Good afternoon.

On Thursday, April 12, the Utah State Board of Education approved a change to the rule that governs School LAND Trust program expenditures. The new language can be found at the end of this email.

The approved changes broaden the definition of academic to include behavioral programs and practices that support an academic goal. Because of this, behavioral programs are removed from the character education/student leadership component, and the changes include increasing the character education/student leadership component to \$7,000.

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R277-477-4. Appropriate Use of School LAND Trust Program Funds.

- (1) Parents, teachers, and the principal, in collaboration with an approving entity, shall use School LAND Trust Program funds in data-driven and evidence-based ways to improve educational outcomes, including:
 - (a) strategies that are measurable and show academic outcomes with multi-tiered systems of support; and
 - (b) counselors and educators working with students and families on academic and behavioral issues when a direct impact on academic achievement can be measured.
- (2) School LAND Trust Program expenditures are required to have a direct impact on the instruction of students in the particular school’s areas of most critical academic need.
- (3) A school may not use School LAND Trust Program funds for the following:
 - (a) to cover the fixed costs of doing business;
 - (b) for construction, maintenance, facilities, overhead, security, or athletics; or
 - (c) to pay for non-academic in-school, co-curricular, or extracurricular activities.
- (4) A school district or local school board may not require a council or school to spend the school’s School LAND Trust Program funds on a specific use or set of uses.
- (5)
 - (a) A council may budget and spend no more than \$7,000 for in-school civic and character education, including student leadership skills training and digital citizenship training as described in Section 53G-7-1202.
 - (b) A school may designate School LAND Trust Program funds for an in-school civic or character education program or activity only if the plan clearly describes how the program or activity has a direct impact of the instruction of students in school’s areas of most critical academic need.
- (6) Notwithstanding other provisions in this rule, a school may use funds as needed to implement a student’s Individualized Education Plan.
- (7) Student incentives implemented as part of an academic goal in the School LAND Trust Program may not exceed \$2 per awarded student in an academic school year.

Safe Technology Utilization and Digital Citizenship

Digital Citizenship

All students and employees of Jordan School District are instructed concerning responsible use of technology devices, the district network, and online etiquette.

In order to use district supplied technology devices and gain access to the district's computer network each year, all students and employees of Jordan School District are required to sign an acceptable use agreement. This documents the users understanding of, and willingness to comply with, district policies as outlined therein.

Access to school and district networks and digital resources is a privilege. Any user who is found to be in violation of district technology guidelines or agreements is subject to the Jordan School District disciplinary policies. This involves an investigation process, and appropriate actions as dictated by the respective findings. For students this most often takes the form of meetings with school administrators and parents, and includes the possible loss of access to technology at the school, suspension, or other actions as prescribed by policy.

Online Student Safety

At a local school level, all teachers are provided with annual training regarding Internet safety. This is usually conducted by the school administration at the beginning of the school year.

Additionally, from a district level, all teachers have been made aware of multiple professional programs available to which they have access. All teachers are encouraged to integrate these programs into their classroom curriculum. Training on these programs is available from district level technology specialists upon request.

The most important online student safety tool for any classroom is direct adult supervision. This may take the form of direct in class monitoring through classroom circulation, or it may involve remote monitoring through the use of various software programs or monitoring tools.

Filtering

Filtering of Internet content by school districts is required by federal mandate, and is a critical part of the Jordan School District computer network. The filtering process is controlled at two levels.

1. All content is filtered by the use of third party commercial libraries with whom the district has contracted services. Content is categorized, and allowed or blocked according to default settings that are deemed appropriate for k-12 education.
2. Additionally, Jordan School District IT personnel have the ability to set various levels of permissions to allow or permit access to previously established user groups and categorized content. The district IT department also has the ability to blacklist specific webpages as necessary and appropriate.
3. Despite the use of industry-proven preventative measures, there remains a small chance that inappropriate sites or material may be inadvertently accessed by Jordan School District computer users. In such cases, students are encouraged to notify a school employee. Employees experiencing such incidents should make a report to school level administration. These reports will then be followed up on at a district level to take appropriate action and make needed adjustments in preventative measures.

