4.2. School Spotlight: Stayton Elementary

The Stayton Elementary Principal, Wendy Moore, was joined by her Dean of Students, Shealon Cooper, and additional staff, including Ally Hill, Christy Fleming, Danny McKibben, Show-Mei Clark, Ashley Hansen, and Meghan Smatlan. Their presentations focused on three primary areas: Social-Emotional Learning (SEL), attendance, and academic growth in math and reading.

They spoke about the school's shift to the *Wayfinder* curriculum, which focuses on self-awareness, adaptability, empathy, collaboration, agency, and purpose. They also reported on school-wide efforts to reduce chronic absenteeism. They emphasized the strategies' positive impact by comparing current second-grade attendance data with rates from when they were in Kindergarten. They also reviewed the recent gains in math and reading assessment scores following the adoption of new curricula and targeted teacher training. Their presentation can be viewed below:

Sublimity - NSSD Student Reps presenting at a recent Sublimity City Council meeting, opening of new playground, and the city's work with Stayton officials regarding the Detroit Lake drawdown.

Lyons – new lights being installed at the new school crosswalk.

8. TEACHING & LEARNING REPORT: Nicole Duncan

Nicole Duncan and Vicky Storey reported on how teachers are successfully implementing *Renaissance Star* as a district-wide interim assessment tool, moving away from relying solely on state assessment data from the previous year. This shift provides teachers with real-time insights into student learning that can help them pivot when needed to focus on specific skills. Current data shows promising trends, particularly in literacy, where mid-year assessments indicate that approximately 50.8% of students are meeting benchmarks—a significant 20% increase over previous year-end state scores. While math proficiency is trending upward at a slower pace, they emphasized that there was an intentional, gradual rollout to ensure teachers were not overwhelmed as they learned new curriculum and reporting tools. 10. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Lee W. Loving

Key points included:

- Unified Basketball: SHS hosted its first-ever unified basketball scrimmage.
- Booster Club Auction: The event raised approx. \$273,000 for student activities and athletics.
- Santiam Sports Complex: The “paddle raise” secured \$130,000 for a community-led proposal for the high school property. Phases 1 & 2 focus on creating two regulation turf soccer fields (one dual-lined for football), turf JV baseball and softball fields, adding a walking path around the turf fields, and expanding parking. Phases 3 & 4 include adding dedicated parking for tennis and varsity baseball, and eventually replacing the main field stadium.
- State Funding Advocacy: He joined 45 other superintendents to advocate for the legislature to access the Education Stability Fund. This move could provide approximately \$100 million for education, potentially keeping the district "whole" for the 26-27 school year.
- SHS Graduation Rates: The Class of 2025’s four-year graduation rate was 97.2%. The rate for Students with Disabilities was at 88.9%, which is a 10.3% increase from 2024. The “Completer Rate” for the Class of 2024 (students who earned a diploma or GED after June 2024) reached a record high of 97.7%.
- Staff Engagement: He hosted well-attended Q&A sessions during recent classified and certified in-service days to improve accessibility and address staff concerns directly.
- Budget: Planning is underway to manage increased PERS rates and fluctuating student enrollment.
- Facilities Planning: The Long-Range Facilities Committee held its first session with 24 of 26 members present. The next meeting is scheduled at Sublimity School on Feb. 23, 2026, at 6:30 PM to review state facility assessments and enrollment projections.

Mid-Year Goals Conferences

Discussion Focus

How are you using student achievement data to track student progress through multiple opportunities for practice, assessment, and intervention?

Do you have a way to track you and your students journey throughout the year on your goals as they seek to master the most important skills/standards?



Simple - Avoid too much “noisy” data that is hard to interpret. Focus on finding data that shows evidence of student learning on a specific skill or standard.

Relevant - Is this data I can teach to? Does it give me a “yes” or “no” regarding whether the student has the skill?

Consistent - If data collection is the same at several points in the year, it's easy to see growth or sound the alarm when students are not growing.

Organized - Keep your data in one spot so that you can follow your own efforts to intervene throughout the year. A spreadsheet with multiple checkpoints and intervention windows can tell the story of the entire journey and demonstrates all aspects of the PDSA cycle!

