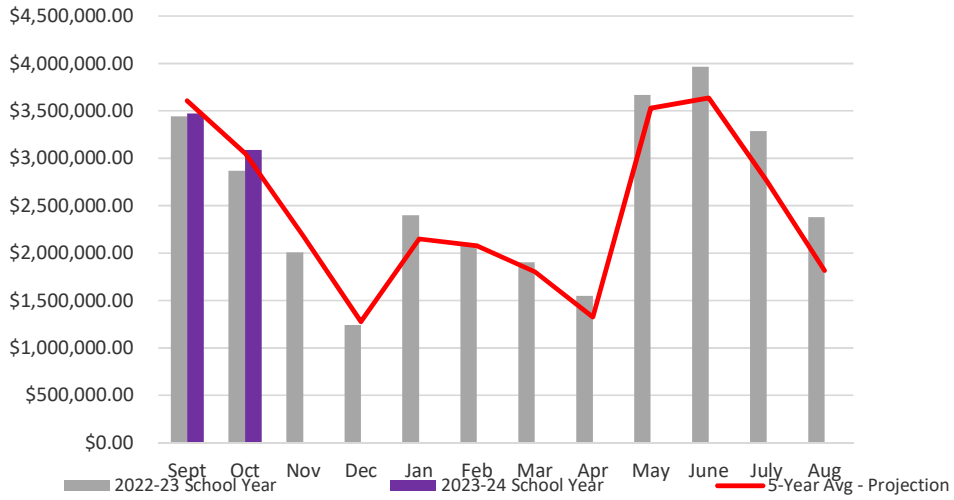

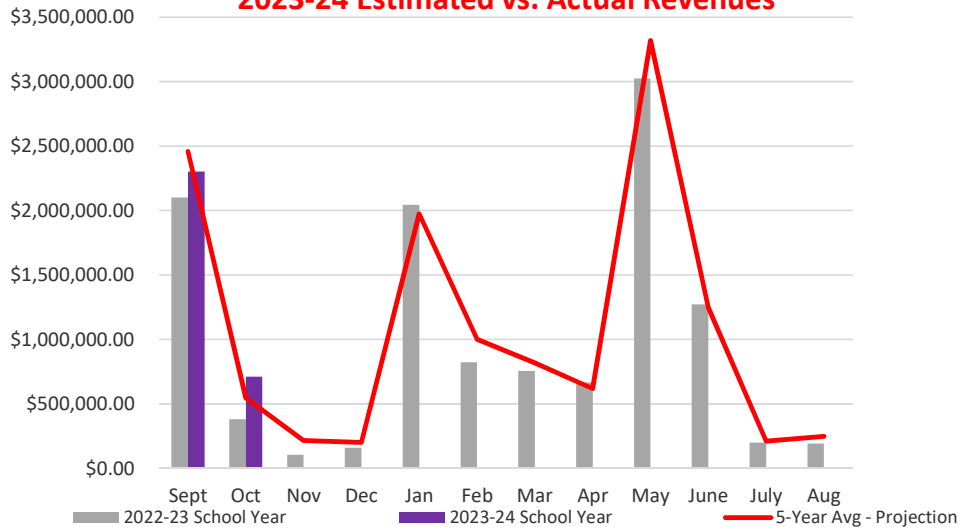

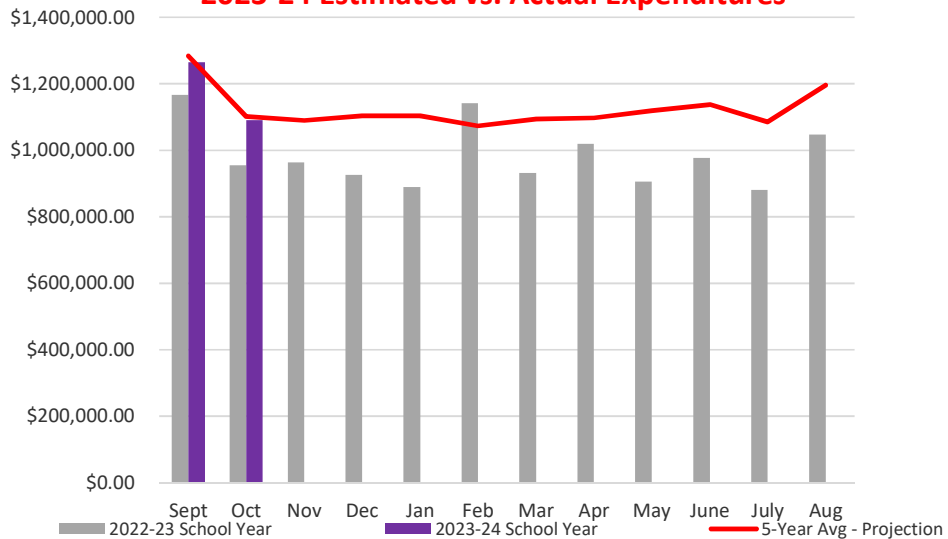
2023-24 Estimated vs. Actual General Fund Balance

Whippet Pack Families-

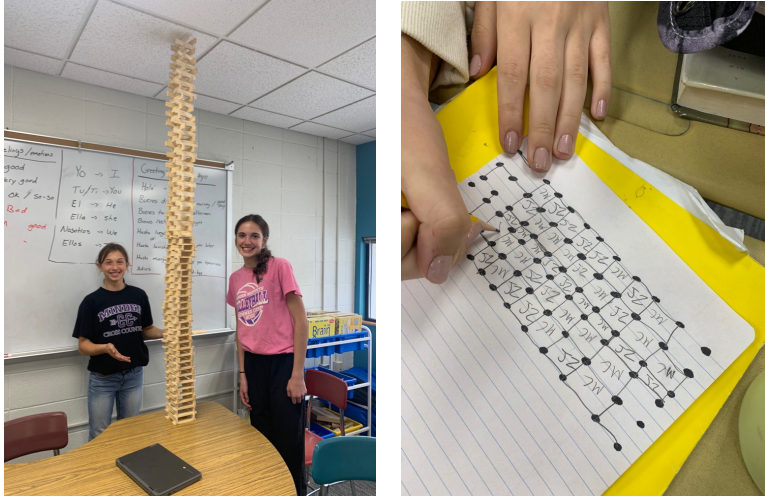
Our second CLJMS Whippet Pack Family meetings focused on the importance of teamwork and collaboration. Students stood on blankets and had to work together to flip a blanket over without anyone getting off of it (feet had to stay on the blankets). This activity aligned with our weekly Second Step social-emotional learning curriculum which highlighted the importance of establishing collaborative relationships to work together constructively towards a common goal.

Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Testing-

The NWEA MAP Test (Measures of Academic Progress) is an adaptive achievement/ growth test. It creates a personalized assessment by adapting to each student's learning level. If the student correctly answers a MAP question, the computer assessment provides a harder question next. If they miss that same question, then an easier MAP question is asked. This provides essential information about what your student knows and is ready to learn. Winter MAP testing for 4th through 8th-grade students will take place between December 4, 2023, through January 26, 2024. Students will be assessed in mathematics, reading, language usage, and science.

CLJMS Talent Pool-

Our Talent Pool students have been working hard on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) enrichment activities with Mrs. Emery. Talent Pool students meet with Mrs. Emery weekly to challenge their thinking and problem-solving skills. Students qualify for Talent Pool based on their Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment scores (95th percentile or higher).

