Principal Jamie McCarty shared highlights from the 2025-26 school year. He was joined by numerous staff members including Corrie Boock, David Holcomb, Ron Rose, Olempiada Anfilofief, Ann Paterson, Christy Robinson, Kelsey Glover.

A RESOLUTION TO DESIGNATE CERTAIN FUNDS OF THE DISTRICT AS COMMITTED FOR REPORTING PURPOSES UNDER GASB 54 “FUND BALANCE REPORTING AND GOVERNMENTAL FUND TYPE DEFINITIONS” FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2025-2026

RESOLUTION 061126D

GASB 54, a ruling by the Government Accounting and Standards Board effective for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2026, requires fund balances to be reported in classifications that “comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.”

The ending balance for all funds must be designated per the following categories set forth by GASB 54:

- **Non-spendable** – Funds that cannot be spent.
- **Restricted** – Amounts subject to externally enforceable legal restrictions (imposed by grantors, contributors, governmental regulations, etc.)
- **Committed** – Amounts whose use is constrained by limitations that a government imposes upon itself.
- **Assigned** – Intended use of resources established by the governing body itself or by an official or officers to which authority is delegated by the governing body.
- **Unassigned** – Available for any purpose. (Reported only in the General Fund.)

Assignments

Authority to classify portions of the ending fund balance as Assigned is hereby granted to the Superintendent and the Business Director.

Spending as it Relates to Ending Fund Balance Policy

The Board of Directors considers the spending of restricted fund balances on purposes for which such funds can be used to occur first when funds are spent for restricted and unrestricted purposes. When unrestricted classifications of fund balance are spent, the board will consider that committed amounts will be reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Directors for North Santiam School District 29J hereby makes the following designations of 2025-2026 ending fund balances in accordance with GASB 54.

- Fund 100 – All General Fund Balances are unassigned.

 - Fund 201, Board Reserve – the Fund Balance is restricted for future needs, such as would be caused by a revenue shortfall or unanticipated expenditures.
 - Fund 202, Textbook Reserve – the Fund Balance is restricted for the purchase of textbooks/curriculum adoptions.
 - Fund 281, PERS Reserve – the Fund Balance is restricted for future increases in the PERS rates.
- Fund 300 – Debt Service Funds – the Fund Balance is restricted for the payment of principal and interest related to the associated debt offerings as designated in the 2026-2027 adopted budget.
- Fund 400 – Capital Projects Funds – the Fund Balance is restricted for those purposes stated in each fund or program as designated in the 2026-2027 adopted budget.
- Fund 600 – Internal Service Funds – the Fund Balance is committed for the purpose of unemployment claims within the District for the 2026-2027 fiscal year.
- Fund 700 – Trust and Agency Funds – the Fund Balance is restricted for the purpose of providing scholarships to graduating seniors as designated by the scholarship board for the 2026-2027 fiscal year.

In preparation for the Fall 2026 academic year, the North Santiam School District initiated an Independent Adoption cycle for instructional materials for Advanced Placement (AP) courses. This review process ensures that our advanced academic pathways align with both district standards and the [College Board AP Course Audit Frameworks](#).

Because the Oregon Department of Education does not maintain a standardized state adoption list for Advanced Placement courses, these resources fall under the state's Independent Adoption mandates, as outlined in **Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 581-022-2350** (Independent Adoptions). Following a peer, staff, and public review period that concluded on June 1, 2026, this report synthesizes community and stakeholder feedback to guide the School Board's final adoption decision.

End of Year Reflection- Goals and Interim Assessments

This year, we concentrated our continuous improvement efforts on three main areas: Literacy, Math, and Belonging (metric: Attendance). Our approach focused on using real, actionable data to inform teaching, recognize student achievements, and strengthen our systems to ensure that each child received the support they needed. Our commitments included improving our Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), implementing aligned interim assessments through Renaissance STAR, and strategically setting attendance review cycles. As we prepare for the final End-of-Year Department Design Goal Conferences on June 22nd and 23rd, we want to reflect on our progress.

One intentional structural shift for NSSD was marking our first year using a district-aligned benchmark assessment and progress-monitoring tool. Thanks to unified benchmarking with Renaissance Star, we have created a common academic language across all campuses, allowing

us to track student growth under a single framework. Furthermore, systematic quarterly data reviews with Renaissance grew our leadership team's capacity. Our leaders now have the tools to deeply understand data and directly support individual school sites in aligning their classrooms with our district-wide goals.