Feasible - Data collection should not create an unsustainable amount of additional work. Be creative and find ways to tie this in with your regular grading practices.





UFLI and the Science of Reading

University of Florida Literacy Institute

Things to Know:

- Reading is not a natural process like speaking
- Reading requires explicit, systematic instruction
- Orthographic mapping - the process the brain uses to turn a new word into a “sight word”²¹

“It’s not about memorizing a huge bank of whole words; it’s making letter-sound relationships become automatic.” - Amanda Vinson

- The goal is “automaticity,” where the student no longer has to think about the sound.

*As a Tier I approach, the goal is to ensure that no student has gaps in their foundational knowledge

UFLI and the Science of Reading

Components of a UFLI Lesson

Each lesson has 8 steps that are typically spread over 2 days

1. Phonemic Awareness (Oral Warm-Up)
2. Visual Drill
3. Auditory Drill
4. Blending Drill
5. New Concept
6. Word Work
7. Irregular Words
8. Connected Text




Updates:

Social Emotional Learning: Wayfinder Implementation and Waypoints

Wayfinder is a comprehensive Social Emotional Learning curriculum that includes curated lessons designed to help students build core life skills, purpose, and a sense of belonging. Our implementation focuses on integrating academics and SEL to equip students with the social and emotional tools necessary for long-term success.


Core Components of Wayfinder

- **Core Lessons:** A structured curriculum that covers essential life skills tailored to different grade levels.
- **Activity Library:** A versatile collection of exercises that educators can use to reinforce key concepts in various settings.
- **Waypoints:** A data-driven assessment tool used to track student growth and identify areas where additional support is needed.



Implementation Overview: Our current stats show that Wayfinder is an active part of the school day:

- **Active Users:** We currently have **2,171 active users** across the district.
- **Instructional Volume:** Educators have viewed **3,771 Core Lessons** (an average of 19 per active educator) and **3,255 Activities** (an average of 17 per active educator).
- **Collaborative Culture:** Staff members have shared **814 Lessons & Activities**, showing a high level of peer-to-peer professional collaboration.



Content Trends: What's Resonating? The most-viewed content gives us a window into the current "pulse" of our classrooms. The top lessons currently being utilized are:

- **Wayfinder Ways (Workbooks 3, 4, and 5):** Focused on applying core values to everyday life.
- **Feelings for All (Workbooks K, 1, and 2):** High engagement in early elementary for identifying and expressing emotions.
- **Hand Signal Check-In:** The #1 most used [Activity](#), which helps teachers quickly gauge student energy and Agency at the start of class.

Waypoints Data Analysis: The Waypoints system allows us to monitor student progress through both Student-Reported and Educator-Observed assessments. We are currently utilizing the Summative Waypoints to track high-level growth across the district. Here is the recent data pull (March 2026),

Next Steps

- **Finish the Spring Benchmarks:** Our main priority is getting these final check-ins done so we can see the full year of growth.
- **Review results by cohort and Schools:** What are we seeing in student trends at specific grade levels and schools?
- **Move beyond core skills:** Dive deeper into developing the microskills of the core skills (see image below).
- **Focus on the High-Risk Group:** About **7 - 8% of our students** are still in the "High Risk" tier. We need to focus on more targeted, small-group work for these students rather than relying solely on general classroom lessons.



As we look toward the end of the year, our goal is to move beyond just "using the platform" and start using these insights to drive our support strategies. By focusing on the core skills students need to

navigate life after graduation, we want our students to leave our district not just with an education but with the character and agency to find their own path.

Graduation Requirements

Effective October 1, 2026, for the Class of 2027 and beyond

The Board will establish graduation requirements for awarding diplomas and certificates of attendance that meet or exceed state requirements.

A student may satisfy graduation requirements in less than four (4) years. The district will award a diploma to a student who fulfills graduation requirements in less than four (4) years, provided that consent is provided by the student's parent/guardian or by the student if they are 18+ years of age or emancipated

Stayton High School Academic Honors Diploma

Students who intend to apply to a college or university after graduation should consider the Academic Honors Diploma. Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit, and other Advanced courses are more rigorous than standard courses. They are intended to prepare students for more challenging college classes and, in some cases, to earn college credit. Honors/AP courses also help demonstrate academic excellence for secondary education entrance applications.

