The property shall be retained as a public utility easement by the City; and the City shall have the right to maintain, operate, repair, and renew existing public utilities in the vacated area.

PUBLIC RECORDS REQUEST

Pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §84-712 et. seq., citizens have the right to examine, and obtain copies of Public Records that are not exempt from disclosure as set forth in Neb. Rev. Stat. §84-712.05. Citizens have a right to obtain a copy of any public record or document regardless of its physical form by making a request to the City's custodian of that record. A public record request shall be submitted in writing through the City Clerk. If the City Clerk is not the custodian of that record, the City Clerk will notify the requesting party of who the custodian of that record is, and where to make the request. The custodian of the record shall have four (4) business days as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §84-712(4) to respond to a request, and to provide the requesting party an estimate of the expected cost of the copies and either (a) access to or, if copying equipment is reasonably available, copies of the public record, (b) if there is a legal basis for denial of access or copies, a written denial of the request together with the information specified in Section 84-712.04, or (c) if the entire request cannot with reasonable good faith efforts be fulfilled within four business days after actual receipt of the request due to the significant difficulty or the extensiveness of the request, a written explanation, including the earliest practicable date for fulfilling the request, an estimate of the expected cost of any copies, and an opportunity for the requestor to modify or prioritize the items within the request.

ORDINANCE NO. 1032

AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE A PORTION OF AN EXISTING RIGHT-OF-WAY; TO TRANSFER TITLE OF SUCH VACATED PROPERTY TO THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNER; TO RETAIN A UTILITY EASEMENT; TO REPEAL ANY ORDINANCE, OR PARTS OF ANY ORDINANCE IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF SUCH ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, the Howard County Medical Center is proposing to construct a Therapy / Wellness Center addition onto the existing facility located at 1113 Sherman Street, St. Paul, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet setback requirements on the north side for the proposed project, the City of St. Paul has agreed to vacate a portion of the existing right-of-way of "M" Street, between Sherman Street and Sheridan Street to facilitate such addition to the Howard County Medical Center.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ST. PAUL, NEBRASKA, that:

SECTION 1: The following property is hereby vacated:

The southerly ten (10.0) feet of the existing eighty (80.0) foot right-of-way of "M" Street, between Sherman Street and Sheridan Street, adjoining a tract of land 264 feet – lying north of Block F, Bryan's Addition in the City of St. Paul, Howard County, Nebraska; as shown on Exhibit A attached hereto.

SECTION 2. The property vacated by Section 1 shall be retained as a public utility easement by the City of St. Paul, Nebraska; and the City shall have the right to maintain, operate, repair, and renew existing public utilities in the vacated area.

SECTION 3. The title to the property vacated by Section 1 of this Ordinance shall revert to the adjacent property owner.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance is directed to be filed in the office of the Register of Deeds for Howard County, Nebraska.

SECTION 5. Any Ordinance or parts of any Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. That this ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect after its passage, adoption, and publication as provided by law.





Monday, October 3, 2022

A meeting of the Mayor and City Council of the City of St. Paul, Nebraska was held at City Hall in said City on Monday, October 3, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. Present were Council President Katie Kowalski and Council members Jerry Thompson, Mike Feeken and Chuck Schmid. Absent: Mayor Joel M. Bergman. Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Phonograph Herald, a legal newspaper published in said City and County. Notice of the meeting was also posted in four (4) public places. Notice of this meeting was communicated in the advance notice. All proceeds thereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was opened to the attendance of the public.

Council President Kowalski opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. with the "Pledge of Allegiance" and thanking the public for attending and announcing that the City of St. Paul abides by the Open Meetings Act, which is posted on the west wall as required by Nebraska State Law §84-1407 through §84-1414. Council President Kowalski also stated that the City Council may vote to go into Closed Session on any agenda item as allowed by NE State Law §84-1410.

Individuals who have appropriate agenda items for City Council consideration should complete the "Request for Future Agenda Items" form located at the City Office. If the issue can be handled administratively without Council action, notification will be provided. If the item is scheduled for a meeting or study session, notification of the date will be given. Also, any City patrons that are requesting "Public Records" or have "Questions or Concerns" in regards to the City, they need to be submitted in writing to the City of St. Paul, so that it can be addressed appropriately. These forms are available online, in a file folder on the back wall of the Council Chambers or at the City Office.

