-No substitutes are needed.

-Students benefit from a variety of teaching styles and two fresh, energized educators.

-Quality of teaching may be improved due to a “two heads are better than one” problem solving approach.

-School system saves money due to teachers not receiving benefits.

-Job sharing is a practice in many surrounding counties, in grades that include even as young as kindergarten. Our school system has had a successful job sharing experiences in the past.

-By being exposed to the styles of two teachers, children learn to work with different people and personalities. The ability to work with others is a valuable lifelong skill that all people need throughout their time in school and later in the workforce.

-Children who have behavior problems get a fresh start every day. Negative feelings are less likely to carry over to the next morning.

-In studies done in the United States, all administrators surveyed agreed that job sharing had not diminished the quality of education... (Garman, 1988). Similarly, seventy-five percent of parents in another study felt that the quality of their children’s education had either improved or stayed the same in job sharing classrooms.

-Consider this analogy: Children have two parents. They love both of them for different reasons and are comfortable with them. The two parents are different from each other and will react differently to similar situations. Children can understand this. When children have two teachers, it not unlike having two parents. The two teachers are individuals who are appreciated for different reasons. Their expectations are alike; their personalities are different. It is not difficult for a child to accept the two people and to learn from each of them.

-It is educationally valuable for students to be exposed to different styles and energies. They benefit from the variety and enjoy the enthusiasm of two different educators.

Parent Survey

-An anonymous parent input survey was sent home in February 2017 in regard to the 2016-1017 job share experience . Parents were asked to rate the job-share experience based on seven categories: overall communication, teacher accessibility, academic growth, meeting students' individual needs, classroom environment, overall student happiness, and discipline. This survey was based on a scale of 1 to 4 (1 being low, 4 being high). Out of the surveys returned, every one of the 7 categories had an **average** of 4.

Parent Quotes from the survey:

“It’s been a great year!”

“It has been great. There has been wonderful support from both teachers, and we greatly appreciate it.”

“This year was the first year with a co-teacher classroom. I thought it was great. My daughter really enjoyed the co-teacher experience.”

“I really believe that having co-teachers is great.”

“This experience has been really good. The students seem very happy as do the teachers.”

“The year I job shared was the best year ever. It can be great for kids if it is the right team. In Sumner County at my school right now there are two job shares. “When my daughter was in kindergarten at Gower Elementary in Nashville she had teachers that job shared. One teacher worked Mon, Tues and every other Wed and the other worked Thurs, Fri and every other Wed. If one of them needed a day off for

personal reasons or sick kids the other took her spot so they never needed a sub! This was a great experience for us. Our daughter loved both teachers and the different qualities they brought. The kids got so many different ways of learning between the two of them!”- Sarah Price (Parent of a child in a job share classroom)

The purpose of requesting a job share position is to be able to better care for our young families while continuing to serve as educators. We held a job share position for 2016-2017, 2017-2018, and 2018-2019, 2019-2020, and 2020-2021 school years, but we understand that according to Board Policy 5.1051: Job Sharing Guidelines, that this position is based on year to year approval by the board. The district will replace HVAC units and replace exterior windows that are currently non-operable to promote clean air and fresh air circulation to further mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

The effectiveness of this activity will be assessed by tracking the number of cases of COVID-19 in each school and by checking the air quality in classrooms.

The district will improve plumbing for handwashing access improvements.

The district will hire a manager to oversee the expenditure of ESSER funds. This activity will be assessed by the timely completion and submission of required reports on allocations and spending and through the utilization of the annual audit of these funds.

Conducting Other Necessary Activities

\$ 923, 875.00 Amount

In response to COVID-19, responsibilities for each position within our district have changed and/or increased in order to provide continuity of services. A stipend of up to \$2000 per licensed employee (\$200 per month of employment in 2020-2021) and \$1500 per support staff employee (\$150 per month of employment in 2020-2021) would be given.

Examples of changes and/or increases in responsibilities include, but are not limited to the following: developing new schedules and procedures for the daily operation of the school, incorporating new health and safety protocols (increased cleaning and disinfecting, maintaining spaces and traffic flow to include social distancing as much as possible, etc.), extending works hours to provide contact tracing, teaching virtual and in-person learners, learning new technology for virtual teaching, identifying and addressing increased learning gaps, covering classes for increased absenteeism due to quarantine/isolation and lack of substitutes, incorporating additional strategies to create and maintain a positive climate and culture, providing additional mental health services to address student anxiety and fears, keeping records and investing time for contact tracing, addressing increased failure rates and attendance issues, expanding and providing on-call technical support to students/families/school staff, troubleshooting technical issues for virtual learning, increasing communication between all stakeholders for all learners, providing professional learning that targets best practices for effective instruction, student engagement, and classroom management in a socially-distanced space and virtual space, addressing increased parental concerns, incorporating new health and safety protocols with transportation, preparing and providing access for meals to in-person and virtual students, and staying abreast of COVID-19 regulations/recommendations and providing guidance regarding protocol adjustments.

The effectiveness of these activities will be assessed by using multiple data sources: stakeholder feedback, substitute reports, health and safety reports, referrals to counselors/social workers, attendance of faculty and students, academic data, number of meals served daily/weekly, tracking hours of work for non-exempt employees, number of technology tickets submitted and resolved, etc.

1 Each school shall provide a guidance program for all students through the cooperative efforts of the
 2 principal, teachers and guidance counselor.¹

3 The program of guidance services shall include such services and activities as:

- 4 1. Orientation of parents and students to the school program;
- 5
- 6 2. Student referral and/or welfare provisions;
- 7
- 8 3. Collection and maintenance of student data and record systems;
- 9
- 10 4. Student program planning and placement; and
- 11
- 12 5. Educational and occupational information for use by students, parents and teachers;

13 The classroom teacher, because of close contacts with the student, shall be a key person in the guidance
 14 program.

15 The high school guidance counselor shall provide leadership to teachers in the guidance area and help
 16 them in the selection of guidance tools and materials and in the administration and interpretation of
 17 individual or group tests.

18 School administrators are authorized to work with recognized groups who may furnish special services

1 **PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS¹**

2 The principal shall ensure that there is a complete physical examination of each student prior to:

- 3 1. Entering school for the first time.² This applies to kindergarten, first grade and other
4 students for whom there is no health record; and
- 5 2. Participation as a member of any athletic team or in any other strenuous physical activity
6 program.³

7
8 Cost of the examination shall be borne by the parent or guardian of the student. These records shall be
9 on file in the principal's office.

10 Screening tests for vision, hearing, scoliosis and lice will be conducted. Parents/Guardians will receive
11 written notice of any screening result that indicates a condition that might interfere or tend to interfere
12 with a student's progress.

