Subject: Proposed Levy for Taxes Payable 2026

All school districts must certify a proposed levy to the home county auditor by September 30th every year. Since school board action is required to approve the proposed levy before the deadline to make changes to the proposed levy certification, the school board can certify the proposed levy at the 'maximum' level which will allow for any corrections/changes in the levy totals between now and December's final certification to be made without recertification. The final levy certification in December will require a specific dollar amount. The deadline for submission of the proposed levy certification form to Ramsey and Hennepin Counties, as well as MDE, is September 30, 2025.

The levy certification proposed this evening impacts taxes payable in calendar year 2026, which the district will receive in fiscal year 2026-27. We have included a levy comparison document, summarizing the change in major line items from FY26 to FY27. The preliminary levy decrease for taxes payable in 2026 is currently estimated at 2.98%. Many of the levy line items are calculated using actual prior year enrollment data and estimated future year enrollment.

The document also includes state aid estimates for FY27. These are preliminary numbers, and again largely based on projected enrollment. There are two significant variances in aid: the first being general education revenue increasing by \$500,400. This is the result of a projected inflation factor of 3.22%. The second is special education revenue decrease of \$3,486,108. This is a very rough estimate by the Minnesota Department of Education and the estimate is not available for FY27 as of yet.

All of these numbers are a starting point for building the fiscal year 26-27 budget. At the December board meeting, we will go much deeper into the positive and negative adjustments, tax impact, and budget comparison information.

It is recommended that the School Board of ISD282 certify the proposed Levy for taxes payable in 2026 as a 'maximum' levy amount, as presented.

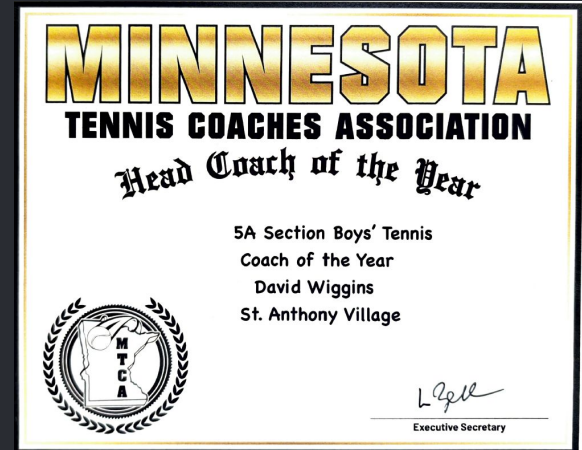

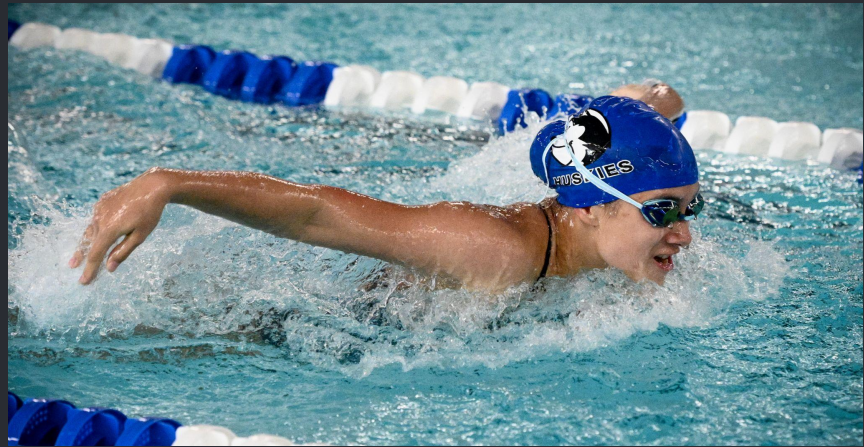

- **The Direct Admissions program is designed to make sure students know you have multiple college options in the fall after high school. No more wondering "Will I get in?" How does Direct Admissions Work?



Program Success

- **Data on Direct Admissions shows that students participating in the program have a higher rate of enrolling in a Minnesota college as well as a higher rate of completing the FAFSA, both of which are key indicators for whether a student will attend postsecondary.**
- **Data from the 2023-24 school year, 76 percent of students attending a Direct Admissions high school filed a FAFSA, compared to a 50 percent completion rate when looking at all graduating seniors.**
- **Data also shows that 46 percent of students enrolled in a Minnesota college after graduation as compared to 28 percent of non-participating 12th grade students.**

3 buses + 3 trailers for luggage are booked through Monarch Bus Services, Inc.