There was an opportunity for individuals wishing to provide input on any of tonight's agenda items. Those individuals were asked to reserve time to speak; per Council President Kowalski, there will be a five (5) minute limit per person on speaking.

On Monday, September 26, 2022 the Planning Commission denied zoning permit application #2022-35 (Howard County / Howard County Medical Center), due to the project not meeting proper setback requirements on the north and west side of the hospital pursuant to Section 5.3.06 and Section 9.2.01 of the City of St. Paul's Zoning Regulations.

Council President Kowalski read the City of St. Paul's Board of Adjustment minutes dated August 22, 2013 regarding the construction of a drive-up canopy for the Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) emergency room entrance. This zoning permit was denied by the Planning Commission and the City Council, therefore it went before the variance board and was approved by the following stipulations: (1) the variance is only for the canopy project and not for the entire right-of-way; (2) if the adjacent properties are affected by the utility relocation due to the canopy project, then those properties shall be returned to the same condition as before the project. This will be done at no cost to the owner; and (3) at no time in the future shall the

canopy and drive-up entrance be enclosed to impair the visibility triangle of Sheridan Street on the north or south sides.

Jerry Woodgate, Planning Commission Chair spoke briefly on why the Commission denied the Howard County Medical Center's (HCMC) Permit application #2022-35. This is due to the Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) not meeting the 14.5 ft. setback on the north side and the 1.5 ft. setback on the west side of the medical center property and not meeting the site-triangle at the corner of Sheridan and "M" Streets. The permit is to construct a Therapy & Wellness Center in the amount of \$8 million. Mr. Woodgate stated that he has never been against the project; the Planning Commission needs to follow the St. Paul Zoning Regulations and have the permit go through the proper process, due to the Commission being a government entity.

Arlan Johnson, Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) CEO stated that this just isn't a random project; this is a project for the people. Mr. Johnson also spoke on prior meetings regarding the history of the project setbacks, the north end property utilities, parking, sidewalk placement and the agreement to relocate the City siren. Mr. Johnson also presented a Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) economic impact information sheet to the Council members that consisted of: (1) jobs provided; (2) revenue created; and (3) the State/Local tax that would be generated. Mr. Johnson stated that he wants to keep the ball rolling on the project. Mr. Johnson is requesting the support from the local government.

Jillyn Klein and Valerie Busse were in attendance to support the Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) Therapy & Wellness Center project.

Utilities Superintendent Matt Helzer and Council members had a brief discussion on vacating the south ten (10) feet of "M" Street between Sheridan and Sherman Streets to give the Howard County Medical Center (HCMC) the necessary setback that is needed on the north side of the medical center. An ordinance will be considered on Monday, October 17, 2022 pertaining to the vacating of the right-of-way.

Council member Thompson moved to deny Howard County/Howard County Medical Center's (HCMC) zoning permit application #2022-35 at 1113 Sherman Street; this is due to not meeting the north and west setbacks. The permit is to build a Therapy & Wellness Center. The permit needs to follow the proper variance channels. Council member Schmid seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson & Schmid voted aye, Council member Feeken voted nay. Motion carried 3/1.

Prior to the consideration of approving the City Consent Agenda, the Council members had withdrawn Paula Imler's zoning permit application #2022-34 regarding the installation of a fence to be located at 708 3rd Street. The Planning Commission denied the permit for the reason that corrugated steel is not allowed as fence material pursuant to Section 9.8.10 of the Zoning Regulations. After a brief discussion, Council member Feeken moved to approve the fence permit. Council member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Feeken and Thompson voted aye, Council member Schmid and Kowalski voted nay. Motion died due to a tie vote. Mayor Bergman was absent; therefore, the tie vote could not be broken.

Council member Schmid moved to approve Consent Agenda Items: (1) September 19, 2022 minutes; (2) September 26, 2022 zoning permits; and October 3, 2022 disbursements, with the stipulation that Dan Howard's claim in the amount of \$91.26 gets withdrawn from the disbursement to be explained at the next Council meeting on Monday, October 17, 2022. Council

member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Council member Feeken moved to approve the 25% Infrastructure (sales tax) fund absorbing the cost of Olsson's surveying Lot 20 of the Middle Loup Subdivision; this is to place a City Welcome sign on the land. Council member Schmid seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, Council member Thompson voted nay. Motion carried 3/1.

