Superintendent Report for August 2021

Ken Schepers Donation

Mr. Schepers has been working with the Kearney Community Foundation to create a scholarship for Shelton students. We appreciate his generosity to our district. He is also willing to donate approximately \$20,000 to a project of the district's choice. He prefers academics and band over athletics. Mr. Schepers has provided the following ideas to start our thinking:

- Some piece of science equipment that would be useful in science education but would be too expensive without additional funding.
- Students in the band need practice instruments which may be unaffordable for a family. Perhaps the school could purchase a selection of decent quality instruments for loan to the students. If there is already a rental arrangement with a local music dealer, perhaps the school could pay or subsidize that rent.
- Perhaps the music department could use a new (or newer) piano.
- A 'greenhouse project' was spearheaded by the FFA several years ago. Perhaps that effort could use some additional funding.
- Computer equipment is very important in today's world. Perhaps new equipment for computer classrooms would be welcomed. If the school would like every student to have their own computer notebook, would additional funding enhance that effort?

CONTRACT

Educational Service Unit Number 10 (the "ESU") and Shelton Public Schools (the "District") (collectively, the "Parties") hereby enter into this Contract for the benefit of both Parties and to comply with applicable laws and regulations regarding Title 1A and other federal funds.

1. ESU's Support to the District. Due to changes in the interpretation and enforcement of certain federal funds, the ESU will no longer facilitate a Title 1A "Co-Op" for school districts within the ESU's service area. Instead, the ESU and District intend to contract for the ESU to assist the District with its obligations related to its Title 1A and other federal funds. As such, the ESU will continue to provide the same supports and assistance to the District as the ESU has historically provided, including the following:

- a. Assist the District with monitoring and reporting;
- b. Provide reasonable support of ESU staff members to assist the District with monitoring and reporting;
- c. Facilitate trainings for District staff to understand monitoring, reporting and other requirements;
- d. Coordinate timely communications and updates from the Nebraska Department of Education;
- e. Assist Districts with collecting, maintaining and reporting Time and Effort logs, Risk Assessments, A133 Audits, and the like;
- f. Make staff available for any monitoring visits that occur at the District;
- g. Other services or supports as agreed to by both Parties.

2. District's Payment to the ESU. In exchange for the ESU's supports, services and staff time, the District will pay to the ESU an administrative fee equal to 7% of allocated Title 1A funds. Such payment shall be made to the ESU by October 1, 2021. If the District fails to make such payment, then the ESU may, with or without notice, decline to provide the services and supports identified in this Contract.

3. Other Services. The Parties agree that this Contract is intended to be a guiding document, and not a detailed or itemized list of every service and support that the ESU will provide to the District. As such, the Parties agree to work together to identify what additional services and supports the ESU will provide to the District, and whether any such additional services and supports will necessitate an increased administrative fee to be paid by the District to the ESU. Both Parties agree that all such discussions will be conducted in good faith and in the best interests of both Parties.

4. Risk and Liability. Since the ESU will not operate the Title 1A "Co-Op" any longer, the District hereby expressly acknowledges and agrees that it will indemnify and hold harmless the ESU from any fine, penalty or other sanction related to the District's receipt, use, monitoring, or reporting of Title 1A or other federal funds. To the extent that the ESU incurs or has been advised that the ESU must pay any fine, penalty or other sanction related to the District's receipt, use, monitoring, or reporting of Title 1A or other federal funds, then the

District agrees to reimburse the ESU in the amount of such fine, penalty or sanction within 30 days of the ESU's payment of such fine, penalty or other sanction.

5. Termination. Either Party may immediately terminate this Contract upon written notice to the other Party.

6. Lawful Provisions. In the event that any provision of this Contract is deemed unlawful or contrary to any statute, regulation, or guidance by any applicable state or federal agency, such provision shall automatically be null and void but the remainder of this Contract shall remain in full force and effect.

