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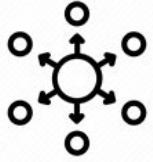

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Assessment Update**

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2020-21 Assessment

Action Taken:

- The **Kindergarten Assessment** suspended
- The **Essential Skills** Oregon Diploma requirement suspended for the class of 2021 (*was also suspended for the class of 2020*)
- The **Local Performance Assessment** requirement for grades 3 - 8 and high school is waived (*first read in October, possible adoption in January or February*)
- Requirement for districts to make a **Nationally Normed College Entrance Practice Assessment** available is waived (*first read in October, possible adoption in January or February*)

Planned Action:

- Request a waiver to the U.S. Department of Education to suspend the ESSA requirement for statewide **Summative Assessments** for the 2020-21 school year

Why update metrics?

Improve support systems for children. *Returning to in-person instruction is one of Oregon's highest priorities.*

New data is available. *ODE & OHA initially created metrics for returning to in-person instruction in early August.*

COVID-19 spread can be mitigated in schools. *Oregon's Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance can help reduce, but not eliminate this risk.*

A Measured, Intentional Approach

In returning to in-person instruction, Governor Brown, ODE, and OHA are focused on:

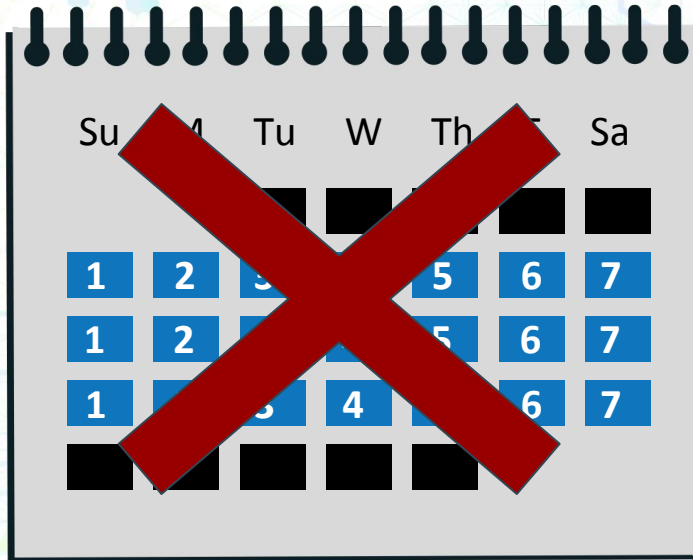
1. Ensuring our schools are ready to implement all the public health protocols with fidelity
2. Providing metrics that allow for in-person instruction at reduced levels of risk
3. Making clear how Oregonians in every county across the state can take the steps needed to meet these new metrics and allow our kids to return to in-person instruction

Top Changes

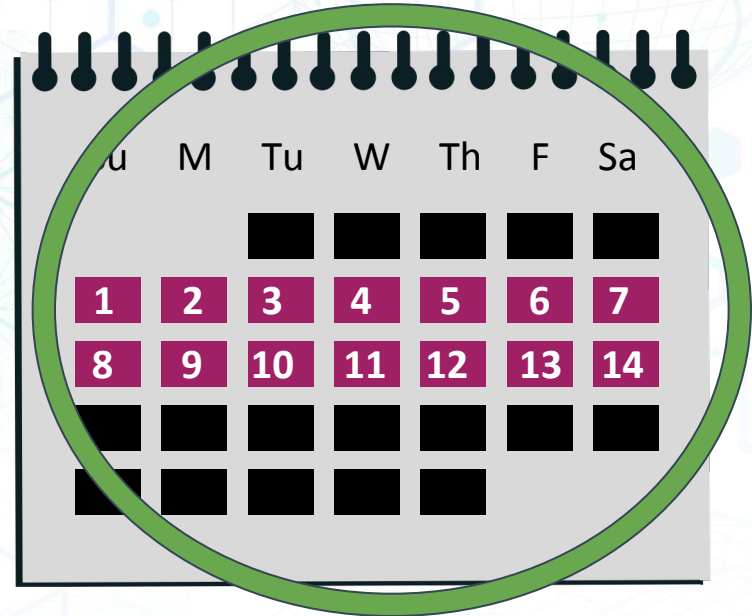
Metrics became effective Friday, October 30, 2020

- 1. Advances a new metrics framework with a move to a two week “Look Back” at the metrics data and removal of state positivity rate**
- 2. Incrementally increases access for in-person instruction beginning at the elementary level**
- 3. Maintains use of some exceptions, including a hold harmless clause**
- 4. Extends implementation windows and advises use of an equity decision tool**
- 5. Limited In-Person Instruction: Changes cohort size from 10 to 20, removes 250 absolute student limit**

Two-Week “Look Back” at Data





Before: Look at data 1 week at a time over a **3 week period**

General Metrics Overview

General Metrics - for returning to in-person instruction

For schools to fully return to in-person instruction the following must be met:

If >10% of students or >10% staff are from a county where case rates or test positivity puts them in the “Transition” column (on metrics table) they should consider delaying a return to in-person instruction until these counties also meet the required metrics, unless after discussion with the LPHA a collaborative decision is made that the neighboring county does not pose significantly higher-risk.

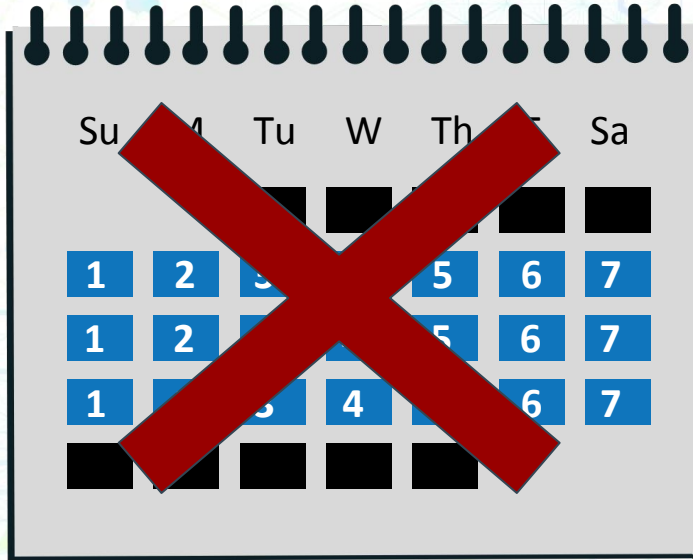

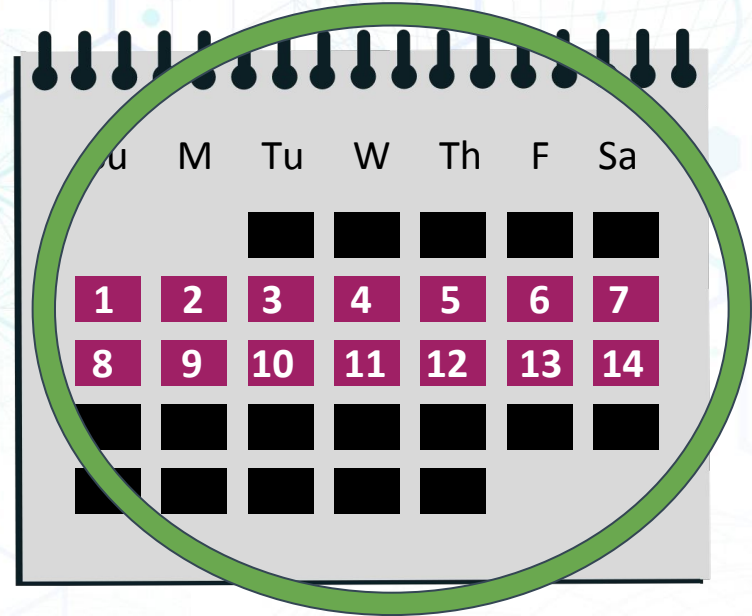
Operating with the General Metrics - Key Points

- Safe Harbor: Schools operating in-person under previous metrics, including exceptions, may *initially* continue to operate in-person.
- Apply an equity-based decision-tool
- Updating Operational Blueprints and weekly status updates to reflect current instructional model.
- Longer window to transition to Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL)
- Schools have a 14-day window to open from the date the metrics are met.

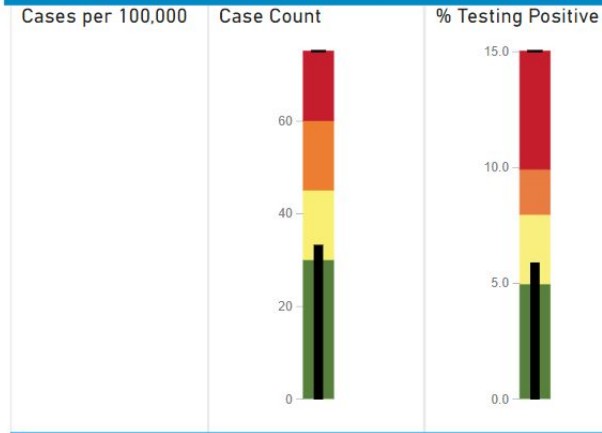

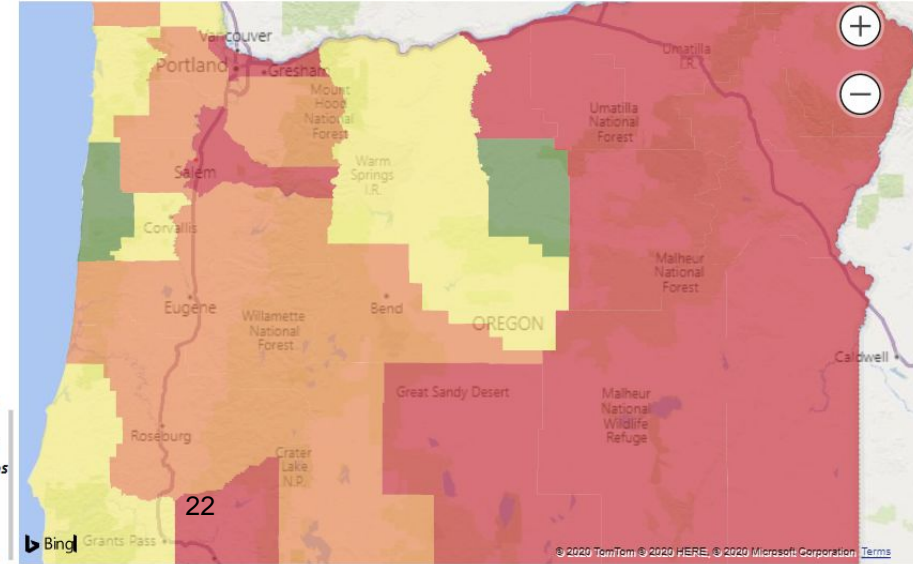

14 Day Window Clarity

“Opening within a 14-day Window from the Time the Metrics are Met - New metrics data are released each Monday. Once metrics are met, schools may work within a 14-day (two week) opening window during which they can move toward implementing in-person instruction. This will support district planning, family communication, and a more gradual—rather than rushed— opening.”

Designed To:

- Prevent districts from having to rush into opening decisions.
- Allow districts time to communicate, plan for in-person instruction, and train staff on protocols.

Not Designed To:

- Look back to previous data releases for more favorable data that no longer reflects current COVID-19 impacts.

Exceptions to the General Metrics

The following exceptions are allowable to schools who meet the criteria outlined:

1. Limited In-Person Instruction for specific student groups
2. Small Remote Schools
3. Low Population Density, Large Population County
4. Emergency Waiver for In-Person Instruction at Schools Impacted by Wildfires

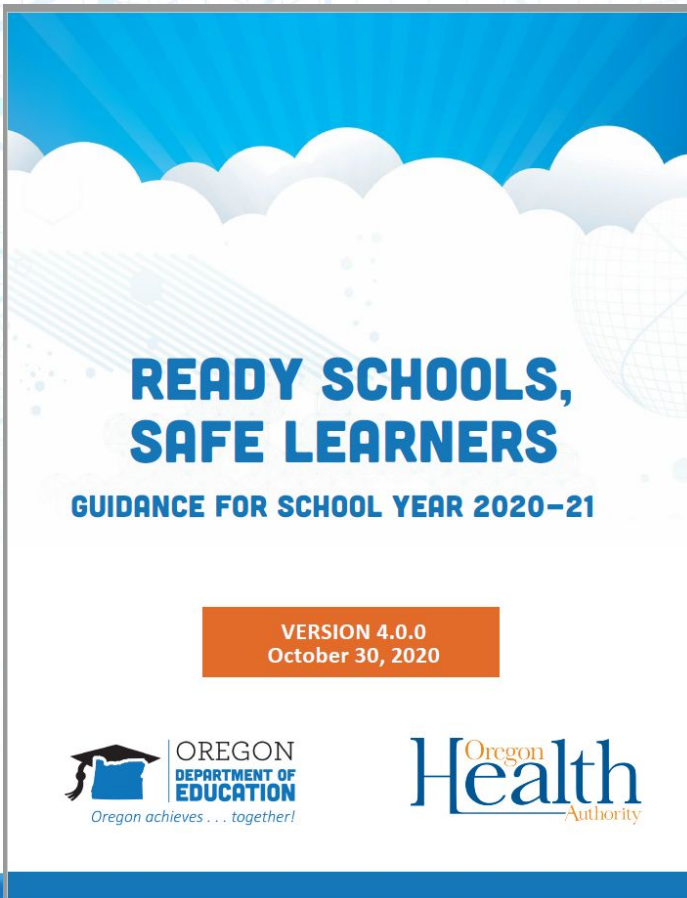

Clarification on Face Coverings

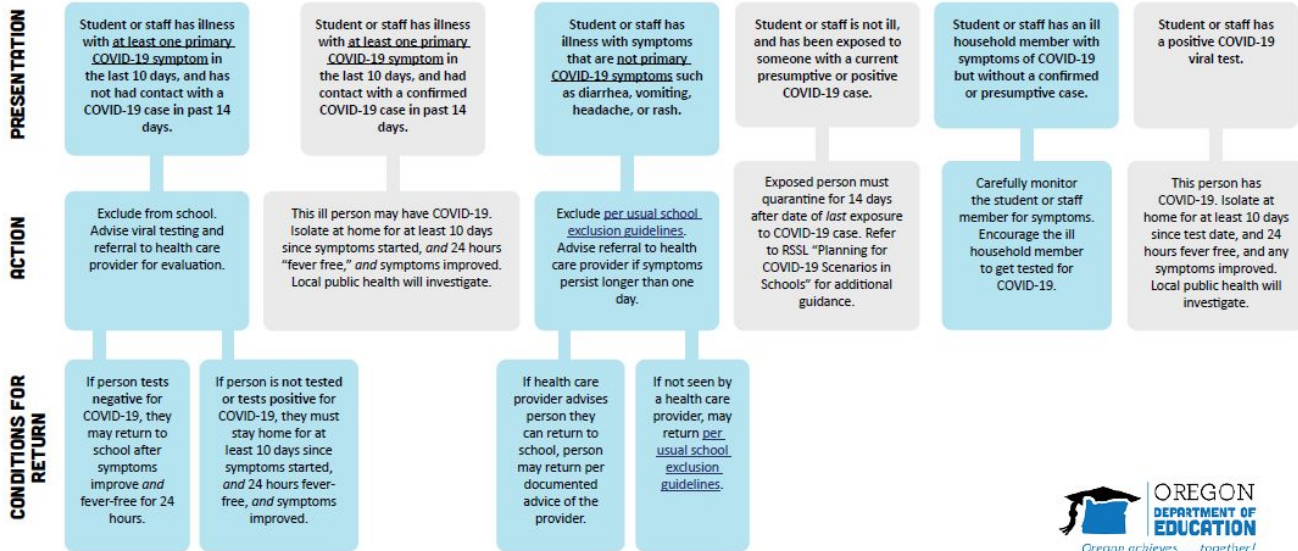


- Wearing a face shield alone without a face covering increases the potential for transmission of viruses to those in the same.
- Face shields are an acceptable alternative only when a person has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a face covering or when people need to see mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate.
- **Two-ply gaiters?** OHA definition: “Face covering” means a cloth, polypropylene, paper or other face covering that covers the nose and the mouth and that rests snugly above the nose, below the mouth, and on the sides of the face

An exposure is defined as an individual who has close contact (less than 6 feet) for longer than 15 *cumulative* minutes *in a day* with a *person who has* COVID-19 case.

COVID-19 EXCLUSION SUMMARY GUIDANCE FOR K-12 SCHOOLS

Version 10/28/2020



Primary COVID-19 symptoms include the following:

- Fever of 100.4°F or higher
- Chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Difficulty breathing
- New loss of taste or loss of smell

IMPORTANT DEFINITIONS

Fever free means a temperature less than 100.4°F without the use of fever-reducing medication.

Presumptive case means a person who was exposed to a positive COVID-19 case and has developed symptoms.

Quarantine separates and restricts the movement of people who were exposed to a contagious disease to see if they become sick.

Isolation separates a sick person with a contagious disease from people who are not sick.

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Two-Week Freeze

- The Governor's announcement today reflects critical measures needed to save lives and flatten the curve given rising cases of COVID-19 in communities throughout the state.
- Since the Governor issued her previous "2 Week Pause" on social activities to slow the spread of COVID-19 in several of our counties, there has been an alarming spike in both cases and COVID-19 hospitalizations. A majority of these cases stem from sporadic community spread.
- Hospitals are sounding the alarm. In the Portland metro area, hospitals are expecting an influx of COVID-19 patients. Several hospitals have voluntarily halted some elective surgeries to preserve beds and staff capacity.
- We are in a very dangerous situation. Daily case rates are topping 1,000 now. The dreaded winter surge is here.

K-12 Schools Not Directly Impacted by the Two-Week Freeze

Congregate homeless sheltering, Youth Programs, Childcare, **K12 Schools**, **K12 Sports**, D1 Athletics and Higher Education **operate under sector specific guidance for all risk levels.**

Oregon, California & Washington Issue Travel Advisories

The incidence of COVID-19 is increasing in many states and countries. Persons arriving in Oregon from other states or Oregonians returning from other states or countries could increase the risk of COVID-19 spread. In addition, travel itself can be a risk for exposure to COVID-19, particularly travel through shared conveyance such as air, bus or rail travel.

1. Persons arriving in Oregon from other states or countries, including returning Oregon residents, **should practice self-quarantine for 14 days after arrival. These persons should limit their interactions to their immediate household.** This recommendation does not apply to individuals who cross state or country borders for essential travel.

Non-essential travel includes: travel that is considered tourism or recreational in nature.

Essential travel includes: work and study, critical infrastructure support, economic services and supply chains, health, immediate medical care, and safety and security.

2. **Oregonians are encouraged to stay home or in their region and avoid non-essential travel to other states or countries.** Avoiding travel can reduce the risk³⁴ of virus transmission and bringing the virus back to Oregon.

Screening and Communication are Even More Critical

Schools Can Mitigate Spread From Travelers

- If you know families are traveling, be sure they are aware of the advisory.
- You can help support the 14-day quarantine.
- Schools may be unaware of student and staff travel. This makes entry and screening protocols ([RSSL Section 1f](#)) and the [Exclusion Guide](#) critical tools through the next several weeks.

COVID-19 EXCLUSION SUMMARY GUIDANCE FOR K-12 SCHOOLS

Version 10/28/2020

PRESENTATION

Student or staff has illness with **at least one primary COVID-19 symptom** in the last 10 days, and has not had contact with a COVID-19 case in past 14 days.

Student or staff has illness with **at least one primary COVID-19 symptom** in the last 10 days, and had contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case in past 14 days.

Student or staff has illness with symptoms that are **not primary COVID-19 symptoms** such as diarrhea, vomiting, headache, or rash.

Student or staff is not ill, and has been exposed to someone with a current presumptive or positive COVID-19 case.

Student or staff has an ill household member with symptoms of COVID-19 but without a confirmed or presumptive case.

Student or staff has a positive COVID-19 viral test.

ACTION

Exclude from school. Advise viral testing and referral to health care provider for evaluation.

This ill person may have COVID-19. Isolate at home for at least 10 days since symptoms started, and 24 hours "fever free," and symptoms improved. Local public health will investigate.

Exclude per usual school exclusion guidelines. Advise referral to health care provider if symptoms persist longer than one day.

Exposed person must quarantine for 14 days after date of last exposure to COVID-19 case. Refer to RSSL "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools" for additional guidance.

Carefully monitor the student or staff member for symptoms. Encourage the ill household member to get tested for COVID-19.

This person has COVID-19. Isolate at home for at least 10 days since test date, and 24 hours fever free, and any symptoms improved. Local public health will investigate.

CONDITIONS FOR RETURN

If person tests negative for COVID-19, they may return to school after symptoms improve and fever-free for 24 hours.

If person is not tested or tests positive for COVID-19, they must stay home for at least 10 days since symptoms started, and 24 hours fever-free, and symptoms improved.

If health care provider advises person they can return to school, person may return per documented advice of the provider.

If not seen by a health care provider, may return per usual school exclusion guidelines.

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Presumptive case means a person who was exposed to a positive COVID-19 case and has developed symptoms.

Quarantine separates and restricts the movement of people who were exposed to a contagious disease to see if they become sick.

Isolation separates a sick person with a contagious disease from people who are not sick.

- Governor Brown announced a statewide closure today.
- It will be in effect for two weeks, starting Wednesday, November 18th through Wednesday, December 2nd, 2020.
- Data will be reviewed after 2 weeks, and the order may be continued.

KEY PRACTICES FOR REDUCING SPREAD OF COVID-19 IN SCHOOLS

The mainstays of reducing exposure to the coronavirus and other respiratory pathogens are:



Physical Distancing At least six feet with other people.



Isolation & Quarantine — Isolation separates sick people from people who are not sick. Quarantine separates and restricts the movement of people who were exposed to a contagious disease to see if they become sick.



Hand Hygiene Frequent washing with soap and water or using hand sanitizer.



Cohorts Conducting all activities in small groups that remain together over time with minimal mixing of groups.



Environmental Cleaning & Disinfection Especially of high touch surfaces.



Protective Equipment Use of face shields, face coverings, and barriers.



Airflow & Ventilation — Outdoor activities are safer than indoor activities; maximize airflow in closed spaces.

Additional Information...

- Given the data and modeling we are seeing, public health experts state that some counties, like Multnomah, will need longer to flatten the curve, in order to preserve hospital capacity and save lives. Multnomah county and other hotspots will need to stay in the Freeze for at least 4 weeks, if not longer.
- Actions taken now will help prevent lives from being lost — not just from COVID-19, but from other diseases or accidents that lead people to need hospital-level care, which they won't be able to get if the beds are full of COVID-19 patients.
- This action by Governor Brown is not the same as last Spring's Stay Home, Save Lives order. (Provisions for education, personal services, churches, etc.)
- The Governor is strongly encouraging outdoor recreation. Playgrounds (and state parks) will remain open. Changes to youth sports guidance is forthcoming. There will no change in current guidance on Division I athletics.

RE: OAR 581-015-2155 - Dissent about retaining existing language re: qualified examiner requirements (i.e. I am respectfully requesting to remove *“Other individual assigned by a school district who has the training and experience to administer and interpret individually administered intelligence tests”* from the current OAR)

To: Honorable State Board of Education

I am a Coordinator of Special Programs at the Southern Oregon Education Service District (SOESD) with 25 years of experience in the field of Special Education. I have administered to a variety of highly specialized programs over the years, including Autism, Traumatic Brain Injury, Psychological Services, regional low-incidence disability program areas, and life-skills classrooms. I spent six years on the Oregon Autism Commission’s Screening-Identification-Assessment subcommittee contributing to the workgroup’s best practice efforts in defining assessment guidelines for identification of Autism in Oregon. I am currently a regional representative on Oregon’s Regional Management Team, supervising multiple programs at the SOESD, including a team of school psychologists, who are providing psychological services for 11 component school districts and programs in Jackson, Josephine and Klamath Counties.

I am proposing to use the same qualified examiner requirements in OAR 581-015-2155 (Intellectual Disability Eligibility) that is defined in OAR 581-015-2175 (Traumatic Brain Injury Eligibility) for the following reasons:

- 1) The currently proposed language in OAR 581-015-2155 (“training and experience”) is **very vague and does not properly define the necessary licensure** and qualification requirements of the examiner
- 2) The current language in OAR 581-015-2155 **does not align with existing OARs** that have a very specific, clear definition re: individual qualified to perform a psychological assessment (intelligence testing is a psychological assessment – please, refer to OAR 581-015-2175). It also does not align with qualified examiner licensure requirements defined in other disciplines (i.e. speech and language pathologists in OAR 581-015-2135 Communication Disorder).
- 3) The current language **allows individuals with insufficient training and experience to mis-identify disabilities**, and **exacerbate** Oregon’s already acknowledged problems around misidentification and **disproportionality** (please, refer to 2020 ODE Audit <https://sos.oregon.gov/audits/Documents/2020-24.pdf>)
- 4) The current language **removes the incentive for individuals in Oregon to pursue a career in the field of school psychology**, and **perpetuates Oregon’s significant school psychologist recruitment and retention problems** (if psychological work can be delegated to individuals, who do not hold a psychology license, then why would anyone want to go through three



years of graduate training, 1,200 hours of required internship experience, financial hardship and an arduous licensure process to become a school psychologist?)

- 5) The current language **lacks specificity to meet minimum requirements set by test publishers** for purchasing and using an intelligence test, as test publishers only sell intelligence tests to individuals with proper licensure (C-level user qualification is required by most test publishers – authors of psychological tests specify the required qualifications of the examiner in each test’s manual). Individually administered intelligence test user qualifications typically require a graduate degree in the field of psychology or psychiatry, and/or membership in a psychological organization such as the American Psychological Association, National Association of School Psychologists, etc. (please, refer to Examiner Qualifications at the websites of MHS, Pearson and Riverside Publishers). It’s a violation of test publisher agreements (reportable to Pearson, WPS, Riverside, etc.) if an unqualified examiner administers and interprets an intelligence tests and thereby fails to protect and maintain test security.

- 6) The current language poses a **risk of liability for districts, who utilize individuals without a psychology degree for the purpose of intelligence testing** (there is a higher risk of OCR complaints and independent educational evaluation requests filed by parents).

The Black Lives Matter Resolution put forth by ODE in October makes it clear that the board is serious about addressing, within their sphere of influence, the ills of racism and to put forward “messages of understanding, love, and belonging” to Oregon public school students. This is a commendable and desirable goal.

The phraseology “Black Lives Matter,” can indicate a sentiment, a movement, or the formal organization often abbreviated as BLM. Therefore, it is not always clear what exactly is meant when one claims to support “Black Lives Matter.” For better or worse, the sentiment can be indistinguishable from the movement or the organization and there are potential dangers with this conflation.

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To whom it may concern,

As a school psychologist currently working in public education in Oregon, I am writing this letter on behalf of the students and families that I serve out of professional responsibility. I was recently made aware of the proposed changes to the OARs, specifically around intelligence testing. I am wondering why the proposed language for OAR 581-015-2155 stating that intelligence testing may be done by “Other individual[s] assigned by a school district who has the training and experience to administer and interpret individually administered intelligence tests” would need to be added. Would the authors of this proposed change be able to provide some examples of who was previously excluded and should now be included? The vagueness of this language leaves too much discretion for each school district. I understand that there is a shortage of school psychologists nationally each year but the solution is not to expand the criteria to potentially include individuals who are not properly trained and do not have the necessary skills or experience. This could lead to potential harm to students and ultimately their families.

Testing companies that publish intelligence tests are very specific with who meets a Level C qualification that is needed for Intelligence tests. This is based upon the Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing developed jointly by the American Educational Research Association (AERA), the American Psychological Association (APA), and the National Council on Measurement in Education (NCME). If individuals do not meet those criteria, it would seem irresponsible to allow an individual district to override that.

It is imperative that the standard for who can administer and interpret intelligence tests is not relaxed. This goes way beyond following proper testing procedures. Once that information is gathered, many additional considerations need to be addressed when determining whether a child has an Intellectual Disability. As stated in IDEA, no one measure or assessment should be used as the sole evidence for determining a student has a disability. If a certified school psychologist or licensed psychologist is not at the table, those additional considerations may be overlooked or not properly addressed. The ability to analyze all of that data is not an easy task and requires an individual that has received extensive training and supervised practice. I am currently in my 11th year as a school psychologist and I continue to consult with other school psychologists as each situation that I encounter is unique.

Testimony for the State Board of Education

November 19, 2020

General and Administrative Rule Revisions ;

Dear members of the State Board of Education:

This testimony is submitted on behalf of the Oregon Association for Talented and Gifted (OATAG), a statewide, membership-based non-profit corporation established in 1978.

As the State Board will be considering proposals for revisions to the Administrative Rules, OATAG recommends the following which align with the Board's stated values as noted:

1) Include students when planning their Talented and Gifted (TAG) services.

OAR 581-022-2330 Rights of Parents of Talented and Gifted Students states that districts must:

(1) Inform *parents* at the time of the identification of the child and the programs and services available.

(2) Provide an opportunity for the *parents* to provide input to and discuss with the district the programs and services to be received by their child.

(3) The *parents* may, at any time, request the withdrawal of their child from programs and services provided under OAR

581-022-1320. The school district shall notify *parents* of identified students of this right.

(4) *Parents* shall be informed of their right to file a complaint under OAR 581-022-1940.

We believe that (2) should be amended to read "provide an opportunity for the parents AND STUDENTS to provide input to programs and services." We are requesting this change because a group of TAG students asked us about it. They feel they should be consulted when plans that affect their education are being determined.

Ideally, at least part of the planning would be incorporated into the college and career plan that the law also requires.

This recommendation aligns with the State Board's values including:

EQUITY:--"every student has access to the resources and supports they need."

EMPOWERMENT--"respect and listen to multiple perspectives, and empower students...."

STUDENT CENTERED:-- "discussion, decisions, and action are centered on the best interest of every student."

(2) Require districts to list TAG administrators/contact information on district websites and provide that information annually to the Department of Education.

This information could be included in the Division 22 report. Currently, students and families seeking information about TAG nominations or TAG services in their district experience a frustrating search for contact information. Often it is either not found on a district's website or it is buried under inconsistent and unpredictable categories.

This recommendation aligns with the State Board's values including:

EMPOWERMENT:--"... empower students, educational professionals, families, and community members to take a leading role in ensuring student success"

(3) Include TAG students in the definition of "underserved" students in the Oregon *Student Success Act*

Section 9 (2)(b) of *Oregon's Student Success Act* states that funds from the new Student Investment Accounts should, among other goals, "reduce student disparities" for:

- Low-income students
- Students from: racial or ethnic groups that have experienced disparities
- Students with disabilities
- ELL students
- Foster children
- Homeless children
- "Any other student groups that have historically experienced academic disparities as determined by the State Board of Education by rule."

As the Act says that it is up to the State Board to decide who is covered by this term, we are requesting that the State Board includes TAG students as an "underserved" group.

TAG students are among the most underserved groups of students in Oregon. In 2017-8, 83 Oregon school districts identified six or fewer TAG students and 89 districts reported spending nothing on TAG services. There are vast disparities in TAG services from district to district and even from school to school. Gifted students who are members of historically underserved groups, low-income students, rural students and students who are also referred for Special Education are especially likely to be unidentified and underserved (see attached report).

This ongoing neglect and the invisibility of TAG students within our education system contributes to the systemic racism that prevents many of our advanced learners from reaching their full potential.

Although other sections of the Student Success Act include grants for "talented and gifted programs," it defines "disaggregated" groups as those listed in section 9(2)(b). Because TAG

students are not listed in that section, important TAG data go unreported. This makes it harder to pinpoint disparities in identification. or levels of service.

In addition, TAG data are not included in the state "accountability details" reports because TAG is not an "accountable" student group in the state's federal ESSA plan.

This recommendation aligns with the State Board's values including:

EQUITY:--"every student has access to the resources and supports they need to thrive in school"

INCLUSION:--"every student has access to the opportunities and benefits of Oregon's education system"

EXCELLENCE--"the Oregon education system prepares every student for college, career, and life"

StUDENT CENTERED: "discussion, decisions, and action are centered on the best interest of every student."

The following two items are not directly related to TAG services but involve overall improvements to Oregon's process for accountability for educational services

(4) Develop a spreadsheet listing all district Division 22 reports with their compliance/non-compliance checks on the Department of Education website and create a mandatory follow-up process when a district states it is out of compliance with a standard. This doesn't actually require any change in rule--just in policy and procedure)

This recommendation aligns with the State Board's values including:

INTEGRITY:--"act with honesty and transparency in everything we do"

EMPOWERMENT:--"... empower students, educational professionals, families, and community members to take a leading role in ensuring student success"

(5) Amend the administrative rules on appeals and complaints to create a process for follow-up monitoring when a district has written a compliance plan and has been released from a compliance order.

The Department spends a lot of time and effort investigating complaints and issuing findings. We have found that districts often develop elaborate compliance plans as part of this process. However, as soon as they are found to be in compliance and re-classified as a "standard" district, they abandon their plan.

Complainants are then compelled to re-start the years-long complaint process from the beginning. The result is that students may never receive adequate TAG services, complainants are frustrated, and the Department has to spend additional time and effort investigating a fresh complaint.

If districts knew that the Department would monitor their continued compliance with their own compliance plans after they were released, they would be more likely to sustain their

efforts.

This recommendation aligns with the State Board's values including:

EQUITY:--"every student has access to the resources and supports they need to thrive in school"

INTEGRITY:--"act with honesty and transparency in everything we do"

INNOVATION: --"work to improve Oregon's education system"

INCLUSION:--"every student has access to the opportunities and benefits of Oregon's education system."

Talented and Gifted

Talented and Gifted (TAG) children are defined by the State of Oregon as "those children who require special educational programs or services, or both, beyond those normally provided by the regular school program in order to realize their contribution to self and society and who demonstrate outstanding ability or potential" in one of the recognized areas of giftedness (ORS 343.391). Oregon statutes and administrative rules require school districts to identify TAG students and to provide TAG students with instruction that is designed to meet their assessed levels of learning and accelerated rates of learning (OAR 581-022-2500).

School districts are required to identify TAG students in the categories of Intellectually Gifted, Academically Talented-Reading, Academically Talented-Mathematics and Potential to Perform at the 97th Percentile. The definition of Potential to Perform at the 97th Percentile may be determined locally by individual districts. The Oregon Department of Education defines the categories Intellectually Gifted and Academically Talented in either Reading or Mathematics. Districts also have the option to identify students in three other areas: creativity, leadership and visual and performing arts. All TAG identification is based on a body of evidence and multiple data points. Individual Students may be identified in multiple areas of TAG.

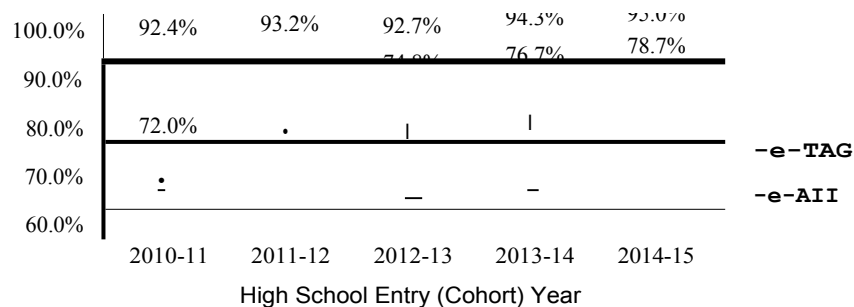

On October 15, the Oregon Department of Education issued a Black Lives Matter Resolution. The resolution contains laudable statements supporting the equal treatment of Black students, fair treatment of all students, and removing roadblocks hindering student success. I support those messages of respect, understanding, and belonging.

The statements that bring concern for me and many students and families contain the words “anti-racism”, and “systemic”, which sound reasonable on the surface, but are, perhaps, destructive or counter-productive. What exactly do these terms mean and how are they taught in the classroom? The phrase “Black Lives Matter” can precisely mean what it declares, Black students matter. But, does it bring unintended division into the schools when it is meant to unite?

Friends of mine and parents across Oregon are discussing that their children are being told in class they are racist from birth. Sixth grade teachers are discussing the Breonna Taylor case and stating that the “killers will be held accountable”, and to “be prepared for large protests around the country if they are not”. Parents are listening to their children’s teachers delegitimize the Founding Fathers and the Constitution, and undermining our law enforcement. Other students are being taught about “white privilege” and inherited racial guilt. Do these teachings support ODE’s mission, as stated in the resolution, to promote “educational practices that lead directly to the educational and life success of all Oregon PK-12 students”?

These are not the lessons of Martin Luther King. Rather, all of these lessons are rooted in an ideology that gave rise to Critical Race Theory (CRT). By definition, these ideas are simply “theories” and their impact on child development is unproven. Many black scholars are speaking out in opposition to teaching these topics to young people, especially without allowing for open debate or opposing viewpoints. Many believe these lessons are harmful for children of all races—division, guilt and permanent victim status leading to hopelessness are just a few of their unintended consequences. Recently, Kemi Badenock, a woman of color and Member of Parliament of the United Kingdom, recently spoke out about the dangers of teaching CRT:

She says this theory sees her “blackness as victimhood and their whiteness as oppression”. She called on members of parliament to condemn the BLM organization instead of pretending it is a completely wholesome anti-racist organization. She states that any school teaching these theories of white privilege and inherited racial guilt without offering an opposing view is breaking the law.

In Oregon and around the world, parents, politicians, teachers, and others are beginning to question these teachings, which are divisive and dehumanizing.

The ODE Black Lives Matter Resolution states:

WHEREAS, the U.S. Office of Special Counsel issued an advisory opinion that it is not a violation of the Hatch Act for federal employees to show support for the Black Lives Matter movement and the Black Lives Matter Global Network while on duty, including wearing or displaying materials related to the cause, because they address issues such as racism, which

are not inherently aligned with a single political party and do not meet any criteria for a "partisan political group".

If the statement "Black Lives Matter" is nonpartisan and teachers are supported in wearing BLM gear, are they also supported in wearing other slogans such as "Blue Lives Matter" or "All Lives Matter"? If BLM is a statement not representing a political agenda, then other slogans should also be acceptable. However, in ODE's "Training Toolkit" released with the Resolution, a teacher discusses how she handled a student saying "All Lives Matter" in one of the virtual classrooms. The student then wrote an apology letter.

