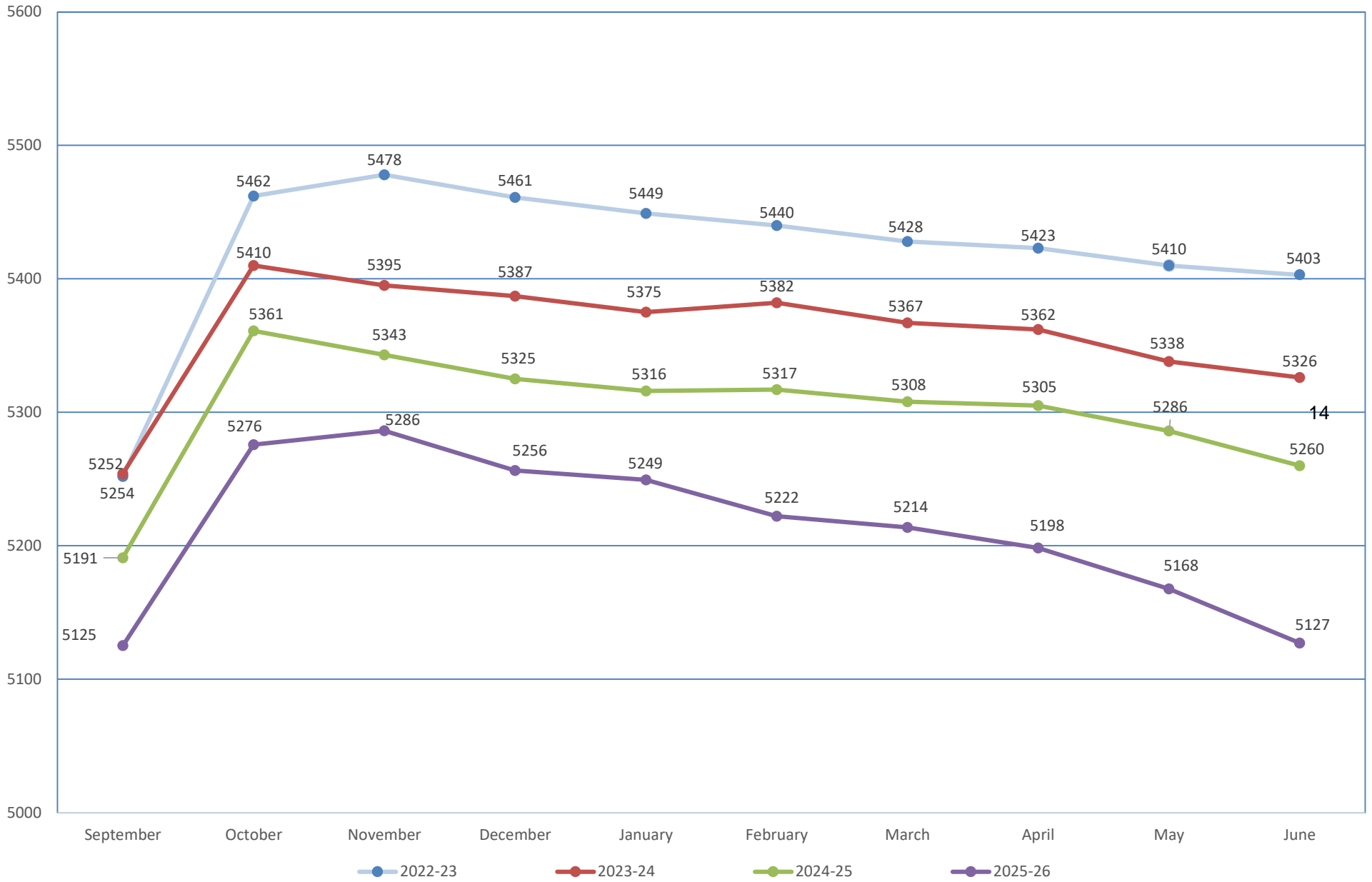

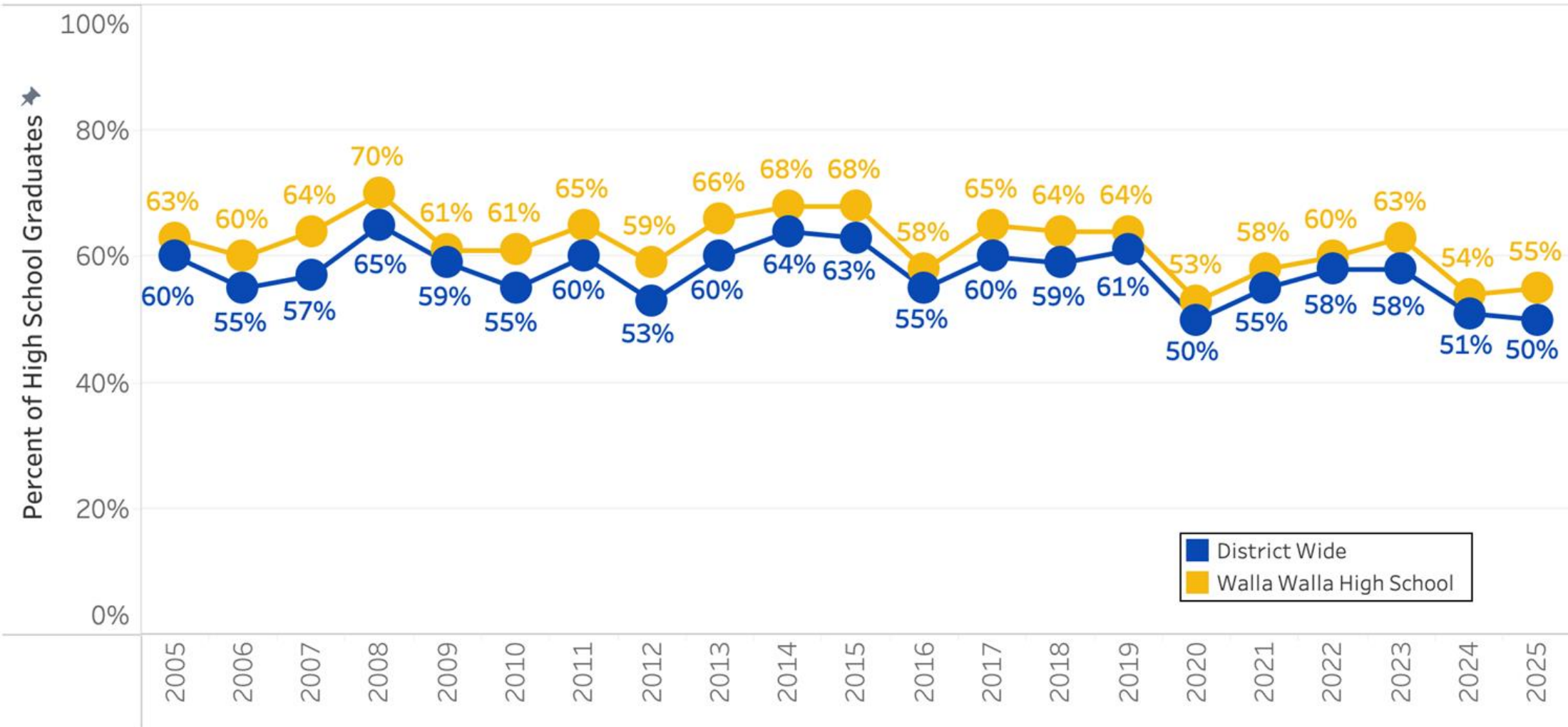