Council member Kowalski moved to approve sales tax absorbing the cost of the Civic Center liability (LARM) insurance in the amount of \$16,759.87. Council member Schmid seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, Council member Thompson voted nay. Motion carried 3/1. City Clerk Beck will be requesting a monthly statement from the St. Paul Development Corp. (SPDC) in keeping track of the St. Paul Civic Center revenues, expenditures and balances.

Utilities Superintendent Helzer updates: (1) the St. Paul Swimming Pool water line had a major conduit crack at the southwest zero entry side of the pool; (2) the Sewer Flusher is at Rose Equipment; the City will be receiving it this coming week; (3) Electrical Commissioner Ed Thompson, City crew and Council member Jerry Thompson was thanked for their dedicated time to the Fall Clean-up project. Two (2) loads of iron went to the Rotary iron pile; two (2) loads of trees went to the recycling tree pile and five (5) loads of garbage went to the Loup Central Landfill. The project was a success.

Council member Feeken received numerous telephone calls regarding comments pertaining to the interview committee hiring the most qualified applicants for the City sewer and water operator positions. Some of those persons made comments that there could be possible nepotism in hiring the applicants. Council member Thompson stated that he was part of the interview committee and that the committee was more thorough on one of the employee's employment application, due to a Council member being a family member. Council member Thompson stated that Council member Kowalski was not part of the interview committee for just that purpose.

Council member Schmid also thanked the Fall Clean-up crew for doing a great job, along with stating that he has been absent due to a surgery. Council member Schmid also stated that he believes that the interview committee hired the best applicants for the sewer and water operator positions.

Council President Katie Kowalski updates: (1) City received a \$700 reimbursement check from LARM for a bulletproof vest for Officer Stethem; (2) the City of St. Paul and the St. Paul Development Corp. (SPDC) is working on a Rural Workforce Housing grant to receive funds in acquiring property, receive asbestos inspections, tear down existing structures, and to eventually develop properties for affordable workforce housing. The Mayor and Council members were instructed to prioritize a list of nuisance properties that need to be addressed, due to the Rural Workforce application being due in November 2022; (3) the Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) Progress meeting that was scheduled for Wednesday, October 5, 2022 at 1:30 p.m. has been postponed to a future date; and (4) the City received a Well-field rent check from Robert Kanter in the amount of \$5,630.

Council President Kowalski adjourned the City Council meeting at 8:09 p.m.



Location and Geography

The City of St. Paul is located in central Howard County. The City of St. Paul covers an area of 1.11 square miles. The Middle Loup River flows east of the city limits. The area is not heavily forested, nor is it located in a geographic area of the state prone to landslides. Most of St. Paul lies in the sandhills and valleys topographic regions and is surrounded by agricultural fields.


Figure STP.1: City of St. Paul Jurisdictional Boundary



Demographics

The following figure displays the historical population trend from 1900 to 2019 (estimated). This figure indicates that the population of St. Paul experienced a decline from 1920 through 1960. Since 2000, however, the population has had a dramatic increase. Increasing populations are associated with increased hazard mitigation and emergency planning requirements for development. Increasing populations can also contribute to increasing tax revenues, allowing communities to pursue additional mitigation projects. The City's population accounted for 38% of Howard County's Population in 2019.

The young, elderly, minorities, and poor may be more vulnerable to certain hazards than other groups. In comparison to the County, St. Paul' population was:

- **Older.** The median age of St. Paul was 39.9 years old in 2019, compared with the County average of 43.1 years. St. Paul's population has grown older since 2010, when the median age was 42.7 years old. St. Paul had a larger proportion of people under 20 years old (28.4%) than the County (26.3%).⁶⁵
- **Less ethnically diverse.** In 2010, 1.3% of St. Paul's population was Black or African American, 0% was other races, and 0.2% were two or more races. By 2019, only 0% of St. Paul's population was two or more races. During that time, Howard County went from 0.2% to 0% American Indian, 0.0% to 1.4% other races and 0.5% to 1.6% two or more races from 2010 to 2019 respectively.⁶⁶
- **Less likely to be at the federal poverty line.** The poverty rate of all persons in St. Paul (4.9%) was lower than the County (5.9%) in 2019.⁶⁷

