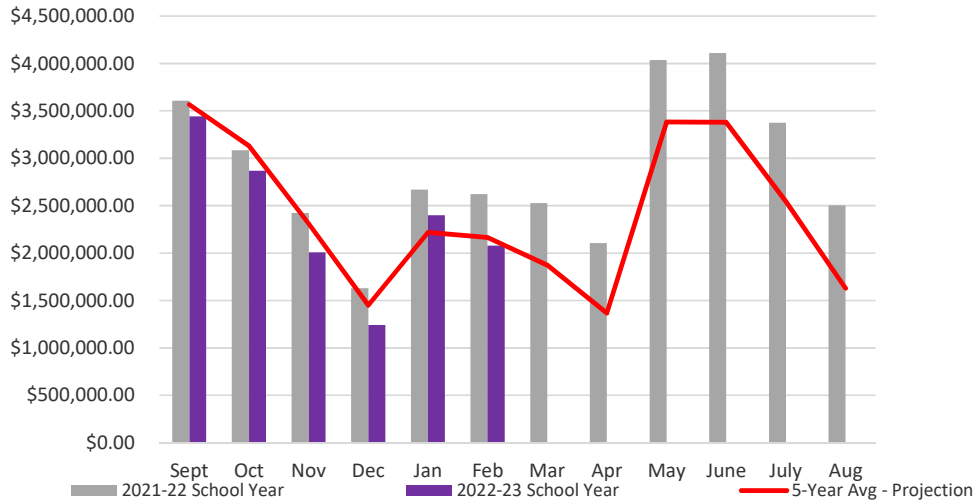

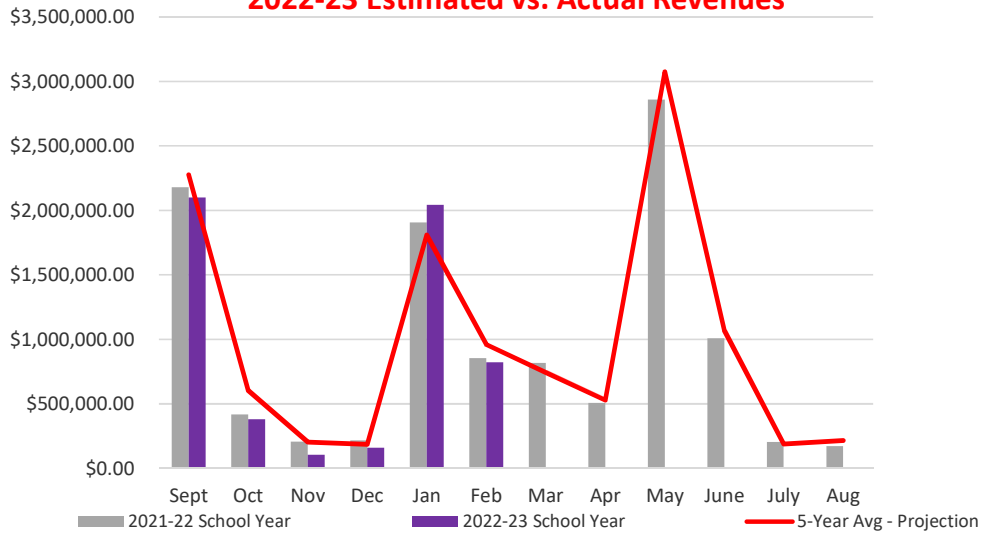

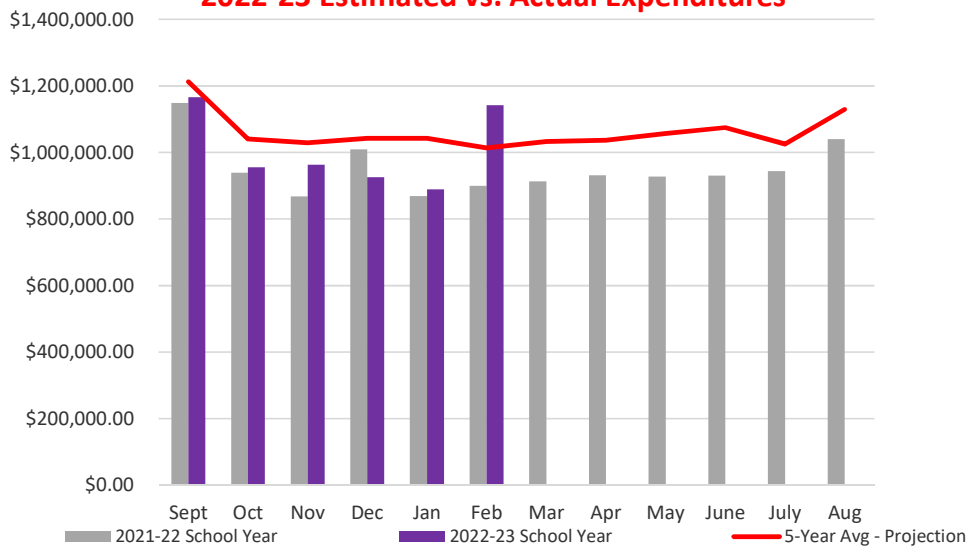
2022-23 Estimated vs. Actual General Fund Balance

Ms. Wippel's Agriculture Classes

Introduction to Ag, Large Animal Management, Plant Production, Vet Science, 8th Grade Ag, Wildlife Management

Introduction to Ag

This year in Introduction to Ag we have seen an increase in student enrollment. There are a total of 41 students enrolled in two sections. In the Fall semester, the students learned about the history of agriculture, biotechnology, FFA, and Food Science. This semester, the students are currently learning about animal science and will learn about plant science, followed by natural resources. This course is designed to allow students to explore the seven career pathways in agriculture to find the one they are most interested in.

Large Animal Management

As the agriculture program continues to grow there is a need for more courses. The Large Animal Management course was added as one of the Capstone courses for the Animal Science Career Pathway. In this course, the students will learn about large animal livestock production. At the beginning of the semester, the students discussed the differences between animal welfare and animal rights and learned about Temple Grandin's impact on the animal industry. Currently, they are learning about Swine Management Production and designing their own Swine Operations based on needs of a farmer in a given scenario. The students will learn about sheep/goat production, dairy, and beef production. Pictures below are of the students dissecting a baby lamb that was aborted by its mother. Hannah Donley brought it in and we were able to see the developmental stage of the fetus.