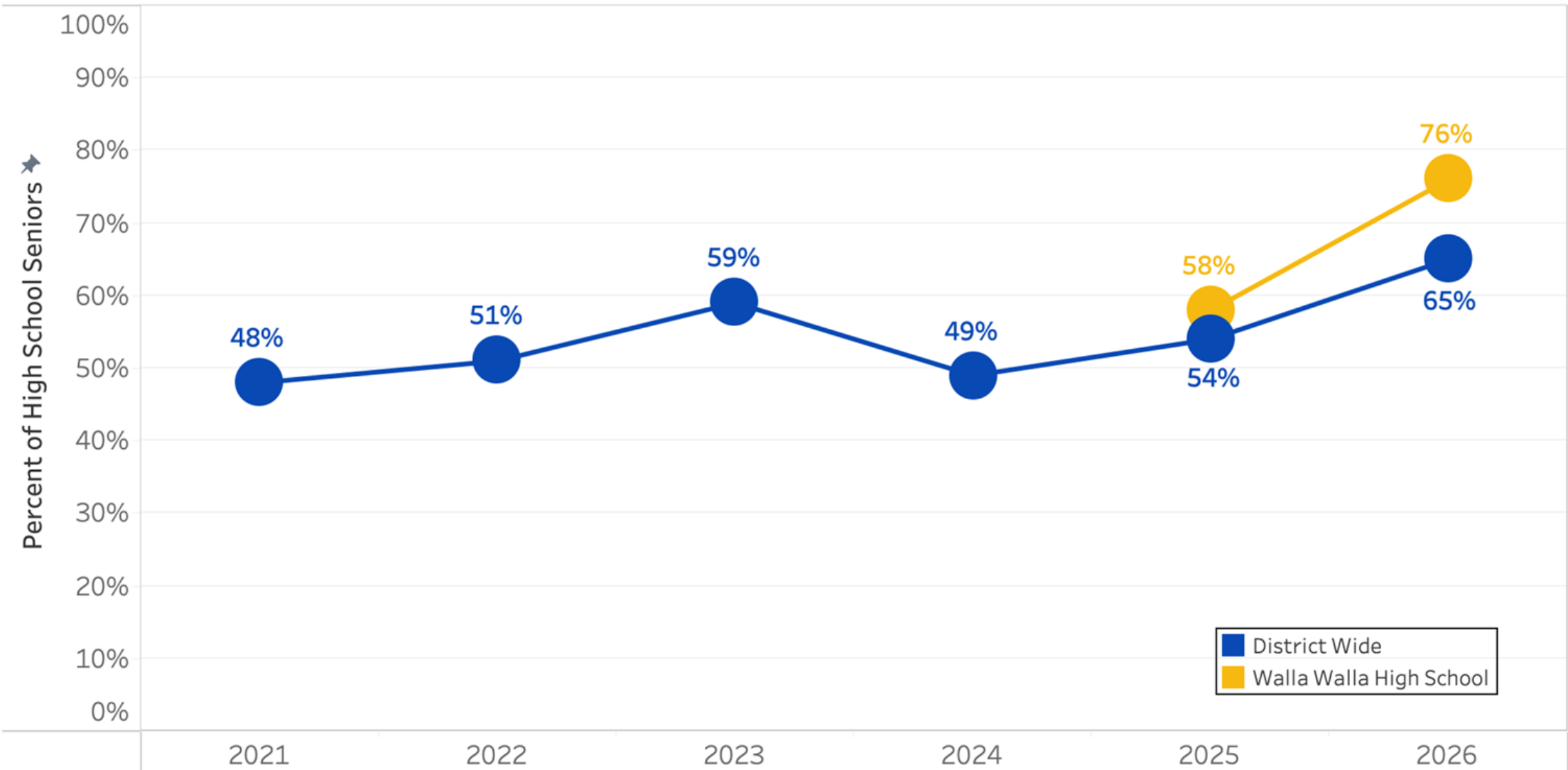

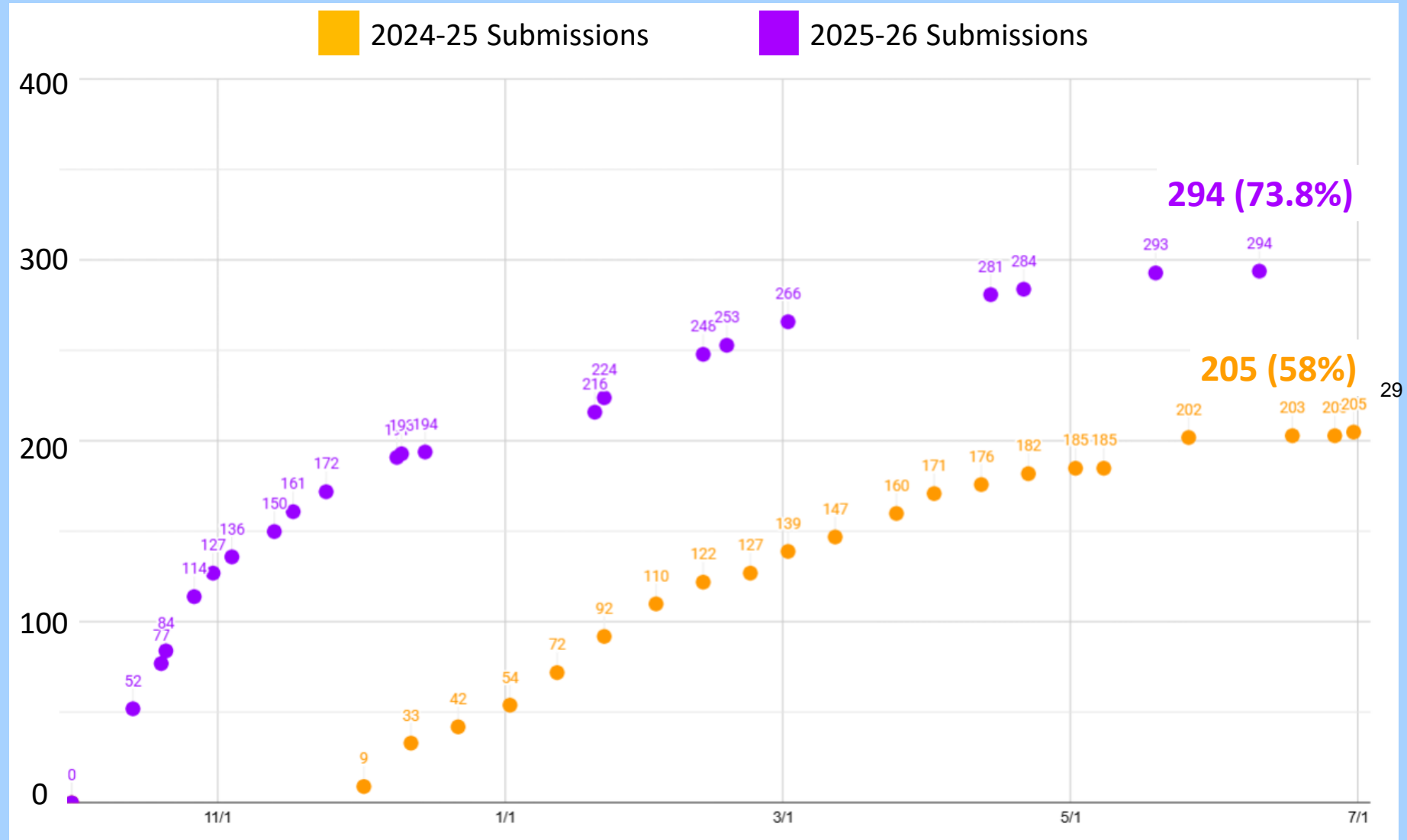

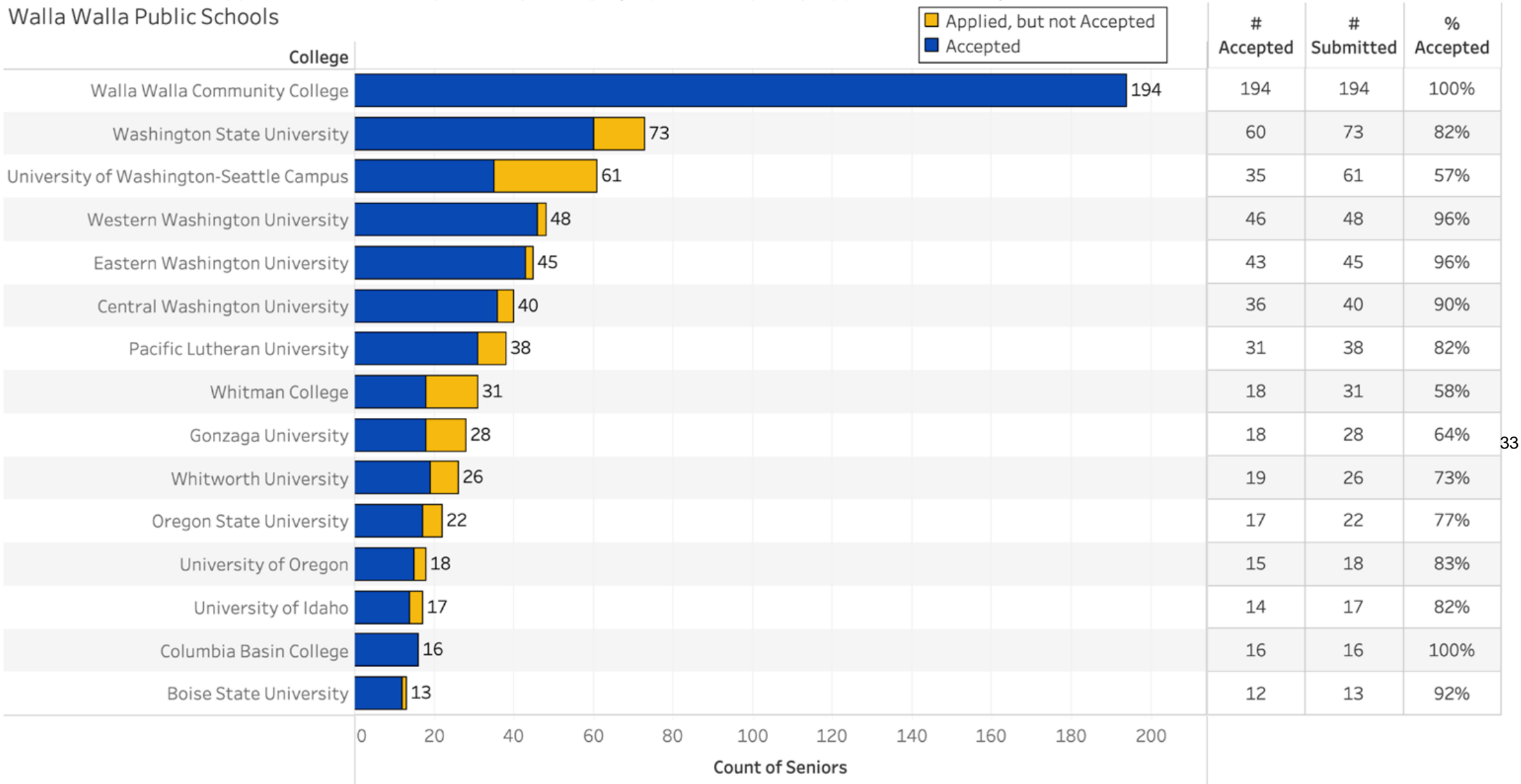