Clearly only certain slogans and statements are being supported by ODE. If BLM is not in violation there should be equal treatment of other statements as well.

Recently Governor Brown rightly asked for the removal of symbols of the noose, the Confederate flag, and the swastika. I agree with this. ODE Director Colt Gill stated on the issue, "The ODE is committed to ensuring that Oregon's schools are safe and inclusive for all students and staff, and the All Students Belong rule is an important step in that process". Does "all students" include students that have parents in law enforcement? Does "all students" include students whose families have escaped communism? My friend that escaped communist rule in Vietnam shared with me her thoughts on the raised fist. She states, "It represents communism. We hate communism. I lived in a refugee camp in Thailand for 2 years before coming to the United States. We escaped and now they teach communism to my children and they are confused. The United States is land of liberty! They don't teach it anymore." Are these students feeling they "belong in their own schools"? The symbol that BLM has adopted is the communist fist, which to those who have escaped communism, means "genocide." Children with these family histories must feel like they are safe and belong in their schools too.

Although the ODE's Resolution is well-meaning, I am concerned about possible unintended consequences. Does it enhance or reduce freedom? Assemble or divide? I believe that the most inclusive line in the Resolution are the last 3 words, "All Students Belong." If ODE really believes this, they need to rethink their Black Lives Matter Resolution.

Director Gill,

It has come to our attention that a proposal has been brought before the State Board of Education to waive assessment requirements, including both the 10th grade and Essential Skills Assessments. While the notice was filed with the Secretary of State's office on September 30, the agenda for the Board's October 15 monthly meeting did not include any mention that this issue would be presented. We understand your department is dealing with many challenging, unprecedented, and critical issues during the covid-19 pandemic, but we are troubled by the lack of transparency regarding this school year's assessment requirements and worry about the resulting lost opportunities for students.

For the past several years the legislature has allocated funds to administer a 10th-grade assessment—historically the PSAT 10—to support Oregon students, including traditionally underrepresented populations. School districts that choose to administer the PSAT 10 provide their students with key information about their college readiness, scholarship opportunities, and a connection to free personalized SAT practice. Additionally, the PSAT 10 helps educators and administrators identify students with the potential to succeed in advanced coursework. During the first special session, the legislature worked hard to ensure funding for the 10th-grade assessment. We question why ODE is requesting assessment waivers that contradict the legislative intent of ORS 392.488 and why this was not communicated to the legislature during either the regular or special session.

Another reason cited for making the waiver request centered on potential cost savings. However, there has been no acknowledgement to the State Board of the cost savings that were achieved this past spring because of canceled IB and SBAC testing and what these unused funds would be spent on, in addition to the \$425,000 already budgeted for the PSAT 10.

Your mission statement centers on equity, though your actions in the case do not reflect that goal. We worry about the impact of these decisions on equity and inclusion, and the lack of data that will be gathered on student learning this year. We urge you to reconsider your proposal to waive ORS 392.488, which requires that the department make a nationally-normed college entrance practice assessment available to all 10th grade students.

We believe allowing students the opportunity to take this assessment is critical for them on their path from school to college or career. Should this waiver become a reality, it will remove key department data and information on students' college readiness and potential to succeed in advanced coursework. The public deserves clear explanations, especially for proposals that have the potential to impact nearly every 10th grader in the state.

We believe these matters to be paramount in promoting equity and transparency.

My name is Pragyna and I am currently a student at the University of Washington.

I recently found out about the new rule ODE is creating banning hate speech and symbols. I largely think this is a much needed policy change and applaud the intent of the rule. However, I am concerned about the rule change outright banning the swastika. The word "swastika" means "conducive to well-being" in Sanskrit. While the Nazis used the swastika (which they called the hakenkreuz) as a symbol of hate, it was originally used by Hindus as a symbol of prosperity and good luck, and Hindus continue to use the symbol to represent their religion today. You often see the swastika on the doorstep of Hindu homes, and people often wear the swastika on jewelry for good luck. The Hindu swastika also looks different from the Nazi symbol. I attached an image here if you would like to see the difference.



I completely understand the intention of banning the swastika, given the history of the Holocaust. Most Hindu Americans are also aware of the implications of the swastika in American society, and do not generally display the symbol in public. However, for Hindu students, the outright banning of this symbol is hurtful. It says that a symbol of faith--stolen in the name of genocide--is inherently evil, and Hindu students feel less comfortable being themselves. In a virtual environment, Hindu students who have the swastika displayed in their homes could be unfairly reprimanded. The Oregon Department of Education should reaffirm that hate is wrong while also not blanket-banning symbols that mean different things to different people. Banning the swastika outright is like banning the cross because cross burnings were used by the KKK to terrorize people of color.

Banning the swastika also creates an issue of awareness. Recently, there was an outbreak of online protests over the SHEIN website selling necklaces with the swastika symbol. Many interpreted the symbol to be representative of the holocaust and found the sale of such a product on the website demeaning and degrading. Despite several members of the Indian community, including many on my own college campus, reaching out to those protesting explaining the

meaning of the swastika, many refused to accept that the Swastika could have an alternate meaning. The response was hateful and demeaning, and it showed a lack of awareness about the topic.

As a concerned Oregonian, I ask that ODE removes the word "swastika" from OAR 581-022-2312. I believe that the descriptor of "symbols of hate" would allow schools to use discretion to address students who display the Nazi swastika with a hateful intent, without singling out a symbol that means a very different thing for Hindus. At the very least, ODE should replace the word "swastika" with the term "hakenkreuz" or "Nazi sign" to distinguish the two symbols. Teachers also must be educated on the difference between the two swastikas.

Senators Roblan and Thomsen, and Representatives Bonham and Helt,

Thank you for reaching out regarding our waiver request and, most importantly, for your advocacy on behalf of students. I will share your correspondence with the State Board of Education.

We share your deep value for equity, access, and opportunity for students in our state. We strive to ensure our actions are transparent and thoughtfully aligned with public process requirements pursuant of any request brought forward to the State Board of Education. We hope to stay in the conversation with you around this important topic, working to build shared understanding and clear explanation around some key points outlined in your letter. Ultimately, our upcoming waiver request honors what we believe is best for students and is the most responsible action we can take in this unique context.

Before addressing the substance of your letter, we would like to offer procedural clarifications regarding the proposed waiver to the nationally-normed college entrance practice assessment required under [ORS 329.488](#).

- *ORS 329.488*, which directs ODE to make a nationally-normed college entrance practice assessment available to Oregon 10th graders, also allows the State Board of Education to use its rulemaking authority to waive this assessment requirement for groups of students. Given the limitations on in-person instruction currently in place in most districts across the state and the myriad challenges schools are facing to maximize precious instructional time, ODE is seeking to use this waiver option to alleviate the burden on schools and educators so they can focus on connecting with students and providing high-quality and engaging instruction in our current context. The proposed waiver is incorporated into the [revision](#) to *OAR 581-022-0104*: State Standards for the 2020-21 School Year (section 4). The State Board had its first read of the revised *OAR 581-022-0104* in [October](#) 2020 (see item 6A). ODE anticipates bringing the rule back to the State Board for adoption in January or February 2021.
- In addition, it is important to note that ODE's contract with the College Board ended on June 30, 2020. If the State Board does not support ODE's waiver request, ODE will swiftly initiate a Request for Proposals (RFP) process. While the College Board was awarded the most recent contract, as a state agency ODE is bound to follow a transparent and competitive procurement process. As such, ODE has framed its response to your concerns without focusing on a specific vendor or assessment product.

Essential Skills & Local Performance Assessment

ODE first communicated to districts, families, and students that the Essential Skills graduation requirement would be suspended for students graduating in 2020 and 2021 as part of the [Distance Learning for All](#) Guidance published in the Spring of 2020.

In order to implement E.O 20-20 (issued April 23, 2020) and assist public schools in responding to the COVID-19 emergency, the Department of Education issued a significant amount of guidance to the field, including [Graduation Pathways 2020](#). The purpose of *Graduation Pathways 2020* was to support the class of 2020 in reaching graduation goals during an unprecedented time. The guidance provided options and recommendations to award credits for seniors that account for their work and accomplishments up to the point of school closure.

The *Graduation Pathways 2020* guidance suspended the Essential Skills requirement for the class of 2020 and the class of 2021. The guidance stated that the suspension was dependent upon the State Board taking action to amend applicable administrative rules.

The State Board did take action to implement that guidance and suspend the Essential Skills by adopting two administrative rules. For the class of 2020, the applicable rule is [OAR 581-022-0103 State Standards for the 2019-20 School Year](#) (see subsection (2)). The rule was adopted as a temporary rule in April 2020 and as a permanent rule in June 2020. Here are links to the board materials for the [April](#) (see item 6A), [May](#) (see item 8H), and [June](#) (see item 3D) board meetings.

For the class of 2021, the applicable rule is [OAR 581-022-0104 State Standards for the 2020-21 School Year](#) (See Subsection (3)(a)). The rule was adopted as a temporary rule in [September](#) (see item 4A). ODE is currently going through the permanent rulemaking process. The permanent rule was first read at the [October](#) board meeting (see item 6A) and will be back before the board for adoption in either January or February.

The assessment waiver request under State Board consideration this fall relates primarily to removing local performance assessment requirements, which place procedural burdens on Oregon districts that are not tenable in the 2020-21 school year, and the waiver of the nationally-normed college entrance practice examination for current 10th graders.

Nationally-normed College Entrance Practice Examination

ORS 329.488 allows the State Board to use its rulemaking authority to waive the nationally-normed college entrance practice test for specific groups of students. The waiver request ODE submitted to the State Board is specific to the cohort of students who are enrolled in Grade 10 during the 2020-21 school year. ODE is seeking a waiver for 2020-21 in order to reduce burdens that are not crucial to instruction for schools and students. To provide some context, under ODE's previous contract with the College Board, the PSAT was historically given in the second week of October. It was not possible to administer the PSAT in October. College Board scheduled an additional testing date for January 2021. The majority of Oregon students are being served by [Comprehensive Distance Learning](#) instructional models, and with the current rise in Oregon COVID-19 health [metric trends](#), that will more than likely be the case in January 2021. Under ORS 329.488, administration of the nationally-normed college entrance practice test is structured as a requirement on both the part of ODE and local districts. Unless ODE works with the State Board to pursue the waiver option permitted under ORS 329.488, it would be left to individual parents to request an exemption from their district. Processing

exemption requests on an individual student basis would create significant additional burdens on districts that are already facing a number of challenges in meeting the needs of students and optimizing the use of instructional time.

Fiscal Implications

With regard to the costs for our summative assessments from spring 2020, most costs associated with summative assessment occur well in advance of the test window, as they are preparatory in nature. Our summative assessment system was planned, reviewed for quality, and implemented in spring 2020 when the pandemic hit Oregon. There was a potential for a minor reimbursement from our item content non-profit consortium (Smarter Balanced, \$382,236), and ODE realized cost savings from our test delivery vendor due to the suspension of our statewide summative assessments (Cambium Assessment, \$1,622,028); however, ODE selected an option that allowed us to provide a comprehensive [Interim Assessment system](#) complete with instructional resources, called Tools for Teachers, for all of Oregon's educators and students for 2020-21 in lieu of the minor reimbursement from our content non-profit consortium (with a projected differential value of more than \$1,000,000). For the first time in recent history, this helped to balance Oregon's assessment system which has been heavily weighted to summative assessment at the expense of statewide support for formative and interim assessment systems. ODE also eliminated the performance task from our summative ELA and mathematics assessments, which will potentially result in \$1,507,600 in savings for 2020-21 (primarily from human hand scoring costs).

Additionally, there was no cost savings for the IB exams through the Test Fee Program in May 2020. Although IB cancelled the May 2020 exams, IB still conducted their assessment via gathering other evidence of student performance, and students still paid for these assessments. Also, the legislature voted to not fund the Test Fee Program for the second half of the biennium; therefore, the leftover \$220,738 in this fund will be enough to cover approximately fifty percent of AP and IB tests in spring 2021, and only for students who qualify for Free/Reduced Price Lunch.

Supporting Students and Ensuring Student Success

As defined by [ORS 329.488](#), the nationally-normed college entrance practice examination is an assessment whose purpose "...is to predict the success of students on, and provide practice for students taking, college entrance exams." This is critical to our discussion, as it is related to one perceived benefit of having Oregon students take practice college entrance examinations, namely, because they are predictive of future performance on college entrance examinations.

To better understand this perceived benefit, ODE reviewed student participation on the PSAT and found significant discrepancies between participation rates and student demographics. We found that students of color were under-represented and White students and Asian students were over-

represented. This is important, as it addresses the perspective that the PSAT may have been an important tool used to open opportunities for Oregon's students of color. While that may happen in unique circumstances, ODE does not have evidence to support that claim. The fact is that Black, Latino/a/x, and Native American students in Oregon do not participate in the PSAT at representative demographic rates.

Local and national trends in college admissions practices show that universities and colleges are removing college entrance examination requirements from admissions procedures. The use of college entrance examinations, and therefore the relevance of college entrance practice examinations, is rapidly in decline. Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs) across the country are evaluating various data sources that have strong predictive validity for post-secondary success and better promote equitable admissions practices, including high school Grade Point Average (GPA), writing samples, interviews, and teacher recommendations.

Organizations that track college/university use of college admissions assessments in their admissions procedures show that [two-thirds are test optional or test-blind](#) for college admissions this fall. IHE's are searching for better, more comprehensive procedures to make these high-stakes decisions. On March 25, 2020, Oregon's public universities removed submission of ACT or SAT scores as a college admissions requirement, in perpetuity ([Statesman Journal, 3-25-2020](#)). The University of California Regents also [suspended the requirement](#) of the ACT or SAT for college admissions on May 21, 2020 for three years while they study better ways to make such high-stakes decisions. On September 1, 2020, California Superior Court judge Brad Seligman went further, issuing a [preliminary injunction](#) against the UC's plan because there is concern regarding whether the assessments present equal opportunities for students experiencing disabilities. An attorney for the prosecution, Mark Rosenbaum, shared the following observation related to the case. He noted that the "historic decision puts an end to racist tests that deprived countless California students of color, students with disabilities, and students from low-income families of a fair shot at admissions to the UC system" ([LA Times, 9-1-2020](#)).

That said, ODE acknowledges there are some benefits for having students participate in nationally-normed college entrance practice assessments. Some scholarship organizations require applicants to submit college entrance practice examinations, such as the National Merit Scholarship (NMS) program. However, because *ORS 329.488* requires administration at Grade 10, it precludes student use for application to the NMS program, which requires a Grade 11 administration. Another potential benefit is that participation in the assessment has offered Oregon students an opportunity to connect to IHEs, as student scores can be reported to IHEs and those who performed well might be added to admissions communications processes. However, consultation with admissions associates in Oregon demonstrates that there is a need for new ways to connect students to IHEs that do not hinge on college entrance examinations. The staff whom ODE consulted acknowledged that nationally-normed college entrance practice examinations had limited utility for them outside of this context and that it was not a sufficient reason to maintain the practice or policy.

Thank you for your engagement around this issue and for your collective interest in supporting Oregon's students during an unprecedented time. I hope that our response provides greater clarity and informs the conversation. We stand ready to meet with you at any time to discuss this further.

Dear Ms. Howard,

I write to you and your colleagues to supplement recent discussions brought to the State Board of Education by the Oregon Department of Education regarding the waiving of Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 329.488. Since 2008, this statute supported the administration of the PSAT/NMSQT to Oregon’s 10th grade students each fall. On average 80-85% of the state’s 10th graders have taken the exam each fall. Schools and districts throughout the State of Oregon administer the assessment, and through it, a number of opportunities are delivered to students, including identifying students who are ready to take specific advanced courses while in high school and connecting students to higher education institutions and financial aid.

The Oregon Department of Education supported the waiver citing the suspension by Oregon colleges and universities to require the SAT and ACT. While accurate, the waiver request does not address the standalone utility and value that the PSAT/NMSQT—rather than the cited SAT--offers to students and families. During public discussion, the Oregon Department of Education also advanced an argument that the percentage of Oregon’s 10th grade students availing themselves of the PSAT/NMSQT is lower for students of color than for White students. Taking data directly from the Oregon Department of Education’s website, I note that in 2018-19, Black and Asian students both had lower participation percentages on the SBAC 11 exams than state average participation across subgroups.

It is important for the State Board to have full data and evidence in front of it to make a thoughtful decision. The Oregon Department of Education believes strongly that the SBAC assessment system will advance opportunities and support for students and educators. I do not write to disparage the SBAC assessments or the system of supports surrounding SBAC. However, in supporting SBAC and seeking to clear an exclusive pathway for its use in Oregon, there is a much richer discussion about value to students and families available for the State Board. I provide data on two of the most essential decision points for the State Board: student performance and assessment benchmarks.

Student Performance

It may be surprising for board members, but in looking at the same cohort of students taking both the PSAT (in fall of their sophomore year) and the same students taking the SBAC exam in the spring of their junior year, one might expect that fewer students, particularly students of color, meet the college readiness benchmarks established across the SAT Suite of Assessments (PSAT 8/9; PSAT/NMSQT, and the SAT). In fact, **far more** of Oregon’s students of color meet the SAT benchmark (in their sophomore year, no less) than do meet the comparable benchmark for SBAC (which is level 4) for reading (ERW) and math nearly 18 months later in their high school career.

This should raise questions for the State Board. Is one exam more “equitable” than the other? Which one provides the clearest information for students to develop multiple pathways towards many postsecondary options? In the tables below, find data on both assessments.

How could there be such significant disparities in achievement and postsecondary readiness? It is important to examine the process by which the benchmarks on each assessment were established because they clearly represent differing interpretations of college readiness.

Assessment Benchmarks:

PSAT/NMSQT and SAT:

- *Students with an SAT Math section score that meets or exceeds the benchmark have a 75 percent chance of earning at least a C in first-semester, credit-bearing college courses in algebra, statistics, pre-calculus, or calculus.*
- *Students with an SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing (ERW) section score that meets or exceeds the benchmark have a 75 percent chance of earning at least a C in first-semester, credit-bearing college courses in history, literature, social sciences, or writing classes.*

SBAC Grade 11:

- *An SBAC score aligned to performance level 4, in combination with successful completion of a 12th grade course reflects the student has met the pre-requisite **for placement** in a first-year credit bearing course.*

How each benchmark was established:

PSAT and SAT:

There are two important elements to note. First, the College Board’s College Readiness Benchmark was developed through research on a nationally representative sample of colleges and universities examining student success in first-semester courses in a wide array of programs: training and employment; two-year; and

four-year institutions. The benchmark was intentionally designed to represent students across the broad range of postsecondary education and training options available to them. Second, regarding mathematics specifically, the College Board’s research supported a deep focus on mastery of algebra, again because the range of postsecondary destinations for students produces varying needs for additional mathematics coursework and study. These elements are reflected in both the content of the assessments and the established benchmark.

SBAC has a thorough explanation of its Level 4 Performance as it defines College Readiness. That explanation includes:

Level 4 Policy Implications for Grade 12 for High School Graduates who Immediately Enter Higher Education:

- Level 4 Student demonstrates thorough understanding of and ability to apply the knowledge and skills associated with college content readiness.
- Student is exempt from developmental course work. (K12 and higher education officials may jointly set Grade 12 requirements to maintain the exemption.)
- Within each state, students may be required to satisfactorily complete Grade 12 English and/or mathematics courses to retain the exemption from developmental course work (higher education and K-12 officials may jointly determine appropriate courses and performance standards).
- Students are encouraged to take appropriate advanced credit courses leading to college credit while still in high school. Colleges may evaluate additional data (courses completed, grades, placement test scores, writing samples, etc.) to determine appropriate course placement at or above the initial credit-bearing level

Discussion: Note that while the SAT benchmarks are research-based, SBAC benchmarks were established through a subjective judgment process about what students should know and be able to do to be successful in college-entry courses. While subjective judgments can be interesting, if there are not grounded in empirical evidence about actual student success in college they may give the wrong signals to students: stating students are ready for college-level courses when they are not, or keeping students who are ready for these courses from enrolling in them. I also am not aware of any inclusion of career readiness in the SBAC benchmarks.

The SAT Suite has been researched extensively. Here’s a sampling of the latest evidence about the opportunities it delivers:

1. Taking college readiness assessments early appears to improve scores, particularly for underrepresented students.
2. When we track students who took an SAT Suite assessment each year from 2015 through 2019, we see a steady upward trend in average scores as well as an increase in the number of students meeting or exceeding both the Math and the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing section benchmarks. In other words, college readiness can be impacted by monitoring student progress especially in the 10th grade and adapting instruction to students’ strengths and developmental needs.
3. More low-income students are taking the SAT than ever before. Nationally, over 3.7 million students in more than 3,000 school districts and 9,000 schools have participated through spring 2019 in administering the SAT Suite assessments during the school day, with Hispanic and Black students participating in much higher rates than White Students.
4. Free, personalized SAT practice works for all students and works particularly well for underrepresented students. Are the same opportunities available for SBAC practice and is there research-based evidence supporting effective practice behaviors?

5. Our research shows there are at least three best practices to help students get the most out of the time spent practicing in Official SAT Practice: 1) following the skill recommendations provided as part of the student's personalized practice plan; 2) taking a practice test; and 3) improving their skills through practice in 15 or more skills identified in their personalized practice plan that is provided through PSAT 10 and other SAT Suite programs. Our research shows that these practices can make a difference in student readiness.
6. Research has shown that when a college entrance examination is given to all students, we see four-year college-going rates increase, higher enrollment in institutions with higher BA completion rates, and students from underrepresented backgrounds benefitting the most.
7. More students are finding more scholarship opportunities through the SAT Suite of Assessments. In 2019 alone, over 20 scholarships were awarded through the SAT Suite to Oregon students, with the total dollar amount in excess of a quarter of a million dollars.
8. Small nudges can change students' trajectories by encouraging students with potential to take AP courses and assessments. In a randomized controlled students, teachers and students received letters, emails, and other communications encouraging students to take AP for which they had potential. Those students in urban high schools nationally who received an intervention were 5-6% more likely to take a matched AP Exam compared to students who did not receive the outreach. In Oregon specifically, we see positive statistically significant results from these interventions.

To date, Deputy Director Gill and Assessment Director Farley have only communicated with the College Board that the existing contract expired and an RFP was necessary going forward. What I do know is that Oregon's statute did not change. Funding to support the statute did not change. ODE did not release an RFP in advance of the June 30, 2020 termination of the existing contract to ensure students continued to be served. We are disappointed in the lack of communication and engagement, and the attempt to subvert with no public discussion the long-standing practice of offering a pre-college readiness exam seems to be serving the interests of ODE rather than the students and families of Oregon. We stand by this statement: The research clearly shows that students who receive opportunities as a result of taking the PSAT/NMSQT are better positioned to pursue their postsecondary goals and succeed.

Re: OAR 581-015-2155 - Dissent regarding language referring to qualified examiner requirements, specifically “*Other individual assigned by a school district who has the training and experience to administer and interpret individually administered intelligence tests.*”

Dear Honorable State Board of Education,

I am the coordinator of the School Psychology and Autism Consultant Teams at NWRES with 20 years of experience in the field of special education. I am concerned about the OAR language that allows for a person who is not a licensed clinical psychologist or school psychologist in the state of Oregon to administer and interpret intelligence tests for special education eligibility under the category of Intellectual Disability(ID).

School psychologists are highly trained and experienced in not only how to administer intelligence testing but also in interpreting that information alongside other important contextual information that must be considered when determining special education eligibility. I am concerned that those without such specialized education and experience may not approach and interpret the body of information gathered during an ID evaluation with such skill and discernment which may result in inaccurate and harmful conclusions regarding the children being evaluated. ID is a particularly sensitive category for parents to consider. Misidentification of a child under the category of ID may have serious implications for the family and the student that may result in an educational path forward that may not be appropriate for the child’s needs and potential.

Furthermore, intelligence testing requires a Level C qualification for administration and interpretation - requiring a high level of expertise and formal training and education. Any assessment completed by someone who does not meet that criteria is not following the ethical guidance and publisher requirements. This may put the district they serve into a situation in which they could be held liable for negligence in allowing a non-qualified person to administer and inform the outcomes of an ID evaluation.

The work that prospective school psychologists go through to obtain their certification and licensure is rigorous, and rightly so. Determining if a child does or does not meet eligibility criteria is a serious matter and merits the type of scrutiny and judgement that comes from those who have worked towards an advanced degree and certification in this area. Oregon already has

challenges with misidentification and disproportionality in special education. I fear that if those without such training are allowed to administer and interpret tests, those numbers will only increase.

I respectfully request that the Board will consider modifying the proposed OAR language to allow for *only* TSPC-licensed school psychologists and psychologists licensed under the Oregon State Board of Psychological Examiners to administer and interpret intelligence testing for the benefit of students in our state.

Subject: **New Metrics Put Focus on Testing**

Oregon issued new school metrics and updated guidance last week that will make it easier for in-person instruction to resume and emphasizes returning elementary school students to the classroom.

The new metrics allow Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam to have higher COVID-19 case counts than original metrics. However, they also require low county test percent positivity rates in order to have in-person school. Statewide test percent positivity rates no longer apply.

State metrics first issued in August required Wasco County, for example, to have less than three COVID-19 cases per week for three consecutive weeks before students at larger schools (250 students or more) could return to the classroom.

Now, in-person or hybrid education is allowed if there are less than 30 cases over two weeks, and the test positivity rate is under 5 percent. School size is no longer a factor under the new metrics (with the exception of very small, remote schools of 75 or fewer students).

In the latest two-week period, from Oct. 18-Oct. 31, Wasco County had 30 cases and a test positivity rate of 8.1 percent.

If the 14-day case count is between 30 and 44 and the test positivity rate is less than 8 percent, that allows careful phasing in of onsite or hybrid schooling, starting with K-3 and adding grades up to grade six. Then, in consultation with the local public health agency, North Central Public Health District, and tracking limited spread over the prior four weeks, a school could thoughtfully expand to middle school or high school in the same fashion.

Schools must begin considering moving from in-person education to distance learning if a county has 45 to 60 cases over 14 days, and/or up to a 10 percent test positivity rate. Remote learning is required if cases are over 60 in two weeks and positivity is higher than 10 percent.

The schools in Dufur and Maupin, as well as in Sherman and Gilliam counties, are already offering in-person instruction. Northern Wasco County School District 21 in The Dalles is still doing remote learning.

D21 Interim Superintendent Theresa Peters said the district has not made any decisions yet on timelines for possible returns to in-person instruction. “We want to invest time in planning ahead to think through every little piece because of the potential for exposure and its impact. You want to limit that as much as possible,” she said. “So it behooves us all to do very thoughtful planning.”

The district is also surveying parents for their intentions on whether they would send their children to in-person instruction.

Sherman and Gilliam counties, where students have been in classrooms, each have low case counts, but the latest two-week period for each county has uncharacteristically high test positivity rates of 12.5 percent in Sherman and 22.2 percent in Gilliam.

Scott Nine, assistant superintendent for the Office of Education Innovation and Improvement at the Oregon Department of Education, said a tradeoff for allowing higher case counts is the need to improve county testing rates, which is a key to controlling the transmission of COVID.

Schools with in-person learning under prior exceptions in counties with high test positivity rates have until Jan. 4 to improve rates before they would be required to go to remote learning based on metrics at that time, Nine said. He called it a “runway” to prepare for and implement increased community testing.

“Increased testing helps limit the ability of a single case to spike test positivity,” he said. He also said community pressure to avoid testing “is the wrong strategy” and conveyed that, “The Oregon Health Authority is ready to work with schools to improve testing access and testing rates.”

The state changed metrics because it has learned schools are not super spreaders, and can actually help identify the virus early if protocols to mitigate risk are followed.

Metrics focus on returning younger students because they require more in person learning and can be more easily kept in small cohorts. Older students have varied classes that put them in contact with more students.

The state has also established a tip line for people to report violations of safety protocols. The number is 1-833-604-0884.

Oregon Department of Education,

On November 6th the North Central Public Health District released a PSA regarding how the new school metrics apply to Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam Counties. I have attached the PSA to this email. It included quotes from Scott Nine. He conveyed that, "The Oregon Health Authority is ready to work with schools to improve testing access and testing rates."

I would like to know what government mechanism, law, or mandate is in place that allows schools to be the ones responsible for increasing testing in their county. I would like to know who counties are supposed to test if there are no identified cases in the county.

The current instructions from the CDC state that not everyone needs to get tested. The CDC says you should only get tested if you have Covid-19 symptoms or if you have had close contact with someone diagnosed with Covid-19. Are you contradicting the CDC? Exactly who in the county is supposed to be tested each week to make sure that if someone does contract Covid-19 the case positivity stays below 10%? Are you instructing counties to waste resources by testing when it is not medically indicated? Who is going to pay for those unnecessary tests? Asking counties to test just to keep their positivity low is unethical.

Mr. Nine also stated "Increased testing helps limit the ability of a single case to spike test positivity." I submit that we cannot use test positivity for school metrics in communities that have no cases or just a handful of cases. In small counties with less than 2,000 people like Sherman, Gilliam, and Wheeler, each case must be contact traced and viewed on it's own. Most of Sherman County's cases were contracted outside the county with little or no in county community spread.

If you can give Oregon's smallest counties a workable and reasonable plan to increase testing and and a plan for how to pay for that testing rather than just pass it off to schools and Oregon Health Authority then citizens would be more cooperative. Passing a mandate on to the schools when they have no right or legal authority to demand increased testing in the community indicates to the citizens of those rural counties that, once again, Salem is dictating policy when they have no idea of the reality in rural Oregon.

I suggest adding a "frontier" metric for counties with less than 2,000 people. If the county case count exceeds a maximum allowable number of cases in fourteen days, County Test Positivity Metrics apply. If the case count was six or ten, two cases in the county would not cause the County Test Positivity Metric to close schools. If the county did exceed that maximum allowable number of cases in 14 days then the County Test Positivity Metric would apply. It would indicate likely community spread

rather than just one person or one family that contracted Covid from outside the county. This will prevent an unnecessary waste of resources from counties testing just to keep case positivity low.

OREGON FAMILY GROUPS FORM STATEWIDE COALITION, SEEK PROMPT IN-PERSON REOPENING OF SCHOOLS

Family groups call for prioritizing in-person K-12 options by January 6, 2021

A coalition of parent groups across Oregon have united under a single umbrella organization, **ED300**. We are calling on appointed and elected leaders to remove statewide barriers to in-person learning by January 6th.

The announcement on Monday by the leaders of multiple grassroots organizations represents the first joint effort by tens of thousands of parents from Portland to southern and eastern Oregon. January 6th marks the 300th day since the vast majority of Oregon's approximately 600,000 students set foot in a classroom.

Parents began organizing in September to advocate on behalf of students as we witnessed learning losses, technology failures, repercussions of no school-based activities, accessibility issues for students with disabilities, and significant mental and emotional health challenges for too many students.

"We call on Governor Brown to remove the state's barriers, and ask superintendents, school boards and lawmakers to engage parent groups such as ED300 to implement a safe and prompt return to in-person learning and co-curricular activities for those who choose," said Rene Gonzalez, a parent of three school-aged children and spokesperson for [ED 300](#) and Opening PDX Schools.

"The learning losses attributable to remote education are not recoverable for many students with learning challenges," said Jennifer Dale, spokesperson for Clack to School and parent of three school-aged children, including a daughter receiving special education services.

We are asking the Governor and the Oregon Department of Education to:

- **Immediately prioritize reopening Oregon schools so that all students have an option for in person-learning by January 6th, 2021.**

➤ Data from numerous states and countries show schools are not significant sources of spread.

- OR's recent uptick in cases is not due to schools and data do not support that open schools worsen existing spikes driven by other sources (workplaces and in the community).
- The mental, social, and educational impacts on children and reduced ability of parents to work is now a crisis that must be addressed.
- Renowned public health expert Dr. Ashish K. Jha: "Schools need to be bolder about returning to the classroom...There are other things that are far more high risk that we're leaving open while being remote in schools, and that doesn't make any sense.... [T]he idea that schools should be the first casualty, before casinos, bars, and restaurants, in my mind defies logic." <https://www.edweek.org/ew/articles/2020/11/03/schools-need-to-be-bolder-about-reopening.html>

- **Remove statewide mandates and county-level metrics and replace them with guidelines that will allow for tailored community-level approaches.**

- We are out of alignment with 42 other states that have guidelines rather than mandates. Oregon's overly blunt mandates are prolonging closures and harming every age student, from early learners to high school students who need support in their journeys to higher education.

- **Collaborate with parents to track and share outcome data related to distance learning.**

- School districts must be transparent about reporting enrollment data, student engagement information, grading outcomes and attendance in order to allow parents to make informed decisions about in-person versus remote options.

- **Discuss the impact of the looming expiration of the FFCRA (employer paid leave) on December 31st.**

- Schools will likely reopen in hybrid models. Families must understand how state lawmakers will support Oregon's families and parents.

My name is Andrea Timm. I live in Bend, Oregon and both my children are a part of the Bend Lapine School District. I am writing to you in a plea to open the schools back up. I have been with my children every day through this distance learning and now can say without a doubt that I am watching my children deteriorate. After only a few weeks of this, we have already begun to experience emotional problems. My 3rd grade daughter out of the blue told me that she hates school. A 3rd grader should never utter those words. I consider our family lucky because I am able to be home with them to guide them through this experience, but despite that fact, she hates it. I can tell you that there are many other children feeling the same way.

Apart from the emotional health of my own children, I can't stop thinking about all of the other children in this state that do not have the same resources. I have a family member that is an educational assistant for a kindergarten class in another school district. She has told me that there are several children that she's online everyday that don't have any adult supervision whatsoever. Their only supervision is their 2nd or 3rd grade sibling. How could you possibly justify ruining the lives of hundreds of thousands of children this way? There are several studies that have come out stating not only is this virus less deadly for children than flu but also how keeping children out of school will severely impact their well being. They also state that school openings have not resulted in an increase of deadly cases or outbreaks. I would source all of them for you, but I can guarantee that you have seen them all, and are choosing to ignore them. I know based on replies people have received from you that are people urging for schools to remain closed. I want to know if any of these people are the pediatricians or scientists that have all said schools should not be closed; or are they simply choosing to ignore the science.

I also don't understand how in a world where we are acutely aware of the gap between the wealthy and those without that you can continue to ignore what this is doing to children who are minorities and children that come from poor families. You know full well that they are being completely left behind with CDL with little chance of catching up. Aside from being left behind in their education, more children are now being exposed to increased child abuse, starvation, and who even knows what else. Dear Gov. Kate Brown and School Board, OHA, and Commissioners, PPS superintendents,

We applaud your work to keep Oregon safe, however we would like to add to the voices for opening schools. The new scientific evidence as well as data coming in from all over the country shows the **safety and necessity of opening schools**. The suicide rate is up, kids are struggling, parents are struggling, and you are opening BOWLING ALLEYS and every special interest that knocks. Here is another special interest: **The interest of our future generation.**

In no way is it ideal for a child to sit staring at a screen for 5+ hours per day. I have been to NYC (Brooklyn) in September where life is going on as usual. People all wear masks at all times. Kindergarteners wear masks like champions. I'm tired of hearing the excuse that kids don't know how to social distance- YOU TEACH THEM!

Physicians from all over the country are sending their kids back to school because they know the BENEFIT OUTWEIGHS THE RISK, and this principle is how you make decisions in society. **Below are some of the comments from my Physician's COVID group on facebook: (And these are just the latest ones of HUNDREDS of comments in this regard):**

We have been in school since August. K through 12 masks full-time. We have had no confirmed school spread. Initially we were sending home close contacts but out of everyone that was sent home for 14 days none of them turned positive. Now the close contacts stay as long as everyone is 100% masked which is our school policy. My kids report they get in trouble if they don't have their masks on. We have sporting events with limited attendance. Masks are required for all spectators. Even on the volleyball bench the reserves remain masked as do coaches. As a state our positivity rate is terrible.. The spread that has been confirmed is related to non-school sanctioned events.

My 7th and 5th graders have been back full time since the beginning of the school year. So far we have not had reported cases in the elementary or high school. My son plays football and my daughter does gymnastics 5 days a week. I am doubtful this is going to last as our rates are starting to climb but my children do much better in person rather than online. My husband and i work full time and we just cant stay at home.

I'm in IA. Full time school since late august. Masks all day except lunch. A few cases since the start but supposedly none traced to in school transmission. Currently 13% positivity in community and hospitals pretty full the last 3 weeks

I'm in WI with 20% positive rates and so far no in school spread. K-8 full time since early sept masks aside from snack, lunch, recess and cohorts in the classroom

I'm in Texas, in our school district, kids under age 10 aren't required to wear masks in classrooms, this has been my biggest deterrent in sending my 7 yr old back to school. I'm curious to hear that no masks are required in cohorts in the classroom for your schools yet there haven't been spread.

No we are just in cohorts in the classroom to lessen who might be quarantined if exposed, but masks are required. Are the kids perfect at masking ? No. (I know because our second grade teacher does a lot of pictures) But my kids are great at it and have the happy masks which have great filtration so with that and low risk of kids having complications from covid and likely my kids would only be exposed to a "low dose" at school by using their masks. It makes me more comfortable. 4K-8th all have same mask requirements. No medics exemption for asthma. Only special needs kids get exemptions

We are in MI and in school full time and going well so far. I definitely see kids' mental health improving since being back. I was seeing some struggling teens and having the routine and social interactions seems to be having a positive effect.

Both kids in elementary, full time, masked.

They have created bubbles of 10 kids- they can do socially distanced In class activities with kids in that bubble only. They do not come in contact with any other kids in their or any other class.

They remain in their classrooms for lunch. Playground structure are closed but they can Get some fresh air in open football field for PE/ recess

No parents/ visitors or contractor allowed on campus during school days

Cafeteria is closed- home food only

Texas- we have been in school full time since mid August... 100% masked prek3-8th. No cases.

Elementary is full time and fully masked and socially distanced of 3 feet. Lunch and outdoor recess are unmasked. It is going really well for my 1st grader. (School started a week late on August 17th). No cases linked to being spread at the schools. Most cases are high school related and again not spread in the school. Middle and high school are hybrid model and socially distanced is 6 feet.

Also in WI w high rates right now, but our k-8 kids are doing well. High schools not doing as

well, but i can't help but think they're spreading it after school hours.