To graduate with an Academic Honors Diploma, a student must earn a minimum of 26 credits and have:

1. Completed the requirements for a Stayton High School Standard Diploma (listed in the next section);
2. At least ten (10) credits in courses designated Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit, and/or Advanced courses. A list of the available courses designated as Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit, and/or Advanced for the current school year can be found in the High School Curriculum Guide, available on the school's website and in the counseling office.
 - a. Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit, and/or Advanced credit will not be:
 - (1) Issued for any regularly scheduled class(es) taken on an independent study basis;
 - (2) Counted for any class taken before ninth grade.

Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit, and/or other Advanced credit can be authorized for certain classes taken at an accredited college or university, provided prior consent of an administrator is obtained, and all requirements are met.

3. A Grade Point Average (GPA) of three and one-half (3.50) or better after seven (7) semesters;

4. A minimum of five (5) graded classes each term for all four (4) years. This does not include Pass/No Pass classes (e.g., teacher aide, peer tutor); however, it does include Advanced or College Prep credits earned at other accredited public high schools.
5. Attended high school for eight (8) complete semesters.
6. [Two (2.0) credits of the same World Language (beginning with the class of 2028)]
7. [One (1.0) credit of additional Math or Science (Student Choice) (beginning with the class of 2028)]

The Academic Honors Diploma Committee – consisting of two (2) counselors, the principal (or their designee), and two (2) licensed teachers – will designate all Advanced courses at the beginning of every school year. The Academic Honors Diploma Committee will review each transfer student's transcript to determine eligibility.

Students participating in the Early College program may be considered eligible for the Academic Honors Diploma on an individual basis with approval from the principal.

Stayton High School Standard Diploma

A Stayton High School Standard diploma will be awarded to students in grades nine (9) through twelve (12) who earn a minimum of twenty-four (24) credits, which include at least:

1. Three (3.0) credits in mathematics (must include Algebra I or above);
2. Four (4.0) credits in language arts;
3. Three (3.0) credits in science; (two (2.0) or more of which are required to be lab-based.)
4. Three (3.0) credits in social sciences (which shall include one-half (0.5) credit of U.S. Civics in addition to at least two and one-half (2.5) credits aligned to the Oregon State Board adopted standards for U.S. and World History, Geography, Economics, and Financial Literacy);
5. One-half (0.5) credit in higher education and career path skills¹;
6. One-half (0.5) credit in personal financial education;
7. One (1.0) credit in health education;
8. One (1.0) credit in physical education; and
9. Three (3.0) credits in Career and Technical Education (CTE), the arts, and/or world language² (credits shall be earned in any one area or a combination of areas).

¹ Higher education and career path skills becomes a one-half credit graduation requirement for students who were first enrolled in grade 9 during the 2023-2024 school year or first enrolled in grade 9 in any subsequent school year (a requirement for a high school diploma awarded on or after January 1, 2027; a district may request a one-year waiver in accordance with law).

² “World languages” includes sign language, heritage languages and languages other than a student’s primary language.

The district shall offer students credit options provided that the method for obtaining such credits is described in the student’s personal education plan, and the credit is earned by meeting the requirements described in Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 581-022-2025.

To receive a Standard diploma, in addition to the credit requirements, as outlined above, a student must:

1. ³Demonstrate proficiency in the Essential Skills of reading, writing, and applying mathematics in a variety of settings; applied math (OAR 581-022-2115);
2. Develop an education plan and build an education profile;
3. Demonstrate extended application of standards through a collection of evidence (or include evidence in existing collections); and
4. Participate in career-related learning experiences.

Modified Diploma

A Modified Diploma will be awarded only to students who have demonstrated the inability to meet the full set of academic content standards adopted by the State Board of Education for a high school diploma while receiving reasonable modifications and accommodations. A Modified diploma may only be awarded to a student who meets the eligibility criteria below and other criteria, if applicable, outlined in OAR 581-022-2010 (3):

1. The student has a documented history of an inability to maintain grade-level achievement due to significant learning and instructional barriers; or
2. The student has a documented medical condition that creates a barrier to achievement.