## Count of Submitted Applications and Acceptance by College (Top 15 Colleges by Application Count)

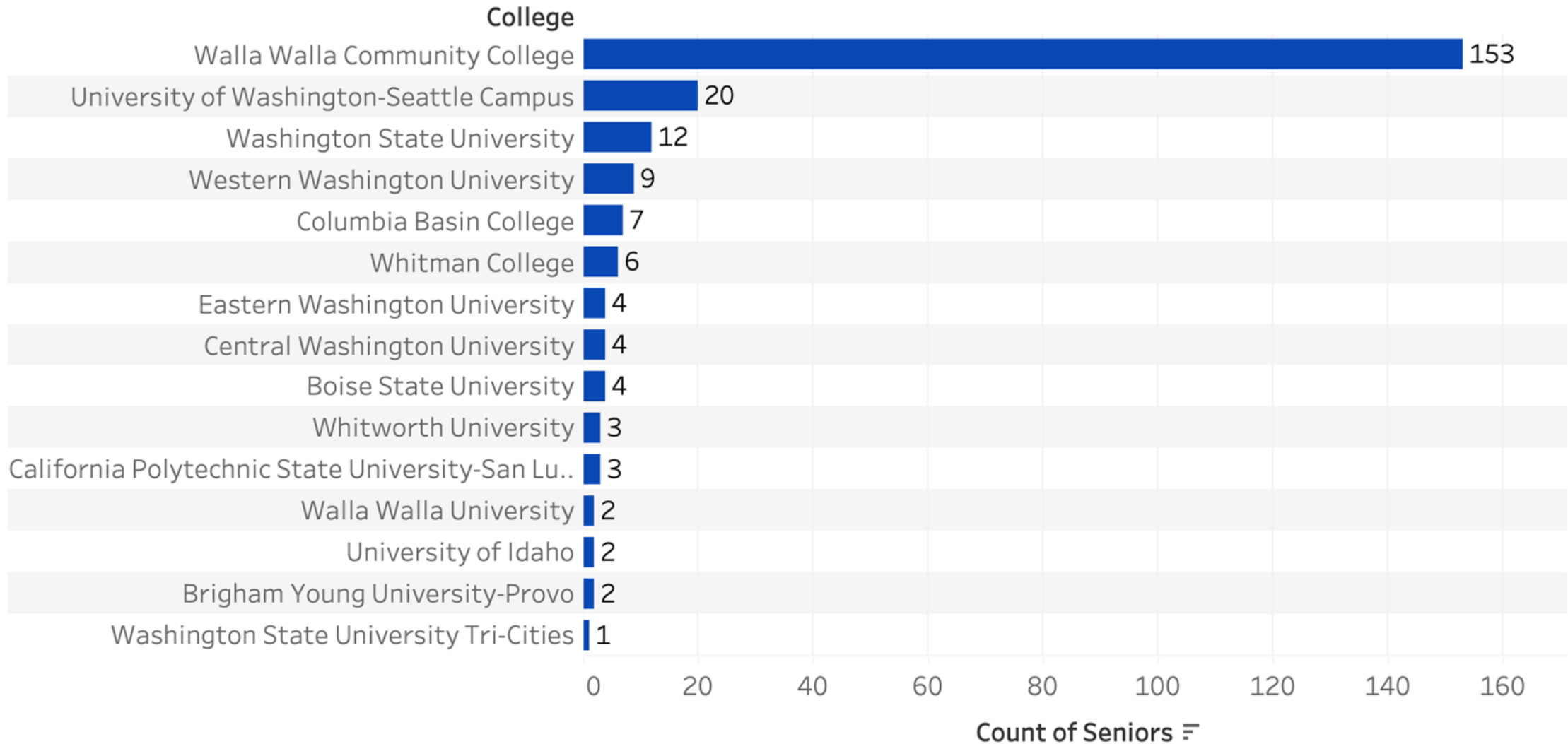

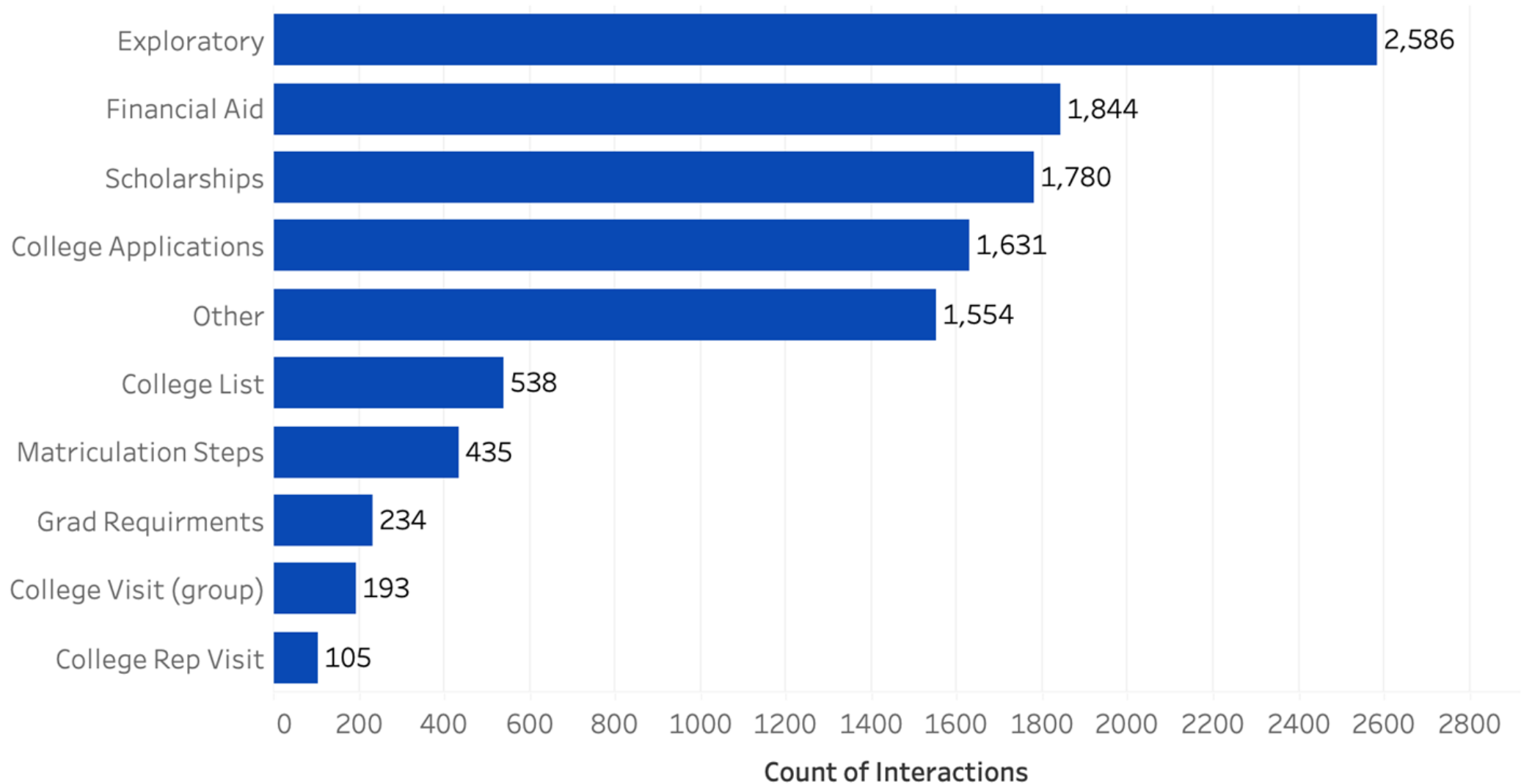
# Count of Seniors Intending to Enroll by College (Top 15 Colleges by Selection Count)

