Date: February 14, 2022

As outlined in the Early Literacy Coaching in Residence Program agreement (LEO), we are required to provide a quarterly report to the Board of Education on the current of the LEO coach and the impact on staff and the district. Ms. Resh, the district LEO coach, is viewed as a key teacher leader in our district who is continually looking for ways to grow professionally and support each and every staff member at United Oaks as well as district-wide.

Ms. Resh brings a wealth of knowledge and insight to our staff and the district at large due to the extensive training provided by the ISD and state-wide. Our LEO coach continues to actively participate at the building, district, and county levels and is seen as a leader at all levels. The information that follows provides an overview of the building and district level work and the ways in which our LEO coach, Erika Resh, continues to grow in her professional practice as an instructional coach.

Building Level Actions

- Embedded coaching (individual, grade level, and building) that supports high-quality literacy instruction (foundational skills, small group instruction, and guided reading, writing, utilizing mentor texts, and implementing the HP framework components)
- Coaching support includes planning, modeling, observing, and reflecting, as well as job-embedded professional learning and support utilizing data to inform and plan instruction (Tier 1 and Tier 2)
- Member of Building Network leadership team
- Co-organizer, in partnership with the United Oaks principal, of literacy-based professional learning for staff

District Level Actions

- Collaboration with district instructional coaching team to provide systemic professional learning across the district
- Member of Instructional Coaching and Literacy Leadership team
- Participates in data days and supports the development of data-informed actions
- Participant in the Cycles of Inquiry project with the Literacy Leadership team
- Development of a professional learning series, in collaboration with the district coaching team, on Essential Instructional Practices in Literacy, with a focus on foundational skills, small group instruction (reading) and writing
- Implementation of the Hazel Park Literacy Roadmap



Instructional Coach Professional Learning

- Ongoing professional learning to learn effective approaches to develop teacher capacity and expand personal knowledge on high quality literacy practices. Professional learning experiences include
 - Cross district collaboration around a variety of literacy and coaching topics, including summer literacy, family engagement, diversity, equity, and inclusion from a literacy lens, and using data to support instructional planning
 - Member of the State Early Literacy Coaching Network focused on developing coaching capacity while collaborating with other ISD's across the state
 - Participant in an interactive writing series with Dr. Sandy Biondo, with a staff member, to develop a series of lessons and then videos of the lessons in action to be used for future professional learning with other teachers. This work is supported by monthly learning sessions with Dr. Biondo and a small cohort of coaches.



Subject: Request to Waive the 2022 MME Requirement for 12th Grade Students
Date: February 14, 2022

In a typical year, high school students who did not take all components of the MME as 11th graders would be required to complete any or all assessments as a 12th grader. These assessments were part of the state-level accountability requirements. Per the Michigan Department of Education, there are no accountability calculations associated with testing 12th graders for the 2021-2022 school year only. 12th graders, who have been unable to take all three components of the MME, are not required but may take the entire MME in Spring 2022.

This same requirement is included in Board Policy 2623 with the language that follows, "The District shall administer the complete Michigan Merit Examination to a student only once and shall not administer the complete Michigan Merit Examination to the same student more than once if the student has valid scores in some or all MME components. If a student does not take the complete Michigan Merit Examination in grade 11, the District shall administer the complete Michigan Merit Examination to the student in grade 12." As we continue to be mindful of our students' well-being and the interrupted learning they have experienced during the past two years, we are requesting that the Board of Education waive the requirement for 12th grades students to take the full MME or any components missed during the 11th grade. All components will be offered to any student who would like to test. If approved, prompt communication will be sent to our secondary teams for distribution to our staff, students, and parents.





The nurses have completed a review of all of the District EAD's and noted Six of our current AEDs in the district have supplies and batteries that are expiring this year. The expiring items will not be supported by the vendor due to the AED machine being phased out by the FDA.

We are proposing 7 new AEDs for the district.

The 7 new wireless AEDs will be universal for adults and children and will not need separate child pads. The new AEDs will only have one set of pads to attach. With this in mind, we will be moving 4 AEDs (with child pads) from Edison, Ford Administration, Hoover Elementary and Webster Early Childhood Center to the Junior High and High School.

The new universal AEDs will go to Edison, Ford Administration, Hoover Elementary, United Oaks, Webb Elementary, Webster Elementary and a new one at Jardon. Webb Elementary and Jardon currently only have one AED between the two buildings and there is a 3 minute response time requirement for AED use. With wireless capabilities on the new AEDs, these machines will be able to transmit directly to EMS or the hospital.