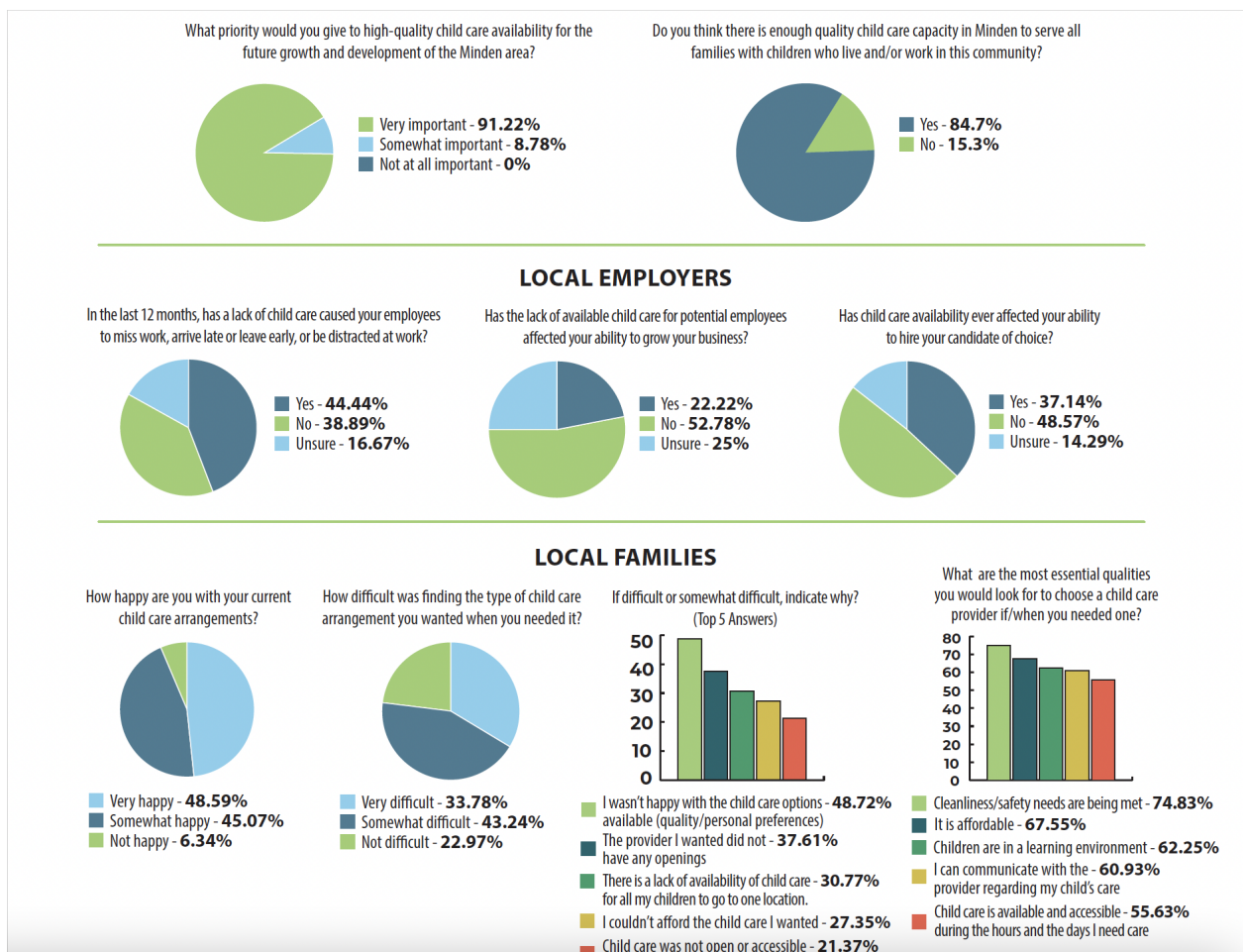
Early Childhood Update

The Community for Kids(C4K) initiative was created in response to community requests for assistance with shortages of high-quality early care and education programs—shortages that both impact children’s optimal development and pose a challenge for communities hoping to attract and retain the viable workforces they need to thrive. 1. Academic Excellence:

October was a month of academic accomplishments for our students. Our seniors are starting to make decisions on the colleges they will be attending and they are slowly getting started filling out a variety of scholarships that will be awarded this spring. We also administered the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) assessment to our 10th-grade students. This assessment will provide valuable insights into various vocational and educational opportunities for those students.