13 In general, the school district will not conduct physical examinations of a student without parental
14 consent to do so or by court order, unless the health or safety of the student or others is in question.⁴

15 **IMMUNIZATIONS**

16 No students entering school, including those entering kindergarten or first grade, those from out-of-
17 state and those from nonpublic schools, will be permitted to enroll (or attend) without proof of
18 immunization, as determined by the Commissioner of Public Health.^{1,3} It is the responsibility of the
19 parents or guardians to have their children immunized and to provide such proof to the principal of the
20 school which the student is to attend.⁵

21
22 Exceptions will be granted to any student whose parent/guardian files with school authorities a signed,
23 written statement that such measures conflict with the one of the following:

- 24 1. His/her religious tenets and practices if in the absence of an epidemic or immediate threat of an
25 epidemic;⁶ or
- 26 2. Due to medical reasons if the student has a written statement from his/her doctor excusing
27 him/her from the immunization.⁷

28
29 Proof of exceptions will be in writing and filed in the same manner as other immunization records.
30

1st reading:

6.400- Student Guidance Program- TSBA's model policy 6.400 is more condensed (see attached). It covers the information found in the board's current policies 6.400, 6.401, 6.406, and 6.407. This is not a change required by law, but they recommend it as a best practice to streamline the policy manual. Additionally, they recommend placing more detailed information about these types of programs in administrative procedures. Model policy is attached.

6.402- Physical Examinations and Immunizations-

TSBA has changed some language under the section on immunizations (see current board policy lines 21-24). They wanted to clarify that under state law, there is always a medical exemption available for vaccinations. The religious exemption, however, is not an option during an epidemic. While this legislation could change in the future, they wanted to be sure that the current state of the law was clear and reflected in those lines. Proposed changes are highlighted on the attached policy.

2nd reading:

6.313 Discipline Procedures: As to policy 6.313, the board policy regarding the code of conduct is to include information regarding exclusionary practices for pre k and k as well as trauma-informed discipline practices per state law. TSBA recommends adding these provisions to the current 6.313 to comply with the requirements found in state law. Current policy with highlighted recommended changes attached.

6.316 Suspension: As to policy 6.316, "remand" and "expel/expulsion" are found throughout the policy; however, these terms correspond to TCA 49-6-3007 and relate to how the absence is coded. This is different from the ways that statutes deal with student discipline and is more focused on school funding. TSBA recommends not including these terms and allowing this policy to only cover suspensions. Current policy with highlighted recommended changes and removal of those terms attached.

1.700- School District Goals- In 2019, the General Assembly passed legislation requiring the State Board of Education to adopt a policy on educator diversity. Last week, at its February meeting, the State Board of Education adopted a policy on this topic. This policy requires local education agencies to set goals for educator diversity. TSBA is recommending that Boards revise their policies to reflect this responsibility. It has been added under Goals for Teachers and Administration in our current policy attached.

4.700- Testing- During the special legislative session, the General Assembly passed legislation allowing local Boards to choose a weight for all TCAP exams to be included in a student's final grade from a range of 0% - 25%. If the Board would like to take advantage of this ability, TSBA recommends suspending that portion of the current policy 4.700. Suspending board policy instead of revising it would eliminate the need for the Board to change this percentage in policy 4.700 again in the future.

1 Students are expected to conform to the rules and regulations of the school system and apply
2 themselves to the learning process.

3 The Board delegates to the Director of Schools the responsibility of developing specific codes of
4 conduct which are appropriate for each level of school. Codes of conduct for students in pre-
5 kindergarten or kindergarten shall utilize alternative disciplinary practices such as RTI² and PBIS
6 framework. Exclusionary discipline shall only be used as a measure of last resort. The development of
7 each code shall involve principals and staff members of each level and shall be consistent with the
8 relevant policies as adopted by the Board.¹

9 The following levels of misbehavior and disciplinary procedures and options are standards designed to
10 protect all members of the educational community in the exercise of their rights and duties and to
11 maintain a safe learning environment where orderly learning is possible and encouraged.² These
12 misbehaviors apply to student conduct on school buses, on school property, and while students are on
school-sponsored outings. Staff members shall ensure that disciplinary measures are implemented in a
manner that:³

- 15 1. Balances accountability with an understanding of traumatic behavior;
- 16 2. Teaches school and classroom rules while reinforcing that violent or abusive behavior is not
17 allowed at school;
- 18 3. Minimizes disruptions to education with an emphasis on positive behavioral supports and
19 behavioral intervention plans;
- 20 4. Creates consistent rules and consequences; and
- 21 5. Models respectful, non-violent relationships.

22 In order to ensure that these goals are accomplished, the school district shall utilize the following
23 trauma-informed discipline practices: restorative practices, RTI²B, multi-tiered system of supports,
24 behavior intervention plans, ACES.

25 **MISBEHAVIORS: Level I**

26 Minor misbehavior on the part of the student which impedes orderly classroom procedures or interferes
27 with the orderly operation of the school, but which can usually be handled by an individual staff
28 member.

29 *Examples (not an exclusive listing):*

Classroom disturbances

- 1 Classroom tardiness
- 2 Cheating and lying
- 3 Abusive language
- 4 Nondefiant failure to do assignments or carry out directions
- 5 Wearing while on the grounds of a public school during the regular school day, clothing that
- 6 exposes underwear or body parts in an indecent manner that disrupts the learning environment⁴
- 7 Harassment (Sexual, Racial, Ethnic, Religious)

8 *Disciplinary Procedures:*

- 9 Immediate intervention by the staff member.
- 10 Determine what offense was committed and its severity.
- 11 Determine offender and that he/she understands the nature of the offense.
- 12 Employ appropriate disciplinary options.
- 13 Record of the offense and disciplinary action maintained by staff member.

14 *Disciplinary Options:*

- 15 Verbal reprimand
- 16 Special Assignment
- 17 Restricting activities
- 18 Assigning work details
- 19 Counseling
- 20 Withdrawal of privileges
- 21 Issuance of demerits which might affect citizenship or department grades
- 22 Strict supervised study
- 23 Detention
- 24 Corporal punishment
- 25 In-school suspension
- 26 Out-of-school suspension

27 **MISBEHAVIORS: Level II**

- 28 Misbehavior whose *frequency* or *seriousness* tends to disrupt the learning climate of the school.
- 29 Included in this level are misbehaviors which do not represent a direct threat to the health and safety of
- 30 others but whose educational consequences are serious enough to require corrective action on the part
- 31 of administrative personnel.

32 *Examples* (not an exclusive listing):

- 33 Continuation of unmodified Level I behaviors
- 34 School or class tardiness
- 35 Use of tobacco, vaping, or e-cigarettes
- 36 Using forged notes or excuses
- 37 Disruptive classroom behavior
- 38 Harassment (Sexual, Racial, Ethnic, Religious)

39 *Disciplinary Procedures:*

1 Student is referred to principal for appropriate disciplinary action.
 2 Principal meets with student and teacher.
 3 Principal hears accusation made by teacher, permits student the opportunity of explaining
 4 his/her conduct, denying it or explaining any mitigating circumstances.
 5 Principal takes appropriate disciplinary action and notifies teacher of action.
 6 Record of offense and disciplinary action maintained by principal.