We are also ordering an AED signage that is needed at the high school, posters for identifying where the nearest AEDs are in the building, CPR kits for each AED and an additional AED cabinet for Jardon.

After taking inventory in our weight room and looking at the layout with staff and coaches we are recommending several items to the Board.

Some of the donated equipment received several years ago are no longer safe and should be moved out for scrap etc. Some of our auxiliary equipment is still in great shape and can still be used. I have tagged the old or unsafe equipment and made sure that no one uses it.

We have 8 Olympic bars, 2 of which I put out of commission because they were dangerous. I am recommending we order an additional 5 which would put us at 11 total.

We currently have two 2 racks and I am recommending we order another 8. This would allow coaches to have groups of 3 work out at 10 racks. 30 kids at the racks. This maximizes our space. (With one bar at each rack, meaning 30 people could work out on racks at one time.)

Moving the auxiliary machines to the sides of the weight room would allow for groups of two to work out together in a safe area. I believe with changes and upgrades we will have room for 45 people to workout safely at once. With the room as it currently is, I wouldn't feel safe about more than 20 working out at once. This is huge for us especially if we plan to open it to the public in the future!

This would be a good start as we hope to get this rolling ASAP. My top priority and goal is to make it as safe as possible for anyone wishing to use our weight room.



We respectfully request that in order to support our focus that we add a 0.5 MTSS Teacher and 1.0 Paraprofessional for Hoover. The pilot program will offer these services to ten (10) students, five (5) from each first grade classroom. We believe this will be a great opportunity for our students to begin closing the learning gap that has been created during the last two years of the pandemic.

We continue to have a positive look as we move forward with this amazing idea to welcome the positive growth from this pilot program at Hoover.

Funding Source: These positions will come from Section 31A At-Risk funds.



Education for Democracy

Where are we amidst today's events?

In a troubling set of presentations in Chicago in mid-November, Roundtable members were presented with a dazzling but sobering series of insights.

"The challenges we face in this country are greater than I have ever seen before for public education," said Norman Ornstein, long a mainstay of political commentary in Washington, D.C. "My mother remembers being on a "kindertransport" taking her to safety out of Germany as her mother ran alongside the train knowing she'd never see her child again," reported the University of Ottawa's Joel Westheimer. "Schools," declared the Rev. Charles Johnson of Pastors for Texas Children, "should be temples of imagination."

"It is at school that we learn how to be a public," was one of the significant points made during an engaging panel of academics (above). Consultant Erin Jones reminded us, "America is bad at having conversations in mixed company about race, politics, religion, and gender."

On a brighter note, reported Berkeley's Rucker Johnson, we now have evidence based on following millions of California students for several years that sustained investment in low-income children raises graduation rates and "student achievement in every grade from three to eleven."

DEMOCRACY UNDER CHALLENGE

"I want to reflect for a moment on the fact that we are living in the midst of a deeply divided country," said Norman Ornstein (r), at the outset of his remarks. Ornstein, a longtime resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute and a fixture on radio, television, and newspapers as a Washington insider, laid out ten significant factors at work in the body politic within which school leaders function.

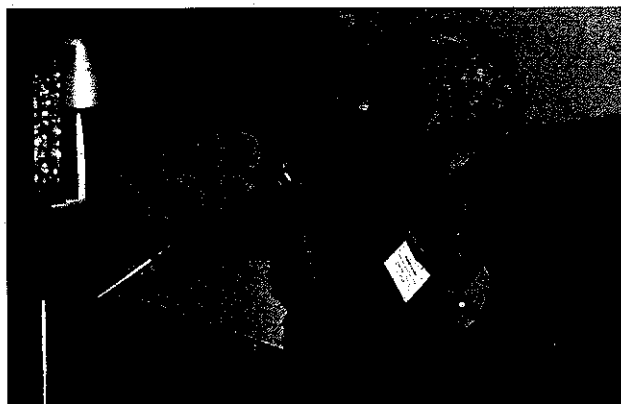
1. *Schools have become a key element in electoral politics*, with debates about critical race theory, supposedly salacious books, and parental involvement in curriculum matters dominating some 2021 elections.

2. *Anger about school shutdowns during the pandemic* has mobilized many suburban "moms," suddenly forced to remain at home without access to childcare.

