a. Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Golden thanked the Board members for their work. He reminded the Board of the Human Resources presentation by Assistant Superintendent Ms. Hall at the work session including the approved mid-year raise for employees, approved by the School Board and County Commission. He encouraged everyone to look at the presentation, located on the school district's website. Golden stated that during the work session it was discussed to survey the teachers to get an idea of data points to find out how we can help teachers grow. "We are proud of the work we do", Golden said when he announced that WCS has 71 National Merit Finalists, exceeding our highest number ever of National Merit Finalists by 19. Golden concluded by thanking everyone who spoke during public comment.

- 14 a. The individual played a critical role or contributed to society in ways that supported the

- 18 which the individual is most known) aligns with or reflects the WCS mission, vision,
- 19 core values and beliefs.

2 A student shall not engage in conduct which causes the disruption or interference with the operation of
 3 the school while on school property, in school vehicles or buses, or at school-sponsored events,

5 Employees are authorized to take reasonable measures to establish appropriate school behavior and
 6 have the authority to control the conduct of any student while under the supervision of the school
 7 district.¹

8 A student may receive disciplinary action ranging from verbal reprimand to suspension and/or expulsion
 9 depending on the severity of the offense and the student’s prior record.²

10 **REMOVAL OF STUDENT³**

11 If a student repeatedly or substantially interferes with the learning environment, the teacher may
 12 submit a written request along with the required documentation to the principal/designee to remove the
 13 student from the teacher’s classroom. The student will be given notice of the rationale for the request
 14 as well as the opportunity to offer an explanation.

15 The principal/designee will investigate the request and make a decision regarding the student’s
 16 placement. The principal will notify the teacher as to his/her decision.

17 If a teacher abuses or overuses the student removal process, the principal/designee shall address the
 18 abuse or overuse with the teacher and may require the teacher to complete additional professional
 19 development to improve the teacher’s classroom management skills.

20 *Appeal Process*

21 If the teacher’s request for removal is denied, he/she may file an appeal with the Superintendent of
 22 Schools/designee. He/she will review the teacher’s request for removal as well as the decision of the
 23 principal/designee and make a determination as to the student’s placement.

Dear Director Golden,

In October 2021, Governor Bill Lee announced the state would review its public school funding formula. Subsequently, Tennessee undertook an expansive statewide engagement process, which incorporated opportunities for thousands of individuals across the state to provide input and feedback on what they would like to see in a new funding formula for public school funding.

Today, Governor Lee has [announced](#) his new proposed K-12 public school funding formula—the Tennessee Investment in Student Achievement (TISA).

Based on the legislation as proposed, **Williamson County Schools would be allocated \$22,014,404.70 in additional funding under TISA**, should it be passed by the Tennessee General Assembly. Passage of this proposed bill would bring an additional \$1B in recurring funding to public education in Tennessee.

For the first time in over 30 years, the TISA would update the way Tennessee invests in public education by moving to a student-based funding formula, which includes:

- A base funding amount for every public-school student.
- Additional weighted funding to address individual student needs like those students who may be low-income, have a disability, be gifted, have characteristics of dyslexia, or live in a sparse community.
- Additional direct funding intended to support students in key priority areas like early literacy, CTE programming, and high-dosage tutoring.
- Outcome incentives based on student achievement to empower schools to help all students reach their full potential.

RE: **2022-2023 Recommended Budget Proposals for the General Purpose School, Central Cafeteria, Extended School Program and Capital Funds**

Date: March 10, 2022

The **Williamson County Board of Education Budget** proposal for 2022-2023 has been completed. The proposed budgets include growth (required by State and Board standards), critical needs and aligns with the Board's strategic plan. The Budget Committee of the County Commission provided budget guidelines that included a raise of **2%** along with a guideline request that operations be held at "status quo" while allowing for growth.

