Minnesota Student Survey 2025 Results

*Presented to the School Board
April 7, 2026*



What is the Minnesota Student Survey?

The Minnesota Student Survey (MSS) is one of the longest-running youth surveys in the nation.

It is the primary source of comprehensive data on youth at the state, county, and district level in Minnesota.

- Administered by the Minnesota Departments of Education, Health, Human Services, and Public Safety since 1989
- Administered every three years to students in grades 5, 8, 9 and 11
- Online survey using branching logic

What is the Minnesota Student Survey?

Survey asks students about their activities, opinions, behaviors, and experiences

Students respond to questions on school climate, bullying, out-of-school activities, health behaviors, emotional and mental health, substance use, and connections with school and family

The survey covers sensitive topics, including domestic violence, self-harm and suicide, which are also covered in this presentation.

Because of these sensitive topics:

- Some questions are modified or omitted based on grade level
- Survey participation is optional
- Each question is optional
- All responses are anonymous



Limitations of the Data

The Minnesota Student Survey data is provided in the form of PDF tables. It can be broken down by state, county, and district level. Within those levels, it can be broken down by grade and gender.

- School-level data is not available except by special request, and even then it is limited by size of the school and subgroups.

All survey data is provided in percentages. Since all questions are optional, the number of students that responded to each question varies.

- All percentages are percentages of the students who responded
- Older grades (especially 11th) tend to have lower Ns
- More sensitive questions tend to have lower Ns

Occasionally, new survey questions are added or questions are revised, so we cannot always compare historically.



Who Took The Survey?

- Across the state, 61% of districts chose to participate and approximately 45% of eligible students took the survey. The survey window was open from January to June of 2025.
- All Stillwater elementary, middle and high schools participated during the month of February 2025.

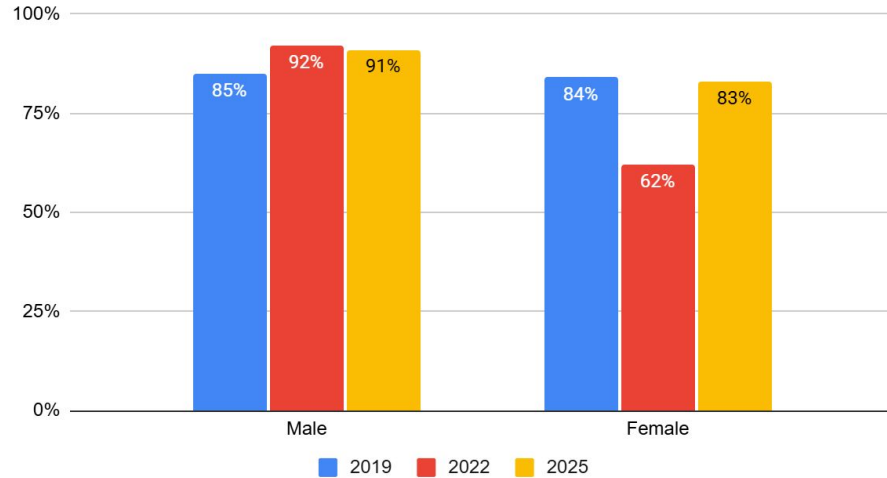

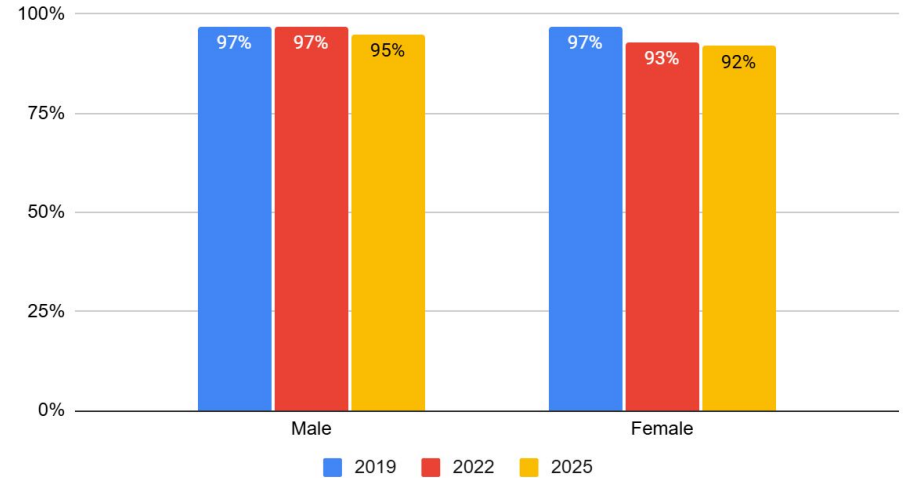

Percent of 11th Grade Students Identifying as Cisgender



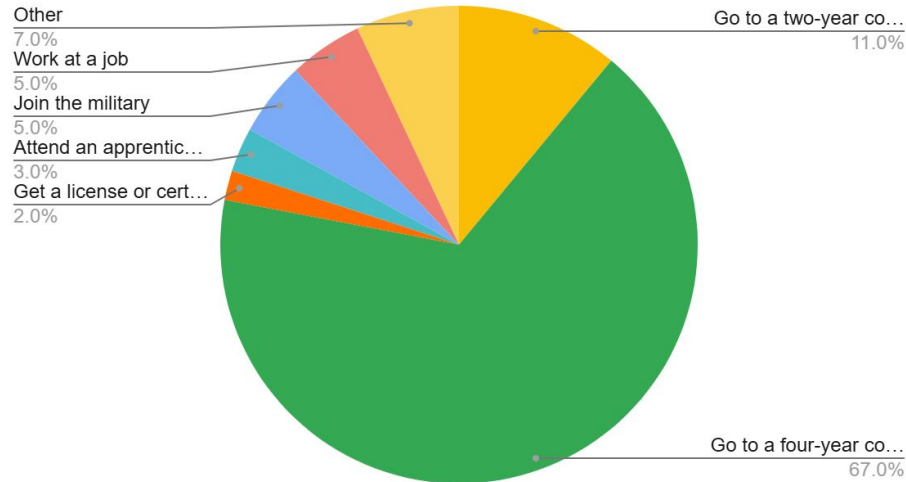

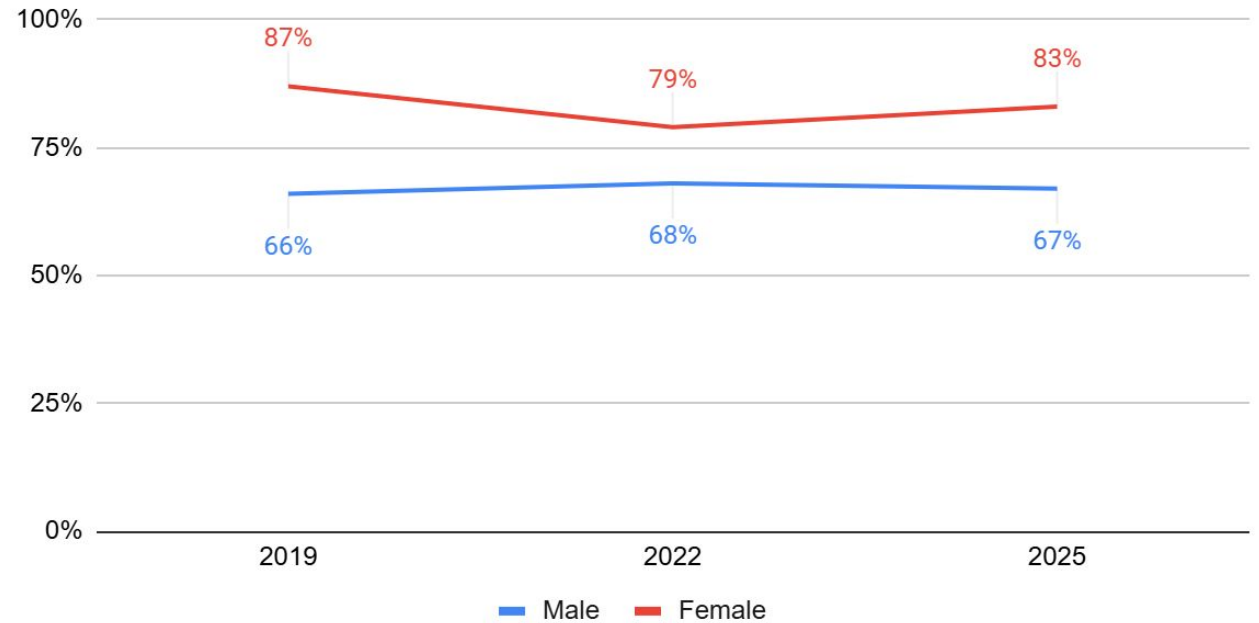

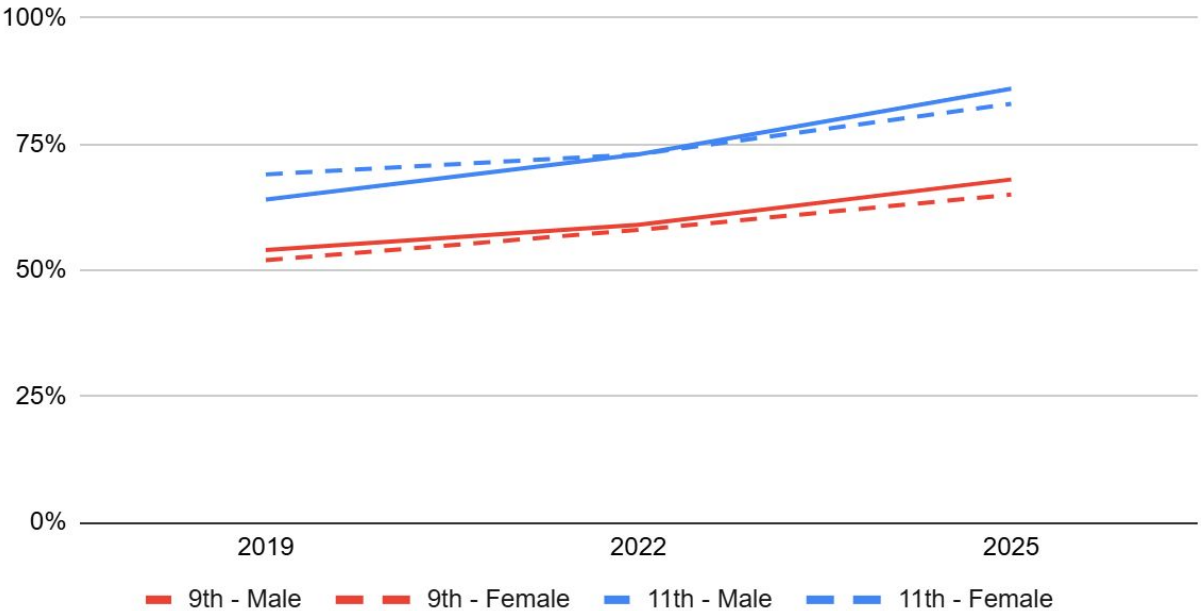
Percent of 11th Grade Students Planning to Attend a 4 Year College

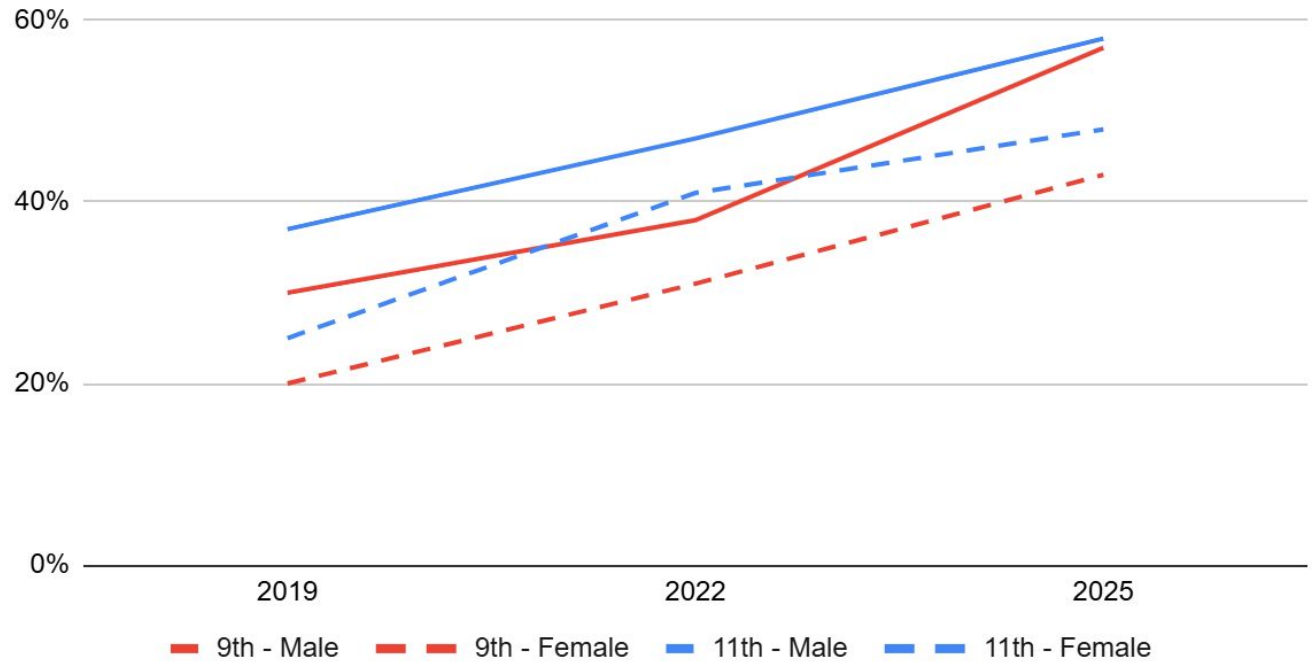
Has an adult in your school helped you think about education options for after high school (college or other training program)?