Our Spring 2026 data shows that these strategic investments in targeted interventions, leadership development, and PLCs are paying off. Across every subject area, we saw a major positive shift in student performance: the percentage of students scoring at the highest proficiency tier (Level 4) remained steady or increased, while the number of high-risk students requiring intensive intervention (Level 1) decreased significantly. This correlates with our core classroom instruction in Math and Literacy, which is getting stronger, while our Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions are successfully helping struggling students catch up. (**note: the Levels in this data are not correlated with OSAS)

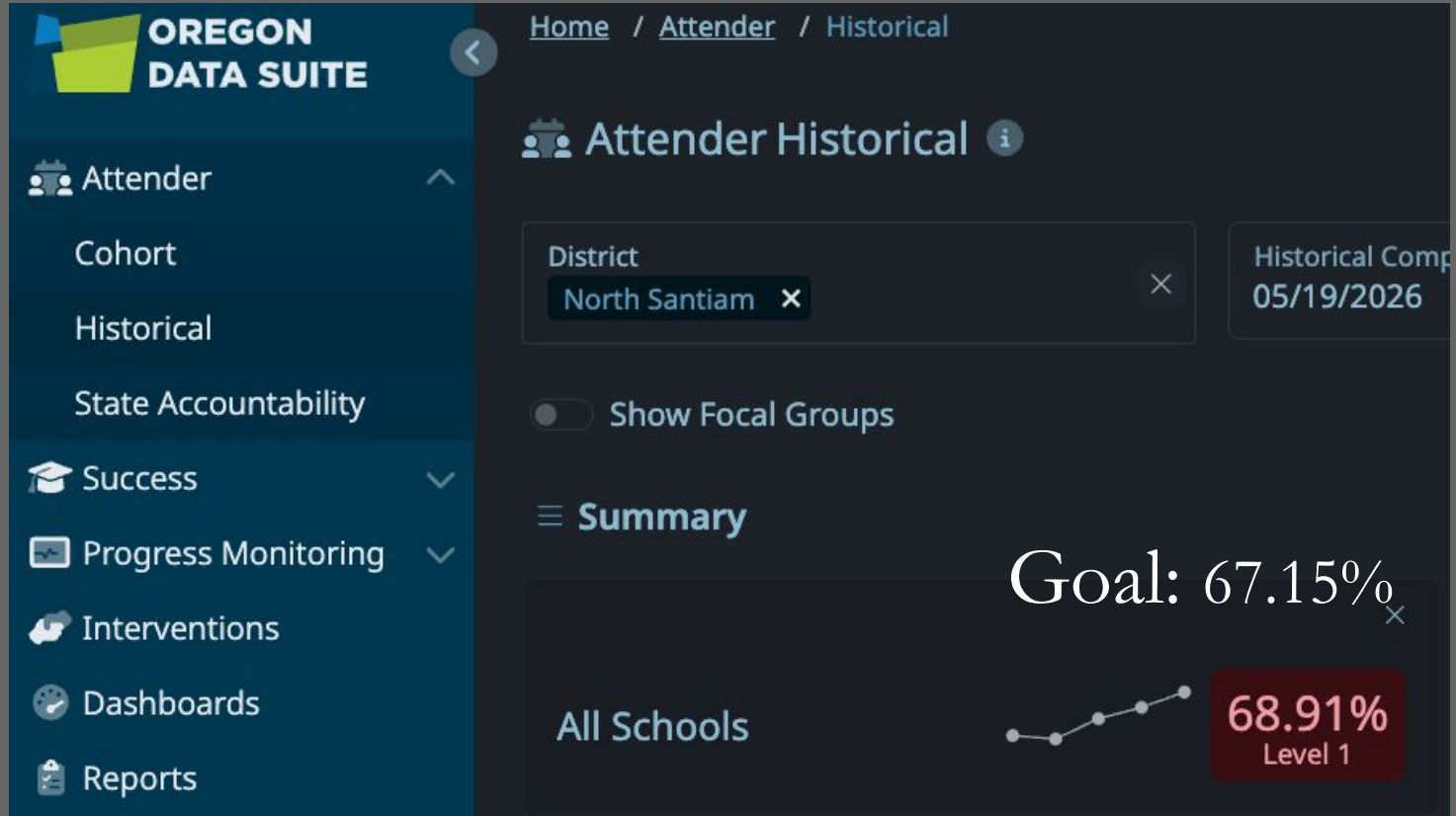

Expanded Options Program**

The Board is committed to providing additional educational options to eligible students enrolled in grades 11 and 12 to continue or complete their education, to earn concurrent high school and college credits and to gain early entry into post-secondary education. The district’s Expanded Options Program (EOP) will comply with all requirements of Oregon law (ORS 340) and give priority status to “at-risk” students.