Having met the above eligibility criteria, a Modified diploma will be awarded to students who, while in grade nine (9) through completion of high school, complete twenty-four (24) credits. The course credits outlined below in items 1-9 are required by law and account for thirteen (13) of the required twenty-four (24) credits.

1. Three (3.0) credits in language arts;
2. Two (2.0) credits in mathematics;
3. Two (2.0) credits in science;
4. Two (2.0) credits in social sciences (which may include Civics, History, Geography, and Economics);

³ The State Board of Education has waived this requirement in Essential Skills for students graduating through the 2027-2028 school year.

5. One-half (0.5) credit in personal financial education⁴;
6. One-half (0.5) credit in higher education and career path skills⁵;
7. One (1.0) credit in health education;
8. One (1.0) credit in physical education; and
9. One (1.0) credit in Career Technical Education (CTE), the arts, or world languages (credits may be earned in any one or a combination).

Students may earn additional credits for a Modified diploma pursuant to OAR 581-022-2010.

In addition to credit requirements as outlined in OAR 581-022-2010, a student must:

1. Demonstrate proficiency in the Essential Skills of reading, writing, and applying mathematics in a variety of settings⁶;
2. Develop an education plan and build an education profile; and
3. Demonstrate extended application of standards through a collection of evidence (or include evidence in existing collection(s)).

Districts may make modifications to the assessment for students who seek a Modified diploma when the following conditions are met:

1. For a student on an individualized education program (IEP) or Section 504 plan, any modifications to work samples must be consistent with the requirements established in the IEP or 504 plan. Modifications include practices and procedures that compromise the intent of the assessment through a change in the achievement level, construct, learning expectations, or content that is to be measured, grade-level standard, or measured outcome of the assessment. This means that IEP or 504 school teams responsible for approving modifications for a student's assessment may adjust the administration of the assessment and/or the assessment's achievement standard. The IEP or 504 team must inform the student's parent that the use of a modification on an assessment will result in an invalid assessment.
2. For a student not on an IEP or 504 plan, any modifications to work samples must have been provided to the student during their instruction in the content area to be assessed, and in the year in which the student is being assessed. Modifications must be approved by the school team that is responsible for monitoring the student's progress toward the Modified diploma.

Students not on an IEP or a Section 504 Plan may not receive a modified statewide OSAS assessment.

⁴ This unit of credit applies to all students who are awarded a Modified diploma on or after January 1, 2027.

⁵ This unit of credit applies to all students who are awarded a Modified diploma on or after January 1, 2027.

⁶ The State Board of Education has waived this requirement in Essential Skills for students graduating through the 2027-2028 school year.

A student's school team (which must include the student and a parent/guardian of the student) shall decide if a student will work toward a Modified diploma no earlier than the end of grade six and no later than two years before the student's anticipated exit from high school.

A student's school team may decide to revise a Modified Diploma decision.

A student's school team may decide that a student who was not previously working toward a Modified diploma should work toward one when the student is less than two years from the anticipated exit from high school if the documented history has changed.

For students with a documented history as described above, the district shall annually provide the parents or guardians of students, beginning in grade five or after such documented history has been established, the following:

1. Information about the availability of high school diplomas, modified diplomas, and the requirements for such diplomas; and
2. A disclosure that students awarded a certificate of attendance will not be counted as a high school graduate in any reporting for the State or district, and that such students awarded a certificate of attendance may not indicate they received a high school diploma on applications for employment, military service, financial aid, admittance to an institution of higher education, or any other purpose.

Essential Skills Assessments for English Language Learners⁷

The district will allow English Language Learner (ELL) students to demonstrate proficiency in Essential Skills in the student's language of origin to earn a high school diploma or a Modified diploma.

The district will develop procedures to provide local performance assessment options as described in the *Local Performance Assessment Manual*, in the ELL student's language of origin, and will develop procedures to ensure that locally scored assessment options administered in an ELL student's language of origin are scored by a qualified rater.