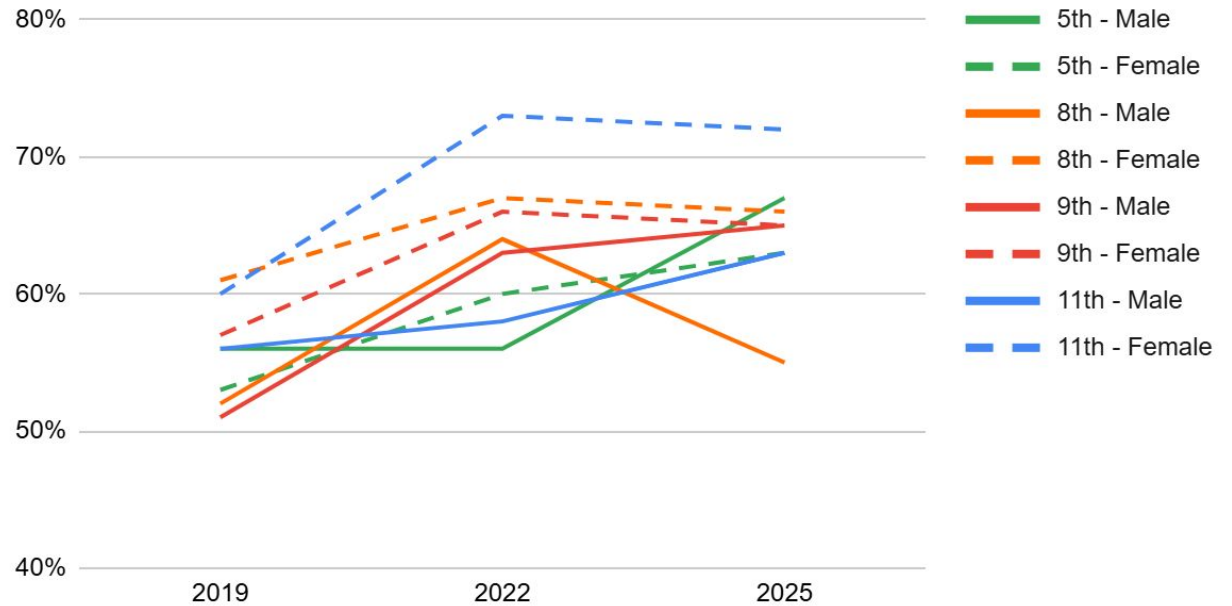

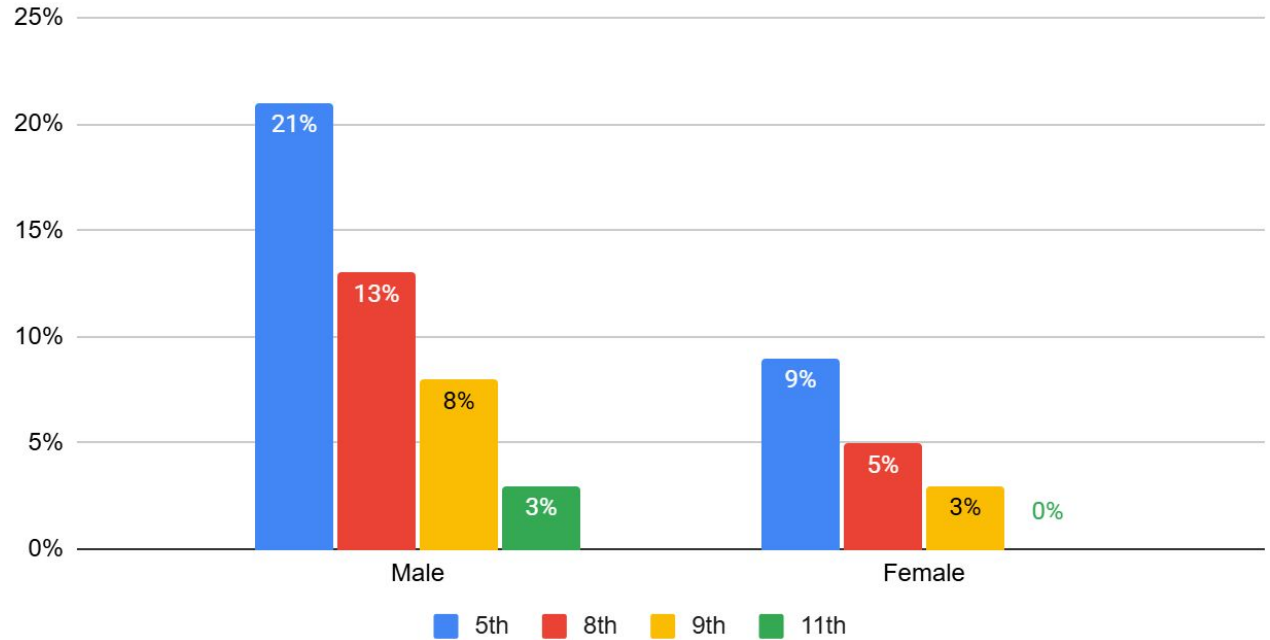

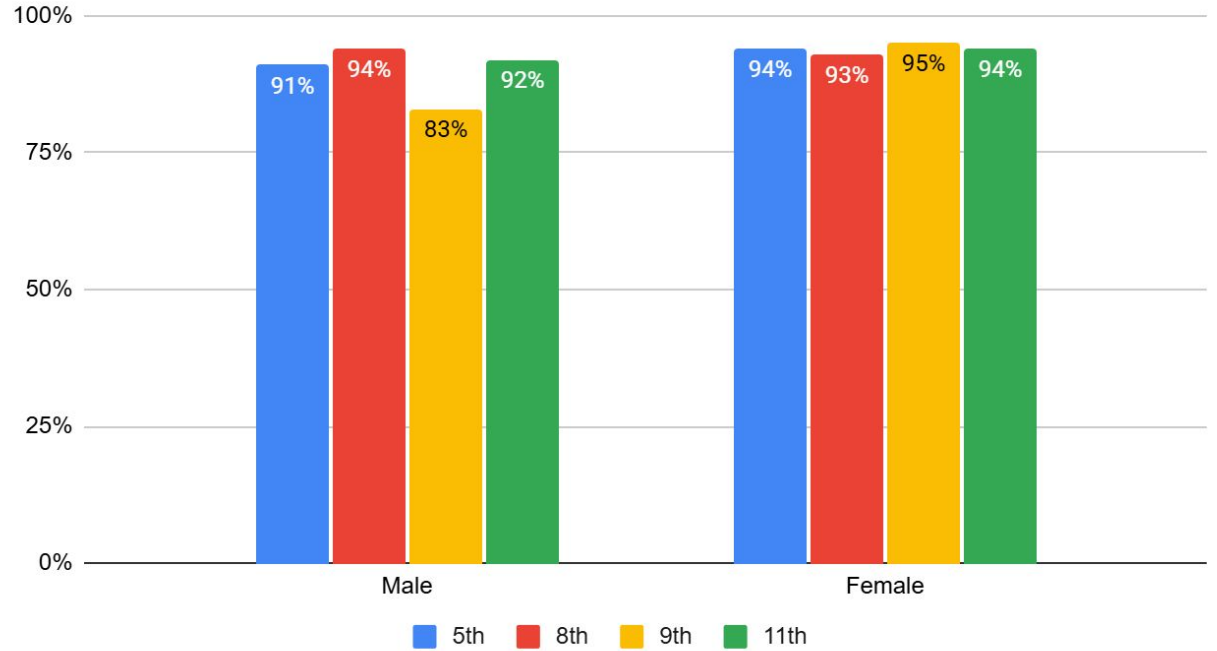
Percent sent out of class at least once for discipline in the past 30 days