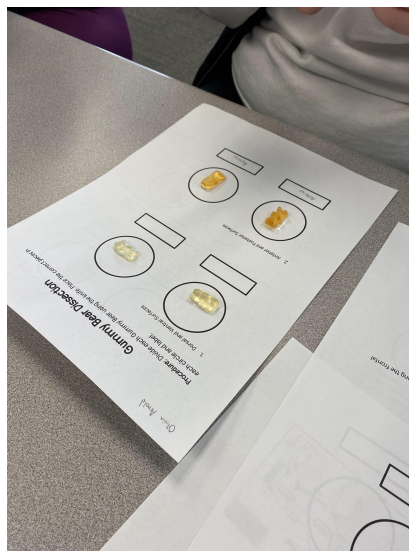
Plant Production

Plant Production is the Capstone course for Plant Science. During this semester, students will learn about specific areas of plant production. Currently, the students are learning about plant propagation and are gaining a lot of hands-on experience by propagating plants of all kinds in the classroom. The students were able to visit Joy's Floral and pick out the house plants to propagate. Next, students will learn about agronomy, landscape design, and floriculture. Pictures below are of a cactus that the students grafted and a lab where students learned multiple grafting techniques using twizzlers.



Vet Science

Vet Science is the second Capstone option for Animal Science. This is a new class this semester where students will learn about veterinary medicine. With this course, we are hoping to visit local vets and watch some operations and procedures. The students just completed the terminology unit and are starting the animal breed identification unit. Throughout the rest of the semester, they will learn a lot about anatomy, medicine, treatments for animals, and operational procedures. In the pictures below students learned directional terminology by dissecting gummy bears.



8th Grade Ag

Each quarter I get a new group of 8th-grade students. During the quarter the students will learn about what agriculture is and what an agriculturalist is. They will also learn about careers in agriculture, myths about the industry, commodities and by-products, and animals. The students currently are learning about animal products and where they are found in the world.