3. *Political tribalism is a huge problem* which has metastasized into states and localities. Despite different philosophies, politicians who used to work together to solve problems, now say to opponents, "You are evil and trying to destroy my way of life."

4. *Populism and distrust of elites has surged*. Populism always emerges amidst economic turmoil. Meanwhile, a "war on expertise" makes "coming to a common understanding of problems much more difficult."

5. *We have a new era of robber barons*, with inequality growing so that "people no longer believe society is working the way it's supposed to." Between 1978 and 2018, CEO compensation grew by 1,000%, while average worker compensation increased by 1.9%. (to p. 5)



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EDUCATION FOR DEMOCRACY

"Let's start with a thought question," said the University of Ottawa's Joel Westheimer, an internationally known expert on education and democracy. Let's imagine you live in a dictatorship presided over by a wonderful person. She wants to do the right thing. She's a benevolent dictator but even "she doesn't want a bunch of people questioning what she's doing."

Continued Westheimer: "What's different about schools in a democracy from schools in even a benevolent dictatorship?"

Authoritarian vs. Democratic. The difference is that in a democracy we

want people to participate in their own governance. "Citizens in a democracy



have responsibilities that people in dictatorships, whether a theocracy, a military junta, or a harsh or benevolent dictatorship, simply don't have." The

reality of life in a democracy is that we need citizens "to make decisions on the most basic and fundamental purposes of their society."

How Should We Live? "I want to suggest to you," said Westheimer, "that the fundamental purpose of schools in a democracy is to put the question to students: 'How should we live?'" How we answer that question is not a given. "There are many social, political, and economic arrangements in the world. Capitalism is a decision to arrange our economic affairs in certain ways. So is socialism." (to p. 4)

ROUNDTABLE'S FUTURE

There was a significant handoff during the November meeting. With the announcement that Roundtable founding executive director James Harvey would be retiring at the end of calendar 2021, the Steering Committee mounted a two-year search to find a legacy home for the Roundtable. The Schlechty Center (Louisville, KY) has become that home and Steve McCammon, president and CEO of Schlechty, attended the Chicago meeting and was introduced as the new Roundtable executive director.



DEFENDING PUBLIC SCHOOLS

“Preach, my dear sir, a crusade against ignorance,” was the advice Thomas Jefferson offered Pastor George Wythe in 1786. The Roundtable benefited from just such a sermon from the Rev. Charles F. Johnson, Executive Director of Pastors for Texas Children. In a spellbinding speech, Johnson held the audience rapt as he laid out the case for opposing charter schools and vouchers for education.

“We’ve heard some stunning statistics” said Johnson. “Very sobering. I want to speak on a very concrete level.” Johnson, who has served for 42 years as a minister, pointed out that, “Most American Protestant denominations have some kind of statement in their founding documents affirming the importance of public schools.” That’s not true of the Roman Catholic faith, he acknowledged, but we need to mobilize those congregations because “while they’re in the local church on weekends, their children are in public schools during the week.”

Like Westheimer, he took dead aim at standardization in the school reform playbook. “I want to make one critical point. These tests are sucking the life and creativity out of our classrooms, which should be holy sanctuaries of imagination and learning.

“We should not have standardized tests because there are no standardized students.”

Johnson laid out a three-part agenda for superintendents to take back to their districts. First, work to create a truth

and transparency commission in every state to bring research to the public’s attention. “It is time the public realized that we’ve had 30 years of a failed experiment known as charters.”

Next, find a way to create an education scorecard for every state legislator. “In Texas, our legislature meets for 50 days every two years. One wag pointed out it would be more effective if it met for two days every 50 years.”

Third, every district needs a faith cabinet. “Work with a local ministerial alliance to learn more about what former President George W. Bush called ‘a thousand points of light,’ all of the good things going on in your community. Then when you’re under 60 attack, the faith community can come to your defense.”

Is any of this easy? No, it’s not, concluded Johnson. But he offered to come to any district seeking help to begin the foundational work of moving forward. “Begin with one person. That’s what you need to get started.”

BUILDING INTERRACIAL BRIDGES

The life of school and system consultant Erin Jones rests on three pillars—family, basketball, and the work of racial reconciliation. She has a remarkable story to tell.