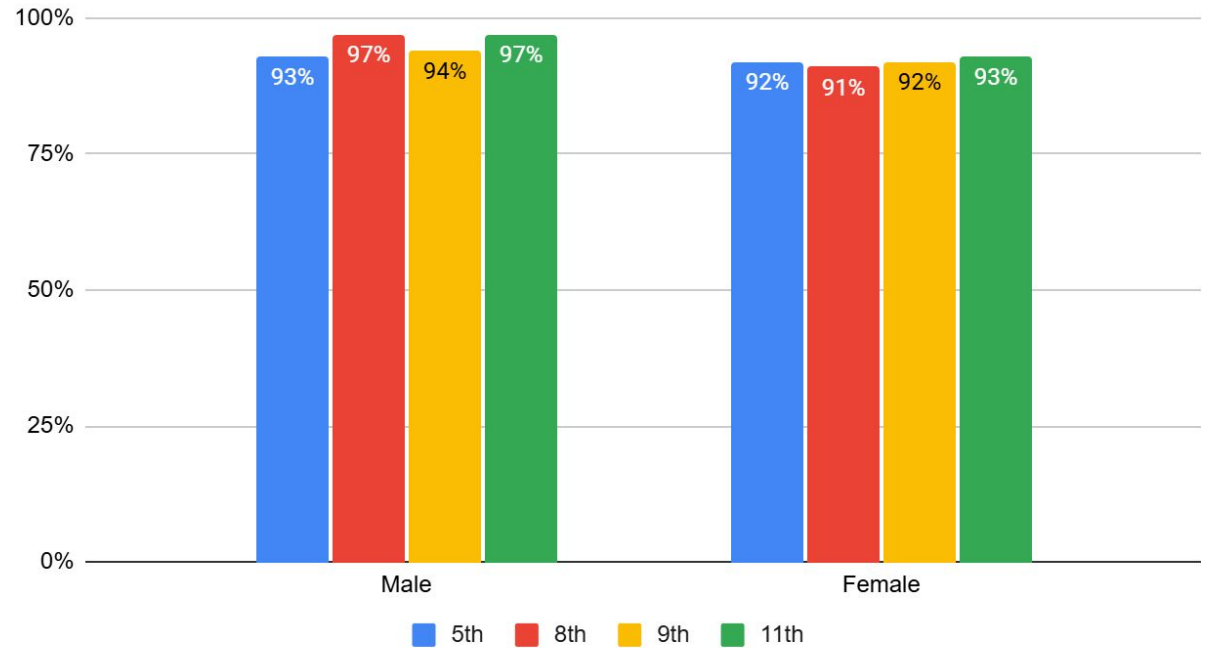

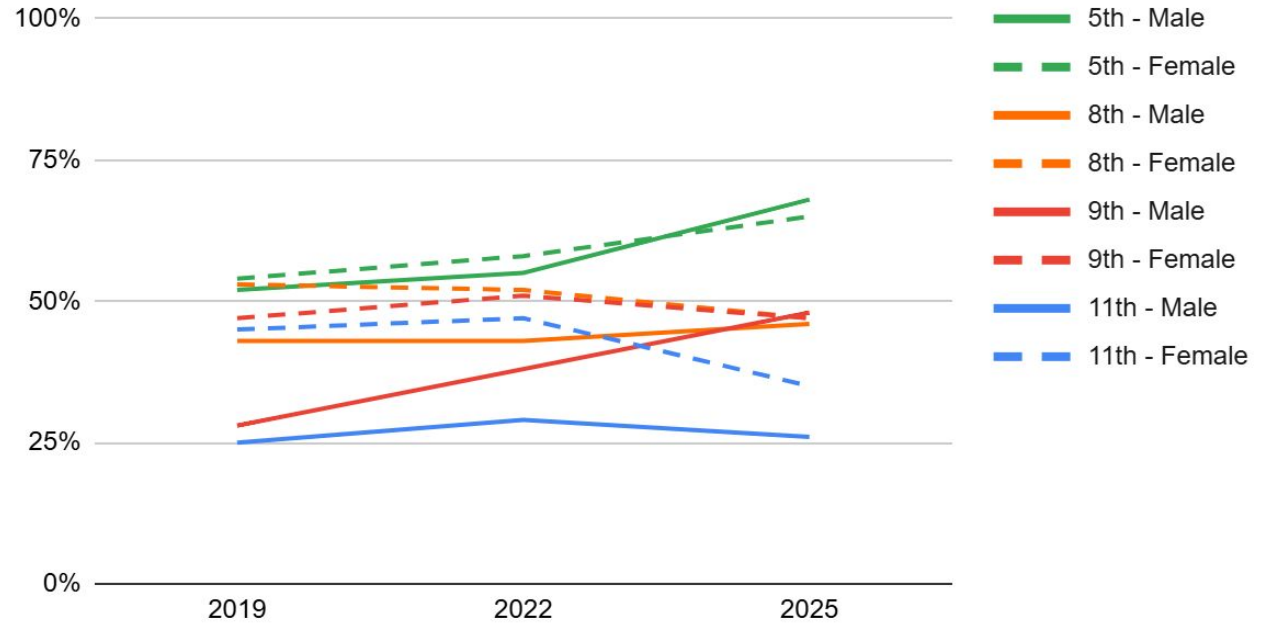
Percent who feel safe at school

Percent of students who were bullied once or more in the last 30 days



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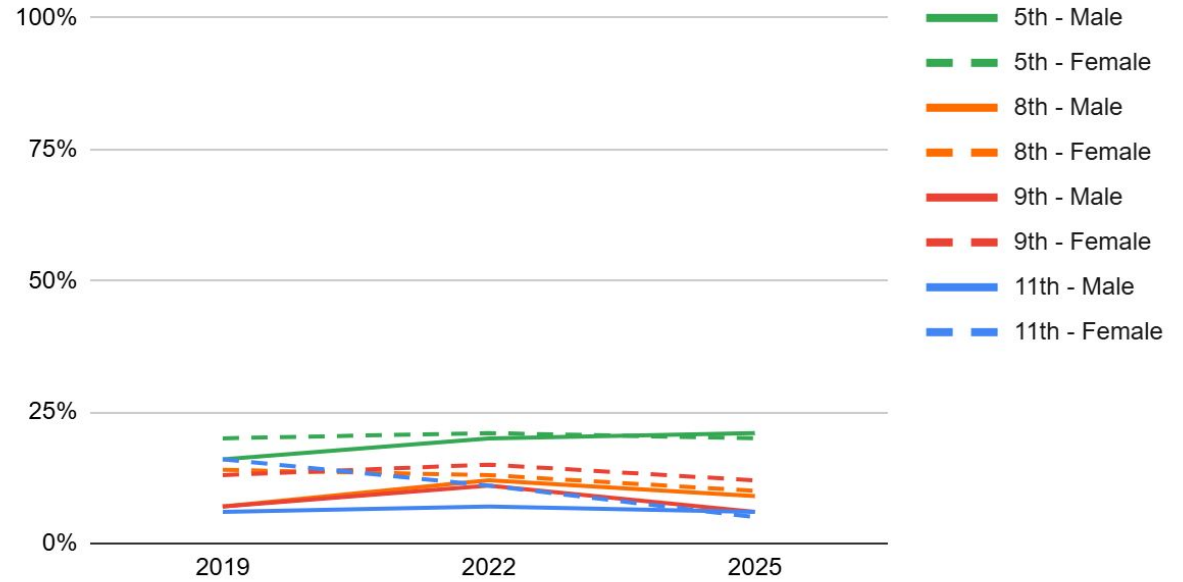

Percent of students who were cyberbullied once or more in the last 30 days



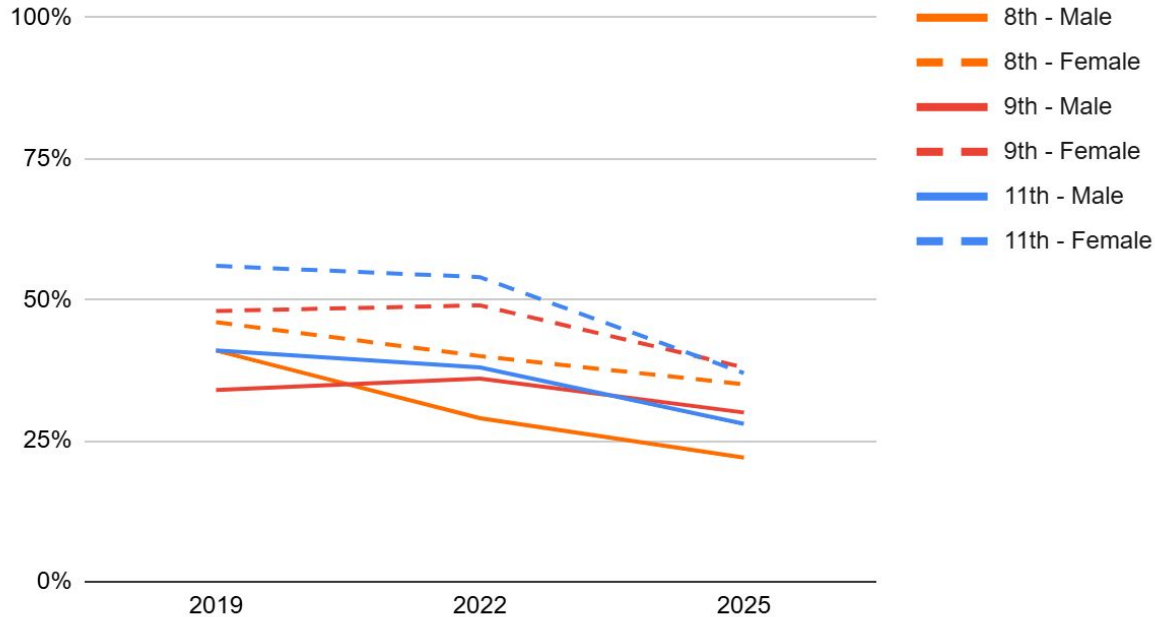

Adverse Childhood Experiences

ACEs Score of 1 or More



An adverse childhood experience (ACE) describes a traumatic experience in a person's life occurring before age 18. The ACEs Score is a measure of cumulative exposure to adverse childhood conditions, and combines the responses to questions about:

- Living with anyone who drinks too much alcohol, uses illegal drugs or abuses prescription drugs
- Living with anyone who is depressed or has another mental health issue
- Parental incarceration
- Verbal or physical abuse
- Domestic violence
- Sexual abuse

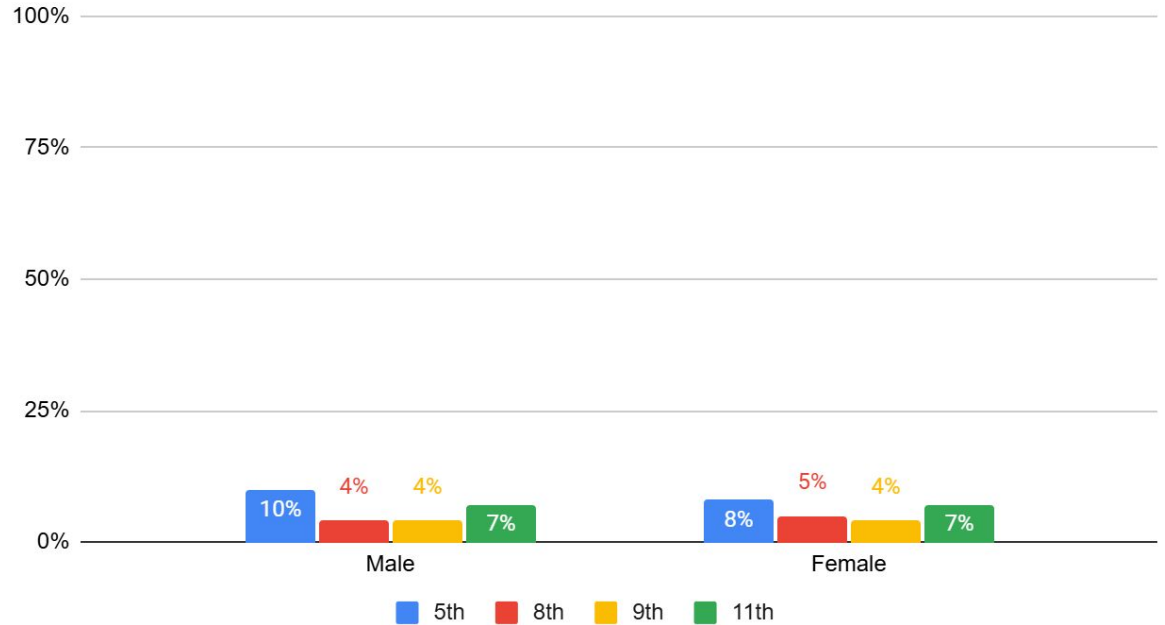


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Gun Violence

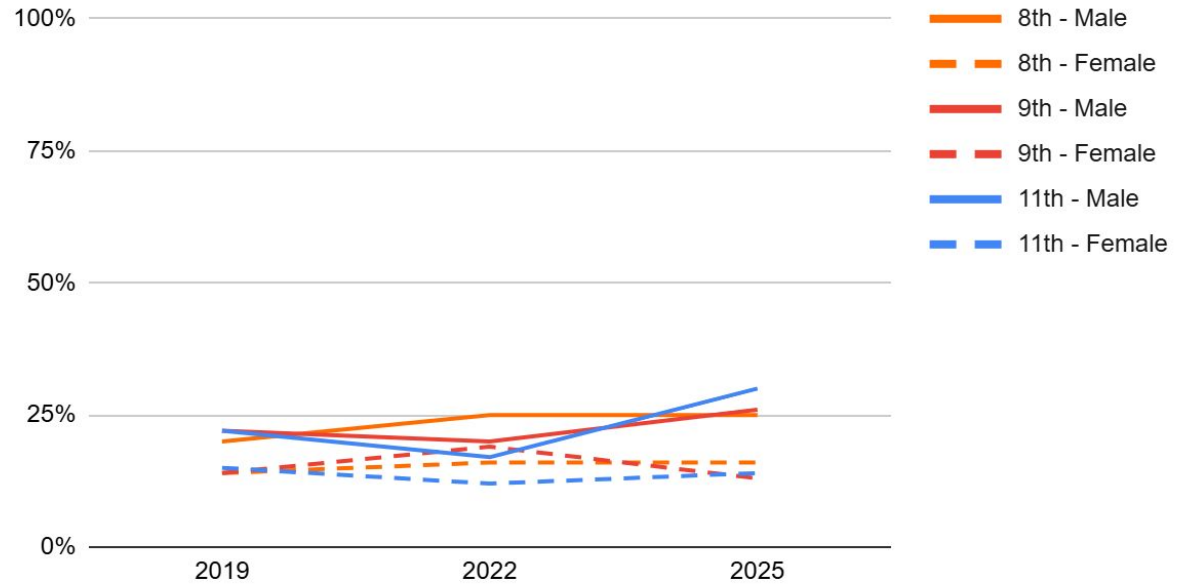

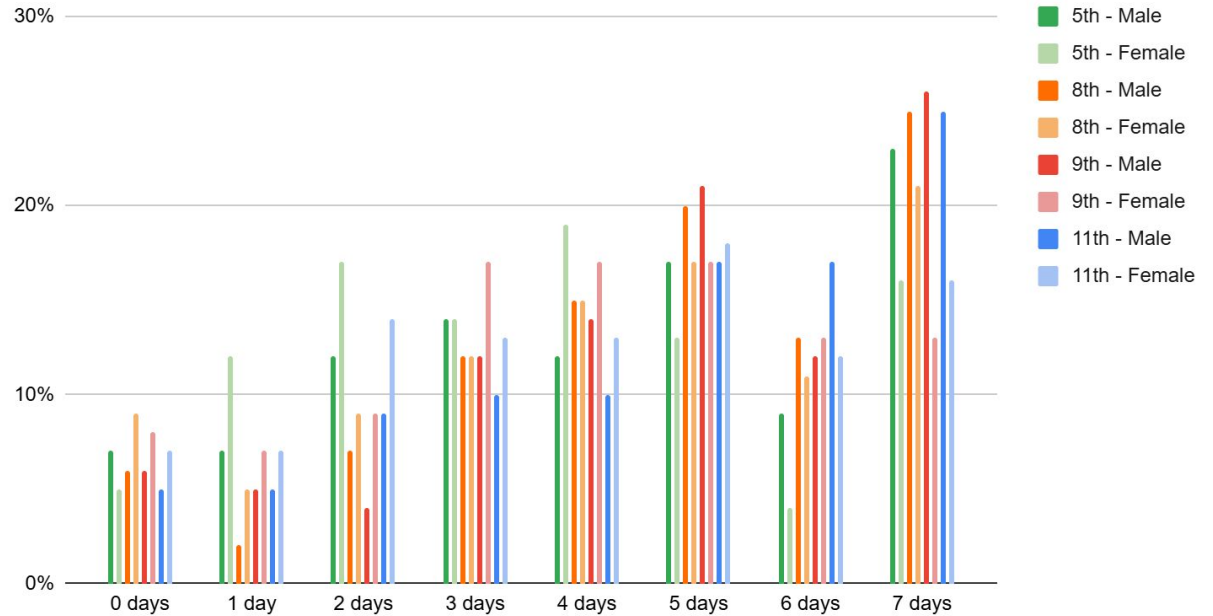
Percent overweight or obese, based on calculated BMI (self-reported weight and height)