2. Athletic Triumphs:

Our fall sports teams have excelled on the field and court, with numerous victories and commendable sportsmanship displayed throughout the month. The Girls Golf Team achieved an impressive 2nd place at the Class C State Golf Meet, showcasing their dedication and skill. Additionally, the Girls Volleyball team emerged victorious at the Class C-1 State Volleyball Tournament against Kearney Catholic. A heartfelt appreciation goes to Head Volleyball Coach Julie Ratka and her assistant coaches for their hard work and commitment. We also extend our gratitude to the parents and families who provided unwavering support to the volleyball team throughout the season.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to our Athletic Director, Mr. Jason Strong, for his hard work and dedication during the fall sports season. His leadership has been instrumental in fostering a culture of excellence and sportsmanship within our athletic programs.

3. Cultural and Artistic Endeavors:

The arts community at the high school has been thriving. Our One-Act Play Team has been working hard to perfect their play at festivals in Ord and here in Minden. I am certain that Mr. Horner will have our kids fully prepared when the District One-Act Play Contest comes around at the end of this month. Additionally, Ms. Christman and our visual arts students have been showcasing some amazing artwork centered around Fall and Halloween. Please stop by the showcases outside Ms. Christman's room to look at the amazing work our art students are turning out.

4. Community Engagement:

October saw our students actively engaging with the community through various service initiatives including volunteers from our FBLA, FCCLA, and our FFA programs collecting 820 pounds of food for our local food bank.

As we move closer to the end of the first semester, I want to express my appreciation for the hard work and dedication exhibited by both our students and staff. The collaboration between teachers, parents, and students is vital in creating a successful school.

Thank you also for your continued dedication to the success of Minden Public Schools. I look forward to updating you on our progress in the coming months.

Minden 2023 ACT Scores:

The average ACT score for Nebraska students declined slightly in 2023, though officials say the state continues to rank higher than most states with high participation in the college entrance exam.

The state's composite score for 2023 was 19.2, down from 19.4 in 2022, and 20.0 in 2021, according to the Nebraska Department of Education.

Nationally, the average ACT score also declined, from 19.8 last year to 19.5 in 2023. The national average was 20.3 in 2021.

It was the sixth consecutive year of declines in average ACT scores nationally, according to Janet Godwin, the CEO of the American College Test (ACT).

The year 2022 marked the first time in three decades that the nationwide average score was below 20. The highest possible score on the ACT is 36.

The 2023 graduating class started high school when the COVID-19 pandemic first began, and disruptions in classroom instruction have been blamed for some of the decline in ACT scores.

Nebraska students lagged slightly behind national averages in specific subject areas.

One bright spot for Nebraska is that among the 15 states in which more than 90% of its students take the ACT, it ranked only behind two states, Utah (19.9 average score) and Wisconsin (19.4).

Nationwide, 37% of students take the ACT, while the rate in Nebraska is 96%.

States that test a higher percentage of graduates typically have lower ACT averages, according to David Jespersen, a spokesman for the Education Department, because that includes more students who are not seeking to go on to college.

Positive changes at the High School.

At the high school, we've observed a significant decline in the number of students qualifying for our Noon Study Hall. Traditionally, this resource has been available to those failing two or more classes on Monday mornings, or seniors struggling with a graduation-required course. Since its inception nearly 15 years ago, the introduction of the noon study hall has led to a remarkable 20%+ reduction in failing classes.

Notably, in previous years, a substantial number of 9th-grade students found themselves in the Noon Study Hall during the first semester. However, this year has seen a noteworthy decrease in the number of 9th graders qualifying. We attribute these positive changes to the dedicated efforts of Mrs. Jensen and her staff. Over the past few years, they have diligently worked to elevate academic standards at C.L Jones MS.

Key changes implemented include:

1. Structuring tiered math classes (7th-grade math, 7th-grade pre-algebra, 8th-grade math, 8th-grade pre-algebra, 8th-grade algebra).
2. Redefining grading procedures, notably abolishing the "No Zero" policy.
3. Shifting the Focused Academic Study Time (FAST) for students struggling with failing grades from the 8th period to the lunch period.

We express our gratitude for the positive transformations brought about by Mrs. Jensen, her staff, and the middle school students. Their collective efforts have significantly contributed to the improvement of academic performance."