Lodging and meals:

All students and chaperones sleep in Eagle Bluff housing and eat meals at Eagle Bluff (lunch and dinner on the 10th, all meals on the 11th, and breakfast and lunch on the 12th).

General provisions for safety of students and staff:

There is a 10:1 student:chaperone ratio while on the trip. Eagle Bluff staff are trained in First Aid/CPR. Eagle Bluff has a fully stocked nurse/first aid room for treating minor injuries and illnesses.

Estimated cost per student: **\$210**

Financing (how will the students pay for the trip):

The 8th Grade Team hosts fundraisers throughout the fall, including Huskie Grams at Back To School night and fundraisers at local restaurants such as Jersey Mikes, Chipotle, and Parkway Pizza. We also offer a sliding pay scale for families, with the opportunity for families to donate to the SAMS Eagle Bluff Fund to help cover the costs of families unable to pay full price.

Money raised from fundraisers (information above) and contributions from the SAMS Activity Fund ensure all students who need a partial/full scholarship to attend Eagle Bluff can receive a scholarship.

In what ways are students with exceptional needs being accommodated:

(1) We meet with the Special Education team to determine necessary accommodations for students attending the trip, which may include Special Ed staff as chaperones, preferred peers in dorm rooms and/or activity groups, breaks as needed, etc. (2) We collect relevant medical information from all families as part of the permission form, and meet with Lori Watzl-King to ensure all students have access to their medications and other necessary accommodations. (3) All members of the 8th Grade Team have individual conversations with students and/or family members who may have cultural concerns, safety concerns, or other concerns.

What unique educational experiences will the students be getting:

Students will receive unique Outdoor Education learning experiences. For many students, this is their first time engaging in deep learning in nature. The goals are as follows:

- To build community and confidence in yourselves and your shared world in an engaging, outdoor setting.**
- To become stewards of the Earth and gain an understanding of our natural world.**
- To explore Minnesota's geology and ecology while building our scientific thinking, writing, and inquiry skills.**
- To be together, have fun, and challenge ourselves and each other!**

With the exception of the last goal, these goals can not be fully achieved in a traditional classroom setting. And, previous experience at Eagle Bluff has shown that the last goal can be deeply successful in a new outdoor environment, and that the growth made in this outdoor environment transfers back to the classroom at SAMS and beyond.

Language Access Plan

Context:

[Minnesota Statute, Section 123B.32](#) states that starting in the 2025-2026 school year our school board must adopt a language access plan that:

- Specifies our procedures to provide effective language assistance to students and adults who communicate in a language other than English, including using trained interpreters.
- Must be available to the public and included in the school's handbook.
- Informs families about their language access rights.
- Is reviewed and updated every two years.

Families have the right to:

- Receive information about their child's education in their native languages
- Have a trained interpreter for important meetings about their child
- Participate fully in their child's educational experience

What is it:

This Language Access Plan follows Minnesota Statute 123B.32 and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. It provides information about the standardized language access tools, processes, and resources available for students, families, and staff in SANB schools, including the:

- Telephone interpretation services through Language Line
- Document translation procedure (New: review existing translated documents - submit form - if approved, document submitted to Lingualinx)
- In person interpreter request procedure (New: submit form at least 2 weeks prior - interpreter request submitted to Multilingual Word)
- Communication platform through ParentSquare (Implementing: automatically translates newsletters/emails to preferred language)

How did we develop it:

We developed a team including the Executive Director of Academics, District EL Coordinator, EL teachers, an Administrative Assistant, Communication Specialist, a school board member, and was sent to specially selected community members for their review. This team met and worked together asynchronously to develop the plan between March and September of 2025. Thank you to Hope Fagerland, Minda Gomez, Tim Leverentz, Traci Adams, Jada Richard, and Dr. Prachi Striker.

Language Access Plan - Draft

More than 30 different languages are spoken in St. Anthony-New Brighton schools. The most common languages include Spanish, Somali, Tibetan, and English.