Employment and Economics

The community's economic base is a mixture of industries. In comparison to Howard County, St. Paul's economy had:

- **Similar mix of industries.** Employment sectors accounting for 10% or more of employment in St. Paul included Manufacturing, Retail, and Education. In comparison Howard County's included Agriculture, Manufacturing, Retail, and Education.⁶⁸
- **Higher household income.** St. Paul's median household income in 2019 (\$60,250) was about \$900 higher than the County (\$59,348).⁶⁹
- **Fewer long-distance commuters.** About 40.5% percent of workers in St. Paul commuted for fewer than 15 minutes, compared with about 36.3% of workers in Howard County. About 37.9% of workers in St. Paul commute 30 minutes or more to work, compared to about 38.0% of the County workers.⁷⁰

Major Employers

Major employers in the City of St. Paul include: Howard County Community Hospital, St. Paul Public Schools, Howard County, Brookefield Park Nursing Facility, City of St. Paul, Matelyn Retirement Community, and Howard-Greeley Rural Public Power District. The planning team noted that 75% of residents commute to Grand Island.

Housing

In comparison to the Howard County, St. Paul's housing stock was:⁷¹

- **Less owner occupied.** About 68.8% of occupied housing units in St. Paul are owner occupied compared with 76.5% of occupied housing in Howard County in 2019.
- **Smaller share of aged housing stock.** St. Paul has fewer houses built prior to 1970 than the county (30.8% compared to 51.7%).
- **More multi-family homes.** The predominant housing type in the City is single family detached and St. Paul contains more multifamily housing with five or more units per structure than the County (2.9% compared to 1.5%). About 79.7% of housing in St. Paul was single-family detached, compared with 84.6% of the County's housing. St. Paul has a smaller share of mobile and manufactured housing (1.1%) compared to the County (6.2%)

The planning team noted that there are 11 mobile homes in the community. This housing information is relevant to hazard mitigation insofar as the age of housing may indicate which housing units were built prior to state building codes being developed. Further, unoccupied housing may suggest that future development may be less likely to occur. Finally, communities with a substantial number of mobile homes may be more vulnerable to the impacts of high winds, tornadoes, and severe winter storms.

Governance

A community's governance indicates the number of boards or offices that may be available to help implement hazard mitigation actions. St. Paul has a number of offices or departments that may be involved in implementing hazard mitigation initiatives. The city has a four-member city council, mayor, and the following offices: clerk/treasurer, utility superintendent, sewage plant operator, street commissioner, zoning administrator, economic development director, volunteer fire department, and police department. Additional departments who can help with implementing hazard mitigation activities include: Howard County Emergency Management, Howard County Sheriff's Office, Howard County Department of Roads, Howard Greeley Rural Public Power District, Nebraska Department of Transportation, and Nebraska State Patrol.

Capabilities

The capability assessment consisted of a review of local existing policies, regulations, plans, and programs with hazard mitigation capabilities. The following tables summarize the jurisdiction's planning and regulatory capability; administrative and technical capability; fiscal capability; educational and outreach capability; and overall capability to implement mitigation projects.

Plan Integration

Communities have several planning documents that discuss or relate to hazard mitigation. Each applicable planning mechanism is listed below along with a short description of how it is integrated with the hazard mitigation plan. Participating jurisdictions will seek out and evaluate any opportunities to integrate the results of the current hazard mitigation plan into other planning mechanisms and updates.

Grants and Funding

The City of St. Paul's funds are able to maintain current facilities and systems with some leeway for additional projects. The city receives additional income from sales tax, KENO, and utility fees. The city does have one bond in place that is currently being paid off which provided improvements

to Howard Avenue. The city has received grants in the past to assist with project implementation including a Downtown Revitalization grant through CDBG. In the coming years the city has identified in the budget funds to renovate the council chambers and purchase a new ambulance.