Checklist for reviewing School LAND Trust Plans

- For each goal, do you understand how it addresses the greatest academic need?
- Does each goal specify measurable outcomes that the SCC may evaluate in a timely manner?
- Is the money used for direct academic instruction? (A teacher paid by LAND Trust money should be in the classroom 75% of the time. Should not be used for administrative or support positions.)
- Is money allocated for character education within the allowable limits of \$7000 of total LAND Trust allocation? This money may be used for in-school civic and character education, including student leadership skills training and digital citizenship training
- What percentage of funds are they carrying over? (LAND Trust funds should be used within the school year. Schools are allowed to carry over up to 10% of funds. They may exceed 10% if a valid reason is given.)
- Does the school state a specific use for expenditures if there is an increased distribution or unexpected carryover?
- Are expenditures mentioned in the narrative portion of the goal?
- Do dollar amounts in the planned expenditures, expenditure categories, and the financial proposal match? (Ex: students incentives should not exceed \$2/student)
- Have a majority of members signed the Signature Page? Or, is an explanation given as to why they are missing? (Note: SCC members are not signing whether they agree with the plan, they are signing to show participation.)

Local School Board Responsibilities

- Councils are properly constituted and trained
- Annual school plan approval
- Digital Citizenship
- Assure compliance
- Communication between councils and the board
- Encourage collaboration/sharing and celebrating success

Training

- The board provides training for councils
- JSD hosts multiple events--All SCC members may attend but principals and chairs are specifically invited.
- Online training video is available at jordandistrict.org
- Digital citizenship is addressed at the training as well as with each school.

Communication between councils and boards

- Councils may advise local boards on issues related to their schools.
- Local Boards may request information from councils to inform local boards.
- Examples may include: Boundaries, safe-walking routes, Parent University, community concerns, etc.

Encourage collaboration & celebrating success

- Understanding various roles
- Welcoming other viewpoints and listening
- Share examples of success

Appropriate Expenditures

- LAND Trust money should be used for direct academic instruction.
- A school may not use School LAND Trust Program funds for the following:
 - To cover the fixed costs of doing business
 - For construction, maintenance, facilities, overhead, security, or athletics
 - To pay for non-academic in-school, co-curricular, or extracurricular activities
- \$7,000 of the appropriation may be spent on behavioral/character education (State Board Rule R277-477)
- Carryover- should not exceed 10% without a specific plan
- Expenditures should be as specific as possible and mentioned in the narrative.

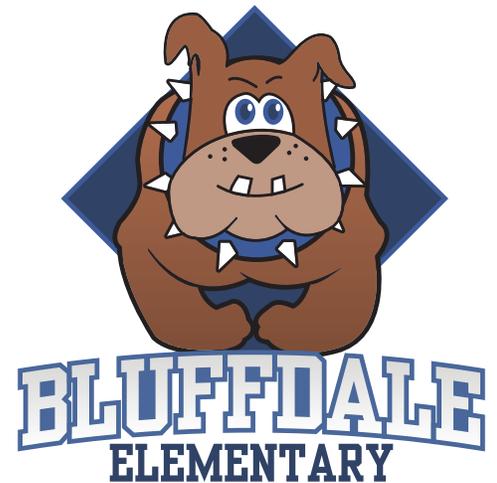

President Voorhies presided and conducted. The Board of Education met in a study session to discuss the following:

A. Update on Student Data Governance and Security

Mr. Ben Jameson, director of Evaluation, Research and Accountability, reviewed progress to date related to student data governance and security. He said last summer the Utah State Board of Education announced several requirements for which LEAs should begin preparations for implementation. These included:

- Appointment of a data privacy manager. He noted that two individuals were selected to serve as co-managers, Steven Harwood, system/programming manager for Information Systems, and Holly Allen, consultant for Evaluation, Research and Accountability.
- Creation of a student data collection notice. He stated that this document was formerly known as a Student Data Disclosure Document and it is posted on the District website.
- Annual training for District staff. This training was held at the beginning of the school year and will continue to be held as part of the District's Crucial Concerns and Policies training.
- Completion of a metadata dictionary. This document is available on the data gateway and will be updated as new instructional technology becomes available.
- Creation of a Data Governance Plan (SB207). He provided a draft of the Plan to Board members and indicated that it will be posted to the website when completed.