7 *Disciplinary Options:*

8 Teacher/schedule change
 9 Modified probation
 10 Behavior modification
 11 Social probation
 12 Peer counseling
 13 Referral to outside agency
 14 In-school suspension
 15 Transfer
 16 Detention
 17 Suspension from school-sponsored activities or from riding school bus
 18 Corporal punishment
 19 Restricting school related honors student is otherwise due
 20 Out-of-school suspension not to exceed ten (10) days.

21 **MISBEHAVIORS: Level III**

22 Acts directly against persons or property but whose consequences *do not seriously endanger* the health
 23 or safety of others in the school.

24 *Examples* (not an exclusive listing):

25 Continuation of unmodified Level I and II behaviors
 26 Fighting (simple)
 27 Vandalism (minor)
 28 Use, possession, sale, and/or distribution of tobacco, vaping, or e-cigarettes drugs, and/or
 29 alcohol
 30 Stealing
 31 Threats to others
 32 Harassment (Sexual, Racial, Ethnic, Religious)

33 *Disciplinary Procedures:*

34 Student is referred to principal for appropriate disciplinary action.
 35 Principal meets with student and teacher.
 36 Principal hears accusation by accusing party and permits offender the opportunity of explaining
 conduct.
 Principal takes appropriate disciplinary action.

- 1 Principal may refer incident to director of schools and make recommendations for
 2 consequences.
 3 If student's program is to be changed, adequate notice shall be given to the student and his/her
 4 parents of the charges against him, his/her right to appear at a hearing and to be represented by
 5 a person of his/her choosing.
 6 Any change in school assignment is appealable to the Board.
 7 Record of offense and disciplinary action maintained by principal or director of schools.

8 *Disciplinary Options:*

- 9 In-school suspension
 10 Detention
 11 Corporal punishment
 12 Restitution from loss, damage or stolen property
 13 Out-of-school suspension not to exceed ten (10) days
 14 Social adjustment classes
 15 Transfer
 16 Expulsion

17 **MISBEHAVIORS: Level IV**

18 Acts which result in violence to another's person or property or which *pose a threat* to the safety of
 19 others in the school. These acts are so serious that they usually require administrative actions which
 20 result in the immediate removal of the student from the school, the intervention of law enforcement
 21 authorities and action by the Board.

22 If a student's action poses a threat to the safety of others in the school, a teacher, principal, school
 23 employee, or school bus driver may use reasonable force when necessary to prevent bodily harm or
 24 death to another person.⁵

25 *Examples (not an exclusive listing):*

- 26 Unmodified Level I, II and III behaviors
 27 Death threat (hit list)
 28 Bomb threat
 29 Extortion
 30 Possession/use/transfer of dangerous weapons *
 31 Assault that results in bodily injury upon any teacher, principal, administrator, any other
 32 employee of the school, or a school resource officer*
 33 Aggravated assault*
 34 Vandalism
 35 Theft/possession/sale of stolen property
 36 Arson
 37 Possession of unauthorized substances *
 38 Use/transfer of unauthorized substances
 39 Harassment (Sexual, Racial, Ethnic, Religious)

Disciplinary Procedures:

- Principal confers with appropriate staff members and with the student.
- Principal hears accusation by accusing party and permits offender opportunity of explaining conduct.
- Parents are notified.
- Law enforcement officials are contacted.
- Incident is reported and recommendations made to the director of schools.
- Complete and accurate reports are submitted to the director of schools.
- Student is given hearing before disciplinary hearing authority.

Disciplinary Options

- Expulsion
- Alternative schools
- Other hearing authority or Board action which results in appropriate placement
- * Expulsion/Remand for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year subject to modification by the director of schools on a case-by-case basis.

ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES:

1. A student shall not be suspended solely because charges are pending against him/her in juvenile or other court.
2. A principal shall not impose successive short term suspensions that cumulatively exceed ten (10) days for the same offense.
3. A teacher or other school official shall not reduce or authorize the reduction of a student's grade because of discipline problems except in deportment or citizenship.
4. A student shall not be denied the passing of a course or grade promotion solely on the basis of failure to:
 - a. pay any activity fee;
 - b. pay a library or other school fine; or
 - c. make restitution for lost or damaged school property.

* Zero tolerance offenses

1 **DEFINITIONS:**¹

2 **Suspension:** dismissed from attendance at school for any reason not more than ten (10) consecutive
3 days. Multiple suspensions shall not run consecutively nor shall multiple suspensions be applied.

4 **REASONS FOR SUSPENSION:**

5 Any principal, principal-teacher or assistant principal (herein called principal) may suspend any
6 student from attendance at school or any school-related activity on or off campus or from attendance at
7 a specific class or classes, or from riding a school bus, without suspending such student from
8 attendance at school (in-school suspension), for good and sufficient reasons including, but not limited
9 to:²

- 10 1. Willful and persistent violation of the rules of the school;
- 11 2. Immoral or disreputable conduct, including vulgar or profane language;
- 12 3. Violence or threatened violence against the person of any personnel attending or assigned to
13 any school;
- 14 4. Willful or malicious damage to real or personal property of the school, or the property of any
15 person attending or assigned to the school;
- 16 5. Inciting, advising or counseling of others to engage in any of the acts herein enumerated;
- 17 6. Marking, defacing, or destroying school property;³
- 18 7. Possession of a pistol, gun or firearm on school property;³
- 19 8. Possession of a knife, etc., as defined in TCA 39-17-1309, on school property;
- 20 9. Assaulting a principal, teacher, school bus driver or other school personnel with vulgar,
21 obscene or threatening language;
- 22 10. Unlawful use or possession of barbitol or legend drugs, as defined in TCA 53-10-101;³
- 23 11. Engaging in behavior which disrupts a class or school-sponsored activity;
- 24
- 25
- 26
- 27

- 1 12. Making a threat, including a false report, to use a bomb, dynamite, or any other deadly
2 explosive or destructive device including chemical weapons on school property or at a school
3 sponsored event;
4
- 5 13. One (1) or more students initiating a physical attack on an individual student on school
6 property or at a school activity, including travel to and from school;
7
- 8 14. Off-campus criminal behavior resulting in felony charges; when behavior poses a danger to
9 persons or property or disrupts the educational process; and
10
- 11 15. Any other conduct prejudicial to good order or discipline in any school.
12

13 Except in an emergency, a principal shall not suspend any student until that student has been advised
14 of the nature of his/her misconduct, questioned about it, and allowed to give an explanation.

15
16 If as a result of an investigation, a principal or his/her designee finds that a student acted in self-
17 defense under a reasonable belief that the student, or another to whom the student was coming to the
18 defense, may have been facing the threat of imminent danger of death or serious bodily injury, then,
19 the student may not face any disciplinary action.⁴

20 **IN-SCHOOL SUSPENSION:⁵**

- 21 1. Students given an in-school suspension in excess of one (1) day from classes shall attend either
22 special classes attended only by students guilty of misconduct or be placed in an isolated area
23 appropriate for study; and
24
- 25 2. Personnel responsible for in-school suspension will see that each student is supervised at all
26 times and has textbooks and classwork assignments from his/her regular teachers. Students
27 given in-school suspension shall be required to complete academic assignments and shall
28 receive credit for work completed.