Definitely in person learning. Virtually was a disaster for us (1st and 4th graders). Have been in school since Aug 10 (NE suburb of Orlando,FL) and have not had a single closure all year!! Had first field trip to St. Augustine yesterday and it was wonderful!
Kids are doing great, much better than virtual.

We have been back 5 days a week since mid august at our private school and my kids r thriving. My friends whose kids r in public school 2 days a week r struggling, hate it, depressed. It's a wise investment during this time period

we have XXXX in private school. Which we never anticipated private school but they have been full school since August and have been successful with keep kids safe. They allowed us to do virtual for the first 4 weeks but most students went back on time. We are blessed that the school is honest they do alert the class/pod that has a positive or suspected case and that pods is quarantined. They spray the playgrounds each day. They have sanitizer and handwashing all over. The children wear mask and during gnome activities they have on a visor. The desk are separated. They still have rug time and they read in small groups. The only down part is that her private school is not diverse. And when a student gets covid or class has to quarantine them they do virtual learning. And its just 2.5 hours of actual screen time each day. She is 6 in the first grade. We are understand school can close at anytime

We feel so blessed to have our kids in Private schools, all day, every day, in-person. The option to attend every class live online, if sick, so you don't fall behind, has been a blessing. Everyone masked full time. All desks spaced out, recess outside, lunch with restrictions. K-8 building has about 450 kids, open since 8/31, only 2 cases. People stay home if sick because of the live, virtual option and they don't build up make-up work. High school has more like 1000 kids, plus sports, and only 12 cases since 8/31. My pediatrician take-home has been that if you can get a safety plan in place that people are honest about and follow and which doesn't punish you for staying home sick, it's good to be in school. I've been pleasantly surprised at the capability to accomplish this.

We struggled with this decision over the summer and ended up putting our first grader in private school full time in person. It has been wonderful for him and he is learning tons. I now feel he may have to stay there for the rest of elementary because he will likely be far ahead of his public school peers who are only in school 2 days a week. He also needs the social interaction. I can't imagine him home full time.

My almost 9 year old attends in person 5 days a week since mid-August at her Catholic school and we are very impressed. The school has a COVID board who met for several months prior to opening and are following the Dept of Health recommendations closely. Temps are checked, everyone is masked, parents not allowed into school except by appt, etc. They

offered this track or a robust distance learning track. There have been a few cases (not in her class), and when kids stay home, they flex to the distance learning track, then back to the classroom once the quarantine time is done. Our daughter has also been pleased with this plan, and that says a lot (she's like a mini-Fauci). Twin Cities, MN

My kids have been going to in person school since August, catholic, had a 10 day quarantine for both because one had fever. Had a total of 4 cases of covid in 500 person school. Only that class quarantined for 14 days. The rest of the school stays open.

Mine are young 4 and 6 and in person school is critical at this age for us.

We are in private —I am very impressed how smoothly it has gone so far. Lots of thought went into mitigation strategies by the school and it has paid off.

WE have had months to prepare, buy HEPA filters (Ask parents to donate), buy masks for teachers, open windows, plan cohorts, and get our kids back. Nothing is happening in Oregon except special interests get what they want. My kids are playing soccer and indoor volleyball- how is that different from attending school? Multiple studes show that schools don't drive spikes.

Here is a letter we got from the school board, I wish to address a few points in BOLD:

Thank you for your thoughtful email to the State Board of Education. Your comments will be included in Public Comments for the November 19, 2020 State Board of Education meeting. You may access meeting materials here.[SBE Meeting BoardBook](#). While this is not an Oregon State Board of Education decision (there are multiple entities who are revisiting the school metrics before decisions are jointly made), the State Board of Education has received a large volume of public comments regarding Oregon's current metrics and experiences with comprehensive distance learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Some messages received are from parents struggling as they attempt to provide guidance to their child while maintaining employment, or seeing their child's frustration due to technology or curriculum challenges. Many comments express concern about the impact on black, indigenous, Latino/a/x, special education students and students experiencing houselessness. We have heard from teachers who see and understand the challenges their students are facing. We have heard a number of concerns expressed by students as to why their family can go to a restaurant where others gather, observe safe distance, sanitation and mask wearing, though students currently cannot gather at school under those same precautions. We have also heard from parents, and teachers alike, asking that the metrics continue to be maintained until Oregon sees stability in the COVID-19 case rates and in-person instruction is determined to be safe for students, teachers, and staff. We cannot ignore this pandemic is still very much a reality. COVID-19 infection rates are on the rise again across Oregon. In the first week of October, we experienced our

highest daily case count. Today, there are 360 cases among children age 0 – 9, and 800 cases among children age 10 – 19.

This is a pandemic. There will be cases. Currently the mortality rate for school age children is less than that of the flu. [39 deaths in age 5-14, pop 41 million] ([cdc.gov](https://www.cdc.gov)) We cannot prevent every case of this virus by closing schools indefinitely. The first clinical trials of the vaccine just started! It takes a year at least to analyze all the data!

We have had to implement quarantines in some schools due to positive COVID-19 cases. These quarantines cause instability in education models and force parents to find childcare for children who may have been exposed to COVID-19, often times with little notice. We cannot ignore that “Children aged <10 years can transmit SARS-CoV-2 in school settings, but less is known about COVID-19 incidence, characteristics, and health outcomes among school-aged children (aged 5–17 years) with COVID-19.” **They do very well. See CDC website. Most of the transmission is happening with outside activities.**

To ignore the evidence of transmission rates of COVID-19 in schools in other parts of the country, where there has been widespread reopening, is to put the safety and health of students, teachers, staff and their families at risk. **Most of the country is opening schools because they recognize the risk:benefit ratio for opening schools is favorable to opening. Texas and NY doesn't have a secret agenda to kill all students and teachers.**

We cannot ignore that in-person learning means - unlike restaurants, grocery stores or similar businesses - groups of students, from different households, gathering in close proximity for long periods of time. **You can make smaller spaced out groups like other states. Where is your innovation? You have had MONTHS to work on this! Excuses are in abundance. Where is your THINKING OUTSIDE THE BOX?**

We follow the impacts of COVID-19 closely alongside the Oregon Health Authority, which provides advice and expertise on when and how it is safe to be in-person in schools. **What qualifies the Oregon to make the strictest metrics in the US and apply them to all schools?**

The State Board supports continuation of Oregon's metrics, which align with CDC metrics issued in mid-September. Only four states have ordered all schools to provide in-person instruction. Forty-Six states offer metric requirements or guidance, as does Oregon. Oregon has the fourth lowest COVID-19 case rate per million in the nation with 8,660. **Only Oregon schools are completely shuttered. Oregon has the 4th lowest case rate and the lowest percentage of kids in school. The daycares have been open since March!**

Together, we can continue to reduce case rates by consistently wearing face coverings, maintaining physical distance, implementing strong personal hygiene and disinfecting spaces, and avoiding gathering with people with whom you do not live. These measures will reduce community spread and help us to open schools to in-person instruction with stability. **This is a GIVEN. Make a universal mask mandate and get back to work and school! Doctors have been working this entire pandemic, as have nurses, bus drivers, restaurant workers, grocery workers, and people who clean COVID hospital rooms.**

This is a very challenging situation.....Thank you, again, for taking the time to share your

comments with us. *Oregon achieves . . . together!* Lisa Pinheiro Interim Board

Dear Oregon Department of Education:

I am writing you today to ask you to please move forward in getting our children back to in person classes as soon as possible. They desperately need it for their physical and mental well-being. My daughter is a sophomore at Tualatin High School. I have a son who just entered college at Florida State University. He was a senior at Tualatin last year.

My daughter is each day participating in online learning. She is making the best of it and is committed to her studies. She is on zoom calls sitting at her desk all day that at one point she was complaining of back pains so I went out to buy her a good support office chair. She is lacking the social interaction so badly needed, the in person classes to help better understand the subject plus just exercise from walking from class to class and lunch time with friends. I insist that she goes and exercise each night by running (She now runs up to 4 to 7 miles a day to eliminate the stress of the day). I also make her arrange something with her friends each week. I do see how she is becoming a recluse because of the situation and I am the one who is suggesting the small gatherings with friends and this child is normally a very social child. Everything else is open here so schools must begin as well. I can spend hours exposed to many people shopping at malls or stores or eating in restaurants with no restrictions on time spent at each location. I am sure there is a safe way for our kids to get back to school.

OCAA finally approved my daughter's sideline cheer practices (no contact) and the TTSD approved it as well so thank goodness practice begins this week. We are just hoping and praying that basketball and football season can start so they have someone to cheer for. These sports are the highlights of the children's week and they must continue. They need this outlet to properly function. Please see this through so that our children can have these much needed activities for their physical and mental well-being.

It makes no sense that U of O and OSU can participate in football so the high schools should be able as well. You are sending mixed messages by doing so. That is unfair to our children when they see it happening at the college level. They wonder why are they being punished?

On the other hand as stated my son goes to college in Florida. I am 61 years old and I have traveled there 8 hours on a plane sitting right next to a stranger to get him there with getting no COVID. I traveled all over the city and college getting no COVID. Of course, I took the necessary safety precautions. Most of Florida is now open with all bars and restaurants as well. My son has frequented many of them having large numbers of people in attendance and him getting no COVID. He went to a FSU college football game and got no COVID. He has been tested several times with negative results. He is taking the necessary precautions so he is fine. His friends who got it had very mild symptoms and recovered quickly.

I have watched Florida's public elementary and high schools very closely. In Florida, starting in

August most of schools have been opened 5 days a week along with their sport programs. There have been very few cases or spikes showing that they have been able to open schools safely and successfully. My good friend in Miami, one of the hot spots in the country, told me that her high school daughter just started going to public school this week for 5 days a week, the last county to open. How is Florida able to do this but not Oregon when we have far lower number of cases, hospitalizations and deaths than Florida?!? There is no logical explanation for this.

The metrics set for Oregon are not reasonable! It is like your goal is to never have the children go back to school with these unrealistic numbers. Both Washington and California have lower metrics and they had more cases!! They both have some students at schools as well. Why is Oregon stopping our children dead in their tracks. They will lose out!

I know you are aware that so many other states have their schools open as well as their sport programs. They have figured out a way to do it safely and successfully. Both Maryland and Colorado just recently reversed their decision to allow athletes to play. Other college football leagues have now reversed their decisions to play.

I worry about my high school daughter as I feel she will NOT be prepared or be accepted to a high ranking college because of this on line learning. I know with my son how competitive it is to get into a high ranking college. FSU is ranked 18th in the country. Over 60,000 students applied and only 6,000 got accepted. That is how competitive it is! I have signed up my daughter to be part of the 2 day in person hybrid through TTSD school district which we are hoping will begin around the first week of November. Can we at least try that to begin with? It would be a start.

Sports need to start and continue. Athletes are leaving and moving to other states that allow their sports. Look at the extremes people are taking so their children can play sports and go to in person school. They see how important it is to their children. Many children in Oregon are doing club sports since schools earlier were not allowing them. This is not fair to the underprivileged who cant afford these costly club activities. The public school system is all about inclusion and by schools not allowing sports is excluding underprivileged kids from not participating. Then on the other hand these kids who are participating in club sports, you are NOT hearing reports of spikes in positive cases so kids are able to play safely with the necessary precautions.

I have seriously thought of moving my daughter to Florida. Why should I have to leave Oregon to have my child get the best education and to be able to participate in sports. Our athletes who stay are missing out on scholarships as well. All of this is detrimental to our children. Does Oregon want that to happen? You have the power to make a change and a difference in our children's lives. Please make it happen for their sake.

As a middle school teacher here in Oregon, I ask for the sake of our communities that you listen to the science on covid.

Dear Mr. Gill and the Board of Education,

I am frustrated and angry that Oregon is not prioritizing in-person learning for our children. There is enough data coming in that shows that it IS possible to get students back in the classroom safely, and that it is VERY important to do so in order to end the damage being created by isolating children at home. It may have made sense in the beginning when little was known about the virus and how to protect ourselves to keep children at home, but now it is obvious that Distance Learning is NOT an adequate substitute and our children are suffering unnecessarily.

The current metrics are ridiculously strict and make no sense across the state. If cases increase on a college campus in Eugene, that should not affect my children in Beaverton. Similarly with a workplace, prison, or nursing home outbreak. Please start using common sense and recent data to find a safe solution for students to get back into the classroom as soon as possible. The hybrid model was already developed and organized by many (most?) districts so they are ready to go as soon as you will let them. I know it's not easy, but leaders across the country have recognized that it's worth the effort - it's time for Oregon to do the same.

When officials address the topic of getting kids back in the building, I hear "cases are rising!" and there are "outbreaks at schools that have opened!" and "we have to keep the schools closed to keep everyone safe!". These statements are packed with threats and fear but are not packed with detail and information, therefore, they are no longer valid reasons to justify the school closures.

The term 'outbreak' doesn't explain what is really happening - what percent of cases in a population is considered an outbreak? Did the students or staff in a school contract COVID-19 from someone in the school or was it from their family/community? Were the safety measures followed? These are important details.

In terms of "cases are rising", it is important to note WHERE the cases are rising and does that really make a difference in communities miles and miles apart? Again, if the prison in Umatilla has an increase in COVID-19 cases, why should that affect my kids in Beaverton?

The message that "keeping schools closed keeps everyone safe" puts way too much reliance on our children as the only tool for slowing the spread of COVID-19. Schools in fact are NOT the primary way that COVID-19 could spread and that is evidenced by the Brown University study. Keeping kids out of school comes at too high of a cost anyway.

PLEASE stand up for the children you are meant to serve. It is becoming cruel what Oregon is doing to its young people and it no longer makes sense.

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Liability Concerns with Reopening Schools

Dear Members of the Governor's Healthy Schools Re-Opening Council:

I am a mother of three, a lawyer, and have now become an advocate to safely reopen our schools. I'm also an Admin for a Facebook group, Clack to School, that now has nearly 4,000 members. We also spawned multiple other groups, and in our region alone we have nearly 9,000 members. These are teachers, parents, special needs advocates, students, and medical professionals. We are data-driven and science-based. We also share our stories, because even anecdotal evidence has a place in the reopening schools conversation.

We believe the science has evolved and now study after study show that schools can safely reopen. Now. Many other studies also demonstrate the significant and known harm of continuing to keep our schools shuttered. Our page (facebook.com/groups/clacktoschool) has been posting these articles and I encourage you to take a look.

I am aware that one of the more pressing concerns is what to do about liability. I consulted with several lawyers in our group and we offer the following framework that could help protect our schools from frivolous and expensive lawsuits and claims.

OTCA (Oregon Tort Claims Act)

- The OTCA already provides immunity for public bodies for a wide variety of matters. It currently provides that as long as a public body and its officers and employees act within their scope of employment or duties, they are immune from liability for a host of claims. ORS 30.256(6).
- You could add to this statutory framework an additional layer of specific claim protection: “any claim arising out of the COVID-19 global pandemic, or contraction of the COVID-19 virus by any person.” ORS 30.256(6)(g).
- If you want to go even further and protect non-profits and other organizations that provide services in the schools (such as after-care providers), you could add: “The immunity provided by subsection (6)(g) of this section shall also apply to any private, non-profit, or charitable organization that provides services to the public on behalf of any public body, or under contract with any public body during any time period in which an emergency order is in place related to the COVID-19 global pandemic, including but not limited to goods and services provided to schools and child care facilities.”¹
- Using a belt and suspenders approach, language could be strengthened showing that no liability will be found unless the plaintiff can demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the school acted with “wanton, reckless, willful, or intentional misconduct.”

Worker's Compensation

In speaking with a worker's compensation attorney here in Oregon, we are aware that SAIF, for example, has been readily accepting COVID claims. This, despite the case law that although worker's comp covers

¹ It is worth nothing that child care facilities have been open for months all over Oregon, without any evidence of any kind of significant spread, and they have **not** these kind of liability protections in place.

illness and diseases, they are historically challenging for the plaintiff to prove transmission occurred at work. But, it appears that SAIF's current position (and that of other carriers) is that the COVID claims are relatively inexpensive to pay out, so they have not been fighting them. We do not believe the threat of worker's comp poses much of a hurdle to safely returning to school.

Insurance

If the concern is that schools' insurance carriers will not cover COVID claims, that again has a fix in the legislature, specifically ordering carriers in this State to extend coverage protection to schools against COVID claims.

Waivers/Assumptions of Risk

As so many other businesses that are operating right now have already figured out, waivers offer strong deterrent protection. They are not fullproof, for sure, but they present one additional layer of deterrence to a potential claim. And I guarantee you that most parents who want to send their kids back to in-person learning would readily sign a waiver.

Opt-Outs

We are asking for a **choice**. We do not want to go back to school as it was pre-COVID. We expect reasonable safety precautions to be in place, as most districts have already demonstrated through their reopening plans that follow ODE/OHA guidelines.

At the same time, we do not want to take away online for anyone – teachers and students alike. We expect that once schools reopen, many teachers and students will continue with the online model (indeed, many districts required parents and teachers to commit to one model for the whole year). Depending on which poll you look at, it may be that only half of the students and teachers are ready and willing to go back. They should have that choice. There are employment laws already in place to protect those public education employees who are most vulnerable, and they should be allowed to continue teaching in home.

But do not impose one model on everyone. It's already proven to be unworkable and causing untold harms on so many. Indeed, while no child has died from COVID in Oregon, there have been three children commit suicide in just the last several weeks. Oregon already has one of the highest teen suicide rates in the country. That is not going down the longer you keep them out of school.

Our ultimate ask is this:

- Revise the metrics so they are more reasonable, attainable, and in line with our neighboring states.
- Make the metrics guidance only; not a mandate.
- Return local control to the districts and schools to decide when and how to reopen, and what to do when there is a case.

Since the day my children were born I knew there was a risk EVERYTIME we were to go in public, to a family gathering, to daycare, to church, to school, or to the grocery store of them catching an illness or spreading an illness I didn't know they were carrying . I've always known this. All parents know this. Even the Governor knows this. There is ALWAYS a risk of our children catching some illness. I haven't even touched on the academic side of this chaos. For now I will keep the focus on mental health because I believe that is the greatest risk as of now.

Governor Brown the lasting effects of what mental state you have put the entire state of Oregon into will now and always outweigh the damage that Covid could ever do. I am begging and pleading that you please give the districts and the parents back the power to decide what is best for our children. You and your handful of health advisors can't begin to fathom the emotional torture you are casting on the people you are supposed to lead. Right now we are living in Oregon's Great Depression and I am not talking financially. I am talking about the mental health of Oregon!

Dear Jerome Colonna,

I'm writing to share my story as a mother of two children in the Bend-La Pine School District in Central Oregon in hopes of returning our kids to school. Due to covid-19, I am working from home full time. My husband is a firefighter and will sometimes work extra days, so I am a single mom at least 74 hours a week. The position I am put in as a parent to try to help my two children with school is exceedingly difficult. The teachers have done an excellent job laying out what needs to be done, however when my son is not in a meeting he doesn't understand the list of things he needs to accomplish. This is left to me to do. Sadly, I can't help him because I'm either in meetings all day, or trying to work. When I am able to help him, I'm very stressed about the neglect to my job and possible repercussions. My daughter is older and able to deal with school, but I know how sad she is without her friends and the athletic activities she enrolls in. She has always been a happy girl, but these days I see her sadness. She keeps telling me she wants to get back to school and how much she misses her friends. Because of covid my employer has cut back hours for many (including myself for 4 months) and I especially feel the need to work as hard as I can so that my hours are not removed. This daily scenario is not sustainable for our mental and physical health. My children's education is suffering. My performance at my job is suffering.

I believe very fervently that children need to get back into school! The CDC specifically recommends that the detriment of children not being in school far outweighs any damage that covid-19 can do. [See this link for more information.](#) More information about safely reopening can be found [here](#). The CDC says "**While some children have been sick with COVID-19, adults make up nearly 95% of reported COVID-19 cases. As of July 21, 2020, 6.6% of reported COVID-19 cases and less than 0.1% of COVID-19-related deaths are among children and adolescents.**"

Of course no one wants children to die, but isn't it far worse to see the depression on a much larger number of children's faces from being isolated at home, or the stress they are picking up from not understanding their school work, or from seeing their parents fall apart trying to make things work in an economy that is suffering, or those children who are left home alone, or the kids who feel stupid because they just can't get the system down, or the children whose parents are getting divorced because they can't make it through this year, or the abuse and suicide cases?

The CDC states "During the H1N1 pandemic (April 15, 2009 to October 2, 2010), 358 pediatric deaths were reported to CDC. So far in this pandemic, deaths of children are less than in each of the last five flu seasons, with only 64." School was not shut down then, nor is it shut down for flu season.

I don't like it when people complain, but don't offer solutions, so my solutions are as follows:

- At the very least, bring the students back to rotating days where one week they go to 3 days of school, then the next week they go to 2 days of school, etc. (rather

than just 2 days of school a week). Maximize the time the children are in class so they are with their peers and get face to face time with teachers.

- I sympathize that not everyone has the same comfort level at this time, so if a teacher does not feel safe in the classroom then my suggestion is to hire long term substitutes and offer a health leave of absence to the teacher. I'm sure there are plenty of subs out there who would very much appreciate the extra work.
- Children who are at high risk can continue with online work at home until a vaccine can get out to the populous, or Deschutes County covid numbers are low enough. They can do the online course that many students have already opted for.
- Our isolated county should not be held to state-wide metrics. Let the 4-12th graders at least reopen with the same metrics as k-3rd grades. According to current standards, our older children will not get back into school this year! It's devastating to offer no hope to our older children!

Thank you for your time and for thoughtfully considering what I have to say. I am imploring you to take measures to bring health back to the children of Bend-La Pine schools by attending to their mental well being above the miniscule risk to their physical health via covid-19. Their mental health is a much larger crisis right now!

Dear Mr. Gill and Mr. Sidelinger and the Board of Education,
I am writing to you about an issue of burning importance to many parents and children in this state- getting kids back to school buildings in person. I have followed the opening metrics closely, since March when schools shut down. To think that my 2 children and thousands of other kids in this state have not attended school in 8 months, in person, is truly mind boggling. 8 months of my kids isolated at home, trying to teach themselves math and a variety of other subjects, telling us that they are depressed and hate learning online. "This isn't school" is what they say. My son is missing his senior year- his college counseling, the social supports he needs, and many other huge milestones and important elements of getting him to college.

Yet it doesn't feel like policy makers on this issue feel the same urgency we do, despite the well documented harms of keeping kids out of school. No other country, indeed, no other state, has kept as many kids out of school as a percent of the population as Oregon has. Nearly every other state (Puerto Rico is one exception and is all CDL, I believe) has gotten kids back in person at least part of the week. Last week at the ODE board meeting, Director Gill said that just 6% of kids in Oregon were receiving any in person schooling. 6%. That is not a number to be proud of. The justification for Oregon's failure on this important measure is contained in the below language from the OHA's page on returning to schools.

"Any in-person model risks spreading COVID-19. Re-opening salons, in-person dining and large gatherings all added to the risk of new cases. Modeling shows that closing schools could prevent 2-4% of deaths from COVID-191 , less than other social distancing measures. However, a July 13, 2020 study2 by the Institute for Disease Modeling, Bellevue, Washington demonstrated that, unless community spread is reduced, reopening schools to in-person instruction, even with protective measures like physical distancing and face coverings, will cause significant 1 Lancet Child Adolescent Health. 2020 May;4(5):397-404. 2https://covid.idmod.org/data/Schools_are_not_islands_we_must_mitigate_community_transmission_to_reopen_schools.pdf Issued: 07.28.2020 growth of the epidemic. A June 2020 study3 by REL Mid-Atlantic noted that opening schools to in-person instruction, "...is likely to result in increased infection among children, teachers and support staff, although several of the mitigation strategies can substantially reduce the number of infections."

The studies cited here are from **July**. I firmly believe- and a growing body of evidence supports- that they are outdated and not based on newer, better science. You are making decisions to keep Oregon's schools closed based on outdated studies that have not held up, that were based on modeling and not on actual data. I am including at the bottom of this email citations to 5 other studies showing the opposite, that schools can be reopened safely without causing surges in Covid spread. And I could cite another 15. **These studies are more recent, based on better data gathered after we better understood how to contain spread, and are not hypothetical. They are not models.** These rates are based on testing kids and teachers in schools that have reopened, many of them in states that have more Covid than Oregon. The rates of Covid post opening have stayed well below .2% in school populations. The NYT today published an article showing very low rates in reopened schools (28 positives out of 16,298 tests).

We have the 4th lowest Covid rate in the country, yet the fewest kids back in school as a percent of our population, and essentially unattainable metrics for reopening. This is wrong on

every conceivable front.

Oregon's Department of Education and the Oregon Health Authority claim to care about Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, yet kids of color and low-income kids are being harmed disproportionately by school closures, as are women and of course women of color. Not only are these children's educations suffering more due to predictable issues of lack of parental time or academic support, and poor access to internet, shuttering school buildings in low income neighborhoods is disastrous for multiple reasons- nutritionally, for healthy physical activity, for mental health reasons, and because schools create cohesion in communities. The homicide rate in outer Southeast Portland North Portland has sky rocketed- closing schools cannot possibly be helping. Last, I have never seen my peers and colleagues so disappointed in Portland as a city and Oregon as a state. So many people I know are talking about leaving and going to states where their kids can go to school. Many already have. I know at least 10 people who have withdrawn their kids from PPS because their child cannot deal with the stress and chaos of online learning and the quality of content they are getting isn't worth the mental stress on the family and the time to manage it all. Our state is not doing its job in getting kids back to school. My family values education enormously, as do most families. My dad was the first in his family to go to college. Their other grandfather left school in 8th grade. Both of those grandparents-all of them, actually- told our kids that education always comes first, above sports, friends, anything else. My kids believed them. I wish I could say I had the same faith that all of you believed the same thing. Please, put Oregon's children ahead of adult political maneuvering and get them back in school. The science supports reopening schools safely.

Dear Oregon State Board of Directors,

Despite our continued struggle with the COVID-19 pandemic, Oregon has been cautiously reopening. Restaurants, shops, bars, salons, gyms, daycares, preschools, swimming pools, and indoor playgrounds are all open and following safety measures guided by scientific consensus. But one place has been conspicuously absent from reopening: public schools. Our children have not attended school in-person for months and most will have to [wait much longer](#).

This continued lack of in-person learning is a game changer. Distance learning requires children to spend hours each day in front of their computers, and remote classrooms do not allow them to socialize easily with their peers. Our schools' essential task of teaching our children how to be empowered individuals in a diverse society cannot be done online.

Worryingly, there is [increasing evidence](#) that the stress caused by remote learning has already had a negative impact on children's physical and mental health, contributed to a loss of important skills, and limited their social development. These impacts are not necessarily just short-term: the lack of in-person school may [increase their risk](#) for chronic health conditions and [lower their future economic prospects](#). Their families and caregivers are suffering as well, and these consequences are felt disproportionately by our [students and families of color and by those experiencing poverty](#).

[Recent expert guidance](#) strongly recommends that we do everything we can to safely educate our students in-person. And schools have been open all over the country for months now with encouraging safety [data](#) that suggests that they have not been a major source of COVID-19 spread. Even in states like [Florida](#), where COVID-19 cases per capita and positivity rates are at much higher levels than here in Oregon, schools have not been implicated in major outbreaks as feared.

[Oregon's school reopening metrics](#) go well beyond our neighbors in [California](#) and [Washington](#) and give students a minimal chance to return to school in-person despite this encouraging data. Common sense safety measures like wearing face coverings, frequent hand-washing, and social distancing work, and despite initial fears that school reopenings would result in major spread of COVID-19 cases, our country's experience tells us otherwise.

Our children both attend Cooper Mountain Elementary School in Beaverton. Even though it has been operating remotely for months, it is not sitting empty. Much like several other area schools, Cooper Mountain permits a [private daycare](#) to use the site to host learners from K - 6th grade. While physically at school, students instead learn remotely rather than receive instruction from their teachers. Fortunately, excellent safety protocols are in place, and we've had no large outbreaks amongst those children and staff. But how can anyone not be stunned to see our schools being used in this way?

We support public education and our teachers, but we are making a mistake by continuing with remote learning alone. If we don't open schools to in-person learning soon, we'll continue to fail the most vulnerable members of our community. We now have data to support that it is possible to do so safely. We strongly urge that the Board, ODE, OHA, and Governor Brown adjust Oregon's metrics for school reopening to be more in line with our West Coast neighbor states in order to facilitate increased in-person learning across the state.

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Hello,

My name is Emily Dayton. I am a parent of two daughters, one is in 2nd grade and the other is 4 years old. My husband and I settled in Oregon nearly 14 years ago, enjoying its natural beauty and general social progressiveness. I grew up in Pennsylvania and my husband in Scotland. Things have been tough with the corona virus, very tough. I am now unemployed, due to the school closures, as I must stay home with my children. I am generally very supportive of the Democratic governor and government of Oregon, and have consistently voted Democratic on every occasion and issue. On only one issue so far have I found common ground with some Republican or right-leaning organizations and individuals. That is the recent issue of enforced school closures in Oregon due to the coronavirus.

Something isn't right in Oregon anymore. Decisions are being made that do not make sense. These decisions are regarding the closure of schools. My 2nd grade child loved school, now she can barely remember it. Time lines are long for children, a term, a year away from school for a young child is like an eternity. Going to school is hazy, an increasingly distant memory in her mind. Online school has very little value, she only logs on to it as she is desperate for some sort of communication with peers and with a teacher. She tries, but learns little and most of the time is wasted on technological problems and glitches. What does she see on the screen? Tiny faces, blurred images of her peers, many of whom are lined up with masks at long tables in childcare facilities. At these facilities they are helped by adult staff to keep them logged into their zoom classes, they are spaced out from peers at tables. After zoom "school" they recreate together outside under controlled conditions following Covid guidelines. But, their parents must pay large amounts of money for them to be there. Why can't they be at school? Why can't they be spaced out, masked, looked after by trained adults at school? They can use the ample outdoor spaces that are normal for most school grounds to move some activities outdoors. This is what many European countries, and many other states are doing. I am considering just removing her from her school as an enrolled student soon. Her needs are not being respected by the State of Oregon, or by our local school board. Neither are the needs of any other young student. The screen light is affecting her sleep, and the experience of this is causing a mental depression. What are the alternatives for us? If I was wealthy, I could try to get her into one of the local private schools that are offering in-person instruction. But we are now firmly lodged in a very low income bracket, under \$30,000/year for a family of four, thanks to me leaving my job due to school closure.

I hear about the school situation in Pennsylvania, as I have school-aged relatives there. In their area, near Pittsburgh, Covid rates are as high as they are here, and yet many districts are operating on a hybrid or even full open schedule. Yes, cases have occurred, and will occur, in schools, and then procedures are in place to deal with that. Classes are in pods, so do not mix with other classes, so if a case occurs only that class needs to stay home for a period of time. This is what many states are doing. This is practical. This is reality. Usually school-related outbreaks are small in number, and can be dealt with in an orderly fashion, without widespread panic and loss of function. Most parents in the population recognize this, and can do reasonable risk assessment concerning our children. In Scotland, where we have many school-aged nieces and nephews, similar procedures are in place. There have been multiple occasions of Coronavirus outbreaks in schools, as neglecting to reopen schools in the fall was not considered to be an option. When a case, or an exposure is detected, the affected class will stay home for a period of weeks. Testing and tracing take place. The whole school does not close. And these schools are operating under full schedules, with masks but not reduced class sizes. Can Scotland compare to Oregon? Yes, the size and population are very similar, the only difference is that recent

infection rates in Scotland are much higher than they are in Oregon. Another difference? Scotland, as well as most other states, and most other developed countries, have seen that closing schools to children is destructive, unwise, and in denial of reality. It is harmful, shameful and cowardly that our children are forced to bear the heavy load of this virus, due to adult incapacity to change, to think creatively, to accept responsibility for their education. Education should be first, always first. Lower grades should be in school, at least attending under a hybrid schedule, attending school just a few mornings a week would be fine at this point. That way, small groups could be maintained as different grades could be on site at different times. Beautiful, expensively created outdoor spaces around schools could be utilized for as much outdoor time as possible. Young children need to see peers, see a teacher in real life. School closures are harming children.

I have learned that some school buildings in my district, Eugene district 4j, will be soon used by childcare organizations such as the YMCA, as they facilitate the care of children and their education over zoom within educational edifications that are not being used for the purpose of education. This is the height of insanity and absurdity. Why are lesser trained staff of groups like the YMCA, or community centers, more qualified to adhere to Covid 19 guidelines than regular school district staff and teachers would be? These questions need to be answered. Oregonians should be hearing explanations for these questions every day. It is a statewide emergency. People are becoming increasingly outraged, disgusted and dismayed by the lack of leadership on this.

The coronavirus is bad, it is scary. Most of us are scared, and doing our part to stop transmission. My family has cut off nearly all social meetings, certainly any occurring indoors, and have not gone to a restaurant or crowd event since March. But Oregon has gotten this one backwards, bars and tattoo parlors, casinos all are open while schools are closed. That is shameful, that is a blight and an assault on children. That tells children that they are not important enough to do everything we can for them, to make sure that they can be educated at school. It is also in denial of scientific reality. There are a myriad of articles about the ways in which school openings have not lead to superspreading of the virus across this country, including in very 'hot' areas. Similar articles can be found about international rates in schools as well. This virus will continue to be here. Waiting for a vaccine to fix this is not realistic thinking. It may not work, it may take many years. The children of Oregon cannot be left to dangle by their USB cords burning their eyes out on zoom school for years. They will certainly end up unplugged. One year in a young child's life is a very precious and important thing. A whole year of missed school is going to have a very profound effect on their brain development, social development, emotional stability, and upon the economic foundation of their existence, which is their family. Many families I know, including my own are now down to one, solidly low, income. In fact, I am now compelled to visit food pantries and am eligible for the SNAP program. This is helpful, but doesn't it put more pressure on the state? As will a whole class of sub-educated children who are unable to function in a school setting after being denied it for an extended period. Oregon already lags dismally in school graduation rates, do you believe this will help? How long do you think Oregonians will be willing to pay taxes for an educational system that exists in a zoom room? This emergency applies to all children in Oregon, but is especially hard on the lowest grades, and especially to those of us with low SES. Low social economic status is not restricted to any particular racial or ethnic grouping, all populations of race can be found represented within it.

As adults, we need to recognize that this virus is now part of our biome, we don't want it, we will wear masks, and avoid high-moderate risk situations. But our children need us to be much wiser, and to figure

out ways to make sure they go to school in the midst of this virus. There are many examples to look at, practices to imitate. Community centers, private schools have been running summer camps in Oregon for months. There were not a spate of uncontrolled outbreaks related to those programs. Schools can follow the same guidelines. Of course, air filtration must be dealt with immediately, get the schools outfitted with the HEPA filters, they help extraordinarily to filter out tiny particles and exchange air. Students must wear masks, of course they would stay in classroom pods, starting out at just a few hours a day, a few days a week. What about wastewater testing? That is very effective, and underutilized in finding the virus before outbreaks are discovered through other means. If some teachers are too afraid to go to class, find the teachers that are not too afraid. There are many of them. Teachers that want to avoid schools buildings can work in the online setting. Something needs to be done, now. Schools need to be open, this year. Yes, even if college parties continue to spread the virus, and workplace and small gathering-related outbreaks continue to occur. Because they will. It is wildly illogical for young children to be denied an in-person education because of the actions of college-aged students, or adults having parties, or going to bars or strip clubs. This is not reasonable, not logical, it is nonsensical. The state of Oregon now has vastly increased testing capacity, why are we not hearing that this capacity is being specifically used to reopen schools? That is what we should all be hearing. Use it to open schools. Test students, do random testing, test teachers. Get schools open. Create a policy. Why can't the University of Oregon help? They have boasted about the creation of their own tests. Since their students came back, mostly studying online while crowding into student housing, Lane County numbers have shot up. Why must those students be here? They can stay home and study online, elementary aged children cannot study online. It does not work. The reason those students are here is because of economic concerns of the University. So they should use some of their resources to help the elementary aged children of Lane County get back into classrooms. They can expand their boasted-of testing program to young children and elementary teachers, make a commitment to help the younger students of Lane County return to school. Many community members are rather disgusted with them for insisting on their students coming back, which has resulted in a local escalation in the virus numbers. This has reduced the chances young children have of returning to school, which is also ridiculous and based upon adherence to extremely exaggerated metrics. Many of the children of Lane County are the University of Oregon's future students, but that future will not happen if they do not receive a satisfactory elementary education.

I find the phrase "kids are resilient" to be increasingly offensive. It is true to varying degrees depending on the child, but when policy makers and school counselors use it broadly in relation to these closures, it is just a way of saying that they will not personally be willing to take any actions, and indeed they won't need to, because children will just be fine despite terrible circumstances. It flies in the face of all of the recent emphasis in trauma-informed education, where the needs and behaviors of each child should be looked at through a lens of possible past traumas they may have endured. Trauma-informed educational practices view children as having very specific sensitivities, and as being very vulnerable to psychological problems due to stresses and trauma. The 'resilience' of children is not something that is a scientific known, it is comfort self-talk for adults who want to disengage from action that will help children. Keeping children out of school is creating an entire population of traumatized children. Closing the schools has created trauma in their brains. This is abusive. I have called my child's pediatrician with concerns about her sleep, the screens, the depression over loss of contact with school and peers. As a pediatrician, she was alarmed and frightened by the state's decision to enforce extended school closures. She was shocked that this would continue to be the response.

Pleading and begging the public to follow guidelines is a good idea, but it is not a policy or strategy. There comes a point when reality must be faced, we live in country where up to a third of people believe that the virus is not real, and buy into any number of deranged and outlandish conspiracy theories. This virus will not stop by pleading with people in this country. But guess what? Children still need to be, have a right to be, educated by a live human being and a chance to see other living children at school. To have these early years at school is where a sense of community comes from, where it takes root. It is a hard thing to cultivate later. It absolutely cannot be created over a screen. To convince ourselves that somehow online education can in any way measure up to in-person education seems to me to be form of child abuse. We make the decision for them, as it is easier for us to do that, it requires less action, less creativity, and our children suffer from it.