B. Comprehensive Plan for Special Education

Ms. Lisa Robinson, director of Special Education, provided a thorough review of the District's Special Education program which included discussion about the purpose of Special Education programs, eligibility requirements, Individual Education Programs (IEP), federal compliance, the District's annual Consolidated Plan which outlines goals and accomplishments, data trends (i.e. number of students currently being served by Special Education programs and expectations for future students based on enrollment trends), financial information (including actual costs to Jordan District), and a summary of the resources (staff and facilities) needed to provide for the needs of the students and staff members.

Mr. Young recommended having the Finance Committee conduct a more in depth review of Special Education financing to which Board members agreed. Mrs. Miller said she would have the Legislative Committee look at what the Board can do to advocate for Special Education at the legislative level. Mr. Young recommended having the Facilities Committee take note of the timeline Ms. Robinson presented related to future facility needs.

C. Recap of Elementary School Capacities and Review of Middle School Capacity/Portables

Dr. Godfrey, associate superintendent, continued the discussion about school capacity and noted that this process, with continued Board input, is a comprehensive attempt to define school capacities in preparation for the boundary changes needed for the opening of new schools. He thanked Mr. Hamblin, consultant for Planning and Student Services, and Mr. Bergera, staff assistant for Auxiliary Services, for their work in visiting each elementary and middle school and working with principals to look at all school classrooms and other spaces.

Recap of Elementary School Capacities. Dr. Godfrey recapped for the Board the definition of elementary classroom capacity which includes classrooms that can hold 25 students or more and excludes classrooms used for special purposes such as rooms used for preschool, cluster units, or secondary computer labs. He noted that the classification for extended capacity includes the classrooms used for special purposes. He reviewed the classification for elementary extreme capacity and noted that it includes all classrooms/spaces that can hold 25 students or more, including stages, kivas, hardwired computer labs, and collaboration areas. Excluded from the extreme capacity are faculty rooms, media centers, and cafeteria/gym spaces. Dr. Godfrey reviewed staffing ratio assumptions of 25 students per regular classroom and 50 students per kindergarten classroom.

Review of Middle School Capacities. Dr. Godfrey reviewed the assumptions used in calculating middle school classroom capacity which includes classrooms that can hold 30 students or more and one CTE computer lab. The capacity numbers exclude non-CTE computer labs, media centers, cafeterias, auditorium, kiva, collaboration areas, and faculty rooms. The middle school classification for extended capacity includes any additional computer labs. The middle school classification for extreme capacity includes classrooms, all computer labs, media centers, cafeterias, auditoriums, kivas, and collaboration areas and excludes faculty rooms.

Board members asked to have the spreadsheet data provided in a one school per page format. They asked to have data included that reflects school capacity if all classrooms are utilized by having either a traveling teacher or teachers who choose to add a 7th and/or 8th period. They also asked to have a notes column added to explain specific information such as classrooms used for DLI programs.

At 6:26 p.m., the meeting adjourned. The regular session started at 6:40 p.m.

Recognitions by Board Members

Ms. Richards said she attended five or six School Community Council meetings and is impressed with the Land Trust Plans the Councils have developed and she is pleased with the efforts they are making to use the money for the benefit of the children.

Mrs. Miller said when she joined the Board Mrs. Pulsipher told her how great the South Jordan Elementary theater program is and this week she attended her first production at the school which was *The Wizard of Oz*.

She said the production was fabulous and the students and staff lived up to their reputation. They involved many students by having two casts and the costumes, scenery, and talented kids were all amazing. She congratulated the students and directors for their efforts on this production. Mrs. Miller attended the Bingham Minerette showcase and said it was fun to see the hard work the girls put into this program and noted that the Minerette coach will be leaving after this year. Mrs. Miller said Jodi Packer texted her a picture of her lacrosse players using Bingham's field and it was fun to see them happy. She thanked all who helped to make it possible for them to do that. Mrs. Miller attended a Battle of the Books competition in which four middle schools participated. She said Fort Herriman and South Hills Middle Schools tied for first place and had to enter a tie-breaker round, with Fort Herriman winning the competition. Mrs. Miller recognized the middle schools for the efforts they have been making the past few weeks related to safety. She said she loved seeing students stand up and speak on issues they are concerned about and trying to make a difference by using opportunities to have their voices heard. She said she has also been pleased to see students setting good examples by participating in kindness challenges such as Bingham's Random Acts of Kindness activity. Mrs. Miller said she met with Bingham High HOSA students who put together a video about what students can do in regard to safety. The students' video took second place at the competition and they are now refining the video and will present it at the national HOSA competition.