Communication with families in a language they can understand provides a foundation for students' academic success and creates a welcoming school community. St. Anthony-New Brighton is committed to communicating meaningfully with all families we serve to provide any and all school-related information and foster mutually beneficial, collaborative partnerships. This Language Access Plan is intended to mitigate language barriers so that families can make informed decisions in their children's education.

Language Access Rights

If you are a parent or guardian of a student in public schools and your dominant language is not English, you have the following rights established by federal law (Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964):

- School districts must have a process for identifying your language needs.
- Schools must provide information in a language you understand.
- School districts must provide effective language assistance to you, such as by offering translated materials or a language interpreter.
- Schools must provide you with language assistance even if your child is proficient in English or you have some English proficiency.
- Schools must provide translation or interpretation from appropriate and competent individuals and may not rely on or ask students, siblings, friends, or untrained school staff to translate or interpret for you.
- Language assistance must be free to you.

St. Anthony-New Brighton will determine parent/guardian language needs through the following procedures:

- c. Chinese (Simplified)
 - d. Somali
 - e. Spanish
2. **Student Information System:** The preferred language of parents/guardians is visible to all staff in Skyward.
 3. **Teacher Communication:** Teachers are encouraged to inquire about communication preferences in their own communication with families.

Dissemination

This plan will be published on the district website. Our school district will take a multi-stakeholder approach to communicating with families about their language access rights and the resources available to them.

- **Administrative Assistants** are responsible for providing all families with a copy of this Language Access Plan as part of the enrollment process.
- **School principals** will link the Language Access Plan in school-wide communications including newsletters and announcements. Principals are also responsible for sending communications in families' preferred language.
- **Classroom teachers** will share the Language Access Plan in beginning-of-the-year communications. Classroom teachers are also responsible for sending communications in families' preferred language.
- **English Language staff** will share language access information at all informational meetings held for families of multilingual students.

Training on the Language Access Plan is provided to all teachers at New Teacher Orientation, and is reviewed with staff annually in August through Compliance training.

To request additional training or review procedures for effectively working with interpreters, staff should contact the district contract listed below, their school administrator, or building EL teacher.

Continuous Improvement

This plan will be reviewed bi-annually by the Student Services team to ensure its effectiveness and alignment with evolving needs and best practices.