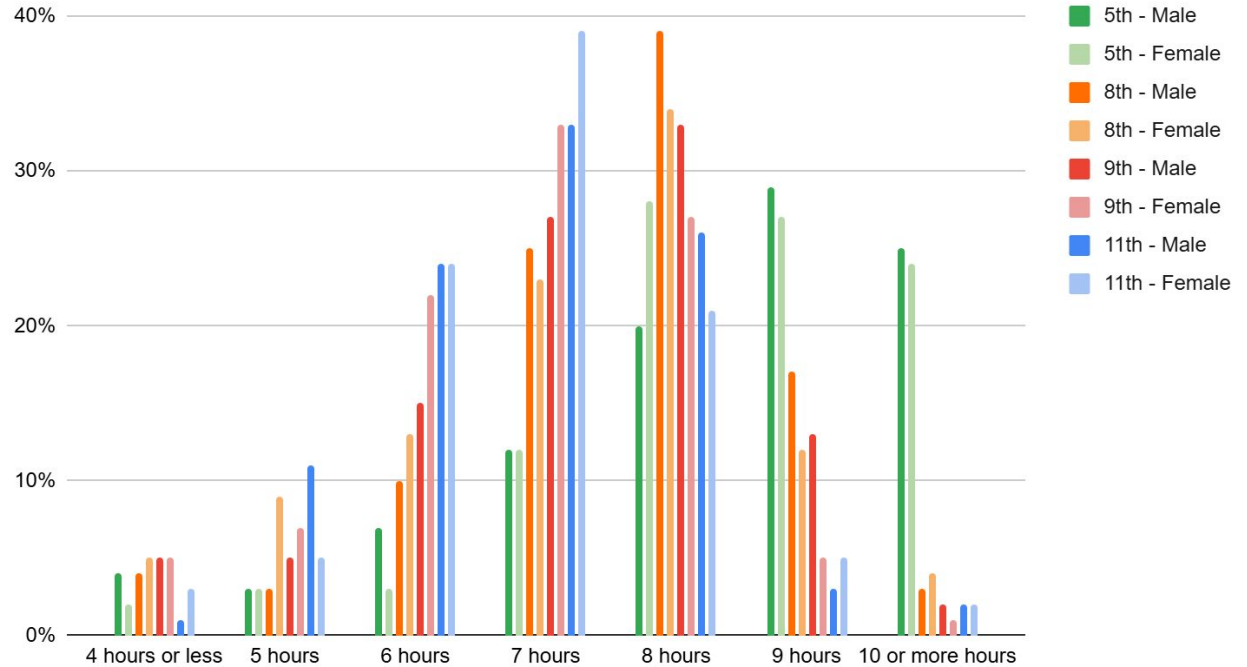
During the last 7 days, on how many days were you physically active for a total of at least 60 minutes per day?

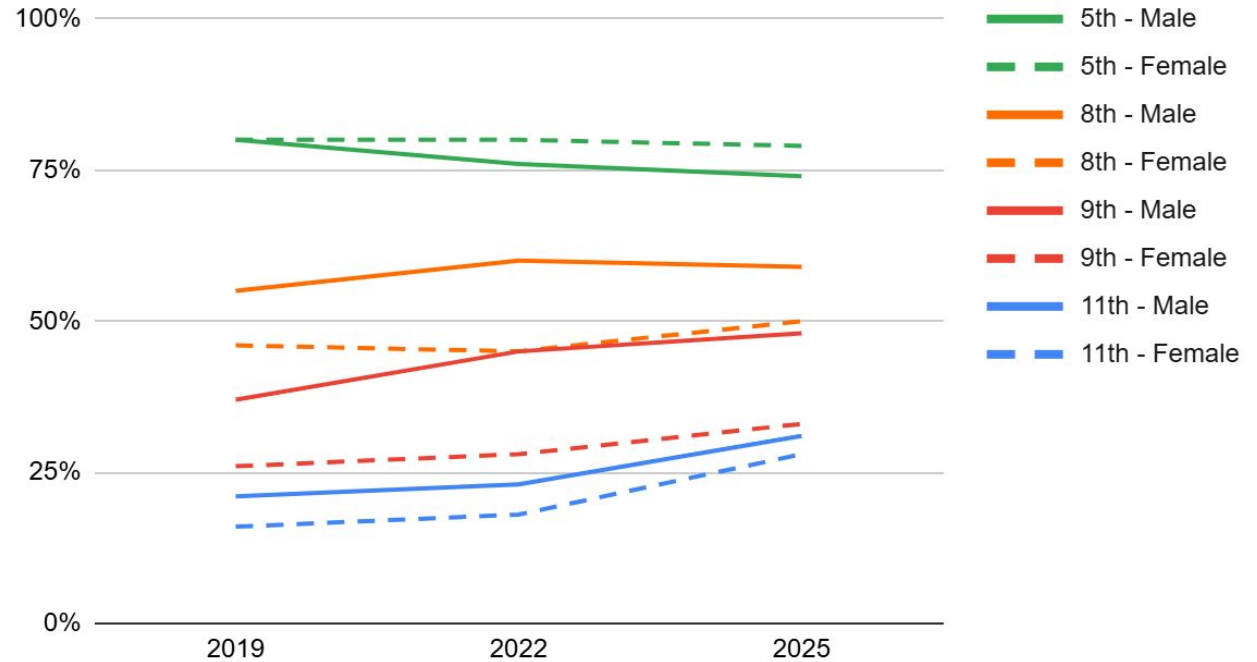
During a typical school night, how many hours of sleep do you get?

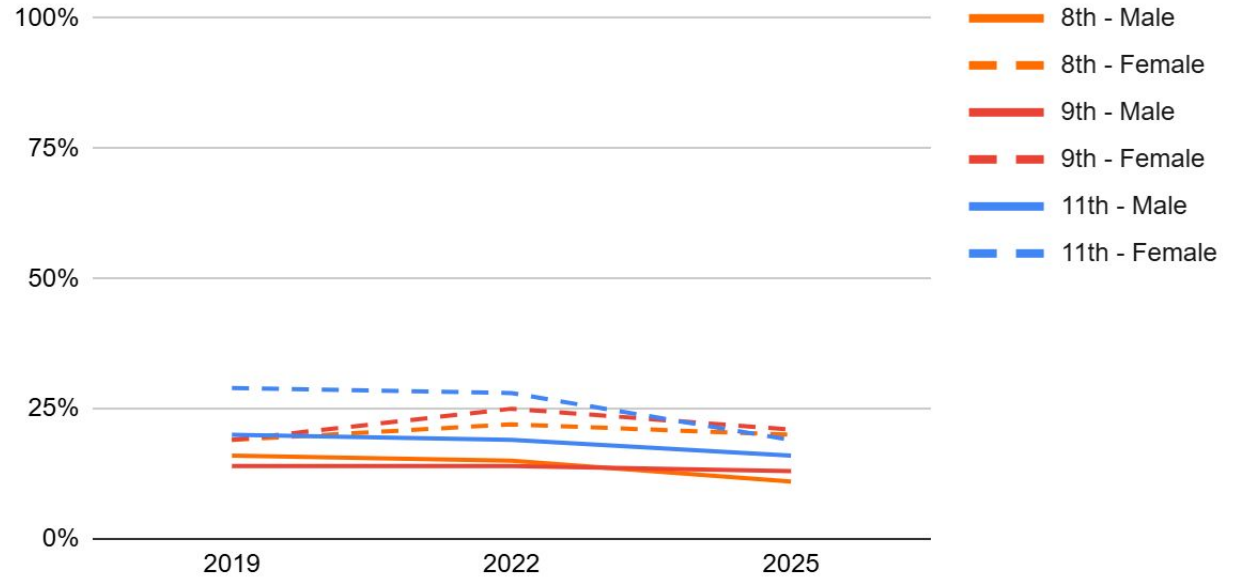

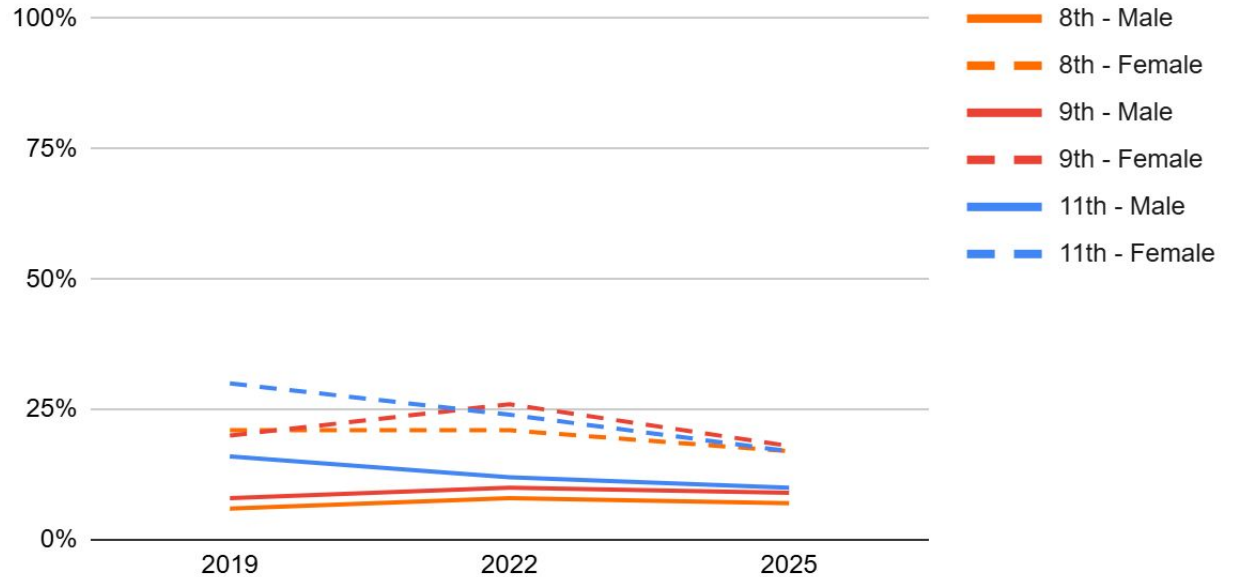
Percent reporting being bothered by little interest or pleasure in doing things more than half the days or nearly every day in the last two weeks

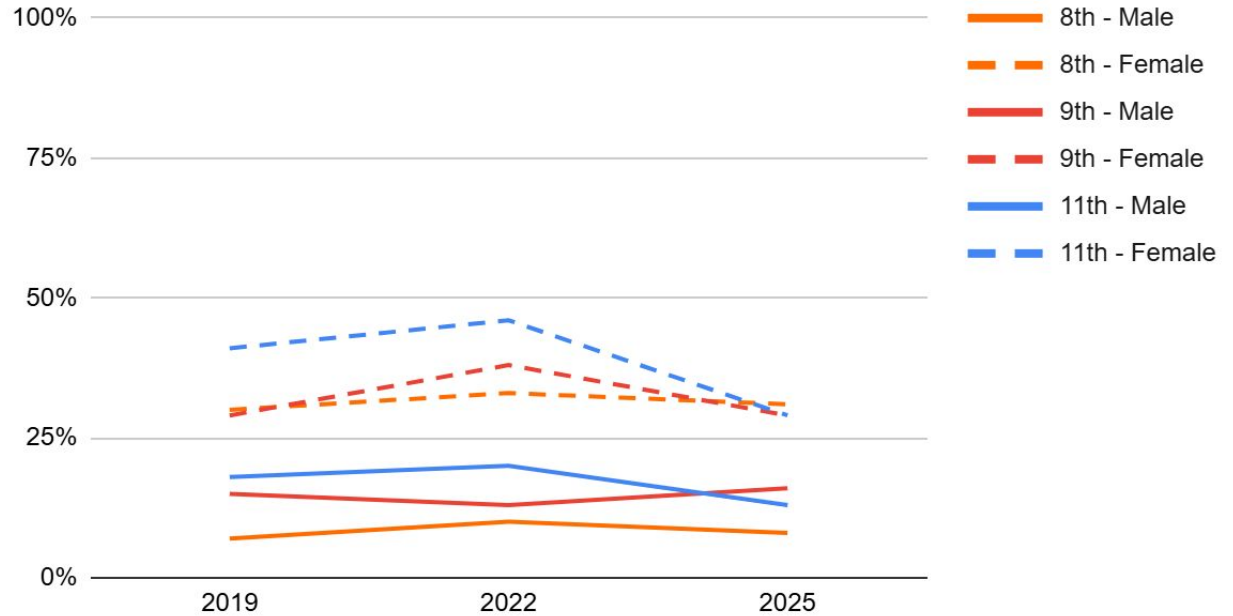
Percent reporting being bothered by feeling down, depressed, or hopeless more than half the days or nearly every day in the last two weeks