Eligible Students

Eligible students may apply to take courses at an eligible post-secondary institution through the Expanded Options Program. ~~EOP.~~ A student is eligible for the EOP if ~~the student: he/she:ff~~

1. Is 16 years of age or older at the time of enrollment in a course under the EOP;
2. Is in grade 11 or 12 at the time of enrollment in a course under the EOP or has not yet completed the required credits to be in grade 11 or 12, but the district has allowed the student to participate in the program;
3. Has developed an educational learning plan;
4. Has not successfully completed the requirements for a high school diploma, ~~or a modified diploma.~~
A student who has graduated from high school may not participate; and
5. Is not ~~an a foreign~~ exchange student enrolled in a school under a cultural exchange program.

Student Notification

Prior to February 15 of each year, the district shall notify all high school students and the parent or guardian of students of the EOP for the following school year. The district will notify a transfer high school student, or a student returning to high school after dropping out of school, ~~dropout~~ of the EOP if the student enrolls after the district has issued the February 15 notice. The district will notify a high school student who has officially expressed an intent to participate in the EOP, and the student’s parent or guardian, of the student’s eligibility status within 20 business days of the expression of intent.

It is a priority for the district to provide information about the EOP to high school students who have dropped out of school. The district shall establish a process to identify and provide those students with information about the program. The district shall send information about the program to the last-known address of the family of the student.

The notice must include the following:

1. Financial arrangements for tuition, textbooks, equipment and materials;
2. Available transportation services;
3. The effect of enrolling in the EOP on the student's ability to complete high school graduation requirements;
4. The consequences of failing or not completing a post-secondary course;
5. Notification that participation in the EOP is contingent on acceptance by an eligible post-secondary institution; and
6. District ~~timelines~~ ~~time lines~~ affecting student eligibility and duplicate course determinations;
7. ~~Exclusion of duplicate courses as determined by the district;~~
8. ~~The process for a student to appeal the district's duplicate course determination to the Superintendent of Public Instruction or the Superintendent's designee under ORS 340.030;~~
9. ~~Exclusion of post-secondary courses in which a student is enrolled if the student is also enrolled full time in the resident high school;~~

Enrollment Process

Prior to May 15 of each year, a student who is interested in participating in the EOP shall notify the district of ~~their/her~~ intent to enroll in eligible post-secondary courses during the following school year. A high school transfer student or a student returning to high school after dropping out of school ~~dropout~~ has 20 business days from the date of enrollment to indicate interest.

The district shall review with the student and the student's parent or guardian the student's current status toward meeting all state and district graduation requirements and the applicability of the proposed eligible post-secondary course to the remaining graduation requirements.

A student who intends to participate in the EOP shall develop an educational learning plan in cooperation with an advisory support team. An advisory support team may include the student, the student's parent or guardian and a teacher or a counselor. The educational learning plan may include:

1. The student's short-term and long-term learning goals and proposed activities; and
2. The relationship of the eligible post-secondary courses proposed under the EOP and the student's learning goals.

A student who enrolls in the EOP may not enroll in eligible post-secondary courses for more than the equivalent of two academic years. A student who first enrolls in the EOP in grade 12 may not enroll in eligible post-secondary courses for more than the equivalent of one academic year. If a student first enrolls in an eligible post-secondary course in the middle of the school year, the time of participation shall be reduced proportionately. If a student is enrolled in a year-round program and begins each grade in the summer session, summer sessions are not counted against the time of participation.

Duplicate Courses

The district will establish a process to determine duplicate course designations. The district will notify an eligible student and the student's parent or guardian of any course the student wishes to take that the district determines is a duplicate course, within 20 business days after the student has submitted a list of intended courses.

A student may appeal a duplicate course determination to the Board based on evidence of the scope of the course. The Board or designee will issue a decision on the appeal within 30 business days of receipt of the appeal. If the appeal is denied by the Board or designee, the student may appeal the district's determination to the Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee under ORS 340.030.



EOP Annual Credit Hour Cap

The number of quarter credit hours that may be awarded by a high school under the EOP is limited to an amount equal to the number of students in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in the high school multiplied by a factor of 0.33. For example, the cap for a high school with 450 students in grades 9 through 12 would be 148.5 ($450 \times 0.33 = 148.5$). (The caps must be established separately for each high school.)