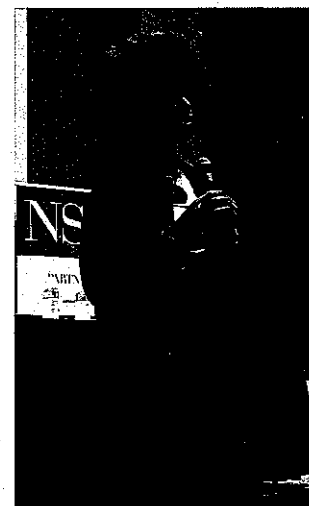
Rejected the day she was born.

One of the emotional high points of her presentation came early as she described being rejected by her White mother the day she was born. “My mother birthed me out of her body, left me in a hospital bed, and walked away. . . . On my birth certificate under ‘name’ it says ‘Negro.’”

Jones never met either of her biological parents and was sent immediately to a children’s home, from which two White Minnesota parents adopted her.

Earning more than a million votes.

From that unpromising beginning, Jones went on to stunning accomplishments. Among them, winning more than one million votes in a statewide race for the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction in the state of Washington, a race lost by less than one percent of the vote. She was the first Black woman in the state to run for statewide office—and remains, to date, the only one ever to do so. “I’m really glad I lost,” says Jones. “I got enough votes to realize people liked me, but not enough to wind up in the middle of the pandemic facing the decisions you face every day.” (to p. 6)

EDUCATION FOR DEMOCRACY (CONT'D)

“And of course our public schools are predicated on the notion that, in order for this experiment in democracy to function, we need citizens who are able to participate and make decisions about their own lives.”

Westheimer quoted Jefferson’s famous aphorism: “I know no safe depository of the ultimate powers of the society but the people themselves; and if we think them not enlightened enough to exercise their control with a wholesome discretion, the remedy is not to take it from them, but to inform their discretion by education.”

A Very Personal Insight. “I want to say this isn’t just an academic story for me. In the 1930s my grandmother put my mother on a kindertransport (railcars taking Jewish children out of Germany as the Nazi menace loomed). My father was already in custody. My mother remembers her mother and grandmother running along the platform beside the train as it left, waving goodbye, knowing they’d never see her again.”

Westheimer acknowledged there were many explanations for what went wrong in Germany. “But I wonder if there was anything German schools could have done differently to teach German children about integrity, courage, ethics, standing up for what counts. And what are our responsibilities as citizens in a democracy?”

Standardization. Against that backdrop, Westheimer asked us to consider standards and standardization. Who’s opposed to standards? But standards and standardization have become the “bible of school reform” in what Finnish educator Pasi Sahlberg describes as GERM, the Global Education Reform Movement. “At its core, teaching is not about standardization. It’s about individualization. Standards become the enemy of creativity in our schools.”

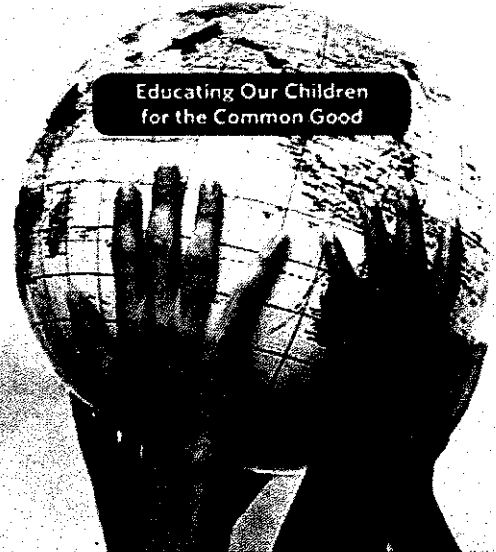
Everything in education, said Westheimer, “should somehow connect to the question, ‘How should we live? What kind of society do we want to live in?’”

We don’t want students back in a benevolent dictatorship, he concluded. “That’s a place where everyone is required to say everything is OK. But in a democratic society, we need people to be uncomfortable, to look at problems in the world and know that someone else isn’t going to solve them.