29 **PROCEDURES FOR OUT OF SCHOOL SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION:⁶**

- 30 1. Unless the student's continued presence in the school, class or school-related activity presents
31 an immediate danger to the student or other persons or property, no principal shall suspend any
32 student until that student has been advised of the nature of his/her misconduct, questioned
33 about it, and allowed to give an explanation.
34
- 35 2. Upon suspension of any student (in-school suspension in excess of one (1) day), the principal
36 shall make an immediate attempt to contact the parent or guardian to inform them of the
37 suspension. The student shall not be sent home before the end of the school day unless the
38 parent or guardian has been contacted.
39

3. The principal shall notify the parent or guardian and the director of schools or designee in writing:
 - a. Of the suspension and the cause for it; and
 - b. A request for a meeting with the parent or guardian, student and principal, to be held as soon as possible, but no later than five (5) days following the suspension.
4. Immediately following the scheduled meeting, whether or not attended by the parent or guardian or student, the principal shall determine the length of the suspension and set conditions for readmission. If the principal determines the length of the suspension to be between six (6) and the maximum of ten (10) days, the principal shall develop and implement a plan for correcting the behavior when the student returns to school.
5. If at the time of the suspension the principal determines that an offense has been committed which, in the judgment of the principal would justify a suspension for more than ten (10) days, he/she may suspend the student unconditionally for a specified period of time or upon such terms and conditions as are deemed reasonable.
6. The principal shall immediately give written or actual notice to the parent or guardian and the student of the right to appeal the decision to suspend for more than ten (10) days. The notice shall include a statement that, unless the student's parent or guardian requests an open hearing in writing within five (5) days of receipt of the notice, any hearing will be closed to the public. All appeals must be filed, orally or in writing, within five (5) days after receipt of the notice and may be filed by the parent or guardian, the student or any person holding a teaching license who is employed by the school system if requested by the student.
7. The appeal from this decision shall be to disciplinary hearing authority appointed by the Board. **If a Disciplinary Hearing Authority has not been appointed, then the appeal shall be to the Board.**
8. If the suspension occurs during the last ten (10) days of any term or semester, the student shall be permitted to take such final examinations or submit such required work as necessary to complete the course of instruction for that semester, subject to conditions prescribed by the principal.

1 The Board shall provide for a system-wide testing program which shall be periodically reviewed and
2 evaluated. The purposes of the program shall be to:

- 3 1. Assist in promoting accountability;
- 4 2. Determine the progress of students;
- 5 3. Assess the effectiveness of the instructional program and student learning;
- 6 4. Aid in counseling and guiding students in planning future education and other endeavors;
- 7 5. Analyze the improvements needed in a given instructional area;
- 8 6. Assist in the screening of students with learning difficulties;¹
- 9 7. Assist in placing students in remedial programs;
- 10 8. Provide information for college entrance and placement; and
- 11 9. Assist in educational research by providing data.²

12 The director of schools shall be responsible for planning and implementing the program, which includes:

- 13 1. Determining specific purposes for each test;
- 14 2. Selecting the appropriate test to be given;
- 15 3. Establishing procedures for administering the tests;
- 16 4. Making provision for interpreting and disseminating the results;
- 17 5. Maintaining testing information in a consistent and confidential manner; and
- 18 6. Ensuring that results are obtained as quickly as possible, especially when placement in a
19 special learning program might be necessary.

20 State-mandated student testing programs shall be undertaken in accordance with procedures published
21 by the State Department of Education.³

1 The director of schools may exclude Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program scores from
2 students' final grades if scores are not received by the district at least five (5) instructional days before
3 the end of the school year.^{4,5}

4 TNReady⁴ and EOC⁵ scores will be included in students' final grades as follows:

- 5 a) Grades 3-5 - 5% of the last nine (9) weeks
- 6 b) Grades 6-8 - 10% of the last nine (9) weeks
- 7 c) Grades 9-12 - 15% of the last nine (9) weeks

9 EOC scores will be incorporated into a student's report card using the target score method that compares
10 the student score to the distribution of the class. The director of schools may exclude end-of-course
11 (EOC) scores from students' final grades if scores are not received by the district at least five (5)
12 instructional days before the end of the course.^{4,5}

13 Before being included in the students' final grades, end-of-course (EOC) test scores will be converted
14 to a 100-point scale using the Target Score Method, which adjusts each student's score based on the
15 average of all students in the class in the county. The conversion is calculated as follows:

25 P_{avg} = the average points earned on the EOC test for all Hickman County students in the class

26 **INTEREST INVENTORIES AND CAREER ASSESSMENTS⁶**

27 Interest inventories shall be made available to 9th graders. These will include assessments such as the
28 Kuder assessment, Myers-Briggs Type Indicator, the ASVAB, or the College Board Career Finder.

29 Career aptitude assessments shall be administered to 8th graders in order to inform the student's high
30 school plan of study.

1 **TESTING INFORMATION AND PARENTAL CONSENT**

2 Any test directly concerned with measuring student ability or achievement through individual or group
3 psychological or socio-metric tests shall not be administered by or with the knowledge of any employee
4 of the system without first obtaining written consent of the parents or guardians.²

5 Results of all group tests shall be recorded on the students' permanent records and shall be made
6 available to appropriate personnel in accordance with established procedures.⁷

7 No later than July 31 of each year, the Board shall publish on its website information related to state
8 and board mandated tests that will be administered during the school year. The information shall
9 include:⁸

- 10 1. The name of the test;
- 11 2. The purpose and use of the test;
- 12 3. The grade or class in which the test will be administered;
- 13 4. The tentative date or dates that the test will be administered;
- 14 5. The time and manner in which parents and students will be notified of the results of the test;
- 15 6. How parents can access the questions and answers on their student's state-required tests; and
- 16 7. If a board mandated test, how the test complements and enhances student instruction and
17 learning and how it serves a purpose distinct from state-required test.

18 Beginning with the 2015-2016 school year and for school years thereafter, the testing information shall
19 also be placed in student handbooks or other school publications that are provided to parents on an
20 annual basis.

1st reading:

6.400- Student Guidance Program- TSBA's model policy 6.400 is more condensed (see attached). It covers the information found in the board's current policies 6.400, 6.401, 6.406, and 6.407. This is not a change required by law, but they recommend it as a best practice to streamline the policy manual. Additionally, they recommend placing more detailed information about these types of programs in administrative procedures. Model policy is attached.

6.402- Physical Examinations and Immunizations-

TSBA has changed some language under the section on immunizations (see current board policy lines 21-24). They wanted to clarify that under state law, there is always a medical exemption available for vaccinations. The religious exemption, however, is not an option during an epidemic. While this legislation could change in the future, they wanted to be sure that the current state of the law was clear and reflected in those lines. Proposed changes are highlighted on the attached policy.