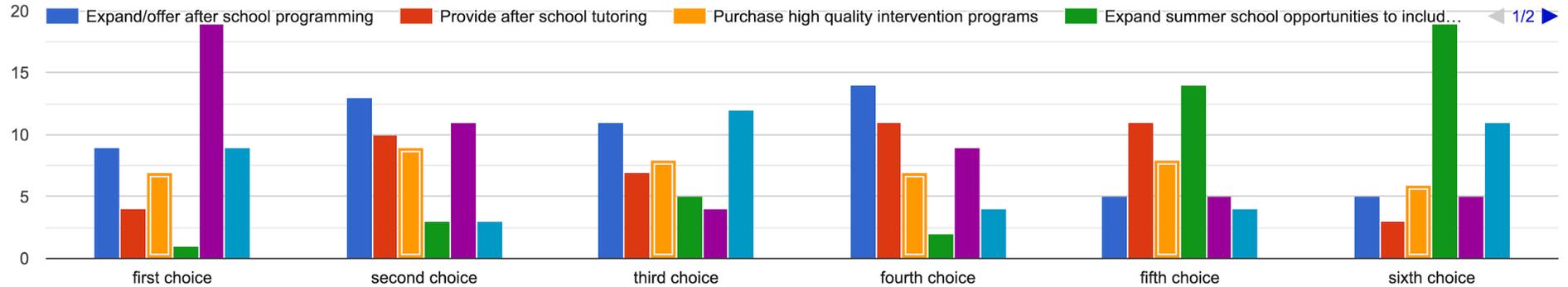

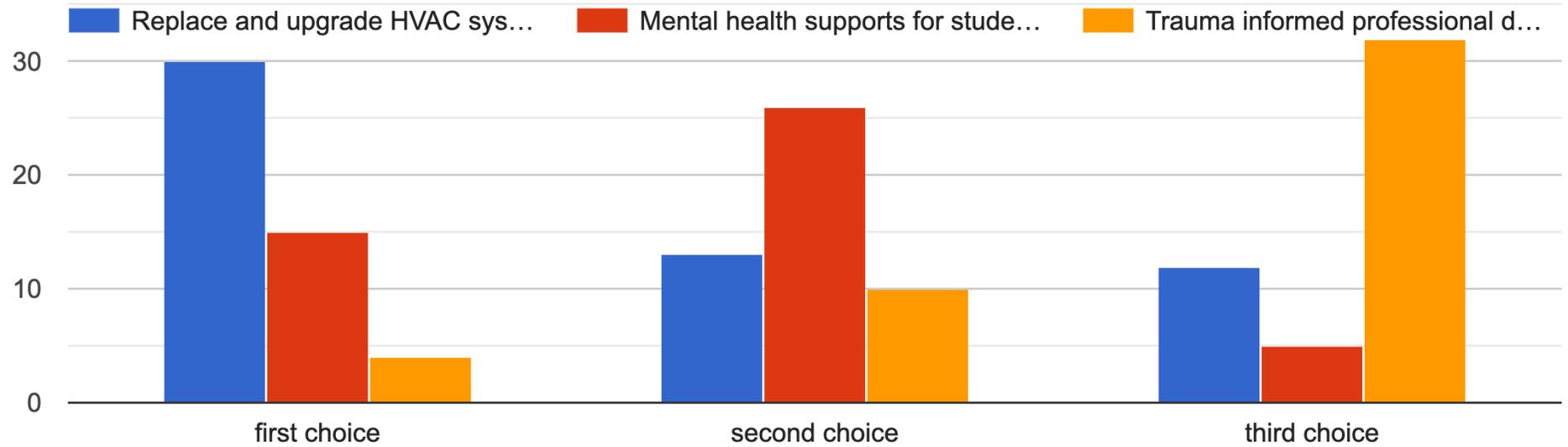

POLICY 4005: INCOME FROM SCHOOL SALES AND/OR SERVICES

The services provided through school shops, laboratories, or other programs and products may be offered for sale.

The instructor in charge of the particular program or shop with approval of the principal shall be responsible for setting prices or charges.

All money received from customers for such sales and for all sales and services shall be turned in each day to the school business office. This money will go into the appropriate activity revolving account for later use in the purchase of replacement parts. All purchases of materials, all refunds to customers and all financial procedures involved in the production of such products or services shall be underwritten through the appropriate activity account of the school. In no instance will employees of Shelton Public Schools use their personal accounts for purchase of parts or services for school programs.

No employee of Shelton Public Schools may utilize school repair programs or services for their own personal gain through immediate or later sale of the products, which have been improved as a result of such services.