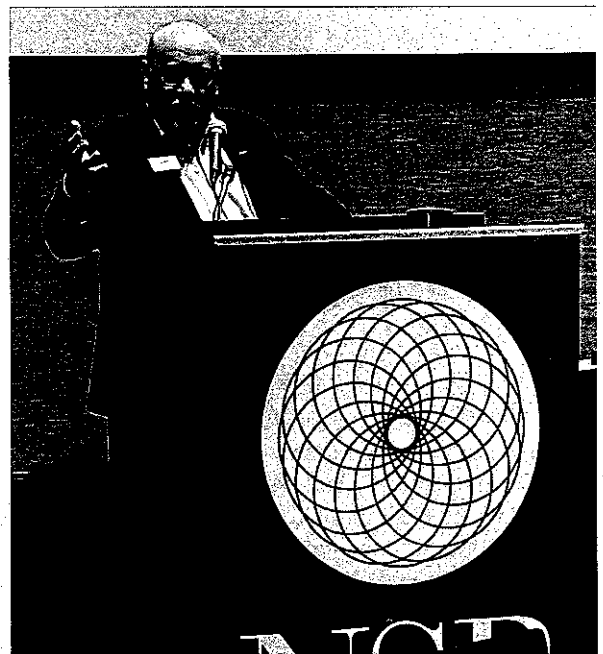

6. *Regional divides make everything more challenging.* It's not just a division between red and blue states, it's that cities and suburbs account for two-thirds or more of GDP growth, with "economic stagnation growing" as you move from cities to rural areas.

7. *The political system is increasingly seen as illegitimate.* Clearly a fatal flaw in a democratic republic, the structural weaknesses in a constitution cobbled together to get 13 disparate colonies to become states are coming home to roost. Two of six recent presidential elections saw the winner declared based on the electoral college despite losing the popular vote. Just 30% of Americans elect 70 senators. "If people vote and those votes don't get translated into representative government, the legitimacy of elections is undermined."

8 *Misinformation campaigns have convinced many that President Biden is not a legitimate president.* 39% of Americans believe that if elected leaders will not protect America, the people must do it themselves, even if it requires

violence. In this environment, it's easy to convince some that leaders in one political party are running a child pornography ring out of a pizza parlor.

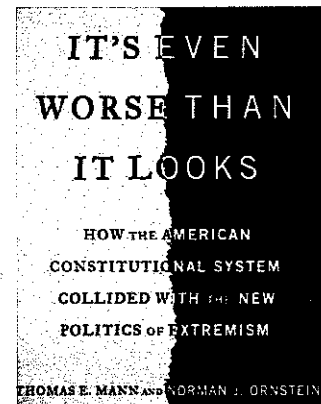
9. *School leaders are at the frontline in dealing with these issues.* We are seeing a much larger attack on public schools as part of the populism described above, with, of course, threats and assaults around school board meetings.

10. *Most of the structural challenges we face require legislative action or constitutional change.* Voter suppression and gerrymandering are affronts to democracy. The Senate filibuster, which has no constitutional foundation, means that senators with just 11% of the population can block legislative progress.

"All of this tells me," said Ornstein (co-author of *It's Even Worse Than It Looks*), "that our challenges are greater than anything I have seen in my lifetime. I don't envy you and I don't envy the position you are in."

There are some steps we can take, he emphasized. Proposed reforms include mandatory national service to give students a sense of their democratic obligations; term limits for Supreme Court Justices; enlarging the House of Representatives to help balance the Electoral College; rank-choice voting; and multi-member districts to make representation more diverse and less homogenous.

But, he cautioned, "If we don't enact legislation protecting voting rights, we're toast as a democracy."

She also got dunked on by Dr. J., played basketball for an American team in 12 nations, tried out for two WNBA teams as a young mother, sang with John Denver, and hung out with Barbara Bush and Anwar Sadat’s wife for a day while in school.

A Disruptor of Narratives. “I’m a walking disruption of narratives,” smiled Jones. “People look at me and see a tall Black woman. They don’t know I was raised by White parents, play two instruments, speak four languages, and played basketball for 40 years and in 12 countries.”

“America is bad about having conversations in mixed company about race, politics, religion, and gender,” said Jones. But, “Talking about ‘the stank’ is the greatest form of patriotism.”

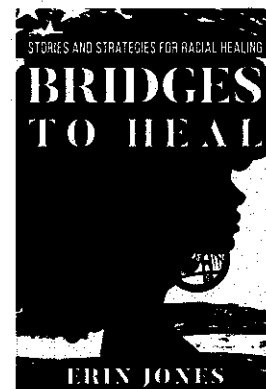
In her new book promoting racial conciliation, *Bridges to Heal US*, Jones lays out four practices and behaviors to help engage in racial reconciliation:

Practice #1: Practice gratitude every day. Gratitude is not something you’re born with. You need to practice it. It’s easy to think after all the data we’ve heard, “Oh my God, it’s hopeless.” You need to practice gratitude every day.