2nd reading:

6.313 Discipline Procedures: As to policy 6.313, the board policy regarding the code of conduct is to include information regarding exclusionary practices for pre k and k as well as trauma-informed discipline practices per state law. TSBA recommends adding these provisions to the current 6.313 to comply with the requirements found in state law. Current policy with highlighted recommended changes attached.

6.316 Suspension: As to policy 6.316, "remand" and "expel/expulsion" are found throughout the policy; however, these terms correspond to TCA 49-6-3007 and relate to how the absence is coded. This is different from the ways that statutes deal with student discipline and is more focused on school funding. TSBA recommends not including these terms and allowing this policy to only cover suspensions. Current policy with highlighted recommended changes and removal of those terms attached.

1.700- School District Goals- In 2019, the General Assembly passed legislation requiring the State Board of Education to adopt a policy on educator diversity. Last week, at its February meeting, the State Board of Education adopted a policy on this topic. This policy requires local education agencies to set goals for educator diversity. TSBA is recommending that Boards revise their policies to reflect this responsibility. It has been added under Goals for Teachers and Administration in our current policy attached.

4.700- Testing- During the special legislative session, the General Assembly passed legislation allowing local Boards to choose a weight for all TCAP exams to be included in a student's final grade from a range of 0% - 25%. If the Board would like to take advantage of this ability, TSBA recommends suspending that portion of the current policy 4.700. Suspending board policy instead of revising it would eliminate the need for the Board to change this percentage in policy 4.700 again in the future.

1 Surveys, analyses, and evaluations for research purposes shall be allowed by the Board when the project
2 is viewed as contributory to a greater understanding of the teaching-learning process, the project does
3 not violate the goals of the Board, and the disruption of the regular school program is minimal. The
4 director of schools shall develop administrative procedures for approving requests for conducting
5 surveys, analyses, or evaluations by agencies, organizations or individuals. The requests shall outline
6 what is to be done, who is to be involved and how the results will be used and distributed.¹

7 Prior to the dissemination of a survey, analysis, or evaluation to students, parents/guardians shall be
8 notified of their ability to review the materials. Such notification shall include information indicating
9 the purpose of the survey, analysis, or evaluation as well as who will have access to the results.
10 Following such notification and prior to the administration of the survey, analysis, or evaluation,
11 parents/guardians may opt their child out of participation.

12 The director of schools shall develop procedures for granting such parental requests and to implement
13 the other provisions of this policy.¹

14 No student shall be required, as part of any program, to submit to a survey, analysis or evaluation that
15 reveals information concerning: ^{1,2}

- 16 1. mental or psychological problems of the student or the student's family;
- 17 2. sexual behavior or attitudes;
- 18 3. illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
- 19 4. critical appraisals of other individuals with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- 20 5. legally privileged relationships;
- 21 6. income; or
- 22 7. the collection of student biometric data involving the analysis of facial expressions, EEG brain
23 wave patterns, skin conductance, galvanic skin response, heart-rate variability, pulse, blood
24 volume, posture, and eye-tracking³

25 without the prior consent of the student (if the student is an adult or emancipated minor), or in the case
26 of an unemancipated minor, without the prior written consent of the parent.⁵

27 The collection of the following student data is strictly prohibited:⁴

- 28 1. political affiliation or voting history;
- 29 2. religious practices; and
- 30 3. firearm ownership.

1 COLLECTING, DISCLOSING OR USING INFORMATION FOR MARKETING⁵

2 In general, the district will not collect, disclose or use personal student information for the purpose of
3 marketing or selling that information or otherwise providing that information to others for that purpose.

4 If any collected information is to be marketed or sold, parents will be directly notified at least annually
5 at the beginning of the school year of the specific or approximate dates when such information will be
6 collected. Parents, upon request, may inspect any instrument used to collect personal information for the
7 purpose of marketing or selling that information before the instrument is administered or distributed to
8 the student. All parents and students of appropriate age may decline to provide the information requested.

9 This portion of the policy does not apply to the collection, disclosure or use of personal information
10 collected from students for the exclusive purpose of developing, evaluating or providing educational
11 products or services for or to students or educational institutions to the extent allowed by law, such as
12 the following:⁴

- 13 1. College or other postsecondary education recruitment or military recruitment.
- 14 2. Book clubs, magazines and programs providing access to low-cost literary products.
- 15 3. Tests and assessments used by elementary schools and secondary schools to provide
16 cognitive, evaluative, diagnostic, clinical, aptitude or achievement information about
17 students (or to generate other statistically useful data for the purpose of securing such tests
18 and assessments) and the subsequent analysis and public release of the aggregate data from
19 such tests and assessments.
- 20 4. The sale by students of products or services to raise funds for school-related or education
21 related activities.
- 22 5. Student recognition programs.

1 The major objective of student health services is to protect and promote the health of the student. This
2 responsibility is shared by all individuals and agencies in the community.

3 To obtain this objective:

- 4 1. A safe, sanitary, healthful school environment shall be provided; and
- 5 2. Basic principles of healthful living shall be taught.

7 The student health services program¹ shall include:

- 9 1. Identification of physical, mental or emotional characteristics of students which will prevent
10 them from attaining their potentialities through public education;
- 11 2. Evidence of a complete medical examination of every student entering school for the first time;
- 12 3. Proof of immunization except those who are exempt by statute;
- 13 4. A medical examination as directed by the TSSAA of every student prior to participation in
14 interscholastic athletics;
- 15 5. A cumulative health record;
- 16 6. A record for each student which contains information as to how and where to contact parents
17 in case of emergency;
- 18 7. A report of each accident taking place while the student in under the jurisdiction of the school;
- 19 8. Plan for taking care of sick or injured students;
- 20 9. Procedures for reporting suspected child abuse or neglect;
- 21 10. Plan for dealing with communicable diseases;
- 22 11. Procedures for dispensing medication;
- 23 12. Teacher referral of students for available health service; and
- 24 13. Method for evaluating criteria, including the extent and use of available health services based
25 upon the needs of students within the school.

1 No student will be denied an education solely because of a communicable disease, and his/her
2 educational program shall be restricted only to the extent necessary to minimize the risk of transmitting
3 the disease.

4 Parents or guardians of infected students shall inform appropriate school officials of the infection so that
5 proper precautions for the protection of other students, employees, and the infected student shall be
6 taken.