Subject: Update on School Board Student Success Goals

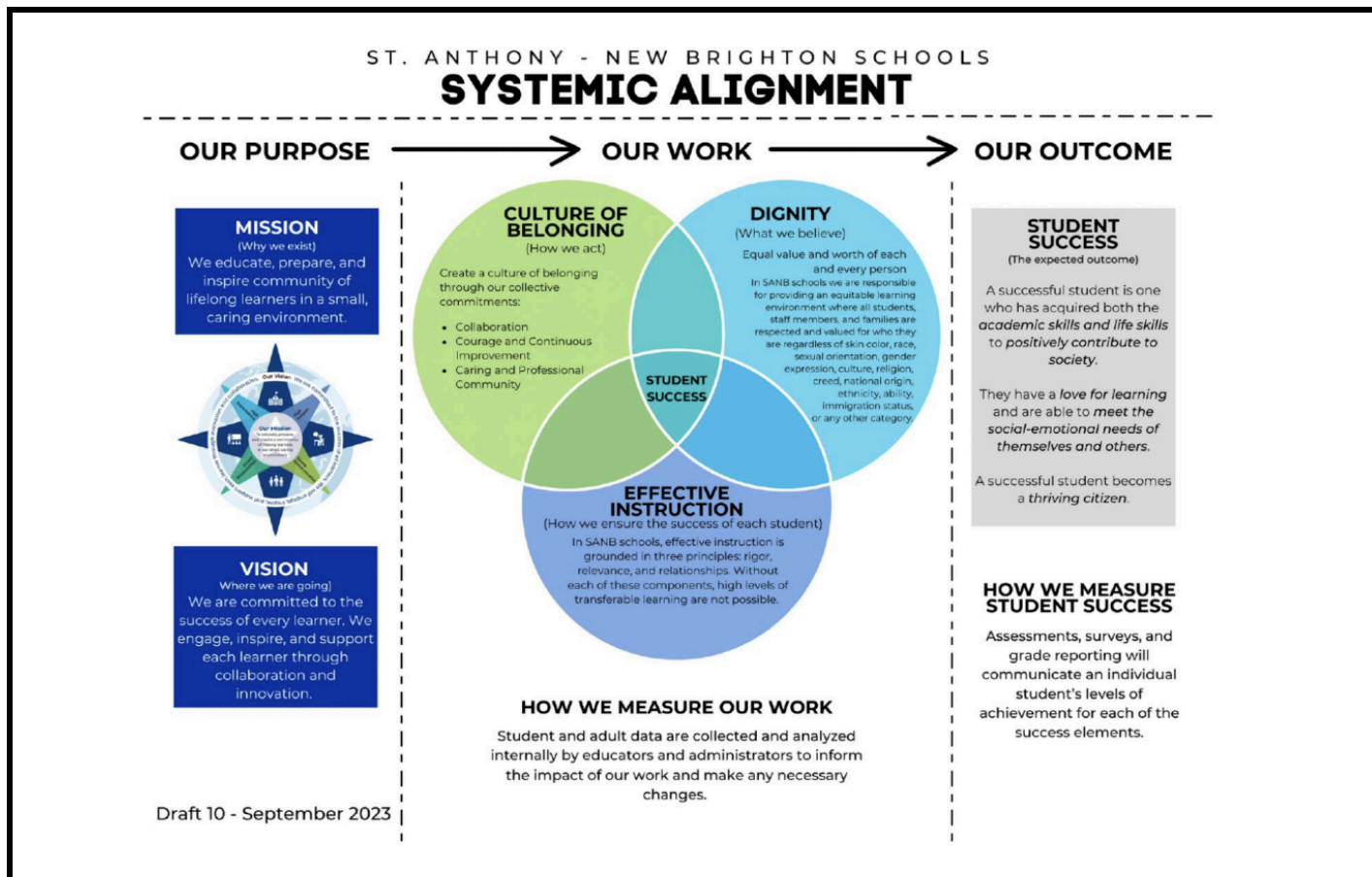
Context: As the governance arm of ISD282, St. Anthony New Brighton Schools, the Board plays a pivotal role in setting the mission and vision that guides our district and the success of our students. This memo provides the crucial context for the data you are about to review, representing the first update on the goals the board established before the 2024-25 school year. As stated, the school board set specific success metric goals prior to the 2024-2025 school year. These goals are set to be accomplished by 2028, with expected milestones met per school year. The data shared in this memo articulates the 2028 goals, yearly expected milestones, along with the data from 2025 student data.

Success Metrics: SANB schools define the success of a graduating senior as a student who has acquired both the *academic skills* and *life skills* necessary to *positively contribute to society*. Such individuals possess a *love for learning* and are capable of addressing the *social-emotional needs* of themselves and others. A successful student ultimately becomes a *thriving citizen*.

Systemic Alignment: ISD 282 has created a change management model to ensure systemic alignment toward student success. In 2014, under the leadership of then Superintendent Laney, the district created a new Mission and Vision. The new vision became: “We are *committed to the success* of all learners. We will engage, inspire, challenge, and support each learner through innovation and collaboration.” In 2018, Superintendent Renee Corneille established the District Teaching and Learning Committee, comprising school board members, union leadership, teacher leaders, and administrators. This committee conducted a survey to ascertain the

community's vision for a successful SANB graduate within ISD282. The survey was administered to a randomized sample of the community (with 30% representation from each demographic group) and all staff members. The culmination of these efforts resulted in an operationalized definition of success for the established vision: "A *successful student* is one who has acquired both the academic skills and life skills to positively contribute to society. They possess a love for learning and are able to meet the social-emotional needs of themselves and others. A successful student becomes a thriving citizen."

ISD 282's strategic framework, centered on "Student Success," guides the work adults employed by the district. This work is composed of three essential ingredients: Dignity (every student gets what they need to thrive), Effective Instruction (setting high expectations and monitoring achievement), and Belonging (creating safe, supported, and connected learning environments). Through strategic planning and data analysis in these areas, the administration monitors progress, ensuring that the dedicated efforts of ISD 282 staff prepare all students to achieve our success metrics.

Please note - Above, Meeting, and Below expected growth indicators are in reference to the 2025 *expected* proficiency score determined by the school board. For example, in 8th grade math the level of proficiency increased (from 39% to 41%), but the *expected* proficiency for 2025 was 45%, and 41% was *below* that expected growth.