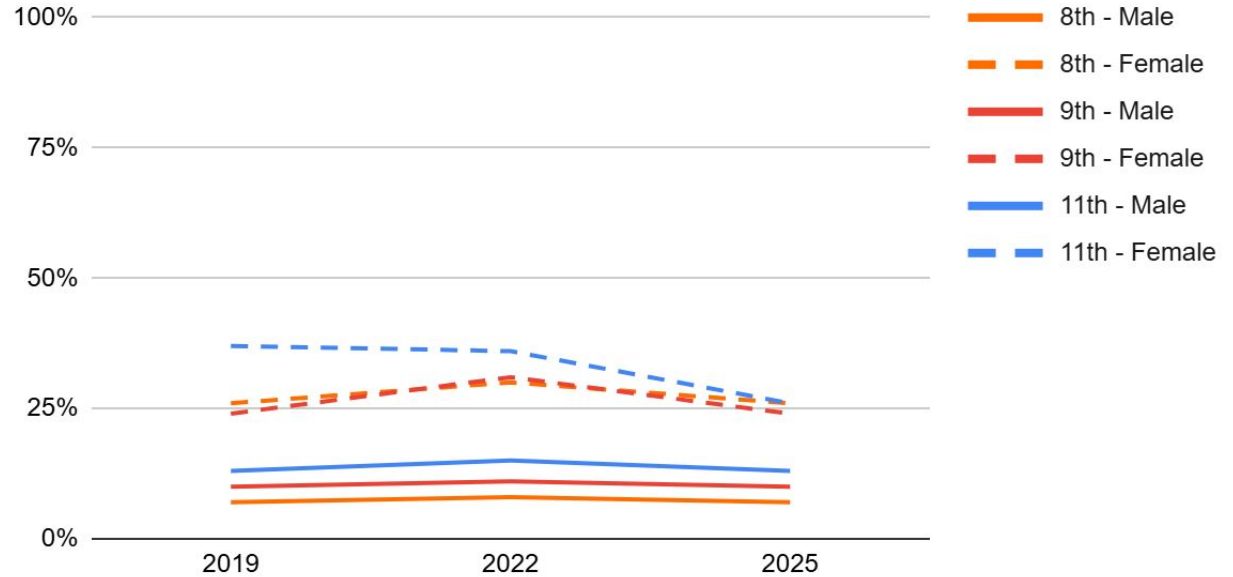
Percent reporting being bothered by feeling nervous, anxious, or on edge more than half the days or nearly every day in the last two weeks

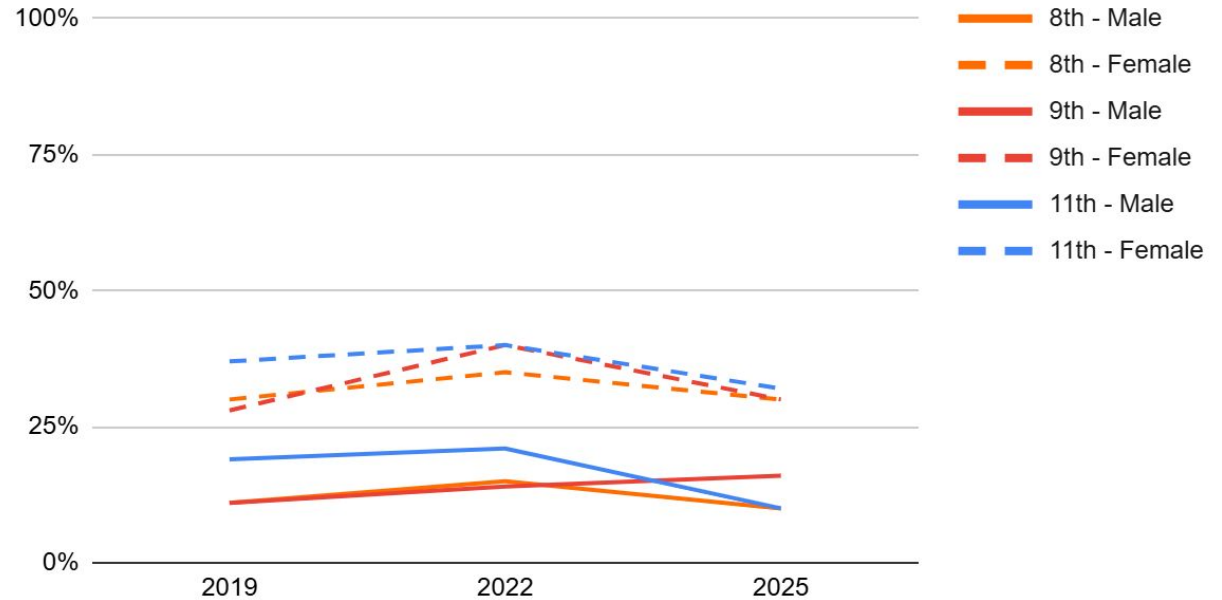
Percent reporting being bothered by not being able to stop or control worrying more than half the days or nearly every day in the last two weeks

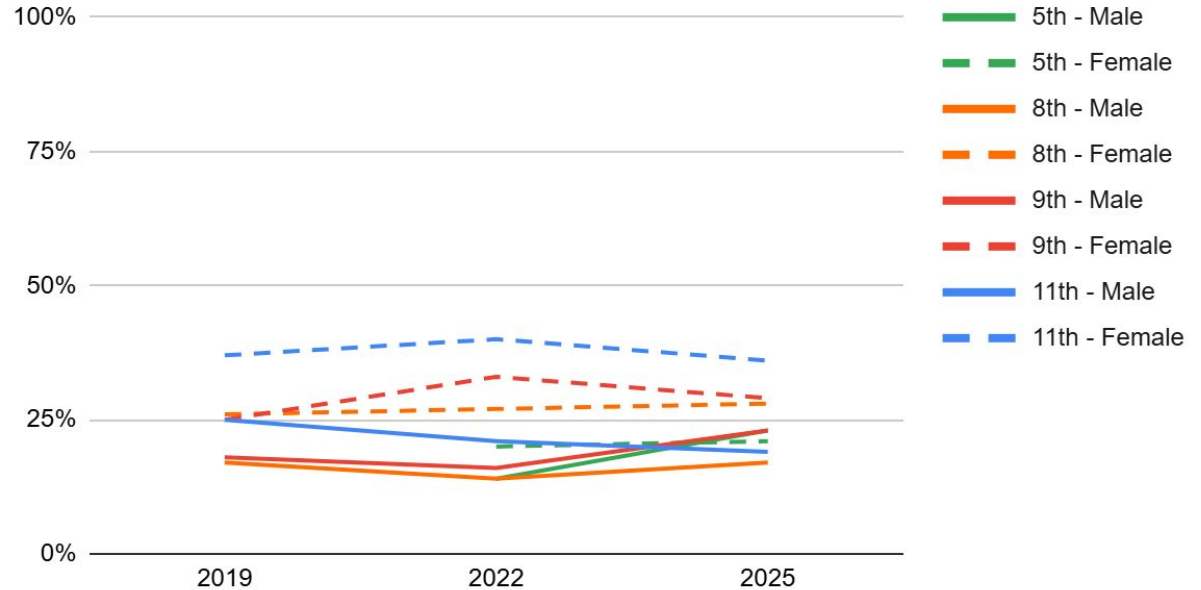
Percent with any long-term mental health, behavioral, or emotional problems

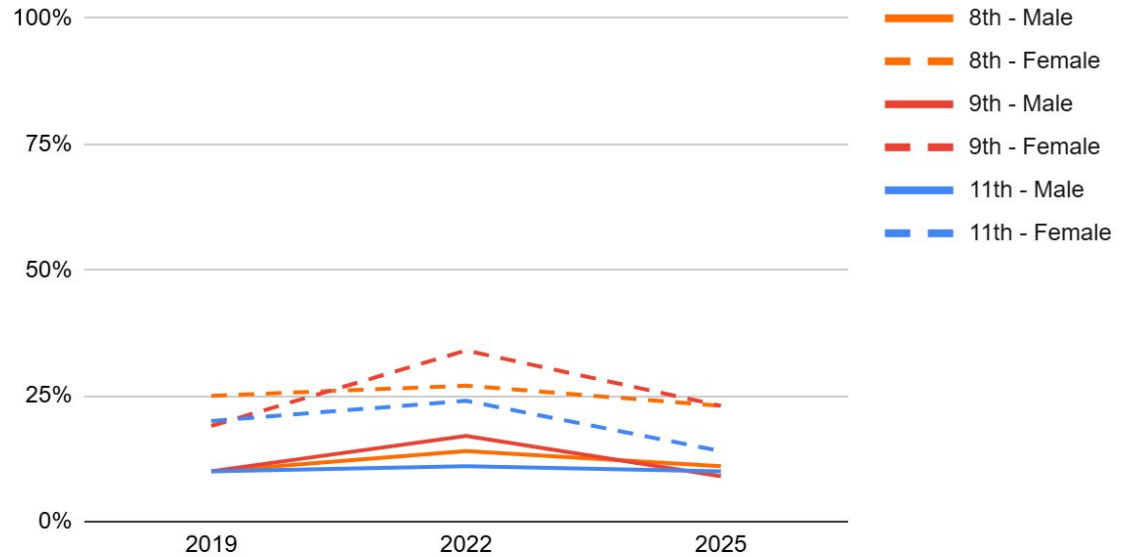
Percent ever treated for a mental health, emotional, or behavioral problem

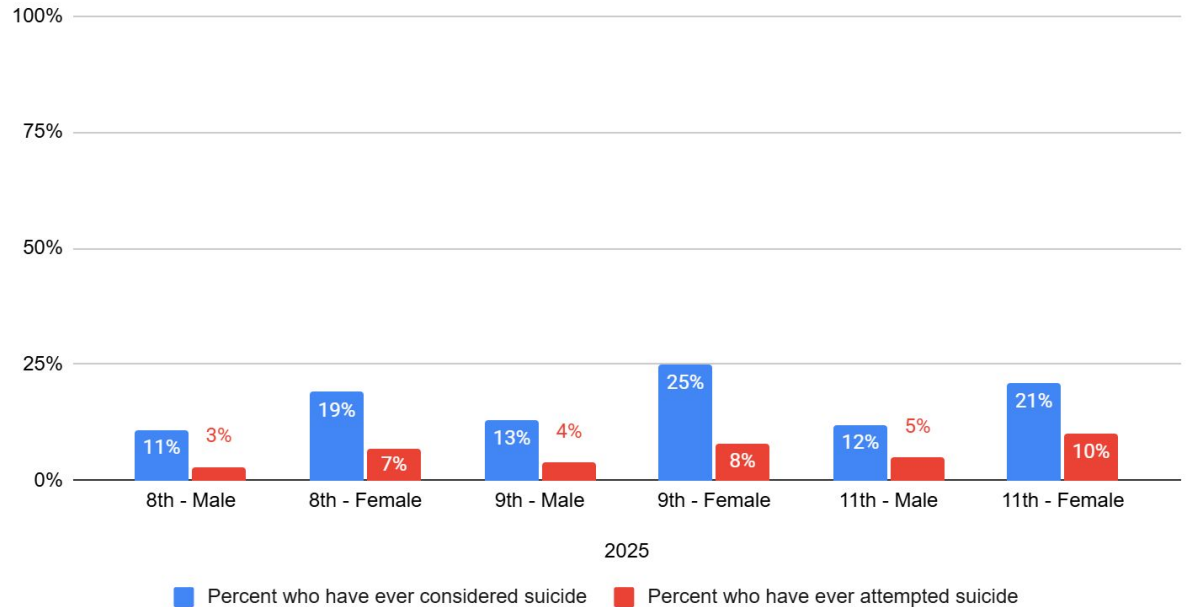
Percent of students who purposely hurt or injured themselves in the past 12 months

Percent who have ever considered suicide and Percent who have ever attempted suicide