Comprehensive Plan

St. Paul's Comprehensive Plan was last updated in 2015 and integrates hazard mitigation in the following ways: notes the location of floodplain areas surrounding the city which inhibit future development; encourage preservation of open space or parks in hazard-prone areas; encourages infill development; and to reduce energy use per capita.

Ordinances and Regulations

The City of St. Paul's Municipal Code is updated on an as needed basis and available to the public online. The code does not address natural hazards such as flooding or wildfire but does identify a Wellhead Protection Area for public water supply system protection. The city's Zoning Ordinance does include some development within the 100-year floodplain; however, additional building requirements are in place for these areas. The ordinance includes floodplain overlay districts, prohibits development in the floodplain unless granted a special permit, and requires a base flood elevation of at least one foot for all structures in the floodplain.

The Zoning Ordinance does identify "a community building shall be provided which shall include at a minimum a storm shelter for park residents." This facility shall be designated as a storm shelter by FEMA.

Howard County Local Emergency Operations Plan

The City of St. Paul has an annex in the Howard County Local Emergency Operations Plan (LEOP). The LEOP establishes standardized policies, plans, guidelines, and procedures for emergency resources and governmental entities to respond and recover when a disaster event occurs. It contains information regarding direction and control, communications and warning, damage assessment, emergency public information, evacuation, fire services, health and human services, law enforcement, mass care, protective shelters, and resource management. This plan is updated every five years.

Central Platte Community Wildfire Protection Plan

The Nebraska Forest Service updated the Central Platte Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP), which includes Howard County in October 2021. The purpose of the CWPP is to help effectively manage wildfires and increase collaboration and communication among organizations who manage fire. The CWPP discusses county specific historical wildfire occurrences and impacts, identifies areas most at risk from wildfires, discusses protection capabilities, and identifies wildfire mitigation strategies. This document is updated every five years.


Other Plans

St. Paul has a drought response plan that provides the city council with the authority to enact water restrictions to conserve public water supply.

Future Development Trends

St. Paul has experienced a trend of steady growth over the years. This trend will likely continue as St. Paul has residential and commercial developments planned in the near future. In the past five years, the community has added the Middle Loup Subdivision for light industrial use, MAD Development and Prairie Hills Subdivision for single family housing, demolished mobile homes and single-family houses to develop duplexes, demolished houses for commercial use, and installed several new blocks of street paving. The local planning team indicated that the census estimates are accurate, and that Dannebrog's population is increasing due to a clean community, good educational and medical facilities, and proximity to Grand Island. In the next five years, the community plans to expand pre-school options and build a new grocery store.

Community Lifelines

Transportation

St. Paul's major transportation corridors include Highway 92, which runs east-west on the north edge of the city, and US Highway 281, which runs north-south on the east side of St. Paul. Highway 92 accommodates 2,890 vehicles per day, 280 of which are heavy commercial vehicles, and Highway 281 accommodates 6,130 vehicles per day, 610 of which are heavy commercial vehicles. The Nebraska Central Railroad Company has a rail line along the eastern side of the city. This information is important to hazard mitigation plans insofar as it suggests possible evacuation corridors in the community, as well as areas more at risk to transportation incidents.

Hazardous Materials – Chemical Storage Fixed Sites

According to the Tier II System reports submitted to the Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy, there are seven chemical storage sites throughout St. Paul which house hazardous materials. In the event of a chemical spill, the local fire department and emergency response may be the first to respond to the incident. Additional response resources include the Twin Loup mutual aid and the regional hazmat team in Grand Island. The local planning team noted that response resources are insufficient and that additional training is necessary to appropriately respond to a spill event.



Hazard Prioritization

For additional discussion regarding area-wide hazards, please see *Section Four: Risk Assessment*. A full list of historical hazard occurrences can be found in the Howard County

jurisdictional profile. The hazards discussed in detail below were selected by the local planning team from the regional hazard list as the relevant hazards for the jurisdiction. The selected hazards were prioritized by the local planning team based on historical hazard occurrences, potential impacts, and the community's capabilities.