The metrics Oregon is using for reopening schools are too severe. Under them, schools will never open. My family would then have to make a decision to move, because our daughters deserve to go to school. To deny this fact, and persist with these impossible metrics is just as misguided and unwise as the president's continued insistence that the virus will someday just vanish into thin air, or indeed already has. To persist with these school closures, especially for grades k-3, is wrong. It is morally wrong, scientifically unsound and gravely dangerous to the well-being of society.

I need to know, all of Oregon needs to know, what are you doing to reopen schools? Besides begging people to wear masks, most of us already are. What are you doing? How are you studying, learning from other states and countries who are dealing with the same issue, but have schools open, at least partially? What are you doing to upgrade air systems in school buildings? What creative ways are you considering for moving parts of the educational experience outdoors? Who are you consulting when doing this research? In what ways do you feel that keeping schools closed is helping? Examine those thoughts, are they based in fear? We need to be brave, we need to rise to the occasion. This is hard, but there are ways that school can be in session as safely as possible within these circumstances. There are procedures, practices. Several months of data is there from other districts around the country and the world. Look at it. Re-evaluate this. At the end I have copy-pasted an article about Rhode Island, and will include other links.

How Rhode Island did it

This year, some things look different at Raymond C. LaPerche Elementary School, in Smithfield, R.I. At recess, students play tag with pool noodles to stay sufficiently distanced and four square is a no-go (everyone touches the ball). Groups of friends eat lunch together, though they're six feet apart. And students coordinate colorful masks with outfits and sneakers.

"The governor said we're going back, so we've gone back," said Julie Dorsey, the school's principal, keeping one eye on a fidgety fifth-grade class at lunch. "We knew we had to be ready."

Across the state, a majority of students are back in classrooms at least part time, in both public and private schools. In class, masks are mandatory. While many other states have left reopening plans up to individual districts, Rhode Island has [centralized its approach](#).

Early on, Gov. Gina Raimondo put public and private schools on a single calendar to simplify reopening. She opened 14 rapid testing locations exclusively for students and teaching staff, and set up a statewide contact tracing system just for schools.

“These districts aren’t going to be able to do it on their own,” she told The Times. “I have studied the failure of the federal government to lead in this crisis, and I didn’t want that to happen to our cities and towns.”

The governor said she had to weigh risks of infection against permanent gaps in education.

“Is there a risk of spreading the virus by sending kids to school? Yes, obviously, of course,” she said. “But if we work hard enough, we can mitigate that risk substantially.”

“The risk of children being left behind academically, mentally and potentially permanently is 100 percent certain,” she added. “This is the front lines of equity. Who do you think is going to be left behind and permanently hurt by this?”

Rhode Island, the smallest state, is also one of the most densely populated; you can get anywhere by car in about an hour. Although its size may have made centralization easier, officials say it’s a scalable model for other states nationwide.

“This is a pandemic that has made clear that no one entity can do this alone,” said Nicole Alexander-Scott, the director of the state’s Department of Health. “It’s a whole of government approach.”

Early on in the pandemic Governor Raimondo [called in the state’s National Guard](#) to assist with school testing and logistics.

“You can leverage resources,” said Harrison Peters, Providence’s superintendent, speaking of the centralization. “What I like, too, is the purchasing power. When you go to get P.P.E. and you say: ‘Hey, we’ve got 24,000 kids,’ versus ‘Hey, I’ve

got a state of about 200,000 kids,’ that’s going to put you at the beginning of the line.”

The Guard is also helping to run a 24/7 crisis command center, an [operations hub](#) that plans school walk-throughs, deploys substitute nurses and coordinates the statewide response. Phones ring regularly with questions and concerns from administrators, while staff members also plan for the future. So far, they’ve fielded over 260 calls and made over 45 visits.

The state’s reopening hasn’t been totally flawless: The North Providence superintendent said the state [failed to promptly notify](#) the school district after two students tested positive. (The state [disputed this claim](#).) Either way, a high school temporarily switched to remote learning after the cases.

Not everyone has embraced the governor’s plan. Some districts, [concerned about aged ventilation systems](#), delayed the return to in-person learning. Teachers in Providence [protested against the reopening in September](#).

[In a briefing on Wednesday](#), Governor Raimondo said the state has seen positive cases in 95 schools since reopening, with 69 having only one case. About 6,000 students and staff members have been tested through the state’s designated PreK-12 testing system, with a 2 percent positivity rate — almost half of which were for students and teachers who had not set foot in a classroom.

“That means in all of those schools, the system is working,” she said. “The testing is working. The contact tracing is working. We haven’t seen outbreaks. If and when we do, we will handle them.”

On the second day of school, several administrators at the Anthony Carnevale Elementary School, in Providence, had to quarantine. Within hours, the state’s rapid response team stepped in, hearing teachers’ complaints, beefing up cleaning protocols and fine-tuning the plan.

“Because we had those conversations, we had the protocol and the procedures in place, my team knew what to do,” said Sindy Giard, the school’s principal.

“When something like this happens, you have to review your plan and tweak it a little bit.”

Dorsey, the principal in Smithfield, regularly refers to an exhaustive [protocol guide](#) that the state put out to help educators think through possible scenarios. “The protocols are awesome,” she said. “Anytime I’m like, ‘What kind of sign am I supposed to have in the bathrooms?’ I just look it up.”

Administrators and health officials say the ultimate success of Rhode Island’s plan isn’t about avoiding coronavirus cases altogether — that’s just not realistic — but about how the system handles them.

“It’s definitely a when. I know that. We know that,” Dorsey said. “Having the first adult isolated case really showed me the process. It was like: ‘OK. We figured that one out. Now we’ll move on to the next one.’”

Dear School Board Members,

I am the parent of two children at Bend Senior High School. My 16-year old son Carson is a Junior and a full-IB diploma student, high level cross country runner, and lacrosse player. My 15-year old daughter Addison is an honor student, will be a full IB diploma student, and also runs cross country and plays lacrosse. Our State Leadership, including Kate Brown, the ODE, and Health Department are doing far more to hurt our youth than protect them, or their teachers, as we have learned more about COVID-19. The more we have learned about this issue, the more it is clear that schools are not a notable vector for spreading the virus, but the closure of schools is absolutely detrimental to education, and maybe most important, it is devastating for the physical & mental health of our youth.

We all had an excuse for not knowing what to do relative to the opening up of businesses, sports, and schools in the Spring, but it is not possible to claim we are being guided by science or recognizing real-world examples of what works and what has failed. We know, now, that COVID-19 is not a threat to healthy youth or teachers, nor are open schools a threat to our communities, and claiming we have to keep them closed for safety is showing blatant ignorance of science and knowledge. Here is what we now know:

- *Our youth are at extremely low risk from COVID-19* – in the age-group of our kids, the IFR is at an incredibly low 0.003%, and that includes those with pre-existing conditions (PECs). When PECs are backed out of the mix, the rate becomes next to nil.
- *Our youth are extremely unlikely to spread the virus from school to the home.* The low level of viral count and lack of symptoms results in very low viral shedding. In the real world, this has shown to result in schools not representing a notable vector for viral spread.... All one has to do is look at what has happened when schools have been open throughout the world, and while there have been some situations where there is a rash of infections, there is NOT a rash of deaths involving students, their teachers, or their families. We are not on an island with our own virus, we should be taking advantage of the information available to us from where schools have been open, but it seems as though YOU have been ignoring the evidence that is out there, WE should not be the tightest locked down state in America as it hurts our kids.
- These are scientific facts we now know, and it is not acceptable for the political and Education Department leaders to ignore the science.... *this is the time to recognize what we know and develop new metrics for opening up schools and when developing the protocols for occupancy and operations once the schools are open, do it in a way that gives the youth something to look forward to, to make school worthwhile for education and socialization.*
- *Distance learning is a total failure* and an incredibly selfish demand on the youth. Every parent I have talked to has indicated how abysmal the education experience is. Personally, I

am not worried about my kids, as they have developed into honors level students, exceptionally adept at self-starting and leading their own education. But I am also a coach, and I am observing those I have coached, as well as my kids' friends, and it is clear that this system is losing kids. What we are seeing is Oregon students getting left behind, falling through the cracks, giving up on studies and sports, and leading down the wrong roads of life.

- Keeping kids out of school is doing *the worst harm relative to socialization*, as well as physical and mental health. What the Education Department has deprived our kids, and deprived the teachers from helping with, is leading to depression, missed domestic violence, and yes, suicide. *There have already been two suicides in the Bend – Lapine District his Fall term*. These deaths may have been avoided with kids in school. It is no longer a theoretical idea that depression and suicide may occur with schools closed, the policy of schools being closed may have now led to the death of a nice boy at the beginning of his life. But that is just the most extreme example, talk to any doctor, and he/she will tell you that there is a huge increase in teenage depression.

There is no choice in this situation that will be free of any risk, or that some will not be able to benefit. But since there is no notable link between schools being opened, and increased community spread of infection or death, GIVE US OUR LIBERTY/RESPONSIBILITY to have our kids in school if we want them in school. NO ONE CARES MORE ABOUT THEIR KIDS THAN PARENTS.... Parents are not going to send their kids into a dangerous environment, we DO NOT NEED SALEM TO PROTECT US!

Opening up the schools may result in some people getting sick, and maybe even some dying, but those losses will be dwarfed by the number hurt and lost by keeping the schools closed down. It is time for us to all stand up and act like adults. We need to stop making naïve decisions based only on one dimension of “safety” of what MIGHT happen, while ignoring more assured losses due to the lost education and the lost socialization.

And please remember, when developing the protocols for when school is back in-person, school cannot be only about the grind of academics, with no fun, no socialization, no joy.

We owe it to our youth to give them back what they need.

Good evening!

This is for public comment and to be in the State Board meeting notes scheduled on November 19, 2020.

As a parent in this state with a teenage son who was a straight A student, I am gravely concerned about his mental health and declining grades. He went from caring about school and getting straight A's to now having three F's and not caring about much of anything. Per a conversation we had this afternoon as I was trying to get my 11th grade 16 year old son to log on he said, "It doesn't matter Mom. Online school sucks. Teachers don't care and I can't get any help like I did on campus. I want to be in school where I can interact with my teachers and friends in person. I am not logging in until that happens." The sad part is, I can't make him log in. I can place all kinds of punishments and I have, but I can't make him do it. That is so very frustrating by as a parent as I can't help him. I have to weigh my punishment with his current mental health and failing grades. My 16 year old is going to fail this semester due to these draconian lockdowns which will put him behind. He has been more and more depressed these last few months.

I have written all legislators, Governor Brown, Director Gill and others with no response at least 2 times since school started. I do not want my son to be a casualty of COVID because schools and state agencies will not allow them to open over what? A 99.4-99.9% survivable virus that is slightly more than the flu. There is so much unnecessary fear going around over this virus that majority survive if they get it. However, I am seeing more and more teen suicides because of these lockdowns. Precious children who would not have taken their lives if they were in school and allowed to learn in class with their teachers and peers and to do extra curricular activities. I don't want my son to be a part of that number.

All the science and data points that schools have low transmission rates and very few children have died from COVID. Those who have, had other underlying health conditions that the majority of kids don't have. In OR, not one school aged child has died of COVID. What science also shows is how kids need social interaction, in person learning, physical activities, no more than 2 hours of screen time per day, and so much more for our kids whose brains and bodies are still developing. These lock downs can and will have so many more effects on our children that will last for decades to come. We need to get these schools open ASAP and stop the draconian and abusive lockdowns.

I am also concerned about people like Nancy Willard who is taking advantage of the tattle tale line and rallying teachers to call in false claims to keep schools shut down. See pictures below. She has also rallied teachers to do sick-outs if schools open back up. "Students are not being required to wear masks and remain socially distant, which is increasing their chance of transmission and thus raising risk to your health."

You can file anonymously - but please do not. You can also request confidentiality. They will absolutely honor this.

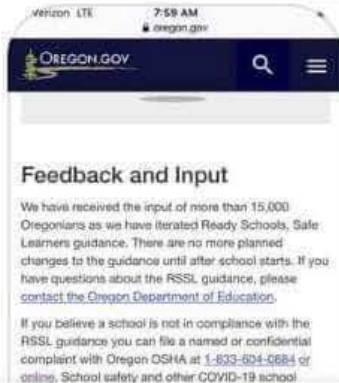

By providing your name and contact information they can contact you again for more information and to let you know the response from the school and their actions. This also allows ongoing discussion to ensure the school follows through with corrections.

There are two situations you can file. One allows for more direct action. It is easier for them to respond if you report that something has happened or is happening that presents risk to your health

your health.

However you can also report if something may happen - this would be at the point of ineffective planning. They may not be able to do as much in these situations - but report.

Here is the great aspect. Even though you can file and request confidentiality with OSHA your school could figure out who filed and retaliate against you.

If your school retaliates against you in any way, you can contact OSHA and they will refer this to BOLI for a retaliation proceeding. You have the right to file complaints with OSHA for health concerns.

The more complaints against a school and failure of the district to effectively address the better. Hold your district and school responsible for every Ready School safety requirement.

The place where I suspect many schools are going to fall down - which is going to be increasing in frequency given the time of year - is when students or staff get sick.

Look closely at your schools plan for management of Covid. There is guidance from the Oregon School Nurses Association. Make sure this has been followed in the written guidance AND is being followed in practice.

Look also at the exclusion requirements. If any student gets sick with symptoms that could be Covid that student is home for 2 weeks. Make sure the school is strongly recommending testing and that testing is easily available in your community.

As we are entering cold and flu season the numbers of students who should be sent home for long periods of time should go up substantially. So much for their receiving a quality education.

Make sure you note the new contacts guidance - 15 minutes over 24 hours.

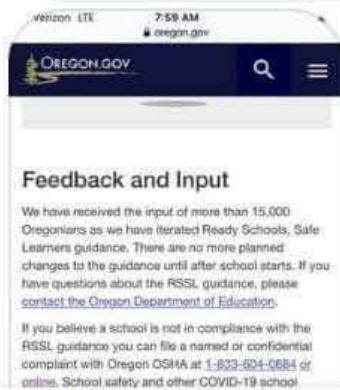

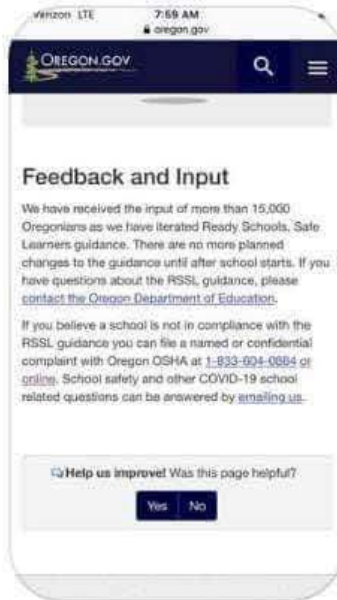

The danger to their future, far outweighs any political agenda behind COVID-19.

It has been 7 months, since Oregon was put under lock down and our children were in school. The imminent danger appeared to be overwhelming our hospitals with patients and seemingly shutting down our health care system. However, during this pandemic, agendas changed. The paradigm since then has changed. Hospital employees are being furloughed or let go due to the lack of patients, but we are still forced into solitary confinement. Yes, to our children this is exactly what we are in.

I personally have a 7 year old struggling with distance learning. She is an emotional mess She will not leave my side for her once joyful sleep overs at grandma's. Her confidence has tanked, feeling like she has no friends. Learning is hard. Especially in a household with two working parents, education has become a trigger for bad behavior. The anxiety and stress endured by the learner and me as a parent helping comes at a cost I am not sure can be reversed. Our children are falling behind. More behind than we were compared to other countries already.

The logics around the choice to refuse our children of their right to a public in-person education is irrational and illogical. Oregon Health Authority does not deem a contact for contact tracing to be anyone wearing a mask or being more than 6 feet apart from each other. Why are our guideline to return to school stricter than our health authority for contact tracing? Why has the power to decide the fate of our community been taken from us? Our children can ride the bus and be 3 feet apart. The bus ride is over an hour. But yet, we cannot go to school where the children are masked, and desks are appropriate distance apart such that they are not deemed a 'close contact'? How does this make logical sense? We as parents, should be the only ones who can decide what is best for our children. NOT the government. Our community is now dealing with the loss of a 13 year child on top of all the other emotional issues arises due to solitary.

We ask that you, as representatives, give us the power to decide what is best and reasonable for ourselves. In the times of equality, we are experiencing the utmost unequal opportunity to educate our children. Our children need to be in school. Their emotional, physical and entire existence depends on it.

Quit robbing our children of their education and emotional wellbeing. Enough is enough. Let our children LEARN!

Please, I beg you, you have the power to stop the increase in child suicide due to the solitary confinement imposed upon us.

To say that the release was disappointing is an understatement. Nothing has been updated for standards or metrics. Our kids are suffering!!!

I would like to see information released regarding families from different demographics and how they are doing based on you personally gathering information. Are you talking to families? Are you talking to students? I do so daily.

I meet with a group of 12th grade girls daily via zoom as a part of the private school I work for checking in on students. They are not ok! Our kids are depressed, full of anxiety, feeling isolated. These are kids from families that have resources to provide for a parent to be home, put food on the table and additional academic support. Our school has done an incredible job actually giving full instruction during the distance learning time. However, the mental health and emotional well being of our children is not ok.

This is very different from public schools. The majority of our friends have their children in public schools and what passes as instruction is so incredibly disappointing. The gap is widening and you are responsible. The gap is widening public vs private education, the gap is widening with poverty vs wealthy, the gap is widening for minorities vs the white community, the gap is widening for gender inequity with more woman forced to leave the workplace.

We are seeing people move out of state monthly due to loss of jobs and school here in Oregon. We are seeing families travel every weekend to play sports in other states. This again shows the gap widening between those with money and those without. It is growing the economies of other states, while locally businesses are closing weekly.

Please respond to let me know what point saving our children from neglect, hunger, abuse, lack of education, poverty and gender inequality becomes more important than Covid-19. Dear Governor Kate Brown and colleagues,

You have indicated to school districts, school boards and the media that you are re-evaluating the return to school metrics. And yet, Friday, when we expected an announcement, you posted a Halloween photo. This is beyond infuriating.

Here I sit, doing online distance learning with my 2nd grade daughter all day long. My two middle school sons share a table downstairs where they stare at their iPad screens from 8am till 3pm. My children are SO lucky and blessed compared to most. They have always excelled at school, they have all of the internet, supplies, space, food, medical care, warmth and safety that they need to thrive. Their parents are financially secure, highly educated and blessed with flexible work situations. This is in STARK contrast to so many students in our town and state who are struggling with not one but many or all of these contributing factors.

And yet, even my kids STRUGGLING. Headaches, backaches, eye strain, all a daily complaint. We have been so diligent in the 13 years of having children to keep them OFF screens. My middle school sons do not have phones, we have no tvs in bedrooms, they are required to play sports and do chores after school, there is no video gaming late into the night. We have done this because brain research CLEARLY supports the correlation between screen time and negative indicators of physical and mental health as well as academic success.

Their teachers are working double time to provide this online version of school, a tremendous amount of work. I taught for 10 years at the elementary level in an economically and socially struggling immigrant community in Oregon and I know that the teachers are working well past the point of physical and emotional exhaustion to provide this subpar experience for my kids. Our family loves and supports these teachers, they are fundamental and essential in the building of a strong new generation of citizens of our world.

I share your deep frustration with the Trump administration. We have turned in our ballots, we are desperate for change, we wait on pins and needles for the decisions to come in the next

weeks. We have followed masking, distancing and travel regulations with precision and encourage our community to do the same. As a family we daily pray for the healing of our world from this disease. It had really never occurred to me to pray for scientists and vaccine producers but now I sure do, every single day.

However, with all of the above said, my children, the State of Oregon's children are being asked to bear a cost that is too great. Their contribution to the disease spread is well proven to be low. I know you have been flooded with emails full of research and scientific articles. I am begging you to weigh the risks and benefits honestly. The risks to children in Oregon (food scarcity, lack of security and safety from abuse, declining physical health and wellness, declining academic abilities, downward spiral of mental health, suicide) are far too great and currently far outweigh the risk of virus spread in school settings. Why have children been forced to bear this societal burden that they did not create and do not contribute to? How can it be that bars, gyms and nail salons continue to operate as normal while the children sit at home on screens or have been pulled out of their education entirely? This is not right.

Please, please read the research and listen to the experts. Change the state metrics for reopening schools, yes, keeping safety in mind but weighing ALL of the risks and benefits. The children of Oregon are already SO far behind. We need the green light to get back to growing and building a healthy, happy and smart new crop of citizens for the future.

I am writing with potential solutions for how to open schools safely.

I believe two facts strongly:

1. Teachers must feel safe going back to school.
2. Schools must reopen.

Schools are critical for the social and emotional health of all children and closed schools pose a serious problem for children who are disadvantaged, have special needs or are in crisis and for working mothers.

Luckily, countless studies worldwide are showing that schools are opening safely and that they are not drivers of covid-19 transmission.

So how do we accomplish the above goals? I believe we start by putting the burden on parents to provide a safe environment for teachers.

Tell parents that they must provide the following for teachers before schools can reopen. Trust me. Parents are resourceful and they can get this done.

1. Parent volunteers outside of school each morning. Parents should put their money where their mouth is and volunteer to be the first line of defense screening kids as they come to school. They should be checking masks and asking that each child had their temperature taken that morning. (If not, the parent volunteers should take the students' temperature.) Tell parents a volunteer sign up system must be in place and filled before schools can open.
2. Plexiglass for teachers' desks. Parents can fundraise, find resources and work together to provide this simple safety measure for teachers. (They cost about \$200 each.)
3. A portable air filter with HEPA filtration for each classroom. Please see the below Harvard article about the importance of portable air filters for risk mitigation. I highly recommend that you read this article. Among other recommendations, it says,

GAZETTE: *Do you need special air cleaners designed to filter out viruses or is a HEPA filter good enough***ALLEN:** *I've been really careful to not recommend things that are going to cost a million dollars and take months to install. The portable air cleaners with the HEPA filters are tried-and-true technology. The science on how they work is really clear and decades deep. And it's literally as simple as plugging one into the wall and turning it on. The filter captures 99.97 percent of particles at 0.3 microns. These filters are going to capture any airborne viral particles. So there's always something you could do.*

We proposed this as a national strategy: Think about the billions we're giving away in stimulus. How about a portable air cleaner in every classroom? It is a really cheap, inexpensive way to get our students back and keep risk low. This is a strategy that can work through the depths of winter in the Northeast, for example, when you can't open your windows.

Luckily, this is an item that we have in abundance in Oregon after the smoke event in September. Put the onus on parents to find, donate, purchase and provide these for each classroom. (These cost \$100-\$200 each.)

4. Touchless hand sanitizer dispensers for each classroom. (About \$25 each.)

What should school districts do?

1. Allow teachers who do not feel safe to take a year off and have their jobs guaranteed when they return.
2. Make deals with online providers so that teachers are able to work from home. For example, our local school district works with [K12.com](https://www.k12.com). [K12.com](https://www.k12.com) is currently hiring at a fast rate. Local districts should reach out to their online course providers such as [K12.com](https://www.k12.com) and ask/require that when they hire new teachers, a percentage of them come from local Oregon teachers who would like to work from home.

What should the state do?

1. The state should provide hazard pay to teachers who return to in-person learning! They are essential workers going to work with children during a pandemic. This is the most important measure that I am listing and emergency covid funds should be used for this first.

2. Change the metrics. This is also critically important! No schools will open with our current metrics which is a statewide emergency. I believe control should be given to local districts and should be based on a combination of: case rate per 100k, percentage positivity, and local hospital capacity.

Massachusetts has excellent metrics as referenced in the Harvard study:

>56 cases per 100k per week = Red zone, virtual school
28-56 = yellow zone, hybrid school
<28 = green zone, full time school

3. Allow local teachers a say as to whether they go to full time or hybrid. Hybrid seems harder for teachers since they are exposed to just as many kids and must reinvent the wheel and manage different teaching modalities. The state should waive specific classroom requirements upon request and allow hybrid vs. full time to be decided by local teachers.
4. Provide the parent-sourced items above (plexiglass, portable air filters and sanitizer dispensers) for the 20% of schools that are in the most disadvantaged areas and are likely to struggle with parent fundraising.
5. Give teachers the first option to take a potential vaccine! Again, these are essential workers.
6. Provide rapid tests to schools so when teachers or parent volunteers see a child coming to school with symptoms, they can be tested quickly.

I believe with all of my heart that schools are the most essential function of our society. If rates cannot be lowered out of the red zone, we should institute a curfew, close bars at 10 pm, require visitors to Oregon to provide a negative Covid test before travel and look at many other measures before we consider closing schools.

We need to reopen **and** teachers should feel safe at the workplace and I believe the above measures would help.

I hope you will consider some of these measures and will work to open schools as quickly as you can.

Dear Department of Education Member:

As a parent of a 6th grader @ High Desert Middle School I am emphatically imploring your board to challenge Governor Brown to allow local communities to determine when our students can return to school safely. The current state metrics are an over reach and not backed by any evidence based research. Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL) is failing our students.

Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL) is a disaster. In the recently published Great Barrington Declaration over 6000+ scientists and medical professional have stated that lockdowns are causing "irreparable damage." <https://gbdeclaration.org> My TAG student who thrived in school and loved learning, now hates school. The New England Journal of Medicine <https://www.nejm.org/doi/full/10.1056/NEJMms2024920> states that students "lose out on essential education, social and developmental benefits and returning students to school should be a "top national priority." The "AAP strongly advocated that all policy considerations for the coming school year should start with the goal of having students physically present in school". Social isolation is causing difficulty with identifying students with learning deficits, physical or sexual abuse, depression and suicide. <https://services.aap.org/en/pages/2019-novel-coronavirus-covid-19-infections/clinical-guidance/covid-19-planning-considerations-return-to-in-person-education-in-schools/>. Personally, I see my student becoming more and more disengaged with learning, more depressed, and losing his love of learning.

Scientific research has also determined that the infection rates of both students and staff are extremely low. A Brown University study of 227,000 students in 50 states show the infection rate was only 0.14% for students and 0.25% for staff. <https://www.axios.com/k-12-reopening-coronavirus-cases-data-6c39ea76-21f5-422a-b99d-20e3914002c4.html>. Again the New England Journal of Medicine states that "even under conditions of moderate transmission (<10 cases per 100,000 people primary schools should be recognized as essential services." <https://www.nejm.org/doi/full/10.1056/NEJMms2024920>. And there is very little evidence that schools have been drivers of transmission of COVID. <https://www.doh.wa.gov/Portals/1/Documents/1600/coronavirus/20201019-SchoolsSummary.pdf>. For those families that have concerns about infection of COVID, they already have an options of online learning, just keep your students at home. Those families what are struggling like mine, having a kiddo at home navigating CDL entire alone, and believe the science that it's safe to return to school with interventions in place are stuck with a learning model that is not working for our students. My student reports that there is not peer to peer interaction at all, that students are not even engaged with the teacher, and that most of the work completed is just "busy work".

I also question the educational hours are students are receiving with CDL. My middle schooler only has each of his 7 classes twice per week for a 55 minute period. How is this meeting the requirement of 900 hours of instruction time? With 7 periods of 55 minutes 2x/week that is only 770 minutes of school/week or 12.83 hours/week. There is roughly 35 weeks in the Bend Lapine School year so that is only 449.16 hours of instruction???? HALF

THE STATE MANDATED INSTRUCTION of 900 hours. And these kids haven't been in school for 7 months! How far behind are they getting in their learning? And without any mandated state testing being completed, we have no idea how far this students are sliding academically. I can personally attest that my student is not being challenged academically at all with CDL and in losing desire daily to participate in this failed method of learning.

Please advocate for our students in Oregon. Get our children back in school.

Dear Members of the Oregon Board of Education,

I am a parent of a 10th grader and 6th grader who attend Franklin High School and Sunnyside Environmental School respectively. I am writing from my makeshift desk on our dining room table with our sons spread out in different rooms trying to learn remotely. I wish you could sit here and listen and feel my children's frustration and sense of failure every day (and see how it impacts my ability to meet the expectations set by my job.)

Both of my children were reluctant learners before this pandemic and now this remote learning experience has sucked dry any interest or joy in learning. My 10th grader thought he was failing Geometry because he had failed to navigate the right platform to turn in his assignments and it took repeat efforts with the teacher to fix this. So, his decision was to stop doing all homework and fail (and lie to his parents about it). My son hit a wall, literally, after trying to read his Spanish assignment this week. I am exhausted by the anger, frustration and tears that they experience every day. We have such limited tools to address their frustration and fears right now. We are scarring our children.

The isolation and lack of sports has turned my fun loving active children into insecure and anxious sad children. It is becoming harder and harder for them to engage socially with others. I am frightened by this. They do not understand how the Oregon Ducks can play football and our neighborhood can be filled with people drinking at bars but they cannot attend school or play sports. I also do not understand this outcome.

My husband is a public defender and I have often compared the essential nature of the services he provides to our community to the role of teachers: critical, underpaid, thankless, truly making a difference. Since the pandemic, his work has continued. He is in court with jurors and defendants wearing masks and protecting the rights of his clients. The courts determined that this work was essential and came up with a plan to get his clients back to court safely. Our children deserve similar effort. Teachers are essential workers and nothing is more essential than our children's education. We have wasted time with metrics not based on science and our children are suffering consequences that other students who are fortunate to live in other states who make decisions based on science and the critical need of education are not having to endure.

I have been shocked and dismayed by the lack of communication by the ODE and by the state to address these concerns. We need leadership, innovation, and communication. We need science guiding the metrics, we need resources to provide opportunities to allow our children to catch up, we need innovation to make hybrid learning a reality in the overcrowded PPS schools and to provide additional summer courses and supports for our children, and we need funding to provide the adequate number of teachers to cover the hybrid schedule and to address those who cannot return to the classroom due to high risk categories. Step up and solve these problems. We have one shot to do this right for these children.

So far, schools do not seem to be stoking community transmission of the coronavirus, according to data emerging from random testing in the United States and Britain. Elementary schools especially seem to seed remarkably few infections.

“The more and more data that I see, the more comfortable I am that children are not, in fact, driving transmission, especially in school settings,” said Brooke Nichols, an infectious disease modeler at the Boston University School of Public Health.

But the more pressing question for scientists and policymakers has been how often transmission from children happens. The bulk of evidence now suggests only limited transmission from young children to adults.

The risk among older children in middle and high schools is less clear, but many experts believe that these schools may be able to contain the coronavirus, provided the community prevalence is low and the schools take abundant precautions.

Weighed against the substantial harms to children and parents from keeping schools closed, elementary schools should at least offer in-person learning, said Dr. David Rubin, a pediatrician and infectious disease expert at the University of Pennsylvania.

Rather than closing schools where community transmission is high, businesses like restaurants, bars or other indoor spaces where adults congregate should be shuttered, Dr. Rubin said.

“Children are not being prioritized, and they’re missing out on all the positive things about going to school,” Dr. Jenkins said. “I don’t understand why we’re not as a community getting together and deciding that schools need to be a priority and making them as safe as we can.”

Hello School Board,

My name is Korallynn Thelen and I have a daughter who has special needs. I write you with a heavy heart due to the lack of supports and education my daughter has received within the PPS school system by distance learning. I was hoping that you can use the data from other school openings around the world and the US to make a case to open schools. Also, provide the schools with the action items to open schools the most safe manner.

I don't have faith that the motivations are in the right place when PPS and the government is prioritizing in person athletics, in person distance learning, retail shops, bowling allies, movie theaters, swimming pools, nail salons and spas over in person education. Every other country in the world is prioritizing in person education over opening of all those other corporations. Why is this not the priority? We need to get together a panel of experts to determine what steps need to take for reopening and do it now! Already in Beaverton the schools have lost 1700 students. What is the impact of those budget shortfall? These are the things that PPS, PAT, the teachers union and the government need to consider when they are delaying the reopening of schools. Comprehensive distance learning is not working. Students are depressed, not learning and commuting suicide. I worry about the mental health of my daughter, her friends, my nieces and nephews. Who since moving to distance learning have become shells of the children they once were.

I just feel bad for all of the kids who are being completely left behind in the distance learning model. The impact of this short sided decision is going to effect BIPOC and special needs children for years to come. Even the metrics for reopening are going to greater impact communities of lower income. Clearly the system is messed up when in person athletics, in person distance learning, movies theaters, bars, restaurants, swimming pools and salons are opened yet the schools remain closed. And now the experts aka CDC and doctors are saying that the risk of not opening outweighs the risk for contracting COVID. Those are the experts that you should be listening to when making these decisions not the teachers union who has their own priorities.

This is very disappointing that there are no viable options for supporting Clara and our family during this pandemic. It is disheartening that PPS has prioritized in person athletics and in-person distance learning above supporting the most marginalized groups. PPS should prioritize special needs students and BIPOC communities over in-person athletics and in-person distance learning child care. PPS has not provided Clara with the base level services she needs to be successful in a digital setting. Parents are left to scramble to support their children with no help besides sitting next to your child 100% of the time so she can even log into a lesson.

Concerns for my child's education during the 20-21 school year:

We are concerned that Clara's increased behavior will prevent her from being able to return to in-person learning during the school year.

We are concerned that during the 20-21 school year and Comprehensive Distance Learning Clara will be in and not have the support to build and/or maintain relationships with her peers.

Lack of speech therapy and OT will continue to widen the gap since Clara doesn't have the base level skills to engage in a digital setting the digital therapy is not an option for her.

Considerations for the school about my child's education during the 20-21 school year:

We are working from home (40 hours a week) and do not have the ability to support multiple transitions throughout the day.

Lack of technology Clara needs to baselevel participate in distance learning. AKA: no touchscreen to mute unmute herself.

Lack of a uniform method of logging into the meetings. Sometimes it's through seesaw or google meets.

Lack of a uniform schedule. Sometimes there is math sometimes there is not.

Constant communication is not clear. Emails, text messages, documents embedded in emails then attached. Difficult to understand what is going on in the classroom.

Lack of an adult by her side 100% of the time to support distance learning and ensure she is engaging in the lesson.

Do not have adequate space so background noise is a constant issue

Input, suggestions, and proposed solutions:

Limit transitions to as few as possible and support any transitions with a visual schedule. Provide virtual (and socially distanced if appropriate) opportunities

for students to engage with each other to maintain important social relationships.

In-person education for special needs ASAP. Prioritizing in-person education for special needs students over daycare for distance learning and in-person athletics.

We look forward to seeing REAL solutions for children with special needs and REAL supports. We would like to be compensated for the therapy and education opportunities that she is missing out from PPS not attempting to even try any time for in-person education or attempt FAPE. The damage that distance learning is doing to my child is immeasurable since these early learning years are VITAL to children with disabilities. Typical children will have the ability to bounce back from this horrible administering of education however I fear (based on lots of research) that this damage is going to set the tone for years to come for Clara.

Lb: research shows that when low income college students leave, they rarely return, negatively affecting their earnings for the rest of their lives. They need their kids in school.

Good evening,

I am writing to put my support behind the call to implement a safe and prompt return to in-person learning and co-curricular activities for those who choose.

I am the parent of two daughters who attend Cleveland High School in Southeast Portland; one a senior and one a sophomore. Both are engaged students who want so badly to return to in-person learning. They want to learn in a classroom where they can ask questions and engage in dialogue with their teachers and their peers. They do not want to spend their mornings looking at a screen of black boxes, or joining a break-out room with their peers who may or may not speak (and no one there to notice). They don't want to continue to jump through hoops each afternoon to secure their daily attendance marks. They want to learn chemistry in a lab, to *do* screen printing and ceramics as they were scheduled to do, they want to converse in Spanish with their teacher and classmates, they want to give speeches in person, and they want to talk about what they are learning in English, or Government, or History *together*. They want to learn in person.

We know it will not be like it was. We know it will not be all day, every day. We realize they will be wearing masks all day. But we need to get these kids back in the classroom in some capacity.

Each of my daughters has vocalized their disappointment that our state continues to prioritize business over education. How, they have asked, is it that bars or bowling alleys are open, but schools are closed? I do not have an answer for them beyond the fact that here in Oregon, the economy appears to be the priority of our state leaders. But why must that be?

Data from numerous states and countries show schools are not significant sources of spread. Renowned public health expert Dr. Ashish K. Jha writes that "Schools need to be bolder about returning to the classroom...There are other things that are far more high risk that we're leaving open while being remote in schools, and that doesn't make any sense.... Dear leaders in Portland, Multnomah County, and the State of Oregon,

I am writing, once again, to put my support behind the call to implement a safe and prompt return to in-person learning and co-curricular activities for those who choose.

I want to highlight the following from this month's Portland Monthly article "*As Oregon Locks Down Again, Has the Chance to Open Schools Slipped Away?*":

“The data seems pretty clear,” says Dr. Alex Foster, an assistant professor of pediatric medicine at Oregon Health and Sciences University. “If you are taking precautions, around masks primarily, you can have school with relaxed physical distancing. There are examples in which they have (elementary-aged) children at some distance, not exactly six feet, and that’s not showing dramatic case counts or spikes as a result.”

Meanwhile, virtual education is taking a toll on students and families. From Salem, the state’s second largest school district, comes word that [half of high school students are failing at least one class](#), three times higher than expected levels. [Studies showed](#) that students from historically underserved communities—among them Black, Latino and Indigenous kids—disproportionately lacked access to high-speed internet connection, leaving them at real risk of being left far behind.

Regardless of background, just about anyone with kids can attest to the negative effects of loneliness and isolation on children’s mental and emotional health. And story after story has documented that it is [women who are dropping out of the work force in droves](#) to manage virtual learning at home—wiping out decades of hard-won professional gains.

I am heartened to see the recent measures put in place to mitigate the recent surge in cases here in Multnomah County and other counties across Oregon. I am hopeful that these stronger efforts will continue and that they demonstrate your prioritizing opening Oregon schools so that all students have an option for in person learning early in 2021.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN,

Thank you for taking my email. 43 states are now open and allowing students to attend in person school. 2 states in the US are in full closure and the 7 other states are in partial closure. Oregon is one of the 7. We are in the minority!

Most states that have no order are allowing each individual school district to decide! Brilliant! Why shouldn't we get to look at our local numbers and make that choice based on our unique districts and what is best for them? Just like Governor Brown would never want President Trump to come in and order us to open or close our schools, our state government should not get the power to close districts at a state level.

