr. Dryier will share with the Board.
- Priorities for the 2025/26 school year were reviewed and will be included in the Strategic Plan.