Northeast Community College Visit -Mr. Horner

Students from Minden attended the Hawk Day at Northeast Community College on Wednesday, October 11. Students heard about programs at Northeast, were able to tour the campus, and then ate lunch in the cafeteria. It was a great day to find out what Northeast Community College has to offer students.





Latino/Hispanic Summit -Mr. Horner

Students from Minden High School recently attended the Latino/Hispanic Leadership Summit at Central Community College in Columbus. Students listened to a motivational keynote speaker and were able to attend sessions about college funding, specific colleges available in Nebraska, and a wide variety of inspirational topics. Over 800 students from across the state attended the conference which is held each fall in Columbus.



Junior English -Miss Oberg

This year's juniors are academically enthusiastic which has made it very enjoyable to teach them. Not only have they done the work because I have asked them to, but they have really embraced the concepts I have presented. The longer I have taught, the more I have realized what is actually worth valuing versus what is either just fun without purpose or is simply an academic exercise. Recognizing this difference has driven my decision-making about how I have approached teaching novels and writing. I have incorporated more group discussions and have learned to teach everything as a process rather than individual skill sets. It's honestly revolutionized my enthusiasm for teaching.

One of the best moments this year was when I finished reading the last chapter of *Of Mice and Men* to the class. When we got to the worst moment of the book, which was unexpected, all of the students looked up at me at the same time with looks in their eyes that seemed to say, "What just happened?" That engagement is what makes teaching worthwhile.

Students have focused on learning and then applying the three steps to critical thinking. As they understand the basics, analyze the material, and draw conclusions about a variety of writing passages (from poetry to nonfiction articles to novels), the students are establishing the foundation through verbal and written forms of how to express each of the three steps. We have been implementing a new activity each week, and the variety of approaches has empowered the students to strengthen those critical thinking skills with enthusiasm.

Over the past several years, I have implemented vital Marzano strategies that have really made a difference: creating analogies, incorporating movement, focusing on different discussion techniques, and fostering a specific classroom atmosphere. These strategies have helped me be intentional as I structure my lessons. I have included some pictures from different moments in the class. In addition, we have focused on the decision-making process with the characters in our novels and how the characters respond to their experiences. We have analyzed the power of making decisions based on the vision of who the character hopes to be.

Students have also been working on formal writing techniques through paragraphs and essays. Our goal this year is to help the students gain confidence and competence in a variety of writing forms while developing a personal style. See the following list for the topics: song analysis (start of year) informal writing, *Gatsby and Of Mice and Men*--formal writing--start with enumeration, then clarification, then body paragraphs, finally an essay at the end, Analogy--compare themselves to an item, personality quiz (strengths and weaknesses) formal writing--body paragraphs, what we keep (about an object that they have kept and to which they assign meaning)--formal writing--personal essay, person who has influenced them--formal writing--personal essay, quote with which they agree and one with which they disagree--formal writing--body paragraph, *Othello/The Essay*--formal writing--start with clarification, then body paragraphs, finally an essay at the end, various persuasive topics for ACT--formal writing--essay, childhood place (what places makes them feel most like themselves)--formal writing--personal essay, junior year lessons (what three lessons have been learned or what world event has affected the junior year)--formal personal essay, and practice college scholarship/job essays (topics vary but usually what obstacle have you overcome and what activity has shaped you)--formal personal essay

One of the best adjustments in junior English has been the change in independent reading. The students have had the opportunity to choose to read many new fiction books through a strong collaboration with the media center and a curated classroom library. Students have been selecting their independent reading from the books in the library for the last several years, which has worked well. One of my personal goals for the classroom is to foster a passion for reading. I believe that many students have rediscovered an interest in reading as a result of independent reading and from the accessibility of the collection of books in my classroom. I have found that about 85-90 percent of the students are reading the books (compared to 30-40 percent in the past) and are enjoying reading and talking about what they are reading with their peers.

After this report, I will most likely only write two more until I retire. I am embracing every joy and opportunity of being in the classroom. I am so thankful that my life path has involved teaching at Minden High School. The students are truly amazing.