At the district's discretion, the district may choose to exceed both the individual high school level cap and the aggregate district level cap. If the district has more eligible students than are allowed under the credit hour cap the district shall establish a process for selecting eligible students for participation in the program. The process will give priority for participation to students who are "at risk." An "at-risk student" means: (1) a student who qualifies for a free or reduced-price lunch program; or (2) an at-risk student as defined by rules adopted by the State Board of Education if it has adopted rules to define an at-risk student.

If the district has not exceeded the credit hour cap, the district shall ensure that all eligible at-risk students are allowed to participate in the EOP and may allow eligible students who are not at-risk to participate in the program.

Post-Secondary Institution Credit

Prior to beginning an eligible post-secondary course, the district shall notify the student of the number and type of credits that the student will be granted upon successful completion of the course. If there is a dispute between the district and the student regarding the number or type of credits that the district will or has granted to a student for a particular course, the student may appeal the district's decision to the Board.

Credits granted to a student shall be counted toward high school graduation requirements and subject area requirements of the state and the district. Evidence of successful completion of each course and credits granted shall be included in the student's education record. A student shall provide the district with a copy

of the student's grade in each course taken for credit under the EOP. The student's education record shall indicate that the credits were earned at an eligible post-secondary institution.

Financial Agreement

The district shall negotiate in good faith a financial agreement with the eligible post-secondary institution for the payment of actual instructional costs associated with the student's enrollment, including tuition and fees, textbooks, equipment, and materials.

Waiver

A district may request an EOP¹ waiver from the Superintendent of Public Instruction¹ if compliance with the EOP would adversely impact the finances of the district; or if all conditions identified in ORS 340.083(1)(b) exist.

Accelerated programs are offered by the district (i.e., Dual Credit, Sponsored-Based Dual Credit, Assessment-Based Dual Credit, Articulated Career Technical Education (CTE) courses, two-plus-two programs, Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate Programs or other locally developed program that offers Accelerated College Credit to their respective high school student).~~¶

Student Reimbursement

Students are not eligible for any state student financial aid for college coursework, but students may apply to the district for reimbursement for any textbooks, fees, equipment or materials purchased by the student that are required for an eligible post-secondary course. All textbooks, fees, equipment and materials provided to a student and paid for by the district are the property of the district.

Transportation Services

The district may provide transportation services to eligible students who attend eligible post-secondary institutions within the education service district boundaries of which the district is a component district.

Special Education Services

The district of an eligible student participating in the EOP shall be responsible for providing any required special education and related services to the student. If a post-secondary institution intends to provide special education and related services to an EOP participant, the institution shall enter into a written contract with the district of the student. ~~The contract shall include the following at a minimum:~~

The contract shall include the following at a minimum:

1. Allowance for the student to remain in the program during the pendency of any special education due process hearing unless the parent or guardian and district agree otherwise;

¹ Oregon Department of Education

2. Immediate notification to the district if the institution suspects that a student participating in the program may have a disability and requires special education or related services;
3. Immediate notification to the district if the student engaged in conduct that may lead to suspension or expulsion; and
4. Immediate notification to the district of any complaint made by the parent or guardian of the student regarding the student's participation in the program at the institution.

District Alternative Programs

The EOP does not affect any program, agreement or plan that existed on January 1, 2006, between the district and a post-secondary institution, which has been continued or renewed.

Any new program, agreement or plan that is developed after January 1, 2006, and is intended to provide access for public high school students to a post-secondary course, may be initiated at the discretion of the district and the post-secondary institution.

Summary

Guidance on the exclusion of students found with head lice has changed in recent years. There is now consensus among other agencies, including the National Association of School Nurses, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Oregon School Nurses Association, that recommends against excluding students with head lice or nits from the classroom. Additionally, a rule originally found in an Oregon Health Authority rule (OAR 333-019-0010) that allowed schools to create exclusionary practices for head lice has since been repealed.

Pediculosis (Head Lice)

~~The Board recognizes that district programs should be conducted in a manner that protects and enhances student and employee health and is consistent with recognized health practices. Consequently, in order to prevent the spread of pediculosis (head lice) in the school setting, district staff shall institute guidelines for classrooms that will assist in the prevention and spread of head lice. Students with suspected cases of lice will be referred to the district nurse or appropriate staff member for assessment. Parents or guardians will be notified that their child has lice. Upon returning to school, students need a note or personal contact with office staff to indicate that the student has received treatment to remove the lice.~~

~~¶~~

~~Successful treatment of head lice requires a coordinated approach and may involve the use of anti-lice products, combing and the implementation of preventative measures as recommended by health authorities. The district will provide parents of student found to have contracted head lice with treatment information. It is the district's intent to not only eliminate the current infestation, but also to prevent a repeat episode.~~

~~¶~~

~~The superintendent will develop administrative regulations, as necessary, to implement this policy.~~

A student with a suspected case of head lice may be referred to designated trained staff for a screening. The screening will be done in a confidential manner by trained personnel.