I'm willing to take a risk. My husband is a dentist in our small town of Silverton, with very few cases. If anyone in our family gets infected, he will have to close his office. I'm willing to take that risk so our kids can get back in school.

A few weeks ago, I had to beg my 15 year old to practice his clarinet. 9 months without band is killing his desire to continue playing. These school closures are detrimental to our music programs across the state. My daughter is a senior in high school and she will most likely get no state competitions this year. Devastating.

But my concern goes beyond me and my family... One New York Times article states child abuse cases dropped by 51%. Sounds good? Not so: the article reads,

“Reports of [child abuse](#) in New York City have dropped sharply since the coronavirus crisis began. And that is worrying the authorities. The steep decline could be a sign that an unseen epidemic of abuse is spreading behind locked doors, according to the police, prosecutors and child protection officials. As the virus has shuttered the city, the fragile system of safeguards designed to protect children has fallen apart.

“Teachers are normally the leading reporters of suspected abuse, calling for help when they notice bruises or signs of hunger or mistreatment at home. Now, teachers get a glimpse of their students only in a virtual classroom, if they see them at all. And while much of the city has been staying indoors and “staying safe,” for many children from troubled homes, the coronavirus pandemic has confined them to the most dangerous place they can be.

“The tensions resulting from stay-at-home orders and social distancing — isolation, unemployment and even alcohol abuse — can easily erupt into violence, child welfare experts said. Sexual predators now have all-day access to children who would normally be in school; in the Bronx, for example, sexual abuse is the most common type of child abuse arrest since the start of the pandemic, according to the borough's District Attorney's Office.

“In many cases, investigators have responded to reports of neglect and found that they were

related to families' struggles with Covid-19."

USA Today - "[Pennsylvania](#) hospitals are treating more children with severe child abuse injuries, indicating the state's most vulnerable kids are not safe at home during the [coronavirus](#) outbreak. They are seeing more severe cases than ever before."

Oregon? OPB reports child abuse drops 70% in 1 month leaving Oregon officials concerned.

"On Feb. 19, a Wednesday, we had 834 calls reporting child abuse and neglect," DHD spokesman Jake Sunderland said. "On Wednesday, March 25, we had 246."

"Most abuse and neglect reports come from people who are designated as "mandatory reporters," such as teachers and other staff that are frequently around children in schools, he said. Other mandatory reporters include doctors, dentists and licensed therapists.

"When a child is at school, they're spending a significant portion of the day with mandatory reporters that are trained and expected to be hyper-aware of the signs of abuse and neglect," he said. "Kids across Oregon are not in school right now, so they're missing that time around mandatory reporters."

That's a major concern for the agency, compounded by the social isolation the coronavirus pandemic has brought to households.

"As social isolation sets in, in order to slow the curve of the spread of coronavirus, kids and families are interacting with less people," Sunderland said. "Kids have less eyes on them and less opportunities to recognize and suspect abuse and neglect.

CNN. NPR. NBC News. Washington Post. The story is consistent throughout the entire country: Kids are not safer at home.

Please fight for our children and their safety, education and overall well being. PLEASE save our children! Let those who are comfortable go back to school. Those who are not or at risk, can have online learning options. There is a way to make it work for all people!

Please make noise for our kids!

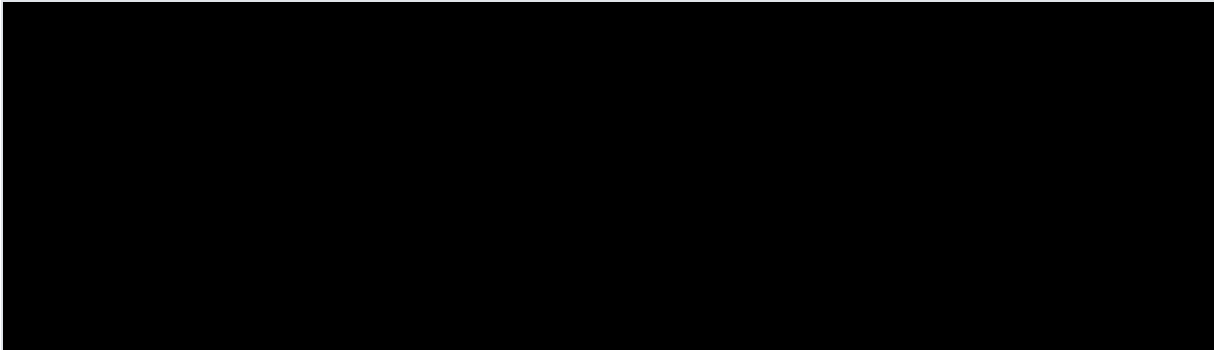

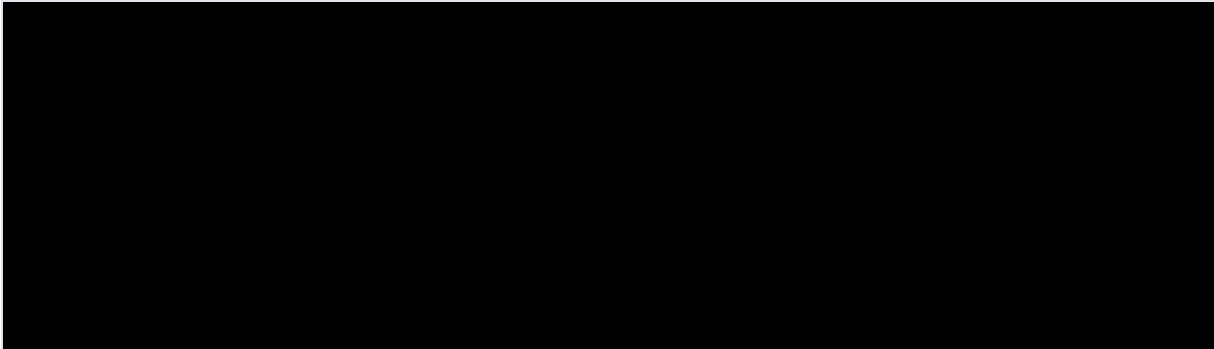

Dear Governor Brown, Director Gill, PPS Board Members, Director Beason, Dean Bangsberg, President Jacobs, and Director Allen,

I am writing to you as a parent of two high schoolers, a co-founder of the advocacy group Opening PDX Schools, as a medical professional, and as a faculty member of the School of Public Health (views are my own, however). I and three friends (also parents) started the FB group Opening PDX Schools to join with like-minded parents who view our 8-month school closure in Oregon as the biggest public health emergency facing Oregon, other than Covid infections and deaths. The school shutdown, a downstream effect of the pandemic, is having major unforeseen consequences. The scale of this failure to get our kids back in school is massive. Out of the 560,000 k-12 students in Oregon, a tiny 10% of them are in any in-person at school at all. Governor Brown's new guidelines (per her press conference) will get another 10% back, leaving 80% of OR students at home learning remotely (CDL). That is 448,000 students receiving 0 hours of in-person instruction. Data gathered in the past two months in USA, and around the world in the past 7 months, show school reopening can be done without increasing Covid spread significantly, even when community spread is rising. The bottom of this email contains a list of references providing evidence for this statement.

Doctors, health researchers, psychologists and psychiatrists, nutritionists, economists, are documenting the severe harms of school closures. Parents, however, already knew the harms, because they are at home with kids who are depressed, struggling, not learning, dropping out, on screens all day, have no plans to go to college, and are sadly committing suicide at record rates this year- and our teen suicide rates in Oregon were already appalling, the 11th worst in the USA. Many of these parents are not at home, because they are working outside the house. Links documenting these irreparable harms are at the bottom of this letter.

Not surprisingly, as word of our FB page spread, and we joined with other groups around the state, our numbers have grown to about 30,000 members-this includes Opening PDX Schools, Back to School Beaverton, Clack to School, Let Oregon Learn, Let's Play (a return to sports focused group) and many others. We are helping each other advocate, spread the word, rally for open schools, and support kids who are struggling. But we need our primary health institutions in this state- OHSU, Kaiser Permanente NW, the Joint School of Public Health, to step up and help out; to provide leadership, engagement, and resources where they can.

I do not say lightly that this situation constitutes a pre-eminent public health emergency. As a faculty member of the School of Public Health, I get many emails from our leaders about equity

and diversity and re-imagining health equity, yet where are our institutions on this issue? A massive amount of data is showing, not surprisingly, that low-resource children are suffering the most with school shutdowns, as well as SpEd students, and kids with physical and learning disabilities. Low resource students rely on schools for their nutrition, their exercise, for help with their learning and physical challenges, to get routine eye and ear checks, to have school counselors see and check in on them, and of course are the most likely to have parents on the frontline as Covid workers, parents who can't help them with school, haven't gone to college, cannot be around during the day, and to have no or inadequate internet. 94,000 Oregonians have no access to the internet and another 301,000 have slow and unreliable internet. Very conservatively estimating, 67,000 kids in Oregon are now stuck trying to learn in a home with an addicted family member- and that is extrapolating from national numbers, when we know OR has higher rates of addiction and substance use disorders. Overdoses increased by 70% in April and May, according to the OHA. In addition, OR already has appalling disparities in educational attainment for students of color. Black students at PPS meet the requirements in math at a rate of 11% compared to 60% of white students; Native Americans/AI students in PPS have some of the worst, most disproportionate educational attainment of any group. Does anyone think this prolonged shutdown is not making these disparities worse?

What is stopping students from being brought back, in addition to the fact that our metrics for going back are still not in line with other states' and still far too rigid? Oregon has the 4th lowest Covid rates in the country, yet the fewest children in school per capita of almost any state. One main reason is that teachers are afraid of getting Covid and afraid that their districts do not have the resources they need or the money to make buildings safe for them. While I do not agree with every demand being made by the teachers' unions right now before public school teachers in PPS, for example, will go back, I absolutely agree that safe return to school requires a vastly improved testing model compared to what is now available or utilized in OR. *We rank at the very bottom for numbers of people tested per capita.* Only Puerto Rico is testing a smaller percentage of its residents than OR. This is unacceptable. Even states with many low-income people and not a lot of resident wealth, like Maine and Arkansas, are doing much better than Oregon. You can see how badly we are doing on this metric [here](#). Dr. Fauci today said, when asked what would you say to teachers who are afraid to go back, that healthy teachers below 60 years should go back to the classroom. For that to happen, OR needs to do something radical with its testing and make a plan to regularly test teachers and students, as other districts like New York City Public Schools has done- a district with far more challenges than any big district in OR. We are preparing a spreadsheet looking at what other districts are doing to test teachers and students, and would be happy to share it when it's ready. Our spreadsheet showing how out of step OR metrics for reopening are is available [here](#). While the new metrics helped a bit, they left high schoolers completely in the cold, arguably the most at-risk group of students for negative consequences of being out of school, with the least amount of time to make up what they are missing and losing out on. I predict, based on my work on BUILD EXITO, a program to support underrepresented students to pursue careers in research, that a high number of at-risk kids won't make it to college next year, or perhaps ever as a direct result of HS shut downs. I hear over and over from my PSU students that HS counselors are so often instrumental in getting first-gen kids to college.

We need our institutions to step up- Kaiser Permanente has test capacity, and a Community Benefit Department. KPNW has shown a durable and admirable commitment to the health of communities here in OR. OHSU also has capacity, and is already testing residents of the metro area for free. PPS and other large districts like Beaverton and Clackamas must partner with big health care systems like Kaiser, OHSU and Providence that can make this happen. NYC has brought back 26% of its students in person, which is more than 300,000 students. They have had a .5% positivity rate of Covid in students and staff attending in person. They did not renovate buildings, or put in expensive new HVAC systems- they are relying on testing and other public health measures that can be done reasonably cheaply. Our students need the institutions devoted to protecting health in this city to step up and help the districts- donate testing capacity, help them

make a plan, provide lab facilities. What is happening now in our state is simply unacceptable- and 560,000 kids are paying the price.

Please look at the citations below, documenting harms to kids from school shut downs, and that opening can be done safely. Please figure out how these institutions can partner with our school leaders to make school safe for teachers and students as soon as possible. There is so much expertise in our medical institutions here in Portland but they have not been engaged in this critical issue of getting kids back to school safely, as they should be. I am asking all of you to work together to help get our kids back to school, where they belong.

Dear Director Gill and ODE,

I support the Governor's pause but I am not hopeful it will get our cases down to the level current ODE metrics require to get kids back to school. Oregonians are burned out and frustrated by 9 months of kids in no school particularly while cases were low and manageable from April-October. The fact that there was no school then is a tragedy of poor management and lack of planning by ODE and districts. Dr. Fauci and every public health expert said late fall and winter were going to be worse but Oregon did nothing to take advantage of our low fall and summer cases. So here we are in November with cases high. **What is the plan to get kids back in January if cases have not come down sufficiently, which they likely will not.** The OHA and everyone else now says schools aren't causing transmission even when there are cases in the community. Yet districts still have their heads in the sand and are not releasing plans to go back in January. A new study from Harvard says half of young people are suffering mental health problems including suicidal ideation. <https://fee.org/articles/harvard-researchers-nearly-half-of-young-adults-showing-signs-of-depression-amid-pandemic/>. Parents are stressed and exhausted and children are failing and falling behind. There are well over 1 million parents and kids in this state. Is the ODE listening to us at all, or only to the concerns of those afraid to go back. I don't expect you to force those who are high risk to go back but at some point a public health framework has got to be applied to schools and staff. A public health framework cannot function on the "one case is too many" principle. That is not public health, which has always been the framework guiding schools until recently because schools are an essential service, without which societies cannot function. The risk of Covid transmission is not going to be zero, not even when a vaccine is available widely. The risk of driving down the highway is not zero, yet we all do it. The risks of reopening are low and manageable when basic precautions are followed- not touchless faucets, but air flow and ventilation, masks, and spacing. They are not zero, but it seems that is what Oregon is waiting for, at enormous costs to children and families, particularly women.

I am speaking to you on behalf of School Districts in Coos County Oregon.

I wanted to write you to you and plead my case as a parent, business owner, and community advocate. I want to encourage you, plead with you, to open our schools back up and rewrite the school reopening metrics. I believe it is the only way out of this conflict.

We are going to be forced to consider leaving Oregon because our state does not support kids, parents, teachers, and families that are requesting in person learning. Our livelihood and educational rights are being violated. Oregon follows an impossible metrics for reopening schools. We understand that not everyone supports this idea, and that is okay. But I am an advocate for my kids and my community, and what I have to say needs to be considered and heard. That is why I am appealing to your leadership for help.

I had talked to dozens of parents who have moved their kids out of state, and are in the process of leaving Oregon all together. When there are no schools, and limited jobs as a result of this shutdown, parents are given an ultimatum. Stay and suffer, or move to a better life for their kids and family. When parents pull children out of school, money for our state is lost. We understand how important it is to keep kids in school, not only for education, but for budgets, and funding. We have to do something or are education system is going to fall.

Our kids are suffering in this shutdown and the scary thing is that there is no resolution in sight with the current metrics we have set in place. The school reopening metrics has huge flaws. It allows no acceptance, no waiver or imperfections within its construction. We feel there is no way out and is therefore illogical to follow. We need a metrics that is reasonable. As it is currently written, it is extremely unlikely that our schools will be considered for reopening.

What we need is a metrics that counts hospitalizations as its number 1 evidence to derive a conclusion of reopening. Currently COVID 19 is counted as a whole, regardless of seriousness vs. asymptomatic. In other words, the metrics does not separate the hospitalizations vs. people who recover quickly. It only goes by the positive cases and is then used against the populated county to keep it shut down. Changing the metrics will

be a step in the right direction.

Coos county has less than the 100,000 population. People are afraid to get tested because of the punishment it inflicts on their neighbors, community, and schools. If COVID 19 were as deadly as a poisonous snake bite then I would be extremely concerned. But it is not. We should only be concerned with hospitalization count for this metrics. Other health providers, EMT's and nurses believe this is the correct course of action as well. This makes more sense. Listing businesses, schools, churches or other "hot spots" only send people into a panic and in turn hate against those who work or go to schools and churches at these locations. It causes people to turn on one another. This is not healthy for our community.

There is another concern regarding this school shutdown. Thousands of children being left home alone for distance learning. For working families, like ours, with 2 parents working, we leave our kids home alone to do their school work in front a computer. They make there own lunches, do their own work, and we hope there is no real emergency because our closest neighbor is over a quarter mile away. This was ever more scary when fire season was in affect. I was forced to quit working to stay home with my children.

My property is miles away from a village town. We live up a hill surrounded by trees. If there were a fire, it would travel uphill and would engulf our entire property and home. There is no way out. We live on a single road. One way in. One way out. We don't have a regular phone line. We have no access to WiFi internet, other than a hotspot on a phone. This puts my kids in a very dangerous situation if they were to be left home alone. I am just one family. What about the thousands of families who leave their kids home alone because they have to make a living wage? This is unacceptable and unsafe so we don't work if there isn't an adult at home with my 5th grader and 7th grader. We are getting by. But what about the families who cannot afford not to work. They are put in a very precarious position to choose between at home school and working.

Our school district is so small and distanced in demographic than many other counties in the state. We do not have resources and community support for those whom live out in the country. We do not have broadband, fiber optic lines, and cannot afford satellite internet. So the lack of WiFi technologies is a huge problem for our families. We need in person learning to be available for those who are willing to take that chance and frankly have no other way. Parents, like myself and my husband, are willing to take the risk by sending our kids back to school. They need to go. We have to support our family by working.

COVID19 is gonna happen, that is clear. But we have to be realistic. It has over 99% survival rate. That is the science. Kids rarely get sick from it, and we are smart, educated

parents who maintain distance from the elderly and immune compromised. We wear masks, where needed and we are doing everything we can to adhere to the stipulations setup by the state. It is unclear how many in the last month were hospitalized. And that is the number we should be concerned with not the total cases. The metrics must be changed otherwise our schools will never reopen.

Waiting on a vaccine is clearly not the option either, after seeing the many setbacks of vaccine companies. Waiting on a vaccine will take years. We don't have years to wait. The reality is that we will do what we have to do in order to help our children and our future. If we are given the opportunity to do right by them, or we are going to be forced to leave. And we all know what happens when attendance goes down.

Putting our kids back in school will allow working families to work, it will provide our kids with safety and education they deserve. They will grow stronger and more confident as a result. We will not be forced to take our kids out of our district and move out of state to find education in person, sports to play, and employment. We want to stay. The way we are headed, good, hardworking, and smart people will be forced to leave. We don't want to see suicide, anxiety, drug abuse, depression, and drop out rate sky rocket. You cannot allow this to happen.

Please do the right thing. Listen to the parents. Listen to the warnings of the WHO, that does not advocate lockdowns as a primary means of controlling the virus, (Washington Examiner Oct. 10th, 2020,) Dr. David Navarro warns, "The only time we believe a lockdown is justified is to buy you time to reorganize, regroup, rebalance your resources, protect your health workers who are exhausted." We have done this in Coos County. Thousands of medical health experts signed their names to a petition calling for the end of coronavirus lockdowns, citing "irreparable damage," they have caused. We want our state to be an amazing state to live in. The ball is in your court. This has gone on long enough. Please open our schools up in our county as other have done. Please help change the metrics. Appeal to the leaders that are above you. You have facts. You have science.

OREGON FAMILY GROUPS FORM STATEWIDE COALITION, SEEK PROMPT IN-PERSON REOPENING OF SCHOOLS

Family groups call for prioritizing in-person K-12 options by January 6, 2021

A coalition of parent groups across Oregon have united under a single umbrella organization, **ED300**. We are calling on appointed and elected leaders to remove statewide barriers to in-person learning by January 6th.

The announcement on Monday by the leaders of multiple grassroots organizations represents the first joint effort by tens of thousands of parents from Portland to southern and eastern Oregon. January 6th marks the 300th day since the vast majority of Oregon's approximately 600,000 students set foot in a classroom.

Parents began organizing in September to advocate on behalf of students as we witnessed learning losses, technology failures, repercussions of no school-based activities, accessibility issues for students with disabilities, and significant mental and emotional health challenges for too many students.

"We call on Governor Brown to remove the state's barriers, and ask superintendents, school boards and lawmakers to engage parent groups such as ED300 to implement a safe and prompt return to in-person learning and co-curricular activities for those who choose," said Rene Gonzalez, a parent of three school-aged children and spokesperson for [ED 300](#) and Opening PDX Schools.

"The learning losses attributable to remote education are not recoverable for many students with learning challenges," said Jennifer Dale, spokesperson for Clack to School and parent of three school-aged children, including a daughter receiving special education services.

We are asking the Governor and the Oregon Department of Education to:

- **Immediately prioritize reopening Oregon schools so that all students have an option for in person-learning by January 6th, 2021.**
 - Data from numerous states and countries show schools are not significant sources of spread.
 - OR's recent uptick in cases is not due to schools and data do not support that open schools worsen existing spikes driven by other sources (workplaces and in the community).
 - The mental, social, and educational impacts on children and reduced ability of parents to work is now a crisis that must be addressed.
 - Renowned public health expert Dr. Ashish K. Jha: "Schools need to be bolder about returning to the classroom...There are other things that are far more high risk that we're leaving open while being remote in schools, and that doesn't make any sense.... [T]he idea that schools should be the first casualty, before casinos, bars, and restaurants, in my mind defies logic." <https://www.edweek.org/ew/articles/2020/11/03/schools-need-to->

- **Remove statewide mandates and county-level metrics and replace them with guidelines that will allow for tailored community-level approaches.**
 - We are out of alignment with 42 other states that have guidelines rather than mandates. Oregon's overly blunt mandates are prolonging closures and harming every age student, from early learners to high school students who need support in their journeys to higher education.
- **Collaborate with parents to track and share outcome data related to distance learning.**
 - School districts must be transparent about reporting enrollment data, student engagement information, grading outcomes and attendance in order to allow parents to make informed decisions about in-person versus remote options.
- **Discuss the impact of the looming expiration of the FFCRA (employer paid leave) on December 31st.**
 - Schools will likely reopen in hybrid models. Families must understand how state lawmakers will support Oregon's families and parents.

Good Afternoon:

I am writing on behalf of a very frustrated parent. When my children started school we were living in the Oakland, Or. area, located in Douglas County. We moved a few years ago to Sutherlin and stayed with Oakland School District because that is what my kids were used to. We live in Sutherlin and make the 5 mile commute to Oakland and that has always worked for us. Where our house is located, we are not able to get very good internet coverage. My 8th grader is doing okay with it, but my 4th grader struggles with it every single day. I work Monday through Friday 8:00 to 2:30 and then go to my 2nd job which is Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 4:00 to 8:00pm. My son is 9 years old and in the 4th grade. Between me not being home all day and our glitchy internet connection he is not able to receive any kind of education at the moment. I have spoken with the Superintendent from Oakland School District several times and she is trying to get the 4th graders in school for at least a 2 hours per day. This still leaves my son severely lacking a education. I then called Sutherlin school district who is letting their 4th graders come back to school Monday through Thursday. I was told that

because of ODE's rules my son is not allowed in the classroom because they can only have 18 kids in a class at a time. I explained that we do not have good internet service and my son is not able to get a distance education and online learning will not work for him. That is not to mention that our experience with online education is not even close to what they would receive in the classroom. He apologized and said he understood my frustration, but because of ODE's rules there was nothing he could do. I then asked why Sutherlin School District was allowed to open when Oakland's was not? Oakland is a smaller school district with less kids, 5 miles away from Sutherlin. His answer to me was: "he had to really fight for his kids, and I would have to ask Oakland's Superintendent about that." I am also confused on why Glide, South Umpqua, Hucrest, Winston, UVC, and other schools that surround us and are larger are allowed to open? I have already reached out to an attorney, because the inconsistency with who is allowed to open and who is not are insane and make no sense. Right now my son is getting refused a education and this is NOT RIGHT! If someone could call me or write back to explain some of this I would greatly appreciate.

I currently have children in 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 7th, and finally 10th grades! This is a new frontier for sure!

Last May my now 10th grader attempted suicide and spent 3 days in ICU and was later checked into a mental hospital. There were a lot of contributing factors, but the one issue that pushed her over the edge was the lack of access to sports. This has been an outlet for the stress and grief over the years after the death of her mom.

In light of the recent tragedy (we had an 11th grader who would have been involved in cross country commit suicide this past weekend) and seeing our struggle as a community to find fields and basketball courts to play on, It seems like giving the community access to these facilities may help some kids.

I've heard that lack of liability ins could be an issue. If that's the case I'm sure there are people in the community that could pool our resources to provide some Ins. I can't imagine the stress you have on your plate trying to make these decisions.

Is there anything else we can do to help you make this vital decision? Do we need a petition signed, a protest? How do we arm you with the tools to get these places opened up?

The message below was sent to me by someone promoting school opening, by another person. The message was apparently sent to you. I would like to use this message as a frame to analyze the arguments of those who are promoting the opening of schools.

I did reach out to Dr. Bob and he tried to find a way to put some folks like me, who are promoting safe reopening, with those who are promoting opening — without the necessary components to ensure safety. His objective was to seek to achieve consensus. I tried to get to a level of agreement on the underlying facts. This task was not accomplished. Some of the participants told Bob — in their first message — that they had already achieved consensus — their conclusion was that schools should open. This was prior to considering any of my thoughts. Interesting concept of “consensus.”

However, I want to start with a critical question that I would love one of you to answer very promptly:

You are apparently a government appointed body that is providing guidance on critically important issues. Who is providing staff for your Council? Where have the agendas, underlying resource materials, and minutes of your meetings being publicly posted? Given the critical importance of your guidance it is of profound concern to me that your work appears to be so invisible. I would like to know who is staffing your Council so I can make a public records request. The reasons for this will become evident below.

My comments will be in blue.

Governor Brown, Director Gill, and Council Members,

As a college instructor of public policy and father of boys aged 5 and 8, I am writing to urge you to amend or drop the current metric-based system that is preventing children statewide from receiving effective, in-person education while doing little to nothing to support public health.

I would encourage you to return to the original Metrics on when schools should Transition to Comprehensive Distance Learning, which is that in-person instruction would not continue if more than 30 incidents per 100,000, with one exception — Limited In Person Instruction. But I think we need to revise the LIPI Metric to be safer when the incident rate is over 30. More on the issue of how the Transition Metric was mysteriously changed around September 20 is in the attached document, that I sent to the State Board of Education.

I also want to call your attention to several factors that should inform policymaking.

First, keeping children out of school does not keep them “safe”, contrary to some arguments.

According to the CDC, there have been 39 deaths involving COVID-19 nationwide among children 5-14 year to date through October 21. (https://www.cdc.gov/nchs/nvss/vsrr/covid_weekly/index.htm). This compares to 163,968 deaths for those 65 and older during the same timeframe. Most people understand that COVID-19 is less dangerous in the young, but few consider the enormous magnitude of the difference in relative risk. More people die annually in school bus crashes than of COVID-19 (<https://injuryfacts.nsc.org/motor.../road-users/school-bus/>). The basic math of this disease shows no reason to “protect” children by keeping them out of schools.

First, we need to be considering the safety of all members of the community — not just children. But also school staff, the families of the children and staff, and then the wider community. Because we know from very recent research that children are more likely to get infected, they are less likely to show symptoms, and they appear to be very significant spreaders of Covid. In many families there are people in the house who are at high risk. So a child going to school could become infected, have no symptoms, and then transmit the virus to their grandmother, who is raising them.

This is one reason I want to see what information resources have been provided to you. Have you been provided with the latest research on issues related to Covid and children? If you have not, then whoever is staffing your Council has not provided effective support. If you have not been provided with this research, then none of your guidance should be considered credible.

This is the headline from a recent study by folks at Princeton: Largest Covid-19 contact tracing study to date finds children key to spread, exigence of super spreaders. <https://www.princeton.edu/news/2020/09/30/largest-covid-19-contact-tracing-study-date-finds-children-key-spread-evidence>.

There is some study going on in the US that some leading educational organizations have signed on to. This is being led by an economics professor. Not an epidemiologist. She is already on the record in several commentaries that she thinks schools should open. She entered this study with a preconceived bias that she is now trying to prove. There is NO WAY that anything she or this study reports should be considered credible. <https://www.theatlantic.com/ideas/archive/2020/10/schools-arent-superspreaders/616669/>

I want to know if you have been provided with this information — without a critical analysis. BTW all of these issues — the Princeton study and the bias of Emily Oster have been fully discussed in the Oregon Safe Return Facebook group. Members of this group, me included, have maintained a strong focus on ensuring we fully understand the accurate research. We focus on our efforts on understanding these issues in a manner that is totally evidence based. This darn well better also be the focus of this Council. This is why I need to see what insight you have been provided.

In case you had not notices, the infection rates are increasing. Halloween, Thanksgiving, and holiday gatherings are going to contribute to an increase. National authorities are warning about a “dark winter.” This is NOT the time to increase the potential of super spreader events by opening schools!!!

Related, policymakers need to understand the baseline alternative to not having children in school. When in-person school is not available, children are not held in perfect antiseptic isolation. Instead, they are spending time in disorganized pods or even in daycare with other children in school buildings (in Bend). In light of the alternative, there is arguably no reason to expect a reduction in Coronavirus infection from denying students in-person school.

The environments he noted are not the same as a school environment. There are more children present in school. Others have argued that since grocery stores and salons are open, schools should be able to open.

We have seen new guidance from CDC on what constitutes “contact.” 15 minutes with close connections over a 24 hour period” is considered by CDC to be considered a close contact. However there is other guidance that 6 feet is insufficient — because of the aerosol nature of the virus.

What he did not mention are concerns of schools related to HVAC systems that can spread this virus further. The Metrics have not required that ALL school buildings have an independent HVAC analysis — which could be considered essential before allowing students or requiring significant numbers of staff to be in the building. This requirement should be added.

The safety of staff at schools is important, and some have argued that protecting staff is sufficient grounds for cancelling all in-person learning. That is an extreme position that is unreasonable in light of the precautions in place to maintain distance, limit interactions between cohorts, and use masks. There is no reason to think that these precautions will be ineffective in schools, and in fact there is every reason to believe they will appropriately manage risk.

Proponents of closure have argued that children cannot distance and use masks effectively. This is not true - I coached soccer for both kindergarteners and third graders this fall and can report perfect compliance with mask requirements even under some very unpleasant conditions (heat, smoke). Children listen to adults and there is no reason think they cannot follow COVID protocols.

It should be considered a significant concern that the parents who are promoting opening are so dismissive of the health concerns of school staff. In many communities they are also denigrating teachers regularly online. This will cause ongoing concerns. The more that the state allows the decisions to open to be made at the local level, the greater the level of bullying and denigration of teachers that will occur. This will cause long lasting damage to the community. To avoid the damage that will occur at the local level if you allow more decisions at the local level, the greater the damage.

There are plenty of reasons to realize that the safety protocols that are important will not be sufficient to protect those in the school environment. Simply wearing a mask frequently or always has not been shown to prevent becoming infected. <https://www.cdc.gov/mmwr/volumes/69/wr/pdfs/mm6936a5-H.pdf>. When children are in school, they are allowed to eat. When they are eating, they are not wearing masks.

I also have been a soccer coach for kindergartners to 2nd graders. There are generally around 10-15 children on a team. They play outside. Sometimes they are not compliant.

Other workers are laboring daily in protective equipment for society’s benefit. My wife is a medical professional who sees 12 new patients per day in a small office at a distance of approximately 3’; she has been doing this since April. I will teach a course this winter and have elected to do so in person, not because there is zero risk, but because it is the right thing to do for students and the risk is minor.

Every medical professional is working in an exceptionally safe environment. There is no equivalent in schools. The vast majority of college classes are being provided online — due to a recognition of the risks.

Even if statistical risk is minor, some staff may prefer not to work in person, which is understandable. They should be accommodated, for example through alternative work arrangements or by offering leaves of absence; such policies are already in place in several school districts. This common sense approach lets schools get back to the critical work of educating our children while honoring the concerns and medical circumstances of individual staff.

Many teachers and support staff have reported that although they are at high risk and presented documentation to their district, their requests for accommodations have been denied. The idea that staff “who prefer not to work in person” would be honored is laughable. The choices provided to staff who are at higher risk have been to place themselves at risk or quit.

Recently I provided some emotional support to a member of Oregon Safe Return. She is a special education teacher in a small school that opened K-3 and LIPI for special education in older grades. She is a mom of 2 younger children. She is medically at risk. She provided doctor documentation to her school and her request for accommodations was denied. Shortly after K-3 students came in, there was an infection. One class went into quarantine. The older sibling of a child in quarantine continued to be in her special ed class. This student had challenges with masks and social distancing.

What would you do in that situation? Would you quit to protect your own safety? She can't quit. She needs to money. Write a will and try to explain to her children what might happen if she were to get sick. Check that off — she did that. Pray? Yep, doing that. Cry? Lots of crying. Look for a new position in a district where the leaders care about staff? Likely a good idea. Reportedly, many teachers are doing this. You will be able to tell the districts where the leaders were least concerned about the well-being of their staff by staff turn over. You can be sure of that.

How about filing a complaint with the state? If she were to file a complaint with ODE, that complaint with her name would be sent to her superintendent. She was already being disparaged, subjected to workplace bullying, by other members of the school staff because she was concerned about her health and life. What level of retaliation do you think she would experience if she filed a complaint?

One critical factor you must understand is that there is absolutely NO WAY to ensure that the safety protocols in Ready Schools are being implemented by schools. They clearly are not — as an attached document identifies. But for any staff member to file a complaint takes incredible bravery. Their complaint, with their name, will be sent to their superintendent. Retaliation has occurred and would occur.

I teach a framework for evaluating public policy that compares costs and benefits of a policy, while also weighing equity impacts on the vulnerable. The school closure has minimal if any benefit and imposes enormous costs on children, especially poor children. Risk reduction to staff is perhaps the only benefit of the policy, and it can be more effectively addressed through individual accommodation. School closures are poor policy that should not continue.

One might hope that in his class he would teach that the first step in making public policy is having an accurate understanding of the facts. Another step in the process should be to create clearly understood standards for compliance.

There are disturbing recent increases in COVID-19 incidence in Oregon and nationwide. While this demands attention of policymakers, it should have no bearing on school reopening.

Evidence of the accurate of my prior sentences.

Rather, the state should be managing risk of COVID through other policies that are more effective and less harmful to children. So far, appropriate prioritization on conjunctive management of all reopening has not happened, as evidenced by our open bars and now bowling: [Oregon allows bowling alleys, skating rinks to open with restrictions](#). While a rational state COVID policy is beyond the scope of the council, you can do enormous good by eliminating the metric-based approach and allowing our children to immediately return to school.

Evidence of the accurate of my prior sentences.

I do hope the Council can provide guidance on a rational — grounded in accurate research insight — set of Metrics for opening schools.

I do have some thoughts on what could be accomplished. However, this weekend I am presenting on Trauma, Resilience, and Equity in the Age of Covid and Black Lives Matter at the Association for Middle Level Education Conference and need to get back to this. I also would like to see your minutes and the resources that have been provided to be able to form these recommendations.

Thank you, and I appreciate your efforts to rationalize policy on this matter.

I have never written, called, or emailed any public servant before in my life. But I have also never been so utterly concerned about the well-being of my children, along with the majority of school aged children across the state of Oregon.

Let's paint a picture. I used to have two smart, outgoing and well-adjusted girls. When the pandemic hit, we were told 2 weeks to flatten the curve. I was on board and ready to do what was right to keep people safe and healthy. We hunkered down and stayed in. We stayed home, no play dates, no parks, no sports and no school. We made the most of family time and enjoyed our summer together. My youngest, now in Kindergarten, was able to attend her beloved preschool the entire time. There were no Covid outbreaks.

Those that don't want to return to school, already have that option and choice in place. Lucky for them. Very unlucky for the rest of us.

We are fortunate enough to still have jobs through this pandemic and not have to leave those jobs to assist our children through CDL learning unlike so many others that have had to or need to BUT for our own family, the emotional, mental and social impacts have taken a very large toll from online schooling, staring at a computer screen for hours, not having any motivation left to then continue homework online, 7.5 months of social isolation and no interaction with peers, friends and teachers, the loss of making memories, and the unknown future of college or university for my Senior (let alone everything else her and her peers have been robbed of for the remainder of their Junior year and now Senior year).

It is vitally important for all kids to return to school that want to but in my opinion, especially the Seniors. This is it for them. Their last opportunity for school in their adolescence before they go out into the real world as adults.

My Senior had a really tough few years in school after we moved here from Canada that put her in a really dark place and just when things finally start going well, she is in a good place and has a good group of friends, this happens and she is losing the last 15 months of her high school years to make up for the horrible years she had. The relationships, the experiences the memories, a proper education, and everything that goes along with college/university preparation. All gone. Her high school life could bluntly end after 2.5 years. For many, it will be a form of PTSD. That may sound dramatic but believe me it isn't. When you have a child that has endured more than any teen should, to then take away her last opportunity to heal some wounds is tragic. And she is not the only one.

Both of my children are strong academic students but in addition to the emotional, mental and social impacts, their academics are now suffering. Their motivation and drive to succeed is suffering. Both of my children are academically driven but my Senior especially made it her life goal to put in whatever effort she needed to excel in school and be at the top of her class. Due to the other pains she endured through the years, it was vitally important for her achieve this success. She was driven more than most of her friends and peers. She wanted to stand-out and show her worth in the way she best knows how. And now even that has become extremely difficult with the cancellations of SAT/ACT testing, getting a PASS instead of a letter grade to showcase her achievements for the last 1/2 of 11th grade (and now looking equal to all of those that did not put forth the same effort throughout school) and from not getting the proper education and recognition with in-class learning. It has been utterly deflating for her. Feeling like all the extreme effort she put forth was all for none.

Not having children herself, I don't feel like Kate Brown can truly understand the devastating impacts to children and families. As for the OEA, they should support both the educators that do want to return to school and those that don't. Those that do, can return to in-class learning. Those that don't can continue with on-line learning. There are

probably many teachers who don't want to return that are ready to retire. Give them that opportunity. There are many brand new teachers that are ready to start their careers with in-class learning that can fill in for those that don't want to or can retire. Give them that opportunity.