Data Analysis:

Grade 3 -

- *Reading*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 60%, surpassing the 2024 baseline of 49% and exceeding the 2025 expectation of 55%.
- *Math*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 70%, exceeding both the 2024 baseline of 61% and the 2025 expectation of 66%.

Grade 5 -

- *Reading*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 65%, meeting the 2025 expectation and surpassing the 2024 baseline of 60%.
- *Math*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 52%. This is the same as the 2024 baseline but falls short of the 2025 expectation of 57%.

Grade 8 -

- *Reading*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 64%, which is a significant increase from the 2024 baseline of 49% and exceeds the 2025 expectation of 55%.
- *Math*: the 2025 proficiency rate was 41%, which is an increase from the 2024 baseline of 39% but falls short of the 2025 expectation of 45%.

Data Analysis:

2025 Actuals vs. Goals

The actual average ACT composite score in 2025 was 20.5, which is 1.5 points below the 2025 goal of 22. This score is also lower than the 2024 baseline of 21.2. The goal for 2028 is to reach an average score of 23.

2025 Gap Analysis

The average gap in scores between different demographic groups decreased in 2025. Unfortunately, we were not able to disaggregate the data for some of the demographic groups.

- The average gap in 2024 was 3.47 points.
- In 2025, the actual average gap was 2.15 points.

This demonstrates a reduction in the score disparity between demographic groups, with the objective for 2028 being the complete elimination of this gap (a reduction target of 0). It is crucial to ensure that any decrease in this gap is attributable to an increase in academic achievement across all groups, with one group progressing at a higher rate. A decrease in a demographic group's performance is not an acceptable means of reducing an achievement gap.

Data Analysis:

The overall average of favorable responses for the 2024-2025 school year was **58%**, which is a slight increase from the previous year's **57%**. The district's national percentile rank also saw a modest improvement, moving from the **38th to the 40th percentile**.

Based on the individual variables, the results are mixed:

- **Emotional Regulation** showed improvement, with favorable responses increasing from 52% to **55%** and the national percentile ranking jumping from the 80th to the **90th percentile**. This variable is on track to meet or exceed its 2028 goal.
- **Self Management** saw a decrease in favorable responses from 74% to **72%**, resulting in a drop from the 70th to the **60th percentile**.
- **Social Awareness** also declined, with favorable responses dropping from 63% to **59%**, and a significant decrease in national percentile ranking from the 35th to the **20th percentile**.
- **Self Efficacy** saw a decrease in favorable responses from 47% to **41%**, resulting in a drop from the 20th to the **10th percentile**.
- **Classroom Effort** also declined, with favorable responses dropping from 65% to **62%**, and a significant drop in national percentile ranking from the 50th to the **20th percentile**.

The demographic gap data shows mixed results as well. For example:

- **Race:** The achievement gap based on race remained unchanged at **2%** from 2023-2024 to 2024-2025. The goal is to eliminate this gap entirely by 2028.
- **English Learner/Multilingual (EL/ML):** This gap was successfully reduced from **2%** in the previous year to **1%** in 2024-2025, showing progress toward the 2028 goal of 0%.
- **Special Education (SPED):** The gap for students receiving special education services widened significantly, increasing from **6% to 9%**. This is a negative trend and moves further from the 2028 goal of a 0% gap.
- **Gender:** The achievement gap based on gender remained at **0%** for both years, indicating that there is no measurable gap in this area.

** Please note: The Principals and Effective Instruction team continue to learn more about how to analyze the Panorama Assessments. The change in questions asked were determined by what data the principals were seeking from students.*

Positive Contributor

Data Analysis:

- **Student Involvement:** The number of students involved in Kiwanis Student Clubs, National Hours Society, and Athletics/Activities increased from 724 in 2023-2024 to **819** in 2024-2025. The "Builders Club" was not active in 2024-2025, which makes the increase even more impressive.
- **Service Hours:** Students accumulated **6,976** service hours in 2024-2025, which is an increase from the 5,922 hours in the previous year. This number is "so close" to the 2025 goal of **7,000** hours.