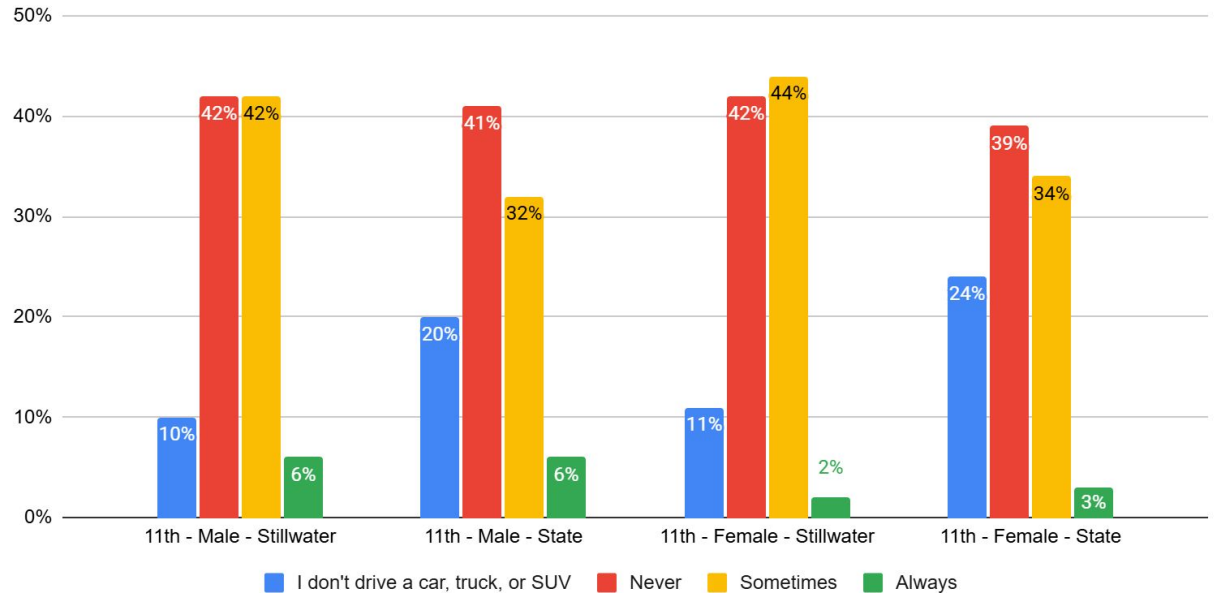

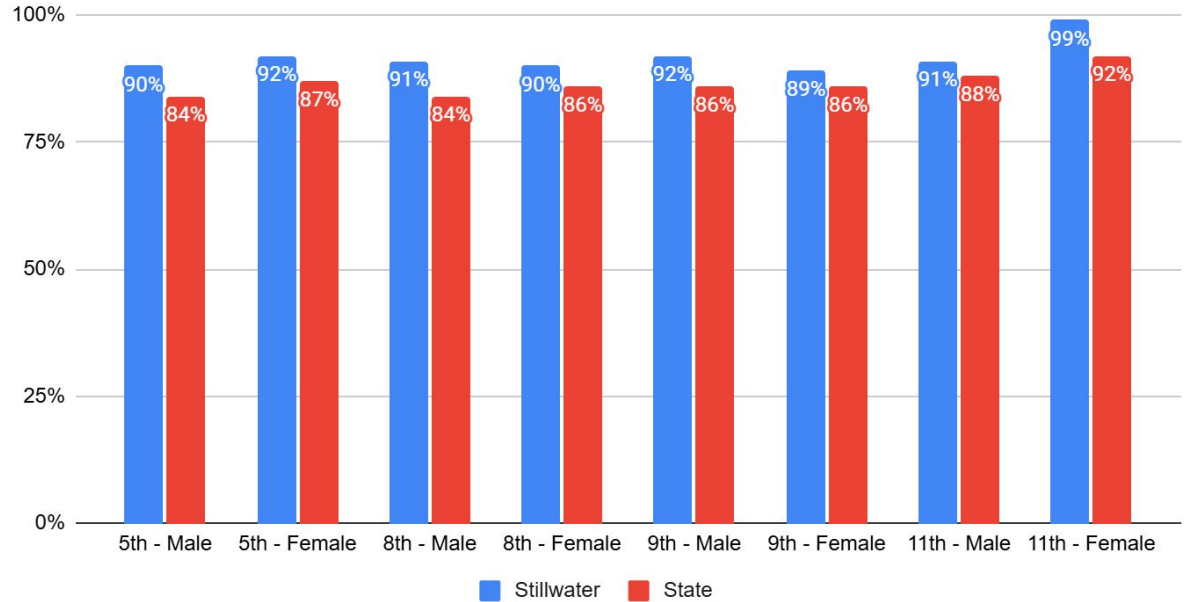
When driving a car, truck or SUV, how often do you handle your phone to do things like send or read text messages, take pictures, use social media, stream videos, or videochat?

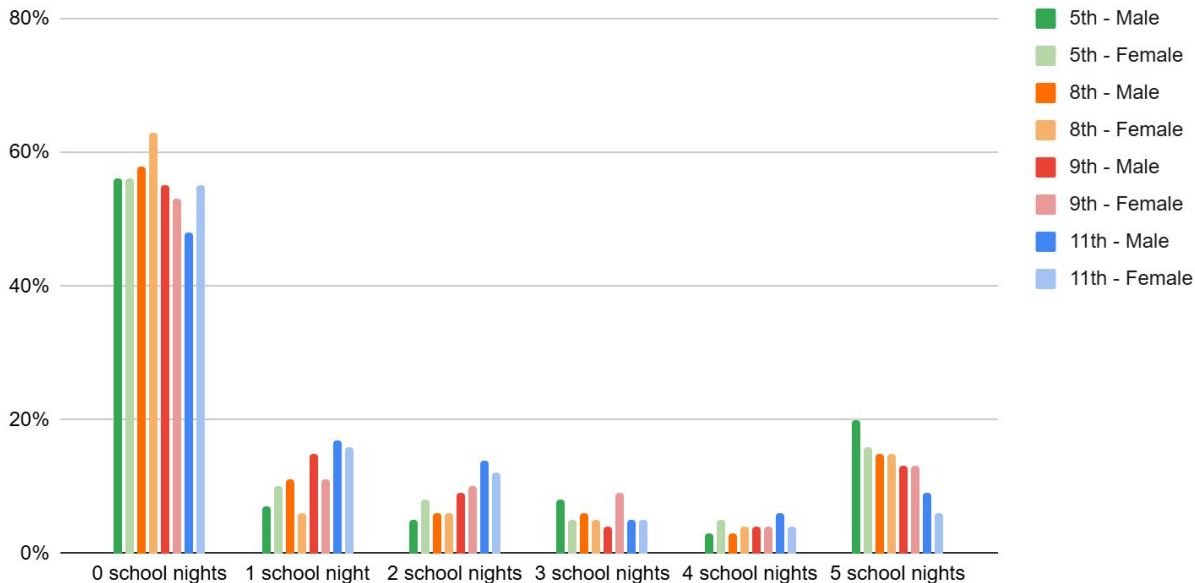
Percent who always wear a seat belt when driving or riding in a car, truck or SUV

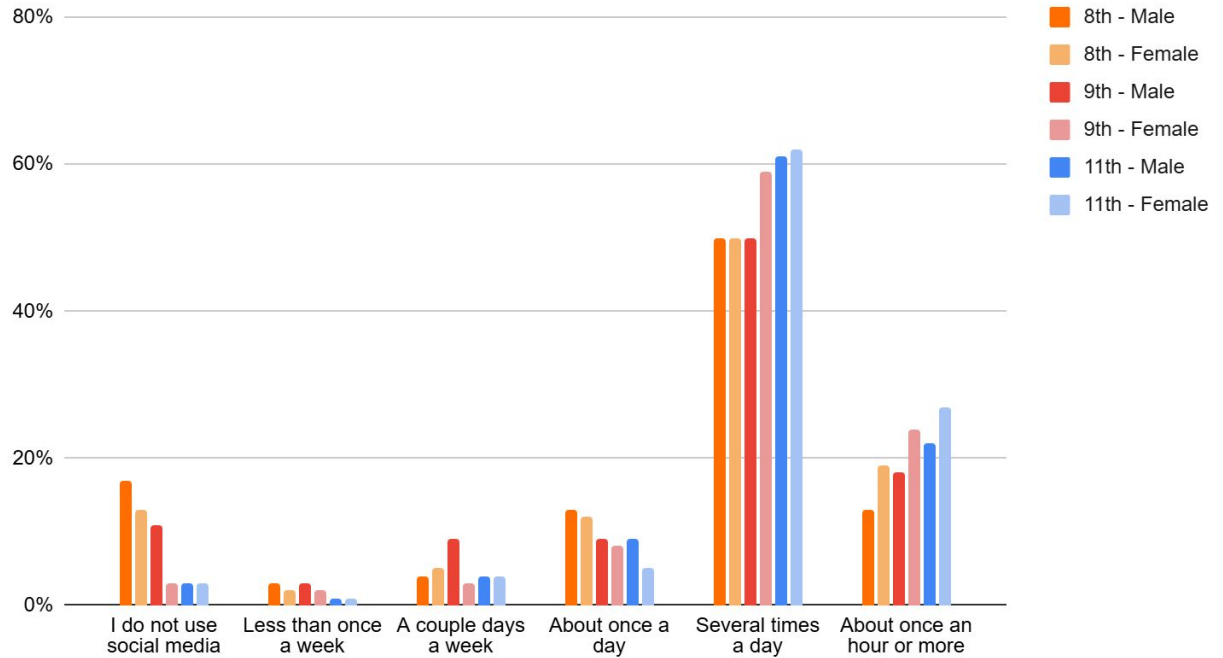
During an average week when you are in school, on how many school nights do you use technology between midnight and 5AM? (Count time spent playing games, watching videos, texting, or using social media on your devices.)