Mrs. Atwood said she has visited many School Community Council meetings over the past few weeks and expressed appreciation for the time parents and staff are taking to be accountable for the use of Land Trust funds. Mrs. Atwood expressed appreciation to the staff and students at Valley High School for inviting her to the Poetry Slam and said it was an amazing opportunity. What impressed her the most was how much the students support each other. Mrs. Atwood said West Jordan Middle School students have been reading the book, "I Am Malala," and Principal Garrison has planned an assembly entitled, "I Am West Jordan Middle School" on Friday at 1:25 p.m. Mrs. Atwood said all Board members are invited to attend.

Mr. Robinson attended a play at Midas Creek Elementary, *Robin and the Hoodies*, and said the students do a great job every year with their school productions and he enjoys attending all school activities to see the great things they do. Mr. Robinson said Foothills Elementary invited him to their annual Chinese New Year celebration which was a fun experience and he also enjoyed the middle school Chinese showcase and seeing all the schools come together. Mr. Robinson expressed appreciation to District and school staffs for providing District facilities and manpower for the recent political caucuses. Mr. Robinson said he attended The Leader in Me conference a week ago and that he loves the program and what it does for his kids and for the students at the schools that have adopted this program. Mr. Robinson said he has attended as many School Community Council meetings as his time permits and attended one at Herriman High recently. He said it has been a tough year for Herriman High students this year and suggested that everyone view the video, "You Matter to Me" which was done by the Hope Squad and school administration. Mr. Robinson said he attended the elementary school parent-teacher conference for the last of his six children and that his daughter has a phenomenal sixth grade teacher, Ms. Sharon Gunn, who was recognized as one of the Teachers of the Year by the Jordan Education Foundation. He said his daughter was excited about being in the room when Foundation personnel made the presentation and thanked them for the great things they do to recognize teachers. He thanked Jordan District for the great teachers his children have had.

Mr. Dunford said about a year ago he gave a "shout-out" to Casey Ivie, student at Copper Hills High, and her partner for winning a national DECA competition and said it is his honor to give another "shout-out" to Casey Ivie for being named a Utah Sterling Scholar for Computer Technology. He said there are impressive young people attending Jordan schools.

Mrs. Voorhies attended the Middle School Choir Festival and said she was astonished at the skills the students displayed which were far beyond anything she's seen at the middle school level and said it was well-worth the hour and a half she and her husband spent there. Mrs. Voorhies attended West Hills Middle School's production of *Singing in the Rain* and was delighted at the enthusiasm of the students. She expressed appreciation for the invitation to attend.

Comments by Elected Officials

President Voorhies expressed appreciation for citizens who offer themselves as candidates for elected offices. She said it is true that if a person wants to be in an elected position that puts them close to their constituency with immediate access to the people, the school board is the place to do this. She said the only Board member she knew prior to being on the Board was Ms. Richards, whom she met briefly at a conference in Portland, Oregon. She said she wanted everyone to know that the current Board members have ethics, skills, commitment, and the work they do each day makes education better for Jordan District. She thanked the Board members for their service and for the progress they are making.

Jim Riding, Mayor, City of West Jordan, expressed appreciation to Board members for their service. He said as a heads up to the Board, he gave a plat map to Mr. Thomas, administrator of Auxiliary Services, of a subdivision called Copper Rim which is on the east side of Mountain View Corridor between 7000 and 7800 South. He said this subdivision will have approximately 750 homes and the development will be reviewed by the City of West Jordan Planning Commission a week from tonight and the developers hope to break ground this summer. Mayor Riding said he would try to attend as many School Board meetings as he can because he believes it is important to know what is going on and to participate with the School District.

Patron Comments Regarding Non-Agenda Items

Lora McFarland, a preschool teacher at Bastian Elementary, said she and Ms. Raines-Parshall address the Board a lot and they hope their comments are received as an indication of their passion for the students and their desire to make things better for the kids. She said kids learn best when surrounded by peers in inclusive settings and encouraged Board members to ask more questions about serving kids in community preschools. She said she feels overwhelmed because of large class sizes and because she has students who are being bused from five different elementary schools. She also stated that the resources Ms. Robinson, director of Special Education, referred to in her presentation during study session aren't available to her.