Drought

The main concern with drought in the community is related to water availability. During the summer of 2012, a drought caused a strain on the public water supply. During that drought period, water levels dropped to almost critical levels. Drought concerns the local planning team due to the demand on public water supply and the increased risk of fires. In the community, drought is defined as lack of rain and monitoring of water levels in municipal wells. Municipal wells are monitored, and all residential and commercial water use is metered. During past events the city has not had to restrict water use but can implement restrictions if necessary. The public water supply in St. Paul is monitored by a SCADA system and all commercial and residential water is metered in the community. Currently, water resources in the community are sufficient. To mitigate against this hazard the city plans to continue ongoing education through the local newspapers and social media channels.

Flooding

St. Paul has three NFIP policies in-force for \$507,500. There are no repetitive flood loss properties in the city of St. Paul. The city identified the northwest edge of town as having poor stormwater drainage and that the city built a berm to prevent flooding. Areas of the community most prone to flooding include the northwest and southeast sides of the city.

During the major flooding in 2019, Highway 281 became a main corridor for additional travelers with restricted highway access in the northern part of the state. During the event, the community experienced major erosion of the north bank of the Middle Loup River which comprises of the railroad bridge and Highway 281. The erosion threatened the city water and highway system. There was also flooding on the northwest side of town due to a small tributary of the Middle Loup River. Additional impacts from the flooding includes damage to houses, limited vehicle access in areas of the community, and lift stations constantly pumping. No evacuations were necessary. As a result of the 2019 flooding, a culvert/berm was constructed to alleviate flooding on the northwest side of town. The city also plans to research potential funding sources for additional projects and assist landowners in obtaining permits to protect riverbanks.

Hazardous Materials (Transportation)

St. Paul has an increased likelihood of chemical spills during transportation due to the proximity of Highway 92, Highway 281, and the Nebraska Central Railroad Company rail line. The local planning team indicated that ethanol, fertilizers, and other chemicals are regularly transported along these local routes. There was a recent incident that involved a car/train accident resulting in the vehicle catching fire. To mitigate against this hazard, the city plans to maintain ongoing communication with the railroad and attend pipeline training and annual training opportunities. New and current first responders in the community are in need of additional training.

Severe Thunderstorms (includes hail)

The primary concerns regarding severe thunderstorms are the potential for damages to property and infrastructure, as well as power outages. Severe thunderstorms occur several times a year

in St. Paul. According to the NCEI, thunderstorms have caused \$455,000 in property damages since 1996, and \$2,255,000 in hail damages. Weather radios are located at critical facilities. Municipal records are protected with surge protectors on electronic devices. Many critical facilities have a generator. However, the school and St. Paul civic center were identified as needing backup generators. Approximately 40% of powerlines in the community are buried. Most critical facilities are not fitted with hail resistant materials. The local planning team is continuing to look into funding sources to implement mitigation strategies in critical facilities.

Severe Winter Storms

Local concerns regarding severe winter storms focus on the shutdown of transportation routes, the inability of first responders to reach residents in need, and power outages. In February 2016, a severe winter storm dropped over 14 inches of snow onto St. Paul. According to the local planning team, there have not been any structural damages to critical facilities associated with severe winter storms in recent history. Emergency snow routes are designated by city council and published in the paper and advertised on social media channels annually.

In order to mitigate the impacts from these storms, approximately 40% of the power lines are buried. City Utilities is in charge of snow removal and snow removal resources include three snowplows, two payloaders, one road grader, four dump trucks, one skid steer, one tractor, and one UTV with a blade. The local planning team noted that the city is in need of more snowplows and updated equipment.

Tornadoes and High Winds

In 1984, an F3 tornado touched down a half mile southwest of St. Paul and moved north northeast for eight miles through the north central portions of town. At least two homes were completely destroyed and 67 were damaged. This tornadic event also destroyed sixteen buildings on the county fairgrounds. Local concerns regarding tornadoes focus on the ability to warn residents and the availability of adequate shelter. Howard County Emergency Management offers text alerts in the event of an impending tornado. The city has four warning sirens throughout town but has identified the northeast part of town as a location in need of a warning siren. The city has identified the ballfields and housing authority as locations in need of shelter. There are hazardous trees located along residential streets and the city utility department continually monitors trees that are encroaching on power lines. The city plans to continue monitoring tree health and hazards in the community and educate the public about overhanging branches.