Facts used in preparation of the budget:

- The County has indicated a need to increase the employer share for medical insurance by **\$750** per fulltime equivalent (FTE) for a total increase in medical insurance cost of **\$3,872,250** and no change for dental insurance this year. The County health insurance plan is a self-funding plan with these payments being used to pay for claims. The total funding to the County for medical and dental insurance is **\$61,697,850**.
- Enrollment estimate for End of First Month (EOFM) is **42,182**, an increase of 932 K-12 students over last year's EOFM of 41,250, a **2.26%** increase. This figure does not include our Pre-K program (up to 180) or our Early Childhood program (currently over 770 on 2.15.22). However, expenses for these programs are included in this budget as always.
- We must provide for a minimum 3% fund balance within our General Purpose budget for State approval, which currently would be **\$14,015,061** based on our General Purpose appropriation request.
- The annual cost to cover the 3% raise for salaried employees and \$1/hour raise for hourly staff that was granted mid-year in February of 2022 is **\$6,663,609** for salaried and **\$2,587,587** for hourly for a total of **\$9,251,196** including benefits.
- The annual cost to roll the professionals on the pay chart was **\$2,539,703**.
- In addition to the roll, a 2% raise and adjustments were made to parts of all pay charts to increase pay ranges allowing us to be more competitive in the job market. The cost associated with the 2% raise and chart changes is **\$9,214,688** (including benefits). Employees are given the higher of the 2% raise or the roll and adjustments to the chart.
- The total staffing pay increase is **8.42%** from original approved 2021-2022 budget.

The **General Purpose School Fund** proposed budget is **\$467,182,046** which is **\$52,602,912** over the prior original budget requested in July of 2021 or a **12.69 %** increase and **\$38,328,127** above the current revised budget or an **8.94%** increase. This represents a total increase in staffing of **178** positions.

The budget has been created with the following revenue information:

BEP

- Currently the BEP formula does not fund **747** of our educators/nurses. Next year's BEP formula will have an increase for overall teacher pay. Governor Lee has said he will be putting \$125,000,000 into BEP funding statewide for teacher pay, and the funds will be distributed based on each district's number of employed teachers. We are unsure at this time as to what our allocation will be. Based on our total number of employed teachers and an approximate total number of teachers employed by the State, we are estimating the amount could be around \$3,000,000. Because we are unsure of the number, we have not included it in our budget projections.
 - Based on student enrollment numbers dropping in 2020-2021, we were held harmless for 2021-2022. You must have a 2% increase in student enrollment to qualify for growth funds. We did not meet that threshold for growth in 2021-2022, so we will receive no additional funding for growth in the current fiscal year.

Sales Tax

- Sales tax was projected with a 10% growth factor on sales from the 2020-2021 fiscal year. Actual collections from sales tax from that year were used with the addition of \$9,000,000 to account for the .5 percent tax increase from April of 2018 that we had agreed to give back to the County for three years to be used to pay down on capital debt. We only received the extra \$1million/month for the last three months of 2021, so the sales tax collection was adjusted to represent a full year of collections. The sales tax growth in 2021-2022 is exceptional, so the prior year's sales tax revenue was used instead for projections.

Property Tax

- The February 2, 2022, projection of the penny provided by the County mayor's office was used at our current tax rate for property taxes and does not include the new ADA split with FSSD.
 - Remember, we share certain local revenues with FSSD based on student enrollment, which is the ADA split provided by the State. This number changes every year around February or March, and we have not received the allocation for this year yet.

OTHER BUDGETS

The following self-sustaining budgets will also need your approval. These two funds have recovered from the loss of income they sustained in the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

- The **Central Cafeteria Fund** request amounts to **\$19,522,056** with no projected rate increases.
- The **Extended School Program Fund** budget (which covers all elementary schools) is **\$5,841,165** which includes tuition increases.

CAPITAL

The capital request of **\$12,514,650** represents individual capital needs exceeding \$10,000 per project that is needed to maintain the infrastructure of our equipment and buildings. This is an increase of **\$2,300,984** or a **22.52%** increase over last year's capital requests of **\$10,213,666**.

Our 5-year capital plan does not include the yearly additional requests that need to be budgeted outside of the operational budget. These capital expenses are beyond routine maintenance and would burden the yearly operational budget due to our vast amount of infrastructure, both in technology, and fixed assets (such as buses). These requests add value and life to our aging assets. The 5-year plan includes major renovation, additions, and new buildings. The Board requests items on the 5-year plan closer to the time of a particular need through an INTENT TO FUND resolution instead of during the budget process.