Practice #2: What’s in your hands? What do you have in your hands that you’re good at? Your ability to sing? Write? Paint? “There’s enough talent in this room to solve our problems, but when we get together we talk about lesson plans, Title this and funding that.” Let’s focus on what’s in our hands and how to use these talents.

Practice #3: Create brave spaces. Get good at being uncomfortable and search for community agreement. Safety is silence. But for you to be your best and bravest, you need to get good at being uncomfortable. Push through the discomfort. Like anything else, it takes practice.

Practice #4: Get present. In particular, get curious about people who are not like you. Pause, breathe, and check in with yourself before you respond to some of these issues. Get present. Don’t run from one thing to another. As leaders we need to practice stopping and pausing, instead of racing around to the next thing.



PUBLIC SCHOOLS AS A PUBLIC GOOD

Skillfully led by Morcease Beasley, superintendent of Clayton County schools, Georgia, a panel made up of Kathleen Knight Abowitz (Miami University, Ohio), Johann Neem (Western Washington University), and Sarah Stizlein (University of Cincinnati) made the intellectual case for education as a foundation for democracy. Democracy, said Abowitz, is a “process of learning how to find agreement.” Schools help us

develop that process. “A people does not create itself,” said Neem. “Institutions do. And they are the means of making a nation out of diverse people.” Stizlein put the same thing a different way: “Public schools are how we learn to be a public.”

Increasingly, said Stizlein, many people want to look down their noses at public schools, thinking of them as institutions to produce workers. “We need to start thinking about education that creates a true democracy.”

Abowitz lamented that in her first-year classes on campus, “Nineteen-year-olds look blank when you mention education for democracy. Most teachers don’t mention it except in social studies classes.” I worry, said Stizlein, that the World Values Survey suggests a growing preference for strong authoritarian leaders among the less-well-educated.”

The founders “understood that our republic is only as good as we are,” said Neem, “and there was a shift in our history from education as a private good to education as a shared good.” (to p. 7)

PUBLIC SCHOOLS AS A PUBLIC GOOD (CONT'D)

Neem, an immigrant who arrived with his family from India at age three, worried that for low-income, native-born children, the American dream is much harder to attain in the face of economic challenges and racial segregation.

“As a child, the public schools told me we are all Americans. Today’s immigrants face nativism. Today, kids feel they need to live in a tent of their own, instead of enlarging the tent.”

Added to these challenges, he said, is a reality that, “Many in our society make it hard for immigrants to feel truly American, because nativism has labeled American as White.”

We need, all agreed with Abowitz, to make space throughout the curriculum for experience-based citizenship education, involved with real-world issues.

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MONEY MATTERS

Too much school research is inaccessible, quick to simplify student comparisons, and fails to address the questions on the minds of school leaders and policymakers. That’s not true of a ground-breaking new analysis from Rucker Johnson, a Berkeley labor economist who gave us a sneak-peak of his new research at our November meeting. The research will be published in January.

It’s an extremely complicated analysis but here are the key points he made during his presentation:

- Money that is targeted to schools with high concentrations of low-income students and sustained over time substantially improves student performance in reading and math *in every grade from three to eleven.*
- Such funding also significantly *improves high school graduation rates.*
- The availability of *high-quality preschool programs has a synergistic effect*, nearly doubling measurable student performance by Grade 8.

These findings are based on tracking the school progress of some 6.5 million K-12 students in California’s 10,000 public schools over five years.

LCFF: Hallmark Legislation. California’s landmark 2013 Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) replaced state categorical programs with (1) a weighted per-pupil grant program; (2) a requirement to limit class size to 24 students in the elementary grades; (3) a 20% premium for each low-income student, English-language learner, or foster youth; (4) an additional 50% of the base grant for every student when the percentage of targeted students exceeded 55% of district enrollment; (5) greater district discretion in spending funds.

Funding for districts with high concentrations of low-income students shot through the roof. Districts, with 70% of enrollment made up of targeted students, for example, received an additional \$5,300 per student. It is this impressive increase in funding, allied with local discretion, that explains Johnson’s remarkable findings. Every educator should be on the alert for the release of Johnson’s study in January 2022.

MASB Bylaws – Article IV – Membership

Section 2. Active Members. The board of education of any public school district in Michigan may become an active member of the Association. Active members of the Association shall be divided into eight regions. The regions shall be designated according to intermediate school district boundaries. The regions shall be as follows:

Region 1. Copper Country ISD, Delta-Schoolcraft ISD, Dickinson-Iron ISD, Eastern Upper Peninsula ISD, Gogebic-Ontonagon ISD, Marquette-Alger RESA and Menominee County ISD.