A meeting of the Mayor and City Council of the City of St. Paul, Nebraska was held at City Hall in said City on Monday, January 3, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Joel M. Bergman and Council members Katie Kowalski, Jerry Thompson, Chuck Schmid and Mike Feeken. Absent: None. Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Phonograph Herald, a legal newspaper published in said City and County. Notice of the meeting was also posted in four (4) public places. Notice of this meeting was communicated in the advance notice. All proceeds thereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was opened to the attendance of the public.

Mayor Bergman opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. with the "Pledge of Allegiance" and thanking the public for attending and announcing that the City of St. Paul abides by the Open Meetings Act, which is posted on the west wall as required by Nebraska State Law §84-1407 through §84-1414. Mayor Bergman also stated that the City Council may vote to go into Closed Session on any agenda item as allowed by NE State Law §84-1410.

Individuals who have appropriate agenda items for City Council consideration should complete the "Request for Future Agenda Items" form located at the City Office. If the issue can be handled administratively without Council action, notification will be provided. If the item is scheduled for a meeting or study session, notification of the date will be given. Also, any City patrons that are requesting "Public Records" or have "Questions or Concerns" in regards to the City, they need to be submitted in writing to the City of St. Paul, so that it can be addressed appropriately. These forms are available online, in a file folder on the back wall of the Council Chambers or at the City Office.

There was an opportunity for individuals wishing to provide input on any of tonight's agenda items. Those individuals were asked to reserve time to speak.

Gary Hinrichs, Certified Public Accountant with Dana F. Cole & Co. provided an audit presentation regarding the City of St. Paul's Financial Statement for year ending September 30, 2021. Mr. Hinrichs stated that this was an unqualified audit, which represents a clean audit report; expenditures were within the approved budget limits. Council member Kowalski moved to approve the 2020-2021 Financial Statement from the City Auditors, Dana F. Cole & Co., Ord, NE. Council member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Council member Schmid moved to approve the City of St. Paul's 2020-2021 Financial Statement Journal Entries from City Auditors Dana F. Cole & Company, Ord, Nebraska. Council member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Council member Schmid moved to approve placing the excess Department funds from the 2020-2021 Financial Report into the ICS Accounts: (1) Police \$44,362; (2) Ambulance \$12,265; and (3) Parks \$13,201. Council member Kowalski seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Council member Kowalski moved to approve deducting \$14,541 from the Elmwood Cemetery ICS and placing it into the City Checking account. This is due to the Elmwood Cemetery shortage in the 2020-2021 Financial Statement; the shortages come from cemetery stone repair; purchase of cameras; and fencing. Council member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Brian Friedrichsen with Olsson discussed the City of St. Paul potentially requesting additional funds from the NE Dept. of Environment & Energy (NDEE) State Revolving Loan funds (SRF) pertaining to the City's Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF). Mr. Friedrichsen stated that at this time, any additional requested funds would be at an interest rate of one percent (1%). Based on a conversation Mr. Friedrichsen had with Steve McNulty with the State of Nebraska, it was recommended to wait until the project is closer to the completion date in case there are additional change orders that would either decrease or increase the project amount. By doing this, there may be a new cycle of zero percent (0%) money available. No action was taken on this agenda item. Mr. Friedrichsen is anticipating a pre-construction meeting in mid-February 2022. Construction plans are available for public review at the City office.

St. Paul Fire Chief Mike Becker provided justification for purchasing an "equipment and command" vehicle for the St. Paul Fire Department described as a 2015 Ford F-250 Super Duty XL 4x4 four (4) door Super Cab 6.8 ft., short box truck from Jacobs Ford at a cost of \$22,995. The St. Paul Rural Fire Board approved the purchase of the truck on December 13, 2021; they will pay half (1/2) the cost. Council member Schmid moved to approve the purchase of the 2015 Ford F-250 Super Duty XL 4x4 four (4) door Super Cab 6.8 ft., short box truck from Jacobs Ford at a cost of \$22,995. Council member Feeken seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, Council member Thompson voted nay. Motion carried 3/1. Mr. Becker said he will personally pay for fuel and oil changes on the vehicle since he will be driving the vehicle so it is readily accessible when needed for fire calls. Mr. Becker assured the City Council that the pickup will not be driven out of town unless it is used in response to a fire call.