3 The Board is composed of twelve (12) members.

4 **QUALIFICATIONS**

5 Members of the Board shall be residents ~~of and~~ elected ~~on a non-partisan basis~~ from districts of
6 substantially equal population and shall be citizens of recognized integrity, intelligence, and ability to
7 administer the duties of the office.^{1,2} To qualify as a candidate, an individual must show proof of
8 graduation from high school or receipt of a G.E.D. *or HiSET*.³ No member of the county legislative
9 body nor any other county governmental official shall be eligible for election as a member of the
10 county board of education.⁴

11 **TERMS OF OFFICE**

12 Members of the Board shall serve four (4) year terms.¹

13 **VACANCIES**

14 Vacancies shall be declared to exist on account of death, resignation, removal from the district, or
15 through due process proceedings.⁵

16 When a vacancy occurs, the unexpired term shall be filled at the next regular or special meeting of the
17 County legislative body.⁶ Such appointment shall continue until the next regular election.

1 *The selection of textbooks shall be completed according to the laws and policies required by Board*
2 *will appoint textbook review committees to review the textbooks and instructional materials proposed*
3 *for adoption by the State of Tennessee and the State Textbook Commission Department of Education.¹*
4 *The responsibility for textbook selection rests with the local textbook selection committees, subject to*
5 *approval by the Board. The Board will appoint textbook selection review committees to review the*
6 *textbooks and instructional materials proposed for adoption.* The committees shall be established by
7 grade level and subject matter fields.

8 The Executive Committee shall prepare a recommended list of committee members for the Board to
9 consider. Members of the committees shall be teachers, supervisors of teachers, and parents with children
10 currently enrolled in a school under the jurisdiction of the Board at the time of the appointment. Teachers
11 and supervisors who are appointed shall be teaching or supervising the respective grade level or subject
12 at the time of appointment, must be licensed in Tennessee with endorsements in the grade level or subject
13 matter, and must have at least three years of experience teaching in public schools. All committee
14 members shall be voting members. The Board may appoint experts in the grade level or subject matter
15 field for the textbooks and instructional materials to be reviewed.

16 The review shall include an examination as to whether the textbooks or instructional materials:

- 17 • Conform to the standards for their subject areas or grade levels;
- 18
- 19 • Are free of any clear, substantive, factual or grammatical errors;
- 20
- 21 • Contain content that is accurate and free of bias;
- 22
- 23 • Comply with and reflect the values expressed in §49-6-1028(b), if the textbook or instructional
24 materials are being considered for adoption as a textbook or instructional materials for
25 education of students in general studies and specifically in United States history and this
26 nation's republican form of government.

27 Experts may be college professors or credentialed subject matter specialists. Upon recommendation by
28 the Superintendent, the Board shall determine whether an individual is a credentialed subject matter
29 specialist. Experts so appointed shall not be voting members of any committee, but may present
30 information to the committee for consideration.

31 The Superintendent shall be an ex officio member of all committees appointed, and shall not be a voting
32 member. Members of the Board may also serve as ex officio members.

- 1 All committee members must swear to the oath required by state law. The members of the committees
- 2 appointed shall serve for the length of time the adoption process for which they are appointed lasts.

- 3 At least one copy of each text to be considered by the committees shall be available at the central office
- 4 during the review period for examination by Board members, WCS employees, and the general public.
- 5 Online access to the textbooks and materials shall be provided to the fullest extent possible. The public
- 6 will be made aware of the dates the textbooks and materials are available for review.²

- 7 The textbook adoption committees' selections will be submitted to the Board for approval.

This course is designed to be an introduction and to prepare students for the AP Historical Skills as well as to the rigor of an AP class. It is not designed to take the place of an AP level course. Therefore an intermediate level would suit this course best in order to prepare students for the Advanced level Histories that they will take in future years.

103. Course Description

This course will be a survey of the accomplishments of all cultures and civilizations starting in the pre-historic times and going up to 1450 C.E. This course is designed to provide a foundation of the unique history of all regions including studies of the development of politics, economics, culture, and religion that have shaped the diverse cultures that exist today. This course will also serve as an introduction to the historical thinking skills from the College Board that will be used in AP (Advanced Placement) World, AP European, and AP US Histories. It is not designed to be an AP level class, but instead as an introduction to historical thinking skills to serve as a springboard to success in AP History classes. Students will be introduced to a contextual and comparative approach to History as well and studying continuities and changes over time in various regions. Students will learn to analyze causation as well as develop historical arguments through interpretation of history and sources. This course can be useful and enjoyed by students who want to prepare for a Historical path in High School, prepare for a future in History, or just interested in the time period and want to take an elective Ancient History class.