Essential Skills Assessments for English Language Learners Appeal

The district will follow Board policy KL - Public Complaints in the event of an appeal for the denial of a diploma based on the Essential Skills graduation requirement. The district will retain student work samples and student performance data to ensure that sufficient evidence is available in the event of an appeal.

Extended Diploma

An Extended diploma will be awarded only to students who have demonstrated the inability to meet the full set of academic content standards adopted by the State Board of Education for a high school diploma while receiving reasonable modifications and accommodations.

⁷ OAR 581-022-2120(2) requires districts to have "policy whether to allow ELL students to demonstrate proficiency in all required Essential Skills in the students' language of origin. OAR 581-022-2120(4) waives this requirement through the 2027-28 school year.

To be eligible for an Extended diploma, a student must:

1. While in grade nine (9) through completion of high school, complete twelve (12) credits, which may not include more than six (6) credits in a self-contained special education classroom, and will include:
 - a. Two (2.0) credits in mathematics;
 - b. Two (2.0) credits in language arts;
 - c. Two (2.0) credits in science;
 - d. Three (3.0) credits in civics, history, geography, or economics;
 - e. One (1.0) credit in health education;
 - f. One (1.0) credit in physical education; and
 - g. One (1.0) credit in the arts or a world language; and
2. Have a documented history of:
 - a. An inability to maintain grade-level achievement due to significant learning and instructional barriers;
 - b. A medical condition that creates a barrier to achievement or
 - c. A change in the student's ability to participate in grade-level activities as a result of a serious illness or injury that occurred after grade eight.

For students with a documented history, the district shall annually provide the parents or guardians of such students, beginning in grade five or after such documented history has been established, the following:

1. Information about the availability of high school diplomas, modified diplomas, and the requirements for such diplomas; and
2. A disclosure that students awarded a certificate of attendance will not be counted as a high school graduate in any reporting for the state or district, and that such students awarded a certificate of attendance may not indicate they received a high school diploma on applications for employment, military service, financial aid, admittance to an institution of higher education, or any other purpose.

Certificate of Attendance

A certificate of attendance⁸ will be awarded to students who:

1. Have maintained regular full-time attendance⁹ for at least four years beginning in grade nine;
2. Do not satisfy requirements for a high school diploma, Modified diploma, or Extended diploma; and

⁸ A student who began grade 9 before July 1, 2020, may be awarded an alternative certificate if the student satisfies the requirements for an alternative certificate which are in effect on the day before July 1, 2024.

⁹ "Regular full-time attendance" means not being absent for more than 10 percent of school days that the student is enrolled in a school year. See OAR 581-020-0631 for definition of chronic absenteeism. Excused absences will not be counted against a student.

3. Have a documented history¹⁰.

For students with a documented history, the district shall annually provide the parents or guardians of such students, beginning in grade five or after such a documented history has been established, the following:

1. Information about the availability of high school diplomas, modified diplomas, and the requirements for the diplomas; and
2. A disclosure that students awarded a certificate of attendance will not be counted as a high school graduate in any required reporting for the State or district and that such students awarded a certificate of attendance may not indicate they received a high school diploma on applications for employment, military service, financial aid, admittance to an institution of higher education or any other purpose.

Other District Responsibilities

The district will ensure that all students have on-site access to the appropriate resources and courses to earn the diplomas offered. The district will provide age-appropriate and developmentally appropriate literacy instruction to all students until graduation.

The district may not deny a student who has the documented history listed under the Modified diploma or Extended diploma requirements outlined above the opportunity to pursue a diploma with more rigorous requirements, for the sole reason that the student has the documented history.

The district may award a Modified diploma or an Extended diploma to a student only upon the written consent of a student who is an emancipated minor or who has reached the age of eighteen (18) at the time the Modified or Extended diploma is awarded, or the student's parent or guardian. The district must receive the written consent during the school year in which the Modified diploma or Extended diploma is awarded.

A student shall have the opportunity to satisfy the requirements for a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, or a certificate of attendance in the later of four (4) years after starting grade nine (9), or until the student reaches the age of twenty-one (21) years if the student is entitled to a public education until the age of twenty-one (21) under state or federal law.