Ashley Raines-Parshall, preschool teacher, addressed the Board about special education case limits and quotas. She said her large caseloads make it impossible for her to help the District meet its goals. She also addressed statements made by Ms. Robinson during her presentation in study session and offered suggestions and cautions.

Erin Preston, parent of a student attending Herriman High, addressed the Board and stated that last week a sixth Herriman High student committed suicide and she and others believe this is a growing epidemic. She expressed concern for the students and suggested implementation of a multi-tiered support system to include increasing the number of counselors, training teachers to identify the at-risk students, increasing support for school therapists, and starting an affiliation with Valley Mental Health. She suggested the Board prioritize its budget and put money towards this growing problem. She concluded by asking the Board to do all it can to prevent another suicide.

III. **Special Business**

A. **Recommendation to Approve Proposed 2018-19 Schedule of School Fees**

Mr. Anderson and Mr. Sorensen, administrators of schools, presented the 2018-19 Schedule of School Fees for approval. The fee schedule has been reviewed in detail during several study sessions.

Mrs. Miller stated that the Board and staff members have performed a detailed review of school fees this year to insure that schools are only charging what is needed for programs. She said the schedule includes some reductions in fees with the exception of Driver's Education.

Mr. Robinson said he will support the fee schedule but would like to see if additional reductions can be made in registration fees.

Mr. Young stated that at the direction of the Board, members of the Finance Committee and District administration will continue the evaluation process related to the fee schedule and will bring additional information to the Board at the appropriate time.

A copy of the 2018-19 Schedule of School Fees is attached at the conclusion of these minutes. (Attachment 5)

Public Comment

No patrons signed up to address the Board regarding this Special Business item and no patrons accepted the invitation to speak.

MOTION: It was moved by Marilyn Richards and seconded by Bryce Dunford to approve the 2018-19 Schedule of School Fees. The motion passed with a unanimous vote.

IV. **Information Items**

A. **Superintendent's Report**

Superintendent Johnson said it is a pleasure to sit with the Board as they discuss the future of the District and deliberate about the use of public funds. She said on March 15 she had the pleasure of joining the Jordan Education Foundation Board on the Prize Patrol bus to visit 17 different schools to present outstanding educator awards and one outstanding principal award. She said the process the Foundation uses to decide who will receive outstanding educator awards includes the submission of a write-up by a school principal along with supporting documentation. She noted that the Committee insures that at least one outstanding educator is recognized at each of the District's schools. Dr. Johnson said she attended the high school student body officer luncheon yesterday, as did President Voorhies and Vice President Young. She said student body presidents and feeder system student body officers divided into groups to discuss fears incoming ninth grade students may have about transitioning to high school and concerns they are hearing from peers. The student body officer from each school facilitated the groups and discussed the things expressed by the students. Dr. Johnson said as she interacts with the high school groups she is impressed with their poise, articulation, problem-solving skills, and their desire to insure the ninth grade students have reassurance that the transition will be okay and they will adjust. She said she enjoyed witnessing the excellent people the high school presidents had become because of the great education received in Jordan School District. Dr. Johnson said at the next luncheon the high school presidents will be bringing the newly elected officers for next year and the discussion will center on what these new officers will do next year to insure that all students feel included. She said she is proud of these young people and pleased at their inquisitiveness.

V. **Discussion Items**

A. **Board Member Committee Reports and Comments**

1. **District/Community Council Board Advisory Committee**

Mr. Robinson said his Committee met yesterday and created a mission statement which reads, "The focus of the District School Community Council is to create highly effective School Community Councils, be trained and become advocates with each School Community Council by providing them with District training and resources. We oversee providing training to the School Community Councils and to the Board of Education on Land Trust Funds and we educate and become advocates to the community through community outreach programs such as Parent University." He invited input from the Board either now or later regarding this statement. Mr. Robinson said the current focus of the Committee is Land Trust funds and noted that it is Board's responsibility to approve each school's Plan. He said the Committee would like to look at the Plans of all schools this year and provide training to Board members throughout the year on what to look for in the Plans. Mrs. Miller added that a document is available in BoardDocs for the Board to use as a guide when reviewing Plans. He noted that approval for the Plans is due in April.

