# Returning 2020-2021 Kindergarten Age School Requests

We have placed 163 students this spring who had also requested, and were placed in, a Minneapolis Public Schools Kindergarten last fall.

These students left (or never started), and are not currently enrolled/attending MPS and are now asking to come back. All are students who will turn six by September 1, 2021.

The 163 students were admitted for Fall 2021 to the following grades:

- Kg: 52
- Gr 1: 110
- Gr 2: 1

# Results of First Lottery

Of the 35 K-5/K-8 community schools:

- 40% of out of area requests received their first choice school
- 87% of out of area requests received their first or second choice school
- 12 schools were below the district average of first choice placements (40%)
  - Schools below the district average: 35% FRL, 42% SOC
  - Schools above the district average: 59% FRL, 67% SOC

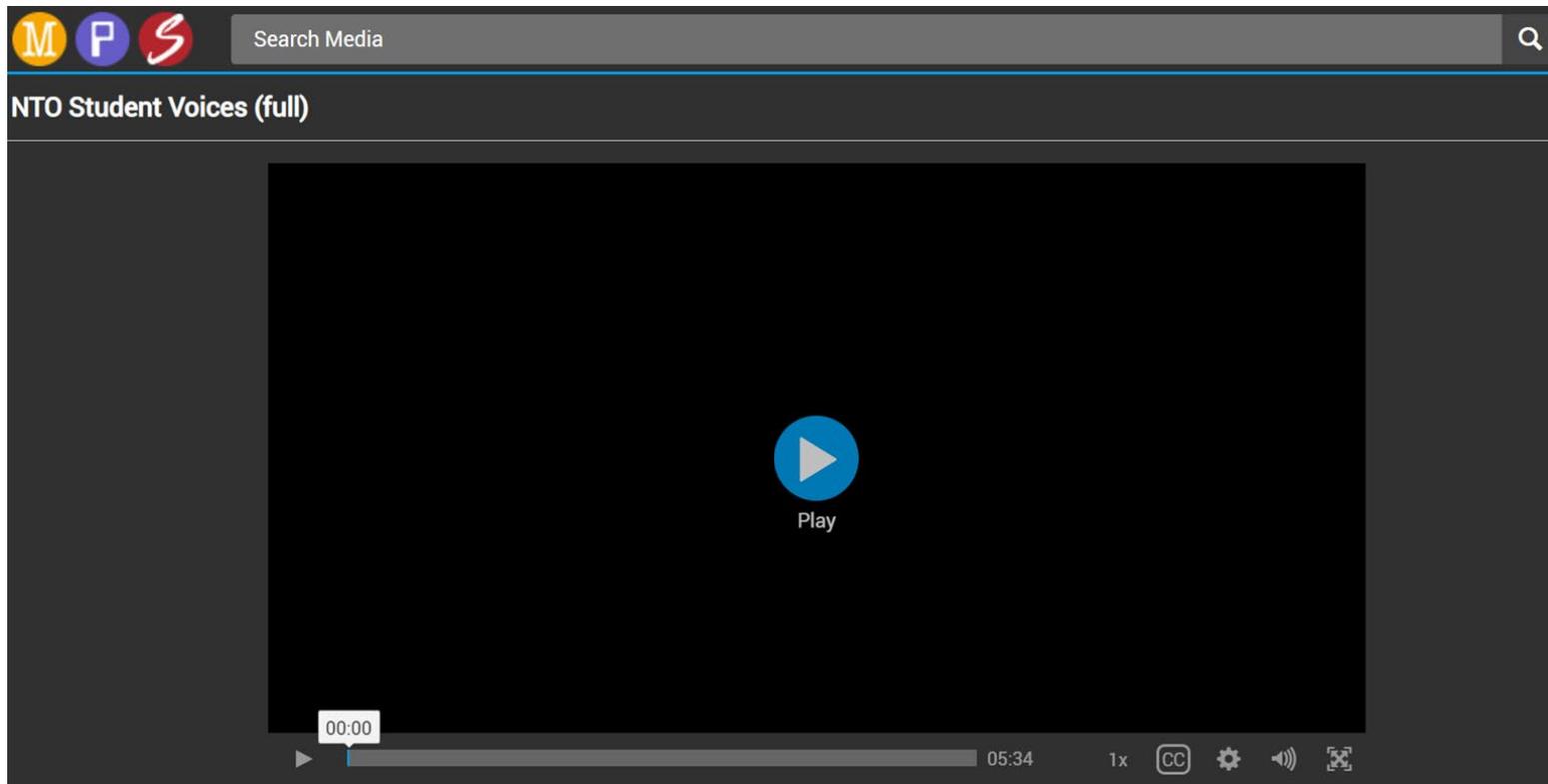

# Policy 1304: Equity and Diversity

## PURPOSE

**Every student deserves a respectful learning environment in which their racial and ethnic diversity is valued and contributes to successful academic outcomes. Minneapolis Public Schools is committed to identifying and correcting practices and policies that perpetuate the achievement gap and institutional racism in all forms in order to provide all of its students with the opportunity to succeed.** Learning and work environments are enriched and improved by the contributions, perspectives and very presence of diverse participants. Minneapolis Public Schools is committed to the success of every student in each of our schools and to our mission and vision statements.

The Board of Directors believes that the responsibility for student success is broadly shared by District staff, families, our community and our student's own efforts. Achievement gaps between white students and students of color are unacceptable if we are to meet our mission and vision statements and our moral obligations to our students, their families and our community as a whole. These gaps are contrary to our belief that all children can learn and succeed. Adult behaviors must not contribute to achievement gaps or create barriers to success. **Adult behaviors must be concentrated on elimination of gaps, particularly those that are predicated on a student's race, ethnicity, home language, personal characteristics or culture and on assurance of educational equity between students.** The Board of Directors, Superintendent and staff commit to conducting an Equity and Diversity Impact Assessment on all future policies that have a significant impact on student learning and resource allocation. This commitment also includes conducting assessments on policies that are periodically reviewed and updated through the policy development process that have a significant impact on student learning and resources allocation.

# Policy 1304: Equity and Diversity

“**Educational equity**” means raising the achievement of all students while **narrowing the gaps between the lowest and highest performing students**, and eliminating the racial or cultural predictability and disproportionality of which students groups occupy the highest and lowest achievement categories including rates of graduation. <sup>1</sup>