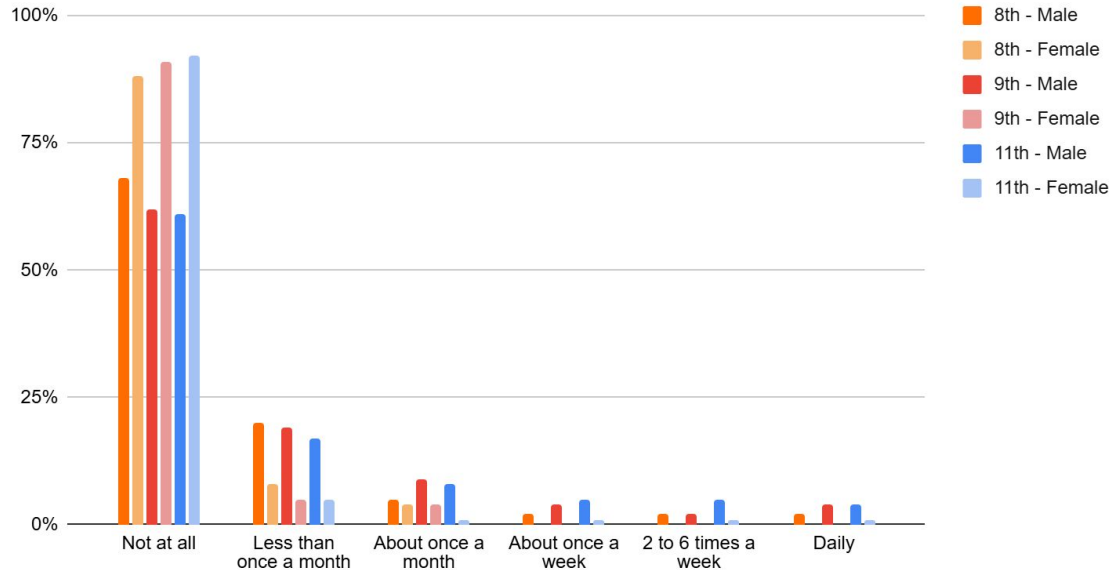

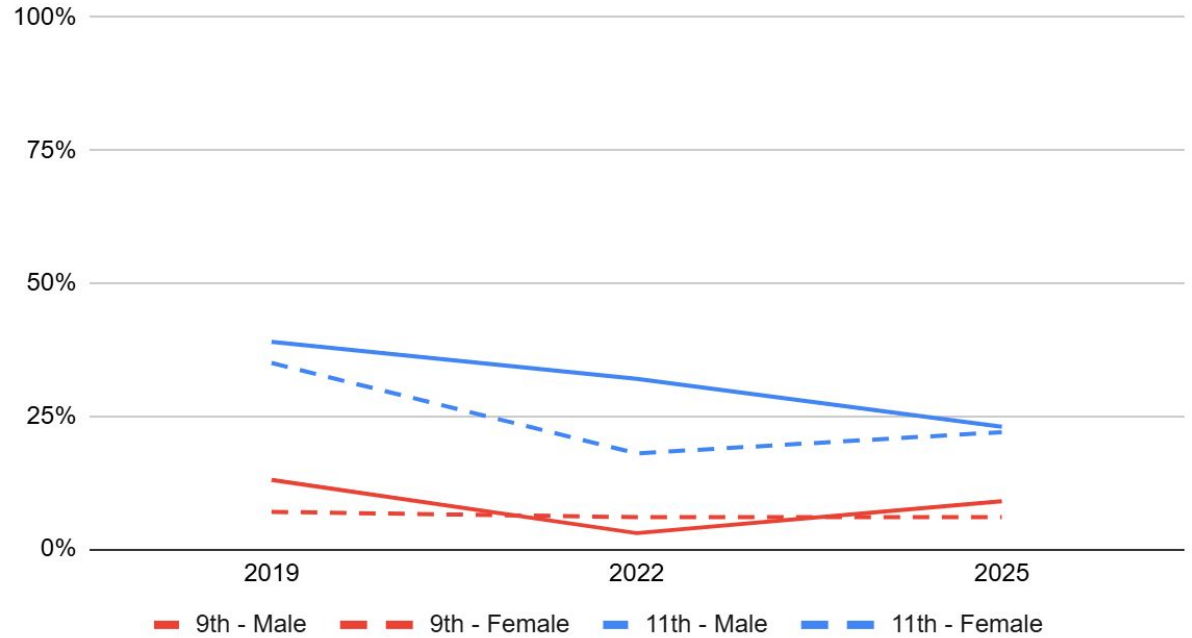

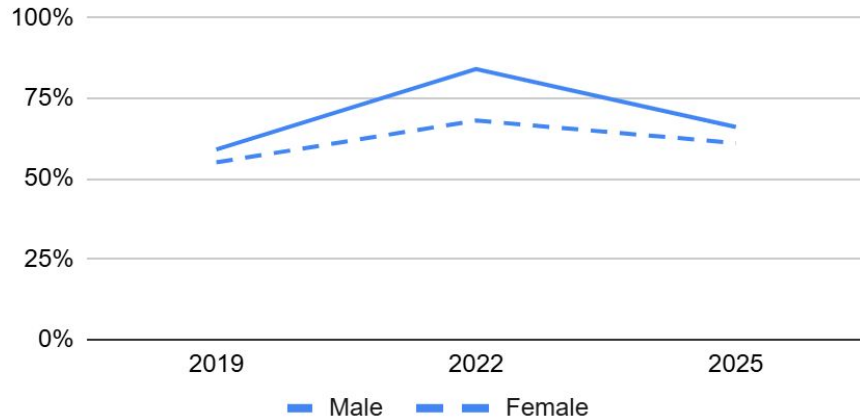

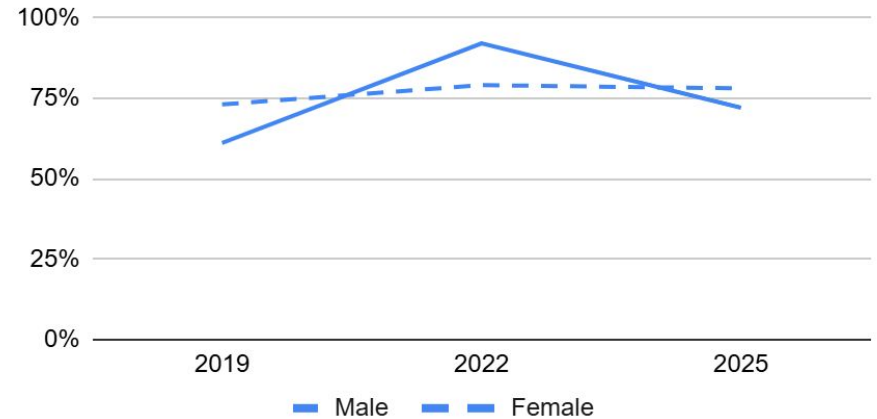


Prevention of Pregnancy and Infection

Percent who have talked about protection from STIs at least once with every partner

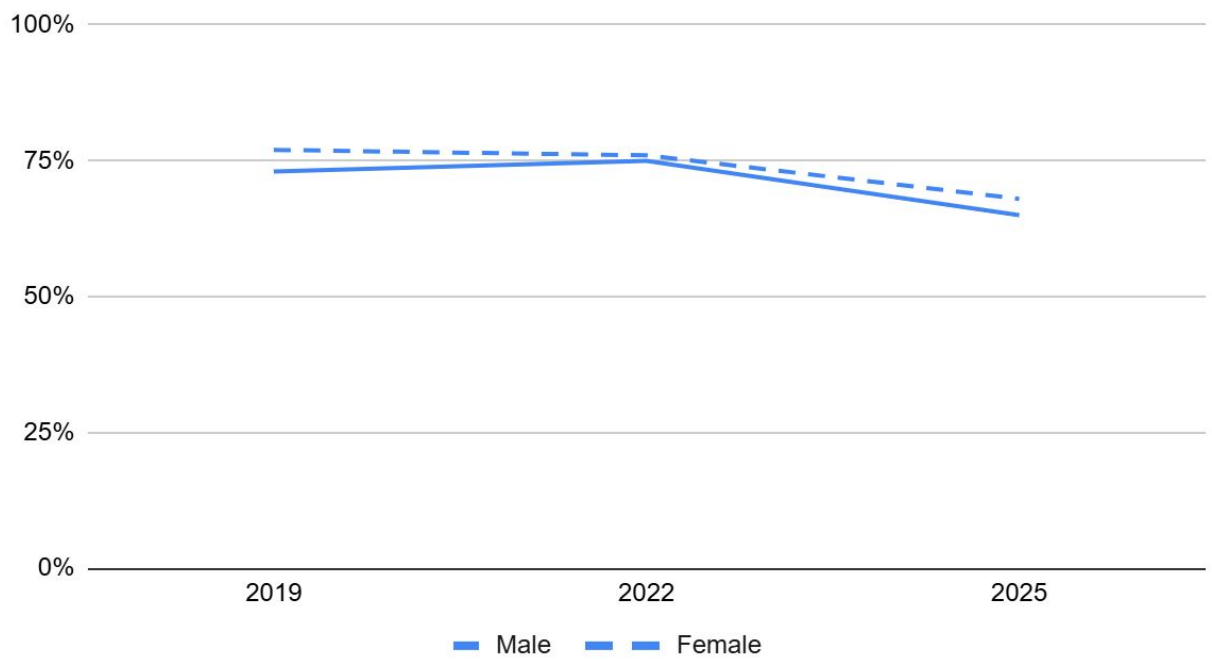


Percent who have talked about preventing pregnancy at least once with every partner



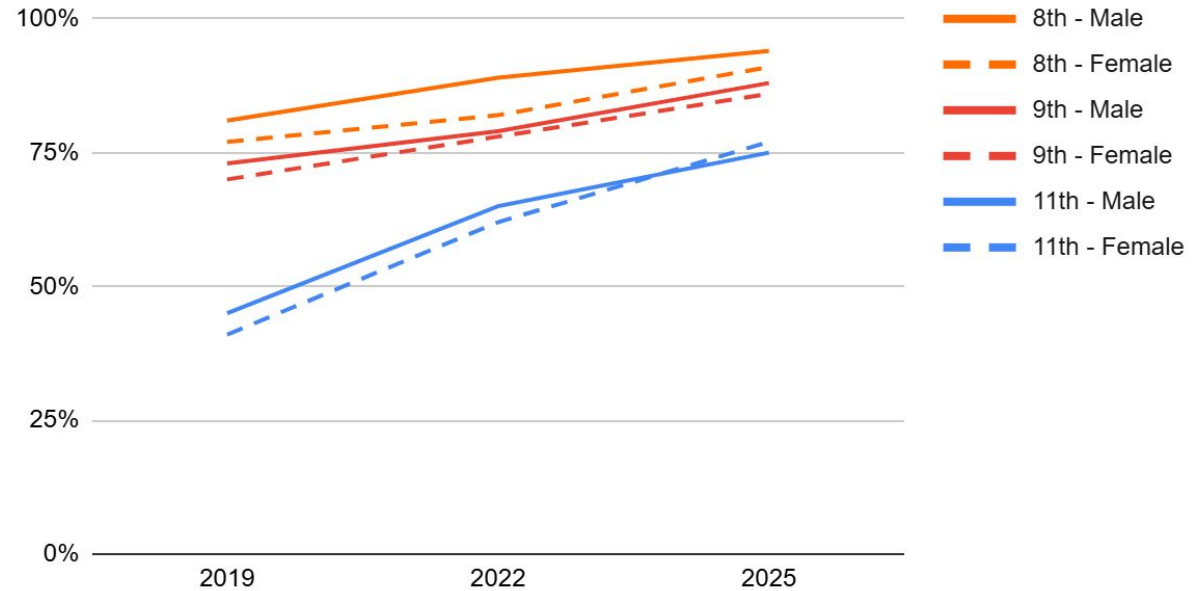

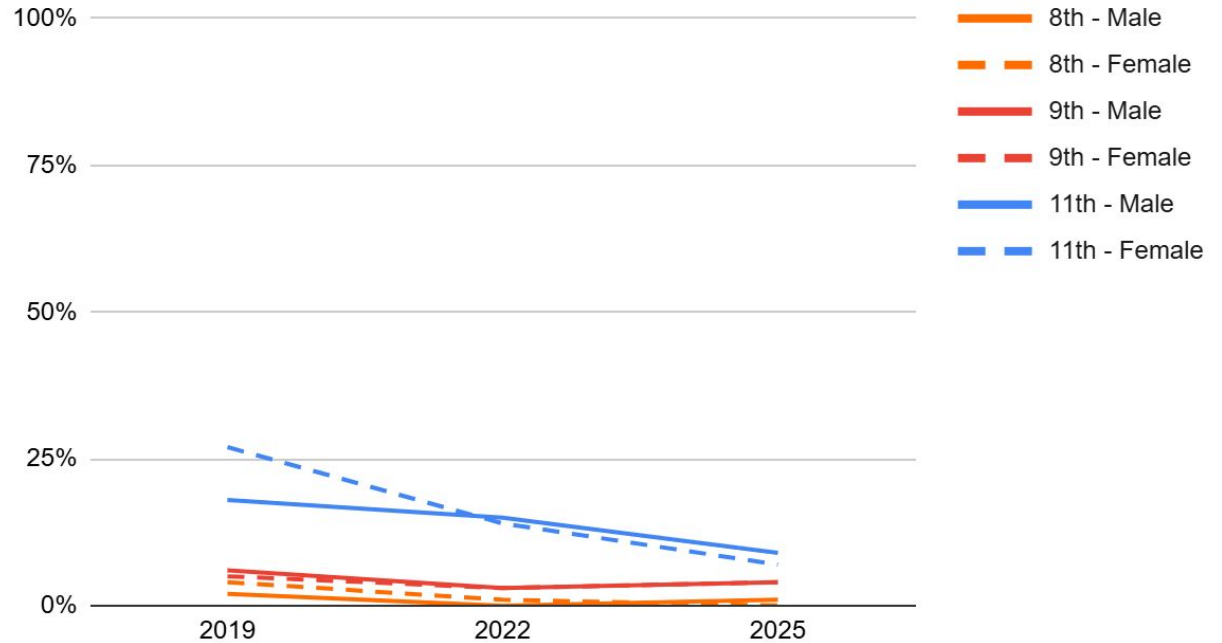
Percent who did not use alcohol, marijuana, or any other drug in the past year

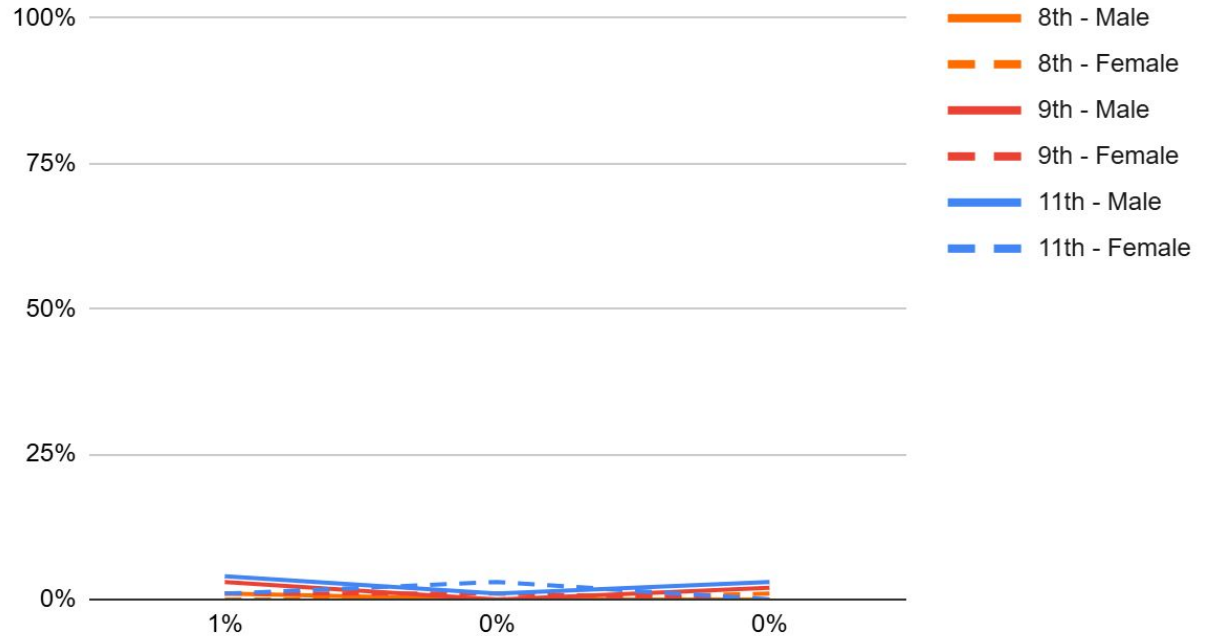
Percent who use alcohol at least monthly