A student may complete the requirements for a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, or a certificate of attendance in less than four years but not less than three years. To satisfy the requirements for a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, or a certificate of attendance in less than four (4) years, the student's parent or guardian or a student who is emancipated or has reached the age of eighteen (18) must provide written consent that clearly states the parent, guardian or student is waiving the fourth year and/or years until the student reaches the age of twenty-one (21). A copy of the consent will be forwarded to the district superintendent, who will annually report to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the number of such consents.

¹⁰ "Documented history" means evidence in the cumulative record and education plans of a student that demonstrates the inability over time to maintain grade level achievement even with appropriate modifications and accommodations.

A student who qualifies to receive or receives a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, or a certificate of attendance shall have the option of participating in a high school graduation ceremony with the student's class.

A student who receives a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, or a certificate of attendance shall have access to instructional hours, hours of transition services, and hours of other services that are designed to meet the unique needs of the student. When added together, the district will provide a total number of hours of instruction and services to the student that equals at least the total number of instructional hours required for students attending a public high school. The district may not unilaterally reduce the total number of hours of instruction and services to which the student has access, regardless of the age of the student.

The district will award to students with disabilities a document certifying successful completion of program requirements. No document issued to students with disabilities educated in full or in part in a special education program shall indicate that the document is issued by such a program. When a student with an IEP completes high school, the district will give the student an individualized summary of performance.

Eligible students with disabilities are entitled to a free appropriate public education (FAPE) until the age of twenty-one (21), even if they have earned a Modified diploma, an Extended diploma, a certificate of attendance, or completion of a General Education Development document. The continuation of services for students with disabilities for a Modified Diploma, Extended diploma, or certificate of attendance is contingent on the IEP team determining the student's continued eligibility and that special education services are needed.

Students and their parents will be notified of graduation and diploma requirements.

The district may not deny a diploma to a student who has opted out of statewide assessments if the student satisfies all other requirements for the diploma. Students may opt out of the Oregon statewide assessments (OSAS) in language arts and/or mathematics by completing the Oregon Department of Education's Opt-out Form¹¹ and submitting the form to the district prior to the deadline.

The district will issue a high school diploma to a veteran if the veteran resides within the boundaries of the district or is an Oregon resident and attended a high school of the district, or to a deceased veteran, upon request from a representative of the veteran, if the deceased veteran resided within the boundaries of the district at the time of death or was an Oregon resident at the time of death and attended a high school of the district.

Student-initiated test impropriety is prohibited. A student who engages in an act of student-initiated test impropriety will be subject to disciplinary action. "Student-initiated test impropriety" means student conduct that is inconsistent with the *Test Administration Manual* or accompanying guidance or results in a score that is invalid.

Summary

The suggested changes are to bring the policy into alignment with district practices which now includes a documentation requirement when an employee misses three consecutive workdays. The policy was presented for a first reading in the February 2026 meeting. In response to a suggestion from the Board, the HR Dept. elected to revise multiple paragraphs for better readability. It is being re-submitted for a new 1st reading along with an additional policy regarding staff leave: GCBDA-Family and Medical Leave.

~~Leave entitlement for personal illness or injury will accrue at the rate of 10 days each year as provided by Oregon Revised Statute. Twelve-month employees will accrue 1 day per month or 12 days each year.~~

In accordance with state law, ~~this leave will accumulate without limit~~ all school employees accrue sick leave for personal illness or injury at a rate of 10 days per school year or one day per month employed, whichever is greater.

- Twelve-month employees accrue 12 days per year (one day per month).
- Mid-year hires will receive a prorated allotment based on their start date.

Sick leave not taken accumulates without limit. This policy runs concurrently with the Oregon Paid Sick Time law, where applicable.

~~The district reserves the right to require proof of personal illness or injury from all employees, including a medical examination by a physician chosen and paid for by the district. Any employee refusing to submit to such an examination or to provide other evidence as required by the district shall be refused the use of accumulated sick leave for such alleged illness.~~

Personal sick leave exceeding three consecutive workdays requires documentation from the employee's attending physician, naturopathic physician, or practitioner. This documentation must certify that the illness or injury prevents the employee from working and, if applicable, specify any necessary accommodations required for a return to duty.