Hi,

I'm the mother of a Kindergartner in Beaverton School District. When schools closed back in March, I was 100% understanding and supportive. I watched the news unfolding from Italy, and then New York and I was terrified that Covid would explode in Oregon, creating a shortage of ventilators and overwhelming hospitals. I supported Governor Brown's precautions. My husband worked from home, ultimately laying off 30% of the workforce at his company, and then losing his job to the restructuring. His layoff allowed for the flexibility required for my part-time job, which I'm capable of doing from home. We did not socialize with anyone other than my parents. We wore masks. We ordered our groceries online. I saw my 6 year old develop signs of depression. After 4 weeks or so of this, we decided to allow him to play outdoors with the neighbor children. It all felt very fraught and urgent, but it had a CLEAR GOAL.

It never occurred to me that we would not return to school, at least with a hybrid model in the autumn. If I'd known, I would have perhaps been more active earlier on. We survived the summer thanks to wonderful summer camps like trackers and Soccer Shots, which required kids to wear masks once the Governor's orders went into effect, but not before. They did their best with social distancing, but of course with 6 year olds, this was not perfect. My child began to be himself again. He became confident and happy again. I was so grateful.

I'm writing not on behalf of my own child, who will be fine somehow from now until BSD potentially reopens in February, but on behalf of all of the children without the resources and privilege that our family has. We spend \$1600/month on a nanny share, to make sure that our child has the support he needs with CDL. Sharing this with another family makes it financially possible and creates a small-ish social bubble. Our child plays with two families down the street. We let him go to the playground and use hand sanitizer after. My husband has taken a new job, at lower pay, that he can do from home. Without these things, we would be in serious mental health danger. They sound like small things, but they are keeping us going for the long haul.

It seems like priorities were lost along the way. The current standards for re-opening were made before more clear research about potential spread among younger children became available. What I can't understand is the generic way that people refer to a "safe school opening." What is safe? Is safe when there is a vaccine? When Covid is below the rate set by Governor Brown? Why is there such variation among the states for reopening? Do people actually believe that this whole thing will "go away" and we will return to "normal"? Increasingly, epidemiologists are saying we will live with Covid for the long haul. Maybe, a vaccine will work and enough people will get it to stamp it out. More likely, it will be like the flu with seasonal variations, coming back each year. We cannot live like this indefinitely. We can't keep pushing back the inevitable, making children, working parents, those who suffer from abuse, those who are hungry or houseless, or without internet to take the biggest cost in a society that has largely gotten back on with life, albeit with masks and distance. The restaurant industry saw that they had to open or perish and they pushed lawmakers to get back in the game. I wish that teachers could advocate for the health and well-being of children with the same fervor, but fear of this virus has impacted decision making to the point where it's nearly impossible to be rational. The reality is that teachers will get Covid. And kids will too. This will happen if schools are open or not. This virus is terrible. We have not succeeded at eradicating it and must find a way to live with it.

I think that we need to do the thing that will bring the most good to the most people. I don't want my kids to get Covid, but I can't expect them to live in a bubble with no end in sight. School and education is an essential function of society. We cannot function without it. Parents can't work and facilitate CDL from 8-2pm. Kindergartners can't get ready for school and learn social skills necessary to be successful in life on an iPad.

The inequality that will come out of this will have a much larger impact than the virus will have on kids.

What do we need to reopen schools that we don't have? Why can't we create smaller class sizes? Why can't we use the surplus from the budget this year to pay for HEPA filters, hazard pay, PPE, whatever the schools need? Why do we need to base numbers on counties and not school boundaries or zip codes?

We have an enormous opportunity to learn from the many countries and states that have opened schools (or Sweden where schools never closed for K-5th) and to thoughtfully reopen our schools.

Please lead the way. We desperately need leadership not ambiguity.

They are stricter than the rest of the country, which probably seemed like a good idea at the time. Now, it does not at all. These unattainable metrics are holding us back from the rest of the country and world.

Our kids are the ones who are hurting most. They are the ones who are going to bear the burden of catching up academically in the long-term. They are the ones who are battling depression. They are the ones lacking social interaction and safe places they find in school. Online learning does not supplant this in any way. We can stop acting like it does.

I respect this virus and I respect public health. I respect educators and families who may not be willing to send their children to school yet. I believe all of these things can be respectfully addressed, but getting our schools open needs to be a top priority. There are many people pulling out of Oregon public education because of this. They are seeking alternative options...or even just uprooting their lives to move somewhere that takes education more seriously.

I understand that your ability to change or influence these metrics/decisions may be limited. Or it may be totally within your control. I am sending this same letter to people in various capacities, because I do not have the time or tolerance to change it based on the audience...like many parents right now I'm working full time and also bearing a large portion of the burden for my children's public education. I just hope you will do what you can with whatever your influence is.

Regarding your comment in today's press conference that students are unable to get the help they need through distance learning, I wanted to share my schedule with you to show how I am actually providing MORE support than usual. As a speech pathologist doing distance learning, I am able to speak to the parents in the moment, answering questions, modeling strategies, and providing parent coaching. Additionally, thanks to Seesaw messages and assignments, I am connecting with many families more than ever! Students are making great progress because their parents are aware of their individual targets. They join us in celebration when a student meets a goal and they know what they need to be reinforcing throughout the student's day. If the concern is that students can't access teacher support, then there are ways that we can solve that problem through distance learning. It does not require being back in-person.

For reference, this is what my typical Monday looks like:

8-8:30am IEP meetings

8:30-9am Evaluations

9-10am Therapy for students in Life Skills

Dear Sir or Madam,

Thank you for your public service. I understand these are certainly difficult times without easy answers. The purpose of this letter is to relay the concerns I have for my child's wellbeing and request that you take immediate action to change the metrics to facilitate students returning to school.

We have been distance learning since March. At this time, it is easy to come to the conclusion that it is not working. I, as a mother, have had to greatly reduce my work hours in order to assist my children with their learning. It would be impossible to assure any type of education for them otherwise. Thankfully, due to the CARES Act and State Employment, this has not impacted my family financially; however, my work product for my state job has gone way down because nobody is doing my job while I am helping my children with school. This could create an impact on my job and future employment and as a woman, this doesn't help my self-esteem. **It has created tension in the household on who's job is more important at work, the husband or the wives - which it shouldn't come down to this to make sure my kids have an education.**

Not attending school is affecting, not only my child's emotional and mental health, but mine as well. It is too hard and the risk to staying at home far outweighs the risk of going back to school. Overdose and suicide rates are currently outpacing last year in many places in the country. I don't want the same for Oregon, but fear this is exactly what will happen.

While I understand case counts are going up, deaths and hospitalizations and deaths have slowed or stayed the same. The hospitalization rates should be the most important numbers as that is the reason we stayed home in the first place as we didn't want our hospitals to end up like New York and turn people away? Even your own data shows children aged 10-19 have the lowest rate of hospitalization and ZERO deaths.

Other states and even entire countries have opened schools without detriment to their society. New York, where death and hospitalization were a big concern at the beginning, are opening their schools to full-time in person learning! The CDC and WHO have both made statements that students are best served by being in school.

I don't know how kids are doing online learning who don't have a parent available for assistance. Ask the schools how many kids haven't even signed on for one day of class yet! My daughter in 4th grade, 5 out of 23 of her classmates are doing the assignments! That is sad.

Will you adjust the school-related metrics to allow greater flexibility in re-opening? Parents need it, kids need, and the whole state suffers without additional flexibility.

I am here to stress my concerns the digital learning is causing. And how I feel giving the School districts the (OPTION) to give parents the choice to send their kids to school or not. It's so CRITICAL to allow parents the choice, to send their kids to school. When their children are already so behind, on IEP's, Behavioral and such. My kids IEP's plans are NOT being met! My kids IEP's state they need teacher 101 support to be able to physically PASS their classes.

Due to their IEP's NOT being met and by law. They should be. My teenagers a failing. My 5th grader is failing. My now kinder is failing.

By not giving the schools the options to reopen is causing so much more harm then good. When you can have (employers) working all Uber our country from Stores, Malls, Theaters, Doctors Clinics, Chucky Cheese, Restaurants, Parks, Churh and other amusement activities. And many families are bringing there children to these places. And where they can sit and enjoy eating 6ft away for well over an hour suit mask off. Yet we can not give parents the options to send their children to schools to do the same thing. Especially when learning is at risk. Even more so for kids like mine. Suffering due to this poor choice. When other schools in our country is giving parents options.

What happened to module 4???

What brought me to call the Salem Keizer School District office in the first place. Is being repeatedly told my kids have to be logged in for school everyday on school day and be in every class through out the day. And my kids need to be caught up on their homework and everything turned in. And expect my kindergartener to know how to completely log on and out of a computer, and sign in and out of classes all day long on her own. And know how to do all her work on her own basically is a completely a joke.

(PRETTY HIGH STANDARDS and Un- Realistic expectations) for kids with special needs and working parents.

I explained over and over... to the teachers, the principal. That I... let me make this clear. (I AM A WORKING PARENT). I CAN NOT..... quit my lively hood to support my kids financially, and not work. To make sure my kids are logging in all day long.

I do not have family support. That a family member can volunteer their time to sit besides my kids all day long to help them.

I run two businesses on my own. I have 5 kids to take care of, a mortgage and more. I do not get free welfare assistance from the state. My job does not have hours catered to school hours.

My teenagers are on IEP and have Learning disabilities. And they have stressed to me. It's not their responsibility to miss their live class sessions, when they are behind and having a hard time understanding the work. It's too much for them. They are feeling depressed. The work assignments keep piling up. They feel alone and my kids have displayed depression and anxiety and stress greater than when they were attending school. Distance learning / digital Learning. Which does NOT and is proving to not work for my kids on IEP.

Now let's focus on my 10yr old... he is having a hard time as well. He is a 5th grader. He is unable to remember. Or even set alarms to get himself to log back into class at all or on time. He does not know his schedule. He's not sure what assignments are due or what's going on day by day. He just graduated from IEP, besides his speech right before Covid shut down hit. He was just on top of class for reading and Math and happy. He now, had gained weight, he used to come home from school to read a book. And liked math. Since Covid shut down. He dislikes reading, he doesn't like math. He's been unable to see friends and play with them since the shut down.

My child has had ZERO interaction with any kids. He doesn't have family members that are children. So ZERO interaction. No interest in school now.

Give you an example what happened over summer. We had bought our 10yr a Nintendo Switch last Jan. For his bday. So he can play with his friends online in the game called Fortnite. As like most parents. We monitor screen time. Because, it's unhealthy.

When the shut down happened and all summer long. My son spent all day playing the game Fortnite. Because, it's the only way to have an outlet for any kind of social interaction with children besides his siblings that he argues with.

His little sister accidentally broke the Nintendo switch. My son being so kind and loving. Pretend to be ok... not having a Nintendo switch or a way to play with any kids. And went 2 solid months in what I later learned (complete) loneliness. Not one single child to talk to or play with. Due to my business being an all time peak season for work. My younger children were home every single day. With one of my teenagers. Why the rest of us work. I was able to take them camping once for a few days. But that's since Covid shut down the schools. My child home everyday... no where to go or anyone to talk to.

One of my teens pulled me to the side. And been telling me. My son, my 10yr old has been (Secretly Crying) by himself. My son was in such a DEEP secretive depression. That like most parents scared he would commit suicide secretly. After hearing MANY

stories of other teenagers and elementary level children committing suicide due to being forced to stay home. Where schools SAVES lives and helps keep kids from committing suicide, having an outlet, having that social skills, and those teachers to look forward to.

Trapping children to stay home. And a society that is not welcoming and not much where to go and know friends to be around for several months straight in a row. Is critically Damaging!!

I didn't have the money at the moment to buy a new Nintendo Switch. And I think the screen time all day everyday in the tv and plus school screen time is Extremely harmful. I can't imagine anything else being more harmful. Then loosing my son into depression or taking his life over this.

I came home with a new Nintendo switch. And my son Mason 10yrs old. Turned around , and tears were rolling down so hard on his face. And he just held me for along time. He explained how happy he was.

Currently Mason is on screen time when he wakes up for schooling. And after school, he is on screen time for the rest of day. Playing with his friends online till dinner time. That many hours of screen time is so unhealthy... but same time losing a child to depression is worst.

This school disrepair is creating so MANY unhealthy habits and creating depression and suicide rate at a all Time high. I don't want to even go into details for domestic violence and sexual assault children are facing and extremely SICKENING!

Which I was a victim advocate for over 2 years at the district attorneys office. And my older kids and I are survivors of a severe domestic violence situation and I use to substitute in the school district working with behavioral/ life skills kids constantly before Covid shut down. So out of ALL PEOPLE..... I am one individual that knows and understands the TRUE CRITICAL IMPACT. The schools districts are going to have to live with. Knowing they are responsible for such harmful effects keeping the schools closed. The schools KNOW BETTER!! They know the harm this is causing!

Just remember. When your enjoying your family at these businesses and laughing. How many children are at home suffering depression, abuse when they have no outlet to go to for laughter with friends and outlet.

Which frustrates me... I run two businesses and had signed back up as a victim advocate with the district attorneys office again. To help all those families suffering. Then I had to force myself to quit the District Attorneys office. Because with my two business, and volunteering at the DA office. I had to give up one. To try help my kids Navigate this online learning. Even now... it's hard for me and even finding The time or understanding.

This is ridiculous... I'm doing the best I can. With a huge LOAD of responsibilities already as it is. And have to know and learn how all my kids schooling's are working.

Home work... and my own business that requires me still working well around the clock.

And for me to stress my concerns and work schedule to the schools, and teachers and principals. And still get repeated phone calls, and messages from the school district for my kids lack of attendance and home work being turned in and what can we do... (IS ENOUGH).

I can't CHANGE my situation without losing our lively good to survive. I've already quit the DA office I was in. And I can't afford to quit my two business over this. Just because, the school district ((chooses)) to remain closed and not give parents options.

When the school district chooses to remain closed and no OPTIONS for my kids to attend school. They choose for families like mine to suffer.

I'm taking my high school kids to school every Thursday for one hour of 101 help with their case managers. Because, the school online is failing them. Mean time... I have to (drive them) to school. So that means my younger kids will be forced to miss their afternoon schooling Every Thursday. While I drive my kids to school and have to wait for them to be done inside the parking lot with my Kids and work in business.

Right now, my business are entering slow season. So it will get better with me, being home. As March comes around. Business's take off full board and by end of April. I will be working ((all day)) anywhere from 6AM to 11PM. My kids younger kids. Will most likely be forced to drop out of school. If there is distance online Learning in place after February and still giving parents NO option to send their kids to school.

This is outrageous... the school board would put this kind of pressure on working families on my Situation. My LEGAL job as a PARENT is to drop my kids off at school and pick them up. And to provide Food, Roof, shelter, Clothes, Love and take my Kids to DR. Visits.

There is NO LAW, That states as a parent I am Forced to QUIT MY JOB or pay for a baby sitter. So my kids can attend ONLINE schooling. Especially when THE STATE GOVERNMENT will NOT pay for my kids to have a baby's sitter during their school hours. I DO NOT qualify for WELFARE!

So what options do i have?

I like to know the next school board meeting to make my voice heard.

Hi - I'm writing you to request your support in opening schools at least for K-1. These are our most vulnerable learners, most of which struggle with distance learning as they are still learning the essential skills taught in K-1, not only does not knowing how to read/write make following written instructions impossible, but these kids do not have other essential skills learned at this age in the classroom such as the ability to sit still and focus for an extended period of time.

I have 2 students in the Lake Oswego School District (ages 6 and 8). I am writing to urge you to revisit the metrics that are keeping our schools from re-opening in-person instruction. At a minimum, we need K-1 back in school, but K-3 would be ideal.

While virtual learning may work academically for some, we are experiencing growing in-equities for all children, especially our most vulnerable students in grades K-3. We are seeing children who are beginning to suffer unrecoverable, permanent losses in academics, social and emotional growth, and their mental health.

My 6 year old (1st grade) has grown to have a strong dislike to school based on the online experiences in the spring and thus far in the fall. It breaks my heart to see someone just starting his schooling career, to not want to go to school at all. Each day, all of us are in tears trying to get him to do his assignments and sit still on zoom calls for 4+ hours a day. Not only has this experience ruined his school experience, but it is also having a huge negative impact on our family life. We simply cannot go on like this any longer. Additionally, half of our salary goes to paying for babysitters and tutors, so that we can continue to work our full time jobs, although we still spend much of the day assisting with the kids. Schools are the structure and social support children need, now more than ever.

Our school administrators and teachers spent the summer months anticipating and planning to safely re-open in person. Plans are already in place. Please consider revisiting the metrics, and allowing our local counties and districts to decide when and how to safely put these plans in place and bring our children back to school.

As you can see, my son has only one real class this quarter – Physics. Apparently, North Clackamas plans to cram a year's worth of math and language arts into two quarters. How is this allowed and who thought this was a good idea? I've also heard from several different sources that the class schedule was done in this manner to make it more difficult to transition back to a live classroom this year. It is readily apparent to me that offering a good public education to our children is no longer a priority to those in charge of the curriculum in the North Clackamas School District and the burden is falling squarely on the shoulders of parents and students. Indeed, my family was forced to hire a writing/english tutor to make up for the utter lack of instruction being offered to my child this year. As you can imagine, this lack of planning/instruction is going to hit lower income and minority students much harder than others. Can one of you please shed some light as to why available classes/class loads were changed just because students aren't physically present in the classroom? My two boys literally have two hours of instruction per day. Why are teachers not currently teaching/working 7-8 hours a day like everyone else in this country? As a long-time tax payer in this state I am extremely disappointed in the quality of education my children are receiving right now and need some answers.

I am writing to ask you to develop a statement and a plan to continue with Comprehensive Distance Learning for Oregon students and educators.

One of the most difficult things to navigate about this pandemic is the lack of coordinated, national leadership. People without expertise in public health or even basic biology have been in positions to make decisions for the community as a whole. Individuals have had to make their own decisions down to the level of the family. Many people do not seem to understand the risks involved with COVID, not just for our senior citizens, but also in terms of hospital bills and long term consequences and complications owing to damage to the cardiovascular system and organs such as the lungs, kidneys, and brain.

Teachers, school staff, and children have died. Children have been left without parents.

Parents are getting very conflicting messages about schools reopening. In talking with educators around the country, trying to teach various arrangements of in-person, hybrid and remote, for varying and uneven portions of time, with portions of students and staff yoyo-ing back and forth to home in quarantine and back to school, has made the school year very inconsistent and frustrating around the country.

Last week Governor Brown announced new metrics that were supposed to allow more students to attend in person schooling. While at face value this seems like a welcome change the reality is that the guidelines and rules that are set forth in the state of Oregon are too onerous for school districts to feel they can put kids in the classroom and not fear fines and harassment coming from the OSHA line established by the governor.

The Oregon State Board of Education must relax these guidelines before some Oregon Students are lost forever. France and Germany are undergoing unprecedented surge, and yet they have deemed schools essential. Other states within the United States are also going through surges that would dwarf what is happening in Oregon, and yet they understand the importance of education. Utah has prioritized testing in order to ensure that students can safely go to school. Meanwhile, in Oregon, you can go to bars, you can go to casinos, college students can party in Eugene to celebrate a football game, but our youth cannot go to school. Oregon has the lowest test rate per million of any state in the USA, according to www.worldometers.info/coronavirus and yet we are still bound by county wide testing positivity rates.

Numerous studies have shown there is virtually no risk to students from covid, and that community spread does not come from the schools, or from sports. What is harmful is the total shutdown of our schools. The focus seems to be on getting elementary students back to school, and while I appreciate the importance of that, it misses the boat on high school students. OREGON FAMILY GROUPS FORM STATEWIDE COALITION, SEEK PROMPT IN-PERSON REOPENING OF SCHOOLS

Family groups call for prioritizing in-person K-12 options by January 6, 2021

A coalition of parent groups across Oregon have united under a single umbrella organization, **ED300**. We are calling on appointed and elected leaders to remove statewide barriers to in-person learning by January 6th.

The announcement on Monday by the leaders of multiple grassroots organizations represents the first joint effort by tens of thousands of parents from Portland to southern and eastern Oregon. January 6th marks the 300th day since the vast majority of Oregon's approximately 600,000 students set foot in a classroom.

Parents began organizing in September to advocate on behalf of students as we witnessed learning losses, technology failures, repercussions of no school-based activities, accessibility issues for students with disabilities, and significant mental and emotional health challenges for too many students.

"We call on Governor Brown to remove the state's barriers, and ask superintendents, school boards and lawmakers to engage parent groups such as ED300 to implement a safe and prompt return to in-person learning and co-curricular activities for those who choose," said Rene Gonzalez, a parent of three school-aged children and spokesperson for [ED 300](http://www.ed300.org) and Opening PDX Schools.

"The learning losses attributable to remote education are not recoverable for many students with learning challenges," said Jennifer Dale, spokesperson for Clack to School and parent of three school-aged children, including a daughter receiving special education services.

We are asking the Governor and the Oregon Department of Education to:

- **Immediately prioritize reopening Oregon schools so that all students have an option for in person-learning by January 6th, 2021.**
 - Data from numerous states and countries show schools are not significant sources of spread.
 - OR's recent uptick in cases is not due to schools and data do not support that open schools worsen existing spikes driven by other sources (workplaces and in the community).
 - The mental, social, and educational impacts on children and reduced ability of parents to work is now a crisis that must be addressed.
 - Renowned public health expert Dr. Ashish K. Jha: "Schools need to be bolder about returning to the classroom...There are other things that are far more high risk that we're leaving open while being remote in schools, and that doesn't make any sense.... [T]he idea that schools should be the first casualty, before casinos, bars, and restaurants, in my mind defies logic." <https://www.edweek.org/ew/articles/2020/11/03/schools-need-to-be-bolder-about-reopening.html>
- **Remove statewide mandates and county-level metrics and replace them with guidelines that will allow for tailored community-level approaches.**
 - We are out of alignment with 42 other states that have guidelines rather than mandates. Oregon's overly blunt mandates are prolonging closures and harming every age student, from early learners to high school students who need support in their journeys to higher education.
- **Collaborate with parents to track and share outcome data related to distance learning.**
 - School districts must be transparent about reporting enrollment data, student engagement information, grading outcomes and attendance in order to allow parents to make informed decisions about in-person versus remote options.
- **Discuss the impact of the looming expiration of the FFCRA (employer paid leave) on December 31st.**
 - Schools will likely reopen in hybrid models. Families must understand how state lawmakers will support Oregon's families and parents.

K-12 students come back, safely

After nearly all of the country's largest districts started the school year remote-only, students are slowly returning to classrooms. The Washington Post reports that [24 of the country's 50 biggest school districts have resumed in-person classes](#) for large groups of students. Just 11 are fully remote and have no immediate plans to bring students back to classrooms.

The reversal, the Post reporters Laura Meckler and Valerie Strauss wrote, is "driven by fear that students are falling behind and early evidence that schools have not become coronavirus superspreaders as feared."

Comprehensive data are scarce, but that trend has been borne out, anecdotally, across the country. Generally, cases are notably low in elementary schools, and increase slightly in middle and high schools. In Texas and New York City, well less than 1 percent of tests from students and school staff members are positive.

Some scientific research seems to confirm that trend. Two international studies found little relationship between transmission and the return to classrooms, [NPR reported](#).

"Some medical experts are saying it's time to shift the discussion from the risks of opening K-12 schools to the risks of keeping them closed," NPR's Anya

Kamenetz wrote.

They are fortunate because my husband and I could provide them with Macbooks, which do not have the glitches that the district-provided Chrome books do. My kids can now receive instructional time without interruption. What about all the kids who don't have this luxury? They are still contending with interrupted instructional time. I can stay home with my kids to ensure they log on to their meets, do their homework and learn. So many families must decide between a paycheck and staying home to help their children with school. It's wrong. The inequity in distance learning is unacceptable. When will Oregon value public education again? Sadly, it's not a priority in the state right now. The Oregon Department of Education claims its priorities are:

- Graduating our students college and career ready
- Closing the Achievement Gap
- Teacher and administrator effectiveness
- Increasing performance for all schools and districts
- A strong, seamless education system from early childhood through higher education

Yet, it's current actions are causing the achievement gap to grow, performance for all schools to decline and an education system marred with disruption and confusion. In the governor's recent mandate she stated that "youth activities" would remain open, as well as schools. Yet across the state youth sports and schools have been told or have chosen to close. My daughter dances in a studio with 5 other girls, all wearing masks, all spaced more than 36 square feet apart. And they have been ordered closed. What in the world does the state of Oregon expect children to do, in the pouring rain, when no indoor facilities are open to them? These are facilities that have gone above and beyond to make sure that their spaces are safe and up to government standards, and you have shut them down, punishing the children who very clearly have NO voice in any of this. I am so disgusted with my state. In every decision that has been made it has been abundantly clear that Oregon DOES NOT CARE about its future, the children of Oregon. I am lucky, we have a treadmill and little area where my children can at least get a little bit of exercise if I make them. But what in the world do you expect our poorest, most vulnerable population to do, especially the BIPOC community that you claim you care so much about? I love that there is nothing about people rioting in the streets but yet these schools, studios, gyms, that have tried so hard to operate safely no longer are able to because of your "freeze," which I'm sure will not last only 2 weeks. Malls can be open but socially distant dance studios and gymnastics gyms, etc can not be.

Children are depressed, children are hurting. I delivered a meal on Tuesday to a family whose mom suffers from severe rheumatoid arthritis. There are 5 children living in borderline hoardish conditions, with a single mom who is trying her damndest to make it work. These children literally have NO PLACE to go, and their mom is on pain killers just to try to function. It broke my heart. Yet there are literally NO options for them to be in another safe place, and with the weather they can not even be outside other than to walk around in the rain. I am just so fed up with a state that claims to care. I am just so tired of my state not giving a damn about students and not doing anything to help, and instead closing the activities that would give them some hope and something to look forward to and a way to look outside themselves. I don't write this for fear of my own kids, we are doing fine. And because I'm white you probably wouldn't care anyways. I heard that comment several times in September at the ODE meeting, that because the BIPOC community wasn't more represented than what we said didn't matter. I am not writing this because of my kids, but because, as an educator and a mom, I care about our children across the state and I want them to have a voice. Oregon can "follow the science" and do better and be better for our children. Please consider using your voice to allow more students access to education and opportunities for in person learning/growth.

Dear Members of the Oregon State School Board,

The time has come to look at the extensive data from Europe and the rest of the country finding that schools do not have any significant impact on virus spread and reopen all of Oregon's schools now. Increasing the metrics of cases allowed for reopening while simultaneously increasing testing did little to nothing to get the majority of Oregon's children back in school. This is not acceptable. The rest of the world has found that the harms of having children out of school outweigh any benefits of keeping them away, regardless of the amount of cases in the community, which varies with time for other reasons. In fact, Oregon's school and children's activity closures are directly causing a large amount of child suicides and mental health issues. In fact, my child has been asked to help out in a Zoom-based intervention today by the school counselor for her 7 year old friend experiencing significant depression. We don't know if it will work or if my daughter's friend will make the same sad choice so many other children have made in Oregon to escape the agony of CDL, school and activity closures permanently.

In addition, in my son's 5th grade class, his teacher said only 8 out of 28 kids have completed their work. Many teachers report well over half of their students are failing. Our principal told me that a large amount of students have gone backwards in reading, not only not improving since the Spring, but actually are reading at a lower level now than they were last year. My son gets splitting headaches frequently at the end of the school day from spending so much time looking at his chromebook screen even though his eyesight is fine. This method of teaching is not only not working, but it is harming children physically and mentally and taking them backwards in their learning. Please remember that the purpose of schools is to educate children, not to please irrationally fearful teachers unions.

Studies have found that teachers of students in person are at no greater risk of the virus than those in other professions. In my children's school district, Beaverton School District in Washington County, 72% of families want their children to go back to in-person learning. While the small amount of high risk teachers and staff members should ideally be given first priority for online teaching or other jobs for those 28% of families that do not wish to go back to school in person, the majority of teachers are not high risk and should be allowed to go back and teach in person as they are being paid to do. My family is very angry to have our hard-earned tax dollars go to the state without our children getting an effective education in return. It pains me each day my son complains of his headaches from school and asks "Why does Oregon hate kids?"

CDL has failed Oregon's children miserably. The rest of the world considers in person education essential. Reopen all of Oregon's schools to in person learning for those families who want to go now.

Also, since race was a big focus at the last ODE meeting, I wanted to mention that my children are both Hispanic and Native American. However, all children are harmed by these closures and they deserve more prioritization by state officials rather than being continuously put last, behind every business, union and interest group. Please do the right thing and get our children back in school without delay. Thank you for your time.

If you look at the following numbers, it is hard to make a case that COVID-19 is infecting a high percentage of the population of Oregon. (These figures are calculated using a total state population on 4,218,000.)

Total cases based on positive tests: 56,743 (1.34% of the population)

Total hospitalizations: 3888 (0.092% of population)

Total deaths: 788 (0.018% of population)

If you compare this to health figures from the OHA for other diseases in 2018, heart disease killed 8159 (0.195% of the population in 2018), cancer killed 6820 (0.163%) and suicide killed 844 (0.08%). So there were more deaths from suicide in 2018 than we have had from COVID in 2020. Why the different response?

I see it as your job as education leaders to use DATA to reduce the fear of the teachers and especially their union leaders so that schools can re-open immediately!

Let's look at some other data / information:

American Institute for Economic research reported on a large study in the UK that found no evidence of serious harms from COVID-19 to adults in close contact with children, compared to those living in households without children. This has implications for determining the benefit-harm balance of children attending school in the COVID-19 pandemic.

Adverse childhood experiences, including family violence, nonaccidental trauma and mental illness, are expected to increase during lockdown and worsen during the anticipated economic recession.

A study on home confinement in the UAE concluded that the COVID-19 lockdown and fear of infection impacted significantly on children of school ages. It negatively impacted their mental, behavioral, physical, sleep, and eating health.

Johannes Huebner, the head of the pediatric infectious disease department at the Ludwig-Maximilians University Hospital in Munich, recently told [NPR correspondent Rob Schmitz](#) that scientific studies have not detected high rates of transmission in schools. "Most of the infections are brought into the schools by adults, by teachers, and then spread among kids. But most of the time, it's only single cases. It's two, three kids, five maybe that get positive." Thus, despite harsh lockdowns in Europe, children are still attending school.

Dimitri Christakis, a pediatrician at Seattle Children's Hospital and editor of the journal *JAMA Pediatrics*, has just published [a paper](#) that estimates 5.53 million years

of life could be lost as a result of school closures in the United States.

The CDC reported on 11/13/20 that beginning in April 2020, the proportion of children's mental health-related Emergency Department visits among all pediatric ED visits increased and remained elevated through October. Compared with 2019, the proportion of mental health-related visits for children aged 5–11 and 12–17 years increased approximately 24%. and 31%, respectively.

The WHO's special envoy David Nabarro for COVID-19 had the following to say about lockdowns on October 8: ***“We in the World Health Organization do not advocate lockdowns as the primary means of control of this virus,”*** told [The Spectator](#) in an interview aired on Oct. 8.

So, I do not understand your nor especially the governor's response to COVID. You are doing irreversible harm to our children and communities. Please take a different approach.

Hi,

Our family has 3 children in public school. 6th grade (west sylvan, PPS), 9th and 11th (Lincoln, PPS). We are in favor of immediately opening school and moving away from a metric based approach. Why?

Two reasons:

1) Zoom school (CDL) is failing our kids.

a. In PPS for example, 1552 students lost enrollment in Oct; similar trends across all zoom school districts. [LINK](#)

b. Hundreds of PPS students have not been able to access school due to inability to meet the technical needs (for multiple reasons, but this impacts the disadvantaged / at risk student the most). I'm sure this is true across the state.

c. Salem-Kaiser reported 50% of students had at least one F. That is outrageously high and likely similar across other school districts as well. This isn't teachers/student failure. This is our approach to using online only to teach. [LINK](#)

2) It is safer than we "think" to open schools responsibly and safely. Simply stated schools DO NOT increase the spread of COVID when opened correctly.

a. In OHA most recent weekly report, there were 61 open schools in Oregon that had at least one Covid case considering both Students + Facility. Dating all the way back to Sept 4th, on average, there were only 1.9 cases per this group of schools. The most cases in one school was 6. Most have 2 or 1. This is straight forward OREGON proof that we can open schools without them being super spreaders. [LINK](#)

b. There are documents in many cities around the country with similar conclusions. Here are two important ones.

i. In NY as found in the Emily Oster's dashboard there are over 2M staff + students. Staff + Students have a LOWER infection rate per 100K than the Communities they are in. Meaning the strong positive behaviors in the school are safer than the surrounding community. [LINK](#)

ii. In New Orleans with 7 weeks of data, only 43 cases. This is a more diverse city. [NO LINK](#)

Our state is not making the youth a priority. I see tweets from the Governor that are both inflammatory and in many cases simply wrong and lead to increased fear. Yesterday she said on CNN that our cases were growing exponentially. That is factually incorrect. While they have increased from about ~600 per day in October to about ~950 per day in mid November they are now again stabilized, albeit at a higher rate. But this is not an exponential increase (it is roughly a 50-60% increase) and when we say things like "exponential" we scare people

which is not helpful. Oregon, looking at CDC comparisons is still among the best and lowest infection rates in the country. We are lower than many parts of the world as well. Would it be good for us to get this down? Absolutely. Does scaring people by exaggerating accomplish this? No. It just makes people either anxious, scared and/or angry. All are useless emotions to helping ourselves and kids in this world.

The Governor, state leaders and school boards are not prioritizing students. The Governor appears to see kids as "risks" to spread the disease not as an "at-risk" impacted group. The Governor "fear" tweeted about Halloween so many times I lost count. Yet I can't remember the last time she voiced concern about our kids' futures. I don't mean to harp on the Governor, but as you are the key advocates for our kids, the State Board must look carefully and see the errors here in judgement and seek to move us to a data driven assessment of the risk of both opening AND not-opening schools. This has not been done or at least shared.

Zoom school is failing our kids and cannot be adequately fixed. In-school options that include masks, lower populations via hybrid models, careful bell schedules etc... are PROVEN to not increase the spread of the disease and in-some cases are actually decreasing when school rates are lower than the surrounding community (NY). This isn't hypothesis. This is hard data from Oregon and other states. We must eliminate the "case number" metrics to open schools and move toward hybrid options for every school in the state. It is a moral imperative and supported by the data.

Having a 504 Plan has not helped in the least, and he is FAILING all his core classes.

Working in front of a computer from 9am until 3pm is mentally and physically exhausting, and he has little energy left to do additional work IN the computer.

My son needs more individualized help in Algebra, and the virtual delivery is not sufficient. He needs more than the teacher is able to offer via Zoom.

There is plenty of evidence regarding the low risk of children to get sick from covid. I do not understand why high schoolers have not been given a priority for in-classroom learning given the fact that they are capable of self-restraint, of keeping their masks on, and will follow all safety guidelines in order to be in school. Teenagers do NOT trade masks, nor will they go around hugging teachers or other classmates.

My otherwise jovial and optimistic child is feeling defeated. This child of mine has overcome great challenges in his short life, becoming an amazing track athlete in the last few years (top 20 in the 100m and 200m at state level). He has great aspirations for his future. Distance learning is sucking the life out of him, and is not providing the kind of education that he needs. There is NOTHING in his 504 Plan that is supportive of his learning disabilities in this current teaching model.

Please, consider opening schools for all high schoolers as soon as possible. This academic year has proven to be a fiasco in terms of student performance with many failing not just one but several classes. Our teenagers are being robbed of equitable opportunities and an effective pedagogical model.

I want to share a letter I wrote to Governor Brown. I am pleading with you to protect the children of Oregon and open our schools!!

Dear Governor Brown,

My name is Melanie I'm 13 years old and in the 8th grade. I'm writing you today to share my story and experience with the corona virus and restrictions forced on me and my peers. I'm only brave enough to do this because I'm doing it for my Girl Scout Sister Olivia, and for all the Olivia's in the state of Oregon. I have never met Olivia, but she is my sister because we were both Girl Scouts. I say were because Olivia is no longer with us, she took her own life due to the isolation from Covid-19.

I'm sure you remember being a child, but you could never understand what it's like being a child during a pandemic. My entire world turned upside down when school closed in March. I have been living in hell for eight months now. Hell might actually be better than this because at least I would be with other people. I don't even care if their bad people, I just need to be with people at this point! Everything I have ever lived for is gone. I can't play sports, no music lessons, no school, no drama, no clubs. I can't hang out with friends. Zoom is not school, and it's definitely worse than hell!

I am clinically depressed and suffer from an anxiety disorder. I have had a crisis therapist and a regular therapist. Some weeks I have had therapy three or more times. My mom has called the suicide hotline with me. She also rarely sleeps because I scare her so much. She is so worried that I will be another Olivia. That she will wake up one day and find me dead. She has told me this several times during one of our many sleepless nights. She also tells me no matter how bad I feel it is never that bad and always fixable. She's only partially correct though. There is nothing I can do to fix this, only you can fix this! What happened to Olivia never should have happened in the first place! Your restrictions are to blame for that. Taking everything away from us, with no end in sight has left us hopeless. What's left to live for is a question I used to ask myself daily. The answer was always my family. Getting to do math with my papa, playing with my cousin, board games with my aunt. This is what has kept me going all these months. This week you took all that away too with your new restrictions/orders. I have absolutely nothing left to live for, you have taken it all from me. I am left feeling complete defeated, hopeless and see no end in sight. So I will spend many sleepless nights with my poor exhausted mother, because her only goal in life right now is to keep me alive until schools open back up and I get my normal life back.

I searched the internet for hours to look for teen suicide rates during Covid but I was unable to find any information. I do know that suicide is the leading cause of death for teens in the state of Oregon. I'm sure it has gotten much worse this year. We're also ranked 11th highest in the nation for teen suicide. I also know that the corona virus has a 97% recovery rate. I know I'm only 13, but if I did the math right that's extremely good odds of recovering.

I will end this with a few questions for you. How many Olivia's will it take before you end this shut down? How are you deciding who gets to live and die? Oregon's youth are killing themselves because you shut down our communities over a virus with a 97% recovery rate! Im extremely fortunate to have a mom that will go countless sleepless nights for me. I know for a fact that not all parents will do that, nor do all parents know their child is struggling. I have so many friends who are suicidal right now and feel the same way I do! I doubt this letter will even be read by you but I had to try. You need to know what is happening to the youth in Oregon because of this shutdown. I hold you responsible for my Girl Scout sister Olivia's death, and for any other teen that dies from suicide due to isolation from the shutdowns you have ordered. You have zero control over what happens with Covid, but you have 100% control over this! I urge you to reconsider you shutdown and restrictions. This is me tossing you my life hoping you will catch it and make the right choice!