7 No student with a communicable disease which may endanger the health of either himself/herself or
8 other individuals will enter or remain in the regular school setting.^{1,2} If a school principal has reason to
9 believe a student has a communicable disease which may endanger the health of either himself/herself
10 or other individuals in the regular school setting, the principal shall:

- 11 1. Assign the student to a setting which will protect other students, employees and the student
12 himself; or
- 13 2. Exclude the student from school until certification is obtained from a physician or the County
14 Health Department by either the parent or principal stating that the disease is no longer
15 communicable.
16

17 If the principal has reason to believe that the student has a long-term communicable disease, the principal
18 must require confirmation from a physician or the County Health Department as to the student's
19 condition. If the student is confirmed to have a long-term communicable disease the principal shall refer
20 the student for special education services.¹

21 The principal may request that further examinations be conducted by a physician or County Health
22 Department and may request periodic re-examinations after the student has been readmitted to the
23 school.²

24 Expenses incurred from examinations requested by school officials shall be paid by the Board.

25 The names of all students excluded from school under this policy will be forwarded to the office of the
26 director of schools.

1 No student shall be denied an education solely by reason of Pediculosis (head lice) and his/her
2 educational program shall be restricted only to the extent necessary to minimize the risk of transmitting
3 the infestation.

4 It shall be the responsibility of the principal, school nurse, or designee to notify the parents in the event
5 a child has head lice. A letter shall be sent home to explain the condition, requirements for readmission,
6 and deadlines for satisfactory completion of the treatment.

7 Prior to readmission, satisfactory evidence must be submitted to school personnel that the student has
8 been treated for head lice. Evidence may include but not be limited to:

- 9 (1) Proof of treatment with a pediculicide product (head lice shampoo) or
10 (2) Satisfactory examination by a principal, school nurse, or designee.

11 Treatment and prevention procedures shall be developed by the director of schools in consultation with
12 Coordinated School Health and distributed to all classroom teachers. Prevention procedures include
13 students re-entering school will be re-screened for live lice in 7-10 days.

14 Any subsequent incidences of head lice for a student during the school year shall require submission of
15 satisfactory evidence of treatment for head lice and be found free of lice by a school health official.

16 A student shall be expected to have met all requirements for treatment and return to school. A student
17 will be allowed a total of four excused absences for treatment of lice at any given time during the school
18 year. Any days in excess of this will be unexcused.

1 In those situations when a bed bug is found on a student or the student's belongings, it will be the goal
2 of the school system to assist the student and to prevent transmission of bed bugs to the school and
3 other students. While undertaking these goals, it is the further goal of the school system to restrict the
4 affected student's educational program only to the extent necessary to minimize the risk of transmitting
5 a bed bug infestation.

6 It shall be the responsibility of the principal, school nurse, or designee to notify the parents or
7 guardians in the event a bed bug has been found on a student or their belongings. A letter shall be sent
8 home to explain the condition, that the student will be excluded from school until the requirements for
9 readmission have been met, and deadlines for satisfactory completion of any required treatment.
10 Readmission of the student to school will be conditioned upon a satisfactory examination by a school
11 health official and if circumstances deem such necessary proof of treatment by a professional pest
12 management service.

13 A student shall be expected to have met all requirements for readmission and return to school no later
14 than 7 days following exclusion for bed bugs. All days in excess of the 7 day allowable period shall be
15 marked as unexcused absences and referred to the attendance supervisor.

16 Procedures for the school system's prevention of bed bug infestations, the response to the sighting of a
17 bed bug, and of any necessary treatment of school facilities in the event of a bed bug infestation shall
18 be developed by the director of schools in consultation with the school system's Coordinated School
19 Health Office.

1 **LIABILITY AND NON-DISCRIMINATION**

2 Students infected with HIV shall not be denied enrollment in school. The Board shall not prevent an HIV
3 infected student from participating in the continuation of his/her education on the basis of HIV infection.
4 Further, the student shall be subject to the same rules for class assignment, privileges and participation
5 in any school-sponsored activities as all other students. The Board shall strive to maintain a respectful
6 school climate for HIV infected students.

7 Mandatory screening for communicable diseases not spread by casual everyday contact, such as HIV
8 infection, shall not be a condition for school entry or attendance.¹

9 **ATHLETICS**

10 A student who is HIV positive may not be denied the opportunity to participate in school athletic
11 programs based solely on his/her HIV status. All reasonable accommodations shall be made to allow
12 students with HIV to participate in school-sponsored physical activities.¹

13 **ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITIES FOR CONFIDENTIALITY**

14 If a student's parents/guardians choose to disclose the child's HIV status, all matters pertaining to that
15 student will be directed by procedures initiated by the director of schools.

16 The director of schools shall be responsible for requesting medical records from the parent/guardian and
17 a statement from the student's physician regarding health status of the student reported to have
18 HIV/AIDS. In addition, the director of schools will gather information regarding the student's
19 cumulative school record.

20 **CONFIDENTIALITY**

21 No information concerning an HIV infected student shall be divulged, directly or indirectly, to any other
22 individual or group without the written consent of the parent/guardian. All medical information and
23 written documentation of discussions, telephone conversations, proceedings and meetings shall be kept
24 by the director of schools in a locked file. If the HIV infected student is under the age of eighteen (18),
25 access to this file will be granted only to those persons who have the written consent of the infected
26 student's parents/guardians.

27 **Under no circumstances shall information identifying a student with AIDS be released to the**
28 **public.**^{2,3}

29 **APPROPRIATE ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMS**

1 In determining the educational placement of a student known to be infected with HIV, school authorities
2 shall follow established policies and procedures for students with disabilities. School authorities shall
3 reassess placement if there is a change in the student's need for accommodations or services.

4 **HIV PREVENTION EDUCATION/CURRICULUM⁵**

5 The director of schools shall be responsible for developing instructional objectives to address each
6 terminal objective in the state AIDS curriculum framework and provide each teacher responsible for
7 teaching AIDS education with these objectives. Students shall further be taught universal precautions
8 through the K-8 Healthful Living and Lifetime Wellness curricula and through the Board's HIV
9 prevention education program.

10 The state AIDS curriculum and related instructional objectives will be used in grades K-12. Parents and
11 guardians shall have convenient opportunities to preview all HIV prevention curricula and materials in
12 accordance with the provisions of the Family Education Law of 1989.

13 Students shall have access to voluntary and confidential counseling about matters related to HIV.
14 Administrators shall maintain a list of counseling and testing resources for student use.

15 **INFECTION CONTROL**

16 The director of schools shall develop an Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA)-based
17 infection control plan in which each school will provide for: 1) well-maintained and easily accessible
18 materials necessary to follow universal precautions, and 2) designate first responders responsible for
19 implementing infection control guidelines, including investigating, correcting, and reporting on
20 instances of exposure. All schools shall further follow the most current Centers for Disease Control and
21 Prevention (CDC) Universal Precautions for Prevention of Transmission of Human Immunodeficiency
22 Virus, Hepatitis B Virus, and Other Blood borne Pathogens in Health Care Settings and the OSHA blood
23 borne pathogens standard.⁴

1 If under exceptional circumstances a child is required to take non-prescription or prescription
2 medication during school hours and the parent/guardian cannot be at school to administer the
3 medication, only the principal or the principal's designee will assist in self-administration of the
4 medication if the student is competent to self-administer medicine with assistance in compliance with
5 the following regulations: ¹

6 Written instructions signed by the parent will be required and will include:

- 7 1. Child's name;
- 8 2. Name of medication;
- 9 3. Name of physician;
- 10 4. Time to be self-administered;
- 11 5. Dosage and directions for self-administration (non-prescription medicines must have label
12 direction);
- 13 6. Possible side effects, if known; and
- 14 7. Termination date for self-administration of the medication.