Any employee who refuses to provide the required medical documentation or fitness-for-duty evidence shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

All medical information will be kept confidential, in a separate file from personnel records, and released only in accordance with the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act or other applicable law.

If ~~s~~Sickness or other unavoidable circumstances **which** prevent a teacher from teaching 20 school days immediately following exhaustion of sick leave accumulated under Oregon law, **the Superintendent will recommend that the Board place will result in the teacher being placed on unpaid leave for the remainder of the school year or until the sickness/circumstances resolve teacher's disability is removed and they are he/she is able to return to work and perform the essential functions of their position.** If the teacher is still unable to return to work ~~as of~~ **by** the following August 1, the Board may terminate the teacher's employment.

All district-paid employee benefits, such as health and dental insurance, will cease on the last day of the month in which employment is terminated, or the staff member is placed on unpaid leave, unless the unpaid leave is in conjunction with state or federal ~~law family medical leave~~. The staff member will be informed **by the Oregon Educators Benefit Board (OEBB) of their his/her** rights to remain a part of the district benefit plan at personal expense, ~~unless otherwise agreed to in a collective bargaining unit.~~

~~Any worker who has sustained a compensable personal injury or illness and is disabled and is unable to perform his/her essential job function will be reemployed at such time as a physician issues a fitness for duty. Such rights of reemployment are subject to seniority rights and other restrictions of the collective bargaining agreement between the employer and employee bargaining unit.~~

Summary

These changes are to align the policy with rule changes regarding leave. In particular, those rules governing which conditions qualify for leave under the Oregon Family Leave Act (OFLA) and Paid Leave Oregon (PLO). While these leave allotments used to run concurrently in many situations, they can no longer be taken concurrently.

When applicable, the district will comply with the provisions of the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA), the Oregon Family Leave Act (OFLA), the Oregon Military Family Leave Act (OMFLA), Paid Leave Oregon (PLO) ~~Family Medical Leave Insurance (PFMLI)~~ and other applicable provisions of state and federal law, Board policies and collective bargaining agreements regarding family medical leave.

In order for an employee to be eligible for the benefits under FMLA, the employee must have been employed by the district for at least 12 months, have worked at least 1,250 hours during the past 12-month period and ~~works~~ worked at a worksite that employs 50 ~~or more~~ district employees within 75 miles of the worksite.

Generally, in order for an employee to be eligible for the benefits under OFLA, the employee must work an average of 25 hours or more per week during the 180 calendar days immediately prior to the first day of the start of the requested leave. ~~For parental leave purposes, an employee becomes eligible upon completing at least 180 calendar days immediately preceding the date on which the parental leave begins; there is no minimum average number of hours worked per week.~~ Special requirements apply during public health emergencies.

OMFLA applies to employees who work an average of at least 20 hours per week; there is no minimum number of days worked when determining an employee's eligibility for OMFLA.

~~PLO/PMFLI~~ is generally available to district employees who have earned \$1,000 in subject wages or taxable income during the alternate or base years¹, contributed to the ~~PLO/PMFLI~~ fund in the alternate or base years and are otherwise eligible.² PLO can be taken for family leave, medical leave or safe leave.³ Leave taken under OFLA is in addition to leave taken under PLO and cannot be taken concurrently; however, OFLA leave or PLO may run concurrently with leave available under ORS 653.601 - 653.661,

¹ The wages are not required to have been earned for work in the district.

FMLA, and other types of leave if provided by the district. Any leave taken under PLO must be taken concurrently with any leave taken under FMLA when for the same purpose.

The superintendent or designee will develop administrative regulations as necessary for the implementation of the provisions of both federal and state law.

~~As of September 2023, all applicable leave provided by the district is facilitated by North Santiam’s third party administrator, American Fidelity. American Fidelity abides by all Federal and State regulations as to what qualifies for each respective leave type (FMLA, OFLA, OMFLA, PMFLI, etc.).~~¶

During election years when there are no newly elected board members, the organizational items may be performed in June if the Board chooses to hold a work session in July (no business items) or skip the July meeting all together.

During election years when new members are seated, the organizational meeting must occur in July.

During non-election years, the meeting can occur in June, July or August (7/31 deadline does not apply).