Mr. Robinson asked for Board input on choosing parents to serve on the Calendar Committee. Board members discussed how to accomplish this. Ms. Richards recommended having some of the past Committee members remain on the Committee to

provide consistency. Mr. Young stated that he would like to know who is currently serving from his area so he can reach out to them and asked for a due date for providing his recommendations to the Committee. Mrs. Miller said she would follow up with the PTA on their recommendations.

President Voorhies asked Mr. Robinson to provide a list to Board members of the current Calendar Committee members with dates of service and a due date for recommendations. Mrs. Atwood requested to have included on the list what the members represent, i.e., year-round, traditional, etc.

2. Facilities Board Advisory Committee

Mrs. Atwood stated that her Committee will be meeting tomorrow and she will provide a report at the next Board meeting.

3. District Finance and Audit Board Advisory Committee

Mr. Dunford reported that Riverton City officials requested an extension on one of their CDA projects due to some unforeseen problems. He said the Finance Committee has reviewed the request and feels comfortable granting the extension. He invited Board members to contact him if they have any concerns. Mr. Young added that this matter will need to be brought before the Board for formal approval.

Mr. Dunford reported that the Finance Committee will continue to discuss and monitor student fees throughout the year. Mr. Dunford said he wanted the Board to be aware that in April Mr. Joseph Christensen, the Board independent auditor, will be reporting to the Finance Committee his findings related to the audit of the District's facility rental program.

4. Legislative/Community Relations Board Advisory Committee

Mrs. Miller stated that she, along with Mrs. Voorhies and Ms. Richards, attended the USBA District meeting this past week. During the meeting a recap was provided of the things that USBA accomplished during the 2018 legislative session and the attendees were asked for input about the priorities for the 2019 legislative session. She invited Board members to be thinking about priorities and to provide them to her in preparation for the USBA summer meetings. She also asked them to be thinking about Board priorities as well. Mrs. Miller reported that the District's Middle School Course Requirement Committee held their first meeting and are looking at the course changes made by USBE for seventh and eighth grade students. She said the Committee is preparing to make recommendations to the Board by November of this year. Mrs. Miller stated that at the last Board meeting Mr. Robinson asked about inviting elected officials to graduation ceremonies. She said her Committee discussed Mr. Robinson's request and reached out to high school principals to find out about current practice. She said she found that the current practice is to invite the city mayors and this has been taking place for quite some time. She noted that while they don't always attend, they are invited and have been already been invited this year. She said the Committee recommendation is to not expand the list of elected officials who are invited to graduation ceremonies in order to keep the focus of these ceremonies on the graduating seniors.

5. Innovations in Education Board Advisory Committee

Mr. Young invited Mr. Dunford to report on the activities of the ad hoc committee for technology. Mr. Dunford said the first meeting was held and the time was used for Committee members to get to know each other and to begin discussions about the direction they would like to go. He said the members chose a Committee chair, Ms. Britnee Eng, who is a teacher at West Jordan High School and Ms. Eng has already begun moving the

Committee forward. Mr. Dunford said he gave the Committee members an assignment to answer four questions: 1) What is the best thing the District is doing in terms of student learning and innovation? He invited Board members to also provide examples of innovative ideas. 2) What is broken and needs to be fixed? 3) With reasonable marginal effort, what could the District be doing? 4) If resources were unlimited, what could the District be doing?

6. Utah High School Activities Association (UHSAA)

Ms. Richards reported that she provided Board members with an agenda from the UHSAA Board of Director's meeting held last Thursday and if Board members have questions about the agenda, she can provide them with supporting materials. She stated that at the meeting the directors discussed winter sports and final school standings, upcoming spring sports, and several items of business. She said following the meeting the Board held a banquet to honor individuals who have given of their time and talent to the UHSAA and they honored two students, one of which is a Jordan District student who was honored with a Spirit of the Sport award.

At 8:06 p.m., President Voorhies declared the meeting adjourned and announced that the Board would return to study session.