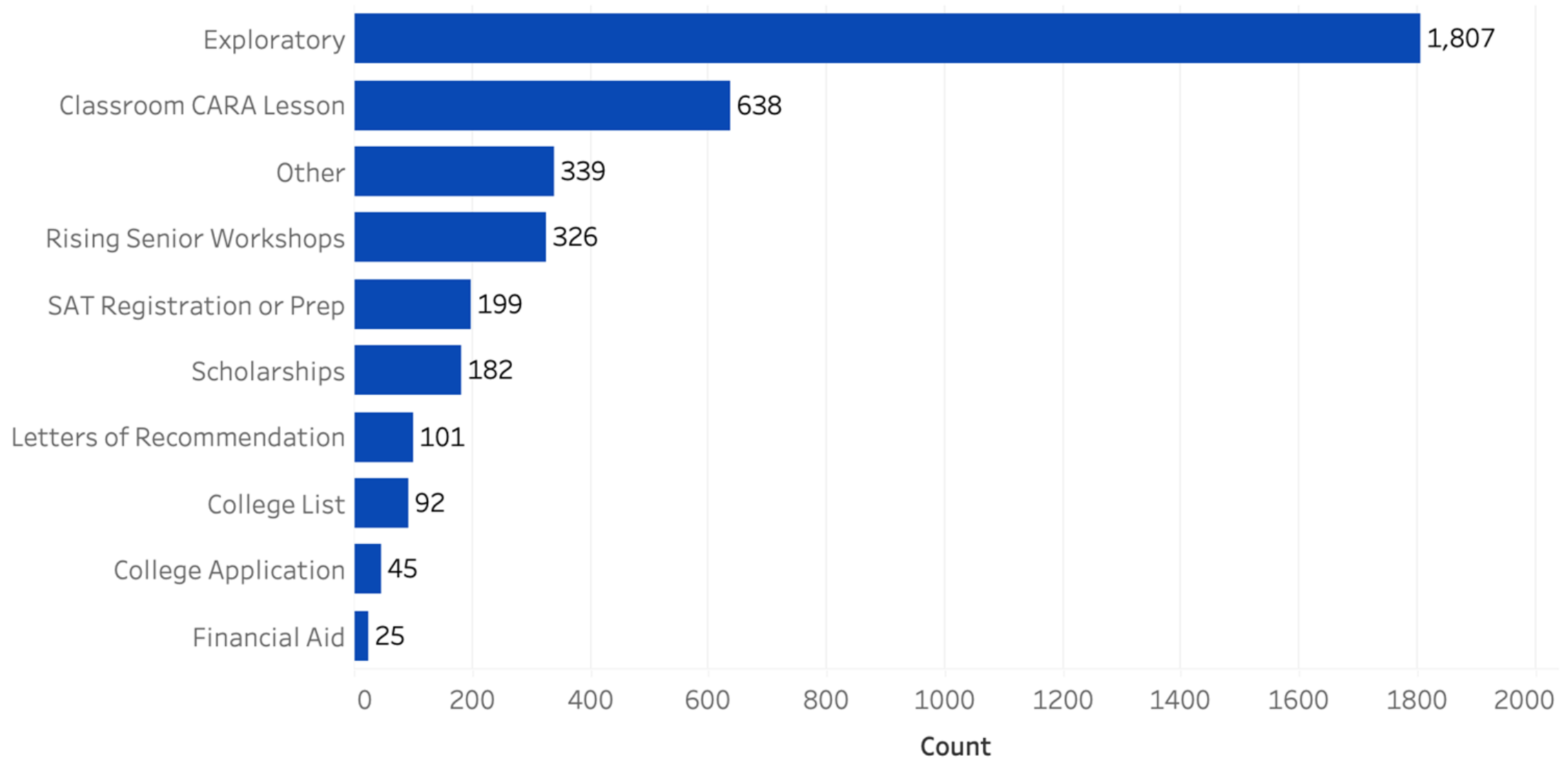
# Count of CCRA Interactions with Seniors by Purpose (Top 10 Purposes of Interaction)