15 Students with asthma shall be permitted to self-administer prescribed, metered dosage asthma-reliever
16 inhalers if the additional information is provided by a parent/guardian:

- 17 1. Written statement from the prescribing health care practitioner that the student suffers from
18 asthma and has been instructed in self-administration; and
- 19 2. Purpose of the medication.

22 The medication shall be delivered to the principal's office in person by the parent/guardian of the
23 student unless the medication shall be retained by the student for immediate self-administration.

24 The medication must be delivered to the principal's office in person by the parent/guardian or their
25 designee of the student unless the medication must be retained by the student for immediate self-
26 administration (i.e. students with asthma), in which case a doctor's order is required to be on file at the
27 school.

28 Volunteer personnel, trained by a registered nurse, may administer emergency medication to a student
29 based on that student's Individual Health Plan (IHP) or a physician's standing order. A call to 911 will
30 be made in the event of these emergencies.

1 The administrator/designee will:

- 2 1. Inform appropriate school personnel of the medication to be self-administered;
- 3 2. Keep written instructions from parent in student's record;
- 4 3. Keep an accurate record of the self-administration of the medication;
- 5 4. Keep all medication in a locked cabinet except medication retained by a student per physician's
- 6 order;
- 7 5. Return unused prescription to the parent or guardian only; and
- 8 6. Ensure that all guidelines developed by the Department of Health and the Department of
- 9 Education are followed.

10 The parent or guardian is responsible for informing the designated official of any change in the
11 student's health or change in medication.

12 A copy of this policy shall be provided to a parent or guardian upon receipt of a request for long-term
13 administration of medication.

14 **TRANSPORTATION OF MEDICATIONS ON SCHOOLS BUSES**

15 In an effort to ensure the safety and well-being of all students, no medications except inhalers or other
16 medications which a physician has indicated in writing should be kept on a student's person, may be
17 transported on school buses. Parents must make arrangements for delivery of medications to the school
18 that their child attends.

19 In the event that medication is sent to school on a bus in violation of this policy, the following
20 procedure will be utilized:

21 1. *First Non-Compliance Incident*

22 Parents will be contacted by phone or letter. A copy of this policy will be attached to the letter.

23 2. *Second Non-Compliance Incident*

24 A referral will be made to the Juvenile Court of Hickman County and/or the Department of
25 Children's Services for disposition of the matter.

26 **DISPOSAL OF MEDICATIONS**

1 Notification will be provided by phone call or notes sent home to parents one week prior to the end of
2 the school year that unused medication is remaining at school.

3 If a parent/guardian or their designee does not pick up remaining medication, disposal will occur at the
4 end of the school year by transporting to the Hickman County Sheriff's Department to be disposed of
5 properly through the Community Drug Take Back Program. Two school personnel shall be present at
6 disposal. Appropriate school personnel will be trained annually in disposal procedures. Documentation
7 shall occur regarding disposal of all medications.

8 **BLOOD GLUCOSE SELF-CHECKS²**

9 Upon written request of a parent or guardian, and if included in the student's medical management plan
10 and in the IHP, a student with diabetes shall be permitted to perform a blood glucose check or
11 administer insulin using any necessary diabetes monitoring and treatment supplies, including sharps.
12 The student shall be permitted to perform the testing in any area of the school or school grounds at any
13 time necessary. The student will report the use of the monitoring or treatment supplies to school
14 employee for proper disposal.

15 Sharps shall be stored in a secure, but accessible location, including the student's person, until use of
16 such sharps is appropriate.

17 Use and disposal of sharps shall be in compliance with the guidelines set forth by the Tennessee
18 Occupational Safety and Health Administration (TOSHA).

19 **STUDENTS WITH PANCREATIC INSUFFICIENCY OR CYSTIC FIBROSIS³**

20 Students diagnosed with pancreatic insufficiency or cystic fibrosis shall be permitted to carry and self-
21 administer their prescribed medication in a manner directed by a licensed healthcare provider without
22 additional assistance or direction. The Director of Schools shall develop procedures for the
23 development of both an Individualized Healthcare Plan (IHP) and an Emergency Care Plan (ECP) that
24 conforms to state law for every student with pancreatic insufficiency or cystic fibrosis that wishes to
25 self-medicate.

26 **STUDENTS WITH ADRENAL INSUFFICIENCY⁴**

27 The parent/guardian of a student diagnosed with adrenal insufficiency shall notify the school district of
28 the student's diagnosis. Once notified, the district shall observe the following procedure:

- 29 1. The district shall train school personnel who will be responsible for administering the
30 medication for the treatment of adrenal insufficiency and any who volunteer to administer the
31 medication.
32

- 1 2. The district shall maintain a record of all school personnel who have completed this training.
- 2
- 3 3. If a student is suffering from an adrenal crisis, a school nurse or other licensed health care
- 4 professional may administer the prescribed medication to the student. If a school nurse or other
- 5 licensed health care professional is not immediately available, trained school personnel may
- 6 administer the prescribed medication.
- 7 The director of schools shall develop procedures on the administration of medications that treat adrenal
- 8 insufficiency and recordkeeping per rules set forth by the State Board of Education.

1 This policy addresses those instances when students need to receive medication in an emergency
2 situation. Board Policy 6.405 addresses instances wherein students take medicine during the school
3 day in non-emergency situations.

4 School personnel, who volunteer, under no duress or pressure and have been properly trained by a
5 registered nurse, are permitted to administer glucagon in emergency situation to a student based on
6 physician's order and/or the student's Individual Health Plan (IHP). If the school nurse is on site, the
7 nurse shall provide the service to the student.¹

8 The school nurse shall be responsible for updating and maintaining each IHP. There must be a
9 parent/guardian signature on file giving permission prior to training school personnel to administer
10 glucagon.

11 Following are specifics relating to glucagon and diazepam. Volunteer personnel, trained by a
12 registered nurse, may administer emergency medication to a student based on that student's Individual
13 Health Plan (IHP) or a physician's standing order. A call to 911 will be made in the event of these
14 emergencies.

15 DEFINITION OF GLUAGON

16 Glucagon is a hormone that helps the liver release sugar, thus increasing the level of sugar in the blood.
17 It must be injected with a syringe into the body like insulin.

18 WHEN TO USE GLUCAGON

19 Glucagon is administered when the student has low blood sugar and is unable to take liquid or food by
20 mouth because of unconsciousness or seizure activity as per a medical provider's written instructions.