“**Institutional racism**” means the **collective failure** of a public or private organization to provide an appropriate and professional service to people because of their race, color, culture or ethnic origin which can be seen or detected in practices, processes, systems, attitudes and behavior. **It looks beyond individual acts of prejudice to the systemic biases that may be built into institutions.** These systemic biases discriminate against and disadvantage people of color through unwitting prejudice, ignorance, thoughtlessness or racial stereotyping.

**The District shall offer opportunities for all staff to improve its cultural competencies in serving our diverse student body and community.** The District staff shall work together to increase their individual and collective capacity to effectively teach a racially and ethnically diverse student population and serve racially and ethnically diverse families and communities. **The District shall offer opportunities for all staff to improve culturally responsive instructional practices, curriculum, and assessments competencies in serving our diverse student body and community to increase individual and collective capacity to effectively teach our diverse student population and serve diverse families.** Practices, procedures and programs that result in over or under representation of any group of students compared to peers shall be subject to close review to assure that such results are due to meeting student legitimate educational, social or emotional needs. Practices that do not meet this close review shall be eliminated. Teachers, administrators and district staff shall collaborate to establish and implement culturally responsive instructional practices, curriculum and assessments.

# Understanding Culture: Learnings

## **What is culture?**

Culture refers to the knowledge, experience, beliefs, values, attitudes, meanings, hierarchies, religion, notions of time, roles, spatial relations, concepts of the universe, and material objects and possessions acquired by a group of people in the course of generations through individual and group striving.

## **What is white supremacy culture?**

White supremacy culture is the idea (ideology) that white people and the ideas, thoughts, beliefs, and actions of white people are superior to People of Color and their ideas, thoughts, beliefs, and actions.

## **What is cultural racism?**

Cultural racism is how the dominant culture is founded upon and then shapes norms, values, beliefs and standards to advantage white people and oppress People of Color.

## **What is climate?**

The feeling that is conveyed in a group by the physical environment and the way in which members of the organization interact with each other, students, families and other external communities.

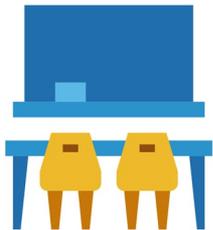

## Pursuit of Identity

Understanding notions of who we are, who others say we are, and whom we desire to be.

*“The universal question is, How will my instruction help students [and educators I serve] to learn something about themselves and/or about others?” -p. 70*

## Pursuit of Intellect

Understanding, enhancement, and exercising of mental powers that allow one to better understand and critique the world.