President Voorhies presided and conducted. The Board of Education continued its study session to discuss the following:

D. Policy Governance Review GP113 *Board Committee Principles*

President Voorhies led a discussion about policy GP113. Board members discussed revisions that may be needed, whether the policy is being followed, and how to incorporate the guidelines. Following the discussion, it was decided to add the policy and guidelines to the agenda for the Board's summer seminar. President Voorhies requested that Board members review the policy prior to the summer meeting and be prepared with recommendations for changes at that time.

E. Jordan Board of Education Scholarship Program

President Voorhies stated that a year ago Ms. Kim Baker, a retired District principal, proposed that the Board sponsor a teaching scholarship to encourage outstanding District students to enter the teaching profession and to work for the District. She said the Board was in support of this idea but no direction

has been given. She suggested asking the Finance Committee to look at the costs involved in creating this type of Board scholarship. Board members agreed. Mr. Young suggested that Mr. Van Komen, Board attorney, look into the legalities of creating a Board scholarship, which he agreed to do.

F. Board Calendar Discussion

President Voorhies led a discussion about scheduling of additional public meetings in the fall, if needed, to discuss or present boundary change information. She also asked for input about the date and time for the Board's summer seminar session. Board members decided to hold the summer seminar on Thursday, June 21, 2018, starting at 10:00 a.m., and to reserve October 16 and October 30, 2018, starting at 6:30 p.m. for additional boundary change meetings, as needed. SUBJECT: Negotiations – Licensed

I. Board Directive

The Board recognizes the importance of an orderly process to arrive at negotiated settlements with the recognized exclusive representatives and bargaining agents of employee groups (licensed and classified, excluding administrators). The Board, therefore, delegates to the Administration the responsibility of conducting good faith negotiations within the parameters set by the Board and reporting those negotiations to the Board.

II. Administrative Policy

The employee agent group is defined as the professional employee association with the largest membership based on full-time equivalent employees. The Administration will recommend to the Board a negotiating team to represent the Board in conducting negotiations with recognized employee groups according to approved administrative policy provisions.

- A. The licensed employees will be represented through the Joint Relations Committee, which will be comprised of the Board's negotiating team and the negotiating team for the licensed employee group. Team membership will be established no later than October 1 of each school year. The mission of the Joint Relations Committee is to enhance the professional employee association/District relationship by fostering open communication and a free exchange of ideas and to identify and resolve issues in a collaborative environment to allow us to provide a quality education for every child in Jordan School District.
- B. Regularly scheduled meetings (monthly) of the Joint Relations Committee (Licensed – [Policy A3](#)) will be held to review and discuss policies, including compensation discussions, to begin no earlier than May 1 of each contract year. Dates can be changed by mutual agreement.
- C. Formal negotiations meeting dates will be determined no later than May 1 of each contract year.
- D. Beginning with the first formal negotiating session, procedural agreements concerning negotiations will be mutually established.
- E. Changes in compensation and negotiated policy will be considered and finalized through the negotiation process.
- F. The District shall comply with [Utah Code 53A-3-425](#) and will require reimbursement to the school district of the cost of paid association leave activities to the extent required by the Code.
- G. After June 15, if agreement has not been reached in negotiations, the Board or the employee agent group or both parties may declare an impasse.
- H. Immediately after declaration of impasse by either party, the Board will invite the employee agent group to participate in mediation using the services of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service. The role of the mediator will be to facilitate communication. All costs associated with mediation will be shared equally by the Board and the employee agent group.
- I. If mediation is not completed or otherwise terminated within forty-five (45) days after the appointment of a mediator, further mediation may continue at the discretion of the Board.

The Board of Education has statutory authority over all issues relating to the effective and efficient operation of the school district ([Utah Code Title 53A Chapter 03](#)). Locally elected Board of Education members should retain the right to operate the school district without undue influence or control from outside groups, organizations, associations, political parties, or special interests. The Board authorizes the Administration to administer the negotiated policies on behalf of the Board.

The Board also recognizes the importance of an orderly process to arrive at a negotiated settlement with the recognized exclusive representatives and bargaining agents of the classified employee group. The Board, therefore, delegates to the Administration the responsibility of conducting good faith negotiations within the parameters set by the Board and reporting those negotiations to the Board.

II. Administrative Policy

The employee agent group is defined as the professional employee association with the largest membership based on full-time equivalent employees. The Administration will recommend to the Board a negotiating team to represent the Board in conducting negotiations with the recognized employee group according to approved administrative policy provisions.