Dear State School Board, Re-Opening Council, Director Gill, and Director Allen I was going to write to you and cite statistics and articles on why schools should re-open. But I am sure you know all the statistics and have read the articles. I have not read one article or study in the past 2 months that has suggested kids should NOT go back to school. Every study agrees that Distance Learning is a disaster, schools are not spreading the virus, parents (especially women) are dropping out of the workforce, the equity gap is further exasperated by school closures. The American Association of Pediatrics is urging states to get kids back to school because of the negative effects this has on kids. Dr. Fauci said, just today, to do everything possible to keep the kids in school. No one is disputing any of these facts. And yet Oregon schools are still closed with no hope of them opening. Waiting for arbitrary metrics that we are never going to meet. When it clear that schools should be treated as essential.

So I struggle with what to write that you do not already know. I wish I could sit down with and talk to you so you could understand. Since that is not possible I guess I will just try to explain what we are going through. The emotional toll this has taken on my kids and our entire family is hard to put into words. I go to work every day because I work for essential businesses. So my kids have been sitting home alone everyday for 8 months now. It has been really hard, but we have managed by staying positive. We were happy to do our part for the good of Oregon. For months I have come home after working all day and engaged my kids with walks, bike rides, puzzle night, cooking night etc. You name an activity and we have done it. But as the months have dragged on this becomes harder. School not starting in the fall was devastating to my kids. But I kept telling them to stay positive and this will end soon. But honestly I just can't do it any longer. I am exhausted from trying to keep a full time job, keep the kids positive, and be involved with their online learning. My kids wake up each day knowing they have no where to go and have to stare at a computer screen all day. They used to be motivated A and B students who loved life, and loved playing sports. The prolonged closures have turned them into angry, unmotivated kids that have trouble getting up each day.

My kids watch the rest of Oregon getting some of their freedoms back. But they do not get any of their school or school activities back. They see friends and cousins in other states going to school, going to football games, having homecomings. All while they have nothing. I can't explain to them why other states can accomplish opening but Oregon can't. Everything regarding Covid in Oregon seems arbitrary. The daycare in our elementary school is open, but we are told it is not safe to go to school. My kids can't play high school basketball, but Pac 12 can play. I guess Covid only spreads in high school gyms and not in college gym? I can't find words to explain this to my kids any longer. I think we are all just numb. I leave for work each day feeling numb and

usually cry all the way to work because I know they are struggling. I call them several times during the day with encouraging words, just praying that this is not the day they decide they can't take it any longer. We all wake up everyday hanging on by a thread, and do whatever we can just to make it through the day. Each day worse than the previous day. I know we can't wait until February (our school district TTSD announced distance learning until at least February) for a change. We were all willing to do this for a short period of time and it was the right thing to do. But you can't expect kids to endure this any longer without any hope that it will end. My kids can't endure this any longer and they feel hopeless. I feel hopeless and mentally unable to help them cope any longer. The next step for me if things do not change will be to quit my job to stay home. I can't leave my kids home alone everyday in the mental condition they are in. This will bring financial stress to add on to everything else we are going through. Not to mention another woman dropping out of the workforce.

I am sure there are thousands of people feeling the same way. I think a lot of people have been pushed to edge and will not be able to handle this any longer. I worry that as the darkness of the Oregon winter settles in, and kids sit at home alone feeling hopeless, that this is a recipe for disaster. We are on the verge of a mental health disaster in this state and you have the power to avert this disaster. There has been one teen suicide (that I know of) recently in Yamhill county. I listened to her mom on a radio show last week and it was heartbreaking. Please don't let there be more. I always hear that one Covid death is too many. How many teen deaths are too many? You CAN open schools and prevent this because opening schools does not increase the spread. The science has proven that schools CAN re-open safely. We will still have Covid in our community, but we will not have kids suffering. Why have both? There are so, so, so many reasons to open the schools. And only one reason (teachers do not want to go back) that I can think of to keep them closed. Seems like an easy decision. I understand there are people who want to continue to stay online, which I respect. They should continue with online. But for those who do not, we deserve a choice to go back and our kids deserve to be educated. And all kids, not just K-3. High school kids deserve the same.

There is one more thing I would like to talk you about. I have been told that Director Gill has said that you are only hearing from white privileged parents and they need to hear from others before things will change. Implying that just because my families skin color is white or we live in a nice house our voices do not matter. Our kids can't feel hopeless because they live in a nice house? That comment does not make any sense to me, but I will ignore that and try to explain why you are not hearing from other families. I grew up in an abusive home. My dad was an alcoholic. He owned a restaurant and worked a lot, so our only salvation was that he was not home a lot. But the nights he did come home drunk were not fun nights. My only good times were school. When I was in school I could forget about what was going on at home. I was able to be a kid and learn and hang out with my friends. I think ALOT about what if Covid had happened when I was a kid. My dad's restaurant would be closed, so he would be home all the time. Schools closed so I have no where to go. Liquor stores would be open so he can still get drunk. I always thought my situation was horrible. But my situation plus lockdowns sounds like a nightmare. A 8 month nightmare that seems like it will never end. How would I have survived that situation? Who would have known it was happening? Who would have advocated for me? I honestly don't know if I would be around today if Covid would have happened when I was a kid.

Living in an abusive home is life altering, and not something I would not wish upon my worst enemy. I know there is at least one kid living in this same situation somewhere in our state. Abusive people are very good at isolating their victims, so no one knows what is going on. There would have been no one in my family writing letters and advocating for me. That is why you are not hearing from people like that. That is why I am writing to you, to advocate for those kids because they do not have a voice. If you have never been through something like this you would not ever consider it when sitting around making your decisions. I want you to think about these kids when you talk about keeping schools closed. Should you protect these kids who have no voice, or should you protect teachers who are afraid to come back to work? Science says teachers that are under 60 and in good health will be fine coming back to work. There is no science that says kids will be fine if you keep schools closed. In fact, science says the exact opposite. So please, please get the youth of Oregon back into schools soon. Nothing good will happen if you do not, and the consequences will be dire.

I'm only brave enough to do this because I'm doing it for my Girl Scout Sister Olivia, and for all the Olivia's in the state of Oregon. I have never met Olivia, but she is my sister because we were both Girl Scouts. I say were because Olivia is no longer with us, she took her own life due to the isolation from Covid-19.

I'm sure you remember being a child, but you could never understand what it's like being a child during a pandemic. My entire world turned upside down when school closed in March. I have been living in hell for eight months now. Hell might actually be better than this because at least I would be with other people. I don't even care if their bad people, I just need to be with people at this point! Everything I have ever lived for is gone. I can't play sports, no music lessons, no school, no drama, no clubs. I can't hang out with friends. Zoom is not school, and it's definitely worse than hell!

I am clinically depressed and suffer from an anxiety disorder. I have had a crisis therapist and a regular therapist. Some weeks I have had therapy three or more times. My mom has called the suicide hotline with me. She also rarely sleeps because I scare her so much. She is so worried that I will be another Olivia. That she will wake up one day and find me dead. She has told me this several times during one of our many sleepless nights. She also tells me no matter how bad I feel it is never that bad and always fixable. She's only partially correct though. There is nothing I can do to fix this, only you can fix this! What happened to Olivia never should have happened in the first place! Your restrictions are to blame for that. Taking everything away from us, with no end in sight has left us hopeless. What's left to live for is a question I used to ask myself daily. The answer was always my family. Getting to do math with my papa, playing with my cousin, board games with my aunt. This is what has kept me going all these months. This week you took all that away too with your new restrictions/orders. I have absolutely nothing left to live for, you have taken it all from me. I am left feeling complete defeated, hopeless and see no end in sight. So I will spend many sleepless nights with my poor exhausted mother, because her only goal in life right now is to keep me alive until schools open back up and I get my normal life back.

I searched the internet for hours to look for teen suicide rates during Covid but I was unable to find any information. I do know that suicide is the leading cause of death for teens in the state of Oregon. I'm sure it has gotten much worse this year. We're also ranked 11th highest in

the nation for teen suicide. I also know that the corona virus has a 97% recovery rate. I know I'm only 13, but if I did the math right that's extremely good odds of recovering.

I will end this with a few questions for you. How many Olivia's will it take before you end this shut down? How are you deciding who gets to live and die? Oregon's youth are killing themselves because you shut down our communities over a virus with a 97% recovery rate! I'm extremely fortunate to have a mom that will go countless sleepless nights for me. I know for a fact that not all parents will do that, nor do all parents know their child is struggling. I have so many friends who are suicidal right now and feel the same way I do! I doubt this letter will even be read by you but I had to try. You need to know what is happening to the youth in Oregon because of this shutdown. I hold you responsible for my Girl Scout sister Olivia's death, and for any other teen that dies from suicide due to isolation from the shutdowns you have ordered. You have zero control over what happens with Covid, but you have 100% control over this! I urge you to reconsider your shutdown and restrictions. This is me tossing you my life hoping you will catch it and make the right choice!

This child's experience hits so close to home for my boys and I right now. I've been in and out of the ER and mental crisis center with the both of them several times since school has started in September; my sophomore in high school is having consistent panic attacks and wanting to at the worst of his days, end his life because he doesn't believe he can endure any more of the grief that he's experiencing. My other child who is in sixth grade is dealing with daily anxiety attacks that are giving him debilitating nausea and he has barely eaten or drunk anything in over 6 weeks.

I am a single mother, working full time. I don't have the luxury of a plethora of family or friends to sit with them everyday, helping them feel less lonely or helping them succeed in school. School was a safe, healthy place for them to learn, socialize and feel connected in their community.

I come home each night to missed assignments and broken spirits. I have walked them through their school work with them the best I can but most of the time, they stare at the computer like statues. Both of them were failing every class and somehow I held their hands through their missing assignments right before their fall term ended, so they could pass some of their classes. We stayed up until midnight getting caught up. They were barely engaged. I was a 4.0 college grad and the online learning was even challenging for me to navigate. How can they learn a meaningful, comprehensive education in this platform when they can barely function with living through the day without distress?

Before COVID forced us into lock down, they were both highly social, both played a variety of sports and neither had a hint of mental health issues compared to now. Neither one of them have any more desire to join sports teams or even go outside for fresh air.

Life is diminishing for them by the day and they both feel that the normalcy to their lives has ended. I do the best I can to say uplifting, optimistic things to them daily; I try to give them hope that change will occur when there's a vaccine, or that this time they're in will build resilience. I fight daily to save their young, vulnerable souls from type of pain that could ultimately take their lives or ruin their futures, if they continue to be hindered by this mental health distress.

I have been searching for therapists or psychologists for almost 2 months; mental health providers are booking out months, not accepting new patients or straight up not returning my calls.

The pediatrician sends his social worker into the room each time make an appointment, which we've had to go to more times in the past few months than in their entire infancy and childhoods. The social worker gives the kids a generic list of coping mechanisms and sends them on their way. While the intention is pure, it doesn't help them one bit; trust me when I say I've tried beyond comprehension to help them apply these lists of coping skills, they don't work. It's almost a mockery to their misery at this point.

I fear where their minds will be after a long, cold, dark winter and months more of isolation. I love them more than life itself and feel both helpless and heartbroken to see them in this much pain. My career life has rebounded and they see me live a normal routine, day in and day out and they ask why they are being asked to isolate in misery. Our family needs a solution before my kids become a statistic. There is no reason that the school districts of Oregon can't put together an option for in person classes. How much longer do my children and many of other children, the group that will soon be adults in society, need to sit and decline? For many of them, how will these past months and the months upcoming, reshape their futures and ultimately the future of our society, unfavorably?

I am a mother of two kids, Zoe (8) and Finn (5), my children are enrolled at Three Rivers Elementary School in 3rd grade and kindergarten. My 5 year old has not had the the opportunities that should be afforded to him because of this pandemic and my daughter Zoe has been struggling since the start of school. She does not want to take instruction from her mother, she doesn't want to sit and stare at a screen counting down the minutes to her next webex meeting and next assignment, so that she can rush through it to just get it done. She is not retaining information like she once use too, school is simply not fun anymore, and instead it is something she dreads every morning. She asks me everyday, "when do I get to go back to school?" and I have no answers for her.

I want to know why my kids are not in school and why there are not essential to you? This has gone on long enough, COVID is not going away, the rest of the world continues on, but schools do not. We are seeing increased numbers because Kate Brown has ordered more rapid testing to be done and shocking enough there has been a huge spike in positive tests, which the false positivity rate is a whole other issue that has yet to be addressed and I imagine never will. We are seeing increased numbers because it's cold and flu season, people are indoors more, and people are simply tired of living in fear. We should be looking at the number of deaths in Deschutes county, not the number of positive COVID tests.

I am tired of hearing "wear your mask" "socially distance" "avoid large crowds" "wash your hands" because I and my family are doing that and yet we are still not in school! The highest age group of individuals with COVID in Deschutes county is 20-29. Please, help me understand this? I am an Occupational Therapist, I work in acute care at St Charles. I have worked with many COVID patients, I do not live in fear! I go to work and do my job because otherwise I don't get paid, my family doesn't eat, and I cannot keep a roof over their heads! I don't have a union backing me and state taxes paying me! As far as I'm concerned, if teachers, the school board and union cared about my kids, then the school board would be urging teachers to walk out of their webex's and refuse to teach until their kids are back in classrooms, but sadly I do not see that happening. Again, please tell me why my kids are not essential?? I imagine if all of us parents pulled our kids out of the Bend/LaPine school district, then something might change because its simple, money talks!

I'd like to add my voice to the growing number of parents, students, and educators pushing for schools in Oregon to reopen soon. I have a long history in the education system, having five kids of my own in the public school system (k-6th), serving as the Vice President of our elementary PTSO, having taught science in a public high school, and currently teaching as a professor at a public four year university. I support and greatly value education in all its varieties.

I understand many of the complexities associated with a safe return to school, and I initially strongly supported the lockdown measures the state of Oregon took. I was proud to be an Oregonian at first, as I observed the cautious and science-backed approach that our leaders took to protect lives. As time has passed on, however, it seems that school reopenings have fallen to the bottom of the list of priorities. I remember distinctly thinking in April of 2020 that surely the Department of Education was planning ahead to find a way for students to return by Fall. I'm very disappointed that this return has still not happened. I'm disappointed to see economic needs consistently being prioritized above the needs of our children and families. Why must we ask the children, the least susceptible to the virus among us, to make the biggest sacrifice?

Why must my Kindergartener be deprived of peers and required to navigate pages upon pages of an online learning system? Why must my child with ADHD/Dyslexia rely solely on her parent to help her navigate her learning challenges during her first year of middle school? Why must she have to deal with this alone when the state is still paying counselors and paraeducators, but not allowing those employees and struggling students to interact in person, in meaningful ways? 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BACKGROUND

The State Board of Education adopts instructional materials on a 7-year subject matter cycle prior to October 31 each year. This results in a 7-year contract with publishers for the content area proposed for adoption (ORS 337.050, OAR 581-011-0070, and OAR 581-011-0071). Due to the impact of COVID-19, the rule was temporarily revised to allow the State Board of Education to adopt World Language materials prior to December 31, 2020.

During the summer of 2020, reviewers in the 2020 World Languages Evaluation received one day of training, and Review Leaders received an additional two hours of training. The training included an equity grounding with Mariana Praschnik-Enriquez, a team member from the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion office, and a session on Accessible Educational Materials by Linda Brown with Office of Enhancing Student Opportunities. Panelists received technical training about scoring and writing high-quality feedback statements in addition to the aforementioned sessions. The training materials will be included on the Instructional Materials site as guidance for school districts that wish to conduct independent reviews and/or professional development.

The review panel reviewed and evaluated materials virtually during the month of August. The reviewers provided comments and feedback describing how each submission conformed to the review criteria. This information will be shared when the adopted list is published and can be used by districts to support their local adoptions. Score notification was provided to publishers on September 4, 2020 and a list of recommendations was compiled.

Oregon Department of Education hereby requests the State Board of Education adopt basal instructional materials for World Languages beginning February 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2027.

Basal instructional materials are not considered a comprehensive curriculum. To that end, school districts will need to review the strengths and weaknesses of each instructional material listed to guide supplemental material selection. The reviewed World Languages instructional materials must meet a threshold of 80% of criteria to be approved for recommendation.

Following adoption by the State Board of Education, school districts make the local decision to select and adopt from the ODE list (ORS 337.050 and OAR 581-022-2355), independently adopt instructional materials using the state criteria (OAR 581-022-2350) or postpone adoption for up to two years (OAR 581-022-2360).

EQUITY IMPACT ANALYSIS

By providing a list of approved instructional materials in World Languages, students from different communities including those historically underserved may have access to high-quality instructional materials. Adopting the list for World Languages will work towards the elimination of the achievement gap and opportunity gap by allowing students access and opportunity to high-quality materials and resources.

Because of the equity training provided to panelists, during the World Languages instructional materials evaluation in August 2020, participants on the French language committee identified content that is not aligned with ODE's equity stance. The evaluation committee came to a unanimous consensus that the materials should not be recommended to the State Board of Education based on the presence of negative stereotypes and outdated, racially coded language. The materials were scored as a "Does Not Meet" and are not recommended for adoption.

Adoption of the list of World Languages instructional materials will save school districts money by allowing them to choose from the list rather than conducting independent adoptions. Districts who purchase from the state adopted list receive a guaranteed contract price for six years. However, school districts may still conduct independent adoptions if they so choose.

EFFECT OF A "YES" OR "NO" VOTE

A "Yes" vote will provide Oregon school districts with a list of World Languages instructional materials to choose from that are aligned to the World Language adopted criteria.

A "No" vote will mean that there will not be an ODE approved list of adopted World Languages instructional materials for Oregon school districts; therefore, school districts would need to conduct independent adoptions to choose their World Language materials.

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BACKGROUND

1. History:
 - a. What prompted the rule (why do we have it?) State law? Federal law? Incident? Why are changes/amendments being proposed?
 This rule exists to regulate the safe administration of medication to students in school. The rule specifies training requirements for anyone administering medication in a school setting. ODE is proposing that this rule be ammended to clarify that, during the 2020-2021 school year, the required medication administration training’s ‘in person’ requirement can be met in a synchronous, virtual format, as long as certain conditions are met.
 - b. What is the current requirement in rule or statute?
 The rule (581-021-0037) refers back to ORS 339.869, which requires that ODE set forth rules for medication administration in schools. The rule requires that all staff who are designated to administer medication in school must be trained in-person every 1st and 3rd year by licensed personnel, and online in the intervening years.
 - c. Why is this rule being brought forward right now?
 School nurses and other school health staff are concerned about exposure to COVID-19 during in-person trainings. Although ODE has developed a memo that strongly encourages school districts to maintain face to face training offerings, if safety & infection prevention protocol cannot be ensured, then only using a synchronous, virtual, interactive format may qualify as ‘in person’.
2. Purpose
 - a. What function does the current rule hold?
 To ensure reduce health-related barriers for students obtaining an education.
 - b. How long has the rule been in place?
 The rule has been in place since 1998, and revised this year (2020) to include rules to support policies to allows for the adminitration of medication to reduce an opioid overdose.

 - o It is recommended that medication training which requires skill demonstrations be provided via same-room in-person format with appropriate disease prevention measures in place.
- ii. Trainers must be licensed and working within their scope of practice.
 - o It is recommended that trainers who have never conducted medication administration training before conduct the training via same-room in-person format first, or reach out to experienced trainers to co-facilitate via distance format.
- iii. Content is provided at a distance via synchronous, interactive online sessions with the trainer and learners visible on screen.
 - o It is recommended to limit the number of learners so that sessions can be as interactive as possible.

581-021-0037

Administration of Medication

(1) As used in this rule, definitions of terms shall be as follows:

(a) "Adrenal crisis" means adrenal crisis as defined in ORS 433.800.

(b) "Adrenal insufficiency" means adrenal insufficiency as defined in ORS 433.800.

(c) "Asthma" means a chronic inflammatory disorder of the airways that requires ongoing medical intervention.

(d) "Designated personnel" means the school personnel designated to administer medication pursuant to district policy and procedure.

(e) "Medication" means:

(A) Any drug, chemical compound, suspension or preparation in suitable form for use as a curative or remedial substance taken either internally or externally but not injected;

(B) Premeasured doses of epinephrine;

(C) Medication to treat adrenal insufficiency;

(D) Glucagon to treat severe hypoglycemia; and

(E) naloxone or any similar medication that is designed to rapidly reverse an overdose of an opioid drug.

(f) "Nonprescription medication" means medication that under federal law does not require a prescription from a prescriber.

(g) "Notice of a diagnosis of adrenal insufficiency" means written notice to the school district from student or the parent or guardian of a student who has been diagnosed as adrenal insufficient with a copy of an order from the student's primary care provider that includes the student's diagnosis, description of symptoms indicating the student is in crisis, prescription for medication to treat adrenal insufficiency crisis, and instructions for follow-up care after medication to treat adrenal insufficiency crisis has been administered.

(h) "Prescriber" means:

(A) A doctor of medicine or osteopathy or a physician assistant licensed to practice by the Board of Medical Examiners for the State of Oregon except as allowed under subsection (5) of this rule;

(B) An Oregon-licensed advance practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority;

(C) A dentist licensed by the Board of Dentistry for the State of Oregon;

(D) An optometrist licensed by the Board of Optometry for the State of Oregon;

(E) A naturopathic physician licensed by the Board of Naturopathy for the State of Oregon; or

(F) A pharmacist licensed by the Board of Pharmacy for the State of Oregon.

(i) "Prescription medication" means any medication that under federal law requires a prescription by a prescriber.

(j) "Severe allergy" means a life-threatening hypersensitivity to a specific substance such as food, pollen, dust, or insect sting.

(2) (a) School districts shall adopt policies and procedures that provide for:

(A) The administration of medication to students by designated personnel;

(B) The administration of medication by a student to themselves without assistance from designated personnel; and

(b) School districts may adopt policies and procedures that provide for the administration of naloxone or any similar medication that is designed to rapidly reverse an overdose of an opioid drug by trained school personnel to any student or other individual on school premises who the personnel believe in good faith is experiencing an overdose of an opioid drug.

(3) Policies and procedures for the administration of medication to students by designated personnel shall:

(a) Include a process to designate and supervise appropriate school personnel that takes into account when a student is in school, at a school-sponsored activity, under the supervision of school personnel, and in transit to or from school or school-sponsored activities;

(b) Require designated personnel to successfully complete annual training on the administration of medication.

(A) Training for designated personnel must be provided by a person who is familiar with the delivery of health services in a school setting and who is:

(i) A Registered Nurse licensed by the Oregon State Board of Nursing;

(ii) A doctor of medicine or osteopathy or a physician assistant licensed to practice by the Board of Medical Examiners for the State of Oregon; or

(iii) A pharmacist licensed by the Board of Pharmacy for the State of Oregon.

(B) The training for designated personnel must be based on requirements set out in guidelines that are approved by the Oregon Department of Education and include a discussion of applicable district policies, procedures and materials;

(C) The first training for a designated personnel and every third training thereafter must be provided in-person. During the intervening years, designated personnel may complete an online training that has been approved by the Oregon Department of Education so long as a trainer is available within a reasonable time following the training to answer questions and provide clarification. For the 2020-2021 school year, to qualify as “in-person” a distance training format may only be considered when these measures can be met:

i. Emergency medication training that requires skill demonstrations must follow OHA rules and updated guidance.

o It is recommended that medication training that requires skill demonstrations be provided via same-room in-person format with appropriate disease prevention measures in place.

ii. Trainers must be licensed and working within their scope of practice.

o It is recommended that trainers who have never conducted medication administration training before conduct the training via same-room in-person format first, or reach out to experienced trainers to co-facilitate via distance format.

iii. Content is provided at a distance via synchronous, interactive online sessions with the trainer and learners visible on screen.

o It is recommended to limit the number of learners so that sessions can be as interactive as possible.

o It is recommended that a second person co-facilitate online sessions to support engagement of all participants.

(c) Permit designated personnel to administer prescription medication where:

(A) Because of its prescribed frequency or schedule, the medication must be given while in school, at a school-sponsored activity, while under the supervision of school personnel, and in transit to or from school or school-sponsored activities;

(B) The student's parent or guardian has provided written permission or the student is allowed to seek medical care without parental consent pursuant to ORS 109.610, 109.675 and 109.640; and

(C) The student or the student's parent or guardian has provided the school district with written instruction for the administration of the medication from the prescriber that includes the name of the student, name of the medication, dosage, method of administration, frequency of administration, any other special instructions, and the signature of the prescriber. A prescription medication label prepared by a pharmacist at the direction of a prescriber shall be sufficient if all of the information required by this definition except for the prescriber's signature is included.

(d) Permit designated personnel to administer nonprescription medication where:

(A) The nonprescription medication is necessary for the student to remain in school;

(B) The nonprescription medication is provided in the original manufacturer's container by the parent or guardian of the student;

(C) The student or the student's parent or guardian has provided written instruction for the administration of the nonprescription medication that includes the name of the student, name of the medication, dosage, method of administration, frequency of administration, any other special instructions, and signature of the student's parent or guardian. If the written instruction is not consistent with the manufacturer's guidelines for the nonprescription medication, the written instruction must also include a written order allowing the inconsistent administration signed by a prescriber; and

(D) For nonprescription medication that is not approved by the Federal Drug Administration, a written order from the student's prescriber that includes the name of the student, name of the medication, dosage, method of administration, frequency of administration, a statement that the medication must be administered while the student is in school, any other special instructions, and the signature of the prescriber.

(e) Include procedures for the administration of premeasured doses of epinephrine by school personnel trained as provided by ORS 433.815 to any student or other individual on school premises who the personnel believe in good faith is experiencing a severe allergic reaction, regardless of whether the student or individual has a prescription for epinephrine;

(f) Include procedures for the administration of medication by school personnel to treat a student who the personnel believe in good faith is experiencing symptoms of adrenal crisis. The procedures must provide that:

(A) Only upon notice of a diagnosis of adrenal insufficiency as defined in this rule, the building administrator of the school the student attends will designate one or more school personnel to be responsible for administering medication to treat adrenal insufficiency in the event the student exhibits symptoms that school personnel believe in good faith indicate the student is experiencing symptoms of adrenal crisis;

(B) The designated personnel will successfully complete training to administer medication to treat a student who has adrenal insufficiency and is experiencing symptoms of adrenal crisis in accordance with rules adopted by the Oregon Health Authority;

(C) The student or parent or guardian of the student must provide adequate supply of the student's prescribed medication to the school district; and

(D) In the event that a student experiences symptoms of adrenal crisis and the designated personnel determines the medication to treat adrenal insufficiency should be administered, any available school personnel will immediately call 911 and the student's parent or guardian.

(g) Provide guidelines for the management of students with life-threatening food allergies and adrenal insufficiency while the student is in school, at a school-sponsored activity, while under the supervision of school personnel, in before-school or after-school care programs on school-owned property, and in transit to or from school or school-sponsored activities. The guidelines must include:

(A) Standards for the education and training of school personnel to manage students with life threatening allergies or adrenal insufficiency;

(B) Procedures for responding to life-threatening allergic reactions or adrenal crisis;

(C) A process for the development of an individualized health care and allergy plan for every student with a known life-threatening allergy and an individualized health care plan for every student for whom the school district has been given proper notice of a diagnosis of adrenal insufficiency as defined in this rule;

(D) Protocols for preventing exposures to allergens;

(E) A process for determining if or when a student may self-carry prescription medication when the student has not been approved to self-administer medication;

(h) Address the following:

(A) Safe storage, methods for administration, handling, monitoring supply and disposing of medications;

(B) Transcribing, record keeping and reporting of medication administration, including errors in administration;

(C) The role of designated personnel to monitor student responses to medication;

(D) Emergency medical response for life threatening side effects and allergic reactions, including the administration of premeasured doses of epinephrine to students and other individuals; and

(E) Confidentiality of student health information contained within the education record.

(4) Policies and procedures for the administration of medication by a student to themselves without assistance from designated personnel shall:

(a) Permit a student to administer prescription medication to themselves where the student is able to demonstrate the ability, developmentally and behaviorally, to self-administer medication and has permission to self-administer medication from a school building administrator, and a prescriber or registered nurse practicing in a school setting.

(b) Permit a student to administer non-prescription medication to themselves where the student is able to demonstrate the ability, developmentally and behaviorally, to self-administer medication and the student has permission to self-administer medication from a building administrator;

(c) Require parental consent except where a student is allowed to seek medical care without parental consent pursuant to ORS 109.610, 109.675, and 109.640;

(d) For nonprescription medication that is not approved by the Federal Drug Administration, require a written order from the student's prescriber that includes the name of the student, name of the medication, dosage, method of administration, frequency of administration, a statement that the medication must be administered while the student is in school, any other special instructions, and the signature of the prescriber.

(e) Include policies and procedures for the self-administration of medication by kindergarten through grade 12 students with asthma or severe allergies that comply with ORS 339.866;

(f) Address the following:

(A) Safe storage, methods for administration, handling, and disposing of medications;

(B) Record keeping;

(C) Whether student response to medication should be monitored by designated personnel and the role of designated personnel in such monitoring;

(D) Emergency medical response for life threatening side effects and allergic reactions, including the administration of premeasured doses of epinephrine; and

(E) Confidentiality of student health information contained within the education record.

(5) Policies and procedures for the administration of naloxone or any similar medication that is designed to rapidly reverse an overdose of an opioid drug by trained school personnel to any student or other individual on school premises who the personnel believe in good faith is experiencing an overdose of an opioid drug shall:

(a) Include a process to designate and supervise appropriate school personnel that takes into account when students or others are in school or at a school-sponsored activity.

(b) Require designated personnel to successfully complete training developed by the Oregon Health Authority on the administration naloxone every three years. The training must be delivered in accordance with rules adopted by the Oregon Health Authority.

(c) Permit designated personnel to administer naloxone or any similar medication that is designed to rapidly reverse an overdose of an opioid drug by trained school personnel to any student or other individual on school premises who the personnel believe in good faith is experiencing an overdose of an opioid drug.

(d) Address the following:

(A) Safe storage, accessibility and availability of the medication during an emergency, methods for administration, handling, and disposing of medications;

(B) Record keeping;

(C) Whether response to medication should be monitored by designated personnel and the role of designated personnel in such monitoring;

(D) Emergency medical response procedures following administration of the medication; and

(E) Confidentiality of health information for the person receiving the administration of medication.

(6) A registered nurse who is employed by a public or private school or by an education service district or a local public health authority as defined in ORS 431.003 to provide nursing services at a public or private school may accept an order from a physician licensed to practice medicine

or osteopathy in another state or territory of the United States if the order is related to the care or treatment of a student who has been enrolled at the school for not more than 90 days.

OAR 581-021-0081 – Student Absences

(1) Definitions for the purpose of this rule:

(a) “Family member or Caregiver” means a family member or caregiver responsible for and appointed to represent a student.

(b) “Student” means a minor between the ages of ~~6~~7 and 18 who has not completed the 12th grade, and who is not exempt from compulsory attendance under ORS 339.030.

(c) “Eligible Student” means a student who has reached 18 years of age, a legally emancipated student, or a student who is attending only an institution of postsecondary education and is not enrolled in a secondary school.

(d) “Excused absence” means an absence from school as allowed in ORS 339.065.

(e) “Mental or behavioral health absence” means an absence taken by a student to promote their mental and behavioral health as stated by the family member or caregiver.

(2) Absence Documentation. School districts can not require confirmation of a healthcare provider appointment following a student’s absence, unless required by the public health authority.

(3) Absence Recording. For purposes of accurate tracking of regular attendance, the school must record military-connected absences separately from other absences per ORS 339.065.

(4) Notice of Excused Absence Allowances. Schools must include information about the number and type of allowed excused absences as outlined in ORS 339.065 in the student policy handbook as developed for ORS 339.250 that is distributed to students and families at the beginning of each school year. The following must be included in the student policy handbook:

(a) Mental or behavioral health as excused absences.

(b) Absences related to being a dependent of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States.

(5) School Response to Absence. When notified by a family member, caregiver, or eligible student of an excused or unexcused absence, schools must:

(a) Allow work missed by the student to be made up within a reasonable period of time following the return to school, at a minimum of one day per day absent. Schools must work with students to determine what is reasonable based upon the student needs, academic

situation, and amount of make up work to be completed. For a planned absence, schools should provide homework prior to the absence. Evaluation of student work received within the allowable time following return to school shall not incur a penalty or grade reduction related to being late.

(b) Offer equitable access to community, academic, and social/emotional resources. Resources must be culturally and linguistically responsive and support mental/behavioral health and physical well-being.

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BACKGROUND

1. History:
 - a. What prompted the rule (why do we have it?) State law? Federal law? Incident? Why are changes/amendments being proposed?
Following the passage of Oregon HB 2191 (2019) and HB 2556 (2019), the ODE staff received many inquiries from schools and districts to clarify the wording of the OAR. Subsequently, ODE staff held listening sessions and conducted a survey to understand the needs of school districts for clarification about student absences. These two bills added types of excused absences—mental or behavioral health and dependents of members of the Armed Forces of the United States to the list in ORS 339.065.
 - b. What is the current requirement in rule or statute?
There are no current rules that respond to the ORSs mentioned in both bills. ORS 339.065, the main amended ORS, specifies the types of absences that must be excused by school districts when calculating Regular Attendance.
2. Purpose
 - a. What function does the current rule hold?
N/A. This is a new rule.
 - b. How long has the rule been in place?
N/A. This is a new rule.
3. Does the board have any areas of discretion or is this strictly mirroring statute?
 - a. If the board does have discretion, those areas should be called out here or in the next section.
This is strictly mirroring statute.
4. Stakeholder voice/input (individual and collective i.e., groups)
 - a. Who was involved in bringing this to the Board?

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The Every Day Matters team, in collaboration with Tribal Attendance Promising Practices staff, both working to reduce chronic absenteeism in Oregon at the ODE have created this OAR after hosting listening sessions and a survey across the state to determine the areas for clarification regarding student absences.

b. What did engagement in this process entail?

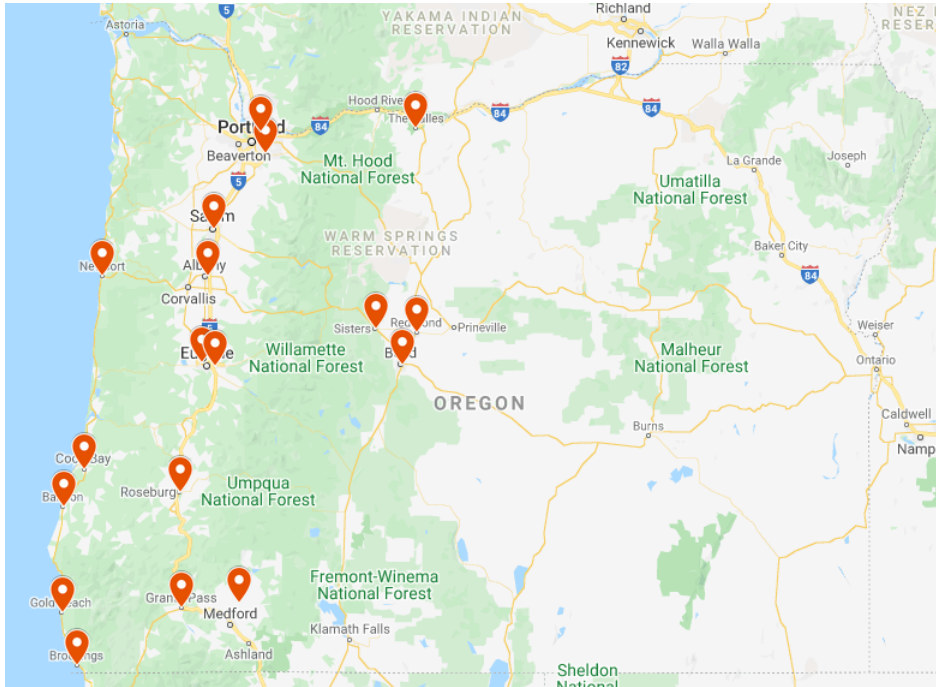


Figure 1 A map of the locations of the 24 listening sessions held in Oregon to prepare for this OAR.

We hosted 24 listening sessions (more were scheduled and cancelled due to COVID-19) from December 2019-March 2020 that included 5 public/community sessions, 8 student sessions, 10 educator sessions, Government to Government with the 9 Federally Recognized Tribes, and Family Advocates. We also hosted an online survey, available in 5 languages and by paper if requested, that mirrored the guiding questions of the listening sessions. The listening sessions were focused largely on mental and behavioral health absences but also facilitated discussion on barriers to student attendance overall. The notes from the meetings and 161 survey responses were analyzed for themes. These themes determined the questions that the Every Day Matters team was trying to answer in developing this OAR.

Following the first draft of the OAR, both internal and external partners that work with student attendance and student groups that are frequently chronically absent were solicited for feedback and two presentations were made to the newly-formed ODE Rules Advisory Committee.

- c. Who may be affected by this?
All students, families of students, and school staff may be affected by this rule, as this rule puts into place requirements for schools for when students are absent, notification to families about the types of excused absences available, and makes it not allowable to require the submission of proof of a medical visit.

Community health centers, mental and behavioral health professionals, and community organizations that provide supports to students referred to them may see an increase in need for providers and resources.

- d. Whose voice is missing potentially?
Because the listening sessions were halted, it is difficult to know that we heard voices of all of our historically underserved student populations and their families. We continue to work to gain feedback on the OAR but it is difficult at this time with the many needs of schools and districts to rethink education during a pandemic.

- e. What additional information does the Board need prior to moving forward?
The team kept equity at the forefront of all conversations. Which of our students reported experiencing grade reductions for days missed from school? Which of our students are most likely to not be able to produce a doctor's note confirming an appointment in the case of an illness absence? What steps can we put into place that create conversations around available resources for our students experiencing a mental health need?

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

- a. How have you intentionally involved stakeholders who are also members of communities affected by this rule?
We have intentionally spoken with school administrators and teachers, attendance clerks, students, parents, and community members. While we did not have listening sessions with all affinity groups that we were planning, due to COVID-19, we have been thoughtful about reaching out for feedback and OAR revision.