POLICY 4006: BONDED EMPLOYEES AND OFFICERS

The treasurer shall give a bond or equivalent insurance coverage payable to the School District in such amount as required by law. The Board of Education may require that other school officials whose duties require the handling of funds be bonded or obtain insurance coverage including, but not limited to, the bookkeeper, activities director, Superintendent and cafeteria supervisor. The cost of such bonds or equivalent insurance coverage shall be paid by the School District.

POLICY 4007: FINANCIAL REPORTS AND STATEMENTS

The Board of Education shall receive monthly financial statements showing the financial condition of Shelton Public Schools as of the last day of the preceding month. Such statements will reflect obligations accrued as well as those already paid. Such other financial records as may be determined necessary by either the Board of Education or the administration shall be presented periodically.

The accounting system used shall conform with the requirements of the State Department of Education and with good accounting practices, providing for the appropriate separation of accounts, funds, and special monies.

The district administration shall also be responsible for pupil accounting and shall report enrollment and attendance as required in the State of Nebraska.

POLICY 4008: AUDITS

The board of education shall appoint a certified public accountant or public accounting firm to audit all school accounts annually and report to the board of education. The audit shall include all areas required by law and the rules of the Nebraska Department of Education. The auditor shall conduct the audit according to the generally accepted standards of the auditing profession.

POLICY 4009: GENERAL PURCHASING AND PROCUREMENT

I. Applicability of this policy.

Purchases made with federal funds, whether those funds are derived directly from the federal government (e.g. award of a federal grant) or are derived by pass-through awards from the Nebraska Department of Education (e.g. special education funds, school lunch funds, Title I funds) are subject to the policy on Purchasing and Procurement with Federal Funds, which is found elsewhere in this section.

This policy applies to all other purchases made by the school district other than construction, remodeling, repair and site improvements.

II. General Purchasing Policy

A. The school district's budget shall be the guide for all purchases. No employee of the district may make a purchase that is not provided for in the budget without board or administrative approval.

B. The board intends to purchase competitively, whenever possible, without prejudice and to seek maximum educational value for every dollar expended.

C. The acquisition of services, equipment and supplies shall be centralized in the administration office under the supervision of the superintendent of schools, who shall be responsible for developing and administering the purchasing program of the school district.

D. Purchases or commitments of district funds that are not authorized by this policy will be the responsibility of the person making the commitment.

III. Building-Specific Purchasing

A. School buildings are operationally under the control of building principals. Principals have control and responsibility for the building and grounds, for all supplies and equipment housed at the building, for all school-related activities in the building, and for all pupils, teachers, and other employees assigned to the building.

B. Principals, in consultation with their staff, are responsible for requisitioning, managing, distributing, and utilizing supplies within the building.

C. The superintendent of schools or his designee is responsible for the requisitioning, managing, distributing, and utilizing of supplies for maintenance and transportation.

D. The administration is responsible for purchasing of goods, services, and supplies and for providing the necessary forms for establishing efficient procedures to facilitate the process.

IV. Purchasing Procedures

A. School personnel must secure the approval of an authorized administrator before making any purchases.

B. Employees seeking reimbursement for a purchase made with their personal funds must attach an itemized receipt or invoice to all requests for reimbursement; must sign all purchase receipts or charge slips; and must submit itemized receipts and any purchasing card or credit card receipts to the office of the superintendent no later than one week prior to the next regular board meeting. A non-itemized credit card receipt is not sufficient.

C. Employees making purchases with a school district credit card or purchasing program must comply with the steps set forth in the district's Purchasing (Credit) Card Program.

D. All purchases of goods and services made with district funds must be made on a properly executed purchase order.

E. All purchases shall be initiated with a purchase order. Purchase orders are signed by the person responsible for that particular budget and finally by the superintendent.

F. For purchases of more than \$3,500, authorized staff members must secure written quotes and/or estimates from a reasonable number of vendors. Staff will purchase from a responsible vendor with the lowest price unless the board approves the purchase from the more expensive vendor.