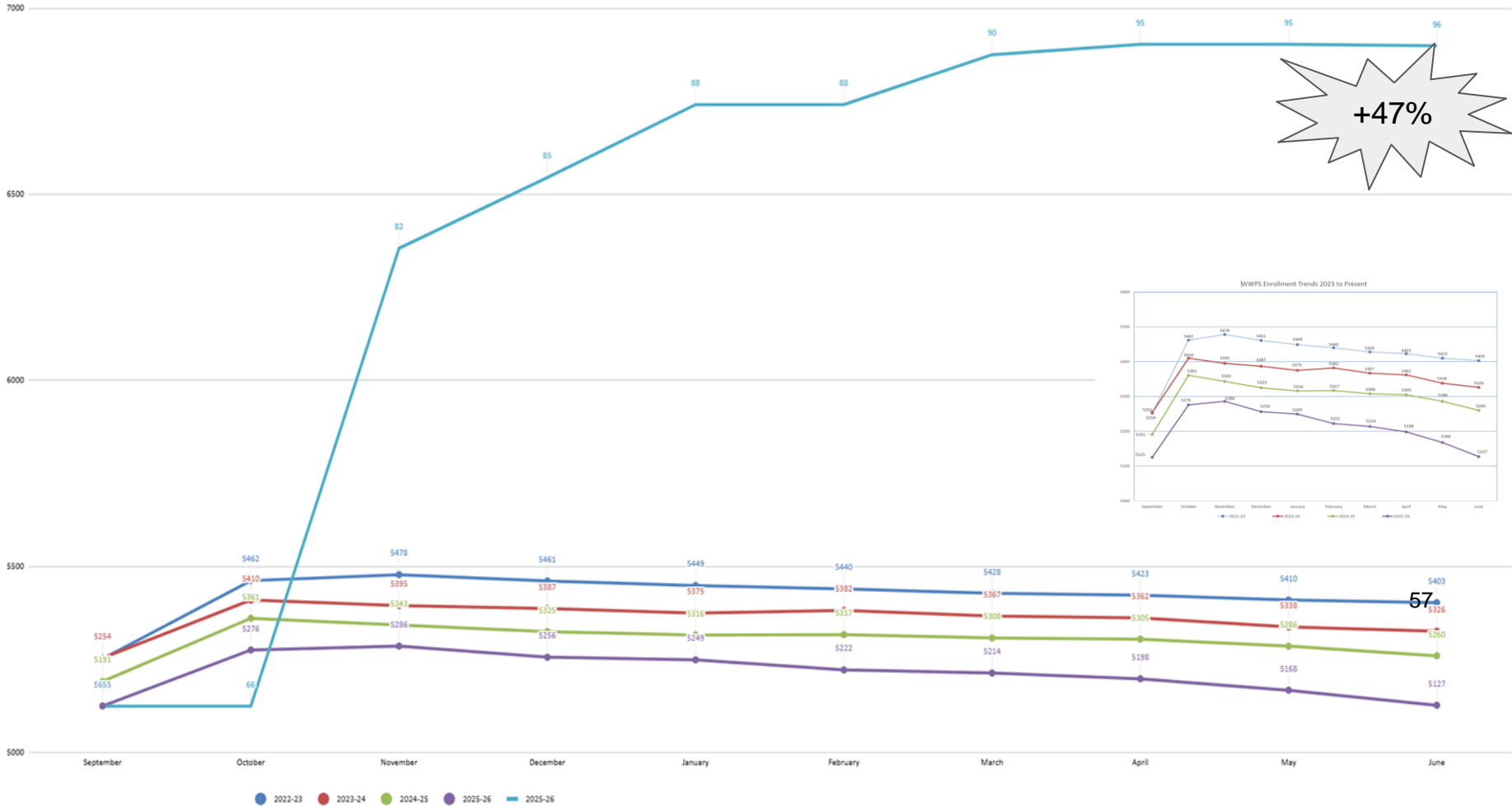
Walla Walla Online Graduation Rates



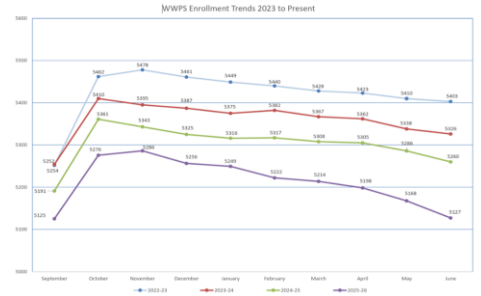
WWPS Enrollment Trends 2023 to Present



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### STUDENT DISCIPLINE

The board of the Walla Walla Public Schools focuses on the educational achievement of ~~each and~~ every student. The district holds high expectations for all students and ~~strives to provide~~ gives all students the opportunity to achieve personal and academic success. The board intends that this policy and procedure be implemented in a manner that supports a positive school climate, maximizes instructional time ~~as appropriate~~, and increases equitable educational opportunities.

#### **Rights and Responsibilities/District Commitment**

~~The board recognizes the negative and disproportionate impact of exclusionary discipline practices and is committed to:~~ The purposes of this policy and accompanying procedure include:

- Providing a safe and supportive learning environment for all students.
- Providing due process to students.
- Implementing culturally responsive discretionary and nondiscretionary ~~Identifying and addressing~~ discipline policies and ~~practices~~ procedures that ~~perpetuate educational~~ provide opportunity ~~gaps~~ for all students to achieve personal and academic success.
- Proactively implementing ~~Engaging~~ with school personnel, students, parents, families, and the community in decisions related to the development and implementation of discipline policies and procedures.
- Ensuring fairness and equity in the administration of discretionary and nondiscretionary discipline.
- -Administering discretionary discipline in ways ~~practices~~ that respond to the needs and strengths of students, support students in meeting behavioral expectations, and keep students in classrooms to the maximum extent possible.
- Providing necessary educational services needed to access their education without disruption for the excluded student.
- Facilitating collaboration between school personnel, students, parents, and families to support successful reentry into the classroom following a suspension or expulsion. ~~without losing access to instruction;~~