- b. Who are the historically underserved groups affected?
The design of the OAR and the feedback received thus far is that this rule positively affects our historically underserved students. This is through the removal of practices that have been found to disproportionately affect students of color and students experiencing poverty to the detriment of their education.

The common requirement that students produce a healthcare provider note in the instance of an illness disproportionately affects our students experiencing poverty, students experiencing houselessness, and our rural students, all of whom may find it more difficult to transport to and receive medical care. Further, this practice does not align with the spirit of HB 2191, which adds mental and behavioral health as excused absences, since not all mental and behavioral health absences will be tended to by a mental health provider.

The portion addressing grading policies removes the allowance for teachers and administrators to inequitably deduct grades as a result of absence, unless the school board has adopted a specific grading policy as outline in ORS 339.280.

School district personnel have reported that they are intentionally keeping the allowable excused absence of mental or behavioral health days a secret so that students don't "abuse" the policy. We believe that all students and parents should be provided the policy around excused absences yearly so that they may be informed that these excused absences exist, hence the section about inclusion in the student handbook.

- c. If the rule change or policy decision has tribal implications and it has been deemed appropriate by the Department's Tribal Liaison, the Deputy Superintendent, or State Board, has there been engagement or collaboration with tribes in this rule change or policy decision?

All 9 Federally-Recognized tribes were included in the listening session that took place during the Government to Government in Spring 2020. Ramona Halcomb, Indian Education Specialist at the ODE, has collaborated on this OAR, and outreach to the tribes for OAR review continues to occur.

- d. How has the Oregon Department of Education modified or enhanced the rule change or policy decision to address the needs of historically underserved communities?
We expect these policy changes presented in this OAR to positively impact our historically underserved communities by removing stated barriers to their education. These barriers include inequitable views of legitimacy of student absences and makeup policies,

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2. Negative/Positive Effects
 - a. What is the impact on the population most affected by this rule that the board should consider?
School districts may require notes from healthcare administrators to act as a deterrent to absences and this OAR eliminates this option. They also may use grading policies that reduce assignment or course grades to deter from absences. School districts will potentially have fewer policies in place to deter from student absences.
 - b. What is the impact on eliminating the opportunity or achievement gap?
It is expected that the impact to grading policies, family relationships, and student engagement when in school will be positive. This may see a closing of the opportunity and achievement gaps.
 - c. Have all the potential unintended consequences been considered?
If it is determined that unintended consequences arise from the adoption of this rule to negatively impact students, steps will be taken to amend the policy.
 - d. Does this rule advance the 40/40/20 goals?
Not directly, no; however, it is expected that the long term effect will be fewer students pushed out of the educational system due to unmet mental health needs, punitive grading systems, and a lack of awareness about the resources available to them.
3. What are the barriers to more equitable outcomes, either:
 - a. State or federally mandated?
There is room in ORS 339.065 and 339.280 to consider how the current policies affect our students that have historically underserved in their education through inequitable attendance practices.
 - b. Political?
School districts may find it difficult to release the punitive consequences for absences due to the belief that those consequences will spur students to attend more frequently. Reducing grades and requiring doctor's notes are somewhat controversial.
 - c. Emotional?
 - d. Financial?
 - e. Programmatic?
School district reporting of attendance and use of attendance as a metric may cause some school districts to be less likely to educate parents and students about mental health absences or grant these days because of the accountability metrics.

EQUITY IMPACT ANALYSIS

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AGENDA ITEM: Student Absences

The following questions are designed to examine how the proposed rule, policy or action systematically affect historically underserved students and/or communities.

1. Will historically underserved populations be impacted by this docket item?
 - a. If yes, describe how the rule changes, policy, or action could produce other unintended consequences not listed in the docket.
Yes, we anticipate historically underserved students, particularly students of color and students experiencing poverty, to be positively impacted by this rule as it will put into place a response to absences that is less punitive and more supportive of student needs and barriers to attending. The punitive nature of attendance practices has disproportionately affected historically underserved students through inequitable implementation of policies.
 - b. If no, refer to *Policy Issue or Concerns* and identify the historically underserved populations affected. Conduct a reflection and examination, which will and should answer 1a.
2. Examine the potential impact of the rule changes, policy, or action on historically underserved populations in Oregon. Describe this ongoing and/or foreseeable impact, using as much detail as possible.
We have addressed this throughout the document and believe it to be clear that the impact is expected to be a remedy of areas of inequity among our historically underserved students.
3. Explain how the rule change, policy, or action works toward the elimination of either (one or both):
 - a. the achievement gap
 - b. the opportunity gap**By reducing the punitive nature of responses to absences and shifting the focus to student learning and well-being, it is expected that schools will alter the culture and climate of their learning so that there is a greater focus on connecting and engaging with students on a real, substantive way while also focusing on their well-being that then increases learning. Once students know that they are welcome back into the school after an absence, and that the staff and teachers care about both their physical, mental, and behavioral health and their learning, the students will feel able and supported in their education. This should result in decreases in both the achievement and opportunity gaps.**

FISCAL ANALYSIS

What is the fiscal impact of the proposed rule changes to the Department of Education, school districts, education service districts or schools? Use the following suggestions as a guide:

1. How does the proposed rule fit within the budget of the agency?
 - a. Which units/divisions/offices will be impacted and how?
There is not an anticipated impact to the budget of the agency.
2. How does the proposed rule change impact school districts and ESDs?
School districts will need to create and maintain resources and practices that address the needs of the student when the school is alerted that the student will be absent. This may

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require more staff time to have those conversations with parents, caregivers, and families to offer these materials. Additionally, more time will need to be allocated to building resource connections with community partners to ensure that families receive complete information about external community supports.

3. How does the proposed rule change impact schools and other educational institutions?
The expected impact to schools is a positive change in culture and climate with the shift from a penalizing response to absences to one of resources and support. There is not an anticipated fiscal impact beyond some staff time for conversations with parents, caregivers, and family.
4. Does the proposed rule change impact other stakeholders?
No.

EFFECT OF A "YES" OR "NO" VOTE

Explain the consequences of a Board approving or not approving the staff recommendation.

This OAR gives clarity to schools around the definition of a mental or behavioral health absence, directs schools to provide information to students on the types of absences they have available to them, including mental and behavioral health absences, requires schools to provide information about resources to students and families that experience an absence, and work with students to make up work that they missed in the event of an absence.

A yes vote on this OAR will ensure that schools are meeting those absence-related needs of students, particularly students historically marginalized in our educational system. It will create a conversation around attendance, student's mental health and other needs, and working together to ensure that an absence is not detrimental to a student's education and future.

A no vote on this OAR will maintain the status quo for students in Oregon, where they may be unaware that they are allowed to take time for their mental health. Responses to absences may continue to be punitive in nature and disproportionately affect our economically disadvantaged students and our students of color.

Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program: Definitions

The following definitions apply to OAR 581-017-0640 to 581-017-0650:

- (1) “Accredited” means a public or private post-secondary institution of education that has gone through a validation process to meet accreditation standards and is recognized by one of six accrediting bodies approved by the US Department of Education.
- (2) “Community College district” has the meaning in ORS 341.005(5).
- (3) “Education Service District” or “ESD” means education service district as defined in ORS 334.003(2).
- (4) “Public post-secondary institution of education” means:
 - (a) the following public universities:
 - (A) University of Oregon;
 - (B) Oregon State University;
 - (C) Portland State University;
 - (D) Oregon Institute of Technology;
 - (E) Western Oregon University;
 - (F) Southern Oregon University;
 - (G) Eastern Oregon University;
 - (b) Oregon Health and Science University
- (5) “Qualified as instructors of accelerated college credit program courses” means meeting the requirements of a high school’s higher education partner(s) to be able to teach a dual-credit course that can award students college credit.
- (6) “Rural” means NCES Census Codes Corresponding to Districts Eligible for Funding under the Rural Education Achievement Program (REAP):
 - (a) 32 - Town, Distant: Territory inside an urban cluster that is more than 10 miles and less than or equal to 35 miles from an urbanized area;

(b) 33 - Town, Remote: Territory inside an urban cluster that is more than 35 miles from an urbanized area;

(c) 41 - Rural, Fringe: Census-defined rural territory that is less than or equal to 5 miles from an urbanized area, as well as rural territory that is less than or equal to 2.5 miles from an urban cluster;

(d) 42 - Rural, Distant: Census-defined rural territory that is more than 5 miles but less than or equal to 25 miles from an urbanized area, as well as rural territory that is more than 2.5 miles but less than or equal to 10 miles from an urban cluster; and

(e) 43 - Rural, Remote: Census-defined rural territory that is more than 25 miles from an urbanized area and is also more than 10 miles from an urban cluster.

(7) "School district" means a common or union high school district.

(8) "Students from Racial or Ethnic Groups that Have Historically Experienced Academic Disparities" includes, but is not limited to American Indian and Alaska Native students, Black and African American students, Hispanic and Latino students, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander students, and multiracial students, and any other racial or ethnic group identified by the school district as historically experienced academic disparities.

Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program: Purpose

Grant funds may be used for:

(1) Expanding support for school districts, education service districts and public postsecondary institutions of education to provide professional learning opportunities for high school instructors of accelerated college credit program courses;

(2) Ensuring high school teachers have dependable online access to graduate courses meeting community college requirements for dual credit instructors;

(3) Improving professional relationships among instructors of accelerated college credit programs courses;

(4) Developing online graduate courses in content areas identified by the department in collaboration with the commission as needing development; and

(5) Collecting and analyze qualitative experience data related to the provision of professional development and training to instructors of accelerated college credit program courses, with an emphasis on development and training programs that are able to increase the number of instructors who are qualified to provide accelerated college credit program courses.

(6) Tuition reimbursement by an eligible applicant for tuition credits earned at an accredited private or public post-secondary institution of education.

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BACKGROUND

In 2019, the Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law HB 2263 (2019). Sections 4 through 6 of that bill direct the Oregon Department of Education, in collaboration with the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC), to administer the Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program. The proposed rules are necessary for the Department to administer that grant.

The stakeholder engagement in this process preceded the adoption of HB 2263 and entailed a 2-year collaboration with k-12 and higher education leaders. The engagement included feedback from the Oregon Education Association (OEA) Gold Standards and a large student survey with partner “Oregon Student Voice.” The HB 2263 legislative record includes testimony from citizens, dual credit coordinators, college and career readiness personnel, higher education partners, and OEA. ODE has drafted the previous adopted administrative rules in consultation with the Sustainable Systems for Accelerated Learning Work Group, consisting of statewide leaders throughout the education system, including community colleges, universities, school districts, education ESDs, ODE and HECC.

The Office of Legislative Counsel reviewed adopted administrative rules for the Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program. The review found the term “public post-secondary institutions of education” included “not-for-profit institutions of higher education” which may be problematic and inconsistent with the legislative intent. The proposed rule amendments fixes the definition and how grant funds may be used.

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

The bill is fairly prescriptive. However, the Board does have discretion to set some additional criteria for the grant program. In **581-010-0640 Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program** add definition for “accredited”: means a public or private post-secondary institution of education that has gone through a validation process to meet accreditation standards and is recognized by one of six accrediting bodies approved by the US Department of Education.

In **581-010-0644 Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program** add more explicit language for whom is to receive tuition reimbursement: Tuition reimbursement by an eligible applicant for tuition credits earned at an accredited private or public post-secondary institution of education to high school instructors of accelerated college credit program courses.

EQUITY IMPACT ANALYSIS

As the funding is limited, a rating system might be required to determine eligibility and some teachers might not receive funding. Through the process of re-imbusement, only teachers or districts who can pay the costs up front will be able to access this grant. As schools that are rural and/or with low levels of historically underserved students participating in accelerated learning receive the highest priority in award of this funding, excluding an interested teacher in one of these schools is unlikely.

Teachers, through increased access to graduate level college credit in their content area, will deepen their subject area knowledge and capacity for college teaching and will meet their higher education partners’ instructor qualifications requirements for dual-credit courses, thereby increasing access to college credit for historically underserved student populations in Oregon. Research shows that students who partake in accelerated learning opportunities are more likely to graduate, participate in higher education, and persist in higher education.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

With regard to the fiscal impact of this rule, the Accelerated College Credit Instructor Grant Program is already allocated in the 2019-2021 ODE budget per HB 2263. These funds were reduced by 50% during the budget reduction process. All Grant Agreements with ESDs were reduced 50% as a result. The Standards and Instructional Support Department in the Office of Teaching and Learning will manage this grant.

The following definitions apply to OAR 581-017-0693 to 581-017-0708

(1) “Afro-Latino/a/x” means an individual from Mexican, Central American, South American, or Caribbean communities who identify with African ancestry.

(2) “Central American” means an individual of descent from: Belize, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, or Panama, including Black, Afro-Latino/a/x, and Indigenous communities residing in those nations.

(3) “Community-Based Organization” means a nonprofit organization that is reflective of a community or significant segments of a community it seeks to serve.

(4) “Community Voice” means that members representing the community served by the project will be involved in co-constructing the project design, implementation, and/or providing strategic guidance in final decision-making.

(5) “Culturally Specific Organization” means an organization that serves a particular cultural community and is primarily staffed and led by members of that community; these organizations demonstrate: intimate knowledge of lived experience of the community, including but not limited to the impact of structural and individual racism or discrimination on the community; knowledge of specific disparities, barriers or challenges documented in the community and how that influences the structure of their program or service; commitment to the community’s strength-based and self-driven thriving and resilience; ability to describe and adapt their services to the community’s cultural practices, health and safety beliefs/practices, positive cultural identity/pride, religious beliefs, etc.

(6) “Department” means the Oregon Department of Education.

(7) “Disproportionate” refers to unequal or inequitable differences in access and outcomes that historical and current-day White supremacy has created between certain families, children and students. What is “proportionate,” however, must also be critically analyzed and addressed in terms of its values, intent, and ideology.

(8) “Indigenous” means an individual from Mexican, Central American, South American, or Caribbean communities who identify with indigenous or tribal communities from those geographic regions.

(9) “Latino/a/x and Indigenous Student Success Grant” or “Grant” means a grant established by ORS 329.845.

(10) “Latino/a/x and Indigenous Student Success Plan” means the plan established by ORS 329.845 and adopted by the State Board of Education.

(11) “Partnership” means a group of organizations, Tribes, districts or individuals who agree to work together with a common interest and shared vision. In a partnership, there is a high level of trust and 2-way communication, and differences in power and privilege are addressed. Roles and responsibilities on all sides are well-defined and developed with shared authority in decision making. There might be shared space and staff, with expectations and agreements in writing. .

(12) “South American” means an individual of descent from: Brazil, Colombia, Argentina, Peru, Venezuela, Chile, Ecuador, Bolivia, Paraguay, Uruguay, Guyana, Suriname, French Guiana, Falkland Island including Black, Afro-Latino/a/x, and Indigenous communities residing in those nations.

(13) “Student” means a student enrolled in early childhood through post-secondary education who:

(a) Is Latino/a/x, Hispanic, Black, Afro-Latino/a/x, or Indigenous, including individuals of Mexican, Cuban, Puerto Rican, Dominican, South American or, Central American descent; and

(b) Has experienced disproportionate results in education due to current and historical practices and policies, as identified by the State Board of Education by rule.

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BACKGROUND

The Student Success Act (HB 3427) was passed in 2019 by the Oregon Legislature to create a significant investment in Oregon's schools. The SSA includes sections to address the educational achievement gap experienced by Latino/a/x and Indigenous students.

The current temporary rules expire in November 2020 so the Department is proposing permanent rules. The rules create the structure to award SSA grant funding to address the disproportionate results in education due to historical practices faced by Latino/a/x and Indigenous students. The first round of grant making awarded this past summer informed the updates to the rules. The permanent rules establish grant eligibility, applicant criteria, and key priorities for funding. The rules will also provide a framework for the development of the Latino/a/x and Indigenous Student Success Plan, which is scheduled for adoption in early 2021.

These rules will impact Latino/a/x and Indigenous families and students across the state, community based organizations who serve those communities, and school districts. The department consulted the Interim Latino/a/x Student Success Advisory Committee and community members involved in the Rules Advisory Committee.

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

In developing the rules, we were challenged in creating a grant-making process that allows for different types of organizations and community groups to apply. We recognize that in many parts of our state, there may not be a culturally-specific organization representing communities of color. We created funding criteria and priorities that will prioritize culturally-specific organizations, and in regions of the state where that may not be an option, ensure that community voice is centered in the decision-making of the funded project.

We are continuing our work to establish definitions across the Department that reflect the different ways our communities show up, center equity, and address deficit-based language. We are creating funding criteria that prioritizes authentic and accountable partnerships between potential grantees and the community members they are accountable to.

EQUITY IMPACT ANALYSIS

In Oregon, Latino/a/x and Indigenous students experience worse educational outcomes than their white peers. This is due to historic and current systemic inequities that exist across the state. These rules will support community-based organizations, providers of early learning services, school districts, and higher education institutions to improve educational outcomes by developing programs and addressing inequities at the systemic level.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

The proposed rules will not have a negative fiscal impact on the Department. The legislature has not yet allocated funding for the Latino/a/x and Indigenous Student Success Plan after the 2019-2021 biennium. The grants may potentially have a positive fiscal impact for early learning hubs, providers of early learning services, school districts, post-secondary institutions of education, and community-based organizations who are working to design, implement, improve, or expand, programs and services for Latino/a/x and Indigenous students.

American Indian/Alaska Native Student Success Plan Grant Program: Definitions

The following definitions apply to OAR 581-017-0675 to 581-017-0690:

- (1) “American Indian/ Alaska Native Student Success Plan Grant” or “Grant” means a Grant established under ORS 329.843.
- (2) “Community-Based Organization” means a nonprofit organization that is representative of a community or significant segments of a community, and that is located within or in close proximity to the community it serves.
- (3) “Community Voice” means that members representing the community served by the project must be involved in the design, implementation, and/or provide strategic guidance.
- (4) “Culturally Responsive” means the implicit recognition and incorporation of the cultural knowledge and experience of students served by the plan in teaching, learning and assessment. This includes identifying and valuing: students’ cultural assets in instruction and assessment; diverse frames of reference that correspond to multifaceted cultural perspectives/experiences; and performance styles in the classroom that do not reflect dominant values of achievement or success.
- (5) “Culturally Specific Organization” means an organization that serves a particular cultural community and is primarily staffed and led by members of that community; these organizations demonstrate intimate knowledge of lived experience of the community, including but not limited to the impact of structural and individual racism or discrimination on the community; knowledge of specific disparities or challenges documented in the community and how that influences the structure of their program or service; ability to describe the community’s cultural practices, health and safety beliefs/practices, positive cultural identity/pride/resilience, religious beliefs, etc. and how their services have been adapted to those cultural norms.
- (6) “Department” means the Oregon Department of Education.
- (7) “Disproportionate Discipline” means disproportionate rates of suspensions and expulsions for American Indian/ Alaska Native students compared to their white classmates who commit similar infractions and who have similar discipline histories.
- (8) “Opportunity gap” refers to the effects and disparities the dominant, White supremacist system and culture has historically, currently, and intentionally created for groups of students where factors such as race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, English proficiency, geography, financial wealth, gender, sexuality, familial situations, and disabilities determine or constrain what opportunities the system offers and how these affect their educational aspiration, achievement, and attainment. These effects and disparities form an educational debt that the dominant educational system owes to marginalized students as well as a need to address and shift the system itself.
- (9) “Student” means individuals who self-identify as American Indian/ Alaska Native who are enrolled in early childhood through post-secondary education.

(10) "Tribe" means a federally recognized tribal government in Oregon: the Burns Paiute Tribe; the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw Indians; the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians; the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde; the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians; the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation; the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs; the Coquille Indian Tribe, and the Klamath Tribes.

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BACKGROUND

Under House Bill 3427, section 38 Statewide Equity Initiatives, the Student Success Act directs the Department of Education Office of Indian Education (OIE) to develop and implement a statewide education plan for American Indian/ Alaska Native students who are enrolled in early childhood learning through post-secondary education programs.

OIE has convened the American Indian/ Alaska Native (AI/AN) State Advisory Committee on Indian Education, comprised of members of the AI/AN community and other stakeholders from across the state of Oregon, to advise and provide recommendations and input to the office regarding the development and implementation of the plan.

The focal points of the plan are to address:

- American Indian Student Success Outcomes
- Increase Graduation, increased achievement by closing opportunity gaps, increase attendance, address disproportionate discipline
- Diversity educator advancement and workforce development
- School, district, community, tribal development and engagement
- Professional development
- Curriculum and instructions

The first AI/AN Education state plan was originally developed and implemented in October 1991. It was updated in 2006. And again in 2017.

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Development of the AI/AN State Education plan and its updates have been guided through a collaborative process and shared leadership by the AI/AN Advisory Committee Members, AI/AN students and youth, Tribes, ODE leadership, the Government to Government Education Cluster (comprised of representatives from each of the 9 federally recognized tribes in Oregon), the general AI/AN community and other committed stakeholders. By engaging the wider community through public community conversations and data analyses, the Office of Indian Education

The board has discretion to define terms, establish the components of the implementation of the Student Success Plan, identify other factors that may be included in the implementation of the Student Success Plan, and set requirements to receive the grant awards. Any decisions in these areas must not conflict with, or go beyond, statutory authority.

In addition to advisement from region's nine (9) Federally recognized tribal governments, in order to ensure that the Student Success Plan was co-developed with our partners, other recommendations and input were received from the following:

- K-12 public school students;
- Families;
- Communities;
- Tribal governments;
- Educators;
- Public charter schools;
- School Districts; and
- General public.

After the Office of Indian Education released two RFAs for Student Success and Educator Success, feedback from community and Tribes were solicited after receiving a low turnout of applications. At our AI/AN Advisory Committee meeting, held on November 3, 2020, we requested feedback from both tribal representatives and advisory committee members as to why they think we did not get more

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applications and what barriers tribes may be facing. We've included the written responses from that request. Tribes and advisory committee members called on an increased indirect rate. Proposed rules reflect the increase.

Additionally, OIE has worked with the ODE Rules Advisory Committee to utilize terminology that is equity-based and rooted in community voice so that term definitions are consistent.

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

The Office of Indian Education has considered the policy issues and/ or concerns that could arise during the implementation of the Student Success Plan Grant Program. The Office has intentionally involved all stakeholders who are also members of the communities affected by the administrative rules. This includes the involvement of the AI/AN State Advisory Committee on Indian Education and the Education Cluster during Government to Government meeting on October 6, 2020 and on November 6, 2020.

EQUITY IMPACT ANALYSIS

The Office of Indian Education strategically aligned the plan with ODE's strategic goals and key initiatives, including boosting attendance and graduation rates for American Indian / Alaska Native students, providing culturally relevant professional development for school district staff, increasing recruitment and retention of Native teachers, and implementing historically-accurate, culturally-embedded Native American curriculum and instructional materials across the K-12 system.

In September 2017, the American Indian / Alaska Native Students In Oregon: A Review of Key Indicators¹ report was published. The primary data source for this report is available on the ODE website at [Reports and Data](http://www.oregon.gov/ode/reports-and-data). This data was utilized to drive discussions and create objectives outlined in the revised 2018-2023 American Indian Alaska Native Education Plan. It is important to recognize, these objectives are not all inclusive but a guide to improve educational outcomes including system improvements for our AI/AN students.¹

All objectives outlined in this plan is an overarching effort to increase graduation rates for AI/AN students in which these students and youth meet and exceed statewide averages for all students and youth with the knowledge that graduation rates vary among student population groups, with historic and current rates for economically disadvantaged, special education,

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homeless, emergent bilingual, Black/African-American, Latino/a/x, American Indian/Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander students falling below the overall state average.

The AI/AN Student Success Plan implemented with an equity lens may help diminish this opportunity gap because it will allow school districts to identify and tailor culturally-responsive supports for students. In addition, the Student Success Plans allows districts to compare data of specific student populations to determine which interventions are working and those that are not effective. This will allow districts to change their system practices to prevent issues before they arise.

To ensure that the AI/AN Student Success Plan is centered on equity, the proposed rules require grant recipients to participate in ODE technical assistance, which must include how to use these systems to support equitable outcomes for students.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

The proposed rules will not have a negative fiscal impact on the Department. The legislature allocated \$3.19m for awarding AI/AN Student Success Plan grants during the 2019-21 biennium. It will have a positive fiscal impact for early learning hubs, providers of early learning services, school districts, Education Service Districts, post-secondary institutions of education, community-based organizations and Tribe(s) who are working to design, implement, improve, expand, or otherwise revise programs and services for American Indian/ Alaska Native students that receive a grant.

EFFECT OF A "YES" OR "NO" VOTE

Second Read: If the Board adopts the rules, OIE will have the necessary requirements in place to develop grant agreements and issue grant awards statewide. If the Board does not adopt the rules, OIE will not have the requirements and policies necessary to effectively administer the grant program. It will need to bring the rules back to the Board at a later date. It is currently operating on temp rules that are set to expire in December 2020.

Summary:

Two recent RFAs were released for the Office of Indian Education for Student Success and Educator Success. To date, we have only received 10 applications, though we did have 29 downloads of the application. We extended the deadline to submit applications and sent a notification to stakeholders. At our AIAN Advisory Committee meeting, held on November 3, 2020, we requested feedback from both tribal representatives and advisory committee members as to why they think we did not get more applications and what barriers tribes may be facing. We've included the written responses from that request below.

The indirect rate is a direct barrier and concern for our Tribe's education department to apply for projects; as the time to document, seek approval and administer new projects is not a small burden upon tribal departments'. In many cases, the tribal administration requests that a tribal department remunerate the funding from other sources and in most cases, this is not possible. This is a direct impact as to whether the time for research/development and advocacy in effort into the possibility that a project may/may not be supported and/or approved through various internal processing.

A solution could be to allow that in-kind or a similar match, in the sense of time spent involved with the delivery of new projects become a forthcoming and known acceptable practice; so that a limit set to INDIRECT does not directly impact participation in (ODE programs) project intent.

Our Tribe has requested that all grant submissions include the federal indirect rate. This is for obvious business reasons, there is quite a bit of overhead involved in administering any grants. The Tribe needs to be prudent with labor and resources when looking at grant opportunities.

If a granting agency does not allow indirect or asks that indirect be lower than the federal rate, there is a high likelihood that the request to submit a grant application will not even make it past our internal grant committee.

An indirect cap rate of 10% is a barrier to our Tribe to apply for these funds. Tribes negotiate an indirect rate using a federally mandated calculation that is approved and audited annually. We are then required to use this rate for all funding. An award with a capped rate that is less than the federally negotiated rate creates a funding gap that the tribe is legally obligated to close using their funds.

An established indirect rate is a good deal for small non-profits because they don't have to go through the effort of establishing their indirect rate, which is a complex and burdensome process. This penalizes Tribes because 10% doesn't begin to cover indirect costs. So while this particular grant targets the majority of our AI/AN youth and programs, and we believe that we could offer meaningful services that meet the grant objectives, this established indirect rate prevents us from pursuing because receiving the grant would cost us money. This can be sometimes equal to or more than the value of the grant and is money which the Tribe does not have.

10% indirect rate coverage is better than not allowing any, but it is an economic hardship because we as departments are required to pay the administration whatever the currently negotiated rate is. In our case, the rate for 2020, it is 26.09%. This means that the department has to find the resources to pay the remaining 16.09% due to our tribal administration for expenses incurred as a result of the implementation of the grant.

Tribal non-profits are required to fundraise the difference if the indirect amount is lower than the agency indirect %. It puts a burden on program staff who don't have the ability to fundraise when the majority of their time is spent on programming.

The thought and intent is well meaning I believe that a 5% indirect limit and also raising the percentage from 5 to 10% is better.

It isn't until writing and winning grants, I had realized that there are so many more parts to receiving grant money as well. The finance person who works on the budget, the finance supervisor who guides and instructs decisions, to the ultimate authorization of the top Tribal official. The indirect rate covers the electricity, the building maintenance, and costs for lawyers who look over contracts to ensure the language is agreeable to the Tribes as a whole, should the contract need oversight and acceptance of the Tribal Council their time is also a consideration. Most times the small indirect rate will not cover time of the initial finance person.

After careful consideration, I have changed my position to believing a 15% indirect is more comparable to all the "hidden" costs of receiving grant money. And when it's appropriate the negotiated federal IDC would be most beneficial.

Thank you for considering these barriers for tribes to apply for the current grants.

Subject: Request for Waiver from ODE to Use Community Connections for HS Students

Baker SD 5J is requesting a waiver from the Oregon Department of Education to allow for the use of Public Transportation as a means of transporting grades 9-12 students immediately to end of SY 2021.

The basis for the request lies within the inability of our Transportation Department to deliver all our students to and from school while keeping students physically distanced on the bus thus meeting the recommendations outlined in RSSL. The waiver would allow for in-town 9-12 grade students to ride public transportation. Those students would walk to designated pick up locations and then the public bus would drop off the students at BHS and Eagle Cap Innovative High School.

Families would purchase the bus pass for their student from Public Transportation. The District would then reimburse the families for the purchase of a Bus Pass. The District will then seek reimbursement from the state transportation grant.

By having the ability to provide public transportation as an option benefits the community greatly. We can provide high quality in person education to all our students and continue to follow the protocols and guidelines amidst this pandemic. By utilizing public transportation, the District will be allowed to serve Special Education students to the same high level of service they are accustomed to receiving.

By utilizing public transportation, we will be able to transport our students safely and efficiently. The public transportation service will have the required background checks as well as the Special Education training needed.

We will work closely with Community Connections by providing the necessary supervision at stops to make sure students are loading and unloading appropriately. We will communicate and discuss problems as they arise. This will be a daily check-in mirroring our current protocols with BSD Bus drivers. We will continually monitor the overall situation and make adjustments as necessary. Data will be analyzed and reported out where appropriate.

Baker School District appreciates your consideration of allowing us to utilize Community Connections as a resource that will expand our capacity to deliver students to in person instructions while maintaining the recommendations from RSSL. We are hoping that this request can be expedited so that we can safely move a fourth of our 9-12 students back to in person school.

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BACKGROUND

ORS 327.043 requires school districts to provide transportation for secondary students who reside more than 1.5 miles from school unless that requirement is waived by the State Board of Education:

327.043 When district required to provide transportation; waiver.

(1) A school district is required to provide transportation for elementary students who reside more than one mile from school and for secondary school students who reside more than 1.5 miles from school. A district is also required to provide transportation for any student identified in a supplemental plan approved by the State Board of Education.

(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, the State Board of Education may waive the requirement to provide transportation for secondary school students who reside more than 1.5 miles from school. A district must present to the board a plan providing or identifying suitable and sufficient alternate modes of transporting secondary school students.

Baker School District is requesting a waiver of the requirement to provide transportation for students in grades 9-12. The district's request (attachement 1) sets out the district's plan for alternative transportation.

Superintendent Mark Witty will attend the Board meeting to answer any questions for the Board.

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION

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MEETING DATE: November 19, 2020

This is the first time the Board has considered this waiver request from Baker School District. The Board has previously considered transportation waiver requests, but none of those requests have related to the specific concerns posed by COVID-19.

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

1. Impact on families

The proposed waiver has the impact of shifting responsibility for much of the transportation of students from the district to the families. ODE staff have raised this concern for the district. Superintendent Witty will be prepared to explain the equity impacts of this waiver proposal on the district's families.

2. Impact of COVID

The Department's [Ready Schools Safe Learners guidance](#) does impose requirements on districts related to transportation. (See section 2i.) For example, the guidance recommends the following:

- Provide at least three feet of physical distance between passengers. Potential exposures on a bus are significantly reduced by three feet of distance, in combination with face coverings, and open windows for ventilation.
- When feasible, provide at least six feet of physical distance between the driver and passengers (except during boarding and while assisting those with mobility devices); reinforce this requirement by cordoning off seats as appropriate.

These requirements impact the number of students a district is able to transport using district school busses.

3. Reimbursement from the transportation grant fund

The district's waiver requests states "Families would purchase the bus pass for their student from Public Transportation. The District would then reimburse families for the purchase of the Bus Pass. The District will then seek reimbursement from the state transportation grant."

ODE staff have raised concerns about whether the cost of the bus passes would be an approved cost that could be reimbursed from the state transportation grant. Staff continue to work on determining whether that could be a reimbursed cost. At this point, the Board should consider it highly unlikely that the district would be reimbursed for the cost of the bus passes through state transportation grant.

If the board votes YES, the district will no longer be required to provide transportation to students in grades 9-12.

If the board votes NO, the district will be required to provide transportation to students in grades 9-12 who live more than 1.5 miles from the school.

Board Advisors/Stakeholder Groups - Policy #102

A. Creation and Term of Board Advisors

The board may elect to have board advisors. Advisors will serve a one-year term from July 1 through June 30. Advisors may serve more than a single term and be re-elected for consecutive terms. Advisors will receive all materials distributed to the board as a whole

1. Criteria for Advisor Selection

- Interest in serving as an advisor for one year
- Commitment to attend board meetings and any special board functions
- Willingness to participate in policy discussions
- Ability to deliberate policy issues
- Demonstrated leadership qualities
- Experience with education delivery in Oregon
- Actively employed in good standing

2. Advisors

- K-12 School Administrator
- K-12 Teacher
- K-12 Student
- K-12 Elected School Board Member
- Early Learning Teacher/Professional Advisor

3. Advisor Selection Process

In consultation with the ~~Superintendent of Public Instruction~~Director of the Oregon Department of Education and the board chair, advisors will be selected as follows:

K-12 School Administrator: Up to three nominations from the ~~Coalition~~federation of Oregon School Administrators will be submitted to the

board. The board Executive Committee will recommend a candidate to the full board who will vote on the selection.

K-12 Teacher: Up to three nominations from the Oregon Education Association will be submitted to the board. The board Executive Committee will recommend a candidate to the full board who will vote on the selection.

K-12 Student: The board administrator will solicit candidates, review applications, and forward up to three names to an interviewing committee named by the board chair who will recommend a candidate to the full board who will vote on the selection.

K-12 Elected School Board Member: Up to three nominations from the Oregon School Boards Association will be submitted to the board. The board Executive Committee will recommend a candidate to the full board who will vote on the selection.

Board advisors will be approved by a vote of the full board.

4. Responsibilities of Advisors

- Attend board meetings
- Assist the board in analyzing issues, proposals, and requests before it
- Other duties as assigned by the board chair

5. Advisor Compensation

Advisors are eligible for reimbursement of actual expenses incurred in attending board meetings and board- related activities, including mileage, meals, and hotels.

B. Stakeholder Groups

The board may vote to have regular reports from stakeholder groups including but not limited to:

1. Recognized Stakeholders

- Oregon School Boards Association
- Oregon Education Association
- ~~Confederation~~ Coalition of Oregon School Administrators
- Nine Confederated Tribes of Oregon

- Parent Groups

2. Responsibilities of Stakeholders

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BACKGROUND

The State Board of Education Policy and Procedures Manual states in Policy Number 102 that each year, the board may elect to have board advisors. The Board of Education selects new or reappoints advisors on a yearly basis. Advisors serve a one-year term from July 1 through June 30 and may serve more than a single term and be re-elected for consecutive terms.

The Policy and Procedure manual calls for the nominations of four advisors: K-12 Administrator, K-12 Teacher, K-12 Student, and Early Learning Advisor.

This year the SBE is considering action to enhance equity, diversity, and inclusion policies and efforts at the local school board level. Due to this focus, the State Board of Education would like to have the voice of a local school board member who would be ready to engage in these conversations.

The SBE Policy and Procedure manual does not currently provide a process for the selection of a local school board member and therefore needs to be revised to add a fifth category and create a selection process for a local school board member.

Revisions proposed:

- Addition of a K-12 Elected School Board Member as a Board Advisor
- Inclusion of a process that mirrors the Superintendent and Teacher advisor selection processes: Up to three nominations are to be submitted by the Oregon School Boards Association and the Board Executive Committee will recommend a candidate to the full board who will vote on the selection.
- A requirement that the school board advisor needs to be currently serving as a local school board member and have an interest in serving as an advisor for one year; a commitment to attend board meetings and any special board functions; a willingness to participate in policy discussions and policy deliberation.

POLICY ISSUE OR CONCERNS

The Policy and Procedures manual provides a process for the selection of board advisors. Over time, there have been specific groups the Board has depended on to nominate individuals to serve as board advisor nominations such as the Coalition of Oregon School Administrators and the Oregon Education Association.

With the adoption of 2020-2021 strategic initiatives in October 2020, the Board articulated its intent to consider equity initiatives and policies that are, should, or could be initiated at the local level. It is the Board's intention to take into account the perspectives and experiences of school boards as the Board delves into this work.

Dear Kimberly and Colt,

While the rural-urban divide is nothing new at the state level, it took moving from inner SE Portland to a 20-acre farm outside of Newberg for me to understand the rural perspective. Every Oregonian would be so lucky as to experience living in a rural setting in our beautiful state! I have seen a small slice of it traveling through Yamhill and Polk counties meeting superintends and school board members in my role as Region 13 representative to the OSBA Board of Directors. The natural beauty and majesty are awe-inspiring and humbling. It is undeniable that the support and revitalization of our rural communities depend on thriving school districts. Schools that support the whole child and end systemic oppression.

As chair of the Newberg school board, I have seen first hand what wilful ignorance looks like. In response to our board's adoption of an anti-racist resolution and creating a board goal to become an anti-racism school board, the board has received high community involvement. Some claim that racism does not exist in our community. Others think that the board is being racist in claiming that BIPOC students face systemic oppression. A recent unsanctioned political rally on school grounds included people openly carrying weapons and flashing white power signs, was described as a "parade." The whitewashing and denial of oppression are astounding. Unfortunately, Newberg is not an outlier in this.

I share this experience not because I am losing hope, quite the opposite. State-wide equity work is imperative, and that includes a focus on supporting our rural districts in this often contentious and painful work. If we hope to create a state education system that serves ALL students, we must include our rural communities. We must have their participation and engagement if we are to have any hope of addressing hundreds of years of state-sanctioned oppression.

It would be an honor to serve in an advisory role to the state board of education as we continue to grow into a more equitable state. This may be the most critical work of our lifetimes and positively impact generations of Oregonians. As a locally elected school board member representing rural and medium-sized districts, I offer an unwavering commitment to social justice and a dedication to creating an equitable education system for all Oregonians.