V. Relations with Vendors

A. The board wishes to maintain good working relations with vendors who supply materials, supplies and services to the school system. The school shall not extend favoritism to any vendors. Each order shall be placed on the basis of quality, price and delivery, with past services being a factor if all other considerations are equal. The administrative team may, in its discretion, use a Nebraska a state-wide cooperative purchasing program in lieu of obtaining quotes or bids under this policy to the extent such a bid or quote is not otherwise independently required by law.

- B. No purchase shall be made that violates any conflict of interest policy or law.

- C. No employee shall endorse any product of any type or kind in such a manner as will identify him/her in any way as an employee of the school district.
- D. The board believes in patronizing local businesses. Consequently, when proposals are judged to be equal in terms of quality, price, and/or service, the contract or purchase will be awarded to the firm that is located within the district. However, the board will not sacrifice either quality or economy to patronize local businesses.

POLICY 4010: SCHOOL ACTIVITIES FUND

The superintendent of schools shall establish an activities fund account to be used to finance the operations of student organizations, inter-school athletics, and other school activities that are not a part of any other fund. All transactions related to the activities fund shall be conducted through an account at a board-approved depository.

The superintendent shall manage the activities fund and serve as its treasurer. The superintendent may divide the activities fund into more than one account to allocate portions of the fund for different purposes.

Funds in an activity's account after the activity ceases to exist shall be transferred to the general fund or such other fund as the board may choose. Funds left in a graduating class's account will be maintained for a period of six months for a class memorial. If they are not used within that time, they may be transferred upon board approval.

As school activities are a responsibility of the school district, any deficit in the activity fund shall be paid from the general fund.

POLICY 4011: PAYMENT PROCEDURES

Students or staff who come in direct contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 may wear a mask for 14 days in lieu of quarantine and self monitor for symptoms.

Diagnostic and Screening Testing

Shelton Public Schools will not provide or conduct testing for COVID-19.

Appropriate Accommodations For Children With Disabilities

Students' IEP teams will determine appropriate accommodations for students with disabilities and communicate those to the students' educational team as appropriate.

Efforts To Provide Vaccinations to School Communities

Shelton will work with local health departments to provide a location for health departments to administer COVID-19 vaccinations as well as use district communication platforms to share information regarding vaccine clinics to the school community. Students and staff will not be required to be vaccinated.

Coordination With State and Local Health Officials

Shelton Public Schools will work in cooperation with state and local health officials. The superintendent will attend webinars put on by the Governor, Education Commissioner, and Two Rivers Health Department to stay abreast of current information.

Ensuring Continuity of Services

Shelton will ensure continuity of services by providing in person instruction. The school calendar will continue to serve as a guide to indicate when school is in session. Students will be expected to attend school in-person on the days when school is in session unless they are home due to illness.

In addition, Shelton has purchased high quality instructional materials that offer virtual access for students who need to learn from home at any point during the school year. These high quality instructional materials also provide opportunities for acceleration to support students who may have gaps in their knowledge. All students will have equitable access to rigorous grade level content.

Beginning in the fall of the 2021-22 school year, 7th graders will complete a study skills course that not only supports their transition to secondary education, but also teaches them important skills for both in-person and virtual learning. The purpose of this course is to give students the necessary skills to be well organized, prepared to ask questions in class, study in effective ways, and have ownership of their progress and learning.

Students' health needs will be met by offering all students a free grab and go breakfast every morning, free lunches throughout the school year, as well as free meals offered during the summer months. In addition, students will receive guidance counseling services that support stress and anxiety management on a weekly basis by the school guidance counselor.

Staff emotional and mental health needs will be met through the district Employee Assistance Program (EAP), which offers up to five free sessions of various mental health services. Staff may access these services as needed throughout the year. Some of the services offered include counseling, stress and anxiety management, and holistic wellness services.

Public Comment Requirements

In July of 2021, a parent survey will be conducted to gather input on the return to school plan. The feedback to the survey was used to make adjustments to the return to school plan. Both the survey and any revisions to the back to school program will be documented and will be retained for future reference.

Uniform Format

Shelton ensures this plan is in an understandable and uniform format by using the template provided by the Nebraska Department of Education. This plan will be posted on the website in both English and Spanish to ensure that it is easy for all parents and students to access. Any parent who wishes to have the plan explained to them verbally may schedule a meeting with district administrators and a translator will be provided if needed.