*“[Students] need to know they are capable of the intellectual greatness their ancestors practiced and promoted... [and] see themselves as the next generation of thinkers.” -p. 113*

## Pursuit of Skills

Attaining proficiencies that are the main focus of current standards and measures of achievement, such as reading comprehension, fluency, and vocabulary.

*“Although we know literacy is much more than skills, it is also important that students develop the skills necessary for each content area.” p. 89*

## Pursuit of Criticality

Capacity to read, write, and think in ways of understanding power, privilege, social justice, and oppression.

*“Students need to leave teachers’ classrooms with a stronger sense of criticality in order to survive and thrive in the world.” p. 132*

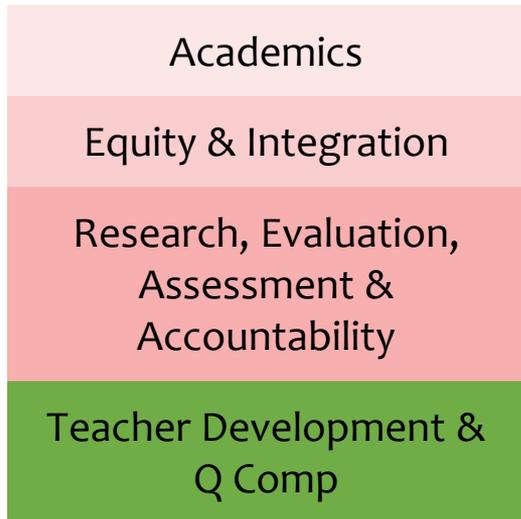

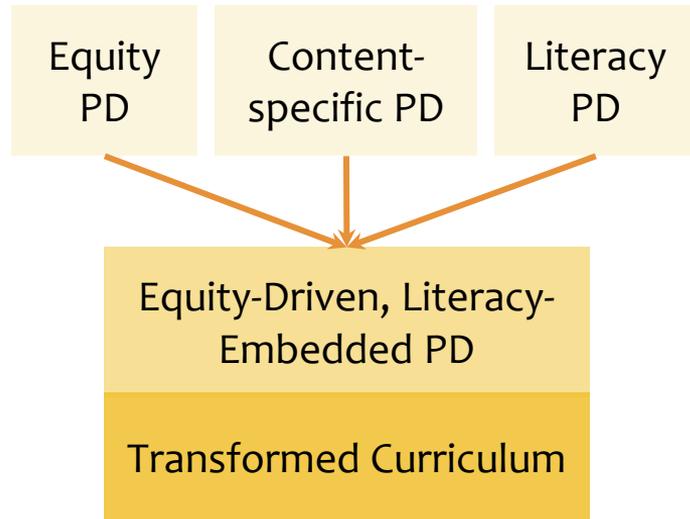

## **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT to build capacity of our educators**

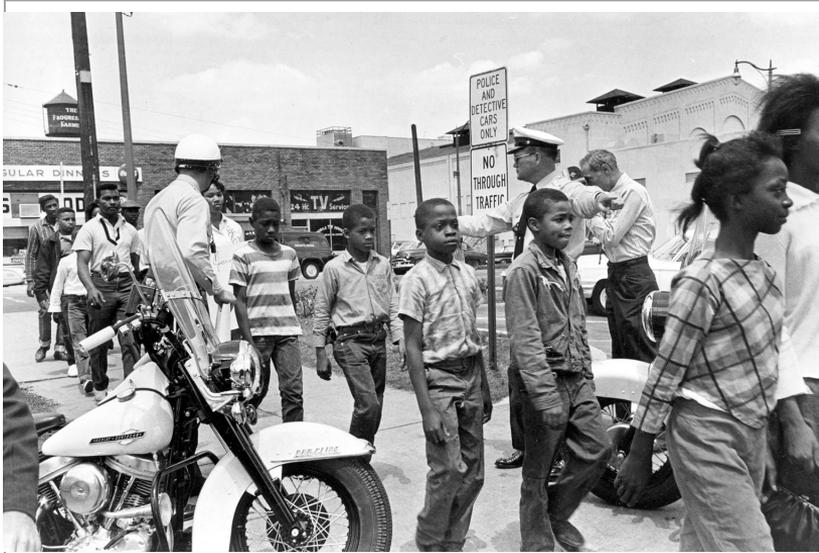