Wildlife Management

This course serves as the Capstone course for Natural Resources. During this course, students will learn about the history of wildlife management, flyways, fisheries, wildlife species, how to manage habitat, and hopefully visit local wildlife resources such as Rowe Sanctuary. So far this semester the students have learned about key people and historical movements that have helped the United States wildlife get where it is today, endangered species, and human impact on wildlife, and will be completing an Amazing Race Habitat game where they will race around the school building their own habitat while accomplishing tasks. Later in the semester, we hope to build wildlife habitats for the outdoor classroom and build fishing rods to go fishing with.

Social Science Department

Mr. Martin's American Government Classes

American Government classes just finished conducting moot courts in class. A moot court is a mock hearing of an appellate court, usually the US Supreme Court. In these hands-on activities, students played the roles of Supreme Court justices, attorneys, journalists, and courtroom sketch artists. The seniors developed and analyzed complex legal arguments which explore how Constitutional protections play a vital role in Americans' daily lives. Students will also be completing a series of mock trials in the next few weeks, the last of which will take place at the Kearney County courthouse. These trials allow students to better understand the trial process of both criminal and civil cases.

For the second year, Minden senior American Government students had the opportunity to take the class for dual college/HS credit through Wayne State College. This allows Minden students the opportunity to enter college already having three credits in political science at a substantially lower price than regular college credits. Last year 28 students took advantage of this opportunity, and this year 22 students are enrolled in the dual credit program.

On October 6 next fall, the Nebraska Supreme Court has chosen Minden High School to host an oral argument session for the Court as part of its school outreach program. The Court will hear arguments from lawyers in actual Nebraska cases. The justices will hold a question-and-answer session after the arguments to help students better understand how the appellate process works in Nebraska, as well as outline careers in the legal profession. Minden high school seniors and students from nearby schools will be invited to attend. This is a big honor and will be a fantastic opportunity for our students and community. Mrs. Wagner's Social Studies Classes

World Geography students are currently working through our unit about Europe. So far, students have learned the locations of physical and human features. They have also discussed aspects of the European population, culture, and history. As we continue the unit, we will discuss Russia's impact on modern world affairs, including the conflict in the Ukraine and its impact on the United States. Finally, students develop critical thinking and inquiry skills as they analyze environmental problems and solutions. As we reach the end of the school year, we will cover the Middle East, analyzing the importance of this region to the U.S. economy and evaluating important cultural differences.

In Sociology this semester, students have discussed cultural differences, norms, and deviance. They learned about how society labels, controls and punishes different types of deviance. To gain firsthand knowledge, they applied these concepts to complete their deviance project. For this project, students committed a minor deviant act (such as walking backwards to their destinations) and recorded how others around them reacted. This project allows students to experience and analyze the reasons behind social behaviors and norms. As the semester progresses, students will discuss social inequalities in the United States, including topics of socioeconomic stratification, race and ethnicity, and gender. Finally, we will discuss the importance of the family to society and how technology and social media impact our social behaviors.

Mr. Maulsby's American History Classes

American history classes are in the process of finishing up learning about World War II. Throughout World War II, students have demonstrated the ability to understand how dictators were able to rise into power after World War I, some of the early mistakes the League of Nations made in trying to slow down the building of the German army, and how victory was achieved by the allies in both Europe and Japan. We dove into some very important topics such as the Holocaust as well as many other atrocities (Pearl Harbor, The Rape of Nanking, The dropping of the atomic bombs, etc) that occurred during World War II. This allowed the students the opportunity to understand how leaders can use propaganda and the media to push their social issues and how people should make sure to educate themselves on past major events, so we can prevent those events from ever occurring again.

Once again, our students just completed their World War II battle podcasts. They did an outstanding job and created some very quality work. During their podcasts, students had to work together to describe many different parts of a battle of their choice including weapons, casualties, tactics, etc. They also gave valuable opinions throughout the podcast and came up with strategic advances that could have changed the outcome of the war. I am always amazed at all the new information I learn from their podcasts and some of the interesting facts they find while researching. I also enjoy their creativity in editing and podcast entertainment. Some of the recorded files sound like actual podcasts that I would consider subscribing to. Now onto the Cold War!



RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION IN KEARNEY COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT 0503 (MINDEN PUBLIC SCHOOLS) IN THE STATE OF NEBRASKA; AND RELATED MATTERS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF KEARNEY COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT 0503 (MINDEN PUBLIC SCHOOLS) IN THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

Section 1. The Board of Education (the “**Board**”) of Kearney County School District 0503 (Minden Public Schools) in the State of Nebraska (the “**District**”) hereby finds and determines as follows:

(a) The District is a duly organized school district under Nebraska law that maintains both elementary and high school grades under the direction of a single board of education.

(b) It is necessary that funds be provided for the purpose of paying the costs of construction and acquisition of a new elementary school building, site and public infrastructure improvements, modifications to the District’s existing buildings and facilities, and providing for the necessary furniture, equipment and apparatus for such buildings and facilities (collectively, the “**Project**”).

(c) To pay the costs of the Project, it will be necessary for the District to issue general obligation bonds of the District in an aggregate stated principal amount not to exceed Twenty-nine Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$29,500,000).

(d) No proposition for the issuance of bonds for any such purposes has been submitted to the electors of the District within six months preceding the date of the special election called by this Resolution.

Section 2. A special election (the “**Election**”) is hereby called and shall be held in the District on May 9, 2023, (the “**Election Date**”) at which Election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the District the following proposition (the “**Proposition**”):

“Shall Kearney County School District 0503 (Minden Public Schools) in the State of Nebraska issue its general obligation bonds in an aggregate stated principal amount not to exceed Twenty-nine Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$29,500,000), for the purpose of providing funds for: construction and acquisition of a new elementary school building, site and public infrastructure improvements, modifications to the District’s existing buildings and facilities, and providing for the necessary furniture, equipment and apparatus for such buildings and facilities; such bonds to be issued from time to time, to bear interest at a rate or rates, become due at such times, and be sold at such prices as determined at the direction of the Board of Education; and

“Shall the School District cause to be levied and collected annually a special levy of taxes against all the taxable property in the School District sufficient in rate and amount to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due?”

The ballots to be voted on and cast at the Election shall have printed thereon the foregoing Proposition, with the words “FOR such Bonds and tax” and “AGAINST such Bonds and tax” following the Proposition.

Qualified electors voting in favor of the Proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words “FOR such Bonds and tax” following the Proposition, and qualified electors voting against the Proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words “AGAINST such Bonds and tax” following the Proposition.

Section 3. Notice of the Election shall be published in *The Minden Courier* at least 42 days prior to the Election Date by the Election Commissioner of Kearney County, Nebraska (the “**Election Commissioner**”). Notice of the Election shall also be given to the qualified electors of the District 20 days prior to the Election and a copy of the sample ballot shall be published one time not more than ten days nor less than three days prior to the Election, or as otherwise provided by law, such notice and sample ballot to be published in *The Minden Courier*, a newspaper of general circulation in the District, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to cause such notice and sample ballot to be published.

Section 4. The Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to certify a copy of this Resolution not later than March 17, 2023 (which is the eighth Friday preceding May 9, 2023) to the Election Commissioner, who shall designate the polling places (if applicable), appoint the election officials and otherwise conduct the Election as provided by law. The District hereby agrees to reimburse the Election Commissioner for the expenses of conducting the Election.

Section 5. The form of ballot and form of notice for such bond election shall be in substantially the form attached to this Resolution as **Attachment I**, utilizing the appropriate provisions for an election held by mail or at polling places and with such other additions and changes determined appropriate by the Election Commissioner. The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed in conjunction with the Election Commissioner conducting the Election, to arrange for the printing of the necessary ballots for the Election and to do all other things and to take all other appropriate or necessary action in order to cause the Proposition to be submitted to the qualified electors of the District as above provided.

Section 6. Anything to the contrary herein notwithstanding, the President and Secretary of the Board are hereby authorized and directed to (a) cause the form of ballot and form of notice approved herein and attached hereto as **Attachment I** to be published in accordance with such laws, with such changes therein as the President or Secretary of the Board, in consultation with counsel to the District and bond counsel, deem necessary to conform to such laws, and (b) take all further actions necessary to comply with all publication and filing deadlines and other election procedures and requirements as may be necessary or proper to submit the Proposition described in **Section 2** hereof to the qualified electors of the District on the Election Date.

Section 7. This Resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage as provided by law.