School personnel will notify the parent or guardian of a student found with head lice and may provide information on treatment. The student will be allowed to remain in school

Suggested school measures for head lice provided in [Communicable Disease Guidance for Schools](#) issued by the Oregon Department of Education and Oregon Health Authority will be consulted.

The State Board of Education adopted changes to OAR 581-026-0305 and -0310 regarding the process for parents to provide notice of their student's intention to enroll in a virtual public charter school and a school district's response.

Resident Student Denial for Virtual Public Charter School Attendance**

The district is not required to approve a transfer of a resident student, when more than three percent of the students residing in the district are attending a virtual public charter school not sponsored by the district. The district will semiannually, by October 1 and April 1, calculate the percentage of students residing in the district, who are attending a virtual public charter school not sponsored by the district. When the calculated ~~established~~ percentage is more than three percent, the district may choose not to approve a student's enrollment to ~~at the release of additional students to enroll in virtual public charter school schools,~~ subject to the requirements in Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 581-026-0305 (2).

A parent/~~guardian~~ must give notice to the district in which the parent resides of their~~of~~ intent to enroll their student in a virtual public charter school. If the calculated percentage is three percent or less, or the district sponsors the desired virtual public charter school, the district will issue a notice of approval or choose not to respond.

If the calculated percentage is more than three percent and the desired virtual public charter school is not ~~not~~ sponsored by the district, the district may issue a denial notice² within 10 calendar days of receiving an Intent to Enroll notification from a parent. ~~before enrolling their student in such a school and notice of actual enrollment.~~

¶

~~If the district is not approving the enrollment, the district must respond with a decision to not give approval within 10 calendar days of receipt of the notice of intent from the parent. Such decision must include.~~

~~The notice that the student is denied for enrollment to the virtual public charter school must include;~~

1. The percentage of students in the district that attend virtual public charter schools that are not sponsored by the district, based on the most recent calculation at the time the intent to enroll was received by the district~~recent calculations~~;
2. The right to appeal the decision to the State Board of Education;

¹ "Parent" means parent, legal guardian or person in parental relationship as defined in ORS 339.133.

² If a parent does not receive a notice of approval or disapproval from the district within 10 days of sending the notice of intent to enroll to the district, the student shall be deemed approved for enrollment by the district. (OAR 581-026-0305 (4))

3. A list of two or more other online options available to the student; and
4. A copy of OAR 581-026-0305 and OAR 581-026-0310.

When calculating the percentage, the district is only required to use data that is reasonably available to the district, including but not limited to the following for such calculation:

1. The number of students residing in the district enrolled in the schools within the district;
2. The number of students residing in the district enrolled in virtual and non-virtual public charter schools located in the district;
3. The number of students residing in the district enrolled in virtual public charter schools not sponsored by the district;
4. The number of home-schooled students residing who reside in the district and who have registered with an educational service district; and
5. The number of students residing who reside in the district enrolled in private schools located within the school district.

A parent may appeal the district's denial for a decision of a district to not approve a student enrollment to a virtual public charter school to the State Board of Education under OAR 581-026-0310.

If the student was enrolled in a virtual public charter school while living in another district and has maintained continuous enrollment in such school since moving into, and residing in this district, approval is not required.

According to [ORS 332.040](#), No later than at the next regular meeting following July 1, the district school board shall meet and organize by electing a chairperson and a vice chairperson from its members.

During election years when there are no newly elected board members, the organizational items may be performed in June if the Board chooses to hold a work session in July (no business items) or skip the July meeting all together.

During election years when new members are seated, the organizational meeting must occur in July.

During non-election years, the meeting can occur in June, July or August (7/31 deadline does not apply).

 - Approve contracts for payment (ORS 332.075(2-3) (e.g. transportation, contracts related to bond projects)
 - Establish depository(ies) for school funds. (ORS 328.441, 294.805-294.895)
 - Establish dates, time and place of regular monthly board meetings. (ORS 332.045)
 - Approve list of low-impact pesticides for use according to the integrated pest management plan ORS 634.705 (5)
 - Approve list of third-party alternative education programs (ORS 336.631)