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Tobacco Use

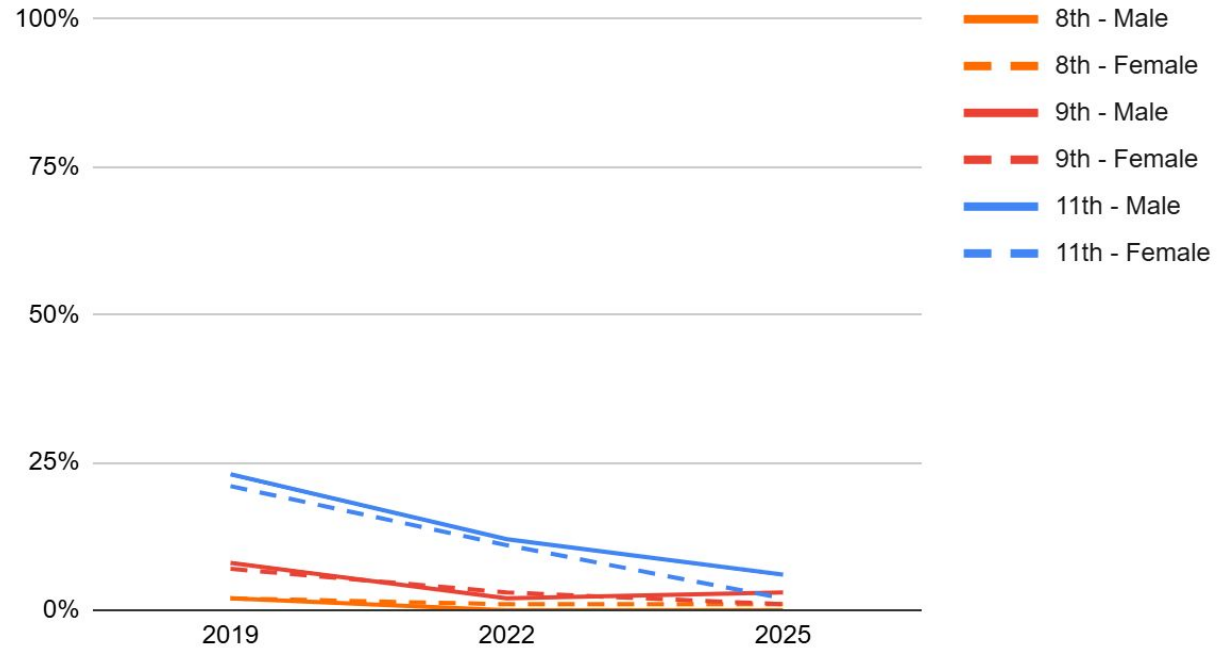
Percent who use tobacco at least monthly



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Marijuana Use

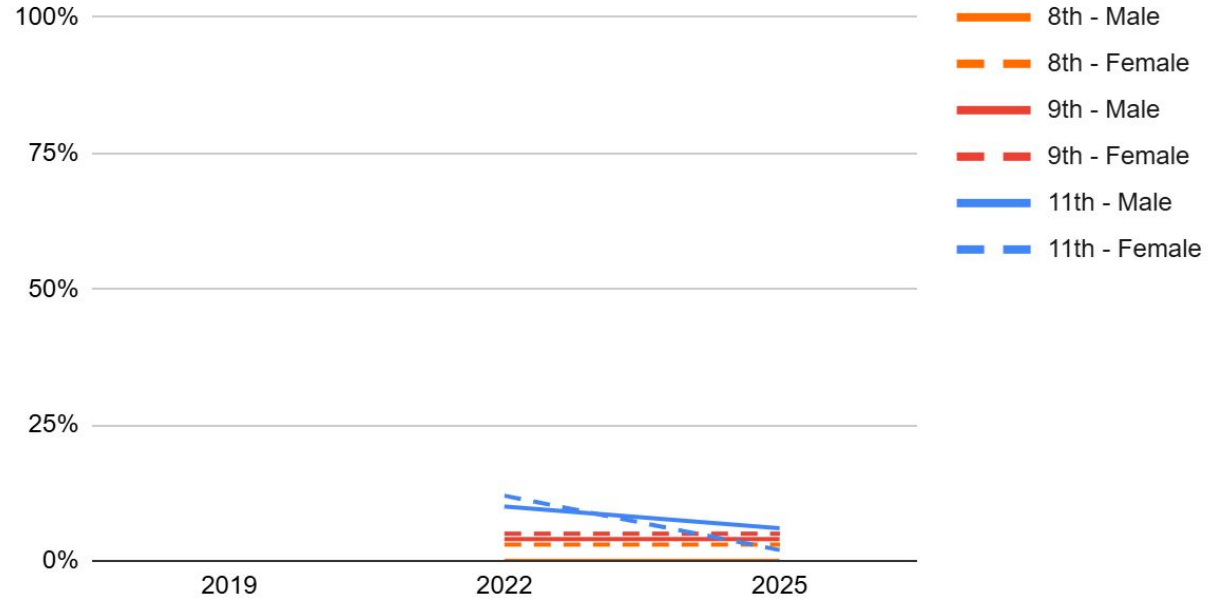

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E-Cigarettes - Nicotine

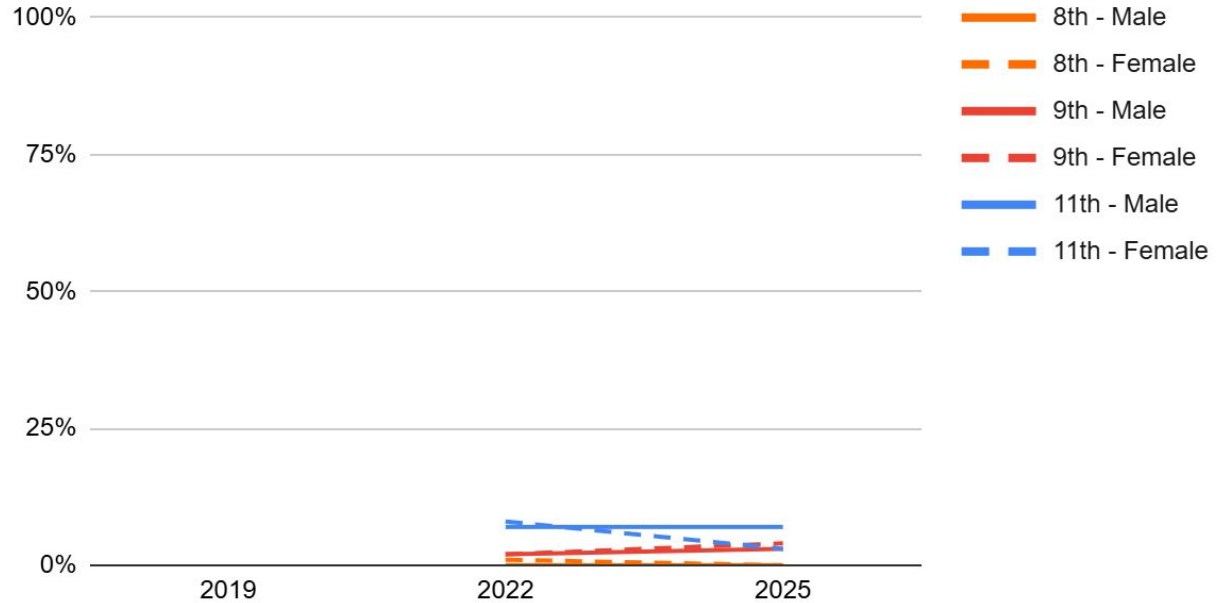
Percent who use a vaping device or e-cigarette with nicotine at least monthly

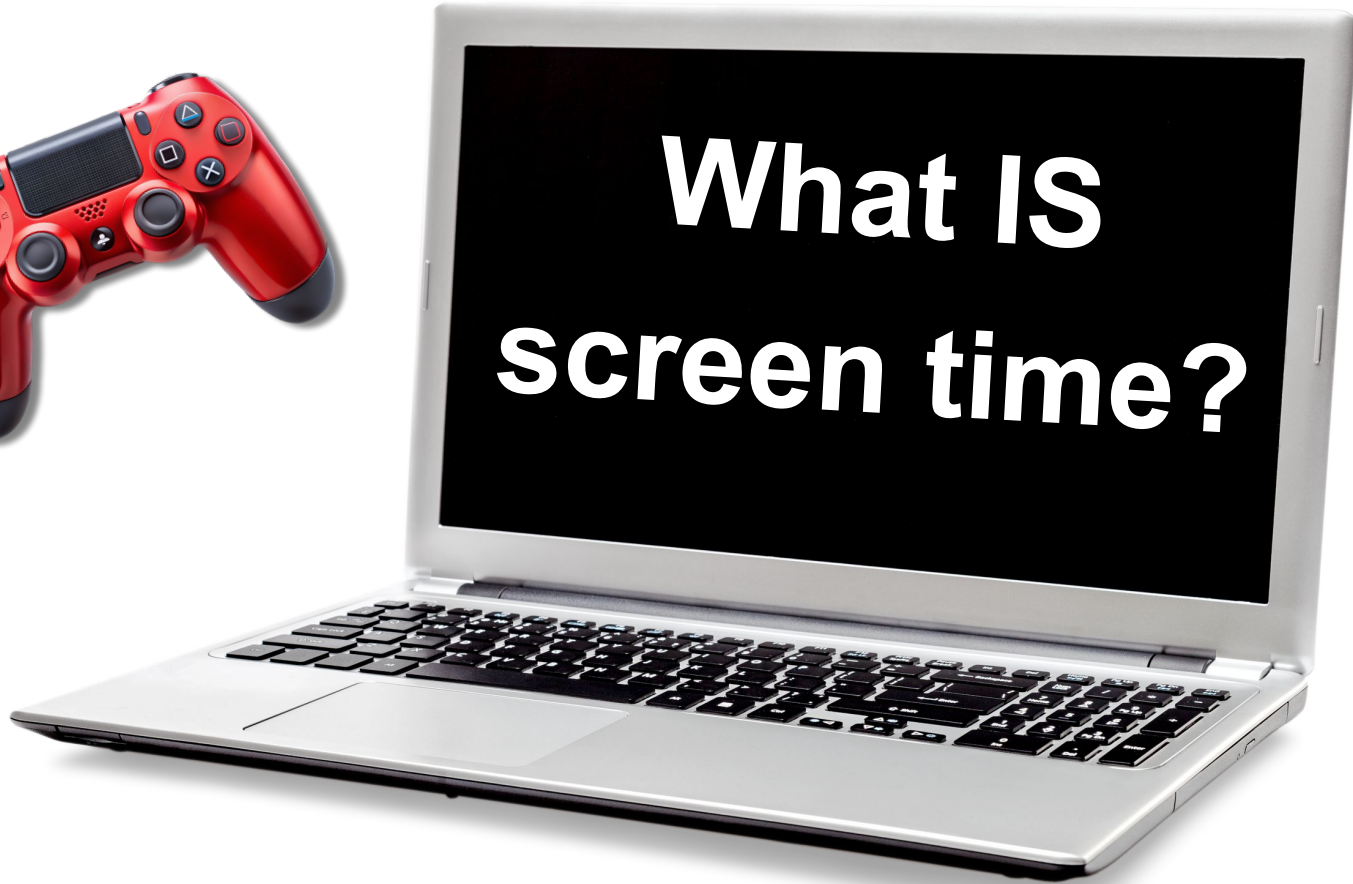

Three Types of “Screen Time”

Cell Phones & Social Media


- Designed to incentivize consistent user engagement.
- Can serve as a significant distraction.
- Subject of recent legislation in most U.S. states.

EdTech

- Used to support student learning.
- Used in ADDITION to high quality teaching.
- Designed to deepen content knowledge AND build 21st-century skills.

Entertainment

- Refers to platforms NOT accessed primarily on a cell phone.
- Includes video games, television, and desktop computers.

Structured and Intentional Use

Structured and Intentional

- Used for a clear purpose.
- Used alongside in-person experiences
- Used to target specific skills

Unstructured and Unintentional

- Mindless scrolling (Doom Scrolling!)
- Multiple hours without breaks
- Used as a replacement for in-person activities

Why we use EdTech

Differentiation

Students are able to engage with activities and lessons that are engaging, personalized, and targets the concepts they are developing.

Skill-Building

EdTech allows students to build and maintain important 21st-century skills that they will need beyond their PreK–12 education.

Access and Inclusion

EdTech allows greater access to grade-level academics to ALL students, including those in special education and English-learner programs.



Student Technology Access



- Universal Access Device Program (One-To-One)
 - **Grades PreK-1:** Shared device access in classrooms for specific programs or lessons (2:1 iPads)
 - **Grades 2-5:** Devices available in the classroom for (1:1 Chromebooks in Carts)
 - **Grades 6-12+:** Individual device for learning (1:1 Chromebook)

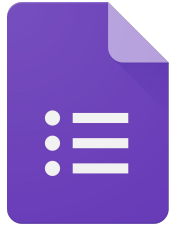

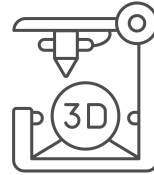

Guardrails for Technology Use

- Safety: Internet filters, “walled gardens” and safeguards
- Teachers can support students and view screens in real time (Hapara)
- Technology is used for specific learning purposes
- Digital Citizenship and clear expectations for student use (and non-use)
- Teachers redirect students when needed



Cell Phone Policy

Policy 524.5: Personal Electronic Communication Devices

1. All students (preK-12) are **prohibited from using personal electronic communication devices** - including phones, smart watches, earbuds, etc. - on school premises **from the first bell of the school day to the last**. This includes instructional time, lunch periods, recess, school-sponsored programs, events or activities, or any other time during the designated school day.
2. All personal electronic communication devices shall be **kept in designated areas** and turned off.

Approved March 4, 2025



Cell Phone Policy Exceptions

- Use allowed under an **IEP, 504 Plan, or documented health care plan**
- Use allowed to monitor or address a health concern or medical condition upon permission granted by school administration
- Families will work with Student Support Services to determine if there is a need