General English 12, English 12, and English 9-Mr. Gracey

The goal of General English 12 is to practice and develop practical English skills for life after high school. To begin the year, the class began by reading short stories. The goal of reading these stories is to explore literary elements and literary forms. With these stories, I facilitated discussions and various perspectives while also having students respond to prompts by composing paragraphs in an array of different strategies. Now, GE12 is reading a book called *Night* by Elie Wiesel where students are practicing reading accountability and practice as they are studying the literary voice of the text. Students are writing various paragraphs that respond to prompts. In addition to reading, students take part in a Daily Oral Language activity to practice grammar for writing techniques. Also, each week students are given a list of vocabulary words and are required to be able to incorporate the words into language by the end of the week.

For English 12, the goal is to practice and learn complex reading and writing strategies for college. We kick-started the year by reading "The Body Snatcher" by Robert Louis Stevenson, which is a Victorian short story in which students were able to study some historical contexts. Moving forward, the class read *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde*. Along with that we dove into complex literature and used critical thinking strategies to delve into themes relating to the late 1800s in both the realms of Victorian and Gothic Literature. Currently, the class is developing research strategies to compose a research paper about a problem in society. MLA Format and an argumentative voice are two achievement goals for the students.

As for English 9, a main goal is to teach and train automatic reading strategies. Students are about to finish *Fahrenheit 451*, by Ray Bradbury, which is challenging literature for students to analyze. They are discussing and writing paragraphs that pertain to the literature. To begin class each day students practice the bell ringer called Daily Oral Language. (DOL) requires learners to orally speak, hear, and write down correct sentences. Also, students are given a weekly vocabulary list where they are quizzed each week and required to put each word to use.

MIDDLE SCHOOL ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL/ATHLETIC DIRECTOR REPORT**

In the past month our fall sport seasons ended so coaches were asked to fill out end of the season reports that provide information such as participants names, inventory, missing equipment, schedule results, equipment needs for next season, summary of the season, and ways to help the program improve. The middle school is now in the process of transitioning to second quarter sports which means our girls are playing basketball and our boys are wrestling. We host 6 girls basketball games for both the 7th and 8th grade teams and we host one wrestling quad. At this time we have 10 girls in 7th grade basketball and 22 girls on the 8th grade girls team. We have 17 wrestlers on our 7th-8th grade boys team.

Our school system partnered with Ecell Sports this school to help with professional development both in teaching and coaching. In early September our middle school athletes took 10-15 minutes during their first period filling out a survey/questionnaire for their coaches. I have looked through each of the surveys for the 12 coaches we surveyed and have met with a couple of them celebrating their strengths and asked them to focus on two areas they can improve on for next season.

Observing teachers and meeting with them to celebrate their strengths and look for areas of improvement has been an important part of this past month. I am very impressed with the dedication our teachers show and their love for their students. I have enjoyed being in their classrooms and watching them in their craft. The process is helpful to give ideas for improvement and use strengths one teacher has to complement another teacher.

October 27th Mr. Horner and I attended Safety Response to Protocol inservice in North Platte. The inservice was to update and or revise your school safety response to protocol plan that is currently in place. We heard a lot of good information and feel we have a lot of good practices in place at this point. The area we feel our district needs to work on is reunification after an incident. Reunification is defined as a critical aspect of crisis response by reunifying students with their parents or guardians in event an unexpected release is necessary. The SRP reunification method provides school and district safety teams, public safety, and emergency managers proven methods for planning, practicing, and achieving a successful reunification. Each building will spend time looking at their particular building plans during professional development this quarter.

I am very proud of our volleyball team, school personnel, community, and alumni around the country for the championship that was earned and the support throughout the tournament getting the job done!

The Cross Country team had a total of eight qualifiers for the state meet in Kearney and performed well. The Girls Golf Team finished as the State Runner Up for the second consecutive year nearly 50 strokes ahead of the 3rd place team! The Football Team finished the season with a great win over Cozad to finish at 5-4 which is a winning record for the second consecutive season.