21 TRAINING

- 22 1. Review physicians' orders for glucagon and parent/guardian permission on file.
- 23 2. The volunteer must complete an initial in-depth diabetes-related training recognizing
24 signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia and respond with student-specific interventions.
- 25 3. The volunteer trainee must be able to state glucagon's action and the need for its use.
- 26 4. The volunteer trainee must be able to state how glucagon should be prepared, the
27 dosage, and side effects as well as follow-up care after the administration of glucagon.

- 1 5. The volunteer trainee must be able to identify where glucagon will be stored (must be
2 kept in a secure location away from heat and direct light) and readily available to the
3 student.
- 4 6. The volunteer trainee will notify or delegate notification of EMS/911 personnel,
5 parents/guardian, and the school nurse any time glucagon is administered to any
6 student.
- 7 7. The volunteer trainee must document observations, administration of glucagon, and
8 follow-up care on the appropriate diabetic and medication forms.
- 9 8. Training will be provided until competency is demonstrated, and retraining shall be
10 completed on a yearly basis. Training will be documented and include a skills checklist,
11 instructor's name, trainee's name, date of training, and documentation of competency of
12 trainee to administer glucagon. A copy of the trainee's competency training form will be
13 kept in the employee's personnel file.

14 **DEFINITION OF DIAZEPAM (DIASTAT)**

15 Diastat works to stop seizure activity by acting on brain cell interactions that inhibit the seizure
16 discharges. This special formulation of diazepam is administered rectally as a gel.

17 School personnel who volunteer under no duress or pressure and who have been properly trained by a
18 registered nurse or employed or contracted by the Hickman County School System may administer
19 anti-seizure medication, including diazepam gel to a student in an emergency situation based on the
20 student's IHP. If the school nurse is available, on site, and able to reach the student within the time
21 limit for administration specified in the IHP, then the school nurse shall provide this service to the
22 student.

23 **WHEN TO USE DIASTAT**

24 Upon the decision of a trained volunteer to administer diazepam gel (Diastat), school officials shall
25 immediately summon local emergency medical services to the school to provide necessary monitoring
26 of transport to safeguard the health and condition of the student.

27 Trained volunteer school personnel administering anti-seizure medications, any registered nurse who
28 provides training to administer such medications, and any local board of education shall not be liable
29 in any court of law for injury resulting from the reasonable and prudent assistance in the administration
30 of such medications, if performed pursuant to the policies and guidelines developed by the departments
31 of health and education and approved by applicable regulatory or governing boards or agencies.

32 The Hickman County School System shall not assign a student with epilepsy or other seizure disorder
33 to a school other than the school for which the student is zoned or would otherwise regularly attend
34 because the student has a seizure disorder.

35 A student's parent/guardian, who has given the student's school written authorization to administer
36 anti-seizure medication, shall, in accordance with the student's IHP, notify the school administrator or
37 school nurse if anti-seizure medication or prescription over-the-counter medicines are administered at a

1 time at which the student is not present in school. The student's IHP shall set forth with specificity the
 2 requirements of reporting administration of medication and for the dissemination of such information
 3 to volunteer school personnel trained to administer anti-seizure medication. Such notification shall be
 4 given after administration of medication before or at the beginning of the next school day in which the
 5 student is in attendance.

6 TRAINING

7 Prior to administration of an anti-seizure medication to a student by volunteer school personnel or a
 8 school nurse in an emergency situation, the student's parent/guardian shall provide:

- 9 1. The school with a written authorization to administer the medication at school;
- 10 2. A written statement from the student's health care practitioner, which shall contain the
 11 student's name, the name and purpose of the medication, the prescribed dosage, the
 12 route of administration, the frequency that the medication may be administered, and the
 13 circumstances under which the medication may be administered;
- 14 3. Prior to its date of expiration, the prescribed medication to the school is in its unopened,
 15 sealed package with the intact label affixed by the dispensing pharmacy.

16 EMERGENCY ALLERGY RESPONSE PLAN

17 The director of schools shall develop and maintain an Emergency Allergy Response Plan that meets
 18 state guidelines for managing students with life-threatening allergies. The Plan shall include measures
 19 to reduce exposure to allergens and procedures to treat allergic reactions. Components of the plan shall
 20 include, but are not limited to: education and training of personnel, record keeping/documentation,
 21 development and reviews of the allergy action plan, and protocols for classrooms and cafeterias that
 22 include strategies to reduce exposure to allergens.²

23 Using the state food allergy guidelines plan as a guide, the direction shall also develop a process to
 24 identify all students with food allergies and develop and implement an Individualized Health Care Plan
 25 (IHCP) with an Allergy Action Plan for each specific student.³

1 The director of schools will develop a program for making psychological services available to all
2 students.¹ This program shall cooperate with other agencies in consultative screening and assessment
3 services.

4 No school personnel shall conduct any mental health screenings, except as provided by law.²

5 School counselors shall respect the right of privacy of the students they counsel. Confidentiality shall
6 be maintained by the counselor except:

- 7 1. Where there is a clear and present danger to the student or other persons;
- 8 2. To consult with another psychologist when it is in the best interests of the student; or
- 9 3. When the student and/or parent waives this privilege in writing.

12 When a counselor is in doubt about what information to release in a judicial proceeding, the counselor
13 shall consult with the board attorney.

1 Each school shall provide a social service program for all students through the cooperative efforts of the
2 principal, teachers, and guidance counselor.¹

3 The principal shall develop a program of social services which shall include such services and activities
4 as:

- 5 1. Orientation of parents and students to the school program;
- 6
- 7 2. Student referral and/or welfare provisions;
- 8
- 9 3. Collection and maintenance of student data and record systems;

- 11 4. Educational information for use by students, parents and teachers;

20 delivery of services to students.

21 School administrators are authorized to work with recognized groups who may furnish special services
22 to students.

1 Employees who are directly responsible for a student's education or who otherwise interact within the
2 scope of their assigned duties may relocate a student from the student's present location to another
3 location when such relocation is necessary for the student's safety or the safety of others.¹ Such
4 employees may also intervene in a physical altercation between two or more students or between a
5 student and an LEA employee. Reasonable force may be used to physically relocate or intervene in a
6 conflict if a student is unwilling to cooperate.²

7 If an employee is unable to resolve the matter with the use of reasonable or justifiable force are required,
8 the student shall be allowed to remain in place until such a time as local law enforcement officers or
9 school resource officers can be summoned to relocate the student or take the student into custody until
10 such a time as a parent or guardian can retrieve the student.

11 In the event that physical relocation becomes necessary, the teacher shall immediately file a brief report
12 of the incident with the building principal. If the student's behavior constitutes a violation of the Board's
13 zero tolerance policy, then the report shall be placed in the student's permanent record. Otherwise, the
14 report shall be kept in the student's discipline record, and not become a part of that student's permanent
15 record. The principal or the principal's designee shall notify the teacher involved of the actions taken to
16 address the behavior of the relocated student.

17 The director of schools shall create procedures to implement this policy consistent with State law. Each
18 building principal shall fully support the authority of the employees' authority under this policy and fully
19 implement the policy and procedures of the system.