Region 2. Alpena-Montmorency-Alcona ESD, Charlevoix- Emmet ISD, Cheboygan-Otsego-Presque Isle ESD, COOR ISD, Iosco RESA, Manistee ISD, Northwest Education Services and Wexford-Missaukee ISD.

Region 3. Ionia County ISD, Kent ISD, Mecosta-Osceola ISD, Montcalm Area ISD, Muskegon Area ISD, Newaygo County RESA, Ottawa Area ISD and West Shore ESD.

Region 4. Bay-Arenac ISD, Clare-Gladwin RESD, Clinton County RESA, Gratiot-Isabella RESD, Midland County ESA, Saginaw ISD and Shiawassee RESD.

Region 5. Genesee ISD, Huron ISD, Lapeer County ISD, Sanilac ISD, St. Clair County RESA and Tuscola ISD.

Region 6. Allegan Area ESA, Barry ISD, Berrien RESA, Branch ISD, Calhoun ISD, Heritage Southwest ISD, Kalamazoo RESA, St. Joseph County ISD and Van Buren ISD.

Region 7. Eaton RESA, Hillsdale County ISD, Ingham ISD, Jackson County ISD, Lenawee ISD, Livingston ESA, Monroe County ISD and Washtenaw ISD.

Region 8. Macomb ISD, Oakland Schools and Wayne RESA.

Active members shall also be divided into the following seven groups based on pupil membership.

Group I All intermediate districts;

Group II School districts with a pupil membership of 0 - 1,400;

Group III School districts with a pupil membership of 1,401 - 2,500;

Group IV School districts with a pupil membership of 2,501 - 5,000;

Group V School districts with a pupil membership of 5,001 - 11,000;

Group VI School districts with a pupil membership of 11,001 - 40,000; and

Group VII School districts with a pupil membership more than 40,000.

Board of Directors' Elections—Candidate Information and Email Voting Procedures

This year, five seats on the MASB Board of Directors are up for election.

The MASB Board of Directors is comprised of 22 members, including three at-large directors. Sixteen directors shall be elected from the eight regions, with two elected from each region; and one director per group shall be elected from Groups V, VI and VII. Directors are elected by active member school boards and, each year, several seats are up for election. The MASB President will nominate a member to serve as an at-large director, subject to Board approval.

Board Limitations:

Article VIII, Section 6 of the MASB Bylaws permits only one director to be elected or appointed from any one local or intermediate school district board.

According to MASB Bylaws Article VIII, Section 8, if any nomination for the Board of Directors is unopposed, the Board of Directors shall declare the unopposed candidate elected without conducting an election for the uncontested group or region.

This year, the following seats on the MASB Board are up for election (one seat each, three-year terms unless otherwise noted): Regions 3, 4, 7, 8 and Group VI. If you're unsure of your district's region or group, please see the list on page 2.

Region 3 will continue to be represented by John Siemion, Ottawa Area ISD, (unopposed, no ballots will be sent)

- **Group VI will be represented by Marc Siegler, Walled Lake Consolidated Schools, (unopposed, no ballots will be sent)**

Voting in Regions 4, 7, and 8 will take place via an online ballot. No local district/ISD funds can be used to campaign for anyone running for a seat. To help your board make an informed decision, the following pages contain background information and statements from each of the candidates.

Each district received ONE ballot, which was emailed to the superintendent secretary on record with MASB on Jan. 28, 2022. These ballots **CANNOT** be forwarded to anyone else. Once your board makes a decision on which candidate it wishes to vote for, please convey this information to your superintendent secretary.

Completed ballots must be submitted and confirmed by the superintendent secretary by **1 p.m. on Wednesday, March 2, 2022.**

Electronic voting is a two-step process:

Step 1 = Submit ballot.

Step 2 = Confirm ballot has been submitted.

Unofficial election results will be available on the voicemail recording at 517.327.5915 as soon as possible, but generally after 2 p.m. on the deadline date. They will also be sent out via email that afternoon. Official results will be approved at the March 18, 2022 Board of Directors' meeting, which newly elected directors should plan to attend.

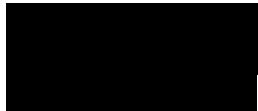