Council member Kowalski moved to approve the Consent Agenda Items: (1) December 20, 2021 Council minutes; (2) December 27, 2021 zoning permits; and (3) January 3, 2022 disbursements. Council member Thompson seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

Council member Thompson moved to authorize the St. Paul Police Department to submit a grant application for in-car computers and to upgrade the Police Departments dash and body cameras. Council member Kowalski seconded the motion. Council members Kowalski, Thompson, Schmid & Feeken voted aye, nays none. Motion carried 4/0.

 Police Chief Howard requested the agenda item to purchase an additional police vehicle be addressed at a future meeting.

Mayor Bergman announced that the next City Council meeting will be on Tuesday, January 18, 2022 at 7:00 p.m., due to the Martin Luther King holiday.

Utility Superintendent Helzer updates: (1) the City's twenty (20) foot radio antenna broke in the last windstorm. A replacement antenna has been found which will cost approximately \$2,500. A claim will be filed with the insurance company; (2) due to the extreme cold temperatures last weekend, the school experienced a frozen fire sprinkler line that caused extensive water damage to the rooms south of the gym; (3) the City's salt spreader now has a new motor and a new, larger alternator which will hopefully resolve the recent maintenance issues; and (4) the block heater went out on the John Deere tractor which will require replacement.

Chief of Police Howard updates: (1) each of the City of St. Paul police cruisers have an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) which was obtained from a grant submitted by Police Sargent Greenwalt. The AED's work with Life Paks used by EMS and the local hospital. The City's cost will be to pay for replacement batteries and new pads as needed; (2) all of the police officers are now certified in Taser training; (3) the Police Department continues to work on nuisance issues throughout the community; (4) the Police Department has a mobile speed limit trailer available from the State of Nebraska through the end of January. It will be placed in various areas around town to provide awareness of posted speed limits.

Mayor Bergman updates: (1) Citizens Bank & Trust notified the City that the City's Insured Cash Sweep (ICS) account interest rate will decrease from .85% to .45% at the end of December 2021; (2) pursuant to the advertisement in the Phonograph Herald on December 22, 2021, the St. Paul Development Corporation will be hiring a Community Programs Coordinator.

Mayor Bergman adjourned the City Council meeting at 7:56 p.m.

IRS increases mileage rate for remainder of 2022

IR-2022-124, June 9, 2022

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today announced an increase in the optional standard mileage rate for the final 6 months of 2022. Taxpayers may use the optional standard mileage rates to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business and certain other purposes.

For the final 6 months of 2022, the standard mileage rate for business travel will be 62.5 cents per mile, up 4 cents from the rate effective at the start of the year. The new rate for deductible medical or moving expenses (available for active-duty members of the military) will be 22 cents for the remainder of 2022, up 4 cents from the rate effective at the start of 2022. These new rates become effective July 1, 2022. The IRS provided legal guidance on the new rates in Announcement 2022-13 [PDF](#), issued today.

In recognition of recent gasoline price increases, the IRS made this special adjustment for the final months of 2022. The IRS normally updates the mileage rates once a year in the fall for the next calendar year. For travel from January 1 through June 30, 2022, taxpayers should use the rates set forth in Notice 2022-03 [PDF](#).

"The IRS is adjusting the standard mileage rates to better reflect the recent increase in fuel prices," said IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig. "We are aware a number of unusual factors have come into play involving fuel costs, and we are taking this special step to help taxpayers, businesses and others who use this rate."

While fuel costs are a significant factor in the mileage figure, other items enter into the calculation of mileage rates, such as depreciation and insurance and other fixed and variable costs.

The optional business standard mileage rate is used to compute the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business use in lieu of tracking actual costs. This rate is also used as a benchmark by the federal government and many businesses to reimburse their employees for mileage.

Taxpayers always have the option of calculating the actual costs of using their vehicle rather than using the standard mileage rates.

The 14 cents per mile rate for charitable organizations remains unchanged as it is set by statute.

Midyear increases in the optional mileage rates are rare, the last time the IRS made such an increase was in 2011.