Next Steps:

- **Expected Growth 2026:** The school board could consider adjusting the expected growth rates for the 2026, 2027, and 2028 school years at a future meeting. For instance, in 3rd-grade reading, the actual 2025 proficiency was 60%, exceeding the 55% goal. With the current 2026 goal set at 60%, the board might want to consider increasing this expectation to reflect the recent positive outcome.
- **Robust Review of Student Data:** This memo and presentation focus on data directly linked to the school board's goals, which were selected to ensure a system-wide review. By examining data from various grade levels—3rd, 5th, 8th, and high school (ACT)—the board can assess the educational system from primary through high school. At a later meeting, the board will have the opportunity to review data from multiple programs, including Alternative Delivery of Specialized Instructional Services (ADSIS), Achievement and Integration (AI), and Comprehensive Achievement and Civic Readiness (CACR), among other student achievement metrics.

Final Summary:

The district's progress toward the Student Success Goals established for the 2024-2025 school year show mixed results, with significant gains in some key areas, but also notable challenges that require attention. Having navigated through the first year of School Board Goals dedicated to the Success Metrics - we are on track to ensure success by the end of the 2028 school year.

Key Highlights of Success

- **Academic Proficiency:** The district exceeded its 2025 goals in several crucial academic areas.
 - **Grade 3 Reading:** The proficiency rate was **60%**, surpassing the goal of 55%.
 - **Grade 3 Math:** The proficiency rate was **70%**, exceeding the goal of 66%.
 - **Grade 5 Reading:** The proficiency rate was **65%**, meeting the goal and surpassing the 2024 baseline.
 - **Grade 8 Reading:** The proficiency rate was **64%**, a significant jump that exceeded the goal of 55%.
- **Service & Community Involvement:** The district nearly met its ambitious goal for service hours.
 - Students accumulated **6,976** service hours, just shy of the **7,000-hour** goal for 2025. This was accomplished with an increase in student involvement from 724 to **819** students.
- **Student Wellness (Emotional Regulation):** Students showed significant growth in emotional regulation.
 - Favorable responses increased from 52% to **55%**, and the district's national percentile ranking jumped from the 80th to the **90th percentile**, exceeding expectations.

Areas Needing Attention and Deliberate Focus

- **ACT Scores:** The district is not on track to meet its ACT goals.
 - The average composite score was **20.5**, falling **1.5 points** below the 2025 goal of 22. This score is also lower than the 2024 baseline of 21.2.
 - **Academic and Wellness Gaps for SPED Students:** The achievement gap for students in special education widened.
 - The social-emotional competency gap for SPED students increased from 6% to **9%**.
 - **Decline in Student Wellness:** Several key wellness indicators showed a decline in favorable responses and national percentile rankings.
 - **Self-Efficacy** dropped from 47% to **41%**, and the national ranking fell from the 20th to the **10th percentile**.
 - **Social Awareness** and **Classroom Effort** also saw notable drops in favorable responses and national percentile ranks.
 - **Grade 5 & 8 Math Proficiency:** Progress in math proficiency did not meet expectations in upper grades.
 - **Grade 5 Math** proficiency remained flat at **52%**, falling short of the 57% goal.
 - **Grade 8 Math** increased slightly to **41%** but did not meet the 45% goal.

Conclusion

The district has made commendable progress in key areas like K-8 reading proficiency. We can attribute reading score increases to a few key indicators. The purchase and partial implementation of the SAVVAS {a high quality curriculum material (HQCM)} along with a focus on Effective Instruction. Both these variables contribute to classrooms that focus on state standards and rigorous student learning expectations. Although the growth and progress is not yet at the level of acceptable, the data shows SANB is moving in the right direction. As the district continues to increase the fidelity of both SAVVAS and Effective Instruction implementation the School Board will see higher levels of academic achievement for all students.

The district also saw increases in students positively contributing to their community. Through participation in service organizations like Kiwanis, National Honors Society, along with Athletics and Activities' commitment to service, our students almost met the 7000 hours of community service during the 2024-25 school year. Each of these organizations promote - with deliberate actions - students giving back to the community. Some may see this type of achievement as "soft" or lacking in importance, but the SANB community clearly expressed that a graduating senior of St. Anthony Village High School must not only understand their rights as a citizen, but also understand their responsibilities to the community.