#### **Students' Fundamental Rights**

The district will observe students' fundamental rights and will administer discipline in a manner that does not:

1. Unlawfully discriminate against a student on the basis of sex, race, creed, ethnicity, religion, color, national origin, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, homelessness, immigration or citizenship status, the presence of any sensory, mental disability, physical disability, neurodivergence, or the use of a trained ~~dog guide or~~ service animal by a person with a disability;
2. Deprive a student of the student's constitutional right to freedom of speech and press, the constitutional right to peaceably assemble and to petition the government and its representatives

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for a redress of grievances, the constitutional right to the free exercise of religion and to have the student's school free from sectarian control or influence, subject to reasonable limitations upon the time, place, and manner of exercising the right;

3. Deprive a student of the student's constitutional right to be secure in the student's person, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures;
4. Unlawfully interfere in a student's pursuit of an education while in the custody of the school district; or
5. Deprive a student of the student's right to an equal educational opportunity, in whole or in part, by a school district without due process of law.

### Student Responsibilities

This district's student discipline policy and procedures ~~is~~ are designed to provide students ~~and staff~~ with a safe, healthy, and educationally sound environment. Students are expected to be aware of and comply with ~~this~~ the policy and procedure, including behavioral expectations that respect the rights, person, and property of others. Students are also expected to pursue the required course of studies. Students and staff are expected to work together to develop a positive climate for learning, consistent with Board Policy 3112 – Social Emotional Climate.

### Development and ~~review~~ Review

The district will collect data on disciplinary actions administered in each school, as required by RCW 28A.300.042, and any additional data required under other district policies and procedures.

~~The district will ensure that school principals confer with certificated building employees as appropriate to review building discipline standards and review the fidelity of their implementation.~~

~~School principals will strive to ensure that teachers and other school personnel receive adequate support to effectively implement a continuum of identified best practices and strategies that:~~

- ~~1. Focus on prevention to reduce the use of exclusionary discipline practices;~~
- ~~2. Allow the exercise of professional judgment and skill sets; and~~
- ~~3. May be adapted to individual student needs in a culturally responsive manner.~~

~~School principals will confer with certificated building employees as appropriate to establish criteria for when certificated employees must complete classes to improve classroom management skills.~~

~~The district~~ will develop and periodically review ~~and further develop this~~ a discretionary and nondiscretionary discipline policy and procedures with the participation of school personnel with representation from each employee group, students, parents, families, and the community. ~~As part of this~~ During the development and review ~~process~~, the district ~~will~~ must use disaggregated data collected under RCW 28A.300.042. ~~This process may include reviewing data to prevent and address discrimination against students in protected classes identified in chapters 28A.640 and 28A.642 RCW,~~

The district will annually provide this policy and procedure to all ~~District~~ **district** personnel, students, parents, and families, which may require language assistance for students and parents with limited-English proficiency under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The district will ensure district employees and contractors are knowledgeable of this student discipline policy and procedure.

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### INFECTIOUS DISEASES

In order to safeguard the school community from the spread of certain communicable diseases the superintendent shall implement procedures assuring that all school buildings are in compliance with Sstate Board of Hhealth rules and regulations regarding the presence of persons who have or have been exposed to infectious diseases deemed dangerous to the public health. Such procedures ~~shall will~~ also prescribe the ~~manner in which safeguards are taken~~ steps to remove the danger to others.

The district ~~shall will~~ require that the parents/~~or~~ guardian complete a medical history form at the beginning of each school year. The school nurse or director of health services may use ~~such reports~~ this information to advise the parent/guardian of the need for further medical attention and to plan for potential health problems in school.

The ~~board authorizes the~~ school principal ~~is authorized~~ to exclude a student who has been diagnosed by a ~~physician-licensed health care provider (LHP)~~ or is suspected of having an infectious disease in accordance with the regulations within the most current, Infectious Disease Control Guide for School Staff, provided by the Department of Health. (SPI, 3-1997). The principal ~~and/or director of health services shall~~ designated health services staff member will report the presence of any suspected case or cases of reportable communicable disease to the appropriate local health authority as required by the State Board of Health. ~~Such-~~ The district and its staff will treat all information concerning a student's present and past health condition ~~shall be treated~~ as confidential. The principal ~~shall will~~ cooperate with the local health officials in the investigation of the source of the disease.

The fact that a student has been tested for a sexually transmitted ~~disease~~ infection, the test result ~~itself~~, any information relating to the diagnosis or treatment of a sexually transmitted ~~disease~~ infection, and any information regarding drug or alcohol treatment for a student must be kept strictly confidential. If the district ~~has- receives authorization to release-~~ the information, the district may ~~be-~~ disclosed information pursuant to the restrictions in the release.

A school principal or designee has the authority to send an ill ~~child-student~~ home ~~with parent/guardian notification-~~ without the concurrence of the local health officer, but if the disease is reportable, the district must notify the local health officer. Walla Walla County Health Department must be notified. The local health officer is the primary resource in the identification and control of infectious disease in community and school. The local health officer, in consultation with the superintendent, can take whatever action deemed necessary to control or eliminate the spread of disease, including closing a school.-