One area of concern is the continued decline in ACT scores. SANB, like many districts, utilizes the ACT as a key measure of overall student achievement. The ACT assessment is relevant for students (supports their post-secondary journey) and also assesses students in many core academic areas. The school board selected the use of the ACT for Goal 2 in the area of academic achievement and also provides (without fee) access to the ACT for all SAVHS juniors.

Like many districts in the state and country, students' mental health continues to be a public health concern. A few indicators of Student Wellness showed a decline in favorable responses. The district needs to continue to be deliberate about the overall wellness of students with specific attention to our students who receive special education services.

Overall, while the school district demonstrated success in raising student proficiency in specific grade levels in reading and math, while also increasing community service, it failed to meet a few of the stated progress goals. By using data, both summative (like this analysis) and formative/interim assessments (FastBridge) the district continues to build an analytics-centric culture.

Overview

Over the past year, Independent School District 282 has experienced a marked increase in public data requests under the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act (MGDPA). While responding to such requests is a legal obligation, the volume, scope, and complexity of recent requests have placed a significant strain on district resources.

Request Activity

Since May 2025, the District has logged 15 separate public data requests, with many requests spanning multiple years of records (up to a decade) and they often involve sensitive topics such as personnel separations, staff complaints, legal settlements, Title IX compliance, and budget allocations. For a point of reference, the district typically receives two data requests annually.

Furthermore, a substantial portion of requests have originated from a small number of repeat requestors, often with overlapping or duplicative subject matter, requiring meticulous attention to ensure both completion and legal compliance

It should also be noted that the District's designated data request official was on medical leave from June through August 2025, which added to the challenges of timely processing and responding to the unusually high volume of requests..

Attached to this memo is a log of all data requests received since May 2025 through the present date, with a brief summary of each request and the District's response.

Staff and Administrative Burden

Each request requires coordination across multiple departments and often involves retrieving information stored on a variety of platforms, including legacy systems that are no longer in active use and paper archives. This adds considerable time and complexity to the process. Business Services staff must locate and reconcile historical budget, payroll, and purchasing records, while Human Resources staff review personnel-related requests, separation agreements, and compliance data. At the same time, Communications and other administrative staff coordinate request intake, schedule inspections, and prepare responses. Collectively, this work diverts significant staff time away from their core responsibilities of supporting teaching, learning, and day-to-day operations.

Legal Review and Costs

Given the sensitivity of many requests, particularly those involving personnel data and potential privacy concerns, the District has engaged legal counsel for review. Legal oversight ensures compliance with MGDPA and protects private data from inadvertent disclosure. However, this has resulted in added costs beyond regular operating needs.

Financial Impact

While inspection of records is provided to the public at no cost, preparing copies for delivery can impose significant expenses for the District. Requests that span multiple years or require redaction of sensitive information involve substantial staff time and legal review. For example, one request required the review and redaction of nearly 2,000 emails, while another resulted in an estimated \$533 in preparation costs for staff time to retrieve, compile, and prepare the requested records. To date, the district has incurred \$6,875 in unbudgeted costs to fulfill data requests, covering staff time, legal fees, and document preparation. It is estimated that an additional \$20,260 will be required to complete the remaining requests. These unbudgeted administrative expenses, while quantifiable, do not account for the significant opportunity costs associated with redirecting staff time from other essential duties.

Updated Process

In July 2025, the District implemented a new Public Data Request Management System to better manage the rising volume of requests. The updated process established a dedicated email inbox for all requests, introduced clear internal procedures defining staff roles, timelines, and escalation paths, and created a public-facing webpage to guide community members in submitting requests. The system also includes a centralized tracking tool to assign, log, and monitor requests, along with standardized response templates to promote consistency in communications. During the medical leave of the data request official, interim oversight was delegated to Communications staff in coordination with the Superintendent.

Together, these changes were designed to reduce the burden on individual staff members, streamline responses, and ensure continued compliance with state and federal law.

Moving Forward

The District remains committed to meeting its obligations under MGDPA with professionalism and transparency. At the same time, it is important for the Board and community to recognize the operational and financial impacts these requests impose. To prioritize the essential duties of student learning, the district will need to hire new staff and/or increase the hours of current staff to meet its data request obligations. Either action will place an additional strain on an already tight budget.
